26 Mile House	Near Milton	1 burial in 1909
French Camp Cemetery	On land once belonging to Sidney "Babe" Airola, Airola Road off of Parotts Ferry Road	Supposedly 3 burials. At least one is supposed to be one of the original French men that lived there in the mid 1800s. Private land.
Airola/Rasmussen Cemetery	On Red Hill Road lower end near Carson Hill.	Only known graves are John William Airola and Elizabeth Darby Airola, both recent graves, but there are possibly others. Fenced area with gravestone on private land.
Alber's Ranch	1 mile E. of Glencoe on N. side of Hwy 26.	Private land. Members of the Albers family.
Altaville Catholic	Take Stockton Rd. off Hwy 4. 1/4 mile east on S. side of road	Major cemetery still in use
Altaville Protestant	Take Stockton Rd. off Hwy 4. 1/4 mile east on N. side of road	Major cemetery still in use
Altaville Serbian	Take Stockton Rd. off Hwy 4. 1/4 east on N. side of road past the Catholic Cemetery	Major cemetery still in use
Angels Camp Congregational Church	On E. side of Hwy 4/49 (Main Street) on the church property	Started in the 1850's but many bodies moved to other cemeteries later. Few headstones remain.
Angels Point	Stanislaus River, Calaveras Co.CA	Michael McCarty, age one month, in July 1852. Baby of Agnes & Thomas McCarty.
Bardsley plot	Follow Hwy 26 across the N. Fork of the Moke. River and going N. to West Point, on left side of hwy. is a narrow gravel road leading to some commercial buildings. Beyond these shops aabout 1/4 mile on left side of road, up a slope about 100' you can see the fence enclosing the burial site	Possibly this may be the Rich Gulch Cemetery. Description says 2 plots. One has at least 5 of the Bardsley, Herbert and Spink family members in it. The other plot is of an unknown group.
Barnhart Ranch	West Point area	1903 to 1934. Five family graves known. Private land.
Bayles Ranch	Glencoe	4 burials known. 1923-1957. Private land.
Beardslee burial site	Near junction of Telegraph City Road and Hwy 4, just S of Hwy 4.	Rock wall surrounds one grave with headstone. Possible at least one more unmarked. At Robert Beardslee's death it said he was buried in "the family cemetery" so would assume others also there.
Bosse Ranch	Railroad Flat area	2 burials named to this site. 1939 & 1891
Brewery Gulch	In Murphys, located behind the location of the brewery of John and Conrad Hauselt in the limestone belt. (near the intersection of French Gulch, Murphys Grade Rd. and Main Street). Private land.	Listed in Edna Buckbee's writings and in scrapbook of E. Christ. She states that this is where the people who died in a smallpox epidemic of 1851 were buried with no headstones. Only person named as buried there is Ed Duffy.
Briseno Ranch	San Domingo Creek near Esmeralda	11 known burials. 1860's-1952
Brownsville	1 mile E. of Murphys on Pennsylvania Gulch Rd. on right side at curve where Brownsville historical marker is.	Many graves were there but markers were pulled up and thrown in creek by Table Mt. Ranch foreman George Hinkston so cattle could graze. Homes now built in area with only one visible grave plot, under large oak with iron fence. 3 graves inside fence, all of the Webster family.

