August 1893-December 31, 1931

All the typed notes contained in these pages are taken from the Ferndale Enterprise and the Book of Deeds at the Humboldt County Court House.

The notes gathered here include all the notes regarding homes in Ferndale, whether they are in reference to homes being built, moved, alterations, tenants, owners. Also included in various homes are notes about the family that were living in the home. The Ferndale Enterprise notes that I decided to choose were based on some kind of extraordinary interest -- travel, accident, or party at the house. Notes on the homes previous to August 1893 are contained in my first book. The notes gathered here also include information on the various commercial structures in the town.

There are separate files that contain notes that are not entered into this book. They will be inserted at the back with a separate index.

In the event of my death, this information and copyright is bequeathed to the FERNDALE MUSEUM for completion.

William Flowers and Frank Reas have been engaged of late in making improvements to the home of Guy Bugbee in this town, which is being thoroughly overhauled. (August 9, 1910)

Reshingling has improved the appearance of the Bugbee tenement on Berding Street, the work being completed a few days ago. (September 6, 1910)

D.C. Downer and wife have moved from the Donnelly tenement on upper Berding street to the Bugbee cottage on Berding Street recently vacated by Guy Bugbee and family. (September 3, 1912)

Last Tuesday afternoon at her home in Ferndale Mrs. D.C. Downer passed to her final reward...native of New York aged 74 years...maiden name was Sarah Allen...and for the past six years resided in Ferndale... (January 23, 1914)

Mrs. H. Welch has moved to her cottage in East Ferndale, recently vacated by J. Hogan and family, who have moved to the Bugbee cottage on Berding Street. (June 13, 1916)

F. Canclini has purchased the S.P. Kelly house in this town which has been occupied of late by Mr. and Mrs. Paul Tappendorff, and with his family will make his home there. Mr. and Mrs. Tappendorff have moved to the Bugbee house on Berding Street. (6/6/24)

(July 19, 1912)

Andrew Nickelson, who recently returned from Oakland, has purchased the Guy Bugbee house at the upper end of Berding Street, where he will make his future home. (4/19/29)

Mrs. Julia Leavey has purchased the Bugbee house on the corner of Berding and Eugene Streets in this town and has been moving to her new home this week. Mrs. Leavey recently returned to Ferndale after a visit with her son and daughter-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. Donald Dowd, in Alameda, and has decided to remain here, as she thinks there is no place like Ferndale...(6/8/28)

Margaret Bugbee to Robert Allison Bugbee...Lot 1 & N1/2 of Lots 9 and 10, block 9, Francis Div, Ferndale, Gift. Margaret Bugbee to Robert Allison Bugbee and Guy Andrew Bugbee...SE cor. Eugene and Church Streets, Ferndale, gift. (7/24/25)

The residence of John Wilson, Ferndale, had a close call from being destroyed by fire last Sunday. A spark from the chimney started a blaze on the roof which was discovered none to soon. (April 29, 1898)

The residence of Mr. and Mrs. Jno Wilson had a close call from being destroyed by fire again Sunday. The blaze, which started from the flue, was discovered, however, by C.T. Mills and M.B. Soper just in time to prevent the conflagration. (July 11, 1899)

Dead...John Wilson, 16th inst at the Veterans' Home at Yountville, Sonoma County...had been an inmate of the home for nearly a year...native of Sweden, and at the time of his passing was aged 85 years. He leaves a widow, Mrs. Wilson, of Ferndale, besides two stepsons, Albert and Joseph Pixton, and one step-daughter, Mrs. J.E. French, of southwestern Humboldt... (March 22, 1907)

Death of Mrs. Sarah Wilson...at her home...born 1835, England...married there to Edward Pixton in 1862 and with her husband and family came to the US in 1880, locating in Salt Lake City. In 1883 she was married to John Wilson and the following year they came to Ferndale...survived by two sons and one daughter: Alfred E. Pixton, Joseph Pixton and Mrs. Edward French, all of the Ettersburg Section. A sister, Mrs. Bentley, resides in Eureka... (December 2, 1913)

Mrs. M. Sievers has purchased the Mrs. Sarah Wilson house in the upper part of town and is having it remodeled for tenement purposes. (December 16, 1913)

Budd Dudley and bride, recently married in Eureka, have returned to Ferndale and will make their home in Mrs. M. Sievers' house on Eugene Street. (December 10, 1915)

Mrs. J. Dowd is now residing in Ferndale with her aged father, Mr. Richard Feehan. (December, 22, 1896)

Mrs. M. Leavy of Blue Lake, formerly Mrs. John Dowd, spent a few days in Ferndale since our last issue visiting her father, Richard Feehan. (May 16, 1899)

Yesterday morning Richard Feehan died suddenly at his Ferndale home of heart disease, after several years of ill health. For three or four days the old gentleman had been confined to his bed, but was sitting up Sunday, and yesterday morning arose feeling quite well. He dressed himself, but while kneeling at his bedside repeating his morning prayers, the final summons came and he passed without a struggle into the Great Beyond. Deceased was a native of Ireland, aged 92 years, and for many years has been a resident of Ferndale. He was the father of Mrs. M. Leavy, of the Blue Lake Section, who has been staying with him for several months past, and the grandfather of the Dowd brothers and sister, so well known in this section...He was also a cousin of the late Archbishop Feehan, of Milwaukee, who was past 90 years when he died and several of his ancestors lived to be over 100 years of age. Mrs. Julie Leavey of this town is now able to be out again after having been confined to her home six weeks by a broken rib. Mrs. Leavey who recently sold her home to Geo. E. Corbett, plans to leave soon after Christmas to make her home with her son, Dr. Donald Dowd, and wife in Alameda...(12/23/27)

A very pretty wedding took place at the home of the bride's mother in Ferndale last Wednesday evening, when Almira Benjamin and Mr. Frank Lesarda were united in the holy bonds of matrimony...they will reside on the Keohoe place on Bear River, which Mr. Lesarda has rented from W. Russ... (December 14, 1900)

David Reese and family have moved into the Francis tenement house on upper Eugene Street. (March 22, 1901)

Ferndale had an early morning blaze yesterday. About 8:30 o'clock the residence of H. Cohen, near the cemetery, was discovered to be on fire, and upon investigation the blaze was found in a bedroom in the upper story of the building. Hose Co. No. 1 and the Hook and Ladder Co were promptly on the scene, but their services were not required, as the fire was extinguished with buckets of water. It is supposed that the fire was caused by the children, who had evidently been playing with a lighted candle which ignited a feather bed.

From the bed the flames had spread to the wall paper, the room being quite badly charred when the fire was put out. Loss about \$50. (June 6, 1902)

Mrs. Grace Francis is having the house occupied by Mr. Cohn reshingled. (September 23, 1902)

John Libbey and family moved Saturday from the Williams place on Ocean Avenue, opposite the grammar schoolhouse, to the Francis house on upper Eugene Street. (February 23, 1909)

Francis Land and Water Company to Sarah Libby, October 16, 1911, lot 4, blk 1, Francis Division., Ferndale. (October 24, 1911)

Much damage done by storm...The Libbe house in the upper part of town was blown off its foundation and settled on the round, resulting in the porches being torn loose and other damage done... (January 20, 1914)

An order has been made in the Superior Court confirming the sale made in the estate of Lillie Jackson, deceased, of lot 5, block 1, Francis Division of Ferndale, which was sold to R.W. Robarts for \$65.00. (April 16, 1897)

E.A. Pierson, who is employed in Kausen and Williams Ferndale Hardware Store is having a residence erected on his lot in the Francis Addition to Ferndale. Carpenter Briggs is doing the work. (July 17, 1896)

Mr. Pierson, the tinsmith, and family have moved into their new residence in Ferndale, erected recently on a lot purchased from Mrs. G. Francis, near E. Merrill's dwelling. (October 9, 1896)

E.A. Pierson's family intend to leave Ferndale next Sunday, to make their home in other parts of the State. (September 6, 1901)

The report recently circulated that E.A. Pierson is to soon take his departure for Campbells, Santa Clara County, to join his family, now residents of that place, is erroneous...he had no intention of leaving Ferndale... (October 1, 1901)

E.A. Pierson has sold his Ferndale residence to James Rogers, of Williams Creek, who with his family are to move to Ferndale to reside, but Mr. Rogers will continue to run his ranch. (April 15, 1902)

E.A. Pierson and wife to J.D. Rogers, lots 5 and 6 of block 3, Francis addition to Ferndale. (May 2, 1902)

W.V. Wooldridge dead...died at the residence of E.A. Pierson in Ferndale, after a lingering illness and general decline...He and his wife have made their home for the past several months at the home of Mr. and Mrs. E.A. Pierson... (June 6, 1902)

A.L. Trousdale is repainting and redecorating the Pierson residence in south Ferndale, recently purchased by Jas D. Rogers, of Williams Creek, and if we are correctly informed this spacious and nicely situated dwelling will soon be for rent. (June 20, 1902)

Jas D. Rogers and wife have moved into their Ferndale residence. Mr. O.E. Petty is now in charge of the Rogers ranch on Williams Creek, which he has leased. (December 8, 1903)

Mr. and Mrs. James Rogers, who are now residing on their ranch up Williams Creek, expect to again take up their residence at their Ferndale home about October 1st. (August 28, 1908)

O. Dudley has discontinued housekeeping, and with his two little daughters will hereafter board with Mr. and Mrs. J.D. Rogers. (March 27, 1914)

J.D. Rogers is having a large addition built on the rear of his Ferndale residence. Contractor Rusk and crew are doing the work. (July 13, 1915)

Mrs. J.D. Rogers, who has been residing at her home place in the upper part of town, moved last Wednesday to her apartments on Washington St., next to the convent school. She has rented her home place to Messrs. Peugh and Davie, who have taken up their residence there. (8/16/29)

The family of R. Quartermass are to occupy the Merrill residence in the southern part of town. (May 29, 1900)

O.E. Merrill and wife, formerly of Ferndale, have taken up their residence at Reno, Nevada. (July 17, 1900)

Mr. Quartermass and family moved last week into rooms in the Williams building over Kausen & Williams hardware store. (December 18, 1900)

A pretty wedding...Monday...George G. Carbray and Miss Jennie Flowers...the newly wedded pair departed for Eureka to spend a day or so. When they return they will take up their residence in the Merrill house in Ferndale... (January 29, 1901)

P.J. Donnelly has purchased the Merrill residence in southeast Ferndale, the price paid, we are informed, being \$700. (April 4, 1902)

Kate and Edwin Merrill to P.J. Donnelly: Lot 7, Blk 1, Francis Division to Ferndale. (April 4, 1902)

John Donnelly and wife, of Eureka, who are soon to move to Ferndale, will occupy the Merrill residence. (April 29, 1902)

A. G. Sperber and wife now occupy the Merrill residence in Ferndale. (October 3, 1902)

John P. Donnelly and family moved from Eureka to Ferndale this week and are now located in the Branstetter building on Main Street. (November 7, 1902)

Dr. Geo Wing and wife are to occupy the Merrill house in Ferndale, now the property of P.J. Donnelly. (July 1, 1904)

The professional card of Dr. George Wing appears elsewhere in these columns. The Doctor has purchased the dental parlors of Dr. C.E. Caldwell, and is no stranger to our people, as he has been conducting Mr. Caldwell's business in Ferndale for some months past. (June 10, 1904)

Ed French and family moved last week into their new residence in the Francis addition to Ferndale. Mr. French now has a neat and comfortable home. (February 27, 1900)

It is said that Ed French of Ferndale has rented a place at Briceland and he and his family may soon move to that section to live. The climate of this valley does not agree with Mrs. French, she being troubled with asthma. (August 21, 1900)

...and Mrs. Sweasey has purchased the Ed French property in the southern part of town. (September 28, 1900)

In our last issue we mentioned that Mrs. Sweasey had purchased Ed French's place in the southern part of the town. Such is not the case, however, although the bargain was about closed. (October 2, 1900)

...in Eureka, Wednesday evening...united in marriage Dr. R.R. Michael of Ferndale and Miss Annie Robinson, daughter of W.S. Robinson, a prominent pioneer of Bridgeville...Dr. and Mrs. Michael took their departure for Ferndale in a private conveyance, arriving late that evening. They will reside in the French house on Eugene Street, but intend to erect a dwelling soon, we understand. Both the bride and the groom are well known in Ferndale, the one being a teacher in our public schools until recently, while the other is one of the Cream City's practicing physicians... (August 16, 1901)

...Geo Carbray and wife, Saturday moving into the residence in the southern part of town just vacated by Dr. Michael and wife, who have moved into Fred Francis' house. (May 6, 1902)

George Smith, employed by Kausen & Williams, the Ferndale hardware dealers, is, with his family, moving into the residence recently vacated by George Carbray and wife. (June 3, 1904)

Guy Bugbee and family, who have been living in the home of Mrs. S.C. Benjamin on Berding street, have moved into the Chris Ericksen cottage, formerly occupied by Mr. and Mrs. William Perry. (November 12, 1907)

The inhabitants of Ferndale were aroused last Tuesday night shortly after 11 o'clock by the ringing of the church bell and the cry of fire. The source of the flame was in a small building used by S.C. Benjamin as a storeroom and chicken house combined. A stream of water was soon turned on from the nearest hydrant and the flames were thus kept under control. A wood shed belonging to Mr. Wilson, whose lot adjoins Mr. Benjamin's was also burned. Together with about 10 cords of wood, about a dozen chickens and a quantity of carpenter tools. The day before the blaze Mr. Benjamin built a small fire in his chicken house for the purpose of fumigating it and he thinks that he did not get it entirely extinguished, which is suppose to be the cause of the fire. (July 5, 1895)

Milton Benjamin, brother of Steve Benjamin, our fellow townsman, arrived on yesterday's Pomona. He will make an extended visit here. Steve had not seen him for about twenty years. (March 1, 1901)

The family of J.E. Flynn, who recently purchased the Ferndale Barber Shop of Chas Frazier, arrived in the Cream City a few days ago from Eureka and have taken up their residence in Mrs. S.C. Benjamin's dwelling on upper Church Street... (January 14, 1906)

J.R, Flynn, the Ferndale barber, and his family, who have been occupying Mrs. S.C. Benjamin's house at the head of Church Street, will soon take up their residence in the Kerfoot dwelling on Ocean Avenue. (September 11, 1906)

Mr. and Mrs. R.E. Grubb, formerly of Oakland, are now located in Ferndale, having taken up their residence in Mrs. S.C. Benjamin's dwelling on Church Street. Mr. Grubb is at present employed by Contractor Ackerman on Ferndale's new high school building. (October 16, 1906)

Guy Bugbee and family, who arrived in Ferndale recently from Petrolia, are to reside in the Mrs. S.C. Benjamin dwelling on Church Street and will soon move to their new home. Guy will assist Mr. Bugbee, Sr., in the latter's blacksmith shop on Ocean Avenue... (May 10, 1907)

Guy Bugbee and family, who have been living in the home of Mrs. S.C. Benjamin on Berding street, have moved into the Chris Ericksen cottage, formerly occupied by Mr. and Mrs. William Perry. (November 12, 1907)

William Benjamin and family have moved from their former home in North Ferndale to the Benjamin residence on Upper Berding Street. (August 22, 1911)

Contractor W.J. Flowers and assistants have practically completed the extensive alterations and improvements to the new home of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Taubman on upper Berding Street, recently purchased from Mrs. Benjamin. Mr. and Mrs. Taubman will have a most attractive and convenient home. (May 13, 1913)

Harry Taubman and family have been engaged the last few days in moving to their recently purchased home on upper Berding street. The house vacated by them is to be occupied by C. Dollison and family. (June 3, 1913)

Almira Benjamin to Harry L. Taubman, 4/10/13, lot 9 n blk 1, Smith's survey of Francis Division to Ferndale and another lot in Francis div, Ferndale. (April 22, 1913)

During the heavy wind of last Monday night the old residence at the head of Berding Street, opposite the F.J. Rushmore home, was blown off its foundation and settled to the ground about two feet from its old location. The porch remained stationary and was torn loose from the rest of the building. The house, which was unoccupied at the time, is one of the old landmarks of Ferndale and is owned by the Francis Land & Water Company. The foundation had rotted to some extent, which was probably the reason that the wind had sufficient force to move it...(2/13/25)

Mrs. Rebecca C. Smith died, mother of Lucius and A.T. Smith and Mrs. William Stevenson of Eureka and Mrs. J.C. Mankin of Blue Lake. Died at her residence in Ferndale. Born Ohio 1831. Humboldt County 1865. Funeral took place Sunday from the Congregational Church. (March 22, 1895)

Carpenter Haywood is renovating and repairing the interior of the residence of the late Mrs. Smith which will be soon offered for rent. (May 10, 1895)

Mr. P.T. Early, of the Brick Store, and Miss Louie Gill, daughter of Mrs. Albion Gill, of Ferndale...married in Eureka, June 12th...and the happy couple are now comfortably located in the Smith residence on lower Main Street, which had been previously furnished and arranged for their occupancy. (June 14, 1895)

A neat new fence is being erected in front of P.T. Early's residence on lower Main Street. (January 26, 1897)

L.M. Smith is building a neat new fence in front of his residence, occupied by Mr. and Mrs. P.T. Early. (February 9, 1897)

There was a lively time at P.T. Early's residence Saturday evening. The gentleman received that day a bull pup of the feminine gender as a Christmas gift from Paul Keller of S.F., and in the evening took the dog home and proceeded to make friends with him. Pete had the pup on his lap, but without the slightest provocation the dog grabbed Pete by the left ear, and then there was a commotion. Mrs. Early appeared on the scene, and a passer-by heard the lady remark: "Stay with it Peter; it may cost you your ear but it will be the making of the dog." An inventory taken at the Early residence Sunday morning showed Pete short a pair of shoes, and the crumb cloth under the dining room table missing. The dog brought his appetite with him. (December 23, 1897)

W.E. Barney and family, who have disposed of their home on Ocean Avenue to G.W. Dewey, are soon to move into L.M. Smith's tenement house on lower Main Street, recently vacated by Prof. Johnston and family. (July 10, 1900)

W.E. Barney took his departure yesterday for Alliance, but his family will remain in Ferndale several weeks yet. (April 26, 1901)

D.C. Pitzer and family, late arrivals from Grant's Pass, Oregon, are now domiciled in L.M. Smith's tenement house on North Main Street. Mr. Pitzer is a carpenter by trade, and is said to be a first-class mechanic. (August 23, 1901)

D.C. Pitzer has moved from Ferndale to Rio Dell... (October 22, 1901)

Ted Francis and family have moved into one of L.M. Smith's tenement houses on Lower Main Street. (October 22, 1901)

Ted Francis and family moved Saturday into their new and commodious home on Vanston Avenue. (April 15, 1902)

Geo Cummings and family intend moving into L.M. Smith's tenement house on lower Main Street, Ferndale within the course of several days. (April 25, 1902)

George Cummings and family will leave Ferndale next week for San Francisco... (November 14, 1902)

Geo Cummings and family departed for below on Tuesday's Eureka. (December 5, 1902)

M Youngman and family, late of Minnesota, arrived in Ferndale last week and will locate here. They will reside in L.M. Smith's

tenement house on Lower Main Street. Mr. Youngman is a practical piano and organ tuner and repairer. (February 3, 1903)

The new Ferndale Hospital...Through the courtesy of Dr. F. M. Bruner an Enterprise representative was permitted last Friday to pay a visit of inspection to the Ferndale Hospital in its new home on lower Main Street and it was a revelation to see the splendid arrangement of the institution. The hospital was recently moved from its former location on Washington street to the Hart property, its present home, which has been thoroughly renovated and remodeled, and it may now be said without exaggeration that Ferndale has a hospital of which our people may well be proud and which is a credit to the town. the hospital is commodious and conveniently arranged, well equipped for the handling of medical and surgical cases and spotlessly clean and sanitary. Entering the building from the main entrance in front, on the right is found the private office of Dr. F.M. Bruner, the hospital physician. This is finely furnished and contains special electrical equipment and powerful light, diagnostic instruments, a splendid professional library, desks, cots, etc. Across the hall and to the left is the hospital parlor, attractively furnished, and with a library of general literature, a piano and cabinet phonograph. In the rear of the parlor is the private room of Dr. and Mrs. Bruner. Back of the office is the hospital dining room, a most attractive apartment with a fireplace. At the end of the hall is a finely equipped bathroom with modern toilet appliances. The rear of the building is given over to a modern kitchen, a laborsaving washroom with sanitary tubs, etc. A fine electric washing machine has been ordered which will arrive in the near future. The operating room is upstairs in the front part of the building and is finely lighted by a series of large windows. A powerful electric light hangs over the operating table for night use. The appliances are all the latest and everything about the room is of spotless white. Opening off the operating room is a sterilizing room, in which is a closet containing a large variety of instruments used in

surgical work. The remainder of the upper floor is given over to private rooms and wards for patients. The rooms are handsomely furnished and thoroughly sanitary. The wall coverings are in green and white, blue and white, and pink and white and the rooms present a very attractive appearance. The hospital has been repainted and repapered throughout, new floors laid, and in fact the building is to all intents and purposes the same as new. Doors open out onto a wide porch from which there is a pleasing view and which is accessible to all patient. A sleeping porch is one of the features of the building and outside on the spacious grounds a sleeping tent has been erected, containing two beds and equipped with electric lights and telephone. Town Trustees...J.N. Lund, appointed by the Ferndale Chamber of Commerce to appear before the town board and consult with the later body regarding a suitable location for a free library site, presented the matter to the town fathers, but nothing definite was done in the matter... (January 10, 1908)

Chamber of Commerce meetings...J.N. Lund, a member of the Chamber's library committee, announced his appearance before the town board of trustees for the purpose of bringing the matter before the town fathers and also to ask their cooperation. Mr. Lund reported nothing definite having been arrived at as the result of his visit. R.A. Simpson, also a member of the library committee, reported that the parties who are desirous of making the donation for library purposes might consider it advisable to withdraw their offer if the question is

not definitely settled within the next sixty days. Should the offer be withdrawn it means a loss to the town of \$800 or more, and it certainly seems that to secure this amount for a town improvement is worthy of something of an extra effort. Eight hundred dollar donations are not being extended to towns every day in the week... (January 14, 1908)

Town Trustees...R.A. Simpson appeared before the Board in reference to the donation offered by the Good Templars for the purchase of a library property on Main Street. No action was taken in the matter, however... (February 7, 1908)

Among the business transacted at the town trustees meeting last Monday night was the discussion of a proposition laid before the board whereby it is possible to secure a library building through the generosity of Andrew Carnegie. For some time, Attorney M.C. DeCarli, of Ferndale, has been in communication with the private secretary of Mr. Carnegie relative to securing a Carnegie library for Ferndale, and Monday night presented the matter to the trustees. The result of Mr. DeCarli's investigation, in brief, is that Mr. Carnegie will donate a sum for a permanent library building in Ferndale equal to ten times as much as the town will yearly contribute for the support of the library, providing a site is secured and owned by the town. In other words should the town contribute a site and guarantee say \$1,000 a year for the support of the library, Mr. Carnegie will donate \$10,000 for a building. No action was taken by the town fathers Monday night, although it is understood the trustees look upon the proposition with considerable favor... (February 14, 1908)

The Town trustees were in session last Monday night to confer regarding the matter of making application for a Carnegie donation for a library building in Ferndale. After some discussion the town fathers passed a resolution to ask for a donation of \$8000, pledging the town to raise \$800 per year for the support of the library, providing the application is favorably acted upon....a lot on Brown Street is already the property of the town...whether this site will be used for building purposes has not been decided, we understand, as other property may be secured on which to erect the library... (February 21, 1908)

Town Trustees...The matter of a donation of several hundred dollars by citizens of Ferndale and vicinity for the purchase -- or rather to be used in aiding in the purchase of a library site was before the town fathers, who had about decided to secure the Dunn property on Berding Street for the purpose named, after consulting the wishes of the donations who saw no objection to the proposition. A communication was received by the Board Monday night, however, which stated the withdrawal of the donation insofar as the Dunn property is concerned, the citizens favoring the purchase of a fifty-foot frontage on the Shaw property on Main Street, next to the J. Jacobsen residence, which, it is learned, can be secured for the site desired. No action was taken and the library site remains a question to be concluded at a future meeting of the trustees... (March 6, 1908)

Town Trustees...a letter was received from Andrew Carnegie relative to his willingness to donate \$8000 to the town of Ferndale for a library building, providing the trustees would insure a site for the structure and guarantee the sum of \$800 per year for the support of the free reading room. Resolutions were adopted by the board covering Mr. Carnegie's request. (April 10, 1908)

Monday evening the Ferndale town trustees held an informal meeting to confer with Architect Skillings of Eureka, who came out to submit proposed plans for the town's new library building. The plans, which call for an \$8,000, one-story reinforced concrete building of classical style, were favorably received, but inasmuch as no site has been selected up to the present the trustees could not do other than give their approval... (June 19, 1908)

The town trustees met in adjourned session last night, the principal object of the meeting being to discuss the selection of a site for the Carnegie library building which may be erected in this town. Several locations have been mentioned, the last of which is the lot owned by A. Putnam on lower Main Street, offered by that gentleman for library purposes only for \$1000. (July 14, 1908)

Special meeting town trustees...discussion of a suitable site for the new library and the matter still remains undecided...the purchase of the Mason property, adjacent to the K of P Castle, was suggested but passed over as not being feasible as the expense of tearing down and removing the building on it would be considerable...The Chamber of Commerce sent a communication to the trustees asking them to act favorably on the purchase of the Putnam lot next to the Cy Boynton place on Main Street... (July 17, 1908)

It is understood that S.V. Morrison and J.N. Lund are to have charge of raising the two hundred dollars necessary for the purchase of the Putnam lot, the proposed site for the new library. The price of the property is \$1000 and as \$800 of this sum will probably be donated by public spirited citizens of this vicinity, but \$200 is needed and no difficulty will be experienced in raising that amount. (July 24, 1908)

At the adjourned meeting of the Town Trustees to be held next Monday evening the contract will probably be awarded for the erection of Ferndale's new Carnegie library building. The bids were opened at the meeting of last Monday evening, only two firms competing. Ackerman & Son of Eureka made the lowest tender, their bid for the building with high walls the entire size of the building being \$7775.40, while with the rear of a lower construction they will build the library for \$7122.60. Concannon & Company of San Francisco offered to construct the building for \$8,582.00. While nothing definite has been given out it is presumed that the contract will be... (April 9, 1909)

Monday of this week Contractor Ackerman of the firm of Ackerman & Ackerman, put men to work breaking ground for the new Carnegie library building. (April 30, 1909)

Tuesday and Wednesday the work was being busily prosecuted of packing up the books of the Ferndale Library, moving the shelving, etc., and the reading room is now located in the Brelle building opposite K of P Castle. This building will be occupied by the library until the completion of the new Carnegie building, which will be about September 1st... (May 14, 1909)

Architect Skillings, who drew the plans for the Ferndale Carnegie library, was in Ferndale Tuesday... (May 14, 1909)

Ted Francis, while working on the Carnegie library building last Tuesday, sustained an accident by which one of his little fingers was broken. The accident will incapacitate him for work for some little time. (May 21, 1909)

Clarence Matthews is at work on the exterior of the new Carnegie library building on Main Street. The iron work is being painted and sanded, and the cement will be treated to a coat of asbestine. The building is beginning to assume a finished appearance and is certainly a handsome structure. (October 12, 1909)

Some little comment has been heard around town regarding the lettering on the entrance to the new concrete library building, which reads, "Ferndale Library." Many of our people have expressed an opinion that the names of Mr. Carnegie, donor of the building, should be on the front instead of the names Ferndale. The Enterprise learns that it was the express wish of Mr. Carnegie that his name should be omitted. Some of the first of the library buildings made possible by his generosity bore his name, but on the later ones this has been left off by his desire. However, a tablet will probably be placed in the interior of the structure containing a simple record of Mr. Carnegie's gift, thus acknowledging to the visitor Mr. Carnegie's generosity in an unostentatious manner, and in a way which that gentleman will perhaps not object to our people commemorating his name. (November 5, 1909)

The shelving is now being placed in position at Ferndale's new library building, which is commencing to assume a finished appearance, though the windows, stairs and other fixtures have not been set up as yet, owing to the non-arrival of material. The furnace was fired up this week to dry out the interior of the building and works very satisfactorily. Painters Matthews and Jensen are at work finishing the woodwork of the building. (December 10, 1909)

Town Trustees...A communication was received from Newton Ackerman of Eureka, asking the board to accept the new library building and stating that the electrical fixtures would be installed later. The board again refused to accept the building, and the clerk was instructed to notify Mr. Ackerman to have the building completed, and the matter of its acceptance would then be taken under consideration. It appears that the outside electrical fixtures, which are to be put in position on either side of the front entrance, have not yet arrived from the East and it may be several weeks before they are received. But the inside fixtures are at hand and there is no reason why they should not be installed and the building made ready for occupancy. The town trustees and the people in general are getting impatient of the lax methods of the contractors in working on the building, besides which the town is under an expense for the rent of the building at present used as a library.... (March 11, 1910)

Library Accepted...At a special meeting of the town trustees held last Saturday afternoon, the new Carnegie library building on Main Street was accepted from the contractors Ackerman & Ackerman of Eureka. The lighting fixtures were installed the latter part of the week and the building is now ready for occupancy, with the exception of the linoleum on the floor, which will be varnished... (March 15, 1910)

The work of moving into the new Carnegie library building was completed this week and everything is now running smoothly in the new quarters. Mrs. Winslow, librarian, has been busily engaged all the week in getting the books arranged and straightening things around, and now has everything in fine shape. There is plenty of shelf room in the new library. After all the books are in position, there is yet left space on the shelves for close to a thousand volumes. This is a good idea, and will do away with the necessity of continually building shelves as the library increases. The furnace in the building works to perfection, and it takes but a small quantity of wood to keep the rooms comfortably warm...The old reading tables are at present in use, but it is hoped to replace these with new and better ones in the near future, or as soon as funds are available. The Ferndale Good Templars have presented the library with a magnificent bible, which is now in the reading room, and are also to give a fine oak reading table. (April 1, 1910)

At the Ferndale public library can now be seen one of the most attractive articles of furniture one could wish to observe. This is in the nature of a reading table, donated by the Ferndale Good Templars, who are certainly to be commended for their generosity. The table is made of highly polished Pepperwood and perfectly blends with the general color scheme of the furniture of the reading room. On one corner of the table is a silver plate bearing the inscription that the article is the gift of Ferndale Lodge, No. 534, I.O.G.T., and is one of the most beautiful pieces of furniture you would find in many a day's travel. The table, constructed in the old mission style, is the handiwork of D.E. Rees, the well known woodworker of Ocean Avenue... (August 18, 1911)

Editorial...The ladies of the Village Club are to be commended for the efforts they are making to beautifying the grounds of the Ferndale public library. It is time that the grounds were put into a condition attractive to the eye instead of being allowed to remain in their present back-yard state, surrounded by a rough board fence and being taken by a luxurious growth of weeds... (October 31, 1911)

The Village Club of Ferndale is facing a dilemma in regard to the improvement and beautifying of the free library lot, a task they kindly took upon themselves a year or so ago. Several months ago the club raised enough money, through a minstrel performance which was largely attended, to beautify and plant the grounds, build a cement walk to the sidewalk and build a cement coping around the lot. During the past few days the lot has been graded and as soon as the weather permits, will be sown to a lawn. Four varieties of fine shade trees have already arrived and await setting out. Behind the library lot is a lot used as a pasture for cattle and in driving cattle into this pasture, and even along Main Street, they invariably run across the library lot. Even after a cement coping is placed around the lot the trouble will not be removed, as the cattle in the past have jumped over the fence which was placed there temporarily, and which was three or four feet high. Work is at a standstill as the ladies do not care to plant a lawn or plant trees and flowers and have them

immediately destroyed. (March 5, 1912)

William Benjamin and assistants last Friday completed the work of constructing concrete walls and sidewalks at the Ferndale Library grounds on Main Street. The grounds now present a greatly improved appearance. Mr. Benjamin having done a very neat piece of work. In a short time the grounds will be laid out to lawn and will be a very attractive place and a credit to the town. (August 20, 1912)

Ring Memorial On Library Grounds...Is Fitting Memorial For Late Ferndale Physician...(2/6/31)

A new pipeless furnace was installed this week at the Ferndale Library by F. Dahlquist, which is operating very satisfactorily and is a big improvement over the old heating system which has been in use since the library was built. (11/12/26)

Robert W. Robarts and wife to Rollin S. and Grace R. Feenaty, 4/9/14, 1-1/2 acres on N line Fern Avenue, Ferndale. (April 28, 1914)

Work on R.S. Feenaty's new bungalow in Ferndale is progressing rapidly, and will soon be completed by A. Rusk and assistants. The new home will be a handsome and convenient one. (June 23, 1914)

Mr. and Mrs. R.S. Feenaty expect to move the fore part of next week to their fine new home near the Ferndale Library, on lower Main Street. The bungalow will be fully completed today or tomorrow, and Mr. and Mrs. Feenaty will have one of the handsomest and most convenient homes in the valley. (July 24, 1914)

Mr. and Mrs. R.S. Feenaty are now settled in their fine new bungalow near the Ferndale library. (August 4, 1914)

BLOCK 2 FRANCIS DIVISION
FERNDALE CEMETERY

Messrs. Wulff and Weaver have been at work opening blocks and driveways in the Ferndale Cemetery (July 31, 1896)

Last Saturday morning the remains of S. Lewis Shaw and two children which for years have rested in the Ferndale Cemetery, were placed in the handsome mausoleum recently erected by his widow, Mrs. Isabella Shaw, after having first been incased in elegant caskets. The closing of the mausoleum was witnessed by Mrs. Shaw and her son Joseph A. Shaw and family. (August 11, 1896)

Stephen Benjamin has been named sexton of the Ferndale Cemetery Association. (June 18, 1897)

Ferndale Cemetery Association has decided to keep a man steadily employed in the Ferndale Cemetery. Mowing the driveways and walks, trimming the hedges and bushes, and keeping the graves and burial lots in proper order. The cost will be met by a yearly assessment of \$2.00 on all lot owners and revenues received from digging graves, etc... (August 17, 1897)

M. Benjamin is now employed in caring for the Ferndale Cemetery. (August 17, 1897)

S.C. Benjamin is now constantly employed in the cemetery and we noticed a marked improvement in its appearance. The grass is kept mowed, the trees are neatly trimmed, many of the graves are weeded, several of the old rickety fences have been torn down and the main driveways have been graveled. (October 1, 1897)

The many marked improvements that have been made of late by the Board of Directors of the Ferndale Cemetery should certainly be an incentive to the individual owners of burial lots therein to unite in furthering the good work already begun...Mr. S.C. Benjamin is kept constantly employed by the Directors caring for the graves, etc. Twenty-six water faucets have been placed in position, and 1,000 head and footboards are on hand which to mark and number each and every grave...the Directors also urge upon lot owners to plant flowers and thus beautify the last resting place of their dear ones and they also wish to see the few remaining and unsightly wooden fences removed at an early date... (May 6, 1898)

The 300 feet of ornamental fence is being built along the north line of the Ferndale Cemetery... (February 3, 1899)

Last Friday afternoon a Ferndale Enterprise representative chanced to roam through the Ferndale Cemetery and was astonished at the wonderful transformation that has taken place there during the past two years...nearly all the wood work has been removed and replaced by concrete work. The walks and alleys have been spaded, graded, and seeded to fine grasses, the headstones over all the graves have been cleaned, new line fences have been erected and painted, a new tool house has been built, lilies and other flowers have been planted in different places. Tiling and drains have been put in everywhere, concrete walls have been constructed around the driveways, 27 new fences have been placed in convenient places, faucets have been placed in convenient places and over \$300 has been spent there already graveing the main approaches. About \$1200 has been used the past two years in beautifying the cemetery...the directors of the Ferndale Cemetery Association are: James Lawson, Mr. Worthington, Peter Nissen, O.D. Whittier, L.H. Miner, F.Z. Boynton (President), and J.H. Trost, Secretary. (February 27, 1900)

Ferndale Cemetery Assoc: same officers and directors exception of E.P. Nissen, who is succeeded by P.J. Petersen as a director. (June 5, 1900)

Ferndale Cemetery Association's new board: F.Z. Boynton, J.P. Jacobsen, J.A. Shaw, Wm. Worthington, James Lawson, P.J. Peterson and R.S. Tyrrell. (June 4, 1901)

A Word to the Boys...of late there has been considerable damage done in our beautiful little cemetery by youngsters who have gone there to play, and who have not only broken the glasses containing flowers placed on the graves but who have even gone so far as to throw rocks and dirt into the Shaw vault, and commit other depredations which cannot longer be tolerated. At a meeting of the Association...the result is the notice to question, to be rigidly enforced from now on. To begin with, a cemetery is not a proper place for children to play, and parents, in so far as they can, should keep their little ones out of there, unless accompanied by themselves... (July 11, 1902)

Will Benjamin, now sexton of the Ferndale Cemetery... (February 17, 1903)

W.M. Benjamin announces in this issue that he is now sexton of both the Ferndale and Catholic cemeteries... (July 28, 1903)

...Ferndale Cemetery...received the marble slab for the Russ tomb. It is 9-7x4-9 in size and 6 inches thick and weighs not less than three tons. (September 25, 1903)

Cemetery Improvement...The Board of Directors of the Ferndale Cemetery Association...are soon to meet for the purpose of considering and acting upon a proposition...the expenditure of probably \$2500... On the west end of the cemetery, and lying between the driveway adjacent to the Methodist church and the first elevation of the cemetery grounds, is quite a strip of land that owing to its steepness has never been utilized. It has laid there ever since the cemetery was plated as unfit for a place of interment, and it is to render it available for

burial lots that the proposition in question was first suggested. The plan is to grade this incline, taking the dirt at the top to fill in at the bottom, thus giving it an easy slope, and after this is done to lay it off into burial plats, with cement steps running up the incline at two or three different points, with concrete cross walks and each burial plat supplied with a concrete curbing. This will add to the cemetery nearly 40 additional burial lots, and very desirable ones, already curbed with cement copings, and by the improvement thus being done as a whole, the new lots could be sold at a figure cheaper than an individual could buy a lot and have it curbed, and the lots in the aggregate would bring a sum sufficient to pay for the entire improvement, including the cost of a public receiving vault at the bottom of the incline... (February 26, 1904)

The old wooden steps at the Ferndale cemetery are being replaced with concrete steps by William Benjamin and Frank Lessardi, a big improvement. (March 15, 1907)

Walter Cook has been selected as the new sexton of the Ferndale Cemetery, vice Will Benjamin, resigned.... (April 19, 1907)

City Engineer J.A. Shaw, assisted by O.D. Whittier, was engaged last Monday in making surveys of new lots in the Ferndale Cemetery and also for grade work for a concrete coping the Association will build along the lower driveway of the cemetery. The Directors of the Association have in mind a number of improvements, soon to be made, which will greatly beautify our little "city of the dead". (February 28, 1908)

A fine mausoleum will soon be built on the Russ lot in the Ferndale Cemetery (October 10, 1913)

Lemuel Steeves has completed the new public receiving vault at the Ferndale cemetery, for which he was some time ago given a contract. The new vault is built of concrete, is 8x14 feet in size, and has room for 16 caskets... (December 19, 1913)

The directors of the Ferndale Cemetery Association have decided to purchase five acres of land from the Francis Land & Water Company adjoining the cemetery. The present holdings of the cemetery association are nearly all taken up. (June 17, 1921)

D.E. Rees, who has been secretary of the Ferndale Cemetery Association for a number of years, has resigned the position and has been succeeded by Geo. L. Collins. (6/27/24)

The Ferndale ME Church is to be repainted and reshingled shortly (May 25, 1894)

The ME Church is being repaired and will soon be repainted. (June 22, 1894)

Bert Matthews, having re-shingled the ME church, Ferndale, is now engaged in painting that edifice. (July 27, 1894)

Rev. Rodda, wife and five children, are now located in the Ferndale ME parsonage, having arrived on last Thursday's steamer. The Rev. Gentleman is the successor of Rev. S.M. Woodward as pastor of the Methodist Church, and comes from Chico, Butte County, where he was formerly located. (October 5, 1894)

Mr. Peter Bennett and Miss Melvina Mae Benjamin will be joined in holy bonds of wedlock on June 19th at 8pm in the ME Church. (June 7, 1895)

On Wednesday evening, June 19th, at 8 o'clock, the Rev. R. Rodda spoke the solemn words which united Mr. Peter Bennett and Miss Melvina May Benjamin, both of Ferndale, as man and wife. The ceremony was performed in the M.E. Church, which was most profusely and handsomely decorated with flowers for the occasion... (June 21, 1895)

Rev. Richard Rodda will preach his last sermons at the ME Church for this conference year next Sunday... (August 30, 1895)

Rev. Rodda has been resigned...and will preach at the ME Church next Sunday... (September 20, 1895)

At eight o'clock Wednesday evening, in the Ferndale ME Church, the Rev. R. Rodda spoke the solemn words that made Mr. Henry Worthington of Grizzly Bluff and Miss Edna Merrill man and wife... (October 4, 1895)

...on December 31st, 1895 the debt on the Ferndale ME Church property was completely liquidated...Richard Rodda (January 3, 1896)

Rev. George Hutchinson will preach in the ME Church next Sunday at 11 a.m.... (April 24, 1896)

Rev. Rodda and wife returned from conference on Wednesday and he will resume services at the ME Church. It will be welcomed news that this gentleman has been reappointed to this pastorate another year (September 25, 1896)

Rev. Hutchinson will preach in the ME Church next Sunday. (May 15, 1896)

S.C. Benjamin completed a few days ago a large hitching shed at the Ferndale ME Church. It is 80 feet long and 20 feet wide and will prove a great convenience to those who attend that place of worship this winter. Affording them a dry warm place in which to tie their teams. (November 10, 1896)

The Methodist Church is to be wired for electric light. (December 11, 1896)

Electrician Wright and assistants were wiring the Methodist Church last Saturday for electric lights. (January 26, 1897)

Rev. Grant from Sutter Creek is to succeed Rev. Rodda as Ferndale's ME pastor. Mr. Rodda goes to Oakdale, Stanislaus County. (September 24, 1897)

Rev. Rodda and family depart Saturday...farewell services at Ferndale and Grizzly Bluff last Sunday were attended by immense congregations. (September 28, 1897)

Rev. W.P. Grant, now pastor of ME Church, was located in Mendocino four years ago and through his efforts an Indian school was established at Manchester in that county... (November 5, 1897)

D.E. Eastman the second oldest child of E.G. Eastman and wife, breathed her last at the home of her parents in North Ferndale and was buried Sunday afternoon. Funeral took place from the ME church, she was 12 years... (December 14, 1897)

It is now a settled fact that the ME Church is to be supplied with a new pipe organ. (February 25, 1898)

The handsome pipe organ for Ferndale ME Church has arrived. (June 10, 1898)

At the Ferndale Methodist Church Wednesday afternoon...united in marriage Mr. George Kistner of Cannibal Island and Miss Jennie Trigg of this section... (July 1, 1898)

Arrangements are being perfected for an entertainment in the near future under the auspices of the Ferndale Cornet Band, the proceeds of which will go towards paying and setting up and placing in order the ME Church's new pipe organ and recently received from the east and which will figure conspicuously during the evening enjoyment... (July 1, 1898)

Last Saturday Rev. Grant immersed in Eel River the two daughters of Mr. John Stewart of the Grizzly Bluff section. Mr. Grant tells us that within the past week he has received into Ferndale and Grizzly Bluff Methodist Churches, 15 new members. (September 6, 1898)

Rev. R.S. Tyrrell will preach in the Ferndale ME Church next Sunday. (September 6, 1898)

Rev. William Jensen of North Ferndale and his family are to move to Blocksburg, where Mr. Jensen has been assigned to preach by the ME conference. (October 25, 1898)

...January 10th...in the ME Church...W.L. Kistner will be united in marriage to Miss C.E. Trigg of this valley. (January 6, 1899)

A pretty wedding took place last Tuesday evening at the Methodist Church, Ferndale, when Miss C. H. Trigg was joined in wedlock to Wm. Kistner of Loleta... (January 13, 1899)

Rev. W.P. Grant will retain the pastorate of the Ferndale ME Church for another year. (September 19, 1899)

Miss L. Babcock has been selected leader and Mrs. O.E. Merrill assistant leader of the choir at the ME Church. (January 9, 1900)

A "congregation meeting" of the Methodist Church of Ferndale was held Monday night to take preliminary action in the matter of erecting a church. It was decided to build on the site where the old church now stands, the latter to be used as a wing to the new edifice. (April 27, 1900)

...D.D. Pierce was elected leader of the choir of the ME church in place of Miss Babcock. (May 8, 1900)

The building committee for the erection of the new ME Church are R.S. Tyrrell, E. Merrill, Jacob Ring, Theodore Brown and the pastor, W.P. Grant. The plan of the building is now under consideration. (May 11, 1900)

The building committee of the Ferndale ME Church, which met last Tuesday evening to consider the bids for erecting the new edifice, failed to take any decisive action on the same, not a sufficient number of proposals having been submitted. (June 21, 1900)

Mrs. Lemuel Steeves, who died at the home of her husband up Williams Creek last Monday, took place from the Ferndale ME Church. Deceased was born in Upper Mattole valley and at the time of her death was 25 years of age. Leaves husband, a father, A.J. Lafferty and a brother, Bert Lafferty. (June 21, 1900)

Mrs. Nancy T. Matthews, who died at Loleta last Thursday, took place from the Ferndale ME Church last Saturday at 10 o'clock a.m. (July 24, 1900)

H.H. Gastman of Arcata is to superintend the construction of the new ME Church in Ferndale. Lumber is now being hauled for the new edifice. (July 27, 1900)

The old ME Church has been moved in place to connect with the new house of worship of which it will form a wing. It will be used until the edifice is completed for the regular services of the church. (August 24, 1900)

Ladies Aid of the ME Church...elected to serve the ensuing year: Pres, Mrs. Etta Cruickshanks; Vice Pres., Mrs. W.P. Grant; Sec., Bertha Tyrrell; Treas. Mrs. W. Smith. (August 31, 1900)

Rev. W.P. Grant, who has so ably filled the pulpit of the Ferndale ME Church for the past several years, has been assigned to the pastorate of the ME church at College Park, near San Jose. Many friends in this section greatly regret the departure of the reverend gentleman and family from our midst, but wish them all happiness and prosperity in their new abode. Rev. Kelly, we understand, has been appointed to succeed Rev. Grant at this place, and is said to be a fluent and eloquent speaker. (September 21, 1900)

The new ME Church looms up and is a decided acquisition to our town. (October 30, 1900)

H.H. Gastman has moved his family back from Ferndale to Little River. Mr. Gastman has about completed his contract on the new ME church at this place. (December 18, 1900)

Rev. Kelly, of the Ferndale ME Church, while hitching up his horse Wednesday, met with misfortune. While thus engaged his horse swung his head around, striking the reverend gentleman on the nose, fracturing that member and blacking both his eyes. (January 8, 1901)

...Mrs. W.S. Kelly organized a Young Ladies Aid Society in Ferndale. Pres, Mrs. W.S. Kelly; 1st VP: Namoni Pierce; 2 vp: Minnie Young; Sec: Bertha Jayes; Treas: Edna Williams. The Society will meet every Saturday at the new church. (January 15, 1901)

Howard Gay finished the plastering of the new ME Church Saturday. (January 22, 1901)

H.H. Gastman returned to his home in Arcata Friday, being through on the new ME church here. (January 22, 1901)

A reporter of this paper visited the new ME Church in Ferndale last week and he pronounced it as being one of the most modern and best little churches in the State. In a few weeks the beautiful fancy-glazed windows will be placed. The commodious kitchen, dining room, lecture room and pastor's study are well finished. The church is a credit to the cream city, and, in fact, would be such to any other town. A full description of this unique edifice will be published at a later date. (March 12, 1901)

The Bishop has raised \$300,000 in California for church purposes in ten months... (June 18, 1901)

The memorial windows in the ME Church are now completed and wonderfully enhance the beauty of the edifice. Ferndale is proud of her new place of worship, and it may be said without exaggeration that it is one of the prettiest churches in the state. (June 25, 1901)

ME Church appointments: Ferndale circuit to be supplied by William Jensen; Ferndale, W.S. Kelly. (September 24, 1901)

The gutters in the roof of our new ME Church blocked up in Sunday's heavy hail storm during church service and the water poured into the Church in places, but little damage was done. (March 7, 1902)

The patent heater in the basement of Ferndale's new ME Church has been abandoned and D.A. Francis furnished the auditorium of that edifice with a large air tight store this week, to which was attached a large drum heater, which druggist J.H. Ring designed. The fact that the surface water could not be kept out of the church basement rendered the patent heater useless. (January 2, 1903)

Rev. James Whittaker, who was appointed pastor of the local ME Church at the last session of the California Annual Conference, is said to be a man of ability not only in the pulpit but also as a musician. He sings first tenor in the Conference quartette, and will be a "welcome addition to our musical talent." September 25, 1903)

Rev. W.S. Kelly, our late ME pastor, left yesterday for San Jose, to which city he was sent by conference...for three years he and his good family have lived and labored among us...The beautiful ME Church that now adorns our little city is a monument to his energy, and besides he has built up and united a strong congregation that will certainly miss him now he's gone... (October 2, 1903)

The Enterprise acknowledges a pleasant call from Rev. Whitaker, Ferndale's new Methodist minister. He is a "big six-footer", and a jolly gentleman whom it is a pleasure to meet. Call again. (October 2, 1903)

Rev. James Whittaker, Ferndale's new ME pastor, is expected to arrive this week, as is also Rev. W.S. Kelly, who has been transferred to a pastorate in San Jose. (September 22, 1903)

OLD METHODIST CHURCH PARSONAGE TENEMENT

D. Stillings and wife have moved into the old Methodist Episcopal parsonage next to the residence of Mrs. Allen (April 5, 1895)

Barber Steele has rented for one year the old M.E. Parsonage and moved his household furniture there the first of the week. He expects his family to return in about six weeks. (August 9, 1895)

E.E. Steele, the barber, has a furnished house to let. (November 15, 1895)

Miles Simpson has rented of Barber Steele the old Methodist parsonage. (December 6, 1895)

Last Sunday night at about 9:30 o'clock an alarm of fire was sounded in Ferndale and in a few minutes the streets were alive with people. The blaze was located in the old parsonage back of the ME church, occupied by Mr. Simpson and family and E.E. Steele, and resulted from the explosion of a coal oil lamp. Mr. Steele, it seems, was about to retire for the night, and stepped to the stand in his bedroom to extinguish the light. He lowered the wick and blew down the chimney, but a flickering of the flame caused him to step back which was a decidedly fortunate move for him, for the next instant the lamp exploded and in a few seconds the inside of the room was all ablaze. Mr. Steele backed into a little closet or hallway off the room, the door opening out of which was barricaded by a bedstead, but Mr. Simpson came to his rescue and released him from his perilous position. The two men went to work immediately to extinguish the fire, and in a few moments Chas T. Mills and several other neighbors arrived and soon had the flames under control. Mr. Mills rendered excellent service and seemed to know exactly what to do. The inside of the bedroom was badly burned, and the furniture the room contained was about all ruined. Mr. Steele received a few slight burns, but was fortunate to escape with his life. Considerable of his and his wife's clothing was also destroyed, but the loss sustained by him was covered by insurance in one of H.A. Tyrrell's companies. (January 10, 1896)

Last Friday H.A. Tyrrell, local agent for the Fire Association of Philadelphia, paid to E.E. Steele, \$177, which covers the total loss Mr. Steele sustained by the damage done to his furniture by the fire at the Old M.E. parsonage some weeks ago. Mr. Steele has nothing but words of praise for Mr. Tyrrell's company. (February 11, 1896)

Barber E.E. Steele has a number of household articles which he will sell cheap. (March 27, 1896)

Mr. Fountain, of the Swauger section, has purchased a half-interest in E.E. Steele's barbering business and moved to Ferndale yesterday with his family. They will occupy the old M.E. parsonage... (April 3, 1896)

The old Methodist parsonage is being moved this week from Church street into the land of M.B. Hansen in East Ferndale. (March 22, 1901)

Last week John Morris moved the old ME parsonage to Rose Avenue, it having been given to M.B. Hansen, who will utilize it as a dwelling house. (March 26, 1901)

The revivals in the Ferndale Congregational Church are being largely attended and will continue for two weeks longer. Rev. Rev. G.H. Merrill, pastor of the Congregational Church of this place, who has been occupying the pulpit of the First Congregational Church in Alameda in exchange with the pastor Rev. W.W. Scudder, during the past month, will return to Ferndale this week... (August 17, 1897)

Last Sunday Rev. G.H. Merrill tendered his resignation as pastor of the Ferndale Congregational Church to take affect September 30th, the end of his first years pastorate in this place. Mr. Merrill is a great suffer of asthma and he finds that the climate of this valley does not agree with him. (August 31, 1897)

Rev. A.S. Parsons of Scotia has been tendered the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church. (December 21, 1897)

Rev. Parsons, has been selected to fill the pulpit of the Ferndale Congregational Church for one year and will move here about the first of February. In the meantime, Rev. Jasper will preach every Sunday morning... (January 14, 1898)

Last Thursday evening the handsome new Congregational Church on the Island was dedicated... (August 23, 1898)

During the absence of Rev. A.S. Parsons, the Rev. J.A. Jasper will occupy the pulpit of the Ferndale Congregational Church on Sunday mornings. (August 26, 1898)

Rev. A.S. Parsons...is en route to West Virginia where he goes to look after property interests. Mrs. Parsons and two children who intended on accompanying him decided at the last moment not to take the trip. (August 30, 1898)

Rev. A.S. Parsons, Congregational pastor, who has been absent in the east, left San Francisco for Ferndale yesterday and will preach next Sunday... (September 30, 1898)

Last Sunday Rev. A. S. Parsons announced his resignation of the Ferndale Congregational Church to take affect January 21st....will go on the "road" as an evangelist. (November 29, 1898)

Rev. A.S. Parsons and family started next week for Berkeley... (January 24, 1899)

The new Congregational church at Loleta, a sister church to the church on the Island, was dedicated last Friday evening, the audience numbering fully 400 people... (January 31, 1899)

The music tendered at the farewell service of the Rev. A.S. Parsons in the Ferndale Congregational Church last Sunday evening was exceptionally fine...at the close of the service hundreds of people remained to bid the reverend gentleman and his wife "adieu". (January 31, 1899)

Rev. J.M. Smith will preach in the Ferndale Congregational Church next Sunday evening. (February 3, 1899)

Rev. G.A. Jasper, until further notice, will preach Sunday mornings in the Ferndale Congregational Church, commencing next Sunday morning. (February 3, 1899)

Rev. A.H. Johnston of Boston, may be called to the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church. The Rev. gentleman is now in Ferndale and will hold services Sunday. (February 10, 1899)

...unanimous call was extended to Rev. A.J. Johnston, late of Boston, to accept the pastorate of the Congregational Church for one year...he has a wife in the east and has also two sons, one of which is principal of the high school in Tehama County and the other is engaged in the publishing business. (February 24, 1899)

Articles of Incorporation of the First Congregational Church of Ferndale have been filed at the County Clerk, showing the following trustees for the first year: Mark Bugbee, L.E. Goble, Mrs. Mary L. Trost, Mrs. Mary Putnam and Mrs. Mary Robarts. (February 28, 1899)

Rev. A.H. Johnston announced his acceptance of the call to the Congregational Church of this place. (March 10, 1899)

Ferndale is to have a High School and its doors will be thrown open in a very few weeks. Prof. Johnston, son of Rev. A.J. Johnston of the Ferndale Congregational Church, has been secured to take charge of the school and the gentleman will arrive Friday. The school will start with at least 20 scholars and there is every indication that it will receive a liberal and substantial patronage. (August 15, 1899)

The funeral of the little daughter of Andrew Meng and wife...took place Thursday from the Ferndale Congregational Church. (September 15, 1899)

Part of the lumber is on the ground for a shed that is to be erected at the Congregational Church and under which horses and vehicles may be housed in stormy weather. (February 18, 1898)

Messrs. Kerri and Edwards started work the other day on the erection of a horse shed at the Congregational Church. (March 1, 1898)

Rev. A.H. Johnston, who has been pastor of the FE Congregational Church for nearly two years past, will preach his last sermon here next Sunday evening. he has resigned his pastorate and will return to his home in Boston. A farewell reception was tendered the reverend gentleman at the home of Mr. and Mrs. M. Bugbee. (June 1, 1900)

Rev. A.H. Johnston preached his farewell sermon at the Ferndale Congregational Church Sunday evening to a large congregation, including quite a number from the Methodist Church, Rev. Grant not conducting services that evening. Mr. Johnston, in company with his daughter-in-law, the wife of Prof. Johnston, and children will depart on this week's steamer Del Norte for San Francisco, on their way to Boston. (June 5, 1900)

Rev. Philip Coombe, of San Francisco, who, with his wife, is visiting relatives in this section, will occupy the pulpit of the Ferndale Congregational Church next Sunday at both morning and evening services. (August 24, 1900)

Rev. Burkett of Fortuna has accepted the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church. (August 28, 1900)

Last Thursday evening Rev. Burkett was duly ordained as pastor of the Ferndale Congregational Church. All the Congregational Church ministers of the county, except one, were present...(September 25, 1900)

Ferndale Congregational Church Ladies' Aid Society - elected the following officers to serve for the ensuing year: President, Mrs. Z.B. Patrick; 1st FP: Mrs. W.S. Fitzell; 2d VP: Mrs. J.H. Trost; Mrs. Mark Bugbee, Sec; Mrs. C.H. ?, Treasurer. (January 11, 1901)

Miss Louie Day has resigned as organist in the Congregational Church. (January 22, 1901)

An addition to the Ferndale Congregational Church is contemplated. It is intended to build an annex on to the rear of this place of worship, to be used as a Sunday School and Christian Endeavor room, also a dining room and kitchen. (August 23, 1901)

Ferndale Congregational: wedding of Rev. W.M. Burkett and Miss Clara Ann Dudley, which took place in Eureka last Thursday, September 5th. The wedding took place at the residence of Rev. Griffith Griffiths, who officiated. Mr. Burkett is the gifted young minister of the Ferndale Congregational Church, and his bride is the popular daughter of Mrs. Ella Whitehead of this place...(September 10, 1901)...Maynard Burkett aged 32 years; Clara Dudley, 18 years (October 8, 1901)

The Congregational Church orchestra was organized last Saturday with 8 members - boys and girls -- who will be instructed by Prof. Wm. Kausen. There is room yet for a few more additions to the orchestra. (October 11, 1901)

...Ferndale is soon to lose the Rev. Maynard Burkett. The gentleman last Sunday morning presented his resignation as pastor of our local Congregational Church, to take effect March 1st. (February 4, 1902)

Rev. M. Burkett is now at Sacramento where he is filling the pulpit of the First Congregational Church for a few weeks during the absence of the regular pastor...(March 14, 1902)

Rev. Farnworth, of San Diego, arrived in Ferndale a few days ago and preached in the Congregational Church Sunday evening. The gentleman may decide to accept the pastorate of this church, and providing he does he will send for his family. (April 22, 1902)

Rev. A.K. Farnsworth, late of the southern part of the state, has accepted the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church. He will send for his family immediately. (April 29, 1902)

W.B. Alford while in San Francisco will purchase the new organ for the Ferndale Congregational Church. (May 16, 1902)

The fine new organ for Ferndale's Congregational Church is expected on today's Argo. Miss Nettie Scott is now organist at that place of worship. (May 27, 1902)

Iver P. Hansen and Miss Helena Reitz, who were married in the Ferndale Congregational Church last Thursday night... (November 11, 1902)

The Trustees of the Ferndale Congregational Church met the other day and decided to raise money with which to build an annex to their church. Rev. Farnworth, the pastor, was selected as chairman of the finance committee. (June 16, 1903)

Rev. Farnworth tells us that he has already raised over \$600 with which to build the new annex to Ferndale's Congregational Church. This includes labor donated, and is about half the amount required to erect the addition and paint the church. (July 14, 1903)

Lumber is being hauled this week for the rear annex to be built to the Ferndale Congregational Church. The addition is to be 32x24 feet in size, and Pastor Farnworth tells us that the main church building is also to be reshingled and repainted. Mr. Farnworth is a rustler, and has already raised about \$800 to go toward paying for the improvements. (August 7, 1903)

The orchestra which M.C. MacLennan has succeeded in organizing for the Congregational Church met for the first time Wednesday night at R.A. Simpson's residence. The combinations will probably be made up as follows: Prof. Flowers, Director; P. Inskip, Helen Trost and Elsie Simpson, violins; Horace Winslow, clarinet; Edna Putnam, piano, Ed Kerri, Cornet; D. Fletcher, Trombone. (October 2, 1903)

Dr. Creppen, who once practiced medicine in Ferndale is now a resident of Reno Nevada, as is also Rev. W. M. Burkett, a former Ferndale clergyman, and who is now the pastor of a Congregational Church in Reno... Mr. Burkett married Miss Clara Dudley of Ferndale (November 17, 1903)

