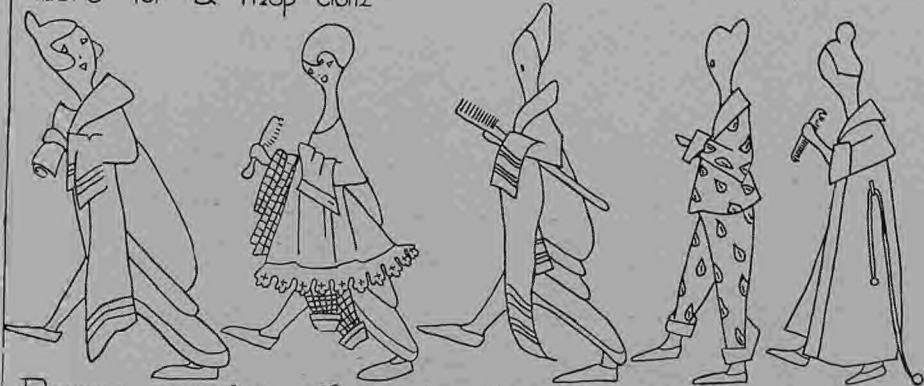

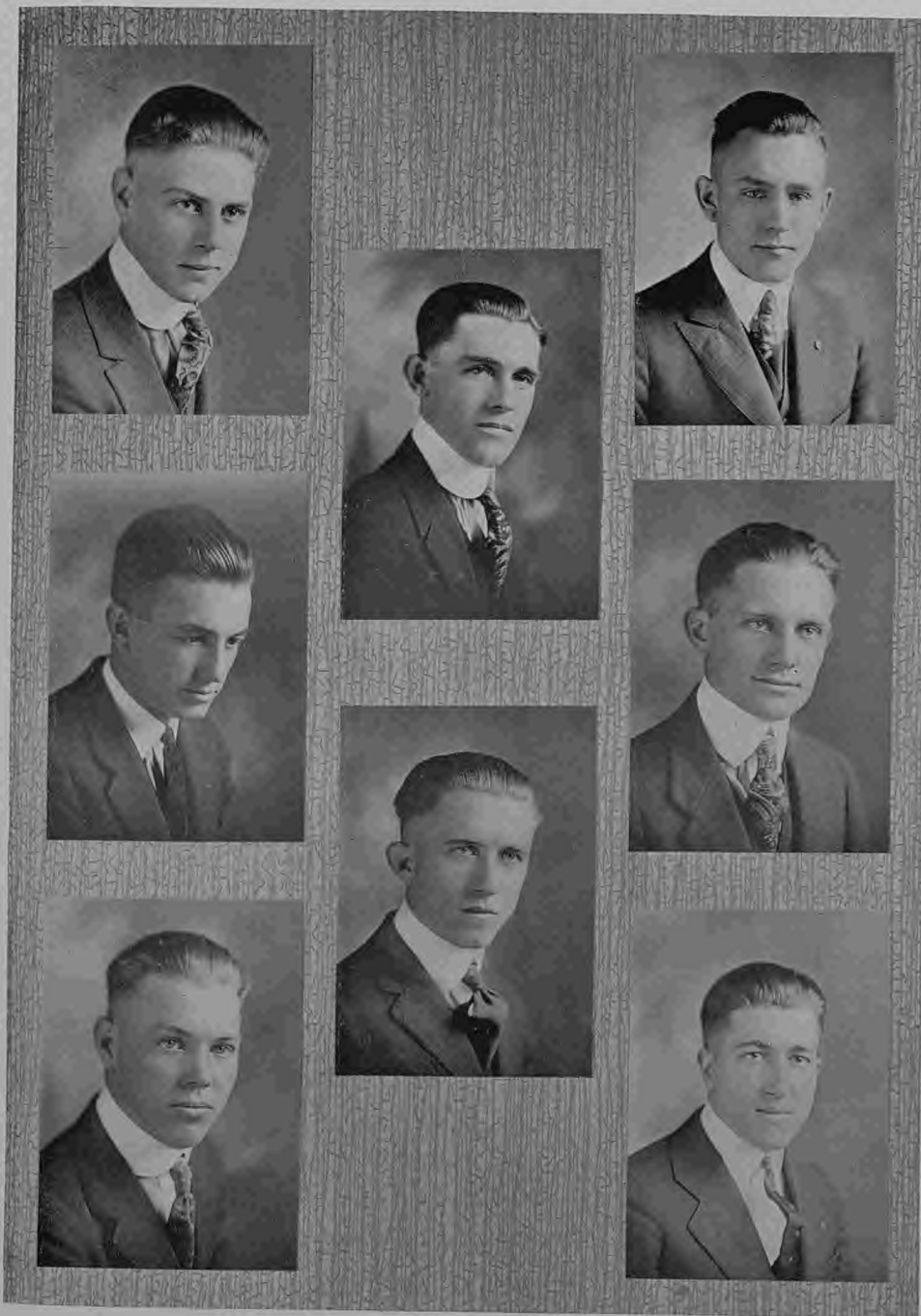
## ORPHANOTROFOS CLUB

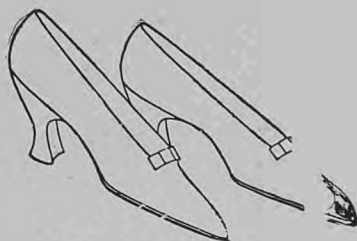