Camanche area	At least 7 burial sites are now under the waters of Lake Comanche. The Army Corp of Engineers surveyed the sites, searched for relatives and re-interred the remains in the location of the families choice. Those who had no survivors were re-interred in the Pioneer Cemetery right outside of San Andreas.	The burial sites were Dorsey-Holman with 199 graves; Hill with 30 graves; Sheridan-Diebold with 10 sites; Poverty Bar with 41; Bigelow with 2 children; Briley-Rose-Williams with 3 men, Cooks Ranch with 1 grave and a lone grave at Lancha Plana
Campo Seco Catholic	Located just off Main Street in Campo Seco.	1860's to present
Campo Seco Protestant	In Campo Seco	1860's to present
Carlton Ranch	West Point	1 burial. Private land
Cave City	on the hillside above the old townsite. Property privately owned.	16 graves, 15 of them men who died "with their boots on" Ranging from 1850-56. (Chronicle 7/21/1883) Burial site is not visible today since no grave markers are there.
Chinese Cemeteries	Angels Camp on Birds Way. San Andreas on Pool Station Road and under present high school. Campo Seco on Penn Mine Road. Jenny Lind. Moke Hill in Protestant Cemetery. San Domingo Camp. French Hill Chinese Cemetery	No longer visible. Usually the Chinese were buried and later the bones would be dug up and shipped back to China so probably few bodies were remaining. French Hill has at least 3 burials dating 1896-1964.
Cook Ranch Cemetery	Between Comanche and Campo Seco	Supposed to have 5-6 graves. One, Alexander McDonald who died 12/18/1851 was reinterred in the Pioneer Cemetery in 1940. The other graves were not located. (Calaveras Weekly 8/23/1940)
Copperopolis	On Reed's Turnpike about 1/4 mile W. of Main Street in Copperopolis	1860's to present. Combined Catholic, Protestant, IOOF and Masonic.
Costello Ranch	Mountain Ranch area	Francis Earl Costello in 1944 and widow Norma C. Costello Stewart buried there in 1984. Private land
County Hospital Paupers Cemeteries: San Andreas	In San Andreas above the library on Gold Hunter Road on county property	There were 3 San Andreas hospitals ran by the county. One was near Hwy 49 at junction of Pool Station Road. There are no visible gravesites but a total of 15 are known to have been buried there. When this hospital burned down a new building appears to have been used across Hwy. 49 from the burnt one. It is unknown if deaths in this 2nd hospital were buried across the road in the already used cemetery area. The next county hospital was built in 1890 and was a large 2 story building on the site of the present government center. It had an orchard (some fruit trees can still be seen next to the Senior Center) a big garden and the Red Barn that is now a musuem. The indigents that died were buried on a plot of land at the top of the hill above the current road dept. yard and right below the old tennis club bld, with burials there going on into the 1920s and later. There is a barbed wire fence around the plot and rocks that were used to mark the head of graves are still visible. There are 400-500 burials there based on names from newspapers and Board of Supervisor Minutes.
County Hospital Cemetery: Pleasant Valley	About 6 miles from Moke Hill on Hwy 26 just N. of Rich Gulch Flat.	No markers. 9 known burials. 1850's grave sites. Site of the original Dr. Hoechenor's Mokelumne Hospital Cemetery. Private land
Crossett Ranch	Altaville area	1911-1927. Only one baby's and one adult grave known. Private land.

Danielson Ranch	Glencoe area	A family cemetery on private land. 8 burials known. 1910-2000
Davis Ranch	Esmeralda area	On the present Chatom Ranch. Has 5 known graves dating from 1905 to 1924
Dean Cemetery	North side of Hunt Road in Salt Springs Valley area	Has about 13 known graves mostly of the Dean and Hizer family. On private land
Demartinin Daughter Burial Site		one grave. Private land.
Dogtown		Unknown location or number of burials.
Doster Ranch	Mountain Ranch area	2 named burials. 1982 & 1998
Double Springs	On Double Springs Road about 1 mile W. of the junction with Hwy 26 on S. side of road	1850's to the present. A privately owned cemetery that the land owner still opens to public burial.
Elio burial site	Near Murphys	1 named burial dated 1908. Location not known.
Fourth Crossing	West of Hwy 49 on the Ponte Ranch.	1850's to 1900. This cemetery has about 30 known burials and possibly a dozen more but there are no grave markers remaining. It was last surveyed in 1962 and is on private property. 1864-1892
French Miner burial site	Esmeralda area	1 grave.
Gillam Ranch	Gillam Road off Double Springs Road.	3 graves known. 2 are Gillams buried there in 1880's. The other is a Farrell buried there in 1998. On private property known as the Rana Ranch in 2007.

Hills Cemetery	Burson area	1 burial site dated 1906
Hodson: Royal Mining Co.	Hodson, near Copperopolis	One baby in 1925 on the grounds of the Mining company and another in 1919 listed in the "Hodson cemetery"
Houston Ranch	Railroad Flat area	On private property. Members of the Houston family.
Hunt Road Cemetery	From Angels Camp take Hwy 4 to Hunt Road. On Red Hill Ranch about 2 1/2 mile. Cemetery on right side near a cattle pen. Has a wrought iron fence.	This may be the cemetery listed as McCarty Ranch cemetery?
Indian Cemetery, Saunders Ranch	Vallecito, Hwy 4 and Red Hill Road area on the N. side of Hwy 4 under a buckeye tree	The cemetery is estimated to have as many as 200 graves but only has one headstone, that of Ray Jeff who was a WW 2 hero. The older burials have rocks around the grave site but over the years the rocks have been displaced. On private land owned by the Saunders family who have been the owners since the Six Mile Indian Rancheria was populated.
Indian Cemetery, Williams Ranch	Murphys. Described as "on the ridge of the Williams Ranch". Probably close to Sheep Ranch Road.	There were many American Indian burials on the Williams Ranch which was above Murphys on the N. side of Hwy 4 past Williams Street. Some of the known American Indian burials are Sally Jack, Captain Yaqui, Pedro Conner, Betsy Brown.
Indian Cemetery: Eaph's Cemetery	On John Eaph Trail off of Bald Mountain Road, West Point area	An Native American Indian burial site. 1800's to 2001
Indian Cemetery: Hunter Family Cemetery	E. of Arnold off Hwy. 4 on Summit Level Road in the Dorrington area. Left on Summit Level about 1/4 mile then turn Rt. About 1/4 mile on left under trees	4 tombstones but at least 7 known burials and possibly many more especially of Hunter family (Native American Indians)