While engaged in painting the roof of the Ferndale Congregational Church last Friday afternoon, William and Clarence Matthews and Ted Hartley had a close call from being killed. The "roof dogs" which held the scaffold upon which they were standing gave way and all three were suddenly precipitated to the ground, a distance of about 35 feet, and it is a wonder they were not killed or at least more seriously injured. William Matthews sustained a dislocated ankle, one of the small bones of which was also broken; Clarence Matthews has a couple of ribs broken, but Mr. Hartley escaped with only a severe shaking up. All three were more or less bruised, but they are "thanking their stars" they escaped as fortunately as they did. (December 15, 1903)

Burkett, a former pastor of the Ferndale Congregational Church and who is so ill at Lincoln, Placer Co., is said to be suffering with Bright's Disease, and but little hope is entertained for his recovery. His last pastorate was at Reno, Nevada. Mr. Burkett was married here to Miss Clara Dudley, and was an exceedingly bright man... (January 29, 1904)

The hitching shed at the Ferndale Congregational Church was torn down last week. It has seen a good many years service. (February 9, 1904)

Easter Sunday morning, Rev. A.K. Farnsworth announced from his pulpit that he had resigned his pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church, to take effect the last of June. Mr. Farnsworth tells us that he is as yet undecided where he will locate next. He may decide to attend the S. Louis Exposition, and is thinking strongly of a trip through Europe and the Holy Land. (April 5, 1904)

The Trustees of the Ferndale Congregational Church met one evening last week and found the financial conditions of the church to be as follows: Collected for annex and church repairs, \$507; paid out for Church repairs, \$219.45; cash on hand, \$287.55; amount subscribed and not collected, \$150. (April 26, 1904)

Rev. A.K. Farnsworth has decided not to reconsider his resignation as pastor of the Ferndale Congregational Church, and he will go to Seattle, Washington the latter part of June. At his Sunday sermon he thanked his members for request to have him remain, and it is to be regretted that he could not so elect. (May 6, 1904)

Painter P.N. Lund has been awarded the contract to repaint both the exterior and interior of the Ferndale Congregational Church. (September 16, 1904)

Rev. John Habbick, of Fresno, who has occupied the pulpit of the Ferndale Congregational Church for the past two Sundays, has accepted the pastorate of this church to take effect December 1st next. The gentleman is a fluent and entertaining speaker, and is a welcome addition to the religious circles of this community. (October 18, 1904)

Painter Peter Lund and assistant, Chris Hansen, have finished the work of repainting the Ferndale Congregational Church, and this building now presents a very attractive appearance. (November 8, 1904)

Rev. Habbick, who, with his family, arrived in Ferndale last week to take charge of the Congregational Church here,... (December 6, 1904)

Yesterday afternoon in the Ferndale Congregational Church at two o'clock, Rev. J.D. Habbick officiated at the marriage of Mr. Harry Hartley of Alton and Miss Eliza Taggart, of England, who arrived in this section a short time ago...the bride was attended by Mrs. Mary Hartley, while E. Hartley, a brother of the groom, served as best man...Mr. Hartley is an employee in F. Luther's merchandising store at Alton, but for some little time held a position with the Ferndale Rochdale Co and also with Merchant A. Waddington... (September 29, 1905)

Rev. J.D. Habbick and family expect to leave Ferndale the first of next week for Los Angeles where Mr. Habbick will be in charge of the Home Mission work in that city. Rev. Habbick has been pastor of the Ferndale Congregational Church for nearly a year past... (October 27, 1905)

A farewell reception was tendered Rev. J.D. Habbick, pastor of the Ferndale Congregational Church, and wife at the Shaw Avenue home of Mr. and Mrs. R.A. Simpson last Saturday night, a large number of the friends of the gentleman and his wife being present... (October 31, 1905)

Rev. J.E. Forsyth, late of Tacoma, Washington, arrived in Ferndale Saturday, and Sunday filled the pulpit of the Congregational Church, both morning and evening, the services being attended by many of the people of this place. It is probable that Rev. Forsyth will accept a call to the pastorate of the Congregational Church. (December 5, 1905)

...Rev. Bauder, who recently accepted the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church... (April 24, 1906)

Superintendent of Sunday School, Mrs. E.P. Bauder; Asst, T.J. Bauder. Deaconess, Mrs. M. Bugbee. (October 19, 1906)

Rev. T.J. Bauder, who has resigned his pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church, expects to join his family below within the next three or four weeks. Rev. Arthur Roberts, of Fresno, who occupied the pulpit of the Congregational Church last Sunday, has been offered and accepted a call to the pastorate of the church. The reverent gentleman, who is highly spoken of as a religious worker, departs on today's steamer en route to Fresno, but, with his family, will return to the Cream City about the first of February to take up his work here. (January 15, 1907)

Roberts has been forced to delay his coming until next Wednesday -- February 20th. Rev. Bauder has consented to postpone his home-going for another week. (February 15, 1907)

Wednesday evening a farewell reception was tendered Rev. T.J. Bauder, who has resigned the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church. Yesterday morning Rev. Bauder left Ferndale for Eureka, and by today's steamer will depart to join his family in Oakland... (February 22, 1907)

Rev. A.K. Farnsworth, formerly a Congregational minister of Ferndale, but who removed from here about a couple of years ago to Sebastopol...Sonoma County's lawyer-preacher... (May 3, 1907)

Rev. A.B. Roberts has presented to the Ferndale Congregational Church a handsome pulpit chair, secured on his recent visit to other parts. (August 23, 1907)

The Island Congregational Church was last week purchased by the Central Creamery Co. Just what use is to be made of the property is unknown at present. The pulpit of the church has been donated to the trustees of the Ferndale Congregational Church and the organ to the Hydesville church of that denomination. The rest of the church fixtures have not been disposed of as yet. (November 2, 1909)

Commencing next Monday, Painter Ted Hartley will make extensive repairs to the interior of the Ferndale Congregational Church. The edifice will be repainted and kalsomined and will be in handsome condition when the improvements are completed. (November 19, 1909)

Two hearts were made happy in Ferndale last Wednesday evening, when at 7 o'clock in the Congregational Church Rev. A.B. Roberts spoke the words which united in the holy bonds of wedlock Mr. Joseph Thomas of Garberville and Miss Edith Sweet of this town... (January 7, 1910)

Rev. A.B. Roberts of the Congregational Church of this town has accepted a call to the pulpit of the church at Sonoma City, and with his family will leave Ferndale in the course of a few weeks... (February 21, 1911)

Rev. Chappelle, of Illinois who has been called to the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational Church, arrived in the Cream City Sunday evening but did not occupy the pulpit of the church that evening. (March 31, 1911)

Rev. Chappelle, who has been filling the pulpit of the Ferndale Congregational Church, takes his departure today en route to Crockett, where he has accepted a call. Another clergyman is expected here by Sunday, whose name is not known at this writing. (May 5, 1911)

He was finally moved to accept by resolutions drawn up by the twenty-five congregational clergymen of the different churches in Minneapolis asking him to return to the work and to their fellowship... (March 18, 1913)

Large audiences taxing the capacity of the Congregational Church, greeted Rev. Clark Sunday morning and evening. At the evening service Rev. Riggs and the members of his congregation attended the service to manifest their respect and good will for both the church and its pastor...a resolution was read: Whereas, The Rev. Kimball Clark has been the pastor of our Congregational Church for two years. During that time he has endeared himself to us by his fine qualities of mind and character, his broad sympathies, his conscientious work, and for the comfort his words, his faith, his Christian spirit have brought to all in sorrow...Mr. Clark has received repeated calls to the Minneapolis church... (April 22, 1913)

No pastor has yet been selected for the Ferndale Congregational Church to succeed Rev. Clark, resigned. (May 2, 1913)

Rev. Parker of Idaho has answered a call to the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational church and... (May 6, 1913)

Rev. Singer, who has been temporarily filling the pulpit of the Ferndale Congregational church, will leave in the course of a couple of weeks for his home in Oakland...Rev Douglas of Oroville has been offered and has accepted the pastorate of the local church and will arrive here about February 1st. (January 13, 1914)

Last Wednesday afternoon at the parsonage on lower Main Street the Congregational Aid Society gave a reception and tea in honor of Rev. and Mrs. R.D. Douglass, who recently arrived to make their home here, Rev. Douglass having accepted a call to the pastorate of the church... (February 6, 1914)

Wilson J. Wythe, an Oakland architect, was in Ferndale Sunday and met with the building committee of the Congregational Church in regard to the improvements soon to be made to the church building here...the present building will be moved back and used as a room for the Sunday school classes and for social affairs. The new annex will be so constructed that the old building can also be used in conjunction with church services when occasion arises and a seating capacity of three hundred will be available. A gallery will be erected, which will also add to the seating capacity... (February 6, 1917)

An incipient blaze at the Congregational church last Wednesday afternoon caused the sounding of the alarm and in a few minutes a large number of fire fighters were on the scene. The blaze was extinguished in short order. It had started on the floor in the entry of the church and its origin is a mystery. The floor was burned through and had not the smoke been seen issuing from the windows and steeple it is probable the fire would have been a serious one. (August 23, 1918)

At a meeting of the members of the Ferndale Congregational Church, held at the close of services last Sunday morning, a unanimous call was extended to Rev. Mrs. Getty Heath to become the pastor of the church. Mrs. Heath has accepted the call and will take up her work

on Sunday, July 17th...born at Tipton, Tulare County...(July 1, 1921)

Congregational Church improvements planned...to lower the ceiling of the church, and possibly replace the pews with chairs. A substantial sum is in the treasury of the church or pledged toward the construction of a new church when building conditions are more favorable and when the new church is constructed it is planned to move the present building to the rear to be used as Sunday school rooms and parlors...(January 20, 1922)

Work was commenced this week on extensive alterations and improvements to the Congregational Church in this town. The interior is to be changed entirely, putting the pulpit and choir loft in the front, with a balcony, Ladies= aid room and other smaller rooms in the rear. The entrance will be changed to the side, where a porch will be built, with glass walls and concrete approach. The ceiling of the church will be lowered considerably and the building practically re-built. The estimated cost of the alterations will be in the neighborhood of \$40000...(October 26, 1923)

Rev. A.P. Orth, pastor of the Ferndale Congregational church, will deliver his farewell sermon next Sunday morning, having tendered his resignation some time ago...(10/28/27)

Many friends here will learn with pleasure that Rev. Jessie Heath is to remain as pastor of the Ferndale Congregational Church...(6/13/24)

Last Sunday Rev. Jessie Heath, pastor of the Ferndale Congregational church, announced to her congregation that in all probability she would tender her resignation some time within the next few months, as she and her family were planning to make their future home in San Jose...Mr. Heath and daughter, Miss Helen, are now in that city...(4/25/24)

Last Sunday at a quiet ceremony at the Ferndale Congregational Church, Mr. Charles Kanen and Miss Esther Hackett were united in marriage...(6/13/24)

From the well kept files of The Enterprise, it was learned that the first dedication of the Ferndale Congregational Church took place in July of 1881, and that was a gala day for the church and its friends. Little did the congregation which builded that first edifice dream that forty-three years later, another generation would make a new home for itself from the excellent material put into that first house of worship and have a second day of dedication...February 17, 1924...(2/22/24)

At a business meeting of the Ferndale Congregational church held the first of the week a call was unanimously extended to Rev. R.D. Douglass of Saratoga to accept the pastorate of the local church...was pastor of the Congregational church here for a number of years and the people of the community will learn with great pleasure that he and his wife are to again take up their residence here. At a pretty wedding last Sunday evening at the Ferndale Congregational church Charles Kanen of Grizzly Bluff and Miss Esther Milligan of Eureka...(6/13/24)

Rev. James Rowell Hewitt, late of New York, arrived in Ferndale Friday, accompanied by Mrs. Hewitt, and occupied the pulpit of the Congregational Church Sunday...it is hoped they may become permanent residents of Ferndale...(1/13/28)

Rev. and Mrs. R.D. Douglass arrived from Saratoga...now getting settled in the Ferndale Congregational parsonage, where they are to make their permanent home...(10/12/28)

Rev. Orth of Hayward has accepted a call to the pastorate of the Ferndale Congregational church and with his wife is expected to arrive here next week. He will occupy the pulpit of the local church a week from next Sunday, August 15th. (8/6/26)

Peter Anderson is assisting R.A. Simpson in putting an electric dynamo in the latter gentleman's carpenter shop. R.A. proposes being the first to introduce electric light in Ferndale. (September 29, 1893)

R.A. Simpson's shop will be lighted by electricity in a few nights. Peter Anderson put in the dynamo. (October 13, 1893)

Ferndale has the electric light, and while it is not on quite as extensive a scale as in other places, yet the dynamo is of home manufacture and as perfect as can be found anywhere. The plant is the property of R.A. Simpson and the lights are used to illuminate his workshop and his dwelling house, which is situated near by.... (October 27, 1893)

R.A. Simpson of Ferndale departs on tomorrow's Ponoma for San Francisco, his visit to the metropolis being to place on the market and secure the necessary papers to patent his "Improved Creamery Butter Cutter," his "Baby Butter Cutter" and his "Indestructible Butter Box."... (February 22, 1895)

R.A. Simpson of Ferndale has been granted a patent on his new butter box. (August 30, 1895)

At R.A. Simpson's shop Wednesday, Chris Hansen lost the end of his right fore finger. He allowed it to come into contact with knives of a grooving machine. (January 3, 1896)

R.A. Simpson is going into the blacksmithing and wagon making business on a more extensive scale and has secured the services of J.H. Donahue an expert workman from Eureka. (June 12, 1896)

R.A. Simpson has been granted a patent on his new butter molding and cutting machine (June 19, 1896)

R.A. Simpson lost a slice off one of his fingers Monday while at work in the shop. It came in contact with the "shaker". (September 25, 1896)

R.A. Simpson has six men hard at work...manufacturing his patent butter boxes, butter cutters, etc. (April 14, 1899)

J. Ayre of Blue Lake, a young man employed in R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop, lost a forefinger of his left hand Saturday by getting it caught in the "cutter"... (May 9, 1899)

Charley Matthews of North Ferndale, who works in R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop, had the fore finger of his right hand cut off at the knuckle joint yesterday, by getting it caught in the jointer... (May 30, 1899)

We see our competitor, Mr. R.A. Simpson, is out with a new advertisement in the Enterprise with a new name for his place of business, to wit: "The Cream City Mechanical Shop." I feel proud to be deemed so worthy of imitation, and hope that the public will recognize the fact that we lead and others follow. Mr. Simpson imitated our patent butter moulds, and seems to stand ready watching to pick up any old thing of ours worth having, and every new thing or improvement our brain or ingenuity may invent he seems ready to jump at and appropriate as his own. Now he comes as near appropriating the name of our shop as it is possible, Ferndale being recognized as the "Cream City" of California. With the above change of name for his place of business we suggest he apply to the court and have his name changed "ditto" or Andreasen, and when that is accomplished if he is lacking in inventive brains we are willing to supply him at reasonable rates. Oluf Andreasen. (May 16, 1899)

Mr. Andreasen's communication in the Enterprise...forces me to speak to you in self defense....I have been engaged in the mechanical business for nearly thirty years, and in this county twenty-five years, sixteen years of this time in Ferndale. I believe he came from his dairy ranch five or six years ago and engaged in the mechanical business in Ferndale...my shop was advertised as the Ferndale Wagon Shop long ago, and was spoken of in the papers as the "Cream City Mechanical Shop" before I advertised it as such. As I am working out of the wagon business into a general mechanical manufacturing business, why have I not some claim on the "Cream City mechanical Shop?"... (May 30, 1899)

R.A. Simpson is erecting an addition to his Mechanical shop on Shaw Avenue, which we understand the gentleman will use as a blacksmith shop. (December 19, 1899)

Jack Ayers has resigned his position at Simpson's mechanical shop and went to work yesterday in Andreasen's mechanical shop. (January 23, 1900)

P. Tarver is now employed at Simpson's mechanical shop. (January 30, 1900)

Ray Loudon of Loleta is employed at Simpson's Cream City Mechanical Shop. (February 23, 1900)

John Worthington, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Worthington, of the Waddington section, is now employed at R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop on Shaw Avenue. (March 30, 1900)

R.F. Elkins has resigned his position at Andreasen's mechanical shop and has accepted a position with R.A. Simpson. (June 5, 1900)

R.A. Simpson is building a new dry house for lumber at his Cream City Mechanical shop. (January 22, 1901)

R.A. Simpson is having an eight-foot sidewalk placed along the east portion of his Ferndale property. (June 4, 1901)

R.A. Simpson's automobile is assuming the proper proportions, but it will be some six weeks or two months before the gentleman will be able to enjoy a ride in his horseless carriage. Lack of help in his mechanical shop, as well as other difficulties he is encountering as a result of the strike, has greatly retarded work on the "auto.". (August 13, 1901)

Ben Ellingwood has resigned his position at Simpson's Mechanical shop in Ferndale. (September 3, 1901)

R.A. Simpson has completed the mechanical work on his new automobile and it is now in the hands of painter P.N. Lund receiving its coat of paint. The vehicle is of a most pleasing design and shows that Mr. Simpson has spared neither expense nor pains in making the carriage both substantial and useful. (October 8, 1901)

G. Elkins has accepted a position with R.A. Simpson, of the Cream city Mechanical shop. (October 11, 1901)

Frank Elkins, employed in R.A. Simpson's shop on Shaw Avenue, had the thumb of his right hand so badly cut in a jointer Wednesday that Dr. Ring was compelled to amputate it at the first joint. (December 6, 1901)

Carl Petersen, after a year's absence at Arcata, has returned to Ferndale where he will accept a position in R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop. (December 24, 1901)

R. A. Simpson of the Shaw Avenue Mechanical Shop is continually on the improve. Lately he has built additions to two of his lumber storage sheds, and also a spacious addition to the east section of his Main Shop, the latter being very substantially built with double

planked walls and a treble planked roof. In this addition, Mr. Simpson has room for a second gasoline engine, which he is soon to put in to afford more power for his establishment... (January 10, 1902)

R.A. Simpson is having a new roof put on his big mechanical shop, and HH Hatch is reshingling his warehouse adjoining Mr. Simpson's property. (September 26, 1902)

R.A. Simpson is now enjoying himself with his home-made automobile, which he has gotten in perfect running order. R.A. is strictly in it with the rest of the "mobilists." (September 15, 1903)

Johnny Charlton met with quite a painful accident at R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop on Shaw Avenue last Tuesday morning. He was using the lathe at this place of business, when the piece of wood he was turning flew and struck him a heavy blow on the forehead, cutting a gash that required several stitches to close the wound. Johnny is indeed fortunate that the mishap ended no more seriously. (December 9, 1904)

R.A. Simpson is making several improvements to his mechanical shop on Shaw Avenue which will give that gentleman considerable additional room at his place of business. Among the improvements being made is that of an engine room in which Mr. Simpson will install a 15 or 20 horse power gasoline engine, the new piece of machinery now being on its way to the Cream City. (February 17, 1905)

A compressed air tank has been installed at R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop on Ocean Avenue, and now operates the town's fire whistle and is heard each noon and at quitting time in the evening. The whistle is a siren and will not fail to give an alarm that will not fail to be heard in case of a conflagration in this town. (April 9, 1907)

Carl Petersen, of Simpson's Mechanical shop, on Shaw Avenue, severs his connection with that firm tomorrow evening... (June 19, 1908)

Simpson's New Auto Truck...large 50-horse power auto truck is now completed and all but ready to inaugurate an auto freight service in this valley which later may be continued between here and Eureka. In fact, the trial trip around town was to have been made Wednesday evening, but owing to a slight defect in the gearing discovered at the last moment, the trial trip was postponed until the following day...Mr. Simpson has the distinction of owning and running the first automobile operated in Ferndale, and that, with the exception of the engine, he manufactured himself. Automobiles have since then, through Mr. Simpson's pioneer movement, become both popular and practical in Ferndale and it is to be hoped that the gentleman's new venture in the auto truck will be equally so. (July 31, 1908)

Thursday evening, R.A. Simpson's new power truck, the first of its kind in Humboldt County, was exhibited on Main Street, Ferndale, after having taken a load of butter boxes, moulds, etc. from Mr. Simpson's Shaw Avenue place of business to the Port Kenyon dock for shipment by Friday's Argo to San Francisco... (August 4, 1908)

R.A. Simpson, proprietor of the Ferndale Mechanical shop, has decided to remove to the central part of the state to engage in the manufacture of his creamery specialties. The gentleman has had this move under consideration for a long time past, but not until recently did he reach a definite conclusion in the matter. Mr. Simpson offers his business here for sale and different parties are considering the purchase of the shop. But if a deal is not concluded within the next few weeks the machinery and fixtures will be taken out and shipped below for use in the shop to be started there. As to his exact location Mr. Simpson is not decided. He has options on property in Berkeley, Alameda and Oakland...While regretting his removal, Mr. Simpson states that it is forced upon him. Practically most of his business is in material which is shipped from the county, and he is at a big disadvantage, owing to the lack of transportation facilities, especially in the winter. Had the Supervisors ordered the Eel River Bridge built it would have helped out much and Mr. Simpson would have continued in business in Ferndale... (September 17, 1909)

The mill property of R.A. Simpson on Shaw Avenue is being improved by a coat of paint. A new fence has also been built around his lumber yard. (October 15, 1909)

R.A. Simpson has reconsidered his decision to close his Ferndale mechanical shop when he removes to Oakland to engage in the business of manufacturing his creamery specialties. It had been the gentleman's intention to close the shop here and move the machinery below, but instead the shop will be operated here as in the past. Mr. Simpson yesterday informed the Enterprise that no manager for the plant had yet been selected, though he has a number in mind. The plant here will be operated solely for molding mill work and general jobbing, while Mr. Simpson's new mill in Oakland will be devoted entirely to the manufacture of his many creamery patents... (October 29, 1909)

On December 10th I with my family and some of my workmen take my departure for Oakland where we will make our future home. As to my old establishment in Ferndale, I have decided to continue it the same as heretofore, with the exception of the manufacture of my patent creamery specialties which I will manufacture exclusively in Oakland. I am leaving my business in the management of Mr. Carl Petersen, one of my old employees, who is authorized to receive all money and pay bills. We will continue to carry a full line of lumber, shingles, shakes, molding, sash and doors, also cream separator extras and creamery supplies as heretofore...My business here will be known as the Cream City Mechanical Shop while my Oakland business will be known as the R.A. Mr. Boyd and Mr. Dasher have been connected with the Simpson shop. Mr. Simpson conducted a mechanical shop in this town for many years past until a couple of years ago, when he opened a shop in Oakland for the manufacture of creamery supplies. He has since operated the Ferndale shop as a branch, spending his time between the two places....the new owners assumed control of the business yesterday, and will be busy for some time in moving the machinery from the Rees shop and setting things to rights in the future place of business. The new company is incorporated for \$15,000. The Simpson residence, occupied by William Clark and family, was also included in the deal. (June 27, 1913)

GARAGE

A new automobile garage is to be opened in Ferndale by Linwood Giacomini of Eureka, who has moved his family to this town and is now busily engaged in getting the new business in operation. The new garage will be opened at the Simpson mechanical shop, an addition of large size being now made to the shop for the accommodation of Mr. Giacomini. Mr. Giacomini will do all kinds of automobile repair work and will have his shop thoroughly equipped to handle the business. Mr. Giacomini, who is a son of S.P. Giacomini of Ferndale, is a thorough mechanic and will doubtless do well in this new venture. (May 17, 1912)

...L.L. Giacomini's new garage located next door to the Simpson mechanical shop will be found (ad)... (May 24, 1912)

George Hansen, who recently graduated from the Ferndale Union High School, will accept a position in the new Giacomini garage, we are informed. (May 31, 1912)

Last Friday at a few minutes after twelve o'clock noon, a conflagration broke out in the Giacomini Garage on Rose avenue which for a time threatened to destroy all that part of town, and only heroic work on the part of the Ferndale fire department and volunteer fire fighters prevented an enormous loss. As it was the garage was totally destroyed, while a fine dwelling close by, belonging to the Cream City Mechanical Co., also went up in smoke, and the mechanical shop belonging to the same company sustained considerable damage. Mr. Giacomini, proprietor of the garage, had completed washing the engine of an Overland touring car belonging to Dr. Perkins of Eureka with distillate and had started the engine running some few minutes before. He got into the machine and started to back it out onto the main floor of the garage when there was an explosion, and instantly the garage was a mass of flames. Mr. Giacomini was surrounded by fire, but managed to get to where patent fire extinguishers were kept and emptied two of these without result. He then gave the alarm of fire and in a minute or two a large number of men were on hand endeavoring to extinguish the flames. Owing to the nature of the fire, however, there being oil and gasoline about, all attempts to subdue the fire were futile until the dwelling house and garage had been consumed. In the garage at the time were several automobiles, but volunteers after a hard fight succeeded in getting all these outside with the exception of the Perkins machine and a machine belonging to Joe Wittman, the latter being a Reo several years old. The machine of Joseph Russ was dragged outside minus the rear wheels and part of the rear machinery, which were burnt up the machine being in for repair at the time. Robert Smith's machine was somewhat damaged, the upholstery being partly destroyed. The dwelling house was occupied by William Clark and family and they lost quite heavily. Their piano and part of their household furniture was saved but as there was only a very short time after the fire broke out in which it was possible to get into the house it was impossible to save everything. The work of the firemen in saving adjoining buildings was deserving of the greatest praise. The plant of the Cream City Mechanical Shop adjoined the garage in the rear and it seems almost a miracle that it was not destroyed. Heroic work of the firemen, however, prevented any damage aside from the roof being partly burned and the machinery being slightly damaged by water. The warehouses of the Hatch Hardware Co. were separated from the burning buildings only by a narrow alley and hard work was necessary to prevent their destruction. The residence of H.A. Nevens and Robert Smith across the street also had narrow escapes, catching fire once or twice in spite of the fact that they were drenched with water. Mr. Giacomini yesterday informed the Enterprise that he estimated his loss at about \$5000 while that of the Cream City Mechanical Co will be about \$4000. Charles Thompson, who was employed at the garage and had a room upstairs, lost all his furniture, clothes, etc. as well as \$30 in money. He figures he is out \$500... (September 23, 1913)

Mr. Andreasen establishes this office as a matter of convenience to his customers who in the future will not have to go to North Ferndale when they want anything in his line. (June 23, 1899)

The uptown office of the Ferndale Mechanical Shop has been moved from the Brelle building to the lower story of the YMI hall. (July 25, 1899)

PAINT SHOP

W.E. Matthews has rented the lower story of the Brelle Building and has opened a paint shop therein. He is prepared to do all kinds of house, sign and carriage painting, also picture framing. (November 24, 1899)

H. Hope and W.E. Matthews have formed a co-partnership in the painting business. they will conduct two shops, one in the Brelle Building on lower Main Street and the other in the building next to Kinzel and Hansen's shop on Ocean Avenue. The gentlemen are prepared to do all kinds of house, sign and carriage painting at satisfactory prices. (January 23, 1900)

Herbert Briggs, who has been connected with the Ferndale Exchange for a number of months past has resigned his position in that office and has accepted employment with Hope & Matthews, the painters. (February 2, 1900)

Hope and Matthews, the painters, have dissolved partnership. (March 23, 1900)

FIRE DEPARTMENT

The hose cart of Hose Co. No. 2 is to be moved into the rear of the Brelle Building on Shaw Avenue. (November 14, 1902)

W.S. Fizzell and D.A. Branstetter were at work yesterday building a shelter for Hose Cart No. 2 on Mr. Branstetter's land between the Gilt Edge and Bartlett & Bartlett's cigar store. (April 7, 1903)

SALVATION ARMY

The Salvation Army has moved its headquarters in to the lower story of the Brelle Building, opposite the K of P Castle. (May 8, 1900)
Bishop K.V. Millard (Church of Redeemed Israel) will preach in Salvation Army hall tomorrow. Saturday night. The hall is on Main Street, and is on the ground floor; it is a large, comfortable and well seated room, opposite Lund's furniture Store. Mr. Millard will bring his large tents to our valley about the first of June...(May 11, 1900)

About forty carpenters met in the Salvation Army hall last Wednesday evening and unanimously adopted the nine-hour working system. This means that they quit work at five o'clock p.m. each day. (August 10, 1900)

On account of the illness of his wife, who has to undergo an operation, Capt Millet of the Salvation Army, will have to say good bye to the Cream City. His farewell meeting will be held on Sunday night at 7:30 p.m. On Saturday evening there will be a farewell social meeting at 7:30 p.m. with ice cream...Farewell meeting at Port Kenyon on Wednesday night, February 6th...(February 5, 1901)

There will be meetings held in the Salvational Army hall regularly on Tuesday, Saturday and Sunday nights. Holiness meeting at 11 a.m. Sunday morning. Family gathering meeting at 3 p.m. Sunday afternoon. (May 10, 1901)

The Salvation Army Hall has been renovated. The walls have been tinted and the wood work painted... (June 25, 1901)

Salvation Army: Until further notice the Salvation Army will hold their week day meetings on Tuesday Wednesday and Saturday at 8 p.m. Sunday 11 a.m. Holiness Meeting, 3 p.m. Family Gathering, 8 p.m. Old Fashioned Salvation Meeting. Children's Meeting in separate hall Sundays at 3 p.m. Ensign Winter, officer in charge. (March 14, 1902)

The Salvation Army Headquarters were moved Saturday from the Brelle building on lower Main Street to the Upper story of the Russ, Early, Williams & Company's warehouse at the upper end of the same street. This move gives the army a more central location and Ensign Winters hopes it will be the means of increasing the attendance at the meetings. (November 4, 1902)

J.S. Beck has sold his stock of plumbing goods in his Ferndale store to the Arcata Hardware Co and has accepted employment with this firm. Mr. Beck and family will leave Ferndale this week to take up their residence in Arcata. (May 30, 1905)

J.S. Beck and family, who have been residing in Ferndale for some months past, take their departure for their new home in Arcata today.

(June 2, 1905)

MILLINERY

Mrs. J. Weaver expects to open a millinery store in the Brelle building on Main Street in the near future. (August 25, 1905)

BRELLE GROCERY STORE

F.G. Brelle, who returned to the Cream City last Thursday from a business trip to San Francisco, has decided to open a grocery store in Ferndale in his building at the corner of Main Street and Shaw Avenue. The name of the business will be "The Corner Grocery Store," and it is the intention to keep only the best groceries at very reasonable prices. (February 3, 1905)

The high wind of last Friday night caused considerable damage in Ferndale and vicinity. At the Ferndale Rochdale Company's store at large plate glass window was blown in and broken, and an accident of a like nature happened to one of the windows in F.G. Brelle's grocery store... (January 2, 1906)

F.G. Brelle, who has been conducting a grocery store in Ferndale for some months, and who made an assignment to the San Francisco Board of Trade for the benefit of his creditors, is embarrassed to the amount of about \$400, his assets being about \$300... (April 10, 1906)

DUCK FURNITURE STORE

The stock in the Duck furniture store, located in Pythian Castle, is being removed to the Brelle building across the street. It will be some time before their store will be in condition for occupancy. During the interval the Duck Bros will dispose of their stock of goods at sacrificial prices... (April 20, 1906)

The Duck Bros., the Ferndale furniture dealers, who have been occupying rather cramped quarters in the Brelle Building, are moving to their old place of business in the lower story of the K of P building which will soon be repaired of all the earthquake damage. (June 15, 1906)

ART STORE

E.R. Freeman, who will conduct an art store in the Brelle building on lower Main street, was an arrival in the Cream City Tuesday. He was accompanied to Ferndale by his wife and sister. (March 5, 1909)

FERNDALE LIBRARY

Tuesday and Wednesday the work was being busily prosecuted of packing up the books of the Ferndale Library, moving the shelving, etc., and the reading room is now located in the Brelle building opposite K of P Castle. This building will be occupied by the library until the completion of the new Carnegie building, which will be about September 1st. The Paine building, formerly the location of the library, will be remodeled and used as a theater by Manager Molrine of the moving picture show. (May 14, 1909)

At 10:50 o'clock last Thursday night this town was visited by the hardest earthquake in the memory of our people, with the exception of the memorable one of 1906. And in some parts of the valley this quake was felt with a greater degree of severity than was the other. In general, however, while an unusually heavy and...In the Brelle building, occupied in part by the Ferndale Library, several large panes of glass in front were broken... LADIES & GENTS FURNISHINGS

L. Cohen has again opened a store in Ferndale and is now located in the Brelle Building opposite the Pythian Castle...a full line of ladies' and gents' furnishings, laces, ribbons, novelties, etc.... (December 8, 1911)

TAILORS

F. G. Brelle and family of San Jose are to again take up their residence in this town in their former home, where they are well known and have many friends. Mr. Brelle recently disposed of his tailoring establishment in San Jose and plans to engage in the same business here..He plans to improve and enlarge his building on Main Street and plans it in first class repair... (June 6, 1911)

F.G. Brelle has opened his tailoring shop in his building on Main Street. (June 30, 1911)

Jaffe & Swahn, who conducted a tailoring shop at 433 Second Street, Eureka, have opened another shop in the Brelle building, Ferndale, where they will be prepared to do all kinds of tailoring... (October 4, 1912)

H. Jaffe, the Ferndale tailor, is now located in the Brice store building, adjoining the Ivanhoe Hotel, having removed from the Brelle building the latter part of the week. (December 3, 1912)

Lewis King, a tailor of ... has opened a shop in the Brelle Building in Ferndale...he will make all his suits and overcoats right in Ferndale... (February 1, 1913)

BRELLE FRUIT

The Brelle Fruit Jar Manufacturing Co of San Jose, CA succeeds the Brelle Automatic Sealer Co of Ferndale, CA... (December 9, 1913)

FERNDALE CLEANING WORKS

Frank Brelle has opened a cleaning and pressing establishment in the Brelle Building. (July 18, 1911)

Mr. B.H. Goff is to be my successor and I earnestly...sending their work to the Ferndale Cleaning Works...Wurt Lane (December 30, 1913)

Change of ownership...Mr. B.H. Goff is to be my successor...continue sending their work to the Ferndale Cleaning Works...Wurt Lane. (January 2, 1914)

Dave Hartley has purchased an interest in the Ferndale Cleaning Works and on the 1st of the month took up his new duties as partner with Ben Goff. Mr. Hartley had been employed for some time past at the Red Star Clothing House, but resigned his position, which took effect the last of June. (July 7, 1914)

Extensive improvements are being made at Goff & Hartley's cleaning and pressing establishment in the Brelle Building... (August 4, 1914)

Goff and Hartley, of the Ferndale Cleaning Works, are to move from the Brelle building to the Hatch building, recently vacated by the Crystal Cafe, about the 15th of this month. (November 3, 1914)

MOTORCYCLE REPAIR SHOP

The Brelle building, next to the Lane and Worthington cleaning works has been leased by a gentleman named Nelson, who is to open a bicycle repair shop, according to report. (September 26, 1913)

Ed Larsen and C.B. Nelson have formed a partnership and will engage in the motorcycle and bicycle business, their headquarters being in the Brelle building. They will have the agency for the Dayton motorcycle and for bicycles. (September 30, 1913)

E.J. Larsen has purchased the interest of his partner C.B. Nelson, in the bicycle business and is now conducting the shop on lower Main Street by himself. (July 10, 1914)

A deal was consummated this week whereby Reinhart Bros. disposed of their motorcycle repair shop to Ed Larsen. Mr. Larsen, who has also been conducting a motorcycle business, will consolidate the two shops, and make his headquarters in the building heretofore occupied by Reinhart Bros. Jas Reinhart will continue his shoe repairing business, but Henry Reinhart has not yet decided upon a future plan of action. (November 6, 1915)

J.T. Berry, who recently conducted a shooting gallery and bowling alley in the Brelle Building, Ferndale, has located in Blue Lake... (May 19, 1916)

Chas. Thompson=s new auto service station, at the corner of Main Street and Shaw Avenue, in Ferndale, is now open for business. It has been attractively and conveniently fitted up, and will doubtless enjoy a liberal patronage from the motorists of this vicinity as well as tourists. (March 19, 1920)

C.R. Thompson is having the cement foundation laid for a new building adjoining his present service station, which will be devoted exclusively to Dodge Brothers car service. It will be 50x70 feet in size, with concrete floor except in the workshop. The walls will be of corrugated iron and the roof of fireproof material...(4/4/24)

C.R. Thompson on September 1st sold his service station and accessory supply business in this town to Henry Reinhart and Peter Petersen, who took possession on that date...rented the property, together with the new building just completed at the rear of the service station, and will make use of the latter as a service shop for their Buick agency. The Elite Garage, conducted until the first of the month by Petersen & Reinhart, has been taken over by George Reinhart, who will conduct that business in future...(9/5/24)

Peter Petersen will take over the garage back of his service station which has formerly been conducted by H.P. Reinhart. After April 1st it will be run in connection with his present business. Mr. Petersen has the agency for the Buick and the new garage will give him a much more efficient business. (3/20/25)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...F.G. Brelle's building was denuded of glass, with a rather heavy loss. (April 24, 1906)

A deal has been concluded whereby C.R. Thompson will on September 1st sell his Ferndale service station and auto supply business to Petersen & Reinhart, proprietors of the Elite Garage and Buick agents in this territory. Petersen & Reinhart will close their present place of business and as yet it is not known whether or not the building, which is owned by the Cream City Mechanical Co., will again be occupied as a garage or used for other purposes. Mr. Thompson sells his auto accessories and service station equipment to Petersen & Reinhart but retains the ownership of the building and land, which will be rented by the new proprietors. The new building now in course of erection by Mr. Thompson will be completed by September 1st and will be used by Petersen & Reinhart as a show room and service shop for the Buick agency...(8/1/24)

Will Carter and wife are now located in the Brelle building on Main Street to which place they moved this week. (December 29, 1899)

Living rooms for rent cheap in the Brelle building. Enquire of S.D. O'Neal. (January 30, 1900)

T.D. Dungan and family have moved into the Brelle Building. (December 20, 1901)

T.D. Dungan and family have moved from the Brelle building on Main Street and are now located in the Bartlett residence at the corner of Eugene and Church Streets. (June 21, 1904)

The second story of the Brelle building is being fitted up for Dr. Dinsmore, who is soon to open dental parlors in Ferndale. The gentleman intended occupying quarters in the Paine building, but owing to some misunderstanding he was compelled to make the change. (July 15, 1904)

The gentleman has accepted a position with H.A. Nevens... (May 13, 1910)

Jay Robinson and wife have moved from the Brelle flat on Main Street to the Tyrrell tenement on Rose Avenue. (January 20, 1911)

Dr. J.W. Alkire, osteopathic physicians, late of Corning, Tehama Co, is permanently located in Ferndale and has his office upstairs in the Brelle Building, corner of Main Street and Shaw Avenue. (September 9, 1913)

Jack Kemp has purchased the A. Chope blacksmith tools and outfit from Messrs. Calanchini and Blum, and yesterday they were being moved to Jack's new shop on lower Main Street. (August 16, 1904)

Jack Kemp opened his new blacksmith shop on Main Street yesterday and is now ready for business. Jack has secured the assistance of James Fawcett, employed for some months at Fred Hansen's North Ferndale Mechanical Shop. (August 23, 1904)

R.L. Cathey, the Ferndale horeshorer, who has been located at the T.H. Faulkner shop on Francis Street, wishes to inform his patrons and the public in general that on or about the 15th of December he will change his location to the Kemp shop, opposite the K of P building on Main Street. (December 5, 1905)

R.L. Cathey, the Ferndale horseshoer, is now located in the Kemp blacksmith shop on Main Street, opposite the K of P Castle... (December 19, 1905)

Lee Cathey, who has conducted a blacksmith shop in the Hall building on Main Street for a number of years, is now located in the Kemp building, opposite Pythian Castle. (October 21, 1913)

Ferndale Feed and Commission House...Messrs D.W. Small and Alex McKay...Proprietors...and they have opened their establishment on Shaw Avenue, next to R.A. Simpson=s. (February 8, 1895)

J.W. Kemp is still conducting his feed store on Shaw Avenue next to Simpson's mechanical shop. He can supply you with anything you want in the hay or grain line. (February 4, 1896)

Jack Kemp, of the Ferndale vegetable store, has opened a fish market on Shaw Avenue, near R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop, and is now prepared to supply the public with all kinds of fish in season. (May 19, 1903)

Jack Kemp has sold his vegetable store in Ferndale to Martin Sanders, and Jack will hereafter conduct the fish market near R.A. Simpson's mechanical shop which he has purchased. (July 21, 1903)

Jack Kemp who last week moved his vegetable store from the Doe Building on Main Street to a location on Shaw Avenue near R.A. Simpson's factory, is putting in some of his time these days blacksmithing with Lee Cathey. (November 13, 1903)

R.A. Simpson is having a new roof put on his big mechanical shop, and H.H. Hatch is reshingling his warehouse adjoining Mr. Simpson's property. (September 26, 1902)

Last Friday at a few minutes after twelve o'clock noon, a conflagration broke out in the Giacomini Garage on Rose avenue which for a time threatened to destroy all that part of town...The warehouses of the Hatch Hardware Co. were separated from the burning buildings only by a narrow alley and hard work was necessary to prevent their destruction... Mr. Kistner will remain at the present stand of the firm and will continue to deal in bicycles, sporting goods, automobile supplies, etc. (December 17, 1907)

Fred Cruickshanks, the Ferndale Blacksmith and his employees, have been busy the last week preparing the interior of Mr. Cruickshanks new shop on lower Main Street for the removal of the gentleman's machinery and stock to the new quarters. (January 7, 1908)

Peter Larsen, who for some years has been engaged in business with G. Kistner, is moving this week into his new quarters in the Cruickshanks blacksmith shop, recently erected. Mr. Larsen and Mr. Kistner have dissolved partnership, the latter still conducting business at the old stand. (January 14, 1908)

Painter C.H. Matthews is at work painting Fred Cruickshanks' new blacksmith shop on lower Main Street. Clarence expects to complete the job in a few days. (February 18, 1908)

Fred Cruickshanks of the Ferndale Iron Works, who recently moved into his commodious and convenient quarters on lower Main Street, is, as rapidly as circumstances will permit, getting his place of business in shape for the rapid and convenient handling of work entrusted to his care... (May 15, 1908)

Fred Cruickshanks contemplates building an addition to his mechanical shop on lower Main Street, in which is also situated H.P. Larsen's garage. The improvements will be made early in the spring. Owing to the increase of the business of Messrs. Cruickshanks and Larsen, the present large building has been found inadequate to accommodate the same. (December 17, 1909)

Messrs. Fred Cruickshanks and H. P. Larsen, have formed a partnership to conduct the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage. As is known to our readers, the two gentlemen have been in the same building on lower Main Street for a couple of years past, where Mr. Cruickshanks conducted the Iron Works, while Mr. Larsen owned the garage. By the new arrangement the two businesses are combined, Messrs. Cruickshanks and Larsen being equal owners. They will continue to conduct an up to date plant, in fact, the shop is one of the best equipped in the county... (January 11, 1910)

Work has been commenced on an addition at the rear of the Ferndale Iron Works, Cruickshanks & Larsen proprietors. The new portion will be 24x50 feet in size and will be used for the woodworking part of business, giving more room in the main shop for new machinery which will be installed. The addition is made necessary by the rapidly increasing business of Cruickshanks & Larsen, and will enable them to handle a much larger volume of work. John Cruickshanks and Al Boyd are in charge of the building operations. (April 8, 1910)

A deal was concluded this week whereby Fred Cruickshanks becomes the sole owner of the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage, he having purchased the interest of his partner, H.P. Larsen. The deal has been under negotiation for several weeks past but was not brought to a head until Tuesday. Messrs. Cruickshanks and Larsen have been associated in business for the past three years and have built up a fine healthy trade which is steadily growing. Mr. Larsen will continue in the employ of Mr. Cruickshanks for some months at least, and probably permanently, as the latter gentleman states he would very much dislike to lose the services of his former partner. Mr. Cruickshanks states that it is his intention to greatly enlarge his present quarters, which are already of large size but which are found inadequate to accommodate all branches of the business. He plans to practically double the size of his present shops. When the work is completed he will have a storage room for automobiles 50x50 feet in size. The work of enlargement will be commenced very shortly. (March 7, 1913)

The work of enlarging the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage was commenced this week by Messrs. W.J.. Flowers, John Gries, W.O. Davis and Ira King. The addition to be built will nearly double the size of this plant and work will be rushed as rapidly as the weather will permit. (April 4, 1913)

The work of building the new addition to the Ferndale Iron works and garage is now completed, and Mr. Cruickshanks now has a very commodious place of business. The addition gives him about 3700 square feet additional room . The new part will be used for automobile work, and the machinery will be moved from its present location into the addition as soon as possible. The building now has an entrance on the side street, as well as on Main Street so that automobiles may be taken directly into the workshop without using the front entrance. (May 6, 1913)

Fred Cruickshanks, proprietor and manager of the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage on lower Main Street, is planning extensive improvements to his place of business within the next couple of months that will make his establishment one of the most convenient and up to date to be found in the county. Mr. Cruickshanks will move his iron works and garage workshops to the rear of his building, these departments to occupy the entire floor space of the large addition recently built to his works, the entrance to which is on the street between his property and the Congregational Church. The entire front of the building facing on Main Street will be occupied as a garage storage and stock room... (October 24, 1913)

C.H. Osgood of Ferndale and Frank Grimm of Port Kenyon have leased a floor space of 50x100 feet from Fred Cruickshanks in the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage and will open a new mechanical shop there. Messrs. Osgood and Grimm also take over the woodworking machinery now installed there and about the first of February Mr. Osgood will go to San Francisco and secure a full up-to-date equipment. (December 22, 1914)

Fred Cruickshanks of the Ferndale Iron Works, is contemplating an addition to his present building on lower Main Street, arrangements for which have now begun. A 26-foot front on the south side will soon be erected, which will be used as a store building and office. Mr. Cruickshanks will also make other improvements in his present building, which will greatly facilitate the handling of the great amount of work which the Ferndale Iron Works always enjoys. (March 2, 1915)

Lee Cathey has disposed of his blacksmithing equipment to Fred Cruickshanks and has closed his shop in this town. He has accepted a position with Mr. Cruickshanks in the Ferndale Iron Works, where he will be employed for some time. (May 7, 1915)

A number of important changes are now under way at the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage, P.A. Mansfield of Roseburg, Oregon, who came from that country recently looking for a suitable location is now making arrangements with Proprietor Cruickshanks to lease the blacksmithing business of the plant, which will be moved from its present quarters in the front of the building to the rear addition which was constructed some time ago. It is Mr. Cruickshank's designs also to lease the garage part of his business, the machinery connected with this to be moved also to the rear addition. Who is to take over this end of the plant has not yet been made public. The main building 50x100 feet will be used by Mr. Cruickshanks as a storage place for autos... (February 8, 1916)

Work has commenced on the new office and store annex to the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage. (March 10, 1916)

Fred Cruickshanks, proprietor of the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage, this week sold his blacksmithing business to George Frame and Chas. Weedman, who will conduct the business at the same location as heretofore. Messrs. Weedman and Frame have been employed in the Iron Works and Garage for some time past, both being experienced and expert workmen. Mr. Cruickshanks in the near future will probably complete a deal whereby he will lease out his garage business, and will devote most of his own time to outside work. (February 9, 1917)

Fred Fuller, an experienced automobile mechanic, and well known in Ferndale, has leased the automobile repair department of the Ferndale Iron Works and Garage from Fred Cruickshanks and will hereafter conduct the same...Mr. Cruickshanks will retain the office and store parts of the garage and will conduct them as before. Fred Cruickshanks has leased his Ferndale garage to Messrs. Kerbach and Herke, experienced automobile mechanics of San Francisco, who will take possession on October 15th. To prevent confusion, etc., tickets will be issued to the new catholic church dedication in Ferndale on August 16th. This is a wise arrangement as the new edifice will hold only a certain number of people those receiving tickets for admission will kindly present them at the door. (August 4, 1896)

Mr. C. O'Mara has presented to the Catholic Church a handsome alter given in the name of his departed and beloved daughter, Mamie. (August 18, 1896)

The dedication of Ferndale's new Catholic Church last Sunday morning, August 16th, called together an immense concourse of people, every section of the county being represented in the vast assemblage. From all directions people began to arrive at an early hour, and when the doors of the new church were opened, it was plain to be seen that the building could not possibly accommodate the multitude that had assembled....In the evening the new church was again crowded...The new Catholic Church in Ferndale will now be known as the Church of the Assumption. It is a most beautiful, spacious and substantial structure, a credit to our town, and an honor to those who united in its erection. (August 18, 1896)

At the Ferndale Catholic Church on Thursday of last week, Mr. Antone Guigliomini and Miss Josie Tonini, both of this family, were joined in the holy bonds of wedlock. (August 25, 1896).

Father Nugent of Ferndale left this week for a two week stay at Grass Valley. The Ferndale Catholic Church will be closed until the gentleman's return. (September 25, 1896)

Tomorrow, Wednesday morning at 9 a.m. in the Ferndale Catholic Church the Rev. Father Nugent will join in marriage Margaret A. Friel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Neil Friel and Flex Montgomery, son of S.J. Montgomery and wife. (October 27, 1896)

The horse took to his heels and ran away and Charley spent most of the night looking for him. ORIGINAL CATHOLIC CHURCH BUILDING

DWELLING (SISTERS)

It has been decided...to erect a building near the Catholic Church for the use of the convent school of this place. (September 14, 1897)

Work has been commenced on the Sister's School to be erected near the Catholic Church in Ferndale. it is to be a roomy two story structure with concrete foundation. (September 28, 1897)

Bert and Eugene Matthews are building the convent school near the Catholic Church, it will be a two story structure 36x40 feet in size. (October 15, 1897)

Ferndale's new convent school building is nearing completion and will soon be ready for occupancy by the Sisters and their pupils. It is a substantial structure about 40 feet square and two stories high, resting on a concrete foundation. On the ground floor are eight rooms and on the upper floor nine rooms, besides closets, pantries, hallways, etc. it is most conveniently arranged for the purpose for which it is intended. (December 21, 1897)

The Ferndale Sisters of Mercy will probably move into the new convent school building the first of next week. (December 31, 1897)

T.L. Wilson has just finished painting the inside woodwork of the Convent School Building... (January 7, 1898)

The Sisters moved their furniture and affects into the new convent school building near the Catholic Church Wednesday. (January 11, 1898)

The old Catholic Church building is being fitted up for a school room for the pupils of the Sisters of Mercy. (August 5, 1898)

Mrs. Mullen, sister of the late Chas Harkins, now makes her home with the Ferndale Sisters of Mercy, so we are told. (February 2, 1900)

The sisters of Mercy re-opened their school in Ferndale yesterday. (August 7, 1900)

Ferndale's public schools will reopen next Monday, as will also the Sisters of Mercy School of this place. (January 1, 1901)

The Sisters of Mercy will reopen their school in Ferndale next Monday, August 19th. (August 16, 1901)

The Sisters of Mercy School in Ferndale will re-open September 1st. (August 26, 1902)

Mrs. Jennie B. Lewis of Santa Cruz is in this county and has had issued a writ of habeas corpus, directed to the Sisters of Charity of Ferndale, for the purpose of getting the custody of her daughter, Muriel Lewis, who was left in charge of the Ferndale Sisters by her father, T.J. Lewis, formerly of this place, but now in Oregon. Five years ago the petitioner and T.J. Lewis, parents of the child, separated, the father taking the child. Later he brought the child to Ferndale, and before leaving here placed her in St. Mary's Convent, with written instructions to the Sisters to allow no one to see the child without written instructions from him...To this place she journeyed only to meet with refusal to her demand to see her daughter, for the Sisters do not know her and were simply carrying out the instructions of the only relative of the child that they did know, the father... (September 2, 1903)

At 9:30 o'clock last Saturday morning Mrs. Mary Mullen, who for the last nine years has been confined to her bed at the Sisters' Convent in Ferndale with paralysis, breathed her last at the ripe old age of 94...leaves behind four children -- Mrs. Chris Petersen, of Francis Creek, Chas Mullen of Glendale, Mrs. W. Montgomery of San Jose, and Mrs. James Wheat of Calaveras County... (October 4, 1904)

J.E.B. Armytage has nearly completed a fine cement walk in front of the Sisters' property near the Catholic Church. (August 21, 1900)

After an illness of about three weeks' duration, the ten-year-old-daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Etter of Upper Mattole passed away at the Catholic Convent School in Ferndale last Saturday morning at about three o'clock. Deceased not long ago came to Ferndale to attend school, but shortly afterward suffered a severe _all which later developed into abscess of the brain... (July 14, 1903)

The Ferndale Convent reopened yesterday, as did also the Ferndale Business College. (January 6, 1903)

Carpenters James Scott and Will Niebur will commence the work of reshingling the Convent School in Ferndale just as soon as the weather will permit. (November 22, 1904)

Painters William and Harry Jensen have been engaged the past couple of days in repapering a number of rooms at the Ferndale Convent. (June 22, 1906)

Carpenter James Scott has been at work the last week or so reshingling the upper story of the residence occupied by the Sisters of Mercy in this place. (April 30, 1907)

William Jensen is at work painting the residence on the extension of Washington Street occupied by the Sisters of Mercy of this place. (May 7, 1907)

Carpenters Chris Hansen and Fred Rasmussen have been at work of late making improvements to the Sisters' school and the Convent building in Ferndale. it will require another week to complete the work. (April 7, 1908)

Carpenters Chris Hansen and Eugene Haywood are busily engaged in making extensive improvements to the Sisters' dwelling on Washington Street. It will be several weeks before the gentlemen complete their work. (May 29, 1908)

Rev. Mother Joseph of the Mercy Convent returned Sunday evening from her trip below. She was accompanied by a young lady who has given up the world and will enter the convent here to dedicate herself to a life of sacrifice. She will be known as Sister Gertrude. The young lady in question is a graduate of Merrill Miller's business college in San Francisco and an expert stenographer and typewriter and for the past three years has held responsible positions in various business houses. It is the intention of the Rev. Mother to add a commercial course to the present suites in the convent school and of that department Sister Gertrude will have charge. Many changes have been made to the school and the convent, to the latter a large and commodious dormitory being added, and it is expected that at the opening of the school August 17th, a large attendance will be present... (August 4, 1908)

AD: St. Mary's Boarding and Day School, Ferndale, Humboldt Co., CA. Conducted by the Sisters of Mercy. This school affords every facility for a thorough English and Commercial Education, and no pains are spared to secure the health and comfort of the pupils. The Scholastic Year consists of two terms. The opening of studies takes place on the sixteenth of August. The closing of the session, the last Friday in June. There are two weeks vacation allowed during the Christmas holidays... (October 2, 1908)

The children of the Ferndale Convent School are enjoying an enforced vacation this week, owing to the serious illness of Sister

Aloysious and the unfortunate accident occurring to the Reverent Mother, who slipped on the frost pavement last Saturday morning, spraining her ankle. The evening school which the Sisters have been successfully conducting since last September, will also be closed for the week. (January 26, 1909)

Unless all sign fail, inside of a year this town will have within its borders as fine a little hospital as can be found anywhere in a place of the same size. This move has been under way for some little time, and considerable work has already been done on the project in a quiet manner. It will cost something over \$5000 to finance the proposition, which is backed by a number of Ferndale's business men. Messrs. H.C. Blum and Andrew Donnelly are the active promoters of this project and as soon as satisfied that the hospital will receive the support of which it is entitled active construction work will be begun... (October 8, 1909)

The erection of a hospital for Ferndale, mention of which has been previously made in the columns of The Enterprise, seems an assured fact. From Mr. Andrew Donnelly, who has interviewed a number of people of Ferndale and vicinity in the matter of subscribing for hospital tickets, we learn that the proposition has met with excellent success and almost enough subscriptions have been secured to assure the going ahead with practical plans. The erection of a hospital for Ferndale means a great deal to the town and it is to be hoped that the object will shortly be accomplished. (November 19, 1909)

The preliminary work in connection with a hospital for Ferndale is progressing favorably. Many yearly tickets have been sold, and it is planned to commence the construction of a building early in the spring. A site for the hospital has not yet been selected, though several places are under consideration. (January 4, 1910)

Last week Drs. Ring and Phelan leased from the Parish Association the convent building on Washington street, for many years occupied by the Sisters of Mercy, and the same is to be immediately fitted up for a first class hospital, which will fill a long felt want in this community, to be known as the Ferndale General Hospital. It was originally intended to erect a new building for the hospital, but as it seemed difficult to secure a sufficient number of subscribers for tickets to warrant so large an expenditure of money, it was feared for awhile the plan would have to be abandoned, until, as the Sisters closed their school here a couple of months ago, two of the community departing at that time for San Francisco and the remaining two Sisters planning to leave for the southern part of the state as soon as Mother Oliver's health, which has been quite feeble, will permit, negotiations were entered into with the Parish Association for the leasing of the building, which is admirably located and adapted for the purpose of a hospital. There are three stories and in all seventeen rooms, including two large wards. The building has the best of modern plumbing and has baths on two floors. A few small alterations are necessary to make it a thoroughly up to date hospital building. The most important change will be fitting up the operating room. It is intended to have the most up to date appliances that can be secured. (May 24, 1910)

A. Boyd yesterday started making the necessary repairs in the convent building on Washington Street, leased a short time ago by Drs. Ring and Phelan, to be used as a hospital. The building, as previously announced, is admirably adapted for hospital purposes, and the only change necessary is that of fixing up an operating room. Some extra wiring is to be done by Electrician Barnes, and the building will be ready for occupancy June 15th, one week from tomorrow. A nurse was expected from the French hospital to take charge of the building but she could not be secured at present, so the charge of the same will be taken by Miss Moore of Eureka, a graduate of Sequoia hospital and an experienced and capable nurse... (June 7, 1910)

Mother Oliver and Sister Aloysas departed yesterday for San Francisco. Mother Oliver goes to San Diego, while Sister Aloysas goes to Sacramento to enter convents at the different places. The convent building on Washington Street has been leased by Drs. Ring and Phelan for hospital purposes... (June 14, 1910)

Dr. Phelan, assisted by Dr. Loveren of Fortuna, operated on the 12-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. O'Leary of the Island, at the Ferndale Hospital Friday for throat trouble. The little girl stood the operation nicely, which was a most serious one, and is now convalescing. (June 28, 1910)

The six year old son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Swain of the Island was removed to the Ferndale General Hospital yesterday, and will be operated on today by Drs. Phelan and Ring. The child is suffering with an abscess caused by a bursted appendix. (July 22, 1910)

A late improvement at the Ferndale hospital is a system of call bells whereby a patient in any of the rooms, without leaving the bed, may summon an attendant by pressing a switch which operates an electric bell. The system is the most modern in use, and is in keeping with the policy of the management to have nothing but the best at the hospital. (August 12, 1910)

A cutting affray occurred at the Petrolia Hotel last Monday night, in which one of the principals in the altercation was stabbed several times and is now at the Ferndale General Hospital receiving treatment at the hands of Dr. Phelan.. (September 9, 1910)

Lynn, the five year old son of Mr. and Mrs. C.A. Keltner of East Ferndale, died last Sunday afternoon after a week's illness. The child was taken with appendicitis, and Saturday afternoon he was removed to the Ferndale Hospital, where he was operated on, but his condition was such that the case was hopeless and he died at the hour mentioned above... (September 13, 1910)

Andrew Jacobsen of the Island sustained a bad injury Tuesday, when a horse reared and stuck him on the head, breaking the bones of his skull. He was operated on Wednesday at the Ferndale Hospital by Doctors Phelan, Ring and Lane, a portion of the bone being removed. The young man is reported as getting along nicely at this writing. (September 30, 1910)

About 11:30 o'clock Wednesday night Bessie Wilson, who resides in the house on the hill, shot herself through the breast with probably

fatal results. The bullet, which was from a revolver, went completely through her body, severing the spinal chord and causing partial paralysis. Doctors Phelan and Ring were summoned and removed the woman to the Ferndale Hospital, where she is now receiving treatment. She asserts that the wound was accidentally inflicted while she was placing the revolver under her pillow. Her chances for recovery are but slight. (October 21, 1910)

Doctors Phelan and Ring of Ferndale and Marshall of Eureka yesterday operated on Bessie Wilson at the Ferndale Hospital for injuries received when the woman accidentally shot herself with a revolver some weeks ago. A portion of the bone was removed from the spine where the bullet passed through. But little chance for the recovery of the patient exists. (November 15, 1910)

Mr. Niels Schmidt of Loleta has been in the Ferndale Hospital with a serious case of blood poisoning. He is now well on the road to recovery... (January 3, 1911)

Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Russ of the Ocean House came up to Ferndale the latter part of last week, bringing their infant son for medical treatment at the Ferndale Hospital. The boy is suffering with pneumonia, but was reported yesterday as getting along nicely. (January 31, 1911)

Josephine, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Coppini of East Ferndale, was operated on yesterday at the Ferndale hospital for an abscess. The patient's condition is quite serious. The operation was performed by Drs. Lane, Phelan and Ring. (February 14, 1911)

The infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Russ, ill at the Ferndale hospital, continues to improve, and his recovery is now anticipated. (February 21, 1911)

Mr. Cooper, father of Mrs. Albert Dukes of Grizzly Bluff, was removed to the home of his daughter Wednesday after having been an inmate of the Ferndale Hospital for a couple of weeks... (March 10, 1911)

O.F. Williams has been engaged of late in remodeling the old convent school building in Ferndale. When completed it will be fitted up as a lodge room for the Ferndale Council, Y.M.I. (May 19, 1911)

At the Ferndale Hospital last Monday evening Wallie Burns, whose serious illness had been reported...passed away, his death being due to an attack of paralysis and complication. The deceased was well known in Ferndale and southern Humboldt. For many years he was manager of the Zanone ranch near Petrolia... (June 23, 1911)

Miss Maggie Moore, who has been spending a vacation from her duties as nurse at the Ferndale Hospital, has resumed her work. Miss Flora Kelly, who has been substituting for Miss Moore, returned to Eureka Wednesday. (July 14, 1911)

Katie, the twelve-year old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Casanova of Ferndale, was operated on at the Ferndale Hospital yesterday afternoon by Dr. C.A. Phelan for appendicitis. The child had been ill for about a week and was in a very serious condition. At this writing the outcome of the case cannot be told. (July 21, 1911)

Katie, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. John Casanova of Ferndale, who was operated on at the Ferndale Hospital last Thursday for appendicitis, is reported as getting along nicely, though her condition is yet quite serious. (July 25, 1911)

Mr. La Bounty of Petrolia was operated on at the Ferndale Hospital by Drs. Phelan and Ring last Thursday evening for hernia. The operation was a successful one and Mr. La Bounty is reported as getting along nicely. (August 29, 1911)

Mrs. George Hansen and little daughter Bernice, who have been below the past two months, arrived in Ferndale Wednesday. Mr. Hansen, who has been in the hills for about the same period of time, arrived in Ferndale a few days ago to meet his wife and little girl. He has accepted a position with Giacomini & Boyd, taking up his work today. Mr. and Mrs. Hansen have rented the A., M., H. Co.'s house near the convent, where they will make their home. (April 1, 1910)

...Ferndale Band...one of the most pleasing features of the Fair...Ferndale Brass Band... (September 29, 1896)

The band concert...given in Roberts Hall New Years night was a market success in every way...the brass band of 15 pieces with Prof. Kausen as director, rendered three selections, and the orchestra of 11 pieces, a like number...those who composed the band and orchestra on the occasion: Band Director, Prof. Kausen; Eli Bagley, Ellen Smith, Will Petersen, Charles Petersen, W.F. Kausen, Miss Kate Petersen, W.N. Damon, V.A. Smith, Peter Andersen, George W. Kaussen, I.M. Ring, Peter Larsen, Prof. N.F. Petersen, Will Neibur, P.N. Lund. Orchestra: Prof. William Kausen; Dr. H.J. Ring; W.F. Kausen, C.H. Williams, L.M. Smith, I.M. Ring, Rev. G.H. Merrill, E.F. Kausen and Mrs. W.F. Kausen, and Will Neibur and P.N. Lund. (January 5, 1897)

...there is talk of erecting a building on H.H. Neibur's land in Ferndale to be used for gymnasium purposes. (July 20, 1897)

It is now an assured fact that Ferndale is to have an athletic Hall to be erected by H.H. Neibur on his land at the foot of Church Street near the baseball grounds. The building is to be 40x40 feet in size with 20 foot walls and bids for building the same will be received at H.C. Blum's office up to August 7th, tomorrow. The people of the town subscribed \$100 as a loan to Mr. Neibur to assist him in the matter. (August 6, 1897)

H.H. Neibur has got the contract to build the Ferndale Athletic brothers to the Kirri brothers. (August 6, 1897)

Carpenter John Kerri commenced work last Monday on the new athletic hall and handball court for H.H. Neibur. (September 10, 1897)

H.H. Neibur's athletic hall is about completed. (October 12, 1897)

The dance in Neibur's new athletic hall last Friday evening was a joyous affair and all who attended felt well repaid... (October 19, 1897)

The Committee appointed for the purpose is meeting with good success in soliciting members for the Ferndale Athletic Club which is soon to be organized. Neibur's athletic hall, which the club will occupy is to be enlarged soon by a 30 foot addition and is to be lighted by electricity. The necessary paraphernalia will soon be ordered and the club is to give the use of the hall and its equipment, one afternoon of each week to the children and one afternoon of each week to the young ladies for their exclusive use. It will be just the place for our young people to exercise and develop their muscles and if the affairs of the club are conducted properly...it will prove a valuable acquisition to our town. (November 2, 1897)

H.H. Neibur has ordered the lumber for the proposed 30 foot addition to his Ferndale Athletic Club. (November 5, 1897)

Considerable interest is being taken by the young ladies who attend school in Ferndale and who accepted the invitation to a free use of Neibur's athletic hall. Last Saturday afternoon a large number assembled at the hall and engaged in the lively exercise of handball etc. The girls were greatly delighted and will continue these exercises in the future and a number of elderly ladies will be present at their future meetings. Other young ladies will meet as usual on Thursday afternoons and enjoy their games and exercises. (February 8, 1898)

A recent meeting of the Ferndale Brass band held at Neiber's Athletic Hall, the following members of that organization were elected as officers for the ensuing term: musical dir and business mgr: Eugene L. Matthews; Pres: DeWitt Bugbee; sec/treas/librarian: George W. Kaussen. It is the intention of the band to give weekly open air concerts this summer, providing the cooperation of the businessmen of this place can be secured. (April 8, 1898)

Professor Kausen is organizing another brass band. This will give Ferndale three brass bands. (April 8, 1898)

To the Public...I feel that it is but justice to myself to publicly state my reasons for severing my connections with the Ferndale Brass Band, of which I have been so long director. A few weeks ago, unbeknown to me, and without my consent, several of the members decided to change their instruments and take up new instruments of which they were not in the least familiar. I remonstrated with the parties in question, but I was given to understand that my desires in the matter were of no consequence and believing under the new arrangement the value of the band and its ability to make satisfactory music would be seriously impaired and feeling also that the attitude assumed by the parties referred to indicated only too plainly that they harbored the idea that they knew more about music than I did myself, I concluded to retire from the organization and thus permit the "boys" to earn it to suit themselves...in conclusion I beg to announce that I am now engaged in organizing another band in Ferndale and in the future as in the past, you will always find me and the new organization ready to assist everywhere the cause that requires our aid...it is true that I am getting old, but not too old to teach those who have yet a great deal to learn in music, their own ideas to the contrary notwithstanding. Respectfully, William Kausen, Sr. (April 15, 1898)

Professor Kausen's newly organized brass band was on our streets Saturday night... (May 10, 1898)

Chris Rasmussen of North Ferndale has started a wood yard at the Neiber place near the Ferndale Catholic Church and is now prepared to supply the public with stove wood at a moment's notice. (June 21, 1898)

Chris Rasmussen has sold his Ferndale wood yard to W. Steeves. (September 16, 1898)

...a compromise has been affected between Kausen's band and the Ferndale Cornet Band, whereby Prof. Kausen's has the whole of the orchestra work, and the FCB, the brass. The Fern Leaf Orchestra has disbanded and Prof. Kausen has dissolved his brass band, several members of which will unite with the Ferndale Cornet Band... (October 25, 1898)

Neiber hall will be occupied by the Ferndale Brass Band for a year to come. The boys will have comfortable winter quarters in their new home... (November 18, 1898)

Ferndale Brass band...composed of Prof. Flowers, W.E. Dungan, Clyde Alford, S.A. Ward, DeWitt Bugbee, W.H. Look, Eugene Matthews, T.L. Wilson and W. Neibur... (May 5, 1899)

At a meeting of the members of the Ferndale Brass Band, held last Sunday, it was decided to disband and for the first time in several years our town is without an organization of this kind. The step the boys have taken is greatly to be regretted, as they had become quite proficient and were furnishing our people with some of the best music ever rendered by local horn blowers. The cause of disorganization, as given by the boys, is lack of interest on the part of some of the members and the absence of reasonable financial aid on the part of the public in general. (February 16, 1900)

We hear it reported that as soon as he returns from his visit to other parts of the state, Prof. Charles Smith will endeavor to organize a brass band in Ferndale. It is also intimated that Prof Petersen of North Ferndale is to make a move in this line, and it looks as if the Cream City may soon have brass bands galore. (February 23, 1900)

The Ferndale Concert Band will be re-organized shortly providing the members meet with proper financial encouragement. Arrangements are being made to secure the services of Prof Flowers, of the Shaw Co., to act as leader of the band during the coming summer, and he has signified his willingness to come to Ferndale for that purpose at a stated price. It is hoped that the boys can raise the required amount - \$60. we believe. Ferndale ought to have a brass band by all means, and Mr. Flowers as we all know, is a capable instructor and a musician of no mean ability. (April 6, 1900)

The members of the Ferndale Concert Band met at Neibur's Hall last Tuesday evening for the purpose of taking steps towards reorganization. D.C. Bugbee was elected President, James H. Hamner, Secretary/Treasurer Pro Tem, and S.A. Ward, Business Manager...secure the services of Prof. Frank Flowers of the Shaw Theatrical Company's Band as musical director of the organization and the results of the labor will be known in a few days...following are the names of the members and instrumentation of the band: E.L. Mathews, First B. Flat Clarinet; E. Weaver, 2nd B Flat Clarinet; James H. Hamner and P.G. Frost, Solo B. Flat Cornets; Clyde Alford, 1st B Flat Cornet; D.C. Bugbee, Tuba, L.M. Smith, Baritone, Elmer Trousdale, Slide Trombone; Peter Larsen, Tenor; S.A. Ward, 1st Alto; J. Ayers, 2nd Alto; and E. Kerri, Snare Drum. (April 13, 1900)

At a meeting of the Ferndale Brass Band, held Tuesday evening, Ira L. Scott was chosen secretary and treasurer, the other officers of the organization being D.C. Bugbee president and S.A. Ward business manager. The soliciting committee has secured something over \$50, the business men of our town having subscribed liberally towards the band concerts to be given this summer. That the band will soon be under the direction and leadership of Prof Frank Flowers is now an assured fact the gentleman being expected to arrive in Ferndale on the 30th inst. (April 20, 1900)

Petersen's Band, accompanied by a number of friends... (April 27, 1900)

The Ferndale Brass Band gave its first open air concert on Main Street last Saturday evening, a large crowd being present and the different numbers rendered passing off very creditably. The band under the able instruction of Prof Flowers, who in a short time will have the boys in proper shape. The next concert takes place next Saturday evening, the program of which will appear in Friday's issue. (May 15, 1900)

Prof. Chas Smith, at one time leader of the Ferndale Concert Band, who has been spending the past few months in SF, is visiting in our town. (June 26, 1900)

Last Friday evening ,the 24th inst, is the date set for the Ferndale Concert Band's grand promenade concert and ball. All lovers of music, as well as those who enjoy tripping the light fantastic, should avail themselves of the opportunity thus afforded to pass a pleasant and agreeable evening... (August 17, 1900)

The first semi-monthly band concert and dance for the winter months was given by the Ferndale Brass Band in Roberts Hall last Saturday... (October 9, 1900)

It is expected that the main line of Ferndale's sewer system will be completed tomorrow evening...A large cave occurred in the ditch on Church Street near the band room Wednesday night, necessitating considerable extra work. (October 12, 1900)

The members of the Ferndale Concert Band were agreeably surprised last Tuesday night. While they were practicing at their hall on Church Street, that evening, quite a number of ladies and gentlemen, armed with cakes and other good things to eat, made their appearance on the scene. The boys were slightly confused for a moment at the unexpected arrival of the party, but they soon rallied sufficiently to make their guests feel at home. (February 1, 1901)

Of the Ferndale Concert Band, Monday evening's Standard has the following to say: "Yesterday's atmosphere was in striking contrast with that of Saturday, allowing the Ferndale band to in a measure retrieve the opportunity which the weather-sulkiness of the day previous deprived them of. At half past nine o'clock the musicians appeared in the vestibule of the Vance House and for nearly an hour discoursed selections which entranced musical experts in the large audience of listeners who were unprepared to hear such combined melody and harmony furnished by the Cream City band. The correct and critical execution was warmly commended by the San Francisco visitors." (March 1, 1901)

The Ferndale Concert band gave a very creditable entertainment at Fortuna last Saturday evening... (March 12, 1901)

East Sunday the Ferndale Concert Band will give a sacred concert at the Occidental Pavilion in Eureka, under the direction of Miss Carrie Clare. (March 19, 1901)

Ferndale Concert Band: Roberts Hall tomorrow (April 12, 1901)

Ferndale Concert Band, on Main Street, in front of the American Hotel, tomorrow evening at 8 o'clock... (May 10, 1901)

The Ferndale Band commenced its series of summer street concerts last Saturday evening in front of the American Hotel. It is understood that this attraction will continue for several months, alternating between different points on Main Street. A large assemblage listened to the music rendered by this popular band that evening, at the close of which an enjoyable dance took place in Roberts Hall, lasting until midnight, the band furnishing music for the occasion. (May 14, 1901)

H.H. Neibur is placing a regulation sidewalk in front of his property on the east side of Church Street. (June 14, 1901)

The Ferndale Concert Band gave its last concert on the street for the season last Friday night, quite a number of our town and valley people listening to the music. A dance in Roberts hall followed the rendition of the program, which was well attended and greatly enjoyed by lovers of the light fantastic. It has been decided by the members of the band to give bi-monthly concerts, followed by a dance in Roberts hall this winter, under the direction of Professor Flowers. Our merchants, as well as many individuals, have expressed their willingness to assist the boys in this move, which will be the means of affording our people a chance to pleasantly pass two evenings a month, at least, during the long winter months. (October 1, 1901)

Professor F.B. Flower and Eugene Matthews returned to Ferndale Sunday evening from Crescent City, where they had been in attendance at the fair at that place. The Humboldt orchestra, of which these gentlemen were members, and which furnished music for Del Norte's exposition, gave excellent satisfaction... (October 8, 1901)

A brass band has been organized in Eureka...the band will be under the supervision of Prof. Frank B. Flowers, who has already established a reputation in this county by his thorough training of the Ferndale band. Mr. Flowers will also continue to instruct the Ferndale band. (October 18, 1901)

Walter Simmons, late of Rohnerville, but now employed in Paine's butcher shop, has joined the Ferndale Concert Band. He plays one of the alto horns. (November 12, 1901)

Tomorrow evening, the 14th and again on Saturday evening, the 28th, the Ferndale Band will give a concert in Roberts hall, followed by the customary social dance...solicits the patronage of the public on these two occasions, particularly, for the organization finds itself at the present time in need of funds to meet expenses. In fact, the band is behind in its financial obligations, and it is essential that a sufficient sum of money should be raised to meet these obligations by the first of the year. The people of this section should take an interest in the band's welfare, and should lend it not only a moral but a financial support as well. It takes money to pay for an instructor, buy new music, etc. and the members of the band, as we all know, reap no financial benefit to speak of for the time and labor they give. Let us then all unite this month in a liberal purchase of band concert tickets, whether we are able to attend the entertainments or not, and thus assist the band boys at a time when they need our help. The Ferndale band is a credit to our little city and locality, and a musical organization of the kind we might say is an essential in our town. We need a band; we have a good one, so why not support it?... (December 13, 1901)

Prof Flowers organized Sunday an auxiliary to the Ferndale Concert Band, made up of several young people, whom the Prof will instruct one evening in a week. (March 11, 1902)

A Ferndale correspondent to the Times says: Master Otto Kausen, the seven-year-old son of E.F. Kausen, of North Ferndale, bids fair to perpetuate the musical reputation of the family. Under the tutelage of his grandfather, young Kausen is rapidly mastering his chosen instrument - the violin. In recognition of his talent in this direction, Master Kausen was recently made the recipient of a handsome and

costly violin, a present from his father. We have no hesitation in predicting a successful career for this young disciple of his worthy grandfather. (March 25, 1902)

The Ferndale band gave its last concert for the season in Roberts Hall last Saturday night, followed by a dance, a large number being present. From now on the band will hold concerts on Main Street every two weeks. (April 22, 1902)

H.C. Blum sold last week for H.H. Neibur the latter's two and three tenths acres of land on the east side of Church Street, on which stands the Band Hall, to Neils P.A. Grundst, of Eureka. Rumor has it that the purchaser is to establish a brewery there, but whether or not there is anything in the report we are unable to ascertain. (May 20, 1902)

N. Grundt, of Eureka, who recently purchased the Niebur property on Church street, Ferndale is soliciting subscriptions throughout the valley to erect a hitching shed on the above named place, and is meeting with much encouragement. We understand that he will charge \$5 a year per individual for the privilege of hitchen horses in the shed, providing he can raise enough money to warrant his venture. (June 10, 1902)

S.A. Ward, business mgr of the Ferndale band... (May 23, 1902)

Prof. Flowers has resigned as director of the Eureka Brass Band and will hereafter devote his whole time to the Ferndale Band. (June 17, 1902)

Manager Ward of the Ferndale Concert Band informs us that during the past thirty-two months \$4,686.15 has been the total gross earnings and subscriptions received by him... (November 18, 1902)

At Friday's night's meeting of the Ferndale Concert Band it was decided to disorganize for the winter. While the merchants and the citizens of this section have contributed very liberally to the support of the band, yet the receipts are wholly inadequate to meet the expenses, hence the boys find that a discontinuance for a time is unavoidable... (November 18, 1902)

A subscription paper was in circulation in Ferndale this week for the purpose of raising funds with which to again secure the services of Prof. Frank Flowers as director of the Ferndale Concert Band. We understand that nearly enough money has been subscribed and that Mr. Flowers, who is at present in Kansas, has been sent for. It looks like we will have street concerts again this summer, as well as social dances in Roberts Hall by the band. (February 27, 1903)

Eugene Matthews will serve for the present as director of the Ferndale Brass Band. (April 3, 1903)

Kausen Orchestra of Ferndale furnished the music...at Rio Dell... (May 19, 1903)

Prof Hendricks, who arrived in the Cream City a couple of weeks ago to take charge of the Ferndale Brass Band, departed on yesterday's steamer en route to his home at Carson City, Nevada... (June 16, 1903)

S.A. Ward, business mgr of the Ferndale Band, received a letter yesterday from Prof F.B. Flowers of Kansas City, in which it is stated that Mr. Flowers has decided not to return to Ferndale, as he had intended... (July 7, 1903)

...Prof Frank Flowers...has finally decided to return to Ferndale... (July 28, 1903)

The Ferndale Brass Band, under the direction of Prof. Flowers, will give street concerts nightly in Ferndale during the fair. Prof Flowers is due to arrive here next Sunday from Kansas City. (August 4, 1903)

Last week Manager Ward received the new uniforms for the members of the Ferndale Band, and the boys will make their first appearance in their new suits at the Ferndale Fair today. The new uniforms are the regulation military band uniform, and are decidedly neat and attractive. (September 6, 1904)

It is probable that the Ferndale Chamber of Commerce will take in hand the management of the Ferndale Concert Band in the near future, or at least this is the move Manager Ward of the latter organization desires. For many months past our band has been having a "hand to mouth" existence, and Mr. Ward feels that if something is not done shortly to place the organization on a firmer financial basis it cannot much longer exist... (June 13, 1905)

...The Ferndale Chamber of Commerce met in special session...to consider the question of raising revenue to meet the expenses of the Ferndale Concert Band. Some little discussion was indulged in regarding the matter, but on one subject there was a unanimity of opinion -- that the band must not be suffered to disorganize on account of lack of funds....a soliciting committee was appointed...to interview the merchants of Ferndale and others who will be asked to do their share toward keeping the Ferndale Band in existence... (June 27, 1905)

Steps are being taken preparatory to reorganizing the Ferndale Band, that the town may not be without music at its coming celebrations. (April 12, 1907)

Last Friday night about a dozen of the young men of the town met at the Band Hall on Church Street to talk over the matter of organizing

an athletic club in this town, with purposes similar to that of the Island Club, now being successfully conducted... (May 14, 1907)

Rev. A.B. Roberts is now actively engaged in organizing a band among the members of the F.M.A.A... (January 5, 1909)

The advertised meeting of the members of Ferndale's old band for Wednesday evening at the band hall on Berding street for the purpose of talking over the matter of reorganizing the band for semi-monthly street concerts the coming spring and summer, was a "fizzle" of the first water, but four of the old band boys putting in an appearance...For years the members devoted ten nights of each month to the band's service, and that too without any personal remuneration...They have nothing but good wishes for the organization of a new band among the younger set and would no doubt help to advance the proposition in a financial way, but to take up their instruments and begin the old grind would require some little deliberation upon their part. (January 8, 1909)

This evening the Ferndale Military and Athletic Association will celebrate its first anniversary at its meeting place, the band hall on Berding Street... (March 9, 1909)

Some fifteen or twenty men and boys met at the old band hall Friday night to inaugurate a gymnasium club in Ferndale. The matter was discussed at some length and another meeting set for next Friday evening, when, if enough members are secured, the club will be formally organized... (September 28, 1909)

Last Saturday evening in Roberts hall a big crowd gathered to listen to the first public indoor concert given by the Cream City Concert Band of this town...director, Prof. Ball...The band was organized about year ago under the direction of L.M. Smith, who gave the boys a good start, so that when Prof. Ball took charge he found them in the right way to learn rapidly, which they have certainly done...A neat sum of money was realized from the concert, which will be devoted to the needs of the band... (November 23, 1909)

Last Tuesday evening a meeting was held at the band hall on Berding Street, at which time a new musical organization was formed to be known as the Ferndale Concert Band. The organization starts off with something over fifteen members... (July 8, 1910)

...the Eureka Herald comments on the brass band situation in Ferndale, and the article, while somewhat overdrawn, as it was no doubt intended to be, is worthy of perusal, especially if you are familiar with the troubles of the Cream City musicians: "The man who wrote "Why Don't The Band Play?" should be in Ferndale these days for two bands are trying to play the same tune with the same instruments and under the same band name. For the last year and half, the Cream City Concert Band has been rending the air of Eel River Valley with sweet tunes and dulcet notes and others things harmonious Professor Ball has been the leader of the band but he left a few weeks ago and Horace Winslow succeeded him as leader. Now appears another band in Ferndale town, under the leadership of Professor Frank Flowers, the well known Eureka band master, and this organization boldly adopts the name of the Cream City Concert Band. The first rehearsal was held Wednesday night with more sweet tunes, dulcet notes, etc. And some of the players in the Cream City Concert Band claim ownership of instruments in the Cream City Concert Band (the other one) and court proceedings are threatened to get hold of the big bass drum and the E flat cornet and some of the other necessities of a first class brass band organization. Lawyers have been interviewed and it is said that there is every likelihood of the matter being taken into the courts for settlement. In the meantime, Ferndale is in for a treat of brass music and the bass drum is doing duty at the old stand without knowing what moment the court may order it to work under a new baton and to be thumped by a new thumper." (July 12, 1910)

T.J. King and Harold Kausen this week finished the work of reshingling the band hall on Berding Street. (July 26, 1912)

substantially built, and rests on a solid concrete foundation. The diagonal boarding between the rustic and the studding will give it great strength, and between the boarding and the rustic are prepared building papers being placed. All the joints are being white leaded, and the carpenters Kirri are doing a first class job in every respect. This new residence will certainly be an ornament to the town. (June 23, 1899)

Mildred Ring, daughter of Dr. H.J. Ring and wife of Ferndale fell from the loft of a barn in which she was playing the other day, injuring her hip quite badly. The little lady walks with the aid of crutches now as a result. (October 27, 1899)

Dr. Ring is putting in new cement sidewalks around his beautiful residence on Church Street. Lee Taubman will also construct the same kind of walks at his pretty home on Rose Avenue. (November 7, 1899)

Dr. Ring is improving his Church street property by the erection of a number of out buildings. The Kirri=s are doing the work. (January 30, 1900)

A fine new fence is being erected around Dr. Ring's new residence, which has just been neatly repainted. (July 31, 1900)

Ronald Ring, the six-year-old son of Dr. and Mrs. H.J. Ring, of Ferndale was run over by an unknown party Friday afternoon and quite badly bruised. He is navigating on crutches these days in consequence. (January 22, 1901)

Last Friday night, Mrs. H.J. Ring, who has been ill for the last six or eight months passed away at her home in Ferndale, the cause of death being cancer... (June 11, 1901)

I have opened dressmaking parlors at Dr. Ring's residence in Ferndale, where I will do all kinds of work in that line. Miss Julia Lowe. (September 10, 1901)

Dr. Ring is having a cement walk laid around the north side of his handsome new residence on Church Street. (January 31, 1902)

One of the most successful socials ever given in Ferndale was held at the pretty home of Dr. Ring Friday night by the Epworth League. The spacious home was filled by young and old. A musical program was rendered which consisted of a piano duet by the Missess Sinclair and Pierce, recitation by Miss Bertha Tyrrell, solo by Miss Berta Loveland, piano solo by Miss Sinclair, solo by Miss Pierce, Piano and violin duet by Dr. Ring and daughter Verna. All of the numbers were heartily encored. Games were then indulged in, after which refreshments in the shape of lemonade and cake and coffee and sandwiches were served. Everybody went away delighted with the evening's entertainment. (July 29, 1902)

A double wedding will take place at the home of Dr. H.J. Ring in Ferndale at 8 o'clock p.m. August 20th, 1902, the contracting parties being Mr. Charles Francis Taubman and Miss Verna Helene Ring, and Mr. Harry Lee Taubman and Miss Helene Helgestad. (August 5, 1902)

The pretty home of Dr. H.J. Ring in Ferndale was brilliantly illuminated last Wednesday evening and was the scene of a happy gathering in the shape of a double wedding. At 8:30 o'clock Rev. W.S. Kelly of the Ferndale ME church united in marriage Harry Lee Taubman and Miss Helen Helgestad, and Charles Francis Taubman and Miss Verna Helen Ring, all popular young people of this town. Both rooms are sons of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Taubman of East Ferndale, one bride is the daughter of Dr. H.J. Ring and the other the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. James Helgestad of this place. The ceremony, which was witnessed by relatives only, was followed by a sumptuous wedding repast, served on the lawn in a lunnular shaped canopy arranged for the occasion. The happy couples, who will make their homes on Rose Avenue, were the recipients of many beautiful and costly wedding gifts. (August 22, 1902)

On Halloween evening at Dr. Ring's spacious home Miss Mildred Ring and Miss Myrtle Donnelly will entertain a number of their young friends with a masquerade and fancy dress. The invitations are very unique, being written in white ink and on bright red spider web paper, and composed in verse. (October 20, 1903)

Carpenter John Kerri has been making improvements to Dr. Ring's residence on Church street the past few days. (June 27, 1905)

A.L. Trousdale yesterday commenced the work of repapering and repainting the interior of Dr. H.J. Ring's fine home on Berding Street. (May 18, 1909)

A holdup attempt was made last Saturday evening to burglarize the home of Dr. H.J. Ring in Ferndale. Shortly after ten o'clock, after the balance of the family had retired for the night, Mrs. Ring, who was resting on a couch down stairs, was aroused by a fearful crash in the pantry as of dishes breaking. Those upstairs also heard the noise and rushed to the scene, when an investigation was made, disclosing the

fact that a shelf filled with chinaware had been knocked down and about ten dollars worth of dishes broken. From indications a burglar had been on the scene. The pantry window had been opened, and an entrance had been gained in that way. Directly beneath the window stood a kitchen table or flour bin, wider at the top than at the bottom. It is presumed that the intruder, after entering through the window, stepped on this table, which was overturned, and in falling caught the shelf to save himself. It giving away caused the noise and broken dishes. Tracks were found in the yard where the burglar had entered, but there is no clew as to his identity. Nothing was missing and the intruder was doubtless glad to get away empty handed after the commotion he had caused. (March 28, 1911)

Dr. Ring's buggy horse indulged in a lively runaway last Saturday afternoon, starting from in front of the doctor's home on Berding Street. No one was in the buggy at the time. The horse turned the corner onto Ocean Avenue and at a lively pace crossed Main Street. Several bystanders attempted to stop the animal and succeeded in turning him into the alley back of the Hotel Ivanhoe, where he finally stopped in the Brick Store sheds. The singletree was broken and other minor damage done to the buggy. The horse was not injured. (July 25, 1911)

A.L. Trousdale, assisted by painters Matthews and Thorndale, last Thursday completed the work of repainting the exterior of the Dr. Ring home in Ferndale. The fine home now presents a most attractive appearance in its new robe of white. (October 7, 1913)

At the invitation of Drs. Bruner and Ring a number of businessmen and citizens of this community met last Tuesday evening at the Ferndale Hospital to listen to plans proposed by the doctors for the establishment of a modern hospital, fully equipped, in this town...(January 23, 1920)

Dr. F.M. Bruner reports that good progress is being made in the sale of stock for the establishment of a modern, up-to-date and fully equipped twenty-bed hospital in Ferndale...To date about \$5000 has been subscribed...The stock is being sold at \$25 a share, none of which is payable until the entire \$15,000 has been subscribed. (February 13, 1920)

Directors of new hospital elected...At a meeting of the stockholders of the new Ferndale General Hospital, held in the town hall last Friday evening, a board of directors was elected, as follows: M.P. Petersen, L.C. Ericcsen, Harry Sweet, William Trigg, Dr. F. Bruner, Dr. H.J. Ring, James Lawson, Antone Enos and Chas. R. Thompson...as previously reported in the Enterprise it is planned to purchase and enlarge the Dr. H.J. Ring home and building operations will begin early in the spring...(April 16, 1920)

A meeting of the directors of the Ferndale General Hospital was held last Thursday evening, at which plans for the remodeling of the Dr. H.J. Ring home for hospital purposes were discussed. Extensive additions and alterations will be made and when completed the hospital will be one of the most modern and convenient to be found anywhere in a town of Ferndale=s size. The work will be in charge of Contractor Frank Slingsby. (June 18, 1920)

Work on the new Ferndale Hospital will be commenced within a few days by Contractor Frank Slingsby and crew. It is expected that the carpenter work will be completed in about six weeks. (August 6, 1920)

Contractor Frank Slingsby and crew commenced work Wednesday remodeling the Dr. H.J. Ring home in Ferndale for the new Ferndale General Hospital. An addition of fifty feet will be built in the rear, and the building converted into an up-to-date hospital building, with all modern conveniences. (August 20, 1920)

Dr. F.M. Bruner, President of the Ferndale General Hospital, Inc., states that it is hoped to have the new hospital building in use by February 15th...(February 4, 1921)

The new Ferndale Hospital will be open for public inspection--next Sunday, March 20th, all day...(March 18, 1921)

Miss Zoe Kelsey, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. S.T. Kelsey of Ferndale has accepted the position of surgical nurse in the new Ferndale Hospital, which will be opened to the public shortly. (March 18, 1921)

New Ferndale Hospital opens to public; is finely equipped...splendidly located on Berding street at the corner of Brown, the spacious building, with modern equipment and planned to obtain the most perfect results for convenience and comfort, stands as a monument to the progressiveness of the people of this valley, who have made its construction possible...a corridor runs the entire length of the building on the lower floor. Entering from the front, on the left comes first the public office, then to the rear an emergency operating room, bath room, three-bed ward, dining room and kitchen. Off the kitchen is the wash room for linen, with stationery bus and sterilizer. The entrance to the basement is from this room, and here is to be found the steam heating plant and stationery vacuum cleaner, with connections to all rooms. To the right of the corridor is a nurse=s reception room, with the superintendent=s room, to the rear. Then three private rooms, the housekeeper=s room and smaller rooms for different purposes. On the second floor a corridor likewise extends through the center the entire depth of the hospital. On the left are a three-bed ward, two private rooms, linen rooms, bath room and the operating and sterilizing rooms. On the right are the maternity ward, nursery, two private rooms, diet kitchen, x-ray room and dark room. Four rooms for nurses are on the third floor, with space for more rooms there if required...(March 25, 1921)

had been brought a short time before her treatment...(April 22, 1921) (first death at hospital?)

At a meeting of the directors of the Ferndale General Hospital last Monday evening Dr. F.M. Bruner resigned as president of the board and Dr. H.J. Ring was elected to the position. (April 15, 1921)

Born, at the Ferndale Hospital on Saturday, August 20th, to Mr. and Mrs. Tracy Elmendorf of Arcata, a son...(August 26, 1921)

Death came to William B. Alford last Tuesday morning at two o'clock at the Ferndale Hospital, where he had been operated on a few days before for a trouble of long standing...born 1851...70 years of age...when he was 21 years of age, in the year 1872, he came to Humboldt County...In 1875 he came to Ferndale, where he entered into partnership with his brother, the late Dr. F.A. Alford, in the pharmacy business...married 1877 in San Jose to Miss Mary Richmond...(October 7, 1921)

Annual meeting of Ferndale Hospital...a board of directors was elected, consisting of Dr. F.M. Bruner, Dr. H.J. Ring, Dr. O. Rockwell, M.P. Petersen, John Lund, A.V. Chapin, Willis Williams, F.A. Slingsby and L.C. Ericcson...Petersen, Williams Chap - 3-year terms; Ring, Bruner and Rockwell, 2-year terms; remainder - short term. (January 12, 1923)

It has been decided to make a drive for the sale of tickets in the Ferndale General Hospital this month in order to sustain the hospital and make it self-supporting...(March 23, 1923)

The Ferndale General Hospital, with building, grounds and equipment, was sold last Tuesday to Dr. O.B. Barron of this town at a commissioner's sale under foreclosure of mortgage for \$2600...the next highest bidder was P. Calanchini, who offered \$2500. Annual meeting of Ferndale Hospital...The retiring directors, M.P. Petersen, A.V. Chapin and John W. Trigg, were re-elected for a term of three years. A financial report for the last year was given by the secretary, John Lund, from which it was learned that the financial affairs of the institution are not in a satisfactory condition. It was the opinion of some of the stockholders that the hospital should be closed before any further indebtedness is incurred, as under present condition there appears to be little chance of putting it on a sound financial basis, particularly as no provision can be made for paying off the bond indebtedness of \$13,400 the bonds falling due in a little over five years...(3/5/26)

Dr. O.B. Barron was engaged this week in moving his office equipment to the Ferndale Hospital building, which he recently purchased and where he and his wife are to also make their home. They expected to be settled in their new home this week. This will make a convenient arrangement for Dr. Barron, enabling him to have his office and home under one roof...(6/8/28)

...Miss Mary Martignoli of Ferndale...daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Jos. Martignoli...for several years past until recently she was connected with the Ferndale General Hospital...(6/11/26)

A rear staircase was built in the Ferndale General Hospital this week by L.C. Ericcson, this addition being necessary to comply with the state regulations. As yet the future of the hospital is undetermined, but it may be rented out and continue in operation. (3/12/26)

An early attempt is to be made to wind up the affairs of the Ferndale Hospital, which closed its doors several months ago. There is a considerable indebtedness against the corporation, roughly estimated at between \$3,000 and \$4,000, besides which the building, equipment and grounds are bonded for about \$12,000. Most of the bills against the hospital have been outlawed by the statute of limitations, but it is the intention of the stockholders to attempt to make settlement by voluntary contributions as far as possible. Many of the stockholders have voluntarily subscribed \$5 per share of stock, which has raised about \$1,200, which amount is now in the bank in readiness for payment of the bills whenever the other stockholders give a like amount per share. In order to wind up the affairs of the corporation and make some disposal of the property, the bondholders have decided to start foreclosure proceedings, which will be commenced in the near future. It is anticipated that the bond owners will face a considerable loss, as the sale value of the building for anything but hospital purposes will undoubtedly be considerably less than the amount of the outstanding bonds. Plans completed for erection of Clubhouse here...the plans for the new building, which will cost approximately \$10,000, were adopted...The contract for the construction work was awarded to Chris Winkler and lumber will be placed on the ground in the near future...The new clubhouse will be built on the triangle of Main and Herbert Streets, which at the request of the club was recently returned to it by the City Council. The tract was some years ago donated by the Village Club to the town as a public park site but was never used for that purpose. This triangle and the lot adjoining it owned by the Village Club will make an ideal site for the new clubhouse...The building of the new clubhouse is a community project, in which the aid of all the community is urged and which has been given in generous measure, state the club members... (9/27/29)

Village Club Plans early construction of new clubhouse...the clubhouse will be built on the corner of Main and Herbert streets, which land has been owned by the club for many years, having been acquired purposely as a site for the clubhouse...(9/20/29)

Anniversary of Village Club celebrated...twenty-second birthday...(11/16/28)

New Clubhouse is Dedicated with Appropriate program...last Tuesday evening...in the presence of a large assemblage of friends from all parts of Humboldt County...the dedication of the beautiful fireplace was conducted by Mrs. L.P. Branstetter. The fireplace is a gift from Mrs. Claire Martyn of England, in honor of her mother, Mrs. Anna Monroe, of this town. It is built from granite mined from a famous old Welch quarry, and was sent to this country by Mrs. Martyn and was chiseled in San Francisco. Mrs. Branstetter in the dedication service told of the old legends connected with fireplaces and the dedication was a pretty one...The clubhouse is of the English colonial type and incorporate the thatch roof in imitation by means of hand-split cedar shakes. The structure is low and rambling and is composed of three wings. Gray stucco walls are relieved by the contrasting red brick porches and stepping stones leading from the south and garden entrances invite one to enter and enjoy the beauty and quiet within. There are hardwood floors used throughout the home, walls are in the softest tones of old ivory plaster and the woodwork of a waxed furniture finish. All interior French doors are covered with silk marquisette and it is used in the French manner. Copies of the antique hand wrought iron hardware at doors and windows lend an air of durability and charm. The rooms are warmed by a central gas furnace with floor registers and adds materially to the comfort of the house. The auditorium which occupies the east wing of the building is adorned by lighting fixtures of great beauty, being of cathedral style. A stage equipped as many modern stages for private theatricals are fitted, is placed in one end of this room. A sun room, committee room and two dressing rooms, comprise the western wing of the structure. Facing the south and west is the sun room with its furniture of stick reed in the natural color. Drapes are of cretonne in shades of dull green with design of scarlet and pulls of cream colored sateen. Two lovely lights suspended from the ceiling echo the same shades of the drapes and are shaped as Japanese lanterns...(5/29/31)

Joseph Steeves and Will Flowers, with their crew, have commenced the work of placing the building of Mrs. C. Kinzel of Ferndale on a new foundation. The recent earthquake threw the structure from its blocks. (May 1, 1906)

C.H. Matthews...assisted by A.L. Trousdale, has been at work of late renovating the interior of Mrs. C. Kinzel's residence on Craig Street. (February 25, 1908)

Mrs. Ina Kinzel has closed her boarding house in Ferndale and will visit for a time with her son, Frank Matthews, in Eureka. Mrs. Kinzel's house in this town will be occupied by Mrs. Twohig and family, late of the Grizzly Bluff section. (November 9, 1909)

...Mr. and Mrs. Bert Rogers of Waddington have purchased the Kinzel house in Ferndale and plan to take up their residence there in the future. We were unable to confirm the report at our press hour yesterday. (November 15, 1912)

About January 1st Mr. and Mrs. Bert Rogers will take up their residence in Ferndale, having purchased the Kinzel residence in this town. (November 19, 1912)

Mrs. Ina Kinzel to Elbert James Rogers, lot 2 in blk 7, Francis Division. (November 29, 1912)

The fire alarm was sounded last Tuesday morning shortly after ten o'clock and investigation showed that a blaze at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bert Rogers in this town had caused the alarm. The firemen quickly responded and soon had the flames subdued. The fire was started in the woodshed connected with the house by children at play, and spread to the roof of the shed, burning a hole through same. The damage was slight. (September 5, 1913)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The house of Mrs. Kinzel was twisted from its foundation and dropped to the ground, a distance of about three feet, and the porch on the front of the residence torn loose from the structure...(April 24, 1906)

Grace Francis et al have deeded to the Town of Ferndale, 50 feet off the west side of Lot 4, Blk 7, Francis Division of Ferndale. (September 21, 1894)

Town Trustees...a petition to retain the lot owned at present by the town for town hall purposes...were read and placed on file... (March 10, 1899)

For sale, the undersigned will receive bids in writing for the town lot, 50x100 feet, fronting on Ocean Avenue, in the town of Ferndale up to 6 p.m., February 20, 1899. J. Kerfoot, Town Clerk. (February 10, 1899)

It is now yet decided where the Ferndale Danish Lutheran Church will be built, but it will either be erected on Shaw Avenue near the Episcopal Chapel, or on the lot owned by the town nearly opposite the ME Church. It is to be a substantial building. (June 27, 1899)

Negotiations are pending for the purchase of the town lot nearly opposite the ME Church, for the site of the proposed new Danish Lutheran Church. (July 7, 1899)

Last Saturday morning between three and four o'clock some one set fire to Ferndale's jail on the lot opposite the ME Church. Mrs. J.L. Sweet, who lives next door, discovered the blaze, an alarm was given, and the fire fighters turned out in force. The south end of the jail was badly charred and the roof burned off, but it might have been a damaging conflagration had it not been checked. The Hunter house and barn, now owned by Mr. Sweet, stands close to the jail, and some difficulty was experienced in getting Mr. Sweet's horses out of the barn, which did not catch, however. Town Marshal Collins, who lives next to Sweet's heard someone ride hurriedly into town and out again just before the fire was announced, and he might have been the chap who applied the match. What prompted the incendiary is hard to conjecture. The damage done amounts to but a few dollars. (March 25, 1902)

Work on Ferndale's new town jail was commenced Wednesday. It will be a two-room building, constructed of 2x6 inch plank, with

concrete floor, and will be an improvement over the old "cooler." It is being erected on the town lot near the cemetery. (May 16, 1902)

Ferndale's new jail--J.T. Robarts architect, Councilmen Putnam and Branstetter and Marshal Barnes superintendents, and carpenters Hawley and Kistner builders -- is completed, and like the Oregonian's wife it is not very pretty but __d for stout. It contains two cells, and the walls, floor and ceiling are of solid 2x6 redwood thoroughly spiked together. The floors are also to have a three-inch-thick cement covering which is intended not only as a "sanitary measure," but as an antidote for "jag fever in the morning" as well. (May 20, 1902)

Ferndale's town trustees were in session last Monday evening but little business was transacted. The report of the jail building committee showed that our new Hotel de Barnes cost about \$95, and the office of City Engineer being declared vacant. Mr. J.A. Shaw was appointed to fill that position at a salary of \$10 per day for time employed. (May 23, 1902)

Town Marshall Barnes and assistants are removing the town's bastille to its new site on the old Giesselman lot on Brown Street, now the property of the town of Ferndale. The lot on which the jail formerly stood has been sold to Miss Edith Sweet. (January 17, 1908)

Charles Calanchini has moved his family to his ranch near Ferndale where they will reside until the residence on the corner of Church and Brown Streets is remodeled. Mrs. Howe and family will occupy the house back of Roberts Hall vacated by them. (February 4, 1896)

The family of Charley Calanchini moved down from the ranch yesterday into their new home, corner of Church and Brown Streets. (February 18, 1896)

A few days ago the little son and daughter of P. Calanchini and wife decided to give the baby of the family a ride. Mrs. Calanchini, lying very ill with pneumonia in an adjoining room, heard the confusion, but was kept in ignorance of the real cause of it, and, in consequence, experienced no excitement, which might have proved fatal to her in her critical condition. (March 18, 1898)

Mrs. Calanchini and little child were sitting in their buggy on the bank of the river when the horse they were driving became frightened by the noise made by the exhaust of a gasoline launch going up the river, and in starting to run cramped the buggy to such an extent that it was overturned, throwing the occupants to the ground with such force as to render Mrs. C. unconscious, although the little one came out of the mix-up unhurt. The lady was conveyed to her Ferndale residence by friends, where Dr. T.D. Ross, who was called to examine the nature of her injuries, discovered, that her jawbone was broken, her nose split, and that she was bruised about the body to a considerable extent. Yesterday Mrs. Calanchini was resting as easy as could be expected, but it will be a number of weeks before she will be fully recovered. (August 23, 1904)

Another fire alarm was turned in about 10:30 o'clock Sunday morning and in a very few minuets our fire fighters were out with their apparatus. It was discovered, however, that the alarm was caused by the burning out of the chimney at the Calanchini residence on Church Street, and that no danger of a conflagration existed... (March 27, 1906)

On the first floor are the parlor, living room, dining room and kitchen, while on the upper floor are four bedrooms. Besides these are numerous closets, pantry, bath rooms, etc., also a sun porch on the lower floor and a sleeping porch above. Everywhere are the most modern conveniences to be found, such as a laundry chute from the upper floor to the basement, ironing board which folds into the kitchen wall, an arrangement over the kitchen range to carry off the steam and odors of cooking, a cold air closet where by an ingenious arrangement a draught of fresh cool air is always circulating, besides laundry closets, drawers and other conveniences too numerous to describe here and which can only be appreciated after a personal inspection. With the exception of the kitchen all the floors of the house are polished, art squares covering them. The ceiling and walls are plastered and tinted and present a pleasing appearance. The interior woodwork is all in natural finish. The electrical fixtures are of brass and are in many unique and handsome designs. Mr. and Mrs. Niels Halkjar have moved from the Francis tenement on upper Berding Street to the residence recently vacated by M. Stafford and family, who have moved to their fine new bungalow on Fifth Street. (November 17, 1914)

During the heavy wind of last Monday night the old residence at the head of Berding Street, opposite the F.J. Rushmore home, was blown off its foundation and settled to the ground about two feet from its old location. The porch remained stationary and was torn loose from the rest of the building. The house, which was unoccupied at the time, is one of the old landmarks of Ferndale and is owned by the Francis Land & Water Company. The foundation had rotted to some extent, which was probably the reason that the wind had sufficient force to move it...(2/13/25)

A.N. Wittman has moved one of Mrs. Francis' buildings across the street next to the house occupied by J.H. Trost... (September 17, 1886)

Mrs. Francis is to have constructed two hundred feet of cement walk and fence in front of her residence in Ferndale. (July 28, 1896)

Work has commenced on the cement fence and sidewalk at Mrs. Grace Francis' residence. (August 14, 1896)

The concrete fence and walk in front of Mrs. Francis' residence will be a handsome piece of work when completed. The fence will be

finished in colors. The main body will be natural cement, the post and base blue, and the panels red. Howard Gay is superintending the job. (September 4, 1896)

T.L. Wilson is repainting the exterior of Mrs. Grace Francis' fine residence in Ferndale and he is doing a fine job. Thomas Levi is a skilled "knight of the brush." (May 18, 1897)

Mrs. Grace Francis is building a large addition to her already commodious and handsome residence in Ferndale. (October 12, 1897)
The Haywood brothers have completed the big rear addition to Mrs. Grace Francis' residence. (October 22, 1897)

While descending the stairs in her residence the other evening, Mrs. Grace Francis slipped and fell and was quite badly bruised. Fortunately she was not seriously injured. (December 6, 1898)

Miss Grace Francis, the eldest daughter of Eugene Francis, accompanied by her grandmother, Mrs. Wilson, reached Ferndale Wednesday from their home in the State of Washington. From Red Bluff they made the trip across the mountains on horseback, and came to visit relatives here. Miss Francis is about 16 years of age, and her father is the oldest son of Mrs. Grace Francis and a brother to Henry, Fred and D.A. Francis. It has been a good many years since Eugene saw Ferndale. (August 4, 1899)

Last Saturday Mrs. Grace Francis served a dinner at her Ferndale home to Mrs. Kitty Prince, her husband, two sons and two daughters, of the Loleta section. Kitty was raised by Mrs. Francis, and for years she served as a domestic in the Francis home, assisting that pioneer lady in her many duties, and Mrs. Francis has not forgotten her. Kitty's four children, though Indians, can all read and write, and the family are quite prosperous. (December 3, 1901)

Old gentleman Perry, who has been employed at the Francis home in Ferndale for a number of years past, is having a fine camp wagon fitted up...purpose to travel for a time... (May 2, 1902)

On Wednesday night of last week, some one entered Mrs. Grace Francis' residence in Ferndale by the way of a back window, but he did not tarry long, owing to the fact that there was a stir upstairs, which probably frightened him away. Nothing was missing and the chap was probably after something good to eat. (February 10, 1903)

Wednesday evening, June 1st, 1904, at 8 o'clock, and in the parlors of the spacious Cream City residence of Mrs. Grace Francis, the grandma of the happy young bride -- and by the way this was the pioneer lady's first grandchild to embark on the matrimonial sea -- Mr. Rollin Stanton Feenaty and Miss Grace Marrienne Robarts, both of Ferndale, took the solemn vows that united them as man and wife. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. Phillip Coombe, of San Francisco, the bride and groom standing under a cluster of beautiful noral wedding bells, and attending them were Miss Blanche Robarts, sister of the bride, and Mr. Wallace Feenaty, the Loleta School teacher, and a brother to the groom. For the happy occasion the interior of the Francis home had been beautifully decorated, and witnessing the impressive service were the many relatives of the contracting parties and just a few intimate friends...The bride was attired in white crepe de chine over white taffeta silk, with a beautiful tulle wedding veil, and in her hand she carried a bouquet of pretty roses and maiden hair ferns. The bridesmaid wore cream silk, trimmed in colonial lace, a cream lace hat with pink roses, and also carried a bouquet of maiden hair ferns and cream roses. Both young ladies presented a charming appearance, in fact it was one of the prettiest home weddings ever solemnized in Ferndale...After June 10th, they will be "at home" in Ferndale, at their Main Street residence, already equipped and furnished by the happy young benedict for the reception of his bride...Mr. Feenaty, whose former home was in Hydesville, and where his mother and family have for long years resided, is bookkeeper for the Russ, Early & Williams Co. of Ferndale, and for some time past has held that responsible position...The lady of his choice is the eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Robarts, of Ferndale, and in this little city she was born and here she grew to womanhood... (June 3, 1904)

Isaac Davis commenced work Wednesday reshingling the residence of Mrs. Grace Francis in this town. The whole structure will be given a new roof. (October 18, 1907)

Carpenter T.J. King yesterday completed the work of reshingling the Francis residence on Francis street. (April 7, 1908)

Last evening at the home of his mother, Mrs. Grace Francis, on Francis Street, Richard Henry Francis, one of the best known residents of Ferndale, passed away after an illness of short duration...born 1863 in Ferndale...on his return to Ferndale some twelve or fifteen years ago he was associated with his brother, D.A. Francis, for a number of years in conducting the Francis Bros. hardware and plumbing establishment in this place... (March 28, 1911)

Yesterday at high noon in the parlors of the Ferndale Methodist church, Rev. Fred Sheldon officiated at the ceremony which united in marriage Mr. Oren Williams, and Miss Elizabeth M. Duckworth, north of this town...the bride is a native of Blackburn, England, but has lived in this country about six years. Three years ago she came to Ferndale, and most of the time since her arrival here has been spent at the home of Mrs. Grace Francis... (May 14, 1915)

Mrs. Grace Francis, 88 years of age, left Ferndale Wednesday morning for a visit to relatives in San Francisco and Oakland and to see the exposition. She was accompanied on the trip by her granddaughter, Mrs. John Shaw, and by Mrs. Oren Williams. Mrs. G.M. Brice and R.W. Robarts, daughters of Mrs. Francis as well as other Ferndale relatives. (August 13, 1915)

Grandma Grace Francis has been quite ill the past week at her home in Ferndale. For a time, owing to her advanced age of 96 years, her

condition was considered serious, but she has rallied nicely, her many friends will be glad to learn. (March 3, 1922)

Mrs. Grace Francis, the oldest pioneer woman of Ferndale, passed to her final reward last Wednesday afternoon, death coming at 2:30 o'clock at her home here after an illness of about four weeks, her death being due to the infirmities of old age...(March 17, 1922)

...George Mount Brice and Clara Francis were married on June 18, 1876, in the old Francis home in Ferndale...four people who were present at the wedding on June 18, 1876, these being Mrs. J.W. Kemp, W.T. Smith, Mrs. Amelia Robarts and D.A. Francis...(6/25/26)

PARK

At the meeting of the Ferndale Chamber of Commerce last Monday evening a movement was started to acquire a picnic ground and dance pavilion in Ferndale. The need for these has long been felt here, as there is no place in the town where a large picnic can be held...the need for an athletic ground was also voiced, and it was brought out that the new high school athletic grounds may be available for a town baseball team, football and other sports...(January 13, 1922)

A goodly number of interested citizens last Sunday morning paid a visit to the Francis ranch in the upper part of town, the site of the proposed fair grounds, picnic grounds and athletic field, which it is desired to acquire for public use...(March 3, 1922)

Amusement grounds without racetrack Chamber's decision...meeting of the Ferndale Chamber of Commerce...public sentiment seemed to be practically unanimous that the Francis tract was the logical place for the amusement ground, and that it would be advisable to locate it there even if it were not possible to lay out a racetrack as had been originally planned. It was brought out that the purchase of ten or eleven acres would be all that would be necessary, and that the cost would be somewhere around \$10,000...(May 5, 1922)

An adjourned meeting of the Ferndale town trustees was held last Monday evening for the purpose of considering matters in connection with the proposed new public park and playgrounds and the proposed new sewer system in the northwesterly part of town...For the park the amount necessary has been set at \$20,000, which will go for the purchase of the land and necessary improvements...(May 12, 1922)

The acquisition of a baseball ground and mammoth dance pavilion for Ferndale is assured. The project will be handled by the Ferndale Fire Department and already more than \$11,000.00 has been guaranteed by the people of the town to finance the proposition, the success of which is now a certainty...The Francis tract, from which the five acres will be purchased by the Firemen, is ideally located for the purpose to which it will be put. It is within a few steps from the center of town, has fine drainage, and is smooth and level. It will require but little work to make it into the best baseball field in the county...(August 11, 1922)

It is now practically a certainty that the Ferndale Firemen will have their mammoth dance pavilion in readiness for use during fair week. The cement blocks for the foundation were placed in position the first of the week, lumber is being placed on the ground daily, and Contractor William Flowers with a large crew of workmen will commence actual construction work today. The pavilion will be 80x174 feet in size, with a kitchen in the rear 16x40. It will be of substantial construction, with shingled roof, and a first-class pine floor will be laid...The new bridge at the head of Berding Street to connect with the grounds is being built this week by D.A. Branstetter and W.O. Davis. A substantial structure is being constructed, with cement abutments, and it will be amply wide to handle large crowds. The grounds were surveyed this week...and prove to be ideally located for a full size baseball field, with ample parking space...(August 11, 1922)

The Firemen's big dance pavilion in Ferndale is nearing completion. The floor is all laid, and is being put in condition for dancing by a large sanding machine, brought from San Francisco by the Cream City Mechanical Co. Especially for the purpose. The dance floor will be 60x140 feet in size, giving 8400 feet of clear dancing space, railed off. Around this will be room for all the spectators and seats for the dancers, ten feet on each side of the floor and twenty feet in the front giving room for many hundreds of people. There will be two rows of seats on each side, thus assuring ample seating accommodation...(September 8, 1922)

The grand ball given by the Ferndale Firemen last Saturday evening in their new pavilion was a great success in every way. An immense crowd was in attendance and all enjoyed the evening thoroughly...(October 27, 1922)

The Ferndale Firemen are making good on their dance pavilion in Ferndale. It will be remembered that something over \$12,000 was raised by private subscriptions for the purchase of five acres of land and the building of the big pavilion. The first dances were given during fair week, and already a neat surplus has accumulated. Those who subscribed money are to be paid off as soon as funds are on hand, and last Thursday evening \$1500 was returned to subscribers, leaving a surplus of about \$1000 on hand for an emergency fund. Each subscriber has been given a number and these numbers have been placed in a box, to be drawn out as rapidly as funds are on hand to

make payments...(November 17, 1922)

A large number of young cypress trees are to be planted along the south line of the Firemen=s new park in Ferndale. When grown these trees will make a splendid hedge and do much to beautify the park and cut off an unsightly view. The trees were donated to the Firemen by Chris Rasmussen of Port Kenyon, whose kindness is appreciated. (March 2, 1923)

At a special meeting of the Ferndale Fire Department held last Friday evening another payment, amounting to \$950, was made toward wiping out the indebtedness on the park and pavilion in this town...with this payment a total of \$3500 has been paid off by the Firemen since their pavilion was opened last September...(May 18, 1923)

George Heney of Ferndale went to San Francisco this week to purchase new equipment for his cleaning works to replace that which was destroyed by fire recently. A new building to house the cleaning works is to be erected on the property of the Firemen=s Park Association in this town and Mr. Heney=s office will be in the Brown building on Main Street, recently vacate by Architect W.M. Klepper. (9/5/24)

Unknown parties have called upon themselves the denunciation of the Ferndale firemen and the people of the town by wanton damage which they have done at the Firemen=s Park. A fine brick oven which had been built for the use of campers has been destroyed, articles stolen and other acts of destructiveness committed...(1/25/24)

Town Clerk Sophus Christensen, as a representative of the Ferndale Fire Department, spoke to the board regarding the taking over by the town of the Firemen=s Park property of approximately five acres. It was the offer of the Firemen to give the town a deed for same and in return to take a long lease on the property at a nominal rental, probably \$1 a year. This proposition was agreeable to the town board and was to be taken up by the Firemen at their monthly meeting last evening...(3/6/25)

At a meeting of the Ferndale Fire Department last Thursday evening another payment amounting to \$1100 was made toward reducing the indebtedness incurred in the purchase of the Firemen=s Park of five acres and the erection of the big dancing pavilion. The indebtedness is now reduced to \$900 and will doubtless be completely wiped out with the next few months...the original indebtedness was around \$12,000...(1/16/25)

BLACKSMITH SHOP BUILDING (East one-half)

Mark Bugbee's blacksmith shop is being resingled. (October 6, 1893)

Saturday evening last was probably one of the most exciting nights the town of Ferndale ever experienced, and from all indications our people had every reason to be in a decidedly excited frame of mind. About 8:30 o'clock our fire alarm made known the fact of the existence of a blaze in our midst...in the building adjoining the M. Bugbee blacksmith shop at the corner of Ocean avenue and church Street. The fire was first discovered by George Smith, as he was returning to his home in that vicinity, who gave the alarm...The origin of the blaze is now known beyond the shadow of a doubt to have been incendiary, and was but the beginning of a well planned scheme to lay our little city in ashes. When first discovered the flames were found to be in the rear of the building mentioned above, and had made such headway before the fire department succeeded in getting to work that the saving of the buildings or the prevention of the spread of the flames to the adjoining structures seemed almost an impossible task. After our firemen got down to business and after all the available water had begun playing on the flames it was soon evident that the conflagration was being checked and the danger of the spread of the fire need not be apprehended. During the time the firemen were at work, however, the roofs of the nearby buildings were on fire several times, but through the prompt and efficient work of our fire laddies the flames were quickly extinguished. Sparks from the blazing buildings were constantly alighting on the roofs of the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co's warehouse, the old Dunn blacksmith shop, the Russ building and Brice's stables, and it is indeed lucky that one or more of these buildings did not become ignited. The structure in which the flames originated was completely ruined, while one side of the roof of Mr. Bugbee's blacksmith shop and the west end of the barn were quite badly burned. The gentleman's residence at the rear of the burning buildings, was also damaged to some extent. After the conflagration had been placed under control and while D. McGregor was returning to his home he found it necessary to enter his barn on account of the uneasy movements of his horse which in some way had made his escape from the large box stall in which he is kept. Mr. McGregor found the stall door closed but no sooner had he opened it than he learned that an attempt had been made to burn him out. The stall was full of smoke and as soon as the draft was allowed to enter the room a good sized blaze sprung up which kept the gentleman decidedly busy for some little time before he was able to get the better of it. The fire had been set in the bedding of the stall, a newspaper having been used to increase the blaze. Had not the animal's movements been heard by the gentleman the result striven for would have been accomplished. The news of this second attempt to burn our town, as may be imagined, did not help to allay the excitement of our people, but when about eleven o'clock our fire bell again rang the excitement had reached fever heat. This last blaze was discovered by Druggist J.H. Ring upon stepping onto the back porch of his place of business to take a survey of the surroundings as is his usual custom before retiring. A glimmer through one of the windows of the large barn in the rear of the Patrick butcher shop held his attention, for the reason that Mr. Ring discovered sparks dropping from the second story to the ground floor of the building. As soon as he had assured himself that his eyes had not deceived him he aroused our people. For the second time in less than three hours the fire department was again called out. Investigation soon proved, however, that this blaze had not gotten under headway when so opportunely discovered by Mr. Ring. A few buckets of water were sufficient to check the flames and dispel the fear of another and more serious disaster. Chaff and straw had been packed against the north side of the building on the upper floor and the match touched several hours before in all probability. Two good sized holes had been burned through the flooring while the joists and studding had also been eaten into by the blaze... (May 9, 1905)

...Mr. Mark Bugbee is to have a new blacksmith shop to take the place of the old one which was so badly damaged by fire last Saturday night. When it became known that the fire which worked the damage to Mr. Bugbee was set for the sole purpose of burning the town of Ferndale, our business men and others concluded at once and rightly that the loss should not be taken as a personal one but rather as a community loss, for there was left no room in doubt that the Bugbee property was fired imply as a means to an end. Consequently and immediately a subscription paper was set in circulation...every property owner approached gladly... (May 9, 1905)

Carpenter James Scott commenced the work this week of building M. Bugbee's new shop on Ocean Avenue to take the place of the one recently destroyed by fire. It is expected to have the building in readiness for Mr. Bugbee's occupancy in a couple of weeks. The gentleman will have a roomy and convenient place of business. (May 19, 1905)

Carpenter L.J. Stone of Waddington has been assisting the past few days in the erection of M. Bugbee's new blacksmith shop at the corner of Ocean Avenue and Church Street. The building will probably be ready for occupancy within the next few weeks. (May 23, 1905)