Indian Cemetery: Murphys Rancheria	On a ridge above Algiers, hidden in brush and on private property	Used in earlier years as an Indian burial site. Last known burial was Ramon Jesus in 1909.
Indian Cemetery: Sandy Gulch	West Point area, off Hwy 26 in a field.	12 known graves with members of the Mose, Fischer, Wilson (American Indian) families. Graves in oaks at the foot of the hill below the gate.
Indian Cemetery: Wirefield Cemetery	In the Albany Flat/Carson Hill area off Hwy 49 on what was the Reidel Ranch." Located at right turn to Whittle Ranch from Reynolds Ferry Road "(1981 Clenn Whittle)	8 listed burials from 1920 to 1984 but used earlier than that. Burial site of many American Indians as well as possibly other pioneers. Private land
Iowa Log Cabin Mine	Outside of San Andreas on way to Valley Springs	2 burials in 1849 of men who died there.
J. M Porter Farm	possibly near West Point	one child in 1921
James Farrell Farm burial site	Near Moke Hill	1 grave. Dead man found there and buried where found due to deterioration of body in 1899
Jenny Lind Cemetery	In Jenny Lind	1850's to present
Jenny Lind IOOF Cemetery	Corner of Baldwin and Mann just off Milton Road	
Jesus Marie Cemetery	On Jesus Marie Road 3.8 mile from its junction with West Point Road. About 2 miles from Moke Hill.	1850's to present
Kirk Family Cemetery	Near Stone Corral Church in San Joaquin Co.	Fairly large number of burials. On private land. Was in Calaveras Co. before the boundaries were changed
Kline Ranch	West Point area	3 known graves one of them a Chinese. 1911-1916. John and Jean Kline were disinterred in July 1930 from the ranch, which was then owned by J.P Arthur, and they were reburied in West Point Cemetery. Unknown if Chinese person is still on the old Kline Ranch.
Laidet Ranch	Esperanza area	2 known graves. 1896-1906
Lane Ranch	Railroad Flat area	2 burials named there is fairly recent years.
Lomabardi Ranch	Toward Mokelumne Hill	American Indian Katherine Wilson "Chutkaya", her husband Billy Wilson and Indian Jim (1898) are known to be buried here. There may be other graves as well. Private land
Los Muertos, near Angels Camp	Near the Six Mile Creek bridge where it crosses Hwy 49 about where the car wash is.	One named burial of Manuel Leon who was buried at Los Muertos on 7/10/1871 but also there were many deaths of Mexicans who were killed by American Miners in a fight before 1860.
Lyons Ranch Cemetery		1 named grave dated 1915
McCarty Cemetery	S. of McCarty ranch house on Rock Creek Road on the old road from Four Springs Ranch to Salt Springs Valley.	Unknown number of graves and no headstones. On private land

		When New Melones was built the cemeteries there were surveyed by the Army Corp of Engineers who tried to find surviving family members. There were 3 sites. 1: Melones Cemetery was located on the property of Victor Ghiglieri and interments were made from 1890-1927 with no grave markers. 2: Whittaker burial site had 1 marked grave and 5 known without markers and 2 other graves that nothing is known about. 3: Livingston site appears to have had only Mrs. Livingstone interred. There were a total of 11 unknown graves and 17 known graves in the total area. The bodies of the known and some of the Unknown were removed to locations of the survivors choice, mostly in the Altaville Catholic Cemetery. Unsure where all the unknown bodies were relocated.