M. Bugbee desires to inform the public that his new shop on Ocean Avenue is now completed and that he will be ready for business on Monday, June 5th. (June 2, 1905)

Blacksmith M. Bugbee is now settled in his fine new shop at the corner of Church Street and Ocean Avenue, and is ready to do all work... (June 13, 1905)

...a shop next door to the blacksmith shop of M. Bugbee & Son. (May 11, 1915)

G.G. Burgess of Eureka has rented the blacksmith shop of M. Bugbee & Son in this town, which he will conduct in future. The gentleman will be joined by his family at the end of the school term, and they will make their home here. (October 14, 1921)

Guy Bugbee, who has been engaged in ranching on the Bugbee place at Grizzly Bluff the past few years, is to return to Ferndale to make his home and will again conduct his blacksmith shop at the corner of Ocean Avenue and Berding St. J.E. Godfrey, who has been conducting the Bugbee shop, will move to his former location opposite Roberts Hall. The change will be made January 1st. (12/19/24)

George C. Burgess has closed up his blacksmith shop in Ferndale and has accepted a position with Burgess and Burgess, in their general merchandise store at Rio Dell...(3/28/24)

Margaret Bugbee to Robert Allison Bugbee...Lot 1 & N1/2 of Lots 9 and 10, block 9, Francis Div, Ferndale, Gift. Margaret Bugbee to Robert Allison Bugbee and Guy Andrew Bugbee...SE cor. Eugene and Church Streets, Ferndale, gift. (7/24/25)

R.L. Cathey, a well known former Ferndaler, has accepted a position in Guy Bugbee=s blacksmith shop. The late Mr. Cathey has been conducting a shop at Englewood. (5/6/26)

Guy Bugbee and family of this town are to make their future home in Santa Rosa...Lee Cathey has rented Mr. Bugbee=s blacksmith shop and will conduct the business in future. (11/1/29)

CARPENTER SHOP BUILDING (west one-half)

Eastman and Branstetter Bros. the popular Carpenter Shop firm intend building an addition to their shop on Ocean Avenue. Increase in business demands larger quarters. (October 13, 1893)

Eastman and Branstetter Bros, the enterprising proprietors of the Ocean Avenue Wagon and Carpenter Shop have been making a fine improvement about their place of business during the past month... (February 9, 1894)

Notice is hereby given that we, E.G. Eastman and R.F. Elkins, both residents of the Town of Ferndale, have this day entered into and formed a partnership for the purpose of carrying on a wagonmaking and general carpenter business in the said town of Ferndale. 6/25/94. (June 29, 1894)

Walter and George Branstetter on Tuesday last sold their interest in the carpenter and wagon making business of Eastman & Branstetter Bros to R.F. Elkins, and the firm name is now Eastman and Elkins. (June 29, 1894)

Dissolution of partnership...Notice is here by given that the partnership heretofore existing between E.G. Eastman and R.F. Elkins under the firm name of Eastman and Elkins has this day be dissolved by mutual consent. E.G. Eastman retiring...dated May 16, 1895 (May 17, 1895)

Frank Elkins cut one of his hands quite badly at his shop on Ocean Avenue Friday. He allowed it to come in contact with a band saw. (November 24, 1896)

Messrs. C. Kinzel and C. Hansen, both of North Ferndale, have purchased the Frank Elkins Mechanical Shop on Ocean Avenue, and will take possession of the same next Monday, May 1st. They will carry also a full line of moldings, sashes, doors, etc. Mr. Elkins, we understand, is to go ranching. (April 28, 1899)

Messrs. Kinzel and Hansen took charge of the Elkins's mechanical shop on ocean Avenue, May 1st. (May 5, 1899)

Messrs. Kinzel and Hansen, who have leased the Elkins Mechanical shop on Ocean Avenue, Ferndale, make their bow to the Enterprise readers in this issue...turn out all kinds of wood work, such as house furnishings, turning, band sawing, cabinet work, butter boxes, churns, water troughs, tanks, pulleys, all kinds of wagon work, etc. (May 9, 1899)

Chris Hansen, of Kinzel and Hansen Mechanical shop was struck in the eye yesterday morning by a knot which flew from a board he was cutting on a circular saw. He received quite a bruise... (May 26, 1899)

James Watson, a carpenter and cabinet maker from Santa Rosa, is now employed at Kinzel and Hansen's shop on Ocean Avenue. (October 31, 1899)

Chris Hansen, of the firm of Kinzel and Hansen, returned Sunday from San Francisco, where he selected new machinery for their woodworking shop on Ocean Avenue. They have found the building occupied by them too small and will soon move into new quarters to be constructed for them by C.T. Schreiner on the site where Charley's shop now stands. (October 23, 1900)

Kinzel & Hansen are now located in their new shop on Ocean Avenue, next door to the Schreiner-Fennessey blacksmith shop. (March 26, 1901)

J.N. Jensen has resigned his position at G.M. Brice's livery stable and is again engaged in the painting business, with a shop next door to the blacksmith shop of M. Bugbee & son. (May 11, 1915)

E.H. Finney, late of Santa Rosa, with his family has located in Ferndale. Mr. Finney is an artificial stone mason, contractor and builder, and has opened up a shop next to Eastman & Elkins. We trust his venture will prove a success. (July 13, 1894)

An alarm of fire was sounded in Ferndale at 8:30 o'clock Friday evening, and the blaze was discovered to be in the rear of P. Calanchini's small one story building, next to R.D. Dunn's blacksmith shop on Ocean avenue, occupied as a dwelling place by Joel Briggs and Jno Sanders. The hose was quickly run out and attached to the hydrant at the Pearsall's corner, and in a few minute water was pouring onto the flames and the fire was soon extinguished. Mr. Dunn had a number of farming implements and quite a quantity of iron stored in the front room of the building, all of which was removed without damage. and in another part of the house were a number of butter boxes and considerable lumber, belonging to Frank Elkins, but this the fire fortunately did not reach. Messrs. Sanders and Briggs lost their bedding and a few other traps, but the entire damage amounts to but little. The building itself was of small value before the fire, and now it is worth less. It will hardly pay to repair it. (March 17, 1896)

H. Hope and W.E. Matthews have formed a co-partnership in the painting business. they will conduct two shops, one in the Brelle Building on lower Main Street and the other in the building next to Kinzel and Hansen's shop on Ocean Avenue. The gentlemen are prepared to do all kinds of house, sign and carriage painting at satisfactory prices. (January 23, 1900)

Herbert Briggs, who has been connected with the Ferndale Exchange for a number of months past has resigned his position in that office and has accepted employment with Hope & Matthews, the painters. (February 2, 1900)

Hope and Matthews, the painters, have dissolved partnership. (March 23, 1900)

Messrs. Huestis & Gracey, who recently formed a co-partnership, are now prepared to do all work in the line of painting, decorating, etc., and their business announcement appears on page one of this issue. You can find them at their shop on Ocean Avenue, opposite A. Berding's residence. (June 2, 1902)

Painters Huestis and Gracey are at work repainting and repapering the interior of the Giacomini residence on Ocean Avenue. (February 13, 1903)

The advertisement of Mowery & Francis, general contractors, appears in today's issue, and they announce that at their Ferndale warehouse on Ocean Avenue they will hereafter carry a full stock of cement, lime and all plastering materials. The firm of Lewis & Bennett are to install at their furniture and wire mattress factory in Ferndale, a planer and band saw, which will be run by a gasoline engine. (January 7, 1902)

(December 14, 1894)

Hyman and Weil are the successors to J. Loewenthal. The genial Lee Taubman is still manager of the Ferndale Cash Store. See big ad on page one. (December 21, 1894)

Last Monday the new uniforms for the Ferndale Band were received by Mr. Lee Taubman with whom the order was placed a few weeks ago. The suits were made in the east and are exceedingly handsome they are blue in color with red and gold trimmings and the caps are very neat and showy with red plumes. Every suit fitted perfectly... BUILDING NOTES

Eugene Haywood is assisting T.L. Wilson in his work of painting the front of the lower story of the Russ Building. (August 10, 1894)

Carpenter James Davis and son Isaac were engaged this week erecting a wood shed in the rear of the Russ Building, for the accommodation of Loewenthal's cash store. (August 10, 1894)

George Fry and assistant started work yesterday morning in repainting Ira A. Russ' big building in Ferndale. (April 11, 1899)

The Russ Building in Ferndale looks like a new building since it was painted. (May 5, 1899)

Contractor D.P. Simpson of Eureka came out to Ferndale Friday last to inspect the foundation of Ira A. Russ' big two story building. He found the structure badly settled, and the foundation, even the floor joists, badly rotted. The building will have to be supplied with an entirely new foundation and this will involve a cost of all of \$1,000. (July 26, 1904)

Ex-supervisor Mercer of Eureka, who has a crew of five workmen now engaged in repairing Ira A. Russ' big building in Ferndale, was here again Friday evening, and he realizes that he has a big job on his hands. The foundation of the building is badly rotted as are also the solid side walls up to a height of about four feet, and the floor joist as well. The structure has settled all out of shape, and will have to be leveled up, and this will necessitate the removal of all the plate glass in front. Much of the concrete sidewalk will also have to be torn out. (August 9, 1904)

The improvements to the Russ building in Ferndale have been completed, and that structure now rests upon a solid and firm foundation. (September 27, 1904)

Repairs to the damaged rooms in the Russ building, occupied by the Ferndale Bank, and resulting from the big earthquake, are being made. Plasterers from Eureka arrived in Ferndale yesterday and will soon have the rooms in as good condition as before the quake. A director's room is also being added, and will be secured from the large room now occupied by W.H. Roberts. (May 11, 1906)

E.G. Pluke, the Eureka painter, has commenced the work of repainting the Russ building. The interior of the upper story of the building will also be thoroughly renovated. (September 27, 1907)

T.H. Faulkner has purchased the Russ building, together with the vacant lot and the land upon which the old fire house stands, adjoining his home and blacksmith shop. Later Mr. Faulkner plans to have the building remodeled to some extent and will probably have

salesrooms and workshop on the ground floor, with apartments upstairs. The Russ Building is a splendid piece of property and Mr. Faulkner is to be congratulated upon having acquired it. (April 22, 1921)

T.H. Faulkner is having extensive improvements made to his property on Francis Street. The building on the Russ property, which he recently purchased, is being remodeled for garage purposes and connected with his blacksmith shop and storage room, new foundations put in and other work done. When completed he will have a commodious garage and storage room for cars. D.A. Branstetter is doing the carpenter work. (June 24, 1921)

Do you remember: When Tom Jarrett ran the hotel where the Russ building now stands? (July 21, 1922)

The exterior of the Russ building in this town is being repainted and will present a very attractive appearance. (9/12/24)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The Russ building, in which is the Ferndale Bank, suffered to the extent of having the large plate glass windows broken and the plaster shaken off. The front was also broken...(April 24, 1906)

T.H. Faulkner has been engaged of late in making extensive improvements to one of his store rooms in the Russ building. The ceiling and walls are being boarded with matched lumber to replace the old plastering, new doors cut and other alterations made...It is understood the building may be occupied by an automobile agency. (5/29/25)

ENGINE HOUSE

June 1900-August 1915: Ferndale Fire Department,

Chas Bartlett took up a subscription in Ferndale yesterday for the purpose of erecting a building in which to store the fire engine, hook and ladder, truck and hose cart No. 1. Ira Russ has donated the lot next to Bank block, upon which to build, and the structure will also contain a large meeting room. The hauling of the lumber has been donated and enough money has already been subscribed to guarantee the construction of the building. Work will commence soon. (December 23, 1898)

Work on Ferndale's new engine house, next to the Russ building, is progressing nicely. (May 29, 1900)

Ferndale's gasoline fire engine is now occupying quarters at the hose company building on Francis Street, having been moved from its old quarters in the Hall building on Main Street a few days ago. (June 9, 1908)

No longer will the members of the Ferndale Fire Department maintain their organization on the same lines as in the past. They ask for an expense allowance from the town, and unless their request is granted the Department will disband. From the time of its organization the Fire Department has depended on its own resources. The Chief has been paid a salary, also the secretary, and the money for this and other purposes has been obtained at the annual celebration on May day, when an admission fee was charged to different amusement features. The firemen have received help from many public spirited citizens and property owners of the town, who have bought tickets, which assistance has been appreciated by the Firemen. The Firemen feel that conditions have now reached a stage when a change is necessary. The support they are receiving is not what they have a right to expect. They feel that if everybody owning property in Ferndale do not feel sufficiently interested to contribute for its protection they should not be expected to donate their services, beg and scheme to keep their organization intact. They cite instances of men owning thousands of dollars worth of property here who refuse to buy a ticket, costing one dollar, to their annual dance. This lack of interest has become contagious, and the Firemen say "If the people don't want a Fire Department we'll disband.".. (May 2, 1911)

That the Ferndale Fire Department will receive support from the town is assured. This was learned Tuesday evening, when a committee of Firemen appeared before the Town Trustees and presented their request for financial aid, also notifying the Board of the action taken in voting to disorganize unless their expenses were paid out of the town funds... (May 5, 1911)

Trustees...The Ferndale Fire Department was granted an allowance of \$200 per year for maintenance of the apparatus and running expenses. This was promised at the meeting a month ago and means that the Ferndale Fire Department is now placed on a business basis instead of being forced to beg for its existence... (June 9, 1911)

The Ferndale Fire department's equipment was moved Saturday afternoon from the different buildings where it had been located to its quarters in the new town building, which is now practically completed. (August 3, 1915)

S.H. Paine has purchased the interest of A.J. Bulmer in their meat market in Ferndale...Mr. Paine desires all those indebted to him to settle by 5/1. (April 12, 1895)

Kausen and Friend's butcher shop closed this week. S.H. Paine has purchased the business and consolidated with his upper Main Street shop. He has also rented the Kausen and Friend slaughter house and will hereafter run two slaughter wagons, one on this side and one on the other side of the river. (June 7, 1895)

William Daugherty has accepted a position with S.H. Paine in the latter's meat market. (July 5, 1895)

Butcher's Paine of Ferndale and Beck of Arlynda have consolidated. The shop at Arlynda is to be closed. (January 3, 1896)

Ernest Van Sickle, who worked for butcher Payne... (February 4, 1896)

Peter Bennett of Paine and Beck's butcher shop... (August 28, 1896)

Paine and Beck have moved their butcher shop into the Lund Building on Main Street, nearly opposite the Post Office and have now a neat handy and commodious place of business arranged strictly according to their wants to carpenters Lem Miner and Oscar Lindley. (December 1, 1896)

Bulmer and French are soon to open a butcher shop in Ferndale next to the Masonic Hall. They have secured land for a slaughter house up Williams gulch, from C.M. Petersen's. (February 9, 1897)

The slaughter house which C.M. Petersen is erecting for A.J. Bulmer and Ed French, up the Williams Gulch... (February 19, 1897)

Instead of opening a third shop in Ferndale as they had intended doing, A.J. Bulmer and Ed French have purchased a two-thirds interest in the Ferndale Meat Market formerly conducted by Z.B. Patrick... (March 19, 1897)

T.J. Faulkner, the Ocean Avenue Blacksmith, has purchased the A.J. Bulmer butcher shop property on Main Street, opposite G.M. Brice's stables. The building at present on the premises will be moved to the west line of the lot and converted into a dwelling for the occupancy of Mr. Faulkner and family and a new building will also be erected for a blacksmith shop for Mr. Faulkner, who's trade is rapidly growing. (August 29, 1899)

John Morris and sons moved this week, the butcher shop building opposite Brice's stables, over to the west line of the lot on which it stands and Mr. T.H. Faulkner who recently purchased this property from A.J. Bulmer will convert it into a dwelling house immediately and will also build him a new blacksmith shop adjoining. (September 1, 1899)

Carpenters are at work on Blacksmith Faulkner's recently purchased property opposite George M. Brice's stables. A comfortable dwelling house and blacksmith shop will be the result of the labors. (September 8, 1899)

Blacksmith Faulkner has decided to build his new blacksmith shop opposite the Brice Stables two stories high. Mr. Mansfield will occupy the upper story for a paint shop. (September 15, 1899)

Blacksmith T.H. Faulkner will move next Monday from his former place of business on Ocean Avenue to his commodious new shop opposite the Brice stables. (September 29, 1899)

An agreement between A.J. Bulmer and Thomas H. Faulkner, by which the former agrees to sell the north 2 of lot 6, in block 9, Francis Division of Ferndale for \$1,000. (December 8, 1899)

Blacksmith G.W. Dewey will hereafter be found at Faulkner's shop opposite Brice's stables. (July 6, 1900)

Blacksmith G.W. Dewey will hereafter be found at Faulkner's shop opposite Brice's stables. (July 10, 1900)

Blacksmith Dewey...located at his new stand opposite Brice's stables. (July 13, 1900)

An addition is being attached to the rear of the Faulkner Blacksmith shop on Francis Street. (December 4, 1900)

A neat sign now adorns the carriage painting shop of B. Rasmussen at the Faulkner shop on Francis Street. (April 18, 1905)

Lee Cathey, who has conducted a horseshoing establishment on lower Main Street for years past, has sold his stock of material to T.H. Faulkner. Yesterday the latter gentleman moved his purchase to his shop, opposite Brice's stables. Mr. Cathey will be employed by Mr. Faulkner, who has decided to conduct a horseshoing business in connection with his other blacksmithing work. (June 2, 1905)

AD: B. Rasmussen, Carriage Painter (successor to P.N. Lund) Shop located above T.H. Faulkner's blacksmith shop. (June 20, 1905)

R.L. Cathey, the Ferndale horseshoer, who has been located at the T.H. Faulkner shop on Francis Street, wishes to inform his patrons and the public in general that on or about the 15th of December he will change his location to the Kemp shop, opposite the K of P building on Main Street. (December 5, 1905)

Rasmussen & Hudlevad, the Ferndale painters and decorators, have moved their shop from Blacksmith Faulkner's place of business on Francis Street to the Brien building on Ocean Avenue, opposite the Ferndale Hotel. (February 6, 1906)

Carpenter Peter Petersen has completed the work of reshingling the T.H. Faulkner residence on Francis Street. (September 25, 1906)

Carpenter Peter Petersen has been at work the last day or two making repairs to the Faulkner blacksmith building on Francis Street. (January 8, 1907)

Ben Rasmussen, who will be remembered as having been engaged in the painting business in the Cream City some two years ago, arrived here recently and will again locate in Ferndale. Since leaving Humboldt Mr. Rasmussen has been in San Francisco, San Mateo and other places, and reports business below rather quiet at present. He has opened a shop over the Faulkner blacksmith shop and is prepared to do carriage and sign painting, as well as all kinds of house decorating. (August 6, 1909)

Ben Rasmussen, who has been conducting a carriage painting shop in Ferndale the past few months, has discontinued same and departs today for a brief trip to the metropolis. On his return Mr. Rasmussen will be employed by P.N. Lund. (December 17, 1909)

The second story has been torn off one of the buildings, the remodeled building to be of one story height. It will be 48 by 120 feet in size conveniently arranged, and will be occupied by Alan D. Peers, who has had his garage business in one of the buildings in the past. (7/16/26)

A deal was concluded this week whereby Alan D. Peers purchased from George E. Reinhart the Elite Garage business in this town, of which he will take charge on September 1st. Mr. Peers has been located in the Faulkner building, which has been recently remodeled and enlarged and which will now be used as a storage garage. Mr. Reinhart has operated the Elite Garage for a number of years past and has not as yet announced his plans for the future. Mr. Peers is well known and an experienced garage man and will doubtless do well in his new location. (8/27/26)

The Ferndale Commercial school opened its doors yesterday in the town hall...Professor J.W. Snowden of San Francisco is in charge. The gentleman comes to us with the best in recommendations... (August 23, 1898)

James Bartlett, son of C. Bartlett, has won the distinction of being the first graduate of the Ferndale Commercial School. Prof. Snowden tells us that the young man completed the business course in its entirety. Jim who is in the employ of the Aggeler Bros...(5/23/99)

The Union High School proposition was badly defeated in this valley at Saturday's election. A light vote was polled, but the result shows that taxpayers are opposed to any increase in taxation at this time. They evidently feel that they have all that they can stand in these hard times. (August 25, 1896)

No High School for Ferndale...the election called by County Superintendent Brown, upon a petition from the heads of families residing in Centerville, Coffee Creek, Ferndale, Grant, Grizzly Bluff, Island, Pleasant Point, Port Kenyon, Salt River and Williams districts to have these districts unite in establishing and maintaining a Union High School in Ferndale, took place Friday...for 187, against 248... (July 18, 1899)

The Union High School was defeated, but it is quite likely that Ferndale is to have a high school, or its equivalent, notwithstanding, to be supported by private patronage. A move is on foot to secure a high school teacher for this place, and if 25 scholars at a tuition of \$5 per month for ten months in the year can be obtained the proposed school will be established at once... (August 4, 1899)

Prof. Snowden reopened the Commercial School Tuesday. He has 19 pupils... (January 6, 1899)

Town Hall...polls will be open in the town hall on Eugene Street... (March 18, 1898)

Trustees meeting...Ordinance #65 entitled time and place of Board elections was adopted...provides that in the future the Board will hold its sessions in the rear room, on the 2nd floor, of the Hart building...the Town Marshall was instructed to move furniture to the new quarters and to have same ready for next meeting... (May 18, 1900)

G.M. Brice has purchased from Ira Russ the lower story of the Masonic Hall. (September 14, 1900)

Professor Johnston, who taught the Ferndale High School, has departed for other parts of the state. After a short visit below he will join his family in the east. (July 20, 1900)

Mr. P.S. Inskip will organize in Ferndale a class in High School branches...(July 20, 1900)

P.S. Inskip has given up the idea of organizing a high school in Ferndale and has gone to Fortuna to take charge of the High School at that place. (August 28, 1900)

The Ferndale Business College will be opened about October 1st by Professor C.F. Nesse... (August 23, 1901)

Miss Rachael Chambaud, of Santa Rosa, will assist Prof Nesse in instructing the pupils at this gentleman's business college to be opened in Ferndale next Tuesday. .. (September 27, 1901)

Prof. C.F. Nesse opens his Ferndale Business College in the Masonic Building today... (October 1, 1901)

The Ferndale Business College...October 1st...Prof. Nesse and assistant, Miss Rachel Chambaud late of Santa Rosa, opened the doors of the Ferndale Business College for the reception of pupils...The school room is situated on the lower floor of the Masonic building, the entrance being on Eugene Street. For the past several weeks Mr. Nesse has been busily engaged in fitting up this room. He has had the ceiling calcimined, the wood work repainted, etc. and in fact has spared no expense of pains in making it a comfortable and attractive study for his pupils. Prof. Neese returned to Ferndale Saturday evening from Eureka, where he put in 23 days inspecting the books of the county officers. He re-opened his business college yesterday, and tells us that he will have a greatly increased list of pupils this term. This school does excellent work. (August 5, 1902)

Prof Neese's Ferndale Business College opened this week with the following students enrolled: William Lutman, Hydesville; Anna Lowry, Capetown; Sadie Crippen and Geo Dudley, Petrolia; Wilbur Wooldridge, Grizzly Bluff; Blanche Robarts, Jennie Mullady, Arthur Edmondston, Bedford Redden, Frank Flowers, John Friel, Roland Rasmussen, Russell Gries, Ernest LeMar, Ferndale. Last Summer, Prof Nesse started with but three pupils. (August 8, 1902)

Prof. Nesse's night school, to be conducted in connection with his Ferndale Business College, opens 9/29 next Monday evening. (September 23, 1902)

Miss Cavy Miner, of Ferndale, and George Dudley, of Petrolia, graduated from the Ferndale Business College last week, so Prof Nesse reports. (December 5, 1902)

Five new pupils were enrolled at the opening of the Ferndale Business College yesterday: George Brice and Milton Halgestad of Ferndale; Miss Mary Johansen, of Pleasant Point; Jay Nissen, of the Island, and Bert Bonnicksen, of Paradise Island. (January 6, 1903)

C. R. Sweet, of the Ferndale Business College, left on the last Eureka for Santa Rosa, where he will work for a few months in a publishing house. He tells us that he will reopen his Ferndale school this fall. (April 19, 1904)

The lower story of the building being thrown into one large room, a kitchen is being added and other improvements made. P.R. Burris and Ira Goff are doing the work. (September 3, 1907)

Ferndale's kindergarten opened yesterday in the Masonic Hall with Miss Frances Bruner in charge. Ten little folks were enrolled, an in a day or two this number will be increased to twenty-five or more...the hours of school are from 9 to 11:15. The Hall has been attractively fixed up for the school, and makes an ideal room for a kindergarten. (September 22, 1914)

BUILDING:

A side addition is to be built to the Ferndale Masonic Hall by the recently organized lodge of Royal Arc Masons. (May 5, 1896)

Carpenters Blakemore and Briggs started work Wednesday morning on the side addition to the Masonic Hall. (May 15, 1896)

Carpenters John Gries, R.E. Haywood and Frank Reas this week commenced work on extensive improvements to Masonic Hall in this town. Another story is to be added to the woodshed and kitchen in the rear, which will give a good sized ante-room and woodshed

opening off the main lodge room upstairs. (December 9, 1921)

J.E. Gries and R. E. Haywood have been engaged several days of late remodeling the dining room of Masonic hall in this town, which has been enlarged and a small kitchen fitted up adjoining it. (May 25, 1923)

Hartley Bros commenced work this week repainting the exterior of Masonic Hall in this town...grey. (July 13, 1923)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The Masonic building was twisted somewhat out of shape, and in the lower story of the structure the plastering was nearly all jarred off the ceilings...(April 24, 1906)

UPSTAIRS - HALL

..been engaged this week decorating Masonic hall in this town, which has recently undergone extensive alterations. When the work is all completed the hall will be a most attractive building for lodge purposes. (1/6/28)

Masons observed sixtieth Anniversary of Organization...The first meetings, stated Mr. Shaw, were held over E.J. Dodge=s store, located at the corner of Ocean Avenue and Francis Street., now the site of Martignoli=s Service Station. This store and the hall above it were burned on September 6 and 7, 1875, during the most disastrous fire in the town=s history, and the lodge lost all its belongings with the exception of a minute book dating back to 1874, and a ledger. For this reason much of the early history of the lodge has been lost. Mr. Shaw told of having found among the papers of his father, Seth Louis Shaw, the minutes of the preliminary meetings at which the plans for the formation of Ferndale Lodge were discussed, and excerpts from these minutes are given here, that the identity of the organizers may be preserve: Under date of December, 1867, it is written: The following named brethren acknowledged by each other as Master Masons in good standing assembled at the store of E.J. Dodge in Ferndale on the day above written at 7:30 o=clock for the purpose of considering the propriety of establishing a lodge of F. & A.M. in this place, namely: E.J. Dodge, J.G> Kenyon, K. Geer, Samuel Hubbard, S.L. Shaw, F. Bryant (or Bergot), F.Z. Boynton, Dennis McAulif, S. W. Morrison and H.S. Soule. The record shows that plans were then made for fitting up a lodge room over the Dodge store, there having been at that time no lodge hall in this town. At a meeting in January the minutes show that an order was made for the commencement of work on the hall, the expense to be about \$400. In the minutes of the meeting held in August, 1868, is told of the decision to call the new organization Ferndale Lodge, F.&A.M....at the time of the fire which destroyed its hall having been engaged in the erection of a new hall, this being the one which is now owned by the Ferndale Odd Fellows. This hall not being ready for occupancy, however, they were compelled to establish a temporary lodge room, which was located over the McConnell store, on the site now occupied by the Ferndale Bank. Early in 1876 they moved to their new hall, and after a time, finding the cost too much for them to finance, sold a half-interest to the Odd Fellows. The lodge meetings were held in that hall until early in 1891, when the present Masonic Hall was completed, and the lodge=s remaining half-interest in the original hall was sold to the Odd Fellows, who thus became the sole owners of the building, which they still occupy...The lodge was granted its dispensation on October 16, 1868, by the grand lodge and thus started on it career. Its charter was granted on October 14, 1869...(11/1/29)

The slumbers of the residents of Ferndale were rudely interrupted last Thursday night by the clanging of our fire alarm, and not many minutes were lost before the members of the fire department were on our streets and getting their fire fighting apparatus to the scene of the blaze, which was discovered to be in a building at the rear of T.J. Brackett's residence on Eugene Street, used as a workshop and chicken house. The fire was first discovered by M.H. Donnelly of the Palace Saloon as he left his place of business shortly after midnight, the gentleman losing no time in turning in the alarm and awakening our citizens. When first noted the roof of the building was all ablaze and gave every evidence of being the beginning of a very disastrous conflagration. This, however, was averted by the prompt arrival of the fire laddies and the quick and efficient work accomplished by them, for in a few minutes after the hose companies got water on the blaze the first was under control and soon thereafter extinguished... (October 17, 1905)

Death of T.J. Brackett, which occurred at the home of the departed yesterday morning about 7:20 o'clock....married in 1875 to Mrs. Margaret Barnes...stepson...I.B. Barnes...the services to occur from the family residence on Eugene Street... (August 11, 1908)

Mrs. D.A. Renfro, of Eureka, will soon remove to Ferndale to make her home in this little city and will have rooms with Mrs. T.J. Brackett on Eugene Street. Mrs. Renfro, a good many years ago was a resident of Ferndale, having with her husband, the late D.A. Renfro, conducted the Ferndale hotel. (September 29, 1908)

Pioneer William Lytle and wife of the Island last Tuesday purchased the Brackett house in the upper part of town and will make their future home there. The deal was made through the real estate firm of Robarts, Blum & Moore, which is doing a rushing business these

days. (January 16, 1914)

Margaret Brackett to Silvio Comisto, 8/11/1910 lots 7 and 8 of blk 9, Francis Division; Silvio Comisto to William and Ann Eliza Lytle, 1/13/1914, same land. (January 20, 1914)

Mr. and Mrs. Jas. Robarts and children moved the latter part of the week to their home on Eugene St. The home was purchased several months ago from the Lytel estate and has been extensively remodeled, now making a very attractive and comfortable residence. (1/29/26)

Joseph Miller, for years a resident of Ferndale, and the father of Dr. Austin Miller of this city, breathed his last Saturday evening, February 27th at the Church Street home of Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Collins, where he roomed...to his bereaved son, Dr. Austin Miller -- the only relative in Humboldt he left, and to whom he has been both a mother and a father since death claimed his wife in 1882...Mrs. R.D. Dunn, with whom the departed had boarded for nearly fifteen years, and who regarded him as a member of her family... (March 1, 1904)

Arthur Tyler, who had been passing the last few days in Ferndale, returned to his home at Rio Dell yesterday. Arthur is a former Cream City boy, residing here some twenty-six years ago with parents. One of the gentleman's eyes was badly bruised, presumably received in the fall that followed the shock... (December 11, 1906)

Mrs. Mary Geissleman, wife of John G., the Ferndale boot and shoemaker, died last Sunday night at her home in this town...pneumonia...aged 83 years...came to Ferndale with husband about 20 years ago...remains interred Wed a.m. in the Ferndale cemetery. (April 19, 1895)

On April 18th a deed was recorded from Mary Giesselman to John Giesselman to a house and lot in Ferndale situated on Brown Street. (April 26, 1895)

Several weeks ago...John Giesselman, Ferndale's eccentric french shoemaker, had his faithful old saddle horse Reno taken out and shot. S.A. Ward did the job and John has hardly been himself since. "Reno" had grown to be very old and outlived his usefulness to Mr. Giesselman and in accordance with a resolve made years ago never to sell the horse or allow him to go out of his possession he had him killed. "Reno" bearing his distinguished looking rider, "The frenchman" will never be seen on dress parade in Ferndale again. A strong bond of affection ever existed between the horse and his master. (February 11, 1896)

T.L. Wilson and wife moved yesterday into the dwelling house opposite the Grange Store on Brown Street. (June 5, 1896)

John Giesselman has sold to Charles DeCarli, his dwelling and lot on Brown Street in the town of Ferndale. The lot is 88x99-1/2 feet in size. (March 12, 1897)

Yesterday morning, old gentleman John Giesselman, the pioneer shoe maker of Ferndale, took his life by shooting himself, dying instantly. We will have more to say next issue... (July 6, 1897)

As we mentioned in our last issue, John Giesselman, the pioneer cobbler of Ferndale, committed suicide at his home last Monday morning. Since the old gentleman lost his wife and his horse, Reno, two years ago, he did not seem to care about living and often threatened to take his life. On the above morning, Ves Ward, who had been taking care of the old man for the past six months went up town for a few minutes and when he returned he found that John had carried out his rash threat -- the shoemaker had shot himself twice -- once near his heart and once in the head, the latter shot proving fatal, blowing off the whole top of his head... (July 9, 1897)

The Giesselman house on Brown Street now occupied by Charles DeCarli is being repaired. A gentleman, his sister and niece from Port Kenyon are to reside in it. (November 5, 1897)

In Eureka last Friday, joined in marriage, John Boone McCurdy, late of Washington, and Elsie E. Miller, of Ferndale. The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Miller who resides with her brother in the Giesselman house on Brown Street. (April 12, 1898)

An effort is being made to secure by subscription part of the Giesselman lot on Brown Street, Ferndale, on which to erect an engine house for our Fire Company. (January 13, 1899)

Foreman Ira A. Lovell of Hose Company Number two is circulating a petition in Ferndale praying the Town Trustees to purchase half of the Giesselman lot on Brown Street on which to erect a town hall, engine house, town jail, etc. all under one roof. Ferndale is certainly in sore need of such a building. Petition is being generally signed. (February 28, 1899)

Boynton and Hall have purchased of Charles DeCarli what is known as the Giesselman property. (March 3, 1899)

Town Trustees met last evening, and the question of the purchase of a part of the Giesselman lot on Brown Street for town Hall purposes was to be decided. Petitions were to be presented both for and against the purchase. (March 7, 1899)

The petition to purchase a part of the Geissleman lot for town hall purposes...were read and placed on file... (March 10, 1899)

We understand that the house occupied by J.B. McCurdy and wife will be torn down as soon as they move out and a new building erected there. (March 13, 1900)

Maynard Michel and wife last week moved into the house on Brown Street, recently vacated by J.B. McCurdy and wife. (March 27, 1900)

Maynard Michel and wife, are moving into the Gill residence on Main Street, lately vacated by Dr. E.M. Cooper and family. (October 8, 1901)

Oluf Halgestad has purchased the Geissleman house on Brown Street and will move it onto his lot in the Tyrrell Addition to Ferndale. John Kerri will start moving it in a few days. Oluf intends building onto this structure this summer. (April 25, 1902)

John Kerri commenced moving the Geissleman house on Brown street yesterday to Oluf Halgestad's place in the Tyrrell addition to Ferndale. It is Oluf's intention to build onto this structure this summer. (May 9, 1902)

Town Trustees...At the last meeting of the Broad it was decided to purchase lots 3 and 4, block 10, Shaw's division to the town of Ferndale, for the sum of \$500, Town Attorney Blackburn being instructed to prepare the necessary papers. The property is that known as the old John Gissleman place on Brown Street. It is the intention to later erect a building on the lots to be used as a town hall, public library, fire engine house, etc. The amount that would be saved by the town in rent now paid out would be in the neighborhood of about \$40 per month... (September 10, 1907)

Town Trustees...J.N. Lund, appointed by the Ferndale Chamber of Commerce to appear before the town board and consult with the later body regarding a suitable location for a free library site, presented the matter to the town fathers, but nothing definite was done in the matter... (January 10, 1908)

Town Marshall Barnes and assistants are removing the town's bastille to its new site on the old Giesselman lot on Brown Street, now the property of the town of Ferndale. The lot on which the jail formerly stood has been sold to Miss Edith Sweet. (January 17, 1908)

The Town trustees were in session last Monday night to confer regarding the matter of making application for a Carnegie donation for a library building in Ferndale. After some discussion the town fathers passed a resolution to ask for a donation of \$8000, pledging the town to raise \$800 per year for the support of the library, providing the application is favorably acted upon....a lot on Brown Street is already the property of the town...whether this site will be used for building purposes has not been decided, we understand, as other property may be secured on which to erect the library... (February 21, 1908)

Town Trustees...The matter of hitching posts on the town lot was brought up by Trustee Aggeler, and Street Superintendent Barnes reported that he had lately erected several there and that there were now accommodations for about twenty-five horses. As most of the people know, the town lot is directly in the rear of the new building of the Ferndale Bank... (March 5, 1912)

William Keith, the hobo who was taken into custody by Night watchman Robinson of Ferndale a few weeks ago and while being put in the lockup struck that officer in the face, for which offense he was sentenced to ten days in the county jail, is under arrest in Eureka for threatening a young lady telephone operator... (February 28, 1913)

Architect C.H. Osgood, at the direction of the Town Trustees, is now engaged in drawing plans for a new town hall and fire house for Ferndale, to be located on the town lot on Brown Street, next to the Ferndale Bank. it is planned to erect a building 32x72 feet in size, the lower floor to be devoted to housing the fire apparatus of the town, with five entrances. A concrete jail will be located in one corner. The upstairs will have an assembly room for public meetings, while the council chambers will take up the balance of the room. The plans call for an attractive and up-to-date structure, and the cost is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$2,000. (April 27, 1915)

Bids are asked for the building of Ferndale's new town hall. W.O. Davis and Frank Reas have been engaged the last couple of days in moving the jail on the town lot to the position it is to occupy when the new building is erected. (May 21, 1915)

At an adjourned meeting of the trustees of the town of Ferndale, held last Tuesday evening, contracts were awarded for the construction of the new town hall and fire equipment house in Ferndale. The successful bidders on the building on the new structure were Stearns & Knox, who will furnish the material and do the carpenter work and painting for \$1,588.31. The concrete floors and foundation will be laid by Hamilton & Benjamin for \$363.00. (June 11, 1915)

The Ferndale Fire department's equipment was moved Saturday afternoon from the different buildings where it had been located to its quarters in the new town building, which is now practically completed. (August 3, 1915)

At a meeting of the Ferndale town trustees last Monday evening the new town hall was formally accepted from the contractors. Messrs. Stearns & Knox. (August 20, 1915)

The old hand power fire engine, which has been owned by Ferndale for many years, was towed to Eureka this week...to San Francisco... The old Torrent, as that type of engine was known, was purchased by public subscription in this town before the town was incorporated and did good service...(November 30, 1923)

The new fire siren recently installed on the tower on the Town Hall, to replace the bell which had been in use for many years, was tried out Saturday evening and found to work very satisfactorily. (7/24/31)

The arrangement of its interior is perfect and M&B now have every opportunity of displaying their immense stock of goods to the very best advantage. Clerk Mullins has arranged displays in a very attractive manner. (March 17, 1896)

Owing to too much other work, W.H. Robarts, bookkeeper for Boynton & Hall, has decided to give up the Ferndale town clerkship, and intended presenting his resignation last night to the Town Council. (March 8, 1904)

John Morris moved last Friday the big Jas Jacobsen safe from the White Front Store to the jewelry store of P.M. Canepa. It was quite a chore, as the safe is very heavy. (April 12, 1904)

W.H. Robarts, who for several years has been employed as the accountant at Boynton & Hall's general merchandising store in Ferndale, has resigned his position. We are informed that Mr. Robarts will go to Vancouver, BC on a visit to look over that country. (July 21, 1905)

The well known firm of Boynton & Hall, which has conducted a general merchandising business in Ferndale for many years, closed its doors last night, having made an assignment to its creditors, who, we are informed, are principally wholesale houses of San Francisco... (February 2, 1906)

Lars Larsen, who has been working for the Rochdale Co for some time, and who had intended associating himself with Messrs N and C Hedegard in the purchase of N.P. Petersen's merchandising store in Ferndale, has given up the idea. Lars is now employed by the J. Gollober Co., which is to commence its sale of the Boynton & Hall stock of goods tomorrow. (April 3, 1906)

Baker Ross of Fortuna, whose place of business was destroyed by fire recently, is soon to pen up in another building in that town. Brick for his new oven has been purchased from J.A. Swett of Ferndale, who owns the pile taken out of the old Grange store building. (July 4, 1911)

C.H. Boynton to Minnie J. Etter, lot 5, blk 10, lot 4 and 15 feet off west side of lot 3, of block 1, Francis Division to Ferndale. (February 4, 1908)

D.A. Branstetter and Frank Reas were at work a couple of days this week tearing down and removing the fixtures in the Boynton & Hall store on Main Street, owned by Mrs. E.J. Etter of this place. At a later date the building will also be removed to make room for the structure the Ferndale Bank will erect upon a portion of the site, recently purchased by the Bank from Mrs. Etter. (March 13, 1908)

Carpenters D.A. Branstetter and Peter Petersen are at work tearing down the old building on Brown Street at the rear of the brick building formerly occupied by Boynton & Hall, and the property of Mrs. E.J. Etter. (March 24, 1908)

The M.J.B. Coffee Company is painting a large 24x12 foot sign on the Ocean Avenue side of the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co's store and on the side of the old White Front building, advertising their brand of coffee. The A M H Co is the sole agent in Ferndale. (July 24, 1908)

The old brick building formerly occupied by the White Front store and which was badly wrecked by the earthquake of 1906, is to be torn down and already the work has been commenced. J.A. Swett has been given the contract by the owners -- the Ferndale Bank and Mrs. E.J. Etter. Mr. Swett expects to have the structure razed by April. It will be remembered that the corner half of this property was bought some time ago by the Ferndale Bank from Mrs. Etter, who still owns the remainder of the lot. It is presumed the Bank people are to erect a building the coming summer, though President Putnam stated yesterday that nothing definite had been decided in the matter. The tearing down of the old brick building is a good move, as aside from being an eyesore it is a menace to life, being so badly cracked and broken that portions of the walls are liable to fall at almost any time. (December 21, 1909)

Messrs. Swett and Wilson are making a decided change in the appearance of the old White Front building, which they are tearing down. Wednesday the front was pulled down with the aid of a team and there now remain but a portion of the three walls. The old building will soon be but a thing of the past. A decided improvement in the appearance of the town will be noted when the structure is out of the way. (February 11, 1910)

Plans are now being drawn by a San Francisco architect for the new concrete building to be erected by the Ferndale Bank on the lot owned by the corporation where the Grange store formerly stood. (September 2, 1910)

A load of piling for the foundation of the new building to be erected by the Ferndale Bank was hauled to the building site on Main Street Tuesday by R.M. Poole and Henry Keisner. The piling will probably be driven this summer and the foundation made ready for building operations in 1912. (March 24, 1911)

Last Tuesday morning the work of driving piles for the foundation of the new Ferndale Bank building was commenced by Messrs. R.M. Poole, Henry Keisner, J.E. Gries and Clark Varian. The county's big gasoline engine and pile driver is being used and the piles are going down at a rapid rate. Forty piles will be driven and the work will probably be completed this week. President Putnam of the bank states that he is uncertain yet whether or not the actual building work will be commenced this summer but that plans are expected daily. It

seems to be the expectation however that work on the building will be commenced in the near future. (May 5, 1911)

An accident which might have resulted in fatalities occurred Tuesday afternoon at the site of the new Ferndale Bank building, where operations were commenced that day driving piles for the foundation. Considering the nature of the accident it terminated fortunately, though John Dowd was quite badly bruised about the legs and will be unable to work for some time. That no one was killed, however, is a cause of congratulation. The pile driver in use overturned and fell to the ground, directly over where men were working and where a number of spectators were standing. As soon as it started to fall the warning was given and all escaped with the exception of Mr. Dowd, who was caught beneath a timber and his legs imprisoned. Luckily, however, he was not directly beneath the falling derrick, or he would have undoubtedly met instant death...The accident was caused by the giving away of the cement sidewalk on the corner where the pile driver was stationed, allowing the derrick to topple sideways. A portion of the upper part was broken, but repairs were at once commenced and the driver was again in use Wednesday morning. (May 5, 1911)

Bids for the construction of the new building for the Ferndale Bank were opened by the officials of the bank the other day, the tender of B.T. Owsley, a contractor of San Francisco, being accepted by the building committee...the new building will be located on the bank's property at the corner of Main and Brown Streets, one of the finest business locations in this little city. The plans for the structure call for the latest in bank construction and when completed Ferndale will be able to boast of having one of the handsomest and most up to date banking houses in Northern California. (August 25, 1911)

Work has commenced on the new home of the Ferndale Bank, which is to be located on the site of the old Grange Store. A crew of men have been engaged for several days in excavating for the foundation where the piles were driven several months ago, and also for the vault foundation. Foreman Doxsee, who will oversee the construction work for contractor Owsley, arrived from San Francisco Thursday evening accompanied by his wife and son and a skilled workman... (September 26, 1911)

The Ferndale Bank to Have a Fine new Home (excellent sketch included). Now that active work is in progress on the new building of the Ferndale Bank at the corner of Main and Brown Streets a description of the building as it will be when complete will doubtless be read with interest by the people of this valley who are interested in all improvements going on in Ferndale. The new building will be of reinforced concrete, fronting on Main Street 25 feet and extending back 75 feet on Brown Street. It will be a one-story structure about 23 feet tall. As may be seen from the cut above, which is made from the architect's drawing, it will have a handsome exterior finish. The building throughout will be constructed in the best possible manner. Tons of iron and steel will be used in reinforcing the concrete and when completed the structure will be as solid as though carved from a solid block of granite. The building will rest on a foundation of cement, which in turn is supported by rows of piling driven deep into the ground a few feet apart. The contractor states that this foundation would be sufficient for a building several times as large. The plans for the interior provide for a most convenient as well as a handsome bank. There will be a lobby and the president's room in front. Then comes the working space for the transaction of business by the cashier and clerks. There is a director's room, two store rooms, lavatories, etc., all arranged in the most convenient way possible. The interior finish will be rich and handsome. A tiled floor in the front part of the building is provided for, while the working space will be of cement covered with battleship linoleum. Marble baseboards will add to the richness of the appearance of the rooms. All the woodwork in the interior will be quarter-sawed Eastern White oak. The wainscoting will probably be of marble. A vault is to be built of cement, tiled, which will measure 8x12 feet on the inside with walls about two feet thick. Several tons of iron will be put into the walls of the vault alone. The roof will be of concrete, covered with five layers of felt, and with pitch and gravel over all. Skylights will be placed so that an abundance of light will be available particularly in the main banking part. Plate glass windows, massive doors covered with plates of solid copper, hinges of brass, all will add to the beauty of the building. Several kinds of marble will be used in the interior finish. For its size, it is difficult to imagine a finer banking building than this one will be when completed. The total cost will be in the neighborhood of \$28,000. Mr. Owsley of San Francisco is the constructor, and Foreman Doxsee is in charge of the work. (September 29, 1911)

The team driven by Amos Gillespie in hauling lumber for the false work of the new Ferndale Bank caused a little excitement yesterday afternoon when a tug became unhooked, allowing the neck yoke to drop to the ground near the site of the bank. Mr. Gillespie was dragged beneath the horses' feet and narrowly escaped injury. The horses kicked considerable and climbed to the sidewalk but no damage resulted from the affair. (September 29, 1911)

The new Ferndale Bank building is now fully completed and the work of moving into the new structure will be commenced within the next few days. (July 4, 1912)

Next Monday, July 15th, the Ferndale Bank will be doing business in its magnificent new home on the corner of Main and Brown Streets. The work of moving the fixtures, safes, etc., has commenced, and by Monday everything will be in readiness for business in the new building. The Ferndale Bank will have a home second to none of its size in the state. The cost of the new building and fixtures, we are informed, is in the neighborhood of \$25,000. (July 12, 1912)

A high board fence was built this week to close the space between the new Ferndale Bank building and the Goff & Brightman market, greatly improving the appearance of the site. The work was done by D.A. Branstetter and John Kerri. (August 16, 1912)

Upon the consolidation of the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co. and the Russ, Early & Williams Co. the first of the year, the Russ-Williams Banking Co. will move to the banking quarters in the Russ building vacated this summer by the Ferndale Bank. The Russ-Williams Bank has heretofore been located in the Brick Store building. (October 4, 1912)

On October 1st Frank N. Rasmussen will resign his position as cashier of the Ferndale Bank and will be succeeded by George N. Lund. Mr. Rasmussen has been cashier of this banking institution for ten years past, having succeeded John H. Trost. He has handled the affairs of the bank in a manner highly satisfactory to the directors and has been popular with all its patrons... (September 3, 1915)

Howard Chappell has tendered his resignation as an employee of the Ferndale Bank...will depart for Los Angeles...Mr. Chappell came to Ferndale to teach in the Ferndale Union high school several years ago, resigning to take a position in the Ferndale Bank...Sophus Christensen will succeed Mr. Chappell in the Ferndale Bank. (June 3, 1921)

An important business deal will be consummated in Ferndale on April 1st, when the Ferndale Market, owned and managed by Goff & Brightman, and the Cream City Market, Hansen & Anderson proprietors, will be consolidated under the name of the Ferndale Meat Co. The proposition has been under discussion by the managements of the two markets for some time past, but no definite action has been taken until now, when formal announcements of the impending change is authorized. The retail business will be conducted in the quarters at present occupied by Goff & Brightman, where many improvements will be made. An ice manufacturing plant will be installed, cold storage rooms added, and a glass refrigerating counter placed in position in the market proper. F. Svendsen has accepted a position in Spillers & Ott's Ferndale harness shop. (September 23, 1902)

Henry Ott last Wednesday sold his interest in the Spillers & Ott Harness shop to his partner, Chas Spillers, who will hereafter conduct the same... (May 12, 1905)

Henry Ott, who recently disposed of his interest in the Gray Horse Harness Shop in Ferndale to his partner, Charles Spillers, is now at

work in this place of business where he expects to be employed the greater part of the summer... (May 23, 1905)

Henry Ott, who has been employed at Charles Spillers' harness shop in Ferndale, went to Loleta last Wednesday where he will work for his father-in-law, Judge Sowash, the Loleta harness dealer. (February 8, 1907)

I am about to retire from business in Ferndale...Charles Spillers, Prop Grey Horse Harness Shop...May 10, 1907 (May 24, 1907)

Peter Schmidt, now the proprietor of the Grey Horse Harness Shop as successor to C.S. Spillers... (June 4, 1907)

It is a pleasure at this time to announce and remind my many friends in Ferndale and the valley that in the very near future I will be among them...True to my decision of over three months ago I am going to make Ferndale -- the home of my boyhood days -- my place of business activities, providing a suitable location may be had, and by diligent toil and just dealings I sincerely hope and trust to "make good" in my new venture...The candy business is one that deserves much care and attention, this trade being usually acquired by such persons naturally inclined along the work...I will make an effort to be in my home town by the 15th inst., to arrange matters for the opening of the Butler Ice Cream and Candy Parlors about September 1st. Accompanying me home will be a young gentleman, a candy maker, who has had over four years of continuous experience in two of the finest candy factories in San Francisco...W.E. Butler. (August 7, 1908)

W.E. Butler, who returned to Ferndale Thursday evening from below, has been busy arranging for the opening of an ice cream and confectionery parlors in this place. Mr. Butler, who has spent several months in San Francisco learning the candy maker's trade, will occupy the building next to Ring's drug store on Main Street and hopes to be able to open his place of business to the public by September 1st... (August 18, 1908)

Carpenter O.E. Williams started work yesterday installing the fixtures in the Russ building on Main Street, which will be occupied by W.E. Butler as an ice cream parlor and candy store. Mr. Butler expects to be comfortably located in his new quarters about September 1st. (August 21, 1908)

Yesterday, W.E. Butler opened his new ice cream and confectionery parlors in the Russ building on Main Street...Mrs. Louie Early has been secured by Mr. Butler to act as his saleslady... (September 4, 1908)

George Kaussen, who with his family returned to this little city to make their permanent home some three months ago, will again engaged in the harness business after an absence of seven years from the Cream City. Mr. Kaussen will have his old store, the Russ building, lately occupied by Butler's confectionery parlors. George expects to open his shop to the public about the first of February. (January 12, 1909)

Last Friday expressman E. Weaver was engaged in moving the fixtures, etc., of the Butler Ice Cream parlors from the Russ building on Main Street to the old Boynton & Hall store house on Brown Street, where the articles will be stored. Proprietor Henry Ott will have his shop neatly fitted up and will have more roomy quarters than in his present location... (September 5, 1911)

A new roof has been placed on the building in this town occupied by the Ferndale Market and Ott's Harness shop. The work was done under the direction of W.O. McCann of the Eureka Paving Co. (March 18, 1913)

N.C. Halkjer, formerly employed in the Goodyear Welt shoe repair shop in Eureka, has opened a first class and up to date shoe repair shop in Ferndale. Location Henry Ott's harness shop. (September 22, 1914)

Henry Ott, proprietor of the Grey Horse Harness Shop and Niels Halkjar, of the Ferndale Shoe Repairing Shop, have formed a partnership under the firm name of Ott & Halkjar. The two business places have been conducted in the same building but under separate ownerships... (September 19, 1916)

Henry Ott, prop of the Grey Horse Harness Shop, has had an addition built on the rear of his place of business, where he can put an automobile while he is engaged in re-covering the top or putting plate glass windows in. Niels Halkjar, proprietor of the Ferndale Shoe Factory, was badly injured last Wednesday evening when he fell from a ladder at his place of business. In falling his back struck the back of a bench and he was rendered unconscious. He was found in this condition by Henry Ott, who at once summoned medical aid, and Mr. Halkjar was removed to his home...(February 24, 1922)

Niels Halkjar has sold his Ferndale Shoe Factory to F. Canclini of Arcata, who has already taken charge of the business. Mr. Canclini will continue to carry a line of shoes and do general repairing, along the same lines as the business has been conducted by Mr. Halkjar. Mr. Halkjar has been in business in this town for a number of years, and both he and his wife have many friends here...(April 21, 1922)

Henry Ott, for many years proprietor of the Grey Horse Harness Shop in this town, has sold his stock of goods to George Kausen and on May 1st retired from business. The stock has been moved to Mr. Kausen=s place of business. ...(5/3/29)

F. Canclini moved his Ferndale shoe repairing establishment this week from its former location in the Henry Ott store to the building which he recently purchased next door to the Dahlquist store. (11/14/24)

Mr. J.P. Francis and family arrived in Ferndale this week, where they will make their future home. The gentleman is the manager of the new theater opened last night in the Loewenthal building by J. Vansant of Eureka. (June 4, 1909)

Jacob Loewenthal has commended suit against Josh Vansant for \$200, alleged to be due for the rent of the building next door to The Enterprise office in Ferndale, which was leased by Vansant at a rental of \$50 a month for theatrical purposes, but which was used only a few times. Vansant claims that when he leased the building it was with the understanding that he could vacate it anytime he desired and that no lease is in existence. The building was fixed up in good style, a stage built and other improvements made, but never proved a paying proposition, as C.W. The new building will be a one story structure and construction work will be in charge of Chris Winkler. Garland Dungan will attend to the duties of his brother Charlie at A. Berding store, during his absence. (July 24, 1896)

Charles H. Dungan, who has been clerking for A. Berding in Ferndale for several years past, took his departure on Sunday...will visit

below for awhile... (June 1, 1897)

Howard Gay and Edward Francis commenced work yesterday laying a cement foundation in which A. Berding's old store building is to rest. This building will be moved back and will face Ocean Avenue, to make room for Mr. Berding's big new building to be erected on the corner. The old warehouse building will be torn down. (June 27, 1899)

Ted Weaver is clerking in A. Berding's store during the absence of August Berding, who is camping in the Mattole section. (July 19, 1898)

The old warehouse building belonging to A. Berding and which was torn down last week, was built over 30 years ago, but not withstanding this fact the timbers in it were in an excellent state of preservation and the redwood shingles on the roof were as sound as the day they were put on. Cut nails were used in its construction, and they would have stood the test 30 years longer undoubtedly. (July 4, 1899)

Mr. Berding's old store building is being remodeled and will be used as a warehouse for Aggeler Brothers. (December 22, 1899)

Last Tuesday afternoon a band of calves that were being driven along Ocean Avenue bolted through the open door and into Aggeler Bros' warehouse in the rear of that store, and there was a hot time there for a few moments. ...opening of a new cash and carry store in Ferndale by the Hinch, Salmon & Walso Co. Of Eureka, one of the largest grocery concerns of northwestern California, which operates three stores in Eureka, the store in Ferndale making the fourth in its chain. It will be formally opened tomorrow...the new store has not been named as yet, for the management of the store want the local people to feel that this store is their store, and with this idea in mind they are going to offer several cash prizes to the ones who can suggest the most suitable name for the store...(no location given)...(4/24/25)

AD: Hinch, Salmon & Walsh Co.... next door to State Theatre, Ferndale... (7/17/25)

The Hinch, Salmon & Walch CO. Has sold its cash and carry grocery store in the State Theatre Building, Ferndale to the Russ, Aggeler, Williams Co. The latter firm taking possession of the business last Monday. The business will be conducted at the same location by the Russ Aggeler, Williams Co. And Manager Ingram, who has been in charge for the Hinch, Salmon & Walch Co. Will remain with the new management...The store was established in Ferndale in April, 1925, now having been in operation here about 14 months. The Russ, Aggeler, Williams Co., one of the oldest mercantile establishments in Ferndale, will now have two places of business, operating its large department store as in the past and in addition conducting its newly purchased cash and carry store. (6/18/26)

Mr. and Mrs. L.B. Ingram and family of this town took their departure Sunday for Tulare...about a year past Mr. Ingram had been manager of the Russ, Aggeler, Williams Co. TWO-STORY A. BERDING STORE

The old store building is to be moved back and will face Ocean Avenue, the warehouse annex will be torn down. (June 20, 1899)

Howard Gay and assistant commenced work Tuesday on the concrete foundation for A. Berding's new store building. (July 21, 1899)

Howard Gay and assistant, Peter Petersen, have about completed the concrete foundation for A. Berding's new building in Ferndale and did a first class job. A better foundation was never laid in the county. (August 4, 1899)

The lumber is now being hauled for A. Berding's new building. (August 8, 1899)

Carpenters Kerri and King and Howard Gay started work yesterday on A. Berding's new building. (August 18, 1899)

The walls of A. Berding's new building are going up. Several men are at work on the structure. (August 25, 1899)

Some very long timbers are being hauled to Ferndale for A. Berding's new building a load of floor joists came Wednesday 50 feet in length. (August 25, 1899)

A. Berding's new building is assuming large proportions. Work on its construction is rapidly progressing. (September 15, 1899)

The new Berding building on the corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue is nearing completion. The plate glass front has been placed in position and the painters are now at work on the structure which when finished will be a handsome addition to our town. (October 20, 1899)

Aggeler Bros have purchased and taken possession of the general merchandising business of A. Berding in Ferndale, and will hereafter conduct the same. The handsome store in the new Berding building will be occupied by Aggeler Bros and they will move into their new quarters as soon as completed, which will be several weeks...Mr. August Berding will be found at the old stand ready to supply your wants until the new quarters on the corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue are occupied. (November 3, 1899)

The new Berding building is being wired for electric lights. (November 24, 1899)

For the past few days Aggeler Bros have been engaged in moving their stock of goods from the Brown building to their handsome and commodious new quarters in the Berding building on the corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue. The enterprising young men have, by strict attention to business and fair treatment, built up a fine trade and now enjoy an excellent patronage. Aggeler Bros have secured the employment of Mr. H.R. Davies to take charge of their dry goods department. Mr. Davies, having had charge of the White house in Eureka for the past few years, is well and favorably known to the Eureka trade... (June 15, 1900)

Mr. Beck, who for the past two months has been employed at Francis Bros' Ferndale hardware store, has accepted a position in SF. The gentleman accompanied by his wife, departed on yesterday's Eureka. (October 26, 1900)

O.G. Elliott, late of Gilroy, CA, several days ago, accepted a position with Francis Bros in Ferndale. (February 8, 1901)

Arthur Chick returned Friday from San Francisco where he has been at work for nearly a year. The young man has accepted a position in Aggeler Bro's store. (April 23, 1901)

Wm. Grinsell has resigned his position in Aggeler Bros store in Ferndale and departed Friday for Arcata where he has accepted the management of Harpst & Spring's creamery. (July 9, 1901)

J.N. Davies, who was recently employed as clerk in Aggeler Bros' Ferndale store is now...at Marshfield, Oregon. (October 21, 1902)

On Tuesday of this week A.M. Aggeler sold his interest in the general merchandising firm of Aggeler Bros in Ferndale to his brother S.G. Aggeler, who with his brother Edward, will continue to conduct the same. (March 13, 1903)

Miss Chambaud has resigned her position as bookkeeper with Aggeler Bros., Ferndale, and will depart on August 10th for Honolulu... (July 28, 1903)

Owing to impaired health D.A. The gentleman seems favorably impressed with our town and valley, and may decide to invest and remain with us. (January 29, 1904)

The Francis Bros closed their Ferndale store yesterday, and are now packing the remainder of their stock for shipment to Fortuna, where Messrs. Francis & Mowery are to engage in the plumbing and hardware business. An experienced man from San Francisco will be in charge of the Fortuna establishment. (April 19, 1904)

E.A. Aggeler has sold to Mr. S.V. Morrison, of Bunker Hill, and to Mr. John Hansen, of the Occidental ranch, a portion of his interest in Aggeler Bros' general merchandising business in Ferndale. Messrs Morrison and Hansen are so well and favorably known here as honest, upright and conscientious businessmen that nothing can be said that would add to their standing in the community. As soon as organization can be completed the new firm will be known as the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co. Carpenters W.S. Fitzell and L.M. Smith commenced the work yesterday of remodeling the interior of the Berding building on Main Street which is to be occupied after the first of the year by M.C. MacLennan & Co. The interior of this building is to be completely rearranged, new shelving put in place, and the whole fitted up to meet every requirement of a modern dry goods store. This firm will certainly have a convenient and commodious place of business when the improvements now being made are finished. (December 6, 1904)

Miss Zadia Kausen is now employed in M.C. MacLennan's dry goods store in Ferndale. The young lady takes the place made vacant by the resignation of Miss Pearl Sniveley, who has given such excellent satisfaction to the patrons of this store for a number of years past. (January 3, 1905)

M.C. MacLennan & Co., who have been engaged in the dry goods business in Ferndale for several years past, have decided to close their store, and hope to be able to leave this place on or about the first of September. P.B. Lynch, for several years past the popular and efficient bookkeeper for the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co of Ferndale, has tendered his resignation, and on April 1st will accept a position in the offices of the Southern Pacific RR Co at San Francisco... (February 11, 1908)

Miss Agnes Early of Ferndale has accepted a position with the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co of this place. Miss Early will be employed in the dry goods department of the store, and began her new duties yesterday. (April 10, 1908)

William Stillings of the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co...is severing his connection with that firm within a few days...leaves for Crockett where he will take charge of the grocery department for Davis Bros of that place...has been in the employ of the A, M, H Co, the past seven years... (April 14, 1908)

Carpenter M.B. Hansen has been engaged of late making improvements to the buildings occupied by Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co... (April 24, 1908)

The many friends of Mrs. V. Brizard, who has been employed at the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co's the past nine months, will learn with regret that she has severed her connection with the firm and will leave for her home in Eureka tomorrow. (May 29, 1908)

Miss Mamie Riley, who recently resigned her position at E.M. Loveland's, has accepted one with the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co., and is now filing the position vacated by Mrs. V. Brizard. (June 2, 1908)

John Hansen and M. Stafford, Mr. Morrison retiring from the firm last evening. Mr. Morrison has been a familiar figure about the Aggeler Store and his presence will be greatly missed as his patrons always found him a most agreeable and obliging business man. The gentleman informs us that he and his family have no intention of leaving the Cream City, which will be good news to their many friends... (August 1, 1911)

The biggest business change that has occurred in Ferndale for many years will take place on January 1, 1913, when the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Company and the Russ, Early & Williams Company, conducting two of the largest general merchandising stores in the county, will be consolidated and will thereafter operate as one store, in which the business heretofore done by both firms will be centered...the new firm will be located in the building at present occupied by the Russ, Early & Williams Company, which is a modern brick structure. He states that he will give full publicity to the Pacific Garage business in Ferndale, as Bruce W. Aurandt, the proprietor, fully realizes the value of newspaper advertising. (October 17, 1919)

The Pacific Garage in Ferndale has closed its doors, and a notice of attachment placed in the window by the Sheriff's office gives proof of financial difficulties. The garage was owned by Bruce W. Aurandt, who operated the Pacific Garage in Eureka, with branches in Ferndale and elsewhere. These places of business have been closed, and Aurandt is gone from the county...(October 15, 1920)

The Ferndale Cooperative Association, a branch of the Pacific Cooperative League, was organized at a meeting held last Wednesday evening in Odd Fellows Hall...board of directors elected as follows: Antone Zana, L.J. Lindrum, Harry Perry, Ross Boyd and John Coppini...(October 22, 1920)

The Ferndale Co-Operative Store is to be located in the Berding building, corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue, recently vacated by the Ferndale Branch of the Pacific Garage. This announcement is authorized by Organizer Walter Conlin, following a meeting of the stockholders which was held Wednesday evening in the parlors of the Pythian Castle...Mr. Conlin, the organizer and his assistant, W.F. Hawley, will be at the Berding building...(November 12, 1920)

The opening of the Ferndale Co-operative store has been definitely set for December 20th...Eugene Pratt, formerly of Fortuna, but lately connected with the Eureka Co-operative store, will be manager of the Ferndale business and will be assisted by Robt. Richmond of this town. (December 10, 1920)

Cooperative Store is formally opened...(December 24, 1920)

Eugene Pratt has resigned his position as manager of the Ferndale Co-Operative Store and has been succeeded by F.O Rex, late of the Eureka Co-Operative Store. Mr. Pratt has resumed his former position in the Eureka Store. (February 11, 1921)

Frank Rex has resigned as manager of the Ferndale Co-Operative Store and it is understood will be engaged as traveling salesman for a line of goods which he will introduce to the merchants of the county. Ed Burgess, who has been acting as manager of the Co-Operative store in Rio Dell, has succeeded Mr. Rex as manager of the Ferndale Store...(February 17, 1922)

The stores of the Pacific Co-Operative League in Ferndale, Eureka, Fortuna, Rio Dell and Hydesville were closed this week by Sheriff

Ross under a writ of attachment filed by the Board of Trade of San Francisco, representing a large number of creditors, mostly wholesale houses of that city...The stockholders state that the Ferndale store has been operated at a profit since it was started, and that the same is true of the other stores in this county. (February 24, 1922)

The Ferndale Store of the Pacific Co-Operative League, now in the hands of a receiver, will be sold at auction in San Francisco on Tuesday, April 11th...(April 7, 1922)

R.R. Williams, who has conducted the Overland service station in the Berding building on Main Street, the past several months, has resigned his position. Whether or not the service station will be continued we were unable to learn. (June 16, 1922)

The Enterprise will move tomorrow, Saturday, into the Berding building, formerly occupied by the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co., at the corner of Main Street and Ocean Ave., where temporary quarters of this paper will be established while its new building is in course of construction. The work of tearing down the building which has been owned and occupied by The Enterprise for many years past will be commenced at once...(June 22, 1923)

In our new home...The Enterprise announces today its removal to its new building after having been located for four months in temporary quarters while the new building was in course of construction. The new Enterprise Building is on the site of the old home of this paper, which was torn down after a life of twenty-eight years, during all of which time it was occupied by The Enterprise...(October 12, 1923)

Work has commenced this week on the alterations to the Berding building in this town, which has been purchased by Geo. M. Mann and will be converted into a theatre. The work will be rushed as rapidly as possible and it is hoped to have the theatre in operation before the holidays. (9/19/24)

The new State Theatre in Ferndale will open on Thursday evening of next week, January 15th. The new picture house is now practically in readiness for the opening, the organ and seats having been installed, the heating system completed, and the carpets to be laid this week. Manager Lassley announces that some of the notables from the Geo. M. Mann Theatres who will be in Ferndale for the opening of the theatre are George Mann, owner and president of the organization...The State Theatre will be operated six nights a week, there being no pictures on Monday evenings. (1/9/25)

...George M. Mann Theatres...which operates theatres in Eureka, Ukiah and various other California and Oregon cities, has acquired the Berding building in Ferndale and will remodel it for theatre purposes. The plan is to install a modern and sumptuously furnished theatre with approximately eight hundred seating capacity and probably two stores, one on either side of the theatre entrance. The building has been purchased by the Mann interests and the stores will be constructed to meet the requirements of the leasing tenants...(8/29/24)

The work of remodeling the Berding building in Ferndale, recently purchased by the Mann interests, into a first-class theatre will start in a very short time...the plans call for a modern front, with rooms for several small stores, the theatre to have a seating capacity of 500...(9/12/24)

M.M. Lasley, manager of the State Theatre in Ferndale since its opening January 15th, has been promoted to the managership of the Orpheus Theatre in Eureka...regret their departure...Vern Woods, of Sonoma County, an experienced theatrical man, is to succeed Mr. Lassley as manager of the State...(3/13/25)

Hector Dedini, who has been connected with the Ford Electrical Shop and operator at the State Theatre in this town, has resigned his positions and on February 15th will commence work for the Schlueter Commercial Co. in Eureka. He will be succeeded as operator at the State Theatre by his brother, Leonard Dedini. (2/12/26)

Manager Bernie Adams of the State Theatre in Ferndale will move to Eureka in a day or two...it is understood that Adrian Chapin is to take over the management of the State Theatre in Ferndale. (3/15/29)

Walter Minkler of Fortuna is now acting as manager of the State Theatre in Ferndale. Mr. Minkler has been connected with the State Theatre in Fortuna for some time past and came to Ferndale to manage the local show house during the illness of R.L. Fairley, who has been manager for some months past. (1/27/28)

Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Fairley of Eureka moved to Ferndale the latter part of the week and will make their home in the Miner bungalow. Mr. Fairley has assumed the management of the State Theatre in this town, succeeding Elmer Christensen, who has been acting as manager for some weeks past and who now becomes the chief operator. Mr. and Mrs. Fairley are the parents of Mrs. Geo. M. Mann. (8/12/27)

Adrian Chapin has resigned his position at the Brick Store and will hereafter devote all his time to the State Theatre in this town, of

which he is the manager. (8/9/29)

...Mr. and Mrs. R.L. Fairley are to leave Ferndale in the near future. Mr. Fairley, who has been the efficient manager of the State Theatre in Ferndale, is to take over the management of one of the George M. The new State Theatre in Ferndale was formally opened to the public for the first time last evening with a large audience in attendance to witness the opening production, AClassmate@...Mr. Mann has not spared expense in remodeling his building here into a commodious and up-to-date picture house. It seats 500 and is equipped with splendid picture machines and a large size Fotoplayer, is steam heated and richly carpeted. A commodious waiting room, handsomely furnished, is located at the right of the entrance on Main Street. The theatre has a large stage with attractive scenery and a modern fireproof operating room. It is attractively lighted and a large electric sign adds much to the appearance of the exterior. M.M. Lasley is manager of the new picture house, B. Adams operator, and Miss Ernestine Jennings presides at the ticket office...(1/16/25)

M.M. Lasley of Los Gatos arrived in Ferndale a few days ago to accept the position of manager of the new State Theatre in Ferndale. Mr. Lasley is a former Humboldtter, having spent his boyhood days in Blue Lake, where his father, CC Lasley, conducted a pharmacy for many years...(12/26/24)

ENTERPRISE OFFICE (NORTHWEST CORNER)

J. Loewenthal's handsome new store was opened to the public last Saturday in Ferndale. (October 16, 1900)

Kerri Brothers have been awarded the contract of building a new Enterprise office, which is to be located between A. Berding Store and T.H. Brown's blacksmith shop on Main Street, Ferndale. Work will be commenced on the new structure in a few days. (July 24, 1896)

The Kerri family took a tumble while at work on the new Enterprise Office Saturday. The staging broke and down they came in a pile. The old gentleman lost a tooth, Bob had the bridge of his nose peeled and Ed's bicycle was knocked all out of shape. (August 11, 1896)

The new Enterprise office is nearing completion. (August 18, 1896)

The new Enterprise building is now ready for occupancy and tomorrow morning we are to begin the work of moving our office into its new home. In consequence, next Tuesday mornings issue will be considerably abridged. In fact, it may be that we will be compelled to miss that issue of the paper entirely. If so, our readers by this notice will know the reason. We desire also to apologize to our patrons for the limited amount of news in this issue. During the past few days we have been overrun with extra work, but once located in our new quarters, it will be our constant aim to keep the Enterprise right up to the desired mark. We thank our patrons. (August 21, 1896)

Painters Wilson and Kropp neatly varnished the front of the new Enterprise office yesterday. (September 11, 1896)

Proprietor of the Enterprise desire to return thanks to Editor Ring of the Oracle for favors extended us yesterday. For the last few issues we have been having trouble with the rollers on the paper press and our readers have undoubtedly noticed the poor print we have been giving them of late. This week the rollers were completely black on us and as the new ones ordered had failed to arrive we were completely "up a stomp", but brother Ring kindly permitted us to use his press thus enabling us to get this issue of our paper out for which we are truly grateful. (November 27, 1896)

Will Butler of the enterprise force is down with the Measles...head typo, P.G. Frost... (May 28, 1897)

...the undersigned will retire from active service from the Enterprise office for several weeks and maybe longer, Mr. S.C. Hart, junior member of the Enterprise firm, will conduct the paper... (June 4, 1897)

Job Printing...we will be prepared to do all work in the job printing line...we have spared no expense in fitting up for this line of work...we have also secured the services of Mr. James Berry of San Francisco, acknowledged to be one of the best and most artistic job

printers on this coast, and in a few days we will be in a position to turn out job printing that will not fail to please and gratify patrons...Ferndale Enterprise... (April 28, 1899)

In our last issue in mentioning the fact that the Enterprise was of age, and in stating also that a job plant had been added to this office, we gave the reasons for the job printing departure on our part, and since our would-be contemporary down the street seems to have been "struck" by our statements and saw fit to make reply to them, we have concluded to give to our readers a few additional facts regarding our relations with the publishers of that paper, which happens to be so appropriately named -- The Exchange. Some few months ago the senior member of Ferndale's new publishing firm informed the Enterprise that he and his brother were about to buy the Independent newspaper and job plant on the installment plan, that they proposed discontinuing the publication of the paper and intended devoting their attention entirely to job printing, adding that he was convinced from past experience that there was a field in Ferndale for only one newspaper and one job office. We replied to him that was the exact point we had maintained at all times and he asked if we would continue to give him our job work in the future as we had done in the past. We answered in the affirmative, and continued to do exactly as we agreed. A few weeks after he made the purchase he again approached us, stating that he intended shipping his newspaper press below in exchange for a larger job press, and that he had some newspaper type which we could use and which he would like to sell us, as he desired to purchase a safe from H.H. Hatch. He said that if we would purchase the material it would help him out financial, and we did so and paid him for it. A few weeks after this he informed us, as we stated in our last issue, that in the future he could not allow us a percentage on our job orders, adding that as we had all the newspaper business he should have all the job printing, and to this proposition we also assented, paying him cash the first of every month for what he did for us in this line, and taking our chances, whatever changes there were, in collecting pay for the work. Not long after this he approached us again, this time with the information that he had decided to publish a newspaper, but gave as his reason that he was afraid an opposition would strike Ferndale with both a newspaper and job plant, and he wanted to keep it out, or in other words "didn't want anyone else to come here and make an honest living in the printing business, etc. etc" - pardon us from quoting the last sentence from his Thursday morning's article. We then told Mr. Matthews that we did not fear an opposition, that we had done business here for years, was firmly established, had the confidence of the people and if with all these advantages we could not meet opposition we ought to lose the field. We also reminded him that he had conducted a job printing office here for years and ought to be able to hold his trade, but he replied "I can't stand an opposition and I am going to start." It was our reply as quoted above that he now interprets into a statement made by us that we had a "cinch" on the business and we proposed to keep it. We further informed him that if he started in the newspaper business we did not propose to help feed it with our job orders for that wouldn't be business, and he then tried to explain that his paper would not be conducted as an opposition but issued for the purpose of keeping out somebody else, but this explanation didn't go and we conducted to put in a job plant, get what patronage we could, and cut loose from any business relations with him...and when our job plant arrived the very next issue of the Exchange came out with a scare head announcing a semi-weekly, which was the best of evidence that our support in the job line was "missed."...Surely the Messrs Matthews -- even though they themselves made the proposition to devote their time hereafter exclusively to job printing -- have the privilege of conducting a newspaper in Ferndale, but we have the same right to go into the job printing business, and we here repeat our "cinch" statement that we do not fear an opposition, that we are willing to take our changes, and if they or anybody else can do better by the public than we can, if they or anybody else can give the people a better paper than we can for the same or less money, let them take the field, but we have no forebodings whatever. Mr. William Matthews is the same gentleman who launched the Valley Oracle into existence six or seven years ago, and it came to the front with a grand flourish of trumpets, but the public knows its fate. He now comes forth with another paper, but what its fate will be the future will tell. The Matthews Bros will always find the proprietors of this paper willing to extend them any professional courtesy or favor, but the Enterprise newspaper and job office will remain open for business just the same...Carr & Hart. (May 19, 1899)

Mr. Jas H. Berry, who for the past three months and a half has been in charge of the Enterprise job department, leaves for Eureka the first of next week to accept a similar position in the Times office... (August 8, 1899)

The Enterprise proprietors... arranged to retain the services of Mr. James H. Berry, who has been in charge of the Enterprise job department for the last four months...has decided to continue with our office... (August 18, 1899)
...on October 1st I sold and disposed of my interest in the Ferndale Enterprise to Pearl G. Frost, who in conjunction with my former partner, S.C. Hart, will hereafter conduct the same...E.B. Carr (October 24, 1899)

E.B. Carr, late of the Ferndale Enterprise, is clerk of the Senate Judiciary Committee, of which Senator Gillett retains the chairmanship. Ed is modest and nervous, but he boys have convinced him that it is not necessary to carry a lantern after dark... (February 9, 1900)

Chester Sonneborn has accepted a position in the Enterprise Office. (March 6, 1900)

Enterprise...our circulation is between 1000 and 1100 paying... (May 25, 1900)

James H. Berry, who, for a number of months past has been in charge of the Enterprise job office, has resigned his situation and was an outgoing passenger on Friday's Del Norte on his way to Portland, Oregon, where he goes to accept a position as traveling salesman for a large jewelry house. His wife will sojourn in the mountains of southern Humboldt a time for the benefit of her health. ... (June 12, 1900)

The publishers of the Enterprise have made arrangements with the American Type Founders Co of SF to supply us with a seven-column quarto instead of the six-column one which we are now printing. This will prove advantageous to our advertisers and will furnish our subscribers with a number of columns more of reading matter twice a week. Our enlargement will appear in about two weeks and we hope it will meet with the approval of our patrons. (August 10, 1900)

The Enterprise goes to its readers this morning in an enlarged form and will henceforth be issued as a seven-column eight-page paper...The subscription price of the Enterprise will remain the same, \$2.50 per year... (August 31, 1900)

Elmer Trousdale has resigned his position in the Enterprise office and departed Wed for SF to seek employment. H.N. Briggs has taken his place in this office. (October 12, 1900)

Dan Fletcher came over from Fortuna Tuesday and is at present employed in the Enterprise office. The young man came down from Glendale a few days ago, where he has been taking care of his mother, who suffered a stroke of paralysis a short time ago. (August 16, 1901)

We desire to inform our patrons and the public in general that Mr. E.B. Carr of Ferndale has purchased a one-third interest in the Enterprise, and will be associated with us on and after November 1st, next Friday...Hart & Frost. (October 29, 1901)

In addition there will also be four windows in the composing room, with all the other rooms liberally supplied with glass...The new building will have a floor space of 2240 feet as compared with 1200 feet in the old building, thus providing the increased room which has urgently needed by The Enterprise newspaper and printing business...The Enterprise will occupy temporary quarters in the Berding building on the corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue. Giacomini and Walter Boyd, and the business will be looked after by Mr. Boyd, assisted by Herbert Johnson, the latter having been connected with the saloon for some little time. (March 2, 1909)

Will Flowers and Thomas Boyd were this week engaged in putting new foundation blocks under the Ben Hart building at the corner of Main and Brown Streets, occupied by Giacomini & Boyd's place of business. The foundation had been in position for many years and in places was badly rotted. (June 11, 1909)

Walter Reynolds, who has been employed at the Mirror Saloon for some time past, has purchased from Geo. J. Hansen a half interest in the Central and will in future be associated with Mr. Hansen in conducting the business. No one has been selected to succeed Mr. Reynolds at the Mirror as yet. (November 5, 1909)

Arthur Johnson of this town, who some months ago passed the civil service examination, has received an appointment as clerk in the Ferndale postoffice, succeeding Mrs. Julia Givins, who has filled the position for several years past. Mr. Johnson entered upon his duties this week. (12/10/26)

William Ott has accepted a position as clerk in the Ferndale postoffice. (1/11/29)

Mrs. Hattie Roberts has tendered her resignation as clerk in the Ferndale Postoffice and next Monday will assume charge of the Clark school, in the Table Bluff section. (1/4/29)

It is now hoped to have the building ready for occupancy shortly after the middle of November. There will be two stores in the building, the larger to be occupied by Cruikshanks & Eriksen, men's furnishers, and the other by Jeweler P.M. Canepa. The building will have a modern stucco front, with attractive display windows, and will be a credit to the town. The building to be vacated by Cruikshanks & Eriksen will be occupied by Adrian Chapin and Lee Reinhart, who are to establish an up-to-date electrical store. (10/31/24)

HARNESS SHOP (North side) 1893

B.L. Waite, the harness maker, has posters out announcing an auction sale of harness, saddles, etc., at his establishment tomorrow. (June 15, 1894)

Much of B.L. Waite's stock of harnesses and saddles was disposed of at his auction sale Saturday. Joe Kerfoot did the shouting and good fixtures were realized. (June 22, 1894)

B.L. Waite took his departure for San Francisco on 12/27 and expects to be absent several months...his brother Frank Waite is in charge of his harness business in Ferndale... (January 3, 1896)

A bill of sale from B.L. Waite, Jr. to B.L. Waite, Sr., conveying the saddlery and harness factory in Ferndale, was filed for record Tuesday morning. The consideration was \$1,000. (March 20, 1896)

Through the assistance of Mr. J.E. Foster, our young friend Will Dougherty has succeeded to the proprietorship of the harness business formerly conducted by B.L. W.F. Campbell of Eureka has leased the Foster building...in which he will open up a harness shop and store in a few days. (March 8, 1898)

Henry Ott has accepted a position with W.F. Campbell, Ferndale's new harness maker, now in business in the Foster Building, Main Street. (March 25, 1898)

W.F. Campbell, the Ferndale harness maker, has decided to retire from business and in consequence is offering for sale his entire stock of light and heavy single and double harness saddles, whips, ropes, etc. (August 26, 1898)

On last Tuesday evening, "Jack" Cardoza gave a free dance in the capacious room back of his store in the Mullady building. Kausen's Band furnished the best of music for the dancers, and Thos Flowers acted as prompter, and all who participated pronounced the affair a most decided success. Mr. Cardoza and wife served refreshments at midnight, and a bang-up time was had all around. Jack's many friends are now hoping that he will "repeat" in the near future. (November 16, 1894)

James Mullady paid this office a call the other evening, and desires us to state for him that he is well satisfied with the manner in which the Kerri Bros constructed his new building in Ferndale. He says the boys did him a first-class job, and filled their contract to the letter. Mr. Mullady has one of the neatest buildings in the town, and we hope it will prove a profitable investment, and we have no doubt but what it will. (November 23, 1894)

An addition 16x26 feet is to be built on the rear of the new Mullady building to be used as a kitchen for the Creamery Restaurant, which is to be moved January 1st, into the room back of Jack Cardoza's variety store. Kerri Bros are to do the work. (December 21, 1894)

We are informed that C.A. Monroe of the American Hotel, has rented the Second story of the new Mullady building. It is to be apportioned into sleeping apartments. (November 2, 1894)

A lease from James Mullady to L.N. Cardoza for the lower store of a building adjoining the Meng Building in Ferndale, for three years - from 11/1/94, at a yearly rental of \$20/month for the first three months, then \$22.50/month for the remainder of the term. Was filed for record 2/25. (March 1, 1895)

The Kerri bros are pushing work on the rear addition to the Mullady Building to be used as a kitchen for the Creamery Restaurant, which is to be moved into the capacious room back of J. Cardoza's store. (January 4, 1895)

Abbie E., wife of J. Cardoza, has filed for record the inventory of her separate estates, consisting of the stock in the confectionery store in Ferndale, also two buggies. (May 10, 1895)

G.W. Dungan has moved his undertaking parlors into the new Mullady building upstairs. (February 8, 1895)

The CCC's are contemplating moving their club rooms to the Mullady building, which will be fitted up for them if satisfactory arrangements can be made. They will occupy the entire second floor... (September 27, 1895)

...Cream City Cycling Club...it was decided to rent the upper story of the Mullady building for their club rooms. It will be fixed up for them immediately. They will have a large reading room in the front part of the building, while the rear will be used as a billiard room and social hall. Between these rooms are situated a cloak room, bathroom and closets... (October 18, 1895)

T.L. Wilson has neatly finished the second story of the Mullady building which the CCCC is to occupy. (October 25, 1895)

The members of the CCC and their lady friends will christen the clubs new quarters at the Mullady building tomorrow night. (November 8, 1895)

On Thursday evening of last week, the editor of this paper accepted an invitation to and attend a "smoker" given by the CCCC in their club rooms in the Mullady building. The boys have their quarters very comfortably fitted up and occupy the entire upper story of the structure. The large room in the rear is used as a billiard and card parlor, and the two front rooms are utilized as reading rooms, and are furnished with all conveniences. (March 31, 1896)

Rooms are being fitted up in the first floor of the Mullady building in the rear of Cardoza's Confectionery and Cigar Store for the occupancy of Mr. and Mrs. Cardoza and family who are to reside there hereafter, instead of on the Island...a residence and one acre of land to rent, inquire of Jack Cardoza, Ferndale... T. Gunderson has opened a tailor shop in the second story of the Mullady building, Main Street. (October 13, 1896)

Kirri Brothers have been busy the past week putting up partitions in the upper story of the Mullady building on Main Street. (August 6, 1897)

Jack Cardoza, the confectioner and fruit dealer, will remain in the Mullady building, having secured a lease of the same for three years, this week. (October 1, 1897)

Mr. Christensen and family who recently arrived from Nebraska have taken rooms in the Mullady building above J. Cardoza's store. (December 17, 1897)

Mrs. Winslow and daughter of Waddington have moved into the upper story of the Mullady building on Main Street. (August 16, 1898)

Tuesday evening at the home of the groom's mother in Ferndale Judge James Smith united in marriage Oliver P. Winslow and Miss Lulu P. Crowl, daughter of E.G. Crowl of this valley. (April 28, 1899)

Jack Cardoza and family will take up their residence on the Island about the first of April. Jack and his wife will continue to conduct business in Ferndale, however. (February 17, 1899)

Jack Cardoza and family moved from Ferndale Friday to their home on the Island. Mr. and Mrs. Cardoza will continue in business however in the cream city. (April 18, 1899)

Jack Cardoza has a furnished room to let. (July 14, 1899)

Having decided to accept a position with a bicycle company of Chicago, I hereby offer for sale my entire stock of notions, candy, tobacco and cigars, lease of building, etc., at a sacrifice. In order to reduce my stock during the holidays quote below a few prices at retail...Jack Cardoza. (December 12, 1899)

"Jack" Cardoza has decided to retire from business in Ferndale, and consequently will offer for sale at public auction, beginning August 15th, his entire stock of bicycles, notions, tobacco, cigars, etc. (August 10, 1900)

Chris Christensen and Andrew Damgaard will open a saloon the first of the month in the Mullady building, now occupied by Jack Cardoza, who intends to retire from business. (October 19, 1900)

The lower floor of the Mullady building is being remodeled for Damgaard & Christensen, who will soon open a saloon there. Bert Matthews and Bert Haywood are doing the work. (November 2, 1900)

Damgaard & Christensen will open their saloon in Ferndale next Saturday evening. (November 13, 1900)

The Tivoli saloon, Christensen and Damgaard, props was opened to the public in Ferndale Wednesday evening.... (November 23, 1900)

Hans Christensen has accepted a position as dispenser of liquid refreshments in Damgaard & Christensen's "Tivoli" saloon on Main Street. (February 8, 1901)

Christensen & Damgaard, proprietors of the Tivoli Saloon in Ferndale, have dissolved partnership, the first-named gentleman retiring from the business, which will be conducted in the future solely by Mr. Damgaard. Chris is yet undecided as to what he will do. (May 21, 1901)

Andrew A. Damgaard of Ferndale and Miss Selma Seablum of Eureka, married Saturday evening, Eureka...Mr. and Mrs. Damgaard will make their home in Ferndale, where the groom is engaged in business. (October 22, 1901)

Early Sunday morning Ferndale had a very narrow escape from what might have been a most disastrous conflagration. At about 4 o'clock a.m. Matt Olsen, the night bar tender at A. Damgaard's Tivoli saloon in Jas Mullady's building on Main Street, heard something popping, and opening the back door saw the reflection of a blaze on the side fence. He lost no time to making an investigation, and in the woodshed found a fire crawling up the partition which separates the woodshed from the main building. He immediately "hooked on" the hose to a faucet, and in a minute or so had the fire out, but it was discovered none too soon. In fact, had Mr. Olsen even been in the front of the saloon or out of hearing of the snapping the result would have been a conflagration and a bad one, for no place in the entire town affords a better chance for a fire to make rapid headway, owing to the number of sheds, etc., there situated. That the fire was the work of an incendiary there seems but little if any doubt, for Mr. Olsen found a number of boxes piled one on the other, with straw, excelsior, etc., intermingled, and to which the match had been applied, and these boxes were previously scattered around the woodshed, it not having been the custom to pile them up in one place. Suspicion points to a certain party as the offender, but he may be entirely innocent, as there is nothing as yet, aside from a mere suspicion, to connect him with the crime. The matter should be thoroughly investigated, however, for the offense is a most diabolical one, notwithstanding it resulted in no damage. The fact that the blaze was discovered in time was simply a piece of good luck, and had the fire had two minutes more of a start, Ferndale would have had a blaze that would have proven most costly. Not only the Mullady but the Meng building, the Gill buildings, B.O. Hart's structures, the Boynton & Hall warehouse, and probably several other buildings would have gone up in smoke without a doubt. (June 17, 1902)

Chris Christensen, Matt Olsen and another party have purchased from Andrew Damgaard the Tivoli Saloon in Ferndale, but it is stated that Mr. Damgaard will retain an interest in the business. Andrew and his wife will leave next week for San Francisco, in which city they will perhaps make their home. (January 30, 1903)

Carpenters Kerri were at work Wednesday making improvements at the Tivoli Saloon, the front of which has been set back several feet. The interior of the Tivoli is also to be repapered and repainted. (February 6, 1903)

Painters Matthews and Hartley were engaged this week in repainting the interior and front of the Tivoli saloon. Messrs Christensen and Olsen, the proprietors of this resort, are also to lay linoleum on the floor in the front part of their building and will certainly have a very neat place of business when the improvements are completed. (July 1, 1904)

At the Eureka parsonage of the Norwegian-Danish church in Eureka, on August 2d, married of Mr. Mads Olsen and Miss Helga Nelsen, both of Ferndale...Mr. Olsen is one of the proprietors of the Tivoli Saloon, Ferndale... (August 9, 1904)

Chris Christensen has sold his interest in the Tivoli Saloon to Will Stevens, who for some time has been employed at this resort. Mr. Christensen tells us that he is as yet undecided as to what line of business he will next engage in or as to where he will locate... (March 21, 1905)

Ferndale is to have a new chop house, which will be started some time this week. The new eating place will be located in the room to the rear of the Tivoli Saloon, which has been neatly fitted up for this purpose. Chas Poinsett is managing the new venture. (October 31, 1905)

...noticed the ad of the Tivoli Cafe, opened to the public last evening by Elwood Poinsett... (November 10, 1905)

Wednesday evening of this week Michael Sullivan of Grizzly Bluff purchased Will Stevens' interest in the Tivoli saloon in Ferndale and has assumed part management of the business...new firm of Olsen & Sullivan... (November 17, 1905)

Will Stevens, who recently disposed of his interest in the Tivoli saloon to M. Sullivan...departs for his old home in Chicago... (December 8, 1905)

E. Poinsett, who has been conducting a short order lunch counter at the Tivoli saloon on Main Street for the last couple of months,

disposed of his business last Friday to B. Rasmussen of Eureka... (December 19, 1905)

Will Stevens, who returned to Ferndale recently from a short visit to relatives in the East, has purchased the interest in the Tivoli Saloon in this place, owned by Matt Olsen. Mr. Stevens recently disposed of a half interest in the business to M. Sullivan. Mr. Olsen and family will remain in this section through the coming summer at least, and may decide to stay here permanently. (January 30, 1906)

What might have been one of the most destructive fires that ever visited Ferndale occurred last Sunday morning, and but for the efficient and hard work done by our volunteer fire department, made possible by Ferndale's new gasoline engine, a large portion of the business section of the Cream City would have gone up in smoke. The fire, which was discovered about a few minutes after six o'clock, was seen first by Amos Cummings of Union Mattole, who had passed the night in Ferndale and had risen early...The blaze originated in the James Mullady building on Main Street, and when discovered the flames were shooting from the southwest portion of the roof of the structure, high into the sky, and from appearances at the time seem to have gained such headway that the building itself and those of B.O. Hart and M.P. Meng adjoining were doomed. The flames originated in the second room from the front of the building on the upper floor and are supposed to have been caused by the occupant of the room carelessly throwing a match or a lighted cigar onto the floor...did not finally quench the flames until after an hour or so of the hardest kind of work...the flames were confined entirely to the upper story of the building in which they started...The principal damage done by fire was to the upper floor of the Mullady building, which is used as a rooming house and conducted by Messrs. Sullivan & Stevens, who are also proprietors of the Tivoli Saloon, occupying the ground floor of the structure....Mr. Hart's loss consists of a good portion of the roof of the north end of his building being injured by fire and also by the water used in bringing the blaze under subjection...J.R. Flynn, whose barber shop is located on the ground floor of the Hart building, was also flooded with water...he is now conducting his business in the office building a few doors to the north, recently vacated by Dr. Miller, but will again be ready to serve his customers in his old stand in a few days... (March 6, 1906)

Jay Weaver, who lodges in one of the rooms in the Mullady building, wherein Sunday morning's fire occurred, had some difficulty in getting out of the burning building in that he is so unfortunate as to have lost one of his legs and only walks with the aid of an artificial limb. When Jay was awakened smoke was entering his room, and in the little time left him to make his escape saving nothing but the clothing he could first lay his hands upon. His belongings were not injured by the fire which did not reach his room, but were so badly damaged by water that his loss will not be an altogether small one. (March 6, 1906)

Owing to the work of remodeling the Tivoli Saloon building on Main Street which has been going on the last few days, the resort has been closed to the public... (March 13, 1906)

The work of repairing the damage to the Tivoli saloon building on Main Street, caused by the fire of a couple of weeks ago, is progressing quite rapidly and already the structure has been roofed, paper being used as a covering instead of shingles. It will be two or three weeks, however, before the carpenters will complete the job. The work of repapering and repainting the interior of the lower story, in which is located Messrs Sullivan & Stevens' saloon, will not be long delayed now. (March 20, 1906)

Sullivan & Stevens of the Tivoli saloon have completed the renovation of their place of business, damaged so badly as a result of the fire in the building a few weeks ago. Tomorrow evening a roast pig lunch will be served at the resort (April 3, 1906)

Will Stevens has sold his interest in the Tivoli Saloon on Main Street to his partner, Michael Sullivan, who will hereafter conduct the same with the assistance of Budd Dudley as bartender. Mr. Sullivan tells us that he is expecting a cousin of his from San Francisco, a saloon man of experience, who may decide to purchase an interest in the business and make the Cream City his permanent home. Mr. Stevens has decided to remain in Ferndale and has accepted the position of clerk at the American Hotel. (May 15, 1906)

George L. Collins, who lately severed his connections with the Mirror Saloon in Ferndale, is now in the employ of M. Sullivan, proprietor of the Tivoli saloon. (February 14, 1908)

C.H. Matthews commenced work Friday repainting the front of the Tivoli saloon on Main Street. Mr. Matthews, assisted by A.L. Trousdale, has been at work of late renovating the interior of Mrs. C. Kinzel's residence on Craig Street. (February 25, 1908)

George Collins, who the last month or two has been employed at the Tivoli saloon, has accepted a position with S.P. Giacomini, the Ferndale wholesale liquor dealer. (April 7, 1908)

The Tivoli saloon, Ferndale, conducted the last couple of years by M. Sullivan, closed its doors last Saturday, the result of an attachment levied by P. Delaney, the Eureka wholesale liquor dealer, who is one of the principal creditors, and who was a visitor to the Cream City Saturday. (April 24, 1908)

Messrs. Kelley and Fredericks, of Eureka, have been in Ferndale this week, and while here purchased the Tivoli saloon in this place, until recently conducted by M. Sullivan. The gentlemen expect to reopen the business to the public as soon as possible. (May 29, 1908)

Frank Lithgow, who lately returned to the cream city from other parts of the state, has purchased a half interest in the Tivoli saloon on Main Street from Mr. Fredericks. (September 22, 1908)

Carpenters James Scott and Chris Hansen were at work this week making repairs to the upper story of the Mullady building on Main Street. (November 20, 1908)

F.C. Lithgow has sold his interest in the Tivoli Saloon to his partner, F. Kelly, who will hereafter conduct this place of business. (June 22, 1909)

August Reynolds has purchased a half interest in the Tivoli saloon on Main Street, and will hereafter devote his time to managing the place. (December 3, 1909)

Jack Dougherty has purchased the Tivoli Saloon, which has been closed the last week, and will reopen the business shortly. (October 4, 1910)

A change in the ownership of the Tivoli Saloon in Ferndale took place this week, when Jack Dougherty sold his half-interest in the business to George J. Hansen. The saloon has been under the management of Dougherty & Carter for the past year or more and Mr. Carter will still be connected with the business... (July 21, 1911)

George Hansen and family have taken up their residence in the rooms on the upper floor of the Tivoli building. Mrs. Hansen departed the first of the week for a visit to San Francisco and other points. (August 25, 1911)

The Tivoli saloon in this town was closed yesterday. We are unable to state whether or not the business will be reopened, but report has it that Proprietor Geo. Hansen has retired from the management of the place. (April 2, 1912)

Ferndale is to have another grocery store. The proprietor will be Lars Larsen, who expected to have a new place of business open to the public shortly after the first of March..the new store will be located in the Mullady building on Main Street, which was this week purchased by James Jensen and will be fitted up in a first-class manner for Mr. Larsen. The deal for the purchase of the Mullady building was made through W.H. Robarts, the Ferndale real estate dealer. Mrs. James Mullady and daughter, Miss Jennie, were the owners of the property. The building was at one time occupied as a saloon, but has been vacant for a considerable length of time. it is finely located in the central part of the town and when remodeled will make a fine store building. Mr. Larsen and family, we are told, plan to make their home in the living rooms upstairs when the work of remodeling it is completed. (February 14, 1913)

Frank Flint is now engaged in remodeling the building recently purchased by James Jensen and which is to be occupied by Lars Larsen's new grocery store. The structure is being thoroughly overhauled and will make a most attractive and convenient store building. (February 21, 1913)

Lars Larsen will open his new grocery store in the Mullady building on Main Street, recently purchased by James Jensen, next Thursday afternoon at 2 o'clock. (March 18, 1913)

Joseph Russ and family have taken possession of the Ferguson residence in North Ferndale, recently vacated by Lars Larsen and family, who now have rooms in the Jensen building on Main Street, over the Larsen store. (April 11, 1913)

Frank Slingsby and assistants are engaged in enlarging Larsen's grocery store in Ferndale. A new warehouse is being built, and the present warehouse will be made a part of the main store. (May 5, 1914)

Hartley Bros, have repainted the Jensen building on Main Street, occupied by Larsen's Grocery Store, this week... (June 19, 1914)

A deal was consummated the last of the week whereby Lars Larsen sold his Ferndale grocery business to Carl Marcussen of Eureka. Mr. Larsen has been engaged in business in this town for some five years. He is not fully decided as to his future movements, but with his wife and children expects to move to the central part of the state and will probably engage in business there Mr. Marcussen has been engaged in the grocery business in Eureka and has had ten years= experience in the business. He has already taken over the management of the Larsen store, and the business will be conducted under the name of the Marcussen Grocery Co...(January 1, 1918)

Miss Emma Jacobsen of Ferndale has accepted a position at the Store of the Marcussen Grocery Co. In this town. (January 8, 1918)

Carl Marcussen returned to Ferndale the latter part of the week from Eureka, where he had been ill, and has resumed his duties in the store of the Marcussen Grocery Co...(February 5, 1918)

M.P. Meng is ready for business in his new quarters. (September 14, 1894)

J.L. Johnston, who for several years has been employed at M.P. Meng's shoe shop, left on the Weott for his old home in Denmark. The Oracle says he is not to return. (March 6, 1896)

Phil Franks who is a cobbler by trade, is assisting at M.P. Meng's...whenever his services are required...Mr. Johnston has gone back to Denmark. (March 6, 1896)

Marriage of our young friend, Andrew P. Meng, son of Merchant M.P. Meng and wife, to Miss Hancena Schmidt, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nels Schmidt of the Waddington Section...the ceremony took place at the home of the bridegroom in Ferndale on the evening of March 19th, the Rev. S.R. Wood tying the knot and a number of relatives and invited guests were present. (March 27, 1896)

An experienced man from San Francisco will be in charge of the new store which opens for business tomorrow. It will go under the name of the Ferndale Cash and Carry Store. (4/24/25)

M.M. Magnus, having sold his Creamery Restaurant to Mr. Leon Bravo, formerly of Swauger. That gentleman is in charge of this popular eating place...Mr. Magnus and his wife left yesterday for Eureka...then Melbourne, Australia...to live with a wealthy brother... (October 6, 1896)

Leon Bravo, proprietor of the Creamery Restaurant inserts his ad. Mr. Bravo is setting up fine meals for 25 cents and is setting up a bakery. (November 10, 1896)

Mrs. Coffren has rented the Creamery Restaurant from Leon Bravo and will hereafter conduct the same. Mr. Bravo is undecided as what he will next do. (April 6, 1897)

H.J. Mueller offers for sale the creamery restaurant in Ferndale with all its fixtures... (July 2, 1897)

It is understood that the company will remove their central office in the Williams building into their new purchase. (September 14, 1906)

The Hartley Bros began work yesterday repainting the building on Main Street soon to be occupied by the Sunset Telephone Co as a central office. (September 28, 1906)

Carpenter James Scott is at work remodeling the interior of the building on Main Street, opposite the postoffice, in which the Sunset Telephone Co's central office will be located. Manager E. McLaren of Eureka was in Ferndale Tuesday making arrangements for the removal of the office into its new quarters, which will be within the next two or three weeks. (September 28, 1906)

The building formerly occupied by B. Olander, the tailor, on Main Street, which has been rearranged and repainted for the Sunset Co's central office in Ferndale, is now ready for occupancy, and the company will move into its new quarters in a day or two. E.M. The formal transfer of the Ferndale Telephone Exchange has been made to the Eel River and Southern Telephone Company, the new corporation formed to take over the plant. The holdings of the new company date from January 1st, and includes all the lines, poles, circuits and telephone equipment belonging to the Ferndale Exchange proper, in fact the entire plant, with the exception of long distance lines and poles, which are not included in the deal and remain the property of the old company... (January 13, 1911)

The office room in front of the Hart Theatre, occupied for a time as campaign headquarters for the Ferndale General Hospital, has been leased by E.M. Loveland, who will move the Western Union offices there from its present location in the telephone building. (June 24, 1921)

Miss Margaret Fletcher has resigned her position at the Ferndale telephone central office and has accepted a position as bookkeeper at Hough Bros. Garage in this town. (3/28/24)

W.B. Foshay Co. Is placed in hands of court receiver...he believes that in the process of settlement the utilities will be separated from the various other activities of the Foshay Co and that the people holding the utility stock will suffer little or no loss...considerable of the Foshay stock is held by people in Ferndale and other parts of the county...The Foshay Co. Had completed negotiations for the purchase of the Francis Land & Water Co. In Ferndale and permission for the sale had been given by the State Railroad Commission. The deal had not been completed, however, and it is considered certain that the transaction will now fall through. (11/8/29)

(4/11/24)

Frederick W. Fowler, for the past several months manager for the Eel River & Southern Telephone Co. Since that concern was taken over by the Public Utilities California Corporation, will shortly leave for Cedar City, Utah...his successor in Ferndale has not yet been named...(10/4/29)

Mrs. Edith Rodoni has accepted a position with the Eel River & Southern Telephone Co. In Ferndale. (12/6/29)

Frederick W. Fowler, late of Crescent City, where he has been in charge of the Foshay interests, has arrived in Ferndale to succeed E.M. Loveland as manager of the Eel River & Southern Telephone Co., the controlling interest in which has been taken over by the Foshay Co...E.M. Loveland, who retires as manager, has been at the head of the Eel River & Southern Telephone Co. Since its organization many years ago and has conducted its business very successfully. He will now devote his time to the management of his AParis Shop@ in the Hart building and will also continue as manager of the Western Union business here....(5/31/29)

BUILDING (1-1/2 story) (center of lot)

The top of D&G's furniture store was ornamented Wed morning with about as hard a looking gang as one usually sees collected together. It is not an every day occurrence to see so many men suddenly appear on a roof top and believing there was a fire a good chance of a "column scoop" we lost little time in making inquiry. But we were disappointed. Kerri Bros had simply taken a contract to reshingle the roof and in order to cover the south side, which had been striped before the storm should resume, as threatened, it was necessary for them to put a large crew at work. The job was done in exhibitionist style. One-half the building being covered with shingles before the noon hour had arrived. (December 1, 1893)

Henry Hansen, who recently purchased the Ferndale furniture business of G.W. Dungan has succeeded in selling off nearly the entire stock of goods and has closed his business in this place. A few articles remaining were taken to his place of business in Fortuna. (January 11, 1895)

H.W. McNeal, will conduct a nightly auction when he opens his store in the building formerly occupied by the Dungan furniture store. Mr. Sessions will act as auctioneer. (February 22, 1895)

W.N. Wooldridge has leased the building formerly occupied by the Dungan furniture store and his family will soon take up their residence there. Mrs. Wooldridge and daughter will open a millinery store and dressmaking parlors therein about March 1st and H.W. McNeal has rented a portion of the building in which he will conduct a variety store. (February 22, 1895)

The Kerri brothers were at work this partitioning off the store room next door to the PO and T.L. Wilson was also engaged doing the necessary painting and paper hanging. W.V. Wooldridge and family will reside therein and Mrs. Wooldridge and daughter will open up a dressmaking parlor in a portion of the building. Matthews and Wooldridge Job Office will also occupy a portion of the building and in connection with their business they will carry a full line of stationary. (March 1, 1895)

Matthews and Wooldridge, whose ad appears in this issue, are now located in their new store next to the PO and have a very neat and attractive place of business. They deal exclusively in stationary, school supplies, legal blanks, and in fact have a most complete stock of goods in their line. (March 8, 1895)

Read the opening announcement of Mrs. Wooldridge and Mrs. Sessions in this issue. They are now located in the building next to the post office and next Tuesday is their opening day. They are prepared to do all kinds of dressmaking and sewing and will also carry a stock of millinery. If you spend one dollar with them next Tuesday, you will receive, as a present 3 yards of lace or embroider. (March 15, 1895)

Byron Wooldridge Tuesday morning sold his interest in the Job Printing and stationary establishment of Matthews and Wooldridge to Mr. H.W. McNeal of the New York Racket Store. The new store will be styled Matthews and McNeal. (August 23, 1895)

Matthews and McNeal sold out their stock of stationary, etc. to other Ferndale dealers in that line of goods. They will devote all their attention to job printing hereafter. (August 30, 1895)

H.W. McNeal is to embark in the newspaper business. He is soon to issue a newspaper called the "Political Age" devoted to the interests of the People's Party. The paper will be printed at Matthews Job Office and will be edited by Mrs. McNeal at Port Kenyon. (November 1, 1895)

The "Political Age", H.W. McNeal, publisher breathed its last on Thursday of last week. The newspaper cemetery is gradually filling up. (January 24, 1896)

Leases: H.W. McNeal to W.E. Matthews, 2 interest in the materials and presses used by Matthews at his printing business in Ferndale. The terms being one year from May 1, 1896 at \$60 per year. (May 15, 1896)

H.W. McNeal has sold to his sister, Mrs. Mary L. Roberts of Salem Oregon, a half interest in the printing plant and business conducted by William E. Matthews of Ferndale. It is subject to a chattel mortgage held by D.W. Wooldridge. (May 22, 1896)

George Branstetter has designed and constructed for W.E. Matthews a printing press which will print a half sheet poster and which does the work well. George is a mechanical genius sure enough. (May 26, 1896)

William Matthews moved his job office this week into the "Shell Building" formerly occupied by Thomas Ferguson. Nelson and Hansen tailors, will occupy the quarters vacated by Mr. Matthews. (May 29, 1896)

The room next to the post office has been nicely fitted up for Mr. Hansen's tailor shop. (June 9, 1896)

The Ferndale tailor shop of Theo Hansen, successor to F.C. Nelson, of electric light fame, has gone to the wall. Wednesday all that remained in the shop was turned over to Kerfoot and Daugherty by Mr. Hansen in payment of his indebtedness to that firm. Hansen has evidently had a hard experience in Ferndale and came out of his business venture broke. Nelson, he said, did him up to the queen's taste. (July 3, 1896)

A. Loveland is soon to return to Ferndale from below and will open a boot and shoe repair shop in the building next to the post office, having rented space from job printer, W.E. Matthews. (July 24, 1896)

Job printer W.E. Matthews moved his office yesterday back to the building next to the Post office. (July 24, 1896)

Carr and Hart of the Enterprise and W.E. Matthews of the Ferndale Job printing office are arranging to publish a daily paper during the four days of the Ferndale Fair. Commencing Tuesday September 15th, 1896. This will prove an excellent advertising medium and those who wish space in the fair daily should make arrangements at an early date to secure it. The daily will be issued every morning during the fair and will contain full reports of the exposition together with local news, etc. (August 4, 1896)

A. Loveland arrived on yesterday's Weott. He is to open a boot and shoe repair shop in the building next to the post office. (August 18, 1896)

Mr. Miles A. Simpson is to publish a weekly campaign paper in Ferndale, it will be a four page, six column publication to be known as "The Silver Dollar" and will advocate the cause of free silver. The first issue will appear on September 5th and the paper will be printed at W.E. Matthews job office. Mr. Simpson is an ardent advocate of the free coinage of silver. (August 28, 1896)

The first issue of M.A. Simpson's, "Silver Dollar" made its appearance Saturday morning. It is a neat four column, four page, paper and it is printed at W.E. Matthews job office. Brother Simpson announced in his salutatory that he will advocate the free coinage of silver side of the currency question and he will do his best to elect Bryan to the Presidency. (September 15, 1896)

Will Michel has succeeded C.H. Davis in the Ferndale bill posting firm of Matthews and Davis. (October 9, 1896)

Miss May Hart publishes a notice in this issue on or after next Monday she can be found at Mrs. Wooldridge's millinery store prepared to clean and repair gentleman's clothes. (October 13, 1896)

Miss May Hart can still be found at Mrs. Wooldridge's millinery store. (November 17, 1896)

Miles Simpson and family moved last week from Ferndale to Swauger where Mr. Simpson is to conduct a paper. (December 8, 1896)

A.L. Trousdale has purchased the Ferndale bill posting business of W.E. Matthews. (March 11, 1898)

W.E. Matthews, the Ferndale job printer, has sublet the Ferndale and Port Kenyon mail contract, and will start carrying the mail between these two places on July 1st. (June 17, 1898)

Rumor says that Mrs. Wooldridge will soon remove her stock of millinery to the Foster building and that the Creamery Restaurant will occupy the premises vacated. (October 14, 1898)

...Mrs. Wooldridge, the milliner, intends leaving Ferndale...clearance sale... (October 14, 1898)

W.V. Wooldridge and wife left Ferndale yesterday to take up their residence at Fortuna, where Mrs. Wooldridge will conduct a millinery establishment. (October 25, 1898)

Howard Gay is placing a range in the room in the Gill building recently vacated by Mrs. Wooldridge, which will soon be occupied by the Creamery Restaurant. (November 4, 1898)

Mrs. Coffren has removed the Creamery Restaurant and bakery to the room lately occupied by Mrs. Wooldridge as a millinery store, where she will be pleased to meet old customers and new ones as well... (November 22, 1898)

Matthews brothers of Ferndale now have one of the largest and best job printing offices in the county and guarantee satisfaction in every instance. Their place of business will be at W.E. Matthews old stand... (November 29, 1898)

Matthews Brothers have mortgaged their printing office to Dr. H.J. Ring et al for \$1,050.00 recorded Wednesday. (February 3, 1899)

M. Simpson of the Swauger Record, purchased last week of the Matthews Brothers, the job press, formerly in use in the Rohnerville Herald office. Mr. Simpson is now prepared to do all kinds of job work at Loleta. (February 3, 1899)

...Matthews and Wooldridge Job Office will also occupy a portion of the building...next door to the Post Office... (March 1, 1899)

The Matthews brothers of Ferndale, intend issuing a paper from their job office on Thursday, March 30th and every week thereafter. It will be a small 8 page, 4 column publication, with a subscription price of \$1.25 per year. (March 21, 1899)

The first number of the "Ferndale Exchange", published by Matthews Bros., made its appearance yesterday, and will be issued every Thursday morning hereafter...this is an 8 page publication, 4 columns to the page, with a patented outside of four pages. Typographically it presents a neat appearance, and the paper is well made up. The publishers are entitled to whatever success their efforts merit. (March 31, 1899)

In our last issue in mentioning the fact that the Enterprise was of age, and in stating also that a job plant had been added to this office, we gave the reasons for the job printing departure on our part, and since our would-be contemporary down the street seems to have been "struck" by our statements and saw fit to make reply to them, we have concluded to give to our readers a few additional facts regarding our relations with the publishers of that paper, which happens to be so appropriately named -- The Exchange. Some few months ago the senior member of Ferndale's new publishing firm informed the Enterprise that he and his brother were about to buy the Independent newspaper and job plant on the installment plan, that they proposed discontinuing the publication of the paper and intended devoting their attention entirely to job printing, adding that he was convinced from past experience that there was a field in Ferndale for only one newspaper and one job office. We replied to him that was the exact point we had maintained at all times and he asked if we would continue to give him our job work in the future as we had done in the past. We answered in the affirmative, and continued to do exactly as we agreed. A few weeks after he made the purchase he again approached us, stating that he intended shipping his newspaper press below in exchange for a larger job press, and that he had some newspaper type which we could use and which he would like to sell us, as he desired to purchase a safe from H.H. Hatch. He said that if we would purchase the material it would help him out financial, and we did so and paid him for it. A few weeks after this he informed us, as we stated in our last issue, that in the future he could not allow us a percentage on our job orders, adding that as we had all the newspaper business he should have all the job printing, and to this proposition we also assented, paying him cash the first of every month for what he did for us in this line, and taking our chances, whatever changes there were, in collecting pay for the work. Not long after this he approached us again, this time with the information that he had decided to publish a newspaper, but gave as his reason that he was afraid an opposition would strike Ferndale with both a newspaper and job plant, and he wanted to keep it out, or in other words "didn't want anyone else to come here and make an honest living in the printing business, etc. etc" - pardon us from quoting the last sentence from his Thursday morning's article. We then told Mr. Matthews that we did not fear an opposition, that we had done business here for years, was firmly established, had the confidence of the people and if with all these advantages we could not meet opposition we ought to lose the field. We also reminded him that he had conducted a job printing office here for years and ought to be able to hold his trade, but he replied "I can't stand an opposition and I am going to start." It was our reply as quoted above that he now interprets into a statement made by us that we had a "cinch" on the business and we proposed to keep it. We further informed him that if he started in the newspaper business we did not propose to help feed it with our job orders for that wouldn't be business, and he then tried to explain that his paper would not be conducted as an opposition but issued for the purpose of keeping out somebody else, but this explanation didn't go and we conduced to put in a job plant, get what patronage we could, and cut loose from any business relations with him...and when our job plant arrived the very next issue of the Exchange came out with a scare head announcing a semi-weekly, which was the best of evidence that our support in the job line was "missed."...Surely the Messrs Matthews -- even though they themselves made the proposition to devote their time hereafter exclusively to job printing -- have the privilege of conducting a newspaper in Ferndale, but we have the same right to go into the job printing business, and we here repeat our "cinch" statement that we do not fear an opposition, that we are willing to take our changes, and if they or anybody else can do better by the public than we can, if they or anybody else can give the people a better paper than we can for the same or less money, let them take the field, but we have no forebodings whatever. Mr. William Matthews is the same gentleman who launched the Valley Oracle into existence six or seven years ago, and it came to the front with a grand flourish of trumpets, but the public knows its fate. He now comes forth with another paper, but what its fate will be the future will tell. The Matthews Bros will always find the proprietors of this paper willing to extend them any professional courtesy or favor, but the Enterprise newspaper and job office will remain open for business just the same...Carr & Hart. (May 19, 1899)

Eugene Matthews of the Exchange, leaves for Eureka today, where he will serve on the mail distributing force for a couple of months. (July 11, 1899)

D.E. Gordon arrived in Ferndale...to edit the Exchange until E.L. Matthews returns from Eureka... (August 15, 1899)

W.E. Matthews of the Ferndale Exchange... (September 1, 1899)

Yesterday's Exchange announces that has W.E. Matthews retired from that paper and E.L. Matthews is now sole editor and manager of the same. (October 24, 1899)

Jack Kemp has accepted a position the Exchange office. (January 23, 1900)

Paul Neville, of this place, is now employed as a typo on the Exchange. Paul is an old hand at the business, he having been connected with the old Valley Oracle. (February 2, 1900)

Mrs. Coffron has sold her restaurant business in Ferndale to a Mrs. Sylvester, of Fortuna. Mrs. Coffron and family will move to Seattle, Washington, to reside. (March 27, 1900)

The Exchange came to hand yesterday in a different form, and is now a seven column folio. The name of Dwight L. Looftbourrow appears as editor and that of E.L. Matthews as business manager, they having formed a co-partnership. (March 27, 1900)

D.L. Looftbourrow has resigned the editorship of the Exchange and has accepted the position of station agent of Singley's taking Fred Francis' place, who goes to Bridgeville to take charge of Russ, Early & Williams' store. (May 29, 1900)

Mrs. Coffron has closed her restaurant in Ferndale. (July 17, 1900)

W.H. Otto has purchased the Coffron Restaurant in Ferndale, where his wife will move her bakery. In a short time Mrs. Otto will also be prepared to serve meals to the public. (July 17, 1900)

The interior of the Otto Restaurant on Main Street is being thoroughly renovated, repapered and repainted and when finished will present a very neat appearance. Mrs. Otto has also decided to keep a limited number of lodgers and for this purpose has fitted up the upper floor of the building. She will also conduct a bakery in connection with her restaurant. (July 24, 1900)

The Otto Restaurant will open to the public in Ferndale next Sunday. Miss Alta Williams of Eureka has accepted the position of waitress at that eating place. (July 27, 1900)

The Exchange has been liberally patronized by the people of this valley, and to them and the business men who have patronized the advertising columns of the paper I offer my warmest thanks. I will continue to conduct a job office and will be pleased to receive orders in that line. E.L. Matthews. (November 6, 1900)

W.H. Otto of Ferndale has gone to Seattle to seek employment. (February 12, 1901)

For Sale: Restaurant fixtures and lodging house furniture in Ferndale, also two wagons, two sets of harness, tools, etc. Mrs. W.H. Otto. (March 12, 1901)

C. Christensen, the new proprietor of the Creamery Restaurant on Main Street... (June 4, 1901)

Mr. Christensen, formerly connected with the Tivoli saloon of this place, last week purchased the Creamery Restaurant business on Main Street from Mrs. W.H. Otto. We wish Mr. Christensen all success in his new undertaking. (June 4, 1901)

Many expressions of admiration were heard in reference to the new show house which is one of the neatest little places to be found anywhere. Canepa's orchestra played Friday evening but at present Willard Wagner, a Eureka pianist, is furnishing the music. The new theater is well ventilated and has plenty of exits to do away with any danger of a jam should a panic arise. (January 3, 1911)

Mr. W.E. Wagner, who played the pictures for three evenings after the opening of the new theater, contemplates returning to Ferndale the latter part of this week or the first of next. The patrons of the theater were so well pleased with his playing that Mr. Molrine has decided to engage him... (January 6, 1911)

A deal was concluded this week whereby C.W. Molrine of Ferndale sells his picture theater business in this town to Everett Legg of Fortuna, who will take possession of the same within a few days. Mr. Molrine has decided to remove to Oakland, where he will probably locate permanently, though he is not yet definitely decided in the matter...Mr. Legg, with his wife will make their home in the R.H. Edwards tenement, we are informed. (November 17, 1911)

W.E. Legg, whose purchase of the Valerie Theater in Ferndale was noted in Friday's Enterprise, took possession of the business Sunday. Mr. Legg has had considerable experience in the moving picture business and will doubtless keep the theater up to its present high standard and make a success of his venture. (November 21, 1911)

W.E. Legg, proprietor of the Valerie Theater, has changed the lighting system of his playhouse and the new arrangement is a great improvement over the old. What is known as the invisible lighting system is now used, and two ceiling lights being within bowls which allow the light to reflect over the tops to the ceiling and furnish enough light so that a person may see to read, while not interfering with the picture display. While the pictures are being shown one may look about the theater and all persons are distinctly visible. (July 4, 1912)

A deal has just been concluded whereby W.E. Legg sells the Valerie Theater in Ferndale to Richard Pollock of Scotia, who took possession yesterday. Mr. Pollock is an experienced moving picture man, having conducted a theater at Scotia for some five years past, where he has met with success and has always given the people of that town good entertainment. With his wife he has taken up his residence in the flat over the Valerie Theater...Mr. Legg conducted the Valerie Theater for more than three years past... (December 8, 1914)

The following lease: leases for 4 years from 1/1/1916 at \$30 per month, Valerie Theater on lot 9 in blk 11, Francis Division. Ferndale. (June 15, 1915)

R. Pollock, proprietor of the Valerie Theatre in this town, now has four moving picture shows in his circuit -- Fortuna, Loleta, Rohnerville and Ferndale. (July 23, 1918)