Mokelumne Hill Jewish	Behind the Protestant Cemetery	12 known graves. 1850's to 1870's
Mokelumne Hill Protestant	N. side of Center Street, four blocks W. of Main	1850's to present
Moody Ranch	Glencoe	2 burials. Private land
Morrow Ranch	near Valley Springs	1 known grave dated 1908. Private land
Mosquito Gulch	1 mile E. of Glencoe on Hwy 26 at Mosquito Gulch	1859. Only one known grave site. Private land
Mountain Ranch	Behind Sender's Market on Garibaldi Street	1870's to present
Murphys Catholic	On grounds of St. Patricks Catholic Church on Sheep Ranch Road 3 blocks E. of Main Street	1850's to present
Murphys Protestant	Hwy 4 to Jones Street, mid block up on left onto Cemetery Lane, right after Historic Murphys School. Named "Buena Vista"	1850's to present. Earliest grave marker is June 1855 but probably some unmarked before that date. Combined Protestant, Masonic, IOOF.
Napoleon Mine	On Napoleon Mine Road, S of Hwy 4 and Telegraph City Road (Copperopolis area)	3 graves of Shumake family dated 1878-1910. Also James Bolton is listed as buried in Telegraph City in 1905 and may be here.
Oak Grove Cemetery	Knights Ferry	Not in our county but many Calaveras families were buried here
Packard Ranch	unknown location but probably near Mokelumne Hill	1 burial of a Packard family member in 1930
Petersburg	Near Valley Springs	Town no longer exists. Unknown where cemetery was and who may be buried.
Pioneer Cemetery, North Branch	On Hwy 12, 1mile E. of Hwy 49 junction going out of San Andreas to Valley Springs. On left side.	1850's to present. Many bodies were re-interred here when Comanche Lake was filled
Porteous Family Cemetery (Phillips Ranch)	On Hwy 26 E. near Sandy Gulch.	5 known graves. 1883-1923. Private land
Railroad Flat: Independence Cemetery	2 miles out of Railroad Flat at old community of Independence.	1860's to present
Rhodes Ranch	Banner Dist. Mountain Ranch	1 known in 1904
Rich Gulch Cemetery	SW of the junction off Rich Gulch Road and Hwy 26	4 known graves plus an iron fence around an unmarked grave. Probably several other burials with no markers.

San Domingo Camp	S. of San Domingo Road just W. of the community of San Domingo.	Unknown number of graves. 1850's to 1930's. Private land
Sandoz Ranch/Fuchs Family Cemetery	West Point, near Mitchell Mill	At least 24 known burials mostly family members.
Sandy Gulch Cemetery	West of Hwy 26 on Loveland Lane.	1860's on. About 28 grave markers and maybe a dozen gravesites not marked.
Schrack Family Cemetery	On Hwy 26	18 graves. Private land. 1857-1975
Shafer cemetery	N. of Hwy 4 at junction of road to Quail Hill mine near Telegraph Hill (Copperopolis area)	3 known graves under oak tree NW of barn. 1868-1871
Sheep Ranch	On Armstrong Road 1 mile E. of Sheep Ranch	1870's to present
Smith Ranch	Probably in the San Andreas Area	2 Smith family members 1939-1952
St. Columbo Catholic Cemetery	In Angels Camp, near the existing Catholic Church	Had a burial ground with the church. Land was donated by Michael Cosgrove. Shows on original townsite map. Present Angels Camp Catholic Cemetery land was purchased by the Catholic Church in 1882 with Agostino Foppiano the 1st burial in the new cemetery. Probably older burials were dug up and reinterred in the new cemetery since grave markers in the existing Catholic Cemetery date from the 1850s
Struckman Road Cemetery	On Struckman Road above Mt. Ranch. Graves are on left side of road.	3 burials, one is "Grandpa Baker" . Informant Quinn Shields stated he helped dig Grandpa Bakers grave and that there were 2 other family members buried there. Billie and Jack Shields from Sheep Ranch may have more info. Could this be the Tony Baker Ranch??
Texas Bar Cemetery (Granandos Family cemetery)	Near Petersburg (Valley Springs area) under the water of Hogan Dam	a deed dated May 4, 1888 between Nancy Morrow and "Citizens of Texas Bar" for "portion of said tract now used as a burying ground" in SE 1/4 of SW 1/4 of sec 22 T 4N 11E, 1/2 an acre. "Said half acre to be enclosed by a good and substantial fence" and a "perpetual right of way for a road" over Morrow's land to the "grave yard." 30 graves with bodies exhumed in 1929 when Hogan Dam was first constructed. Bodies were reinterred in Lodi, Stockton and San Andreas.

Tiscornia House cemetery	Between Broadway and Church Street in San Andreas	Supposed to have a family burial plot. 1850's. No markers. Private land
Tony Baker Ranch/Happy Hollow Ranch	Esmeralda area	Located on the Tony Baker Ranch. Has 7 known family graves with the latest dated 1975
Tower Ranch Cemetery	Near Felix on Salt Spring Valley Road in field behind ranch house	Tower family members. Private land. One site dated 1907

Vallecito Public Cemetery	On Cemetery Lane off Church Street in Vallecito	1850's to present
Wermouth Ranch	Abbeys Ferry Road	I grave of a baby dated 1908
West Point Public Cemetery	Just W. of West Point community on Cemetery Lane.	1850's to present
Whittle Ranch burial site	Outside of Angels Camp off Highway 49 near Carson Hill/Albany Flat area.	1 Whittle baby in 1929
Woodcock Ranch	Glencoe area	Frederick Everett Woodcock age 14 yr. 11 months. Son of Martha and Joseph. Buried with them in family graveyard just in back of their Glencoe home, along with the 2 faithful oxen who pulled their wagon over the wilderness to California.