R. Pollock, proprietor of the Valerie Theatre in Ferndale, will probably take possession of the Trilma Theatre in Fortuna on July 15th...W.E. Legg, proprietor of the Trilma, and formerly connected with The Enterprise, plans to go to work at the shipyards...(July 9, 1918)

Manager Pollock of the Valerie Theatre is perfecting plans for the enlargement of his popular little show house in this town. Owing to the fine program of entertainment he is offering, the seating capacity is always taxed to its full capacity, and he is now planning an extension of forty feet to the rear, which will afford him an additional 100 seats...plans to start the improvements early in the spring...(February 13, 1920)

Richard Pollock, proprietor of the Valerie Theatre and Walter Boyd...have entered into partnership to conduct a big motion picture circuit in this county. They have purchased the interests of Byard & Byard, Proprietors of the Minor Theatre in Arcata and the picture houses at Blue Lake, Korbelt and Bulwinkle. Mr. Pollock besides the Valerie Theatre in Ferndale has a circuit with Loleta and Rohnerville included, so that under the new management the circuit will consist of seven picture theatres. Messrs Boyd and Pollock will take over the control of the Arcata circuit on August 1st and Mr. Pollock will be located in Arcata while Mr. Boyd will continue to make his home in Ferndale...Plans are now being considered for the erection of a new concrete theatre building in Ferndale for Messrs. Pollock and Boyd, by Miss Frances Hart on her property next to the post office now occupied by the old wooden building which was formerly used by W.B. Alford as a drug store and one part of which is now used as a shoe shop by Jas. Reinhart. The contract has not yet been let for the new building but it is almost certain that the new theatre is to be built. If constructed it will be something over one hundred feet deep, fireproof and modern in every way. It is probable that in another week the Enterprise will be able to announce the new theatre as a certainty, which will be good news to the people of this vicinity....(July 2, 1920)

The work of remodeling the old Valerie Theatre building, just vacated by the P. & B. Motion Picture Circuit, which is now in the new Hart Theatre, was commenced yesterday. Ernest French is the carpenter in charge, and among his assistants are B.F. Hiller, owner of the building and Budd Dudley, who is to move his restaurant and soft drink emporium to the building when the alterations are completed. (December 3, 1920)

Budd Dudley this week completed the work of moving his restaurant and soft drink emporium from its former quarters in the Hart building to the Hiller building, formerly occupied by the Valerie Theatre. Budd now has a neat and up-to-date place of business. (February 4, 1921)

O.N. Dudley has retired from the management of Dudley's Cafe in Ferndale, which will hereafter be under the direction of B.F. Hiller. (August 19, 1921)

B.F. Hiller of Ferndale is contemplating the leasing of his restaurant in Ferndale to parties from Grant's Pass, Oregon. The deal has not

yet been concluded but probably will be within a few days. (November 18, 1921)

The Hiller building on Main street, formerly occupied as a restaurant, is being renovated and will be used by Mr. Hiller as a meat market. He expects to be open for business in a few days. (May 4, 1923)

Mr. and Mrs. Chas Logan have moved from the Kausen apartments on Main St. to the cottage in North Ferndale recently vacated by Mr. and Mrs. J.K. Neales, who left last week for Texas to reside. (11/12/26)

The Ferndale fire fighters were called last Saturday shortly after one o'clock to quell a blaze at A.P. Winslow=s place of business on Main Street. The fire, the origin of which has not been determined, was located in the rear wall of the building and was quickly extinguished by the aid of the town=s chemical engine...(7/18/24)

Extensive improvements have been made to the building owned and occupied by F. Canclini, proprietor of the Ferndale Shoe Factory, on Main St. An addition has been built onto the rear, a new roof laid and a skylight installed. When the improvements are completed Mr. Canclini will have a very attractive business place. (7/3/25)

The Hiller building, formerly occupied by Optician A.P. Winslow, has been moved a few feet from its former location on Main St., and is being extensively remodeled. It will be occupied by F. Canclini of the Ferndale Shoe Factory in the near future. (10/24/24)

F. Canclini moved his Ferndale shoe repairing establishment this week from its former location in the Henry Ott store to the building which he recently purchased next door to the Dahlquist store. (11/14/24)

Elmer Trousdale is now assisting at Mrs. A.E. Cardoza's Main Street photograph gallery. (October 10, 1899)

We understand that the large hotel building at Port Kenyon will shortly be moved to Ferndale and placed upon the lot adjoining the Post Office where the photograph gallery is now located. The building will be extensively remodeled upon its arrival, so we learn. (July 15, 1898)

Messrs. J. Rasmussen, Peter Nissen, and N.C. Nissen are arranging to erect a fine two-story building on their lot on the corner of Main and Washington Streets, Ferndale. W.S. Fitzell is preparing the plans for the structure, which is to be an ornament to our town. (July 4, 1899)

It is stated that work will commence in about a month on Nissen and Rasmussen's new two-story building in Ferndale, which is to be erected on their lot at the corner of Main and Washington Streets. (July 28, 1899)

The Cardoza photograph gallery roof caught fire early yesterday morning and caused considerable excitement for a few minutes. Several buckets of water sufficed to extinguished the blaze, however, and no damage to speak of was done to the building. The fire caught from the stove pipe. (January 26, 1900)

Mrs. A.E. Cardoza has moved into her new photograph gallery, and the building just vacated is being torn down. (March 2, 1900)

S.H. Paine has purchased the lot on the corner of Main and Washington streets, where Mrs. Cardoza's photograph gallery formerly stood, from Messrs. Rasmussen, Nissen and Nissen. It is Mr. Paine's intention to erect a fine building there next summer. (June 29, 1900)

Mrs. Cardoza, the photographer, requests us to announce that her gallery will be closed on Sunday's hereafter. It will be open next Sunday, however. (July 20, 1900)

S.H. Paine will erect a fine building in the near future on his lot at the junction of Main and Washington streets. (June 18, 1901)

D.D. Pierce will occupy half of the building which S.H. Paine will erect on the corner of Washington and Main Streets as a dry goods store. (June 25, 1901)

Ground was broken Saturday morning and work commenced on the erection of S.H. Paine's new building on the corner of Main and Washington Streets, Ferndale. Wm. Kerri has the contract to do the carpenter work. The new structure will be 40x70 feet in size, and Mr. Paine will occupy one-half of the building for his meat market, and it is said that the other portion will be used by Mr. Wells of Eureka for a drug store. (July 23, 1901)

S.H. Paine has decided to erect a two story building, instead of a one-story, at the corner of Main and Washington streets, work upon which has already commenced. When the building is completed it will be a great credit to Ferndale. (August 6, 1901)

Work on S.H. Paine's new building on Main Street is progressing rapidly. (August 13, 1901)

We are informed that Clint Shaw, now in charge of E.W. Wells & Son's drug store at Loleta, has been selected to conduct the Ferndale branch of this firm in Ferndale, to be located in the new Payne building on Main Street, now in course of erection. (September 10, 1901)

Work on S.H. Paine's new building at the corner of Main and Washington Streets is rapidly advancing under the efficient supervision of Contractors Branstetter and Kerri, and the end of the next several weeks will see the completion of the edifice. This will be one of the most substantial and handsome buildings in the county, a decided improvement to our little city, and a lasting recommendation of the mechanical skill of Messrs. Branstetter and Kerri. (September 20, 1901)

Painters Kropp, Trousdale, Huestis and Gracey are busily engaged in applying a coat of paint to S.H. Payne's new building on Main Street. This building, when completed, will certainly be a credit to our town. (October 4, 1901)

Dr. E.W. Wells, of the firm of E.W. Wells & Son, left on the steamer Eureka Tuesday for San Francisco, where he will select the fixtures and stock for the branch pharmacy of the firm to be established in Ferndale. The firm also has a branch in Loleta. (October 11, 1901)

It is understood that Wells & Son, of Eureka, are soon to move their stock of drugs, etc., from Loleta to Ferndale, but that J.A. Dickson has made arrangements to have a new drug store opened in the same building. (October 18, 1901)

Willard Wells of Eureka and Clint Shaw of Loleta were in town Sunday and took dinner at the Ferndale Hotel. Mr. Wells will soon open his drug store in the Paine building, and, we understand, Mr. Shaw will have charge of it. (October 29, 1901)

Mrs. Maggie Shaw and her son Brice, of Eureka, are soon to move to Ferndale to reside with Mrs. Shaw's son, Clint, who is to be in charge of E.W. Wells and Son's pharmacy, soon to be opened in the Cream City. (November 5, 1901)

S.H. Paine expects to move his meat market into his handsome new building on the east side of Main Street on or about the 15th of this month. (November 5, 1901)

S.H. Paine received this week an invoice of heavy felt, which he will place between the double floors upstairs in his new building for the purpose of deadening the sound from below. (November 15, 1901)

S.H. Paine moved, Sunday, his meat market into his new building on Main Street, where his customers can now find him as snug as a bug in a rug, so to speak. Mr. Paine has now an elegant shop, neat, roomy and fitted up with every modern convenience, even to an electric motor with which to operate his sausage grinder. (November 19, 1901)

Messrs. Wilson and Gracey are now at work papering the upstairs rooms in the new Paine Building. (December 10, 1901)

Clint Shaw and mother, of Eureka, took up their residence yesterday in the second story of the Paine building, above the Wells drug store, in which Clint is employed. (December 17, 1901)

F.W. Wells & Son's brand new drug store in the Paine Building on Main Street, Ferndale, is now open for business. (December 17, 1901)

Will Kerri and family have moved from Church Street into the upper story of the new Paine Building. (December 24, 1901)

S.H. Paine, who has sold out his meat market in Ferndale to Messrs Beck & Rasmussen, will go East shortly for a visit if we are correctly informed. (January 7, 1902)

Another business change has taken place in Ferndale, Mr. S.H. Paine having sold his Cream City meat market to Messrs Peter Beck and M. Rasmussen, who will hereafter conduct the same. Mr. Beck is too well known in this section to need any recommendations at our hands. He thoroughly understands the butchering business, has many friends and is well liked by everybody. His partner, Mr. Rasmussen, comes from Haywards, and is also an experienced butcher, having been engaged in the meat business in the city from which he hails... (January 7, 1902)

Ralston Poole, who has for some time been employed by Beck & Rasmussen, of the Cream City Market, has resigned his position and will depart in a few days for Lake County... (May 13, 1902)

Silva Giacomini has purchased of Will Kerri the lease of the upper story of the Paine building in Ferndale, and he and his family will occupy a portion of it. Mr. Kerri, we understand, has left Ferndale for good, and proposes trying his luck in South Africa. (August 11, 1903)

Mrs. Irma MacLaren has moved from Miss Parker's house into the upper story of the Paine Building. (January 1, 1904)

L. Cohen is soon to reopen a store in the Paine Building, Ferndale. He has been conducting a "store on wheels" for a year or so past. (January 5, 1904)

L. Cohen opens his store in the Paine building, Ferndale, on the 12th. (January 8, 1904)

The Ferndale butchering firm of Beck & Rasmussen has been dissolved by mutual consent, Mr. Beck taking full charge of the business on January 1st, 1904. (January 12, 1904)

Ralston Poole, who resigned his position with Beck & Rasmussen, is at present driving the butcher wagon for Russ's Ferndale market, taking the place of Peter Johnson, who is off on a vacation. (January 15, 1904)

Walter Simmons who was recently in the employ of Z.B. Patrick in the Ferndale Meat Market, is now working in Peter Beck's Cream City Shop. (January 19, 1904)

Morris Rasmussen, late of the Ferndale firm of Beck & Rasmussen, who left Saturday with his wife for a visit to Haywards, has purchased the Meller Butcher Shop at Loleta... (February 16, 1904)

The second story of the Brelle building is being fitted up for Dr. Dinsmore, who is soon to open dental parlors in Ferndale. The gentleman intended occupying quarters in the Paine building, but owing to some misunderstanding he was compelled to make the change. (July 15, 1904)

Saturday's Arcata Union says: "Mrs. D.A. Francis and Mrs. C.A. Monroe of Ferndale were visitors to Arcata this week, and while here spent some time interviewing our librarian and different members of the board in gathering data as to how to conduct a few public library and reading room."... (August 2, 1904)

Ferndale's new public library will probably be opened to the public by the first of November, or as soon thereafter as those in charge of the institution can arrange. An effort is being made to secure the Paine building at the corner of Main and Washington Streets for the library rooms. This place would make an ideal home for the new library as it is centrally located, is neat and commodious and could easily be fitted up to meet every requirement. (October 4, 1904)

The trustees of the newly organized Ferndale Public Library met...the board apportioned themselves by lot to serve for the following terms, beginning July 1st, 1904, to wit: F.G. Williams, one year; Mrs. D.A. Francis and Mrs. J.M. Dickson, two years; Mrs. C.T. Mills and M.C. DeCarli, three years. Mrs. D.A. Francis was then selected to serve as President of the Board for the first year, and M.C. DeCarli as the secretary. As the tax recently levied by the Town Trustees will soon become available for library purposes, the Board decided to take the necessary steps immediately to get the library established, and it is now expected that the library will be open to the public shortly after November 1st...Mrs. A.P. Winslow has been selected to act as librarian...it is probable that the rooms formerly occupied by Wells' drug store in the Paine building will be chosen (as quarters).... (October 7, 1904)

A number of new books have been received by the trustees of Ferndale's new library and are soon to be unpacked and placed in position. The reading room will probably be thrown open to the public the last of the week or a few days thereafter. (November 15, 1904)

The trustees of the Ferndale Library have decided to open the new reading room to the public tomorrow, Wednesday, night, at which time a musical program will be rendered, and when it is also desired that as many of our people be present as can make it convenient. The books ordered from below have not yet arrived but are expected daily. However, quite a number of volumes belonging to Ferndale's former library have been called in, and these together with those donated by our citizens, besides numerous magazines and papers, will give a sufficient quantity of reading matter to meet all requirements until the arrival of the new books. The home of our new library in the Paine building on Main Street is one of the most desirable locations that could have been selected. The room has been neatly fitted up and presents a most inviting and comfortable appearance. The new reading room will doubtless be well patronized by our people, as it should be, for it has certainly been needed in this town for some time past. (November 29, 1904)

Ferndale's new library opened its doors to the public last Wednesday evening, a large number of the people of this section being present, who passed several hours in inspecting the new reading room and in listening to an informal but pleasing program...The rooms are admirably adapted to the purpose for which they are intended, and the centrally located, in fact, no location better suited to the purpose in hand could have been selected....The hours the library will be open to the public are from 9:30 am until 12, 1:30 pm until 5, and in the evening from 7 o'clock until 9:30. Ferndale's new reading room...will doubtless be conducted in such a way that it will long be a source of credit to our town and also afford the readers of this community entertainment for years to come. (December 2, 1904)

Tuesday about ninety books were received by the Ferndale Public Library from below. Librarian Mrs. A.P. Winslow and Mrs. D.A. Francis have been engaged the past few days in preparing and placing the books in position. Our new reading room is progressing in an altogether satisfactory manner, and everything at present points to the fact that it is just what the town has needed for a long time. (December 9, 1904)

Dr. M.F. Underwood, for years located in San Francisco, and also at other points in this state, arrived in Ferndale last Friday and has decided to practice medicine in this town and vicinity in the future. Dr. Underwood has secured rooms in the Paine Building on Main Street wherein he will open offices... (March 14, 1905)

Mrs. Irma MacLaren has been seriously ill at her rooms in the Paine building on Main Street... (May 5, 1905)

Ferndale's public library is fast becoming one of the necessities of the town and the reading privileges afforded by this institution are being taken advantage of in a way that conclusively proves its popularity. During the month of January just past 815 books were issued to our citizens, which shows that our people appreciate the opportunities given them. (February 3, 1905)

During the month of February, the Ferndale public library issued 783 books to residents of this place, state books not included. (March 3, 1905)

During the month of March the Ferndale Public Library issued 891 books... (April 4, 1905)

During the month of April 769 books were issued by the Ferndale Library, evidence that the residents of this town are not tiring of our reading room and that it is filling a long felt want... (May 5, 1905)

Will Michel expects to resign his position with Butcher Peter Beck of Ferndale on or about the first of June.... (May 30, 1905)

Will Dennigan, lately employed in the Russ Market, Eureka, has accepted a position with Butcher Peter Beck of Ferndale. (June 2, 1905)

During May the Ferndale Library issued 729 books to the people of this place... (June 13, 1905)

Charles Moore has accepted a position in Peter Beck's Ferndale meat market. (July 4, 1905)

TT...Mrs. J.M. Dickson tendered her resignation as library trustee, owing to the lady having moved from this place to the Cannibal section. The resignation was accepted and Mrs. E. Varley of Ferndale appointed to fill the vacancy... (December 8, 1905)

Mrs. W.F. Reis and two children returned to Ferndale Tuesday from their stay in San Jose and elsewhere in the state. Mr. Reis and family for the present will take up their residence in the Paine building on Main Street. (March 2, 1906)

Silva Giacomini has sold his lease to the upper floor of the Paine building on Main Street to James Bartlett, the latter also purchasing Mr. Giacomini's furniture. Mr. and Mrs. Giacomini will occupy the B.O. Hart residence on Church street in the near future. (September 28, 1906)

John Pierson and family, who have been living in the Paine building, are now residing in the E.C. Mills cottage in East Ferndale. (October 2, 1906)

Mrs. J.C. Bartlett and family are now domiciled in their new home in the upper story of the Paine Building on Main Street. (October 19, 1906)

Mrs. E.A. Montague and child arrived in Ferndale yesterday to take up their residence here. Dr. Montague, who has been here for the past couple of weeks, informs us that he has secured rooms in the Paine building, over the library, where he and his family will make their home. (March 29, 1907)

Mrs. H.H. Hall and Mrs. M. Kerri of North Ferndale have leased the upper story of the Paine building on Main street, formerly under lease to Mrs. J.C. Bartlett, and which has been conducted as a rooming house. The ladies will continue it in the same manner and commenced moving in furniture last Friday. (July 16, 1907)

Mrs. H.H. Hall of Ferndale...in her home in the Paine building... (April 3, 1908)

Josh Vansant, the theatrical man of Eureka, has leased the Loewenthal building on Main Street for a term of five years... and about the middle of May Lucius Smith will begin alternations on the building. The partition is to be taken down and a stage erected. It is Mr. Vansant's intention to run a moving picture and vaudeville show in Ferndale in connection with his Eureka theater and the same attractions he offers to his patrons there will be brought to Ferndale. Mr. Molrine, who at present conducts a moving picture show in the Loewenthal building, will vacate the place as soon as possible, but he does not intend leaving Ferndale by any means, as he feels that he has built up a good business here and can retain a good share of the patronage. He is now negotiating with S.H. Paine for the rental of the Paine Building, at present used as the Library. As the library building will be ready in a few months, the library trustees may decide to give up their quarters providing they can secure a temporary location. (April 30, 1909)

Dr. E.A. Leatherwood of Eureka made his professional visit to Ferndale Tuesday, returning to the county seat Wednesday. Dr. Leatherwood, as will be seen by his card...will be found at his offices in the Paine Building Tuesday and Saturday evenings of each week. (April 30, 1909)

Tuesday and Wednesday the work was being busily prosecuted of packing up the books of the Ferndale Library, moving the shelving, etc., and the reading room is now located in the Brelle building opposite K of P Castle. This building will be occupied by the library until the completion of the new Carnegie building, which will be about September 1st. The Paine building, formerly the location of the

library, will be remodeled and used as a theater by Manager Molrine of the moving picture show. (May 14, 1909)

Painters A.L. Trousdale and Clarence Matthews sustained a fall while engaged in repainting the interior of the Paine building, formerly occupied by the library, last Tuesday afternoon, which might have resulted seriously. A scaffold on which they were working broke, precipitating them to the floor, a distance of twelve or fifteen feet. Mr. Trousdale suffered an injury to his left foot, which is causing him considerable pain and he will be laid off from work for some time to come. Mr. Matthews escaped with a few bruises. The gentlemen may consider themselves fortunate that they escaped with no broken bones. (May 21, 1909)

Carpenters King and Lindley have been engaged this week in remodeling the Paine Building, which is to be occupied by the moving picture theater. A box office has been built in the front of the building, also a loft where the moving picture machine will be installed. The building will make a most attractive and convenient little theater. (May 21, 1909)

Mrs. H.H. Hall, who has been making her home with her daughter, Mrs. M. Kerri, in the Paine building, will shortly move to the Port Kenyon section to make her home with another daughter, Mrs. George Hansen. (July 30, 1909)

Mrs. C.I. Fuller on the first of the month will open a rooming house in the Paine building on Main Street. The place was formerly conducted by Mrs. M. Kerri. (September 28, 1909)

Mrs. H.H. Hall, who has made her home in the Paine Building with her daughter, Mrs. M. Kerri, moved last week to Port Kenyon, where she will reside in the future with another daughter, Mrs. George C. Hansen. (October 5, 1909)

Proprietor C.W. Molrine of the Ferndale Moving Picture Theater has rented Roberts Hall, which in future will be under his control. The gentleman, however, will still conduct his theater at his present location in the Paine Building. Mr. Molrine plans to open a skating rink in Roberts Hall and will probably have the same in operation within a couple of weeks... (November 5, 1909)

Married...Miss Fannie Kistner, who up to six weeks ago conducted dressmaking parlors in the Paine building, was married to Arthur Stringfellow at Portland, Oregon...make their home at 2818 Coby Avenue, Everett, Washington... (December 7, 1909)

For Sale...160 acres of land, also household furniture. Mrs. C.I. Fuller, Paine Building, Ferndale. (December 21, 1909)

Proprietor C.W. Molrine of the Palm moving picture theater is planning to have an orchestra at his playhouse three nights out of the week though he has made no final arrangements as yet. (February 22, 1910)

The Palm orchestra played at the moving picture theater Saturday and Sunday evenings, and it is believed that music will prove a popular addition to the show. The orchestra plays between the films and also while the pictures are being shown. (March 1, 1910)

Optician A.P. Winslow and family will move today to the Paine building, which they have rented. Mr. and Mrs. E.C. Davis will occupy the Gill house, vacated by Mr. Winslow and family. (March 1, 1910)

Ferndale is to have a new theater, Chas. Molrine, manager of the moving picture theater, has rented the Fern Restaurant building and will have the place remodeled into one of the neatest show houses in the county.... (November 8, 1910)

George Kistner, the Ferndale automobile and bicycle dealer, has rented the Paine building, formerly occupied by the moving picture theater, and the place is now being remodeled for his use by D.A. Branstetter. A door has been cut in the side where automobiles may enter and Mr. Kistner will have a fine garage when the work is completed. He expects to move his new quarters in about a week. (March 17, 1911)

...Messrs. Walter Hansen and Walter Anderson took possession of the Beck butcher business in this town, having purchased the same from Mr. Beck on Saturday last. Negotiations for the business had been in progress for several weeks past but the deal was not concluded until the last of the week...the property involved in the deal consists of the lease to the Paine building on Main Street, where the market is located, the slaughter house in the Francis Creek section, together with pasture land, the wagons, stock, good will, etc., in fact everything which Mr. Beck has owned in connection with the business exclusive of his ranch up Francis Creek...Mr. Beck has been in the butcher business in this town and vicinity for the past twenty-four years, and will enjoy a real earned rest...Mr. Anderson will be in charge of the market, Mr. Hansen will have the slaughter house under his direction, and Frank Flowers will be employed by the firm as driver of the meat wagon around the valley... (April 2, 1912)

An important business deal will be consummated in Ferndale on April 1st, when the Ferndale Market, owned and managed by Goff & Brightman, and the Cream City Market, Hansen & Anderson proprietors, will be consolidated under the name of the Ferndale Meat Co. The proposition has been under discussion by the managements of the two markets for some time past, but no definite action has been taken until now, when formal announcements of the impending change is authorized. The retail business will be conducted in the quarters at present occupied by Goff & Brightman, where many improvements will be made. An ice manufacturing plant will be installed, cold storage rooms added, and a glass refrigerating counter placed in position in the market proper. This will give the new meat company a cold storage equipment second to none in the state of equal size and is in line with the company's idea to have everything of the best.

A new and most sanitary slaughterhouse will be built near the site of the one at present used by Goff & Brightman. The retail selling will

be done by Joseph Goff and Walter Anderson, while Walter Hansen and Emory Brightman will have charge of the slaughter house, buying of stock, etc. Two automobile delivery wagons will be used, and visits will be made three times a week each to the Grizzly Bluff, Centerville and the Island sections.... (March 24, 1914)

Meat Companies are not to Consolidate...April 3, 1914)

Costly Fire in Ferndale...The flames originated in the dental office of Dr. Jos. Hindley in the Paine Building, and were caused by a gasoline explosion. They spread with great rapidity and within a minute or two the fire was breaking out the windows. Dr. Hindley and S.H. Paine, the owner of the building, who was in an adjoining room, attempted to beat out the fire, but were soon forced to retreat on account of the flames and smoke...The building was damaged to the extent of probably five hundred dollars...As Mr. Paine was coming out of the building when forced to retreat by the fire, a pane of glass fell from the burning room and struck him on the head... (October 31, 1916)

Dr. Jos. Hindley is now ready to receive patients at his original office in the Paine building, which was recently damaged by fire, the place having been completely repaired. (November 10, 1916)

George Kistner has decided to close his Ferndale place of business on July 1st, and will accept a position at the California Central Creamery. His stock and tools will be taken over by the Kausen & Williams Hardware Co., which will continue the business in its new location. Mr. Kistner will do the repair work for the Kausen & Williams Co. In addition to his duties at the creamery. (June 25, 1918)

On July 1st, I will retire from business in Ferndale, having sold my stock and tools to the Kausen & Williams Hardware Co....Geo. W. Kistner. (June 25, 1918)

On September 1st the Ferndale Market, Brightman and Calanchini, proprietors and the Cream City market, Hanson and Anderson, proprietors, will be consolidated under the name of the Ferndale Meat Co. The consolidation will be for the period of the war and the change is made necessary by the scarcity of labor. It has been found almost impossible to secure sufficient help to operate the two business houses, and by a consolidation it is hoped the difficulty can be overcome. The market business will be conducted in the present location of Brightman and Calanchini, while the market now occupied by Hanson and Anderson will be used for a sausage factory..(August 30, 1918)

Fritz Dahlquist, the Ferndale plumber, has rented the Paine building on Main Street, recently vacated by George Kistner, and is moving from his former location in the Kemp building. When fitted up, Mr. Dahlquist will have a very convenient place of business. (September 6, 1918)

Fritz Dahlquist, agent for the Empire Milking machine and proprietor of a plumbing establishment in Ferndale, has disposed of an interest in the business to his brother-in-law, Morris Hansen, late of Marysville. (February 13, 1920)

Morris Hansen has now entered into partnership with F. Dahlquist in this town, and the firm will be known as Dahlquist & Co...(February 20, 1920)

F. Dahlquist & Co. Are now occupying their enlarged place of business on Main Street, double the size of their former place. The building has been repainted and they now have an attractive store and workroom. (April 23, 1920)

Horace H. Winslow and Miss Myrtle Beatrice Myers...were united in marriage at a pretty ceremony at eight o'clock last Monday evening at the home of the bride's parents in this town...will make their home in the Paine building, where a cosy suite of rooms has been fitted up for their occupancy...(July 16, 1920)

Dr. Jos Hindley will move his dental parlors from the Paine Building to the Hart building on Main Street some time after August 1st. The new offices are now being fitted up for his occupancy. (July 23, 1920)

Dr. L.R. Codoni moved his dental parlors the first of the week from the Russ building to the offices in the Paine Building recently vacated by Dr. Jos. Hindley. (August 20, 1920)

Ray H. Kausen has sold his electrical supply and wiring business in Ferndale to F. Dahlquist & Co...(September 3, 1920)

...Joe Montgomery...for some time past he has held a position with F. Dahlquist & Co in this town...(December 3, 1920)

F. Dahlquist and Morris Hansen, of the firm of F. Dahlquist & Co., of Ferndale, have dissolved partnership, and the business will hereafter be conducted by Mr. Dahlquist...(August 12, 1921)

Mr. and Mrs. William Grinsell, who recently purchased the M. Hansen home on lower Main Street, are now domiciled in their convenient and cozy residence. Mr. Grinsell, who has been assisting at the Red Front Store for some months past, has entered the employ of Dahlquist Bros. At their place of business on Main Street. (August 25, 1922)

F. Canclini moved his Ferndale shoe repairing establishment this week from its former location in the Henry Ott store to the building which he recently purchased next door to the Dahlquist store. (11/14/24)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...S.H. Paine=s building, occupied by Beck=s meat market and the Ferndale library, was twisted to some extent, and the plate glass windows were demolished...(April 24, 1906)

Work has been under way this week moving the stock and equipment of George I. Hanson=s garage from the Kemp Building to the Paine Building on Main St., formerly occupied by the F. Lee Cathey...is back at the anvil in C.T. Mills Blacksmith shop. (February 1, 1898)

Fred Cruickshanks has his new forge in working order at his main Street blacksmith shop, recently enlarged. (February 25, 1898)

Oscar Ryan is now employed at Fred Cruickshank's Main Street Blacksmithing and repair shop. (April 24, 1900)

Fred Ferrins, who is employed by blacksmith Cruickshanks of this place... (April 12, 1901)

R.D. Dunn has accepted a position with Fred Cruickshanks at the latter's Main Street blacksmith shop. (April 12, 1901)

R.D. Dunn is now, and has been for several weeks past, a partner with F. Cruickshanks in the blacksmithing business in Ferndale. (December 3, 1901)

Blacksmiths Cruickshanks & Dunn have had their shop enlarged by a rear addition 16 by 24 feet in size. (April 28, 1903)

Fred Schoeneman is now employed at the Cruickshanks' blacksmith shop on Main street, taking the place made vacant by the resignation of George Frame... (January 18, 1907)

Ferndale's gasoline fire engine is now occupying quarters at the hose company building on Francis Street, having been moved from its old quarters in the Hall building on Main Street a few days ago. (June 9, 1908) (check this year or date?????)

C.H. Briggs commenced work yesterday making improvements to the Hall building on Main Street, formerly occupied by Blacksmith Fred Cruickshanks, for the property housing of Ferndale's gasoline fire engine. (August 14, 1908)

Carpenter C.H. Briggs has completed the work of arranging a part of the Hall building on Main Street, formerly occupied by Blacksmith Cruickshanks, as the new quarters for the town's gasoline fire engine, which was moved to the building the first of the week. (September 4, 1908)

A deal was concluded the last of the week whereby Irvin Kline disposed of the Ferndale Bakery to Archie Ellingwood and Frank Steeves, who will hereafter conduct the same. Hines of the Ferndale Bakery were found in an unconscious condition in the rear of the kitchen department of that place last Tuesday morning shortly before seven o'clock, by Eddie Knudsen, who usually makes an early morning call on the boys when they are just finishing up the baking or the day. Upon entering the back apartments Eddie found both Mr. Ellingwood and Mr. Hines lying on the floor, and thinking they were playing a job on him handled the two bakers rather roughly, but when they failed to show signs of life he immediately gave the alarm and Dr. Ring was at once summoned and nearby persons called in. They were rushed to the Ferndale Hospital where they were treated and are now able to be out, although feeling quite weak as the result of their experience. Much mystery seems to prevail to account for the condition they were found in. Mrs. Wands is lately from Los Angeles and is accompanied by her husband, who may be engaged in the cattle business in this county. (December 14, 1915)

Mr. and Mrs. J.W. Carson, who have been residing in the rooms over the Ferndale bakery, have left for San Francisco. (February 8, 1916)

Part of the Hatch building, formerly occupied by a butcher shop and the cleaning works, is being remodeled for the occupancy of the Ferndale Bakery. The increasing business of the local bakery has forced proprietor Steeves to seek larger quarters than he has at present, and a deal has been on for some time relative to the new location... (March 13, 1917)

Garage at the corner of Main St and Ocean Ave. Work has already been commenced on the tearing down of an old building at the rear of the garage building to make room for the new structure. The new building will be 80x150 feet in size, of attractive design with stucco front, cement floors and of fire resisting construction. It will be a decided addition to the business district of Ferndale. The owners of the property are Mr. and Mrs. C.H. Wetherbee, who are now having the plans prepared for their new building. (8/5/27)

The contract was awarded to the Kerri Brothers. (September 6, 1895)

Contract specs for new KofP Hall - p2,c2 bottom - Copy - (September 20, 1895)

C.I. Fuller of the Wild Cat sawmill has furnished some fine pine lumber for the new KofP building. (October 25, 1895)

The contractors got the roof on the new KofP building Monday and on Monday evening it rained. (November 8, 1895)

Ernest, the little son of Al Kausen and wife got quite a fall while playing at the new KofP building Monday. He was badly shaken up but fortunately sustained no serious injuries, although several of the little fellows teeth were knocked out. (November 29, 1895)

Last Saturday the french plate glass for the new KofP building arrived. It weighs 4,000 lbs so G.M. Brice who hauled it over from Singley's informs us (February 4, 1896)

The lodge room in the new KofP building will be completed this week as will also the last coat of hard finish on the second floor of this elegant structure. The third floor of the building is being arranged for a dancing hall and a banquet room. Messrs. Kerri and Scott have done a first class job... (February 4, 1896)

Some very handsome curly redwood lumber has been used in the furnishings on the inside of the KofP castle. (February 14, 1896)

The building committee of the KofP accepted their new building from Messrs. Kerri and Scott last Saturday. (March 10, 1896)

KofP bids for painting awarded to Trousdale and Kropp for \$272.25 for the outside and the inside was \$199.00. (March 20, 1896)

The handsome electric light chandeliers for the new KofP castle arrived yesterday. (May 8, 1896)

The new KofP building is wired for electric lights and an arc street light has been swung at the intersection of Main Street and Shaw Avenue. Another Arc light adorns the center of the lower hall where the grand ball will be held tonight. (May 8, 1896)

Photographer Root took several very fine views of the KofP procession in Ferndale last Friday. The pictures can be seen and purchased at Canepa and Aggeler's. (May 12, 1896)

Camera's were numerous in Ferndale on Friday and many a snapshot was taken at the KofP procession headed by the Ferndale Cornet Band. (May 12, 1896)

Notwithstanding the threatening weather and the occasional showers that fell during the day, the K of P dedication and attendant celebration held in Ferndale last Friday, May 8th, under the auspices of Aurora Lodge, No. 51, K of P, was a grand success. By noon our town was filled with people, and as the visiting Knights from other sections of the county arrived, with their friends, they found a most cordial welcome awaiting them. The Ferndale Cornet Band, attired in new uniforms, played selection after selection on the streets as the crowd continued to congregate, and the K of P colors, red, blue and yellow could be seen on every hand....The large auditorium of the building, and the adjoining rooms, were literally packed with humanity, and it is safe to say that not one-third of the immense crowd in attendance gained admission to the hall....From the beginning to the end the dedicatory celebration was a marked success, and too much cannot be said in praise of the members of Aurora Lodge, No. 51 KofP of Ferndale. The handsome and elegant three-story structure they have erected, costing in the neighborhood of \$12,000, stands forth as the best evidence of their public spirit and their devotion to the noble order to which they belong. (May 12, 1896)

The Ferndale Cornet Band made their debut in their new uniforms last Friday, KofP day...its membership numbers 12 players. W.F. Kausen, leader, Prof. William Kausen, musical dir; I.M. Ring, V.A. Smith, G.W. Kaussen, L.M. Smith, Peter Anderson, P.N. Lund, Will Neiber, Eli Bagley, Will Damon and Peter Larsen. (May 8, 1896)

While ascending the tower to the new KofP Castle Saturday, George Collins took a 10 foot drop. Result, a bruised hip. His mission up so high was to unfurl the stars and stripes to the breeze in honor of the visit to our town of the noted Women's Suffrage Advocates. (June

23, 1896)

Wednesday evenings hail clogged up the roof gutter on the newest side of the new KofP castle, backing the water up and forcing it under the shingles, and under the building. The plaster on the west wall was badly soaked in places, as was also part of the handsome carpet in the reception room...The Lund brothers received a share of the water, which seeped down to their furniture store in the ground floor of the building. (January 1, 1897)

The Pythian castle was the scene of a joyous gathering on Tuesday evening of this week, the occasion being the marriage of Mr. Christian Hansen and Miss Louisa Meng, both of Ferndale. By 5 o'clock the spacious lodge room was filled with the relatives of the contracting party and invited friends to the number of fully 200 and Prof. Petersen's brass band heralded the approach of the wedding party...the groom is a most worthy young man in every respect and a skillful mechanic who for the past several years has been employed in the Andreassen Mechanical Shop of this place, he is a brother to Mrs. M.P. Hansen and by his industry and thrift has provided a handsome new cottage for himself and bride in North Ferndale. The bride is the only daughter of merchant M.P. Meng and wife of Ferndale... (December 24, 1897)

John Morris, who started work yesterday to re-underpin the K of P Castle in Ferndale, found that structure to be very badly damaged. The ground floor joice and the solid walls up to a distance of several feet from the ground are badly rotted, caused probably from lack of ventilation, as the building is comparatively a new one. (August 5, 1902)

Last Saturday morning between 2:15 and 2:45 o'clock and an hour or so after the Native Daughters and their guests had vacated the building, a dastardly attempt was made to burn the handsome three story structure at the corner of Main Street and Shaw Avenue, Ferndale, and known as the Pythian Castle. The edifice is owned by our local Knights of Pythias and is one of the most costly buildings in the Cream City. J.N. Lund occupies the ground floor of the building, in which he carries a large stock of furniture, carpets, etc; on the second floor is the lodge room and reception parlors of the Knights, and used by a number of our other secret societies, and in the third story is the dancing hall, banquet room and kitchen. The structure is comparatively a new one, and is furnished throughout with all modern conveniences. The fiend who attempted the destruction of this beautiful edifice seemed determined to do his work well, for he started three fires, any one of which, had it just been given a little more time, would have proven most effectual to his purpose. One fire was set on the outside of the building, at its rear corner on Shaw Avenue, and in a pile of boxes and debris which had been thrown out of Mr. Lund's upholstering rooms. The second fire was started in the wood room on the second floor and in a pile of pitchy pine wood stored therein, while the third fire was set in the rear of the kitchen and in two boxes filled with excelsior, scraps of paper, etc. Chris Petersen, night clerk at the American Hotel, was the first to discover the blaze. He was just preparing to shut up the hostelry for the night, and upon stepping out onto the front veranda to bring in some chairs, he saw the glare of the fire at the outside corner of the building. He immediately gave the alarm, and in a few moments several of our citizens and firemen were on hand and in a very short time had tumbled the burning boxes over the cement wall at the back of the Castle and into the creek. In the meantime, T.J. Lewis, the Ferndale wire mattress maker, who was one of the first to respond to the alarm, had made his way into the building for the purpose of inspection, and on reaching the third story discovered the two burning boxes in the kitchen. One of these he threw out of the back window and the fire in the other box, which was sitting on a table, he quickly extinguished. Descending to the street again he heard the cry of "fire in the wood room." whereupon he and Town President Doe, who was also one of the earliest arrivals, rushed up the stairs and in almost less time than it takes to tell it threw the burning chunks of wood out of the window and into the street. The three fires being thus extinguished, a thorough inspection of the premises followed and revealed that all danger was over, and that the work of the incendiary had been frustrated and with no actual damage whatever. But the fire was not discovered any too soon, for had any one of the three blazes as before stated, been given a trifle more time the result would have been undoubtedly the most costly conflagration in the history of Ferndale. With the K of P hall in flames, probably and more than likely the American Hotel, the Ferndale Livery Stable and the Doe building, all owned by C.A. Doe, the Brelle property, the Hatch buildings, the YMI hall building and likely half the town at least would have been destroyed, for it is conceded that Ferndale is without adequate fire fighting means in case of a conflagration of any great magnitude. As to the identity of the perpetrator or perpetrators of this diabolical attempt at incendiarism our people are all at sea and suspicion points to no one, but it is the third mysterious fire we have had in the past year and our property owners have ample reason for feeling uneasy... (October 14, 1902)

Joseph Steeves, Eugene Haywood, L. Rusk, Joseph Smiley and Frank Kelly are at work straightening the K of P Hall in Ferndale, so badly twisted and damaged by last week's shake up. It is the intention of the Knights to thoroughly repair the property and to place it in an even more substantial condition than before the quake. Steel braces will be placed in position on the lower floor, and, if possible, the lower story front will be of steel, thus making it one of the strongest and safest of the large buildings of the town. (April 27, 1906)

Joseph Steeves, James Scott, Eugene Haywood, Charles Peyton and Frank Reas are busily engaged in repairing the damage done by last month's earthquake to the Knights' of Pythias hall in Ferndale. It has been found that the foundation of the building, as well as portions of the floor joists and studding, have rotted quite badly and will have to be replaced. Braces will be placed at intervals from the walls to the ceiling in the lower story, and when all the repairs are finished the building will be one of the most substantial structures in the town. Mr. Steeves, who is superintending the work, thinks it will take between three and four weeks to complete the job. (May 10, 1906)

The members of Aurora Lodge, No. 51, Knights of Pythias, of Ferndale, are planning for a happy time on the evening of October 13th, when with appropriate ceremonies they will burn the mortgage which has heretofore hung over their fine hall...The Ferndale Pythian Castle was dedicated May 8, 1896, and is one of the finest buildings in the town. The mortgage on the structure would have been paid off long ago but for the fact that a heavy expense was incurred at the time of the big earthquake when the building was badly damaged and a large sum of money sent to put it in first-class condition again... (October 5, 1915)

Knights Burn their Mortgage...The burning of the mortgage entertainment at Pythian Castle last Wednesday evening in Ferndale was largely attended...the chairman gave a short bit of history regarding the castle and how by small payments at a time the mortgage was finally lifted. An orchestra was on hand and played several lively tunes and then the speaker of the evening, Mr. S. Turner of Arcata was introduced. The gentleman, who has been a member of the Knights of Pythias for over 35 years, gave a fine address and mixed...burning of the mortgage, which has existed for 19 years, by Mr. Turner, who wished them all kinds of success.. (October 15, 1915)

The Pythian Castle in this town is being repainted by W.T. Adams and assistants...(8/1/24)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The KofP Hall was badly twisted and now has a decided lean to the west, so much so that it was deemed advisable to shore it up to prevent its falling...(April 24, 1906)

SECOND FLOOR:

Rev. A.H. Jensen of Eureka has moved to this valley and will hereafter conduct Danish Lutheran Services in the KofP Castle in this place every Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock. The gentleman and his family are at present residing on Paradise Island, but this will not be for long, for the will soon take up their permanent residence in Ferndale. They will also do house painting and decorating. Their place of business will be in the new KofP castle. (August 4, 1896)

P.N. Lund was yesterday moving from his old store into his new quarters in the KofP castle. The Lund Brothers will be ready for business in a day or two. (August 25, 1896)

P.N. Lund has rented the lower story of the K of P Castle of this place and we understand that he will open a furniture store therein in the near future. (July 10, 1896)

Lund Bros...Peter Firth is at work in the upholstering department... (September 1, 1896)

J.N. Lund of Grizzly Bluff will soon move to Grizzly Bluff with his family having rented his ranch. Mr. Lund is a partner with his brother, Peter N., in the furniture business here. (October 16, 1896)

Jimmy Jensen, the former restaurant man, is now in the employ of the Lund Brothers, furniture dealers. (January 6, 1899)

Jimmie Jensen, formerly proprietor of the Ferndale Restaurant, but who has been working in a Eureka Chope house for some months past, came to the Cream City last week. Jimmie has secured a position with furniture dealers Lund and will probably be with us for some time to come. (December 8, 1899)

Dissolution of Partnership, the firm of Lund Bros, Ferndale furniture dealers, has been dissolved, Mr. P.N. Lund retiring. P.N. Lund and J.P. Lund. 2/9, 1900) (February 9, 1900)

H.A. Hansen of Fortuna and J.P. Lund of Ferndale have gone into partnership in the undertaking business in this town. G.W. Dungan was busy this week moving caskets, etc. from the lower story of the Masonic Hall and getting everything in readiness for the new firm, which has our best wishes for success. (March 30, 1900)

A neat new sign adorns the front of Hansen and Lund's undertaking parlors on the corner of Main Street and Shaw Avenue. (June 21, 1900)

W. Anderson has accepted a position with P.N. Lund. (August 30, 1901)

George Cummings has resigned his position with furniture dealer Lund, and he and his family are soon to remove from Ferndale, we are informed. (November 7, 1902)

Last Saturday the papers were signed whereby a number of the residents of this section became the owners of the furniture business in Ferndale which has been conducted by H.J. Mueller for many years past. The purchasers have formed themselves into a company and are to file their articles of incorporation in a few days, when the names of those interested will be made known to the public. It is also stated that J.N. Lund's Ferndale business will also be bought and the two stores consolidated into one establishment. More anon. (November 1, 1904)

Articles of Incorporation were filed with the County Clerk Saturday...The firms and businesses consolidated are those of the J.N. Lund and H.J. Mueller furniture businesses, the latter store being purchased by the stockholders of the new company. The two stores have been incorporated under the name of "The Citizens' Furniture and Undertaking Co." with a capital stock of \$30,000, divided into 3000 shares, of which 1470 shares have been subscribed for as follows: J. Lund, T. Aldrich, H.A. Hansen, L.M. Klepper and E. Roberts, Geo M. Brice, Ed Hopkins, A.H. Kausen, Amelia Robarts, Minnie Boynton, G.W. Dungan, H.C. Blum, L.P. Branstetter....Both the Mueller and Lund stores will probably be kept open to the public as neither building is sufficiently large to display the company's present stock nor the additions that are soon to be added. Garland Dungan and Robt Roberts will have charge of one store while the other will be conducted by J.N. Lund. (November 15, 1904)

The Citizens' Furniture and Undertaking Co is now moving its stock from its store in the K of P Hall, and that place is no longer open for business. With the addition of the goods formerly in that store, the company's place of business in the Mueller building is now filled to overflowing, and the concern will probably have to secure a warehouse in which to store the surplus furniture, etc. (December 13, 1904)

Charles Duck and family of Eureka have decided to locate in Ferndale, and the first of the week moved into L.M. Smith's residence on lower Main Street. Mr. Duck is a member of the firm of Duck Bros, the Eureka furniture dealers, who are to open a branch furniture store in the Cream City in the lower story of Pythian Castle. (July 21, 1905)

New ad for Duck Bros furniture store in Pythian Castle, Ferndale... (August 25, 1905)

The stock in the Duck furniture store, located in Pythian Castle, is being removed to the Brelle building across the street. It will be some time before their store will be in condition for occupancy. During the interval the Duck Bros will dispose of their stock of goods at sacrificial prices... (April 20, 1906)

The Duck Bros., the Ferndale furniture dealers, who have been occupying rather cramped quarters in the Brelle Building, are moving to their old place of business in the lower story of the K of P building which will soon be repaired of all the earthquake damage. (June 15, 1906)

Will Stevens has given up his position with the Duck Bros' furniture store in this town, and expects to leave Ferndale with the next week or ten days en route to Portland, Or. (January 4, 1907)

George Robinson, who has had charge of the Duck Brothers' store in Ferndale the past five months, takes his departure today or tomorrow for the county seat, where he will be similarly employed at the Eureka Store... (April 16, 1909)

Mr. Calvin Wilson, manager of Duck Bros= store, will shortly resign charge of the store, owing to continued ill health...Mr. Duck has decided to close out the Ferndale store and during the next thirty days the stock will be disposed of. (April 5, 1910)

Ferndale is to have another business in the near future. E.A. Weaver, who some months' ago purchased the Edwin Duck furniture store in Eureka, has decided to move the business to Ferndale and has rented the lower floor of the Pythian Castle... (February 24, 1911)

A part of the stock of E. Weaver's furniture store in Eureka has been moved to the lower floor of Pythian Castle in Ferndale, where Mr. Weaver is to be located hereafter. (March 7, 1911)

Edwin A. Weaver...died suddenly last Monday evening of heart trouble...born 1847, England...Mr. Weaver was engaged in the furniture business in this town during the latter years of his life and was proprietor of the business at the time of his death. His store was in the Pythian Castle....For many years he was a member of the Ferndale Band and a splendid vocalist...survived by his wife, Mrs. Jane Weaver, a brother, Jack Weaver of Eureka, a brother in Utah, and another in England...(September 20, 1918)

H. Frucht has leased the lower floor of Pythian Castle, formerly occupied by the Weaver furniture store, which he will use for storage purposes for his junk business and will also conduct a second-hand store. (February 7, 1919)

Elmer C. Gardner of the Petrolia State Co. Has purchased the garage located in Pythian Castle building and formerly operated by Maurice Reed. John Monsen, who has been connected with the business for some years past, will continue in charge of the mechanical work and Harold Larsen will be in charge of the office. (10/17/30)

Antone Zana, one of the best known men of Eel River valley, fell dead last Wednesday evening in Knights of Pythias Hall in this town, following a lodge meeting and banquet. He was sitting on a bench in the upper hall and suddenly fell to the floor, being dead before aid could reach him...born 1870, Italy...(9/24/26)

Viggo Eriksen has taken over the management of his garage in connection with his auto salesrooms and service station business in Ferndale. The garage business has been previously under lease to Maurice Reed, who will hereafter be located in the Pythian Castle building. Henry Reinhart will be the mechanic in charge of the garage business for Mr. Eriksen...(6/11/26)

The quiet little city of Ferndale was thrown into a turmoil of excitement at about half-past ten o'clock Wednesday evening by the startling report that Mrs. Clara Ellen Wertz had been assassinated at the home of her parents, William Lytel and wife on the Island, some three miles distant from this place...subsequent events proved that Milton Richardson was the murderer, and that after the killing of his victim he made his way to Ferndale...Messrs. Lovell and Gill heard his police whistle blow, and they, too, rushed down the (Shaw) Avenue, locating Mr. Howard in front of the Adventist Church. On the sidewalk lay Richardson, with a bullet hole through his head, and a pistol by his side. The ball, fired by his own hand, entered the left temple...urged on by an insane jealousy he took her life and then his own...Milton Richardson is the oldest son of William Richardson, who was hung on the Island a number of years ago for an unmentionable crime. Rev. A.J. Osborne, of Eureka, will preach in the Adventist church on Shaw Avenue, Ferndale, next Friday evening at 8 o'clock. (May 5, 1908)

A very quite but beautiful wedding was contracted at the Adventist church, Ferndale, Wednesday at high noon, when Miss Ethyl Richardson became the bride of Prof. Lindley Taylor, of Fairland, Indiana. In the absence of a minister of the Adventist faith, the ceremony was performed by Rev. A.B. Roberts of the Congregational Church. The church was very prettily decorated for the occasion, and the design was most unique. In each aisle three beautiful arches of green were erected and the entire church hung with Canadian maple leaf and ivy with syringoes entwined. The effect was most pleasing, particularly as the church had been darkened and the lights gleamed through the decorations... following the ceremony a luncheon was served at the home of the bride's parents on Fifth Street...daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Frederick Richardson of Ferndale...make their home in Fairland... (July 24, 1908)

Rev. Patterson, who for some months past had been occupying the pulpit of the Ferndale Adventist church, left the latter part of the week for the southern part of the state, accompanied by his family. The reverend gentleman received and accepted a call from another church. (March 14, 1911)

Rev. and Mrs. Hutchinson are now making their home in Ferndale and are residing at Mrs. Mackey's on the corner of Washington & Berding Streets. Rev. Hutchinson for the next several months will occupy the pulpit of the Adventist Church in Ferndale. (November 12, 1912)

C.A. Bartlett has purchased the Adventist church property on Shaw Avenue. It is understood that later on he plans to have the church remodeled into an up-to-date apartment house. (April 22, 1921)

The work of remodeling the old Adventist church on Shaw avenue and making it into a garage for the housing of the auto trucks of this supervisorial district is progressing nicely. Miss Lucie Johnston, who has made her home with Mrs. I. Shaw in Ferndale for the past 17 years, departed for the Mattole section last Friday, where she will probably reside with the family of A.A. Hadley in the Upper Valley. (March 2, 1897)

The Haywood Brothers and Bert Matthews have torn down the old woodshed at J.A. Shaw's home in Ferndale and are erecting a new one to take its place. (May 7, 1897)

L. W. Carter, the painter, a former resident of the Wild Cat Section, returned overland with his family last Tuesday, after an absence of several years and he comes to remain here...he went to work yesterday morning painting the roof of Mrs. I. Shaw's residence and he tells us that the first job of painting that he did in this valley was on the same house years ago. (August 20, 1897)

...married at Upper Mattole, March 10, 1898...Calvin Calkins and Lucy Johnston, both of Upper Mattole...the bride was formerly a

resident of Ferndale and for many years made her residence with Mrs. I. Shaw. (March 18, 1898)

A new hydrant has been placed in position in front of Mrs. I. Shaw's residence, opposite the Congregational Church. (July 19, 1898)

Mrs. I. Shaw is in a very precarious state of health and her friends are considerably worried over her condition. (February 7, 1899)

Major J.A. Shaw of Ferndale received a diploma Saturday from Adjutant General W.H. Seamens which certifies that Mr. Shaw has served faithfully for seven consecutive years in the National Guard of California and is therefore hereafter exempt from juror and military duty except in time of war. The diploma bears date of August 30, 1899. (September 5, 1899)

About one hundred schoolmates of Master Armytage and Miss Helen Shaw attended the birthday party of these young people at the home of their parents, Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Shaw in Ferndale Saturday afternoon. The little folks enjoyed themselves several hours playing various games on the lawn, afterwards being seated at tables laden with good things to eat, to which they did ample justice. (October 2, 1900)

Frederick, the little son of Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Shaw burned both his hands quite badly Wednesday by falling onto a red-hot fireplace blower. (March 15, 1901)

Quite a number of those interested met at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Jos A. Shaw in Ferndale last evening to take steps toward organizing a tennis club in this town. We went to press too early last night to give a report of the gathering. (April 16, 1901)

J.A. Shaw's residence opposite the Ferndale Congregational Church is being re-painted. (May 21, 1901)

J.A. Shaw, wife and son Armytage, will leave on the steamer of the 4th for a three months visit in southern California and Mexico. (December 24, 1901)

Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Shaw and son Armytage leave on tomorrow's steamer for a three months' visit to southern California and the City of Mexico. Mrs. Shaw's health has not been the best of late, and a change of climate will undoubtedly prove beneficial to her. (January 3, 1902)

Mr. D.A. Francis...returned Tuesday from a three months' tour of southern California, Arizona, New Mexico, Texas and Old Mexico, made in company with J.A. Shaw and wife and their little son Armytage...He confirms the report that Mrs. Shaw has been seriously ill in San Francisco, but states that when he left the city she was much better and looks for her and her husband to return on Sunday's steamer. (April 11, 1902)

Preparatory to the laying of a cement pavement, Ted Francis started work yesterday tearing up the plank sidewalk in front of J.A. Shaw's Main Street property. The lumber therein has been purchased by Fred Cruickshanks, who will utilize it for a sidewalk and for other purposes at his Rose Avenue home. (July 8, 1902)

Crystal Wedding...At their home in Ferndale last Friday afternoon Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Shaw celebrated their fifteenth wedding anniversary. Their mansion was crowded with invited guests who spent several hours laying euchre, followed by a sumptuous repast.... (January 19, 1904)

Contractor and builder W.S. Fitzell...and L.M. Smith, we are informed, are to do a considerable amount of improvement work at the residence of J.A. Shaw and wife in the near future. (April 3, 1906)

J.A. Shaw and family are again occupying their residence on lower Main Street, the interior of which has been thoroughly renovated. Since the work of improving has been going on Mr. Shaw and family have been guests at the Hart residence father down the street. (May 29, 1906)

An electric motor has been received by Manager Barnes which will be installed at the home of J.A. Shaw in Ferndale to operate a sewing machine. Another motor will soon arrive which will operate a washing machine, irons, etc. at the Shaw home. (January 7, 1908)

Town Trustees...The matter of a donation of several hundred dollars by citizens of Ferndale and vicinity for the purchase --or rather to be used in aiding in the purchase of a library site was before the town fathers, who had about decided to secure the Dunn property on Berding Street for the purpose named, after consulting the wishes of the donations who saw no objection to the proposition. A communication was received by the Board Monday night, however, which stated the withdrawal of the donation insofar as the Dunn property is concerned, the citizens favoring the purchase of a fifty-foot frontage on the Shaw property on Main Street, next to the J. Jacobsen residence, which, it is learned, can be secured for the site desired. No action was taken and the library site remains a question to be concluded at a future meeting of the trustees... (March 6, 1908)

J.A. Shaw returned to Ferndale Tuesday afternoon from Eureka where he went to secure his new White steam automobile, ordered from the East some months ago. Accompanying Mr. Shaw to the Cream City in the steamer were Fred Smythe of Eureka, from whom the auto was purchased, Machinist Larsen of the Ferndale Iron Works and A. Keohan of this place. Mr. Shaw's new purchase is certainly one of the finest automobiles ever brought to Humboldt and is equipped with all the latest devices and conveniences known to the trade... (April

17, 1908)

The breaking of an electric globe at the residence of J.A. Shaw on lower Main Street last Friday night about 9:30 o'clock, caused a passerby to turn in an alarm of fire, which was quickly responded to by our little city's fire department. Before the boys arrived on the scene, however, it was learned that their services were not required and that no danger of a conflagration existed. (June 2, 1908)

J.A. Shaw, of Ferndale, was on the streets yesterday with his new Maxwell runabout, received by a recent steamer. The new machine is of high power, being powered with a 24 horse power engine. The auto presents a handsome appearance, and has attracted much favorable comment since its arrival in the Cream City. (July 7, 1908)

J.A. Shaw and wife, son Armytage and daughter Miss Helen, will leave Ferndale today or tomorrow for San Francisco, making the trip overland in their White steamer automobile. They had intended leaving Wednesday but were delayed by an accident to the car. Armytage will resume his studies at St. Matthew's College, and Miss Helen will enter a young ladies' school at the metropolis. Mr. and Mrs. Shaw will visit Suisun and other parts of the state before returning to Ferndale. (August 6, 1909)

J.A. Shaw went to Eureka Friday and brought out his fine new Winton touring car, which arrived the day previous. The machine is of 48 horse power, six cylinders, and is a beauty in every particular. (April 12, 1910)

J.A. Shaw and family left Ferndale yesterday for Suisun in their big touring car. After a visit with relatives there they will take up their residence in Oakland for the winter, where they recently purchased a fine home. (November 15, 1910)

While on a recent trip below Mr. Riley was a guest for a half day of Mr. and Mrs. J.A. Shaw at their beautiful home on Boulevard Way, Grand Avenue Heights, Oakland. He reports that Mr. Shaw and family have a fine home splendidly located overlooking Piedmont Park. All the modern conveniences are found, while a cement garage houses the big Winton touring car. The Shaws leave for Humboldt on June 3rd to spend the summer. (May 9, 1911)

J.A. Shaw and family were expected to arrive in Ferndale last evening from their home in Oakland to spend the summer in this town. They were making the trip overland in their touring car. (June 11, 1912)

They journeyed overland in their touring car and report a good trip. The Salvation Army will hold a big demonstration on 2/29 at Roberts Hall...Captain Mattheson, the Laplain will be present, dressed in native costume...a grand time anticipated. (February 25, 1896)

The Salvation Rally in Roberts Hall last Saturday night...three new recruits were sworn in... (March 3, 1896)

Captain Lydia Alleman and acting lieutenant Elsie Alleman of Eureka will "swear in" several recruits on next Saturday evening at 8 p.m. at Roberts Hall. Also "giveaway" a baby. Come and see who will receive it. There will be the grandest "hallelujah" march on the streets ever seen in Ferndale. Several soldiers from other corps being expected. (May 26, 1896)

The Salvation Army held a big meeting in Ferndale Saturday evening, proceeded by a lively street parade. Roberts Hall was packed with people, six new recruits were sworn in, and a baby was christened and given to the Lord. Nearly \$35.00 was taken in at the door at 10 cents admission. (June 2, 1896)

On Friday June 10th will be another red letter day in the history of the local Salvation Army of this town. On that evening there will be a special parade and open air meeting. The indoor meeting to be held in Roberts Hall. The firey Captain Billy Burke, the prize fighter, will preach and tell what he knows about another mans wife... (July 7, 1896)

Salvation Army had a big time in Ferndale last Friday evening. They indulged in a grand street parade, an open air meeting and afterwards went to Roberts Hall where they held another meeting. The hall was packed with people. (July 14, 1896)

The Salvation Army is getting up a coffee supper to defray the officers expenses to their next appointment and the same will be held on Wednesday evening, August 5th at Roberts Hall. Captain Hansen and Lt. Rawson will be present and we hope to see the Salvation Army well patronized. (August 4, 1896)

The Salvation Army held a big rally in Ferndale Sunday evening. Roberts Hall was packed with people. (August 11, 1896)

Salvation Army musical outriders Ensigns Taylor and Kingdeman were in Ferndale Saturday and Sunday evenings and held big rallies at Roberts Hall. They are musicians and with assistance with the Ferndale captain and his soldiers, the services were interesting and entertaining. (October 13, 1896)

Messrs. Peter Anderson and Prof. Petersen will conduct a skating rink in Roberts Hall beginning Saturday evening, November 28th, with skating on Wednesday and Saturday evenings on each week until further notice...to be followed by a social dance with full string and brass music... (November 24, 1896)

The Ferndale skating rink in Roberts Hall has changed hands, Messrs. Anderson and Petersen having sold the same to Mr. Charles Farrens of popcorn fame and Mr. Will McCann. The gentlemen will hereafter conduct the rink which will be open on Wednesday and Saturday evenings of each week. (December 25, 1896)

The Salvation Army of Ferndale will hold a "Cosmopolitan Jubilee Meeting" in Roberts Hall on Saturday evening on April 7th (April 13, 1897)

As will be seen by reference to an ad in this issue the Ferndale Building Association offers for sale all of its property in Ferndale, including Roberts Hall, the Ferndale Hotel Building, and the Lowenthal Store Building, the property will be sold either separately or as a whole. Call on Secretary B. Bonetti for full particulars. (April 20, 1897)

The Salvation is nothing if not progressive, so in order to keep up with the times they have purchased an Edison phonograph for the purpose of inducing entertainment throughout the state. They call it the "halleluliah talking machine" and say that it can shout "praise the lord" or play a timball as well as the general himself. Their phonograph is loaded with speeches...will be in Ferndale, Roberts Hall, Saturday, the 19th... (June 18, 1897)

It is generally expressed opinion that the old Roberts Hall building is no longer capable of accommodating Ferndale=s latter day assemblages and it is frequently suggested that the old structure should be enlarged or a new and nearer up to date one with better luminating facilities take its place. (October 11, 1898)

...many needed repairs at Roberts Hall...front steps have been torn down and new ones replaced and an alcove in the anteroom.

(November 25, 1898)

G.M. Brice and H.C. Blum have rented Roberts Hall from the Ferndale Building Association for a term of two years, and will put it in perfect repair and apple pie order. It will also, very likely, wire the building for electric lights. (January 10, 1899)

Roberts Hall is being wired for electric lights and the same will be so arranged as to afford different colored lights for the stage. Messrs. Brice and Blum who have the hall leased have also contracted with the parties who are supplying the scenery for the Occidental Theater, Eureka, to furnish them a new drop curtain for the hall, and also to repair the scenery therein. This will be good news to our people. (February 21, 1899)

Electrician Wright expected to complete the work yesterday of wiring Roberts Hall for electric lights. (February 24, 1899)

Electrician Wright last Saturday completed the work of wiring Roberts hall for Messrs Brice and Blum, who have the hall leased, and hereafter this place of amusement will be lighted by electricity. In the auditorium of the hall are ten 32 candle power lights, with another 32 light on the outside and at the entrance to the building. On the stage are twelve 8-candle power foot lights, and twenty-four 16 candle power light overhead, six of which are red lights, and all are operated by switches which permit the lights to be manipulated in almost any way desired. The dressing rooms, the ticket office and the two cloak rooms are also supplied with electric lights, and when all the lights are on the interior of this spacious building is brilliantly illuminated -- a marked contrast to the old coal oil lamp regime. Messrs Brice and Blum have also ordered a new drop curtain for the stage and the scenery in the hall and the floor as well are to be placed in perfect repair. (February 28, 1899)

Last Monday night Mrs. A.H. Kausen met with a painful accident at Roberts Hall, the result of which will be that she will be laid up probably for several weeks. At the rear door to the hall is a platform some eight feet high and connected with the ground by a flight of stairs. Around this platform there is no railing, and in feeling for the steps in the dark the lady lost her balance and fell to the ground, badly spraining her knee. She is confined to her bed, and while no bones were broken her attending physician, Dr. L. Michael, says that it will be some little time before she is able to use the injured limb. (July 7, 1899)

James Scott and Will Niebur are at work this week putting new windows in Roberts' Hall, the old ones having outlived their usefulness. (November 15, 1901)

Miss Mertie Scott has leased Roberts' Hall, as a business venture, and will sublet it for dances, entertainment, etc. (January 3, 1902)

Rumor has it that negotiations are pending for the purchase of the Roberts Hall building, which, if the deal is consummated, will be moved to a site in the lower end of town. (April 18, 1902)

There is nothing new to report in the matter of the negotiations for the purchase of the Roberts Hall building and its removal to a site on lower Main Street. Liveryman W.G. Dauphiny, we understand, is the prospective purchaser. (April 22, 1902)

Carpenters James Scott and Will Niebur will be engaged for the next week or so in reshingling Roberts Hall on Ocean Avenue. This improvement has been needed for some time and will be a boon to Manager Ward. (August 23, 1904)

Roberts Hall, Ferndale, now under a three years' lease to S.A. Ward, of this place, is soon to meet with a number of improvements in the shape of new scenery, more comfortable seats, etc. Preston R. Burris, also of this place, has gone into partnership with Mr. Ward in the management of the Cream City's playhouse, and these gentlemen intend to fit up the building in a way that will be a revelation to our people. (November 1, 1904)

The passing of Roberts Hall, renamed the Ferndale Theater, to the Humboldt Circuit and Vaudeville Co, completes the circuit of theatres in the six principal towns of Humboldt County. The houses are to be designated by the initial letter, viz: Arcata, A; Blue Lake, B; Diamond Hall, Fortuna, D; Eureka, E St, E; Ferndale, F; Scotia, S. Each of the houses is to have the letter emblazoned in electric lights and placed on the front of the hall in the street. The Ferndale Theater is being remodelled as fast as mechanical genius and the procurement of material will allow. The main building is to be repapered and repainted, while the stage is to have new scenery throughout and greatly increased lighting capacity... (November 8, 1904)

S.A. Ward is to soon open a skating rink in Roberts Hall, which will probably be conducted on two or three evenings each week... (April 13, 1906)

Lawrence Canepa has rented Roberts Hall and in future will be in charge of the same. (April 5, 1907)

Carpenters Will Flowers and Thomas Boyd have been engaged the past few days placing a new foundation under Roberts Hall on Ocean Avenue and adding other improvements to the building. (August 28, 1908)

Proprietor C.W. Molrine of the Ferndale Moving Picture Theater has rented Roberts Hall, which in future will be under his control. The gentleman, however, will still conduct his theater at his present location in the Paine Building. Mr. Molrine plans to open a skating rink in Roberts Hall and will probably have the same in operation within a couple of weeks... (November 5, 1909)

Negotiations were concluded yesterday whereby the Ferndale Band leases Roberts Hall for a term of five years, with the privilege of an additional five years at the expiration of the first lease. The hall is at present leased by W.E. Legg and the band takes possession on September 1st. It is the intention of the band boys to thoroughly renovate the hall and place it in first-class condition. A new floor will be laid as the first improvement and this will make it suitable for dancing again. The walls and ceiling are to be repapered, while the woodwork will be repainted. The scenery and stage are to be repaired and decorated, in short the hall is to be placed in the best possible condition in every way... (August 6, 1912)

W.E. Legg, proprietor of the Valerie Theater, addressed the board regarding a reduction of the license paid by him, as he will hereafter conduct only one playhouse. Roberts Hall having been leased to the Ferndale Band.... (August 9, 1912)

Extensive improvements are being made to Roberts Hall, now under lease to the Ferndale Band. A new pine floor has been laid, an orchestra pit built in, and the dressing rooms repainted and repapered. Later on the entire hall will be renovated. The carpenter work has been done by Will Flowers, Jim Wilson, Keith Roberts and others, while T.L. Wilson is doing the papering and painting... (September 13, 1912)

Hartley Bros have been awarded a contract by the Ferndale Concert Band to repaint and repaper the interior of Roberts Hall, and expect to start the work in about two weeks. Since renting the hall the band has made numerous improvements, including a new floor, an orchestra pit, etc. and when the building is decorated by Hartley Bros. it will present a most attractive appearance. (April 8, 1913)

Ferndale Union High School graduation...The commencement exercise of the Ferndale union high school were held last Friday evening in Roberts Hall, and were attended by an immense crowd, standing room being at a premium. A class of twenty-two pupils was graduated...Roberts Hall had been beautifully decorated for the occasion... (May 26, 1914)

Do you remember: When Sam Kee Billy had a laundry where Roberts Hall now stands? (July 21, 1922)

Roberts Hall, Ferndale=s pioneer dance hall and playhouse, which was purchased some time ago by the Portuguese people of this valley and will be known as Portuguese Hall, has been extensively remodeled and renovated. The stage has been torn out and the space which it occupied has been converted into a kitchen and dining room. There is a movable partition between the dining room and the main floor, which can be moved to accommodate the needs of the occasion, permitting the dining room to be enlarged as necessary. The gallery has been converted into a lodge room for the use of the Portuguese lodges which will hold their meetings there. A new foundation has been placed under the building and when the improvements are completed it will be in first-class condition. (5/29/25)

Roberts Hall, for many years the only show house in Ferndale, has been purchased from the Ferndale Building Association by the Portuguese people of this community through Antone Enos, Antone Oliveira and Joe S. Nunes, acting as trustees. The hall, it is understood, will be remodeled and used for a lodge hall and social center, where the annual Portuguese celebration and various social activities will be held. Roberts Hall was built in 1890 by the Ferndale Building Association...For a number of years it has been under lease to the Roberts Hall Association, composed of a number of local men, who conducted dances there until the large pavilion was built here by the Firemen...(11/28/24)

BUILDING BACK OF ROBERTS HALL

Charles Calanchini has moved his family to his ranch near Ferndale...Mrs. Howe and family will occupy the house back of Roberts Hall vacated by them. (February 4, 1896)

For sale, the old Dave Roberts house and also the barn back of Roberts Hall. Both must be removed immediately from premises. (March 7, 1902)

James Halgestad has purchased for \$10 the old D.R. Roberts house and barn back of Roberts Hall, and is now engaged in tearing them down to make room for the R.E.&W. Co's new warehouse. The lumber saved from the structures will be used by Mr. Helgestad in building a barn on his west Ferndale place. (March 25, 1902)

Ferndale Town Trustees met in regular session last Monday...nothing was done but granting John Kerri a license to move the Roberts house... (April 11, 1902)

What is known as the old D.R. Roberts house, which stood back of Roberts Hall and was recently purchased by Jas Halgestad, or at least the front part of it, is now being moved by John Kerri and crew to Mr. Halgestad's land near the public school house. This is one of the old landmarks of Ferndale, and was built for pioneer Francis Francis, now deceased, about 42 years ago, and for several years was conducted by him and his wife, Mrs. Grace Francis, as a stopping place or hotel, and in it they housed many travelers, especially during the first Mattole oil excitement in 1865 or 66. All but the eldest of the Francis children were born therein, and notwithstanding its over 40 years of service it is still in good shape and will last for many years to come. Mr. Halgestad will add to it and use the structure for a dwelling. (April 11, 1902)

I have it on good authority that Ferndale will soon have a third drug store, it will be located in the building now occupied by H. Mueller and some of the goods have already arrived. (January 12, 1894)

W.B. Alford has opened a Drug Store in the building formerly occupied by H.J. Mueller's furniture business. A large stock of goods will arrive as soon as the ferry is working. (January 19, 1894)

W.B. Alford who now has his new drug store in the Hart Building, lately vacated by H.J. Mueller, in running order, inserts an ad in our columns this week. His establishment is fitted up very nicely and the center partition which was torn out a year or so ago to make the building one room, has been replaced. The other part of the building has been replaced by the New York Racket Store. (February 2, 1894)

James Jacobsen requests us to state that he will open up a jewelry store in about two weeks in the front part of W.B. Alford's new drug store. Mr. Jacobson showed us on Monday last a very fine sample of engraving done by him. (February 9, 1894)

Julius Jacobsen and his daughter and son, James, went to the Metropolis on the last WEOTT, James, we understand, will purchase stock for his new jewelry store, while below. (February 9, 1894)

James Jacobsen of Ferndale who returned from San Francisco on the last WEOTT brought with him a stock of jewelry and has opened up in the building occupied by Druggist Alford. Mr. Jacobsen is a Ferndale boy and we don't doubt that he will be well patronized. (March 2, 1894)

Peter Anderson, informs us that he and other parties are making a move to establish a telephone exchange in Ferndale. Under the Bell patent all the instruments were rented and ... (February 23, 1894)

This week Peter Anderson stretched the wires that placed the Port Kenyon warehouse and the Occidental Ranch in the valley telephone circuit. Instruments connecting with this circuit, which comprise Ferndale, Fortuna, Rohnerville, Alton and Scotia, may be found in the following places in and about Ferndale...Ferndale Bank, American Stables, Brick Store, Moller & Boynton, Dr. Ring, Dr. Sargent, American Hotel, Dr. Michael, J.T. Robarts, J.H. Trost, Port Kenyon warehouse and the Occidental Ranch. (March 9, 1894)

The stockholders in the Alton-Ferndale telephone line have incorporated under the name of the Humboldt Telephone Co., with the capital stock placed at \$5,000, the principal place of business being at Ferndale. The directors and officers are as follows: H.H. Moller, C.A. Eastman, G.C. Barber, G.M. Brice and F.W. Luther...it is the intention of the company to consolidate with the Port Kenyon line and to establish a central in Ferndale, and a line may be constructed to Eureka. (April 26, 1895)

J.N. Jacobsen the jeweler...remember his place of business is at the Palm Pharmacy of W.B. Alford. (July 19, 1895)

The Humboldt Telephone Company...has decided to establish a central office at W.B. Alford's Drug store in Ferndale and the necessary switchboard, etc. has been ordered...the following towns will be on the line...Newburg, Fortuna, Rohnerville, Alton, Scotia, Grizzly Bluff, Waddington, Ferndale and Port Kenyon. (August 2, 1895)

Druggist Alford has quite a display of telephone instruments at his store. The Central Office of the Valley circuit is to be at his place of business. (August 23, 1895)

W.B. Barber having arranged with the Western Union Telegraph company, telegrams can now be sent from the central office of the Humboldt Telephone company at W.B. Alford's store Ferndale, to be transferred to their destination over the telegraph wires...arrangements will stand until that company reestablishes its offices in Ferndale, which were discontinued last week. (October 18, 1895)

The Humboldt Telephone Company is now in charge of both the Port Kenyon and Anderson lines, which gives this company a very complete valley circuit. (November 8, 1895)

W.B. Barber informs us that last week he completed the construction of the two central offices of the Humboldt Telephone company, one in Ferndale and one in Fortuna and has turned over to the company a working system of about 60 offices. Clyde Alford now takes charge of repairing lines for the company. (January 24, 1896)

Jewelry Jacobsen is now settled in his new quarters next to H.J. Mueller's and has a very neat and attractive store. (July 3, 1896)

The front of the building occupied by Druggist Alford and Dr. Michael has been given a fresh coat of paint by Painter Kroff. (June 26, 1896)

W.B. Alford of the Palm Pharmacy has added a neat sign to his place of business. (July 2, 1897)

...a move is on foot to connect Ferndale and Mattole country by telephone. The cost is placed at between \$1,200 and \$1,400, which amount should be raised easily by donation by the parties interested in both localities. (August 24, 1900)

The Humboldt Telephone Co. is putting in a fine new switchboard at their Ferndale central office in Alford's drug store. (July 9, 1901)

Miss Millie Langdon has accepted a position in the central office of the Humboldt Telephone Company, located at Alford's Pharmacy. (August 23, 1901)

The Ferndale-Petrolia telephone line has been kept "red-hot" since communication has been established between these two points. (October 18, 1901)

James N. Jacobsen has been appointed Manager of the Humboldt Telephone Co., vice C.C. Alford, resigned. Arrangements are now being made to make several extensions in the line, one of which is to Cock Robin Island. (January 17, 1902)

A.L. Trousdale is at work this week re-painting the interior of W.B. Alford's pharmacy -- shelves, counters and all. (March 14, 1902)

Manager Jacobsen was at work yesterday moving the Humboldt Telephone Co's Ferndale Central office from Alford's drug store into N.P. Petersen's merchandising store next door, and it will hereafter be in charge of Miss Emma Petersen. For a time only the night service is to be discontinued. (March 25, 1902)

Miss Mill Langdon, the popular "hello girl" at the Humboldt central office in Ferndale, leaves tomorrow for Petrolia where she will enjoy a vacation for a week or so. (August 1, 1902)

L. Macken, a druggist of Oakland, and a brother-in-law of Chas Moore and Mrs. S.V. Morrison, of Ferndale, has been in the Cream City the last few days. The gentleman is negotiating for the purchase of the W.B. Alford pharmacy here, although the sale had not been effected yesterday afternoon. (May 1, 1906)

Hartley Bros, the Ferndale painters, commenced work yesterday repainting the front of the Alford drug store on Main Street. (May 1, 1908)

Town Trustees...A petition received by the town fathers at their January meeting asking that the crossing on Main Street in front of the W.B. Alford drug store be kept in repair was again discussed... (February 5, 1909)

...new hitching racks in the rear of Alford's drug store on the Hart property are now ready for use and will accommodate many horses. The hitching racks are reached by driving through the alley between the post office and Dr. Lane's office and will be found a decided convenience... (December 24, 1912)

The Gill house opposite the post office on Main Street is being remodeled and will be occupied as a drug store by W.B. Alford, who will move from his present location in the Hart building as soon as the alterations are completed. (February 1, 1918)

W.B. Alford has moved his drug store to its new location opposite the post office and now has a very neat and attractive place of business. (May 12, 1918)

On the theory that a change is as good as a rest, Jas. Reinhart will close his Ferndale shoe repairing shop on June 5th and spend the next couple of months as an employee at the Poole Mill. (June 4, 1918)

...Plans are now being considered for the erection of a new concrete theatre building in Ferndale for Messrs. Pollock and Boyd, by Miss Frances Hart on her property next to the post office now occupied by the old wooden building which was formerly used by W.B. Alford as a drug store and one part of which is now used as a shoe shop by Jas. Reinhart. The contract has not yet been let for the new building but it is almost certain that the new theatre is to be built. If constructed it will be something over one hundred feet deep, fireproof and modern in every way. It is probable that in another week the Enterprise will be able to announce the new theatre as a certainty, which will be good news to the people of this vicinity....(July 2, 1920)

Pollock and Boyd make explanation...In last Friday's Enterprise the following article appeared: AAt the meeting of the town trustees last Tuesday evening the board was addressed by Walter Boyd, who asked that an ordinance be passed prohibiting the use of any wooden building in Ferndale for a motion picture house. R. Pollock, proprietor of the Valerie Theatre asked that his license fee be reduced and also that an ordinance be passed fixing the license fee on any tent show coming to Ferndale at \$100 per day.@ The above statement is

misleading in its wording. Walter Boyd spoke in behalf of the heirs of the Hart estate, who were present, and who contemplate erecting a fire proof structure on their property next to the post office for a motion picture theatre. They asked the town board what protection they could expect from them in case they decide to build along these lines; that is, to have an ordinance framed to have any other motion picture show that may start to be housed in a fire-proof building....(July 16, 1920)

The Englehart Paving & Construction Co. Has been awarded a contract by the Hart heirs, Miss Frances Hart, Mrs. May Shaw and Mrs. Helen Hilborn, for the construction of a new theatre building on Main Street, Ferndale, next to the post office, and work has already been commenced tearing down the old building now on the site in preparation for the beginning of construction work...The new theatre will be 40x118 feet in size, of reinforced concrete construction, and modern in every particular. On either side of the main front entrance to the theatre will be a store or business rooms, 14x28 feet in size. The ticket office, of glass, will be in the center, and to the rear of this will be a lobby about 12 feet wide and 30 feet long, leading to the theatre. The auditorium will be 40x70 feet in size and will have a seating capacity of more than four hundred people...The front will be of most attractive construction, with :The Hart,@ the name of the new theatre, in outstanding letters...(July 23, 1920)

The new Hart Theatre in Ferndale is rapidly nearing completion... (November 5, 1920)

Hart Theatre in Ferndale is opened with Great Success...(December 3, 1920)

The office room in front of the Hart Theatre, occupied for a time as campaign headquarters for the Ferndale General Hospital, has been leased by E.M. Loveland, who will move the Western Union offices there from its present location in the telephone building. (June 24, 1921)

Formal announcement is made in this morning=s Enterprise of the opening of the Paris Shop in the Hart Theatre building, Ferndale. (August 19, 1921)

A deal was concluded this week whereby Richard Pollock and Walter Boyd sold the P. & B. Motion Picture Circuit to Messrs. Edward and Byron Byard. The circuit is made up of the Hart Theatre in Ferndale, the Minor Theatre at Arcata, and theaters at Loleta, Rohnerville, Blue Lake, Korbels and Bulwinkle...It is understood that Byron Byard will reside in Ferndale and have the management of the Hart Theatre and the other theaters of the circuit in this part of the county...(October 20, 1922)

The Hart Theatre in Ferndale was considerably damaged by a fire which caught from the chimney last Sunday evening while the show was in progress. The audience filed out quietly and there was no panic. The fire was discovered through the audible crackling of the flames between the ceiling and the roof, and later the odor of smoke was noticed, upon which the audience commenced leaving and the theatre was emptied without confusion...the damage consists of the burning of ceiling timbers, rafters and damaging of the laths and plaster on the ceiling, with a few holes through the roof...(March 2, 1923)

A new musical instrument known as the AFotoplayer@ has been installed at the Hart Theatre in Ferndale this week by the representative of one of the large music houses of San Francisco. This instrument is designed to give the effect of a pipe organ, a full orchestra or a combination of instruments desired. It is coming into general use among the large picture theatres everywhere...(March 23, 1923)

Some boards which were standing against the wall back of the stove in the Hart Theatre building caught fire last Sunday evening shortly before seven o'clock and when discovered by Gerald Collins were blazing briskly. Gerald notified Chief Bartlett of the fire department and the fire was subdued in a few seconds after the chemical engine arrived on the scene, the fire alarm not being sounded...(March 30, 1923)

Byard Bros. Buy Theatre at Willits...Byron Byard, who has been manager of the Hart Theatre in this town and of the theatres at Loleta and Rohnerville, will move to Willits and take charge of the theatre there...Harold Larsen will act as manager of the Hart Theatre commencing next month...(May 25, 1923)

Manager Y. Darnell of the Hart Theatre this week severed his connection with that picture house and with his wife is now in Eureka...Richard Pollock, formerly in the picture business here but now proprietor of a theatre at Calistoga, arrived in Ferndale Saturday and will remain a week or more to conduct the Hart until a new manager arrives...(4/23/26)

Frederick W. Fowler, late of Crescent City, where he has been in charge of the Foshay interests, has arrived in Ferndale to succeed E.M. Loveland as manager of the Eel River & Southern Telephone Co., the controlling interest in which has been taken over by the Foshay Co...E.M. Loveland, who retires as manager, has been at the head of the Eel River & Southern Telephone Co. Since its organization many years ago and has conducted its business very successfully. He will now devote his time to the management of his AParis Shop@ in the Hart building and will also continue as manager of the Western Union business here....(5/31/29)

...Jas D. Martin announces the opening of his new ice cream and confectionery store in the Hart Theatre building tomorrow, September 22nd. It will be known as the AHeart Candy Shoppe@. Mr. Martin has installed a fine lot of fixtures and will have a very attractive place of business. He announces that the serving of noon luncheons will be a speciality. He will be assisted in the store by Mrs. Minnie Rees. (9/21/28)

Dresses at the Paris Shop...we have just received a new lot of silk dresses... (9/20/29)

The improvements being made to the Hart Theatre building are progressing rapidly, and the proprietors of the Paris Shop are much pleased with the acquisition of more space for the showing of their goods, the present quarters being very crowded. Mr. Martin, who will occupy the other store building expects to be ready for business probably by the 15th of the month. (9/7/28)

Mrs. E.M. Loveland of the Paris Shop was a guest...(9/7/28)

Jas. D. Martin=s place of business in the Hart Theatre building on Main St. is closed until November 1st, when Mr. Martin expects to reopen it as a restaurant, serving meals at all hours instead of only a noon luncheon as in the past. (10/24/30)

Byard & Byard, who have conducted the Hart Theatre in Ferndale the past three years as one of their chain of motion picture houses, have retired from business here and the lease to the theatre has reverted to the owners, the Hart Estate. It is announced that the Hart Theatre, which is now closed for repairs, will be reopened in the near future under the management of the owners. An experienced theatrical man will have the active management of the theatre. Byard & Byard will continue to operate the Minor Theatre in Arcata...(9/11/25)

Work has commenced this week remodeling the Hart Theatre building on Main St. into a business building. The sloping floor will be replaced by a level floor and the front altered. The Paris Shop will continue to occupy one of the front store buildings, while the balance of the building will be devoted to a candy and ice cream parlor and lunch stand, to be conducted by Jas. D. Martin. Mr. Martin states that he expects to be open for business early next month. (8/24/28)

The Hart Theatre in Ferndale was reopened last Wednesday evening after having been closed down about two weeks during which time the building underwent repairs. The theatre...has been taken over by the Hart Estate, owners of the building. Y. Darnell, an experienced theatrical man who was in Ferndale a few weeks a year or more ago as manager for Byard Bros., will be in charge of the theatre for the Hart Estate...(9/18/25)

Contractors Slingsby & Winkler and crew are making good progress on the addition to the rear of the Hart Theatre. When the work is completed the Hart will have a large stage, allowing of the staging of performances with a large cast. (3/13/25)

Workmen have been engaged this week in building a marquee on the front of the Hart Theatre building, occupied by the Paris Shop and the Heart Candy Shoppe. (11/23/28)

Byron Byard and family, who have made their home at Willits and later at Healdsburg since leaving Ferndale a few months ago, have returned to this town to reside, where Mr. Byard will look after the interests of the Hart Theatre and the other theatres in this county owned by the Byard Bros. They will reside in the Canfield house recently vacated by C.L. Markley and family...(6/13/24)

Harold Larsen, manager of the Hart Theatre in Ferndale, has tendered his resignation to Byard Brothers, owners of the California Theatres Co., with which the local theatre is connected. His successor has not yet been named...(4/25/24)

Mr. Y. Darnell of San Francisco arrived in Ferndale the last of the week to accept the position of manager of the Hart Theatre in this town...(5/2/24)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The windows of Alford=s drug store escaped the general breakage, but his loss of stock was heavy. His floor was littered with broken bottles and his loss will probably reach \$700...And Still The Earth Trembles, Heavy Shock Felt Shortly After One O=Clock Yesterday Morning, Followed by Lighter Trembles at 3 and 6 a.m...The W.B. Alford pharmacy, so badly wrecked by the tremblor of Wednesday morning, was again visited, and not a little of the remaining stock of drugs, patent medicines and glassware was thrown to the floor and broken...(April 24, 1906)

Byard Brothers, owners of the Hart Theatre in Ferndale, as well as a chain of other moving picture houses in this county, Willits and Healdsburg, have given their interests the name of California Theatres Co....714 Loew building, San Francisco...(3/21/24)

Jas. D. Martin announces the opening of the new restaurant, to be known as Martin=s Grill and Coffee Shop, in the Hart Theatre building in this town, succeeding the Heart Candy Shoppe. The place has been thoroughly renovated and remodeled, new equipment added and presents a very attractive appearance. Mr. Martin will be assisted in the conduct of the business by Mrs. Cora Goble...(11/14/30)

Mrs. Bernice Mills opened her new beauty parlor last Friday in the Hart Theatre building. The place has been tastily decorated and a full equipment of the latest appliances which go with a modern beauty parlor installed. (11/27/25)

Jas. F. Robarts has moved his stock of cigars and tobacco from his store building into his pharmacy next door and has had the former cigar store remodeled into an office building which will be occupied by Mrs. Beatrice Myers Winslow, who has heretofore occupied the office in the Hart Theatre building. (1/9/25)

The new addition to the stage in the Hart Theatre was completed this week. The stage is one of the largest in town and will accommodate

the cast of almost any performance which will come to Ferndale. The work was done by Frank Slingsby, contractor. P.I. Tappendorff was engaged to do the electrical work. It will be entirely finished for the high school operetta to be given there next Monday night. (3/27/25)

Mrs. Bernice Mills has moved her beauty parlors from their former location in the Hart Theatre building to the new Ferndale Bank building and now has one of the finest places of the kind to be found in the state. (10/14/27)

Mr. Mueller and his assistants were engaged in lowering the elevated platform which extends nearly the entire length of the north side of the store, and just as they broke loose the fastenings, the tackle arranged to hold the platform while it was being lowered gave away and down it came. Lund, T. Aldrich, H.A. Hansen, L.M. Klepper and E. Roberts, Geo M. Brice, Ed Hopkins, A.H. Kausen, Amelia Robarts, Minnie Boynton, G.W. Dungan, H.C. Blum, L.P. Branstetter....Both the Mueller and Lund stores will probably be kept open to the public as neither building is sufficiently large to display the company's present stock nor the additions that are soon to be added. Garland Dungan and Robt Roberts will have charge of one store while the other will be conducted by J.N. Lund. (November 15, 1904)

H.J. Mueller has leased to G.M. Brice, H.A. Hansen and L.M. Klepper the north 39 feet of lot 5, block 14, Francis Division to Ferndale, with buildings thereon and appurtenances for a term of five years from 11/1/1904 at a monthly rent of \$65.00. (December 13, 1904)

The Citizens' Furniture and Undertaking Co is now moving its stock from its store in the K of P Hall, and that place is no longer open for business. With the addition of the goods formerly in that store, the company's place of business in the Mueller building is now filled to overflowing, and the concern will probably have to secure a warehouse in which to store the surplus furniture, etc. (December 13, 1904)

An alarm of fire was given in Ferndale Monday evening, occasioned by a dense volume of smoke issuing from the building occupied by the Milwaukee saloon on Main Street. Quite a stir was the result, but investigation proved that the smoke was coming out of the chimney, and that everything was O.K.. (July 6, 1894)

...final account and distribution of the estate of the late P.F. Hart. The widow was granted a family allowance of \$500 for expenses since the death of the deceased and the estate valued at \$25,623 was distributed as follows, to each of the four children: Francis, Mary, Smith C., and Helen Hart is left the sum of \$100. The remainder to go to the widow M.A. Hart. The estate consists principally of farming land in the county, bank stock valued at \$700, a chattel mortgage for \$1,855.25 and \$1,808 in cash. Also a law library, three horses, harness and buggy and household furniture. (September 13, 1895)

It is quite likely that the Hart Estate will erect a handsome new building on Main Street this summer to take the place of the building occupied by Comisto and Calanchini. (June 12, 1896)

Painter Wilson has been at work touching up the interior of the Hart Store formerly occupied by L.H. Miner. Calanchini and Comisto will move in there in a few days as the building they now occupy is to be torn down and a handsome new edifice will be erected at once by Mrs. P.F. Hart to take its place. (June 23, 1896)

Calanchini and Comisto have secured the Milwaukee Saloon building and will move it to the lot next to Dunn's blacksmith shop. It will be fitted up to rent. (June 30, 1896)

The old Milwaukee Saloon building was torn down this week it being considered not safe to move. (July 10, 1896)

The work of excavating for the new Hart Building on Main Street was begun yesterday by Bartlett and Smiley. Howard Gay commences work in a few days laying a cement foundation for the new structure. (July 17, 1896)

Carpenter Miles is pushing work on the new Hart building, he has seven men employed besides himself. (July 31, 1896)

Byron Wooldridge and Maynard Michel and brother are lathing the new Hart Building. Howard Gay will plaster it and T.L. Wilson will paint it. (August 18, 1896)

Howard Gay commenced spreading the plaster on the new Hart Building Wednesday. (August 21, 1896)

The lower story of the new Hart Building will soon be ready for occupancy by Calanchini and Comisto, who will have one of the finest saloons in the county when located in their new quarters. (September 29, 1896)

The plate glass for the front of the new Hart Building was freighted to Ferndale Saturday by C.A. Bartlett and contract Milnes has it now in place. (October 13, 1896)

Calanchini and Comisto will move into their elegant new saloon in the Hart building next Monday. (October 13, 1896)

Calanchini and Comisto are now located in their handsome new saloon in the Hart building. The new bar counter which occupies a place in this resort is one of the prettiest in the county. It was made by Swortel and Williams of Fortuna and is ornamented by a piece of Redwood Burl. (October 20, 1896)

A handsome looking glass 4x6 feet in size was received from below this week by the Lund brothers for the Milwaukee Saloon, Comisto and Calanchini. (September 24, 1897)

Calanchini and Comisto now have their handsome big gilt framed looking glass in position over their bar at the Milwaukee. (October 8, 1897)

Jerry Lanini is now tending bar for Comisto and Calanchini... (March 25, 1898)

Comisto and Calanchini have put in a fine new steam beer pump at their Milwaukee Saloon. (December 2, 1898)

Jerry Lanini, the bald headed bungs tarter, at the Milwaukee Saloon...took a bath Saturday morning. A keg of Buttle=s=s's cider blew up and Jerry came within an ace of being drowned. (January 3, 1899)

The bar in the Milwaukee Saloon looks like a Mirror. It has just been hardwood finished by Ole Olesen and he did a first class job. (November 27, 1899)

The front of the upper story of the Hart building is being neatly re-painted. (September 14, 1900)

The interior of the Milwaukee saloon is being handsomely papered and revarnished, and when completed will present an elegant appearance. Messrs. Calanchini & Comisto believe in keeping their popular resort in first-class shape. George Fry and Arthur Hadoran of Eureka are doing the work. (June 15, 1900)

Work was begun yesterday moving the fixtures and stock of the Milwaukee saloon to the building near by, formerly occupied by the Red Star Clothing House, where the business will be conducted until the repairs to its former quarters are completed. (April 20, 1906)

The Hart building, in which was located the Milwaukee, and which was so badly racked by Wednesday morning's earthquake, has been propped so that now the danger of its collapse has been eliminated. The work of repairing the structure was commenced yesterday morning. Messrs Calanchini & Comisto, whose place of business was in the lower story of the building are now doing business in the building formerly occupied by the Red Star Clothing House. (April 24, 1906)

Carpenters Eugene Haywood, Will Flowers and Thomas Boyd commenced work yesterday morning repairing the damage done to the Milwaukee building on Main Street by the late earthquake. The floor of the building is being torn up to permit of a new foundation being put in. The new floor will slope to the center of the structure, and the plaster and lathes will be torn away and the walls and ceiling of the lower room clothed and papered. It will be several weeks before the improvements are all completed. (May 25, 1906)

Contractors Steeves and Flowers are rushing the work on the improvements being made to the Milwaukee building on Main Street, but will not complete the repairs for several weeks. Calanchini & Comisto, who occupy the lower floor of the building, will make a number of changes in the arrangement of their place of business. (June 8, 1906)

The Milwaukee saloon is again quartered in the Hart building. The structure was badly damaged by the April earthquake, but has been renovated and improved to such an extent that Messrs Calanchini & Comisto now have a more convenient and attractive place of business than before the quake. (July 27, 1906)

Monday night a burglar or burglars forced an entrance into the Milwaukee saloon in Ferndale and relieved that place of business of a very neat sum of money. The robbers made their way into the saloon through the transom over the rear door, and with a brace and bit went to work on a slot machine in the front part of the building. It was an easy matter to bore a circle in the panel of the machine and remove the lock and secure the money in the receptacle in which the quarters are kept in the interior of the machine. Besides looting the machine the robbers turned their attention to the cash register from which they secured several dollars and also helped themselves to about twenty-five dollars in nickels that were kept in a cigar box placed among the stock of cigars kept by the firm and hardly a likely place to look for money... (January 10, 1908)

Next week Messrs. L.M. Smith and M.B. Hansen will start work...reshingle a portion of the Milwaukee Depot building and the Hart tenement at the rear of this place of business. (September 22, 1908)

Carpenters L.M. Smith and M.B. Hansen are now engaged in reshingling the Milwaukee building on Main Street. (November 6, 1908)

After having conducted the Milwaukee saloon in Ferndale for thirty-four years, Messrs. P. Calanchini and S. Comisto have disposed of the business to Orsen (Bud) Dudley who will take possession on February 15th. The firm of Calanchini & Comisto is believed to be the oldest in Humboldt County which has been continuously under one management. The place of business has been in operation for over a third of a century, and in all that time there has been no change of management...Mr. Dudley, who succeeds to the ownership of the Milwaukee on the 15th inst., has been employed there for many years past and is thoroughly familiar with the business... (February 6, 1917)

The Town Dries Up: Ceremonies are lively...at twelve o'clock last Monday night the licensed saloon ceased to exist in Ferndale, as elsewhere over the United States. On Saturday evening and again on Monday evening large crowds gathered in town and gave John Barleycorn a fond farewell. The crowds were in the main good natured and there were no arrests. Several of the local saloons will be converted into soft drink emporiums, among them being the Milwaukee, Bud Dudley Proprietor; and the Central, Peter Mossi Proprietor. The plans of other former saloon owners are yet indefinite...(July 4, 1919)

...AD...Dudley=s, The House of Good Eats, Main Street, Ferndale...Everything Fresh and Clean...Tables for Ladies...(July 30, 1920) (I have seen reference to Dudley=s restaurant before this).

Budd Dudley this week completed the work of moving his restaurant and soft drink emporium from its former quarters in the Hart building to the Hiller building, formerly occupied by the Valerie Theatre. Budd now has a neat and up-to-date place of business. (February 4, 1921)

A new pool and billiard parlor has been opened in the Hart building by Walter Roberts. The interior has been considerably altered and presents a very neat appearance. James Robarts is assisting Mr. Roberts. (November 25, 1921)

W.A. Bartlett, for many years proprietor of the Ferndale Cigar Factory, has purchased the Brunswick billiard and pool parlors in this town and took possession of the same the first of the week. Walter Roberts, who opened the parlors last November, departed Tuesday evening for San Francisco, where he has accepted a position as traveling salesman for a novelty vending machine, which he will introduce throughout the state. Mr. Bartlett plans to close his cigar factory and store in the near future and will devote all his time to the management of the Brunswick Parlors. He will be assisted in the work by James Robarts...(March 3, 1922)

Contractor William Flowers and crew this week commenced work on the construction of an addition on the rear of the Hart building on Main Street, occupied by the Bartlett billiard parlors. (October 13, 1922)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The Hart building, occupied by the Milwaukee Saloon, was served in a similiar manner (twisted, lean, shore it up)...although the damage may be perhaps more easily repaired...(April 24, 1906)

AD: W.A. Bartlett...Ferndale...Cigars or Tobacco...(12/11/31)

George L. Collins, who resigned as nightwatchman and marshal of this town on November 1st, has accepted a position in W.A. Bartlett=s billiard parlors. (11/7/24)

Robert Freeman who has conducted the bootblack stand at Bartlett=s billiard parlors the past year or more, left this week for a visit with relatives. He expects later to return and locate somewhere in California. (10/17/24)

Mr. T.D. Ross and family are expected to arrive on the Pomona today to take up their residence in Ferndale. The doctor will practice his profession here. (January 5, 1900)

Dr. T.D. Ross and family, of Santa Rosa, were among the incoming passengers and have located in Ferndale, where the doctor will practice his profession in the future. He may be found at the office of Dr. J.H. Ring. (January 9, 1900)

Dr. K.M. Lundborg will open his dental parlors in Dr. H.J. Ring's office in a few days... (December 27, 1901)

Dr. K.N. Lundberg, the dentist, having finished his work at Hydesville and Scotia, has returned to Ferndale where he has decided to locate permanently. The doctor can now be found in the front room of the building on Main Street occupied by Dr. H.J. Ring, and he is now ready to receive patients. (January 24, 1902)

Dentist Lundborg is now comfortably located in his office in the Hart Building, Ferndale. (February 27, 1903)

The new Brown building on Main Street is finished and Dr. T.D. Ross and Dr. H.J. Ring have moved their offices thereto. Dr. Ross occupied one half of the building and Dr. Ring the other half, and both gentlemen have now roomy and inviting quarters, neatly furnished and with every convenience at hand. (October 3, 1902)

Kerri Brothers were at work yesterday tearing out the partitions in the Hart building lately vacated by Dr. Ring. This building is to be remodeled somewhat and to be occupied by P.M. Canepa who will soon open a jewelry and variety store therein. (December 2, 1902)

P.M. Canepa, who at present employed in H.J. Mueller's furniture store, informs us that he intends to soon engage in business for himself in Ferndale and in a short time will open a jewelry and variety store in the Cream City. (December 2, 1902)

The Hart building, formerly occupied by Dr. Ring, is about ready for the occupancy of P.M. Canepa, who is to conduct a jewelry and variety store therein. (December 9, 1902)

P.M. Canepa will open his jewelry and variety store on December 10th... (December 9, 1902)

O. Youngman is now in the employ of P.M. Canepa manufacturing and repairing jewelry. (April 10, 1903)

Lawrence Canepa is learning the watch repairing business with his brother, P.M. Canepa, Ferndale. (January 26, 1904)

John Morris moved last Friday the big Jas Jacobsen safe from the White Front Store to the jewelry store of P.M. Canepa. It was quite a chore, as the safe is very heavy. (April 12, 1904)

Carpenters Eugene Haywood and A. Rusk of Port Kenyon have placed a new display window in the store occupied by Jeweler Canepa. (April 27, 1906)

Lawrence Canepa is now employed in the Ferndale jewelry store of his brother, P.M. Canepa, and will learn the trade. (January 22, 1907)

Hartley Bros. were engaged this week in repainting the fronts of the Hart buildings on Main Street, occupied by P.M. Canepa and Bartlett & Pierson. (November 24, 1911)

Work will be commenced in the near future on the building of a new addition to the rear of the P.M. Canepa jewelry store in Ferndale. This will be used as a show room for the fine line of Starr pianos which Mr. Canepa is putting in stock, he being the Ferndale agent for this popular instrument. (September 2, 1913)

James Martin, who has been employed in P.M. Canepa's Ferndale jewelry store for a long time past, has decided to enter business for himself, and today will open a jewelry store and watch repairing establishment at Loleta. (December 9, 1913)

Diamond Robbery Mystery...As the result of a mysterious robbery at his Ferndale jewelry store last Thursday afternoon P.M. Canepa is out \$425, the value of mounted diamonds taken by the thief. As yet no arrests have been made but several clues are being followed and the apprehension of the guilty part is hoped for. Mr. Canepa had a tray containing a number of diamond rings, scarf pins and cuff buttons out on his counter showing them to a woman customer and during his momentary absence to the rear of the store a number of pieces of the jewelry disappeared. Several people had stepped in and out of the store and Mr. Canepa has a particular recollection of one party who came in just as he was reaching down to get some article out of the bottom of a showcase, to whom suspicion points... (November 16, 1915)

The jewelry store of P.M. Canepa in Ferndale was burglarized last Tuesday evening between six and seven o'clock and diamonds valued at about \$1500 were stolen. No clue has been obtained as to the identity of the burglar. Mr. Canepa locked up his store a few moments before six and went home. Returning to the store a few minutes after seven he discovered that the bar across the outside door leading into his back room had been broken. Realizing that his place of business had in all probability been robbed he started an investigation which confirmed his fears. He had left his safe unlocked, and looking inside he at once discovered that a tray of diamond rings had been stolen. He is uncertain as to whether there were ten or eleven rings in the tray. One ring which did not contain a diamond was left untouched in the tray...Jess Hunsucker, a recent arrival in Ferndale, was arrested yesterday and charged with the robbery. The diamonds have not been recovered. Sheriff Ross states that he has strong evidence against the accused man. (November 25, 1921)

Developments in the Canepa Jewelry Store Robbery Case...Hunsucker breaks down under questioning, admits his guilt and informs officers that diamonds are hidden in Petersen & Reinhart Garage. Same are found by officers with exception of one, still missing...Hunsucker tells officers missing diamond can be found in Citizens Undertaking Parlors, where it is located by them, thus accounting for all the stolen stones...The strongest evidence was that of John Bach, young son of Mrs. Emma Bach of this town. The boy was looking out of the window of the apartment over the Citizens Furniture Store, where he resides with his mother and brother, and saw Hunsucker enter the alley at the side of the Canepa store at about the time the robbery had been committed...(December 2, 1921)

Jeweler P.M. Canepa has been engaged this week moving his stock from his old location in the Hart building to the upper floor of the building alongside, over Bartlett's billiard parlors. He will be located there until the new building to replace the one destroyed by fire recently has been completed, when he will occupy quarters in the new structure. (9/12/24)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...In the front of P.M. Canepa's jewelry store, the damage is the loss of windows. Mr. Canepa's stock suffered to some extent, probably not more than \$25...(April 24, 1906)

BUILDING (north side of lot)

President Cleveland has appointed Garland Dungan postmaster at Ferndale to succeed L.H. Miner, who has held the position ever since May, 1890. The appointment has been sent to the Senate for confirmation... (February 23, 1894)

An addition now being built to the store occupied by Miner & Francis, belonging to the Hart estate, is to be 24x30 feet in size. Carpenters Blakemore, Davis, Johnston and Dungan are building it, and when completed part of it is to be used as a warehouse for Miner & Francis and part for a meeting hall for the Cream City Cycling Club. The members of this club propose to have comfortable headquarters in which to spend their evenings. (November 30, 1894)

J.W. Blakemore and assistants completed this week the addition to Miner & Francis' store, in which the Ferndale Cycling Club is to have its headquarters. The boys intend fixing up their hall in the most comfortable manner, and among other things it will be supplied with a fine billiard table. The Ferndale wheelmen propose to enjoy themselves this winter. (December 7, 1894)

The Ferndale wheelmen hope to have their headquarters back of Miner and Francis' store furnished and ready for occupancy in a few days. The boys figure on many a pleasant evening together this winter. (December 14, 1895) (think this is 1894?)

The CCC's are contemplating moving their club rooms to the Mullady building, which will be fitted up for them if satisfactory arrangements can be made. They will occupy the entire second floor... (September 27, 1895)

...Cream City Cycling Club...it was decided to rent the upper story of the Mullady building for their club rooms. It will be fixed up for them immediately. They will have a large reading room in the front part of the building, while the rear will be used as a billiard room and social hall. Between these rooms are situated a cloak room, bathroom and closets... (October 18, 1895)

The firm of Miner and Francis has been dissolved of mutual consent. Mr. Francis retiring. Lee can still be found at his old stand ready to serve the public. (February 1, 1895)

...Ferndale is to be connected with the metallic telephone circuit of the Sunset Company. E. McLaren, Superintendent. and that the line will soon be constructed to this place. This circuit takes in the towns across the river, Eureka and Arcata. The companies employees stretched 50 miles of wire last week. (September 6, 1895)

The Sunset Telephone Company completed the line which now connects Ferndale with the County Telephone circuit...the office at Ferndale is at L.H. Miner's store... (November 1, 1895)

...Western Union Telegraph office has advised...to discontinue the telegraph office at Ferndale, our people will therefore have to rely on the telephone hereafter... (October 11, 1895)

Mr. L.H. Miner has arranged to reestablish telegraph services to this place... (November 1, 1895)

Painter Wilson has been at work touching up the interior of the Hart Store formerly occupied by L.H. Miner. Calanchini and Comisto will move in there in a few days as the building they now occupy is to be torn down and a handsome new edifice will be erected at once by Mrs. P.F. Hart to take its place. (June 23, 1896)

Mr. Lee Taubman has leased the Hart Building, formerly occupied by L.H. Miner, and will open a general clothing house therein about September 15th. The building will be remodeled throughout and supplied with a plate glass front. Mr. Taubman will depart for New York City on tomorrow's steamer, where he will purchase his stock of new goods. (July 17, 1896)

...Lee Taubman will open a clothing store in the Hart building in Ferndale, now occupied by Calanchini and Comisto... (August 14, 1896)

The Red Star Clothing house of Ferndale opens about October 15th. (September 15, 1896)

The lumber is being hauled with which to renovate the Hart Building for Lee Taubman, who will open the Red Star Clothing House therein November 1st. The building is to be supplied with a fine plate glass front. (October 16, 1896)

Lee Taubman will not open the Red Star Clothing house in Ferndale until November 1st. (October 16, 1896)

Taubman's Red Star Clothing house will open for business next Saturday. (November 17, 1896)

Elbert Williams is clerking for Lee Taubman at the Red Star. (November 17, 1896)

After an unavoidable delay on account of the building not being completed, the Red Star Clothing House is now ready for business, and in order that the people of this community may know the foundation stones upon which we expect to build our future trade, we desire to present to them at this time the following as our business principles: Cash to all and credit to some...New Hart Building... (November 20, 1896)

Lee Taubman will open his Red Star Clothing house in Ferndale tomorrow. (November 20, 1896)

Grand Opening of the second year of business...Red Star Clothing... (November 16, 1897)

Lee Taubman had erected...over his Red Star Clothing house a large flag pole... (May 10, 1898)

George Carbray, who has been employed at Taubman's Red Star Clothing house for the past two and one-half years, has resigned his position. (November 21, 1899)

Harry Taubman is again assisting his father at the Red Star Clothing House in Ferndale, having resigned his position with W.A. McNamara at Eureka. (April 8, 1902)

George Dudley, who has been working at the Red Star, returned to Petrolia last Monday. he is a son of Millman J. A. Dudley, of Mattole. (April 11, 1902)

Carpenter Holly is getting ready to remodel the front in the Hart building on Main Street, occupied by Lee Taubman's Red Star Clothing

House. A practically new front will be put in with double doors. (May 6, 1902)

A new roof is being put on the Red Star store building occupied by Lee Taubman and owned by Mrs. Hart. (August 26, 1902)

Charles Thompson has resigned his position at the Red Star Clothing to accept a job at Burrill's Confectionery and Ice Cream Parlors. (November 4, 1904)

Benjamin Worthington, son of Andrew Worthington and wife, of the Waddington section, has accepted a position in Lee Taubman's Red Star Clothing House. (November 4, 1904)

Lee Taubman, who has owned and conducted the Red Star Clothing House in Ferndale for the past nine years, has decided to retire from active business. He has taken his two sons, C.F. and H.L. Taubman, into his business as partners and from now on the two junior members of the firm will manage the business. The firm name will be Lee Taubman & Sons...the store will be remodeled and made one of the most up-to-date clothing stores in Humboldt County... (May 16, 1905)

Merchants Lee Taubman & Sons of the Red Star Clothing House are to move their stock of goods from their present quarters to the Williams building, next to the postoffice, lately vacated by H.R. Duncan, of the Wave Candy Store. Work on fitting up the interior of the building for the occupancy of the Messrs Taubman will soon be commenced. The gentlemen do not expect to be in their new quarters until after the first of the new year. (October 20, 1905)

Lee Taubman and sons will move their clothing store to its new location in the Williams building some time between the 10th and 15th of the present month.... (January 2, 1906)

The stock of the Red Star Clothing House was being removed this week from the Hart building to the firm's new quarters in the Williams building, near the Post Office. (January 14, 1906)

Work was begun yesterday moving the fixtures and stock of the Milwaukee saloon to the building near by, formerly occupied by the Red Star Clothing House, where the business will be conducted until the repairs to its former quarters are completed. (April 20, 1906)

The Milwaukee saloon is again quartered in the Hart building. The structure was badly damaged by the April earthquake, but has been renovated and improved to such an extent that Messrs Calanchini & Comisto now have a more convenient and attractive place of business than before the quake. (July 27, 1906)

Peter Schmidt, the Ferndale harness maker, has leased Mrs. Mary Hart's building on Main Street, next to P.M. Canepa's jewelry store, for a term of five years. The gentleman will take possession as soon as few necessary improvements are made in the building. (January 31, 1908)

Carpenter Peter Petersen yesterday completed the work of re-arranging the interior of the Hart building, now being occupied by Peter Schmidt, the harness dealer. The Hartley Bros have also been engaged in renovating the interior of the store. (February 21, 1908)

Edgar Cadoni has decided to learn the harness maker's trade, and Tuesday accepted a position with Peter Schmidt, the Ferndale harness dealer. (March 13, 1908)

Henry Ott resigned his position at Peter Schmidt's harness shop the first of the year, and plans to shortly leave for Lindsay, Tulare County, where he will open a shop of his own. (January 5, 1909)

Negotiations have been concluded whereby on the 15th of the present month Henry Ott will become the owner of the Peter Schmidt harness shop in Ferndale. Mr. Schmidt and family plan to leave soon after that date for Ione, Amador County, where the gentleman has a brother residing... (July 4, 1911)

Work was commenced yesterday moving the stock of the Grey Horse harness shop from the Hart building to its former location in the Russ building, next door to the Ferndale Market. Proprietor Henry Ott will have his shop neatly fitted up and will have more roomy quarters than in his present location... (September 5, 1911)

Bartlett & Pierson yesterday commenced the work of moving their cigar factory and store to its new location in the Hart Building. By tonight they will probably be settled in their new place of business. (October 10, 1911)

Hartley Bros. were engaged this week in repainting the fronts of the Hart buildings on Main Street, occupied by P.M. Canepa and

Bartlett & Pierson. (November 24, 1911)

A deal was been practically concluded this week whereby George Pierson about the 15th of this month will dispose of his interest in the cigar factory of Bartlett & Pierson to his partner, Walter Bartlett, who will thereafter conduct this business as sole owner. (March 6, 1914)

George Pierson, who has sold his interest in the Bartlett & Pierson cigar factory to his partner, W.A. Bartlett, severed his connection with that business Tuesday and is now preparing to move with his family to Eureka... (March 13, 1914)

W.A. Bartlett, for many years proprietor of the Ferndale Cigar Factory, has purchased the Brunswick billiard and pool parlors in this town and took possession of the same the first of the week. Walter Roberts, who opened the parlors last November, departed Tuesday evening for San Francisco, where he has accepted a position as traveling salesman for a novelty vending machine, which he will introduce throughout the state. Mr. Bartlett plans to close his cigar factory and store in the near future and will devote all his time to the management of the Brunswick Parlors. He will be assisted in the work by James Robarts...(March 3, 1922)

George Heney is to open a cleaning and pressing establishment in the Hart Building, formerly occupied by the Bartlett Cigar factory. He has purchased a new steam pressing machine and other equipment, and expects to be open for business in the near future. (August 4, 1922)

George Heney has been engaged this week installing the machinery in his new cleaning and pressing establishment, which he is to open in the Hart building, formerly occupied by the Bartlett cigar factory. (August 11, 1922)

Mrs. May B. Rushmore of the Red Star Clothing House has sold her clothes cleaning business and equipment to George S. Heney of the Ferndale Clean Works, retaining her steam pressing machine. Mr. Heney will combine the two businesses and will have a finely equipped cleaning and pressing establishment. (December 8, 1922)

Contractor Frank Slingsby and crew have been engaged this week in making alterations and repairs to the fronts of the Hart buildings on Main Street, occupied by Bartlett=s billiard parlors and Heney=s cleaning works. (March 30, 1923)

Through a deal concluded this week Gus Putney purchased of Jas. Reinhart the latter=s shoe repairing business and equipment in Ferndale. Mr. Putney has been employed at the shop for a long time past and is a thoroughly competent workman. Mr. Reinhart plans to open a sporting goods store in the Hiller building on Main Street and will also do gun repairing and similar work. (June 8, 1923)

The south half of the Hart building on Main Street, now occupied by George S. Heney=s cleaning and pressing works, is being remodeled and will be occupied by James E. Reinhart, where the gentleman will conduct a sporting goods house and gun store. (June 29, 1923)

The Putney shoe shop building was being treated in a new coat of paint this week...(August 31, 1923)

Carpenter Miles, constructed an ice house this week for Calanchini and Comisto at the Milwaukee Saloon. (July 12, 1895)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The Hart building, formerly occupied by the Red Star Clothing House, but now vacant, was badly twisted in front and the windows and sash torn lose and broken...(April 24, 1906)

OLD AND NEW HART BUILDING NOTES:

Good progress is being made on the construction of the new Hart building on Main St. to replace the one destroyed by fire some weeks ago. It is now hoped to have the building ready for occupancy shortly after the middle of November. There will be two stores in the building, the larger to be occupied by Cruikshanks & Eriksen, men=s furnishers, and the other by Jeweler P.M. Canepa. The building will have a modern stucco front, with attractive display windows, and will be a credit to the town. The building to be vacated by Cruikshanks & Eriksen will be occupied by Adrian Chapin and Lee Reinhart, who are to establish an up-to-date electrical store. (10/31/24)

A fire last Tuesday morning shortly after seven o=clock in the Hart building on Main St., occupied by Geo. Heney=s cleaning works and the Reinhart Bros., did heavy damage and only the splendid work of the Ferndale Fire Department prevented its spread through the entire wooden block with an enormous loss. George Heney, proprietor of the cleaning works, was pumping up a small tank filled with fuel oil when the end of the tank blew off, the oil igniting from the flame and spreading over the shop with great rapidity. Mr. Heney was unsuccessful in his efforts to extinguish the blaze with a small chemical extinguisher and by the time the alarm could be sounded the flames had enveloped the entire front of the building and were shooting out half way across the street. For a short time it appeared as though the fire would be beyond control but the rapid work of the firemen with the pumping and chemical engines soon deadened the flames though it was a considerable time before the danger was past, owing to the fact that the fire had spread into the Mossi building

adjoining and was smouldering in the attic...The pressing machine and other equipment in the Heney cleaning works was destroyed, together with the office furniture and a number of shirts which were hanging in the front part. Quite a quantity of clothing was saved. Mr. Heney estimates his loss in the neighborhood of \$1500, and which he carried no insurance. The loss of James Reinhart, who conducted a sporting goods store and gun shop in the other part of the building was about \$800, the gentleman estimates. Lee Reinhart=s stock of electrical goods in the same store was practically wiped out with a loss of about \$500. No insurance was carried by any of the parties. The upstairs portion of the Mossi building alongside suffered quite heavy damage, the fire burning through the side and destroying a quantity of the household furniture and clothing of Mr. and Mrs. Harry Frucht, who occupied the upper flat, with a loss of several hundred dollars. The lower floor of this building, occupied by Mr. Mossi=s billiard and parlors, was considerably damaged by water. The jewelry store of P.M. Canepa which abutted the burned Hart property was almost miraculously saved from destruction, though the flames had burned part way through the wall which separated them. The stock in this store was not even damaged by water and Mr. Canepa considers himself most fortunate, as well he may, as for a time it appeared as though his store was doomed. Mr. Heney expects to reopen for business as soon as he can get new machinery and a location. His main cleaning works is situated in another part of town so that the heaviest loss is his pressing machine and the smaller articles of equipment used in the business. J.E. Reinhart is as yet undecided as to whether or not he will reopen his shop. His lathe and considerable of his machinery was not badly damaged and can be repaired. A large number of guns were burned and much ammunition was exploded, there being a heavy bombardment in progress during the early stages of the conflagration. (8/29/24)

Jeweler P.M. Canepa was moving yesterday into his new place of business in the new Hart building. (11/21/24)

Contractor Frank Slingsby and crew commenced work yesterday tearing down the old Hart building on Main St., which was gutted by fire about two weeks ago in preparation for erecting a new business building on the same location. The new building will be 37x65 feet in size, of solid wall construction with stucco front. Work will be rushed as much as possible and it is expected the building will be in readiness for occupancy before the holiday season. (9/12/24)

Reece Cruikshanks and Martin Eriksen, who have operated men's clothing stores in Ferndale and Fortuna under the firm name of Cruikshanks & Eriksen, have dissolved partnership, according to announcement made this week. Mr. Eriksen will be the sole owner of the store in Ferndale of which he has been the manager, while Mr. Cruikshanks becomes proprietor of the former firm's store in Fortuna, of which he has been in charge. The change dates from July 8th. The partnership of Cruikshanks & Eriksen has been in effect for the past eight years...(7/17/31)

AD...P.M. Canepa...jeweler...(7/17/31)

...on April 1st Reece Cruikshanks of the firm of Cruikshanks & Eriksen of this town will dispose of his interest in the business to John Brazill, Jr. Mr. Brazill is a well known and popular young man of this town and for several years past has been connected with the Marcussen Grocery Co....Mr. Cruikshanks will enter business in Fortuna...(3/15/29)

Since the destruction of the Hart building occupied by Heney=s cleaning works and the Reinhart Bros. Last Tuesday morning there is a strong sentiment prevailing that the land occupied by this building should be acquired by the town and a street opened up there. The need of a street through to Shaw avenue at this point has been felt for many years and there has been much talk in the past concerning opening one through. It would break the long line of wooden buildings which now stand there, would materially lessen the fire danger and would result in a substantial decrease in insurance rates...(8/29/24)

The matter of opening a new alley through the Hart property on the west side of Main St. also came up for consideration...it was stated that the alley could be opened without much difficulty from Roberts Hall to the rear of the Hart Theatre, from where it would cross the creek and merge into Fourth St...(10/31/24)

Cruikshanks & Eriksen moved the first of the week to their new store in the new Hart building and now have one of the best appointed business places to be found in the county. Reinhart & Chapin have opened their new electrical supply store in the building vacated by Cruikshanks & Eriksen. (12/12/24)

The store of J.E. Reinhart in the Hart building on Main Street has been enlarged, Mr. Reinhart having moved his machinery in to the rear end of the building. The front part is being fixed up for an attractive little store. (4/4/24)

A move is on foot looking to the opening of an alley through Mrs. M. Hart's property to the north line of the Odd Fellow's building. The matter will come up at the town trustees meeting tomorrow night. (September 5, 1905)

WAREHOUSE

Mrs. M. Hart is thinking of building a large warehouse on her land in the rear of the Mueller building on Main Street to be used by the Citizens' Furniture Co. of this place. (September 5, 1905)

Mrs. M. Hart is to have a new warehouse, 40x50 feet in size, erected on her property on the west side of Main Street for rental to Johnson

Bros., the Ferndale merchants. Work will be commenced shortly. The building will be erected by L.J. Stone and assistants. (December 17, 1912)

Dan will place a plate glass front in the new structure, and from all accounts it is to be a decided ornament to the town. (August 3, 1894)

We are informed that Dan Branstetter will commence work on his new building, which is to be erected between the Milwaukee Saloon and the Gilt Edge sometime next month. (August 10, 1894)

B. Bonetti was moving his jewelry shop Tuesday into the Michel drug store. D.A. Branstetter will commence work on his new building in a few days. (September 7, 1894)

Another of Ferndale's old landmarks has disappeared, Dan Branstetter's building so long occupied by Kausen's and Bonetti's jewelry stores and Ries & Christensen's barber shop having been torn down this week. Dan intends putting up in its place a fine two-story frame building the construction of which will commence in a few days. The upper story of the new structure will be partitioned into rooms suitable for offices while the lower story will be occupied by Ries' barber shop and Kausen's jewelry store. Ferndale is improving very rapidly. (September 14, 1894)

From now until the completion of Dan Branstetter's new building, Miss Kausen's jewelry store will have temporary quarters in the north end of the Gilt Edge building while Tonsorial Artist Ries can be found with Horace H. Fike at the latter's shop across the street. H.B. Christensen, who was in partnership with Mr. Ries, has retired from the business. (September 14, 1894)

The cement foundation for D.A. Branstetter's new building on Main Street was being laid this week. (September 21, 1894)

Work is rapidly progressing on the new building of D. Branstetter and Jas Mullady on Main Street. (October 12, 1894)

Carpenters John Kerri and D.A. Branstetter were engaged this week placing a handsome front on the building of the last named gentleman, in course of erection on Main Street. Mr. Branstetter is to have an elegant structure when it is completed. (November 16, 1894)

T.L. Wilson commenced "clothing" the interior of D.A. Branstetter's handsome new building Wednesday morning. The ground floor will be occupied by Miss L. Kausen, Jeweler, and Reis & Fike, Barbers. (November 30, 1894)

The plate glass windows were placed in the front of D.A. Branstetter's new building the first of the week, under the supervision of T.L. Wilson, who is doing the painting and decorating required to complete this handsome structure. The apartment to be occupied by Miss L. Kausen, jeweler, will be ready to move into in a few days. (December 7, 1894)

The D.A. Branstetter building on Main Street has been resingled by carpenters Kerri and Gentry. (October 30, 1906)

D.A. Branstetter is employed in shingling the side of his business building on Main Street which is exposed to the weather and where the winter rains penetrate the rustic. (November 4, 1910)

Contractors Rusk and Herbert yesterday commenced work with D.A. Branstetter raising and putting a new foundation under Mr. Branstetter's building on Main Street occupied by Dinsmore's jewelry store, Ries' barber shop and the Ferndale Club. (June 8, 1915)

The front of the Branstetter building on Main Street, occupied by the Mathes jewelry store and the Eberling barber shop, has been repainted and presents a greatly improved appearance. (August 3, 1923)

JEWELER

A.L. Trousdale papered and otherwise decorated Kausen's Jewelry store this week. He did a good job and the interior of the store now looks very fine. (April 6, 1894)

Last evening, Miss L. Kausen, the jeweler, moved into her new store in the Branstetter building. Miss Kausen has now one of the handsomest places of business in the county and her establishment is certainly a credit to Ferndale. Her stock is one of the finest ever offered to the public, and those in search of holiday gifts should pay her a call without fail. There is no end to the beautiful as well as

Mrs. L.A. Kausen's jewelry store window contained some very fine views this week. They were taken by members of the Ferndale Camera club. (July 10, 1896)

Mr. Otto Youngman, a recent arrival from Minnesota, has accepted a position with Edwards, the jeweler, the gentleman being a jeweler by trade. (February 3, 1903)

R.H. Edwards has enlarged his jewelry store by the removal of a rear partition which gives him 15 feet more room, all of which his rapidly increasing business demands. (March 13, 1903)

Lester Harper has resigned his position with Jeweler R.H. Edwards of Ferndale, and left this week to join his mother, now a resident of San Jose. (October 28, 1904)

F.R. Mathes the Ferndale jeweler, has had a large electric clock installed on the sidewalk in front of his store. The clock is controlled by a master clock within the store and is accurate and plainly read at a long distance. It is found a great convenience by all who have occasion to look for the time of day. (May 19, 1922)

F.R. Mathes, Ferndale jeweler, has concluded a deal whereby he will take over the C.H. Wright jewelry business in Eureka about the middle of August. Mr. Mathes will personally manage the Eureka business and his Ferndale store will be under the management of his brother, Kurt Mathes...F.R. Mathes and family will continue to make their home in Ferndale, the gentleman going back and forth to the county seat to look after his business there for the present at least. (7/15/27)

There came near being a fire in the D.A. Branstetter building on Main Street Sunday night. Mr. Branstetter had emptied the stove in his room in the second story of the building, placing the ashes in a box, but had neglected to carry the box out and empty it. Among the ashes there must have been a coal, for in the night Mrs. Bowen, who resides in the building, detected the smell of smoke, and upon investigation the troublesome box was found by Mr. Bowen, the bottom of which was burned through, as was also the floor beneath, and the blazing cinders were dropping through onto the roof of a woodshed beneath the building's rear projection. The blaze was quickly extinguished, and all's well that ends well, but it certainly was a close call. (February 4, 1902)

Peter Anderson and sister have taken rooms in the new Branstetter building for the balance of the winter. (January 4, 1895)

J.M. Bowen and family moved yesterday from the Branstetter building into the Gill residence opposite the Alford pharmacy. (February 18, 1902)

The personal property of John Duholm was sold at public auction Monday by Constable Howard, to satisfy a judgment received against him by Dr. Cooper. Joe Kerfoot acted as auctioneer, and the gross receipts of the sale footed up to \$130. G.M. Brice purchased the horse, Ed Hamner the harness, and Jensen & Eskesen the bakery wagon. The groceries sold brought a fair price. (November 23, 1894)

As will be seen by an ad in this issue, Jensen and Rosen are now the proprietors of the Ferndale Bakery. The Rosen mentioned is not the veteran Fred Rosen, but a young man from San Francisco who has been employed in the bakery for several months past. As Mr. Canty of the Creamery Restaurant has discontinued his Bakery business, Jensen & Rosen now have the field to themselves. Peter Nissen has sold his interest in the Gilt Edge Rest to his former partner, James Jensen. (February 16, 1897)

J.R. Jensen is now the sole proprietor of the Ferndale Rest. (February 26, 1897)

Dissolution of partnership...between J.R. Jensen and C. Eskesen in the Ferndale Restaurant....public notice is hereby given that J.R. Jensen and Peter Nissen, engaged in the same business, have dissolved partnership and the restaurant will here after be conducted by the undersigned. (March 2, 1897)

Chas Maggini, prop of the Ferndale Restaurant and Lodging House, offers his business for sale. (September 3, 1901)

Born, in Ferndale, October 3d, to Charles Maggini and wife, a daughter. (October 11, 1901)

An explosion, which cannot be accounted for, took place in the kitchen of the Ferndale Restaurant early Wednesday morning. Mr. Maggini, the proprietor was building a fire in the range, when all of a sudden there was a flash, followed by a tremendous report. The room was filled with smoke which smelt like powder. Several window panes in the kitchen were blown out and the sink was loosened from the wall. Numerous parties investigated the matter, but none have yet been able to find the cause of the explosion. Even Mr. Maggini is puzzled. (October 25, 1901)

The reading room will be open on weekdays, 9 a.m. to 10 p.m. and on Sundays, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Smoking, loud talking, spitting on the floor, etc. will be strictly prohibited by the management...the books of the old town library and the Chapin library have been secured... (February 4, 1896)

Miss Jessie Barnes has been employed as librarian in Ferndale's Free Reading Room. (February 11, 1896)

...The Ferndale IOGT which has charge of a library of late years, voted to relinquish all claims to it and to turn it over for the use of the reading room. (March 6, 1896)

...The Ferndale Reading room has closed its doors for lack of support... (February 12, 1897)

Ferndale's Japanese store has closed business, and cigar maker Wickham is to occupy the Brown building, the front of which is to be remodeled to suit his purposes. (May 3, 1898)

...remodeling the Brown building on Main Street, which cigar manufacturer Wickham is to occupy... (May 6, 1898)

Herbert Smith, of San Francisco, has purchased the cigar manufacturing business and tobacco store of Charles Wickham of Ferndale. Mr. Smith will take charge the first of the year. (December 27, 1898)

Herbert Smith and Company, successor to Charles Wickham... (January 3, 1899)

Walter Bartlett, of H.A. Smith's cigar factory and tobacco store... (February 2, 1900)

Herbert Smith has sold his Ferndale cigar store to Walter and James Bartlett, two well known and popular young men of this town. (May 20, 1902)

The work of tearing down the building next to the Gilt Edge on Main Street, formerly occupied by Bartlett's cigar store, commenced

Tuesday morning, and when the lot is cleared and excavated D.A. Branstetter will commence at once the erection of his new structure. Ferndale's old landmarks are rapidly disappearing. (May 23, 1902)

The necessary excavation for D.A. Branstetter's new building on Main Street was finished Wednesday, and work on the concrete foundation has been commenced. (May 30, 1902)

Bartlett and Bartlett started moving their cigar store and factory into D.A. Branstetter's new building yesterday, where they have handsome and commodious headquarters. (August 5, 1902)

George Pierson, son of E.A. Pierson and wife, has accepted a position in Bartlett & Bartlett's Ferndale Cigar Factory. (April 3, 1903)

Friday morning there was a close call from being a fire in Ferndale. In the billiard room of Bartlett & Bartlett's place of business, a quantity of excelsior had been placed in the wood box and someone thoughtlessly threw a lighted cigarette into the box, or at least it is so supposed. Of course the excelsior ignited and when the blaze was discovered the flames were running up the wainscotting at a lively rate and would have soon attacked the wall paper and lining. Geo Pierson, at work on the upper landing of the cigar factory, smelled the smoke, and an investigation was made none too soon. The billiard room was empty when the blaze started. (March 15, 1904)

Bartlett & Bartlett are having the interior of their Ferndale cigar store revarnished. (March 25, 1904)

James Bartlett has disposed of his interest in the cigar factor and store of Bartlett & Bartlett in this place to George Pierson, who for some years has been in the employ of the firm named. Mr. Pierson is now an owner in the retail business of the store and on the first of July will assume his interest in the factory. To the new firm of Bartlett & Pierson the Enterprise extends best wishes for future success. Mr. Bartlett, together with his mother and sister, expects to leave Ferndale about the middle of July...go to Lakeport where James will engage in the wholesale and retail cigar business... (June 25, 1907)

Roderick Elwood, who for a year or more past has been employed in the Bartlett & Pierson cigar factory in Ferndale, resigned his position this week. (October 18, 1907)

Rumor has it that another cigar store is to be opened in Ferndale and that it will occupy the building soon to be vacated by Bartlett & Pierson. (September 29, 1911)

Bartlett & Pierson yesterday commenced the work of moving their cigar factory and store to its new location in the Hart Building. By tonight they will probably be settled in their new place of business. (October 10, 1911)

Hartley Bros. commenced work yesterday repainting the Branstetter building on Main Street, formerly occupied by the Bartlett & Pierson cigar store. (September 13, 1912)

W.L. Burrill is to move his Ferndale confectionery and ice cream parlors from its present location in the Hatch building to the Branstetter building, formerly occupied by the Bartlett & Pierson cigar store. The date of the removal has not been definitely decided upon...extensive alteration and repairs are to be made to the building, and when completed Mr. Burrill will have a store second to none of the kind in the county...the main store, ice cream parlors, candy factory, etc., will be handsomely fitted up and arranged in the most convenient manner possible... (January 14, 1913)

The work of remodeling the Branstetter building, which is to be occupied by W.L. Burrill as a confectionery and ice cream store, is rapidly progressing and the building will soon be ready for occupancy. A new front has been put in, a metal ceiling installed and in fact the whole building has been thoroughly overhauled. (February 21, 1913)

W.L. Burrill's ice cream and confectionery parlors are now located in the Branstetter building, which has been enlarged and remodeled for the use to which it is to be put. It may be said without exaggeration that Mr. Burrill has a place of business second to none of the kind in the county. The building is most conveniently arranged in every particular and will give ample room for all purposes. The work of furnishing it is not fully completed but will be done in a short time, after which Mr. Burrill is planning for an opening day, which will be announced in due time in the Enterprise. (March 11, 1913)

Last Saturday was opening day at Burrill's new ice cream and confectionery parlors, and despite the inclemency of the weather a very large crowd visited the new store. Mr. Burrill, recently moved to his new location in the Branstetter building from the Hatch building, and has been with his assistants busily engaged in getting things set to rights in readiness for the formal opening last Saturday. The ladies who were callers at the store Saturday were each presented with a handsome souvenir banner upon which was a picture of the new Eel River Bridge. Mr. Burrill had two hundred of these handsome souvenirs on hand and all were given away...At the front of the spacious store, where a large and varied assortment of the best creations of the candy maker's art is to be found at all times, as well as fruit and everything which goes with a business of this kind. Just to the rear of the store is the handsomely furnished ice cream parlor and opening off the parlor is the ladies' rest booth, furnished with toilet conveniences, telephone, table, chairs, etc., which Mr. Burrill wishes all ladies to feel at liberty to make use of at any time without any obligation on their part. Back of the parlors is a storeroom, with upstairs compartment, both of which are stocked with commodities used in candy making, paper goods, boxes, etc. In the rear of this is the sanitary candy kitchen, arranged in the most convenient manner possible for the manufacture of high grade candies. Then comes another store room for different articles and in the extreme rear is the room with cement floor where the ice cream is made as well as the

ice house, etc. Hot and cold water is piped to the soda fountain, the ladies' rest room and all points where it is needed. Electric motors furnish power for the ice cream freezers, peanut roaster, etc...The building where the store is located is owned by D.A. Branstetter, who has remodeled it for Mr. Burrill in a thorough manner... (March 25, 1913)

He has under consideration a business opportunity in the central part of the state, and went to look over the situation... (January 22, 1915)

Donald Dowd, who has been employed at the Burrill Candy Shop for the past year, has resigned his position and on the 15th will accept employment with Brightman & Calanchini. (March 10, 1916)

Carl Helgestad has accepted the position made vacant at the Burrill Candy Shop by the resignation of Donald Dowd... (March 14, 1916)

Mrs. Walter L. Burrill is heiress to portion of estate left by deceased uncle in New York...Col. Ethan Allen... (February 20, 1917)

A deal was practically concluded the last week whereby W.L. Burrill disposes of his Ferndale confectionery store and ice cream parlors to Raymond and Charles Grinsell of this town...will take charge of the business next Monday. Mr. Burrill will remain with the new proprietors for several months until they familiarize themselves with the conduct of the business. Mr. Burrill has been in business in Ferndale some eighteen years and has one of the neatest stores of the kind in the county. He has not yet fully decided as to his future movements, but has several offers in view which he is considering... (March 20, 1917)

W.L. Burrill...now of Petaluma... (December 7, 1917)

Fred Mills, candy maker at Grinsell Bros.= store in Ferndale, left Sunday for a couple of weeks= trip to San Francisco. (January 29, 1918)

A deal was concluded last Monday evening whereby Grinsell Bros. Sold their Ferndale confectionery and ice cream parlors to Fred C. Mills. Mr. Mills has been connected with the business for several months past as candy maker. He is an experienced man, having been previously engaged in business at Fortuna, and later at Tracy...Raymond Grinsell, who has been in sole charge of the business since his brother Charlie went into the Army, is as yet undecided as to his future movements. Charlie, who is now on a furlough here, will return to Fort Sill, Oklahoma, within a few days. (August 30, 1918)

Miss Alma Jacobsen has resumed her position in the Mills confectionery parlors in Ferndale after a two weeks= vacation...(November 21, 1919)

Miss Alma Jacobsen is enjoying a two weeks= vacation from her duties in the Mills confectionery parlors in this town. (October 21, 1921)

A deal has been concluded whereby Fred C. Mills will on July 1st sell his confectionery and ice cream business in Ferndale to Percy Newell of Fortuna. Mr. Newell will spend the next four months in Ferndale familiarizing himself with the business, taking up his work this week...(March 2, 1923)

Miss Wilma McAlister has accepted a position in the Mills confectionery parlors in this town, which on July 1st will be taken over by Percy Newell. (June 22, 1923)

Percy Newell takes over Mills business...July 1st...will be assisted in the store by Mrs. D.H. Fletcher and Miss Wilma McAlister. (July 6, 1923)

A new soda fountain, the latest and best obtainable, was installed this week at the Mills ice cream and confectionery parlors in Ferndale It is known as a Frigidaire® and refrigeration is obtained by the use of electricity, no ice being used in it...(9/2/26)

The improvements at Fred C. Mills= ice cream and confectionery parlors in this town are practically completed. Additional light has been obtained by placing more glass in front, the parlors have been attractively decorated and new draperies are to be added. Mr. Mills now has a very attractive place of business. (3/7/24)

Mr. Canepa does excellent work and will doubly succeed in his new business departure. His former partner Mr. E.A. Aggeler will conduct the general merchandising store as the successor to Canepa and Aggeler. (June 19, 1896)

Alex Aggeler has accepted a permanent position in the store of his brother, E.A. Aggeler, Ferndale. (June 23, 1896)

...Jim Bartlett, son of Carter Bartlett and wife, has accepted a position with merchant E.A. Aggeler in his Ferndale store. Jim is a graduate of the Ferndale Public Schools, and one of the brightest and most energetic of Ferndale's "coming" men... (August 10, 1897)

Notice of co-partnership...E.A. "Ed" Aggeler and A.M. "Alex" Aggeler...for the purpose of carrying on a general merchandise business in Ferndale, in the name of Aggeler brothers...January 2, 1898. (February 11, 1898)

James Bartlett, son of C. Bartlett, has won the distinction of being the first graduate of the Ferndale Commercial School. Prof. Snowden tells us that the young man completed the business course in its entirety. Jim who is in the employ of the Aggeler Bros... (May 23, 1899)

For the past few days Aggeler Bros have been engaged in moving their stock of goods from the Brown building to their handsome and commodious new quarters in the Berding building on the corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue...Several years ago the senior partner of the firm, Mr. E.A. Aggeler, first engaged in the general merchandising business in Ferndale, going into partnership with Mr. P.M. Canepa, now of Petrolia. A short time afterward Mr. Aggeler became sole proprietor, and a year or so later he disposed of half interest in his business to his brother, Mr. A.M. Aggeler, and the firm name was changed to Aggeler Bros... (December 15, 1899)

Z. Russ & Sons will soon commence the erection of a fine two-story building on Main Street on the site of the J.E. French & Co's Meat Market. While the new edifice is being erected Messrs. French & Patrick will conduct business in the Brown building, recently occupied by Aggeler Bros. (June 5, 1900)

French & Patrick have moved their meat market into the building formerly occupied by Aggeler Bros. Work will soon commence tearing down the old market prior to the erection of a fine two story building, which will be a credit to our town. (June 15, 1900)

Al Gustin, formerly connected with the Russ Market, Eureka, has accepted a position with J.E. French & Co., the Ferndale butchers. (August 24, 1900)

Last Tuesday Ed French sold his interest in the Ferndale Meat Market to Joseph Russ. Mr. French has leased the Ericksen ranch at Briceland and will fit up the same as a resort. Mrs. French's health is not the best, being troubled with asthma, and this is the reason why he disposed of his business here. (September 14, 1900)

Peter Johnston, of this place, is now in the employ of the Ferndale Meat Market. He will be in charge of the firm's meat wagon and will make an obliging and courteous driver. (October 5, 1900)

The Ferndale Meat Market has discontinued its butcher shop at Loleta. (November 9, 1900)

The meat market of the Z. Russ & sons, Z.B. Patrick, manager, has been moved into the fine new building of the Russ= on Main Street. (December 4, 1900)

A Mr. Hambleton, from one of the southern counties, arrived in Ferndale Saturday with his family and will open a racket store in the Brown building, recently vacated by Aggeler Bros. (June 26, 1900)

J.B. Hambleton opened his Racket Store in the Brown building, Ferndale, last Saturday. (July, 10, 1900)

Walter Peacock, who has been clerking in Hambleton's Racket store in Ferndale since it opened, left on the Pomona Sunday for Hanford, Kings County, where he has accepted a position in a large store. (September 25, 1900)

A.B. Long recently purchased the Ferndale Racket Store from J.M. Hambleton. Mr. Hambleton and family will remain in Humboldt. (September 28, 1900)

A.B. Long has decided to retire from business in Ferndale and will sell the entire stock in his Racket Store at auction, also his household furniture. (January 18, 1901)

A variety store will be opened by L. Cohn in the "Racket Building," Ferndale, next week. (August 2, 1901)

A new variety store will be opened today in the Brown building, Main Street, Ferndale, with a stock of notions, laces, embroideries, tin, agate, and granite ware., etc... (August 6, 1901)

The Ferndale Racket Store is closing out and will only be open a few days longer...L. Cohn. Brown Building. (December 27, 1901)

The articles of incorporation and of co-operation association of the Ferndale Rochdale Company were filed with the county clerk Monday. The company has been formed...to engage in a general merchandise, commission, manufacturing and shipping business on the co-operative plan and on the same plan to invest the funds of the association in factories, mines, water powers, or other co-operative associations...The original associates of the present company...are Jas Smith, Stanwood Bragdon, Jno Trigg, Theo Fulghum, W.T. Smith, G.W. Snively, S.L. Goble, Merton Bragdon and E.E. Bragdon...The company will open a store in the Taylor building, next to the Ferndale Hotel, we are informed. (October 12, 1900)

G.W. Sniveley, manager of the Rochdale Grocery Store... (April 12, 1901)

Improvements are soon to be made at the Creamery Restaurant whereby a more convenient eating place will be supplied. That portion of the building occupied by E.L. Matthews as a job printing office will be fitted up for family use by Mr. Christensen. Mr. Matthews will move his office into the Brown building, next door to the Rochdale store, we are informed. (July 9, 1901)

In our last issue we mentioned the presence in Ferndale Monday evening of groceryman A.C. Dauphiny, of Eureka, but it was not until after Tuesday's issue of the Enterprise was distributed that we learned the object of the gentleman's visit here, which was to purchase from Theo H. Brown the 30-foot-front lot and building on Main Street, next to the Brick Store warehouse, and where the Rochdale store now does business. The price paid was \$4,000, the same as D.A. Branstetter paid Mr. Brown a few weeks ago for the adjoining thirty feet. Some say it is Mr. Dauphiny's purpose to erect a new building on the land in which he intends to engage in the grocery business, but this may or may not be so. Probably more soon. (March 7, 1902)

The sale by T.H. Brown to A.C. Dauphiny & Co of thirty feet on Main Street, next to the Brick Store warehouse, and already mentioned in the Enterprise, has been fully consummated, the balance of the purchase price of \$4,000 paid and the deed passed. There is considerable guessing in Ferndale as to what this lot was purchased for, it being the general opinion that Mr. Dauphiny has no intention of establishing a branch grocery store here. Time will tell, however. (March 14, 1902)

The Ferndale Rochdale Co-operative Company met Saturday to consider the proposition of a change of location for their Ferndale store, but no definite action was taken. The building their store now occupies has been sold by T.H. Brown to A.C. Dauphiny & Co., of Eureka, and it is presumed they will soon have to vacate. (March 18, 1902)

M.H. Donnelly has purchased the piece of property on Main Street, Ferndale, next to the Brick Store premises, recently sold by T.H. Brown to A.C. Dauphiny & Co. of Eureka. Next week Mr. Donnelly will commence tearing down the old building thereon, until yesterday occupied by the Rochdale store, and will immediately begin the construction of a new solid wall building, 30x75 feet in size, to take its place, and Carpenter Geo Milnes will superintend the building of it. It is to be a modern structure, and Mr. Donnelly and his brother John, of Eureka, will open a first class saloon in the lower story when it is finished, and the upper story will be utilized for offices, etc. (April 11, 1902)

The Rochdale store was being moved yesterday into the Brown building just vacated by Mr. Ed Hopkins, where manager Sniveley will do business until R.H. Edwards' proposed new building on lower Main Street is completed and ready for occupancy. (April 11, 1902)

John Morris and sons started work Friday tearing down the old building on the Main Street lot next to the Brick Store premises and recently purchased by M.H. Donnelly. Mr. Donnelly gives Mr. Morris all the lumber in the structure for his work. Mr. Donnelly expects to have his new building completed by the 4th of July. (April 15, 1902)

Work on the foundation of the Donnelly building on Main Street was commenced yesterday. Carpenter George Milnes has charge of the work. (April 29, 1902)

...The frame work of the Donnelly building is completed, is now being shingled and is nearly ready for the lathers. (June 6, 1902)

The front of M.H. Donnelly's new building on Main Street presents a neat and attractive appearance. (July 3, 1902)

Huestis & Gracy started work Saturday painting the exterior of M.H. Donnelly's handsome new building on Main Street. (July 8, 1902)

M.H. Donnelly will open his new saloon in Ferndale on August 20th. (July 29, 1902)

Lemuel Miner, the carpenter, of Eureka, is now employed assisting in finishing up the interior of M.H. Donnelly's handsome new building on Main Street. (August 1, 1902)

M.H. Donnelly will not open his handsome new saloon in Ferndale until September 1st (August 19, 1902)

Grand Opening - Saloon - handsome new Palace Saloon in Ferndale on Saturday evening, September 6th... (September 2, 1902)

M.H. Donnelly's elegant new Ferndale saloon, "The Palace," was formally opened to the public last Saturday evening, and a large number were present to partake of the good things provided by the proprietor and to inspect his handsome new quarters. A roast pig supper, with all et cetera, was served during the evening, and Mr. Donnelly made everybody welcome. "The Palace" is one of the handsomest saloons in northern California, roomy and well appointed, and no cost was spared in its furnishings. Everybody admires its tasty and elegant make-up and it bids fair to become a very popular resort. (September 9, 1902)

Chris Petersen, for a long time the night clerk at the American Hotel, has accepted a position in M.H. Donnelly's Palace Saloon, Ferndale. (August 23, 1904)

Painter Coon has been at work decorating the front of M.H. Donnelly's saloon. When completed the building will be greatly improved in appearance. (June 29, 1906)

M.H. Donnelly, who has leased his Palace Saloon in Ferndale, will take his departure shortly for a trip to other parts of the state. (April 2, 1907)

Charley Kistner has accepted a position at the Palace Saloon, taking the place made vacant by the resignation of Thomas Pedrazzini, who is now handling the ribbons on the Ferndale-Petrolia stage. (April 24, 1908)

Ernest Dunn is to conduct a lunch counter in the Palace Saloon in this town. (February 8, 1910)

E.D. Dunn has sold the Palace Grill to William Louder, who will take possession of this eating place on August 1st... (July 22, 1910)

Walter Boyd, who the last year has been conducting the Palace Saloon in Ferndale, gave up his lease to the same Wednesday, April 1st. The business is now under the direction of the owner of the property, M.H. Donnelly. (April 3, 1908)

Walter Boyd, who recently disposed of his business interests in Ferndale to M.H. Donnelly... (April 28, 1908)

M.H. Donnelly received the latter part of the week a gasoline lighting outfit which will be installed at his place of business. The plant is one of the Edison make and is claimed to give an exceptionally fine light at a very reasonable cost. The capacity of Mr. Donnelly's plant is six lights of 500 candle power each. The new system will be put in operation within the next few days. (August 17, 1909)

The new gasoline lighting plant at M.H. Donnelly's place of business was in operation Thursday evening for the first time and attracted many people who had not before seen a like system in use. The plant furnishes a strong, white light and works to perfection, states Mr. Donnelly. (August 24, 1909)

Jack Weaver has moved his bootblack stand and is now located in front of the M.H. Donnelly place of business. (August 31, 1909)

Early Saturday morning the Palace Saloon of M.H. Donnelly was entered and \$60 or \$70 in the cash register and another place, was stolen. Entrance to the building was gained through a rear window and the burglar departed by way of the back door, which he unlocked from the inside... (September 13, 1910)

During the high winds of about noon yesterday, a section of the front of M.H. Donnelly's building on Main Street was blown off, the boards narrowly missing several bystanders as they came to the ground. (February 14, 1911)

A little blaze occurred in the rear of the Donnelly saloon on Main Street Sunday evening about seven o'clock but was discovered before any material damage had been done. The cause of the fire is unknown but it is supposed to have been started from a cigar being thrown onto some refuse lying on the floor. (May 2, 1911)

Permission was granted Donnelly & Matteri to operate the Palace Saloon in Ferndale under the license previously issued to M.H. Donnelly, who recently sold an interest in the business to M. Matteri. (October 10, 1913)

A deal was concluded last week whereby M.H. Donnelly sold his interest in the Palace Saloon, Ferndale, to his partner, Mike Matteri. Mr. Donnelly has been in business many years and will now retire from active life. Gus Putney will assist Mr. Matteri in conducting the business. (February 20, 1917)

A deal was closed Tuesday whereby Etzio Biasca of San Francisco purchased the billiard parlors and soft drink emporium of Bravo & Arnibaldi in the Donnelly Building on Main St in this town...John Bruga will be employed by Mr. Biasca to assist him in conducting the business... (9/13/29)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...M.H. Donnelly was rather a heavy loser, as the large windows of his building were broken and the plaster ruined, while his loss of stock was quite a heavy item...(April 24, 1906)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The front of Bartlett's= cigar store was badly wrenched and the glass broken out, while in the interior the paper is cracked and torn from the wall...(April 24, 1906)

2ND FLOOR

Dr. Bailhache, the San Francisco dentist, who is soon to locate in Ferndale, is an old acquaintance of Ed Hopkins, of this city, and a boyhood friend of Gus Wanrich, whom he has not seen for 30 years...has rented the front up-stairs rooms of the new Donnelly building on Main Street, intending to locate here.(June 20, 1902)

Decorator Thos L. Wilson is doing a fine job papering and painting in the upstairs of M.H. Donnelly's new building. (January 6, 1903)

Ferndale Club Rooms - The move recently inaugurated and looking to the establishment of a club room in Ferndale, is progressing favorably, and many of our business men, we understand, are taking quite an interest in the matter. Apartments will probably be secured in the second story of the new Donnelly building, and it is the intention, we believe, to supply the rooms not only with reading matter, billiard tables, etc, but also to have a gymnasium connected therewith. The club is to be conducted along the lines of the Humboldt Club of Eureka. (January 13, 1903)

H.C. Blum has moved his office into the upstairs of the Donnelly building, from the Russ building, and has three rooms elegantly fitted up, in fact he has as fine offices now as anyone in the county. Judge Smith is also to move into the Donnelly building from the R.E.&W. Co. building and will occupy two rooms just across the hall from Mr. Blum. (November 3, 1903)

Attorney A.W. Blackburn, who recently located in Ferndale for the practice of his profession, publishes his professional card in today's issue... (Office in Donnelly building, Main Street) (September 26, 1905)

Anyone desiring the service of a competent stenographer or typewriter is invited to call upon Mrs. Mosier at Judge Smith's office in the Donnelly building, Main Street, Ferndale. (December 5, 1905)

I wish to inform the ladies of Ferndale and vicinity that I have opened dressmaking parlors upstairs in the Donnelly building, next to Brick Store, where I will be pleased to meet your requirements. Mrs. H.C. Blum. (April 3, 1906)

I wish to inform the ladies of Ferndale and vicinity that I have opened dressmaking parlors up stairs in the Donnelly building, next to Brick Store, where I will be please to meet your requirements...Mrs. H.C. Blum... (May 15, 1906)

Apprentices wanted...Mrs. H.C. Blum, conducting dressmaking parlors in the Donnelly building... (November 20, 1906)

Next Wednesday, March 20th, will be the date of the grand millinery opening at Mrs. M.H. Donnelly establishment in Ferndale...on Main Street... (March 12, 1907)

Saturday last was decided interest to the ladies of Ferndale and vicinity, for on that date occurred the Grand Opening at Mrs. M.H. Donnelly's millinery store on Main Street, where was shown all the latest... (March 24, 1908)

Board of Supervisors appointed Attorney A.W. Blackburn Justice of the Peace of Pacific Township to fill the unexpired term of Judge Smith, resigned... (April 14, 1908)

Judge Smith, who left Ferndale a month or more ago to take up his residence in Berkeley... (May 22, 1908)

Constable C.F. Rackliffe is to open a collection agency in Ferndale and will have an office in the Donnelly building at the head of the stairs, formerly occupied by Attorney Blackburn... (March 16, 1909)

On December 1st, Dr. O.B. Barron of Ferndale will move his office from the Blackburn building to the Donnelly building, upstairs next door to the Mills confectionery parlors. The offices in the Donnelly building have been remodeled and renovated and Dr. Barron will have very neat and convenient offices. (November 30, 1923)

BLOCK 14, LOT 9

Work was started yesterday on the Russ, Early & Williams Co. warehouse, which is to be erected just back of Roberts Hall. It is to be 60x80 feet in size and will rest on 99 concrete piers, three feet square. Howard Gay will do the cement work, and Messrs Haywood & Matthews the carpenter work. (April 11, 1902)

The completion of the immense new warehouse back of the Brick Store does not end the improvements of the R.E.&W. Co. by any means, for in the very near future this firm is to have built just to the east of the warehouse a hitching shed 16 feet deep and 100 feet long for the accommodation of their customers, and also a horse barn for their own use. Their big warehouse is 60x80 feet in size, and will be used to house their stock of farming implements, vehicles, flour, feed stuffs, heavy hardware, etc, and will be connected with the main

store by a short distance telephone. (May 27, 1902)

Work has commenced this week by Haywood Bros and Bert Matthews on the erection of Russ, Early & Williams' new hitching shed of the Brick store, and the structure is now nearly completed. It is 80 feet long and 18 feet wide, and will be a great convenience for country patrons of "The Brick." (October 10, 1902)

The Russ, Early, Williams & Co's hitching shed is now completed. It is located on the alley in the rear of the Brick Store, is 80x13 feet in size, and has ample accommodation for a large number of "rigs"... (October 14, 1902)

BRICK STORE (2 story) WAREHOUSE BUILDING (north section)

...Mr. William Matthews is the same gentleman who launched the Valley Oracle into existence six or seven years ago, and it came to the front with a grand flourish of trumpets, but the public knows its fate.... (May 19, 1899)

The papers declaring Ferndale an incorporated town having arrived from Sacramento last week, on Monday afternoon the five Trustees, Clerk, Marshal and Treasurer chosen at the late election were formally sworn in, and Ferndale municipal ship started upon her voyage. Immediately after taking the oath the Trustees convened in the room over the Brick Store warehouse for their initial session with Clerk Dungan at the desk, and after organizing themselves by electing A. Putnam President and choosing Messrs Moller and Brice for the four year term and Messrs Berding, Putnam and Shaw for the two-year term, proceeded with the business of the meeting...After deciding to hold regular meetings on the first Monday in each month at 7:30 pm... (September 8, 1893)

The Oracle, in its issue of yesterday, goes after the Trustees and their first ordinances in vigorous style, characterizing the license ordinance as outrageous and a disgrace to the town... (October 13, 1893)

W.J. Weymouth, editor of the Oracle...says the Oracle is in the swim, notwithstanding the hoodoo that gave the Enterprise the town printing... (October 20, 1893)

Peter Lund is having an addition built to his building on lower Main Street lately occupied by the Oracle. (November 3, 1893)

Yesterday's Oracle contained the announcement that the paper had been sold to I.M. Ring, late of the Nerve office, Eureka. Our young friends, Weymouth and Frost, who have conducted the Oracle during the past year, retire with the full knowledge that they have given their readers an excellent paper and have done all to make a success of their venture that they possibly could do. Mr. Ring, we understand, will run the paper in the interests of the Farmers Alliance. (January 5, 1894)

The Standard, of Friday last, contained the following: AThere is a rumor on the streets that the Oracle has been sold to the Ferndale Enterprise. A private note from the editor of the Oracle says that it will not be published this week. This, in connection with other facts, known to the writer, leads us to say the Oracle has probably been sold. Ferndale is a good town, but hardly large enough to support two good newspapers, and the Enterprise fills the field very creditably. We wish to say for the young men who have conducted the Oracle that they made it a live and readable paper, one that will be missed in many homes in southern Humboldt, in case the rumor proves true. This rumor is the third of its kind that has gained currency since the birth of Ferndale's second paper, and as each of the rumors had some foundation, in fact, we deem it proper to make explanation. The Oracle was established in May, 1892, by Matthews & Saul, (who dissolved partnership a short time later), and upon its suspending publication in September of that year a proposition was made to the publishers of this paper to purchase the newspaper portion of the plant. The proposition was favorably considered, but before the consummation of the sale E.G. Ogle signified his intention to resurrect the paper with new material, if necessary, whereupon we dismissed the proposition, and the plant was purchased by him. The Oracle was revived and continued in existence until early in 1893, when an attachment was placed upon it to satisfy an indebtedness, and again the material was offered the Enterprise -- The price being unsatisfactory the offer was refused, with the result that Messrs. Weymouth & Frost, two young gentlemen, secured control, and as the Standard states, have every since published a good and readable paper. But the same fate which an inadequate field brought upon their predecessors was destined to be theirs and at last they were forced to succumb. Mr. Ogle, to whom the material still belonged, approached the publishers of the Enterprise some two weeks ago with another offer for sale, but his price being considered excessive he was met with refusal. Later he consented to take a less figure which would have effected the sale but for a misunderstanding between him and those in charge of the paper. The Oracle, we understand, now belongs to Mr. I.M. Ring, late of the Nerve Publishing Co at Eureka, who will conduct it in the future. That the poor financial success of the Oracle is attributable to the incapability of the field to support two papers few will attempt to deny, and it seems rather strange that there should still be some who consider the fact not demonstrated. Ferndale is a good town for one good paper, as the Standard intimates, and until her population increases materially two can hardly be expected to thrive. However, it is not our intention to complain. The country is free and the privilege of conducting a newspaper in Ferndale belongs to us no more than to others. The Enterprise has treated its rival in the past with all due courtesy and proposes to do so in the future. (January 5, 1894)

We wish to correct a statement made by you last week. In an article regarding the Oracle you stated that at the time negotiations were going on for the purchase of that paper by the Enterprise the material was owned by E.G. Ogle. This is incorrect, the Oracle belonged to us in its entirety from March, 1893 to January 1st, 1894. We do not deny that Mr. Ogle held a mortgage and notes against it to its full value, but this did not make him owner, nor could he have claimed proprietorship until these claims had been foreclosed on account of nonpayment. We had a bill of sale of the entire plant to the time we sold the Oracle to its present proprietor, and the bill of sale he received is signed by us...Respectfully, W.J. Weymouth & P.G. Frost. (January 12, 1894)

W.J. Weymouth, late editor of the Oracle has accepted a position on the Standard... (January 12, 1894)

We are informed that the Valley Oracle office is to be moved about May 10th into the C.A. Doe building, next door to Doe's Livery Stable, lower Main Street. (May 3, 1895)

B.F. Harville is to have some extensive improvements made in the building adjoining the brick store. The stairs leading to the second floor are to be widened and the room occupied by the Oracle office is to be rearranged for G.W. Dungan, who is to move his undertaking parlors there to. (May 24, 1895)

The Oracle has moved into its new quarters in the Doe building next door to the YMI Hall and will hereafter be issued on Tuesdays. (June 7, 1895)

The building adjoining the brick store is being repainted. It will improve its appearance greatly. (June 14, 1895)

G.W. Dungan is to move his undertaking parlors into the Masonic Hall building, instead of into the building adjoining the brick store. (June 28, 1895)

Judge Smith can now be found at his office next to the Brick Store... (August 2, 1895)

The Salvation Army has established a barracks in the second story of the building next to the brick store. Wednesday night about 20 of the army held a rousing meeting there and will meeting there again next Wednesday evening... (October 4, 1895)

The Salvation Army has come to Ferndale to stay. Their meetings are held six evenings... (January 17, 1896)

Captain Minney and Lt. Linney of the Salvation Army arrived in Ferndale from San Francisco...and are to remain this place for several months. (January 17, 1896)

The Salvation Army will hold a rally at Grizzly Bluff... (January 24, 1896)

The Salvation Army will hold a rally in the alliance hall on the Island next Thursday night. (February 14, 1896)

The Salvation Army appointments for the balance of the week are, tonight, Tues - Grizzly Bluff; Wed night - Waddington; Thurs - Island; Friday - Port Kenyon; Saturday night, Sunday afternoon, Sunday night - Ferndale. (February 18, 1896)

From the War Call: Captain Minney and Lt. Linnell have their work well under way. We have a stove in our hall so that people who come to their meetings need not freeze. People up here do not know much about the Army except that the men wear red bands around their caps and wear a red guernsey; some also know that the captain is the one with the red braid on his coat and the Lt. has yellow. They have already some fruits of their labor in the fact that several men have found salvation, but the captain says he is also going to have some bonnet wearers here after awhile. On Tuesday evenings the officers go to Port Kenyon, and on Friday they hold meetings at Waddington. They are also going to hold meetings on the Island. (March 6, 1896)

Pete Olsen of Ferndale has joined the Salvation Army and we earnestly hope that he stays with it. (/7/14, 1896)

There is to be a change in Ferndale's Salvation Army our captain after this week goes to Arcata and our lieutenant to Santa Rosa. (August 4, 1896)

Welcome meeting to Captain Quast of the famous California Charioteer band Saturday evening in the Salvation Army Hall. Lt. Jose who arrived here Wednesday and Captain Quast will be the officers in charge of the Salvation Army of the Ferndale Circuit. All soldiers will be present and everybody is invited to come and welcome the new officers and enjoy the music. (August 14, 1896)

The Salvation Army is growing in Ferndale. Their meetings are well attended and much interest is taken in their work. Captain Minney left for Arcata yesterday and the new Captain and Lt. are in charge of the Ferndale barracks. (August 18, 1896)

...tomorrow the Salvation Army will hold a trade's union meeting in their hall, at which the soldiers will present their different professions and trades...on Sunday evening Lt. Jose will hold his farewell meeting... (January 1, 1897)

The Salvation Army outriders will hold a big rally and street parade in Ferndale tomorrow night...barracks near the brick store... (March 13, 1896)

C.H. Dungan has opened an employment office in Ferndale...place of business...with Judge Smith next to the Brick Store. (July 1, 1898)

The Salvation Army of Ferndale will hold a two weeks' prayer service in their hall beginning last evening. (January 16, 1900)

The Salvation Army has moved its headquarters in to the lower story of the Brelle Building, opposite the K of P Castle. (May 8, 1900)

If the Enterprise is correctly informed, the wooden warehouse of the Brick Store, which faces on Main Street, is soon to be torn down or removed, and in its place a brick structure is to go in, or more properly speaking the brick building occupied by the R.W & W Co is to be extended over to the Donnelly line. This property is owned by Mrs. Harville, of San Francisco. (July 8, 1902)

The Salvation Army Headquarters were moved Saturday from the Brelle building on lower Main Street to the Upper story of the Russ, Early, Williams & Company's warehouse at the upper end of the same street. This move gives the army a more central location and Ensign Winters hopes it will be the means of increasing the attendance at the meetings. (November 4, 1902)

Ensign Winter, who has been at the head of Salvation Army work in Ferndale for some time past, leaves today for SF, where he will be assigned to some other field. Ensign Winter is a true Christian gentleman, deeply in earnest in his work and has made many friends during his stay among us. He has the respect of all our people. (December 26, 1902)

Capt. Frank Carter has sent in his resignation to the Salvation Army at San Francisco for the reason that he feels he can do more and better work alone. he intends to spread the gospel news throughout this part of the county and he is now soliciting donations to start a circulating library of religious books, and if circumstances will permit, he will start a Gospel Hall in Ferndale and cooperate with our churches...(February 10, 1903)

Ferndale now has what it has long needed -- a stenographer and type writer. Yesterday Miss Ethel Kausen, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Al Kausen, and a graduate of the Ferndale Business College, opened an office with Judge Smith, next to the Brick Store, and hereafter will be found there daily, and ready to do all work in that line at reasonable prices. (June 2, 1903)

...Judge Smith is also to move into the Donnelly building from the R.E.&W. Co. building and will occupy two rooms just across the hall from Mr. Blum. (November 3, 1903)

The Salvation Army has closed its barracks in the Brick Store building, Ferndale and the Lieutenant in charge has "stored" the fixtures. He will continue his religious work in this neighborhood, however. (February 24, 1903)

The rear portion of the upper story of the R.E.&W. warehouse is apt to be converted into a gymnasium by a number of Ferndale's young men. A punching bad is already in place, and several of our younger generation have been trying to knock it through the roof. (January 19, 1904)

The improvements at the Brick Store...The past few days workmen have been engaged in removing goods from the second story of the store to the Russ building, where they will be stored until they are again placed on the shelves in the new structure... (June 6, 1905)

BRICK STORE (center of lot)

J.M. Early, of the firm of Russ, Early & Williams, who returned last week, sold his household goods at auction Friday and with his family left on Wednesday's Humboldt. Their objective point was Alameda, where Mr. Early hopes, by rest and quietness, to regain his former good health... (February 23, 1894)

Kausen & Williams placed three iron pipe hitching posts in front of the Brick Store yesterday. (September 21, 1895)

Russ, Early and Williams company is contemplating extensive improvements at the Brick Store. New shelving will be placed in the store and a general renovation will be made...and do not be surprised if you see in the course of a few weeks, a handsome glass front placed in this establishment. (March 8, 1895)

On the 15th of this month the work of renovating the brick store...will commence. A handsome plate glass front will be placed in position and the interior of the building will be changed throughout. The office will occupy a place near the front of the store and when the work is done the Brick will be one of the most commodious and handsome place of business in the county. (April 5, 1895)

Work has commenced last Saturday overhauling and renovating the interior of the Brick Store. The upstairs is being ceiled throughout and new shelving will be put up in the entire building...work will be commenced on the new plate glass front. Two gentleman from San Francisco have the contract for making these improvements and when completed the Brick will be one of the most handsomest stores in the county. (April 19, 1895)

The lumber which is being used for making the improvements in the Brick Store was shipped up from San Francisco. It is all kilned dried. (April 19, 1895)

The work of renovating the brick store goes steadily on. Two gentleman from San Francisco are putting in the plate glass front. Bert Haywood and James Davis are building the new shelving and T.L. Wilson is doing the painting. The Brick will be a "daisy" when repairs are all done. (April 26, 1895)

The contract for placing the plate glass front in the Brick store is about completed. The two San Francisco gentleman who had the contract did a first class job -- in a week or so this establishment will be in apple pie order and will be one of the handsomest stores in the state. (May 3, 1895)

T.L. Wilson was at work this week painting the front of the Brick Store. (May 10, 1895)

A handsome private office has been built in the center of the brick store for the accommodation of bookkeeper, F.G. Williams (May 17, 1895)

A handsome new sign now adorns the front of the Brick Store... (June 14, 1895)

Mr. T.V. McKey, the popular dry goods clerk at the Brick store, will return from below today, and will bring with him his family, who are to take up their residence in Ferndale. (August 1, 1902)

Garland Dungan will resign his position tomorrow with the Russ, Early & Williams Co. and next week will depart for Berkeley to visit his parents -- John Dungan and wife. (November 28, 1902)

While at the Ferndale headquarters of O'Neill & Klepper one day this week, an Enterprise reporter was shown certain drawings made by Mr. L.M. Klepper of the new structure when the Russ, Early & Williams Co. have in contemplation to take the place of their three buildings which now stand on Main Street, Ferndale -- their brick store, the adjoining warehouse and the store building on the right occupied by A.P. Winslow. Should the company decide to make this improvement Ferndale will surely have one of the handsomest structures in the county, and with as pretty a front as Mr. Klepper's excellent taste could suggest. And what is more the entire structure, aside from those portions of the present brick building which can be used without detriment, will be of cement brick. The store building proper will be enlarged to the extent of taking in the proportions of the present warehouse, and will consequently have fully a third more front, allowing of magnificent show windows, with a beautifully arched and tessellated entrance. Mr. Klepper's drawings are as fine as we have ever seen, and it is evident that he is an architect of ability. (April 15, 1904)

When all the improvements contemplated have been completed the Brick will be one of the finest and best appointed general merchandising stores to be found in the county. A.N. Foster, the Eureka contractor and builder, will have charge of the work. (April 21, 1905)

Carpenters David Hawley and L.M. Smith will soon engage in tearing down the Russ, Early & Williams Co's warehouse on Main Street in order to make room for the new brick building this firm will shortly erect on the site so secured. This structure will have a depth of 100 feet and will be connected with the store building now occupied by this company. The rear end of the old store will also be torn out and an addition of twenty feet or more added. The R.E.&W. Co will have a great store building when all the improvements they have in mind are completed. (April 25, 1905)

It will certainly be a credit to the town. (June 6, 1905)

The north wall of the new building has been extended nearly as high as called for in the plans and specifications, while the remainder of the brick work will probably be completed in a few weeks. G.W. Snively, at present one of the employees of the Brick Store in Ferndale, will soon resign his position... (July 11, 1905)

All traces of the old brick store of the Russ, Early & Williams Co have disappeared and in its place is to be seen one of the most modern and up-to-date store building to be found in northern California. A few weeks more and contractor Foster and assistants will complete their work on the new building. (November 7, 1905)

Miss Sadia Kausen, of Ferndale, recently employed at Hink's Eureka store, has entered the employ of the Russ, Early & Williams Co in this place, and took up her new duties last Tuesday. (January 5, 1906)

Photographer McMillan has just finished a number of fine pictures of the front of the Russ, Early & Williams Co's new store in this place. The photos are very handsome and attractive. (January 16, 1906)

Manager F.G. Williams, of the Russ, Early & Williams Co., whose elegant store in this place was so badly damaged by last week's earthquake, tells us that no definite plan has as yet been decided upon as to the rebuilding of the structure. The owner of the building, Mrs. F. Harville, of San Francisco, is now here and it is expected that within the next few days some action will be taken. (April 27, 1906)

A portion of the upper part of the rear wall of the Russ, Early & Williams Co's store in Ferndale, damaged by the late trembler, is being torn down. The building has been thoroughly braced, both inside and out, and is in as safe a condition as before the quake. (May 1, 1906)

No definite plans as to the repairing of the damage done to the Russ, Early & Williams Co's store in Ferndale by the big trembler have as yet been decided upon by the owner of the building. Manager F.G. Williams and W.O. McCann of Eureka have given the building a thorough examination and find that the side walls are practically unharmed, though the back wall of the structure is more or less damaged. The front of the building, however, will have to be rebuilt from the ground up.... (May 18, 1906)

Unless present plans miscarry, Ferndale will soon have another regularly incorporated Bank for the transaction of commercial business. This will be at the store of the Russ, Early & Williams Co., where a general banking business has been carried on for many years past. Owing to the passage of recent ... (November 16, 1909)

Yesterday the Russ-Williams Banking Co. of Ferndale commenced business. The bank is located in the Brick Store, where the Russ, Early & Williams Co. has conducted a banking business in connection with the store for many years past. Owing to the enactment of new laws, the new bank was incorporated and will hereafter do a general commercial banking business. The officers of the bank are as follows: President, F.G. Williams; VP, W.N. Russ; cashier, R.S. Feenaty; Assistant Cashier, George N. Lund. These with Mrs. F.G. Williams comprise the board of directors. The bank, which will do only a commercial business, is capitalized for \$25,000, fully paid up. The new concern is a substantial and reliable one and will doubtless do a large business. Later on it may be located apart from the Russ Early & Williams store, though nothing definite is known in this regard at the present writing. (January 4, 1910)

Gerald Giacomini has resigned his position in the store of Russ, Early & Williams Co., with which concern he has been connected several years...leaves for Sacramento, where he will act as secretary for Assemblyman G.A. Jasper of this district... (December 16, 1910)

David Hartley and family, who have made Alton their home for several years, are to make Ferndale their future place of residence. Mr. Hartley has accepted a position with the R.E.&W. Co. (March 31, 1911)

Yesterday morning work was commenced by D.A. Branstetter and Chris Hansen putting in a concrete foundation for the Russ Williams Banking Company's new safe. The new safe, which arrived in Ferndale last week, is one of the latest patterns of burglar proof strong boxes now on the market. (August 22, 1911)

Taubman Bros. this week installed a large safe at their place of business, purchased from the Russ, Early & Williams Co. The work of moving the safe, which weighs several tons, was done by Wm. Flowers, Frank Reas and Charlie Grinsell, and proved quite an undertaking. (September 22, 1911)

This Tuesday evening, October 31st, T.V. McKey, who for the past eleven years has been in charge of the dry goods department of the Russ, Early & Williams Co's. store in Ferndale, will sever his connection with that firm and next Sunday leaves for San Francisco to engage in business for himself. His wife and children will remain here for the present...Dave Hartley will take Mr. McKey's position in the dry goods department of the Brick for the present. (October 31, 1911)

Upon the consolidation of the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co. and the Russ, Early & Williams Co. the first of the year, the Russ-Williams Banking Co. will move to the banking quarters in the Russ building vacated this summer by the Ferndale Bank. The Russ-Williams Bank has heretofore been located in the Brick Store building. (October 4, 1912)

The building of the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Company will be retained until the lease on it expires. The name of the new corporation has not yet been fully settled upon but will be given out in the near future. The stock will be owned by the same parties interested in the two corporations at present existing, with the exception that Mr. E.A. Aggeler will retire, he having recently disposed of his stock to Mr. S.G. Aggeler... (October 1, 1912)

A new metal ceiling is being placed in position in the store building of the Russ, Early & Williams Co. The plaster on the ceiling was badly damaged by earthquakes a few years ago, and the new ceiling will do away with any future trouble from this source. (December 6, 1912)

Wednesday, January 1st, the Russ, Early & Williams Co and the Aggeler, Morrison, Hansen Co., owners of two big general merchandising store in Ferndale, were consolidated and will hereafter conduct their business at the Brick Store under the name of the Russ, Aggeler, Williams Co... (January 3, 1913)

Dave Hartley of the Brick Store, has accepted a position as manager of Frank Beckwith's store at Hydesville and will assume his new duties in a week or so... (February 4, 1913)

Joseph Fitzell has accepted a position in the offices of the Russ, Aggeler, Williams Co. (June 17, 1913)

George Lund, for the past eight years bookkeeper for the Russ, Early & Williams Co. and the Russ, Aggeler, Williams Co. has tendered his resignation, same to become effective July 1st. Mr. Lund has been offered and has accepted a fine position in the Bank of Eureka, and will take up his duties at the county seat bank shortly after the first of the month. The position at the Brick Store will be taken by Will Dodge of Eureka, who will take up the work this week. (June 24, 1913)

A bill of sale was recorded Friday whereby A.P. Winslow conveys to Mrs. Mary L. Knapp, a safe, counters, tables, showcases, etc. in a store on the west side of Main Street...for \$400. (December 13, 1898)

...A.P. Winslow...ad in this issue...Optician... (July 11, 1899)

A.P. Winslow optician and jeweler, showed us Friday the working of his "baby" electric light plant which he recently installed at his place of business. It consists of a small dynamo, propelled by a Pelton water wheel, and not only furnishes lights for his store and for use in connection with his optical instruments, including the ophthalmometer, but also electric power to run both his turning and polishing lathes. It works to perfection, and in its arrangement Mr. Winslow has demonstrated his well-known ingenuity. It is well worth seeing. (April 1, 1902)

A.P. Winslow, Oph D of Ferndale...has decided to branch out...and is arranging to make regular professional visits both to Arcata and Blue Lake... (October 3, 1902)

(July 29, 1904)

...the Doe building on the east side of Main Street, soon to be occupied by Optician A.P. Winslow. (May 16, 1905)

Optician and jeweler A.P. Winslow last Saturday moved into his new quarters in the Doe building on Main Street, opposite H.H. Hatch's implement store... (May 30, 1905)

...The building, occupied until recently by optician Winslow, has been torn down, and the site thus secured will be used to increase the size of the old Brick... (June 6, 1905)

Druggist Ring was moving into his elegant new store in the Brown building yesterday. (September 11, 1896)

It is stated that the store on Main Street formerly occupied by Druggist Ring is to be enlarged and finished with a plate glass front for J. Loewenthal's Cash Clothing Store. (September 18, 1896)

The store formerly occupied by druggist Ring is to be enlarged, remodeled and furnished with a plate glass front for the use of Loewenthal's Cash Clothing House. Manager Sonneborn tells us that he will be ready to move in a couple of weeks and that he is to have one of the neatest stores in the county. (September 22, 1896)

The work of remodeling the store formerly occupied by Druggist Ring has commenced. The floor is to be lowered to the street grade and will rest on a new foundation and a handsome plate glass front is to be put in. When finished it will be occupied by J. Loewenthal's Cash Clothing House. (September 29, 1896)

T.J. Frost is superintending the work of renovating the building formerly occupied by druggist Ring and which is to be occupied by Loewenthal's Cash Clothing Store. (October 2, 1896)

Manager Sonneborn of Loewenthal's Cash store has presented this office with a very handsome photograph taken by P.M. Canepa of his window display showing the battle between the Mary Mack and the Monitor. Mention was made in the Ferndale a few issues ago...the scene was fought March 8, 1862... (February 16, 1897)

D. Sonneborn, who has resigned the management of Loewenthal's Ferndale Clothing store, may start in business for himself in this town. Mr. Sonneborn has made a host of friends here... (July 23, 1897)

D. Sonneborn, who resigned as manager of Loewenthal's Ferndale Clothing Store ...and Mr. Greenwald who has been in the employ of Mr. Loewenthal, now holds that position. (July 23, 1897)

Jacob Loewenthal of Eureka was in Ferndale yesterday and closed the bargain whereby he becomes the owner of the Ferndale Hotel Property. Mr. Loewenthal tells us that he will build a new hotel on the corner in the spring. (August 6, 1897)

Yesterday morning, constable Ericksen placed D. Sonneborn under arrest on a charge of embezzlement, sworn to by Jacob Loewenthal, who alleges that the accused appropriated to himself while manager of Loewenthal's Clothing Store in Ferndale, goods and money to the amount of \$3,500 or thereabouts. Mr. Sonneborn immediately gave bonds in the sum of \$1,000 to appear before Judge Smith for examination next Tuesday. He protests his innocence to the charge and plead "not guilty". (August 24, 1897)

(January 7, 1898)

Jacobs, the Eureka clothier, has rented the store in Ferndale formerly occupied by J. Loewenthal and on June 1st will open a clothing emporium therein. (May 10, 1898)

...The Jacobs Brothers opened their Ferndale Clothing Emporium, opposite the Enterprise office last Saturday morning. Will Daugherty is clerking for the firm. (June 14, 1898)

...place will be built a store 20x50 feet in size, a duplicate to the store adjoining, owned by Mr. Taylor and occupied by the Jacobs Bros, clothiers. Above the store will be sleeping apartments connected with the hotel, and with the apartments above the Jacobs Bros' store... (August 16, 1898)

The Ferndale Emporium is in its last days and must be sold out by 12/15... (December 2, 1898)

M.C. MacLennan of Auburn, California are in Ferndale. Mr. MacLennan has rented the Taylor store next to the Ferndale Hotel and will open a dry good store therein. (March 14, 1899)

M.C. MacLennan and Co. opened their dry goods, fancy goods and men's furnishing goods store in the Ferndale Hotel building on Tuesday April 4th and are now ready for business. (April 7, 1899)

L.H. Campbell who recently conducted a laundry at Fortuna was in town yesterday. He informs us that next week he will open a store in the Taylor building next door to the Ferndale Hotel, he will carry a full line of holiday goods. (November 27, 1899)

L.H. Campbell has rented the Taylor store next to the Ferndale Hotel and next week will open a bazaar in that place. (December 1, 1899)

L.H. Campbell, who intended opening a bazaar in Ferndale, tells us that he is unable to secure a store building here and consequently has given up the idea of engaging in business in the Cream City... (January 5, 1900)

There was a lively time at the MacLennan dry goods store in Ferndale on New Year's Day. Mr. MacLennan had a crew of five carpenters at work changing and remodeling the shelving at his place of business. (January 3, 1902)

Next Week, shoemaker Hopkins will move into the Taylor building next to the Ferndale Hotel. The building he vacates will be occupied by the Rochdale Company. (April 4, 1902)

Ed Hopkins, the boot and shoe dealer and repairer, will move today from the Brown building into his new quarters in the Taylor building next to the Ferndale hotel. Carpenters started work yesterday morning making repairs on the Brown Building, which the Rochdale store is to occupy until the new structure which R.H. Edwards is to have erected for their occupancy is completed. (April 8, 1902)

Dr. Starr, the dentist, has moved his office from the ground floor of the Ferndale Hotel to the front rooms of this building above Hopkins' shoe store. (January 27, 1903)

The Wiley B. Allen Co. has a number of pianos for sale in the building formerly occupied by the Hopkins shoe store and the representatives of the company will be here for the next week. (December 3, 1909)

George Kaussen, the Ferndale's harness dealer, yesterday moved his place of business from the Russ building, next door to the Ferndale

Market, to the building between R. Jacobsen's tailor shop and the Hotel Ivanhoe, formerly occupied by Ed Hopkins shoe store. When he gets settled Mr. Kaussen will have a neat and commodious store. (November 1, 1910)

Mr. and Mrs. M.H. Donnelly, who have been residing on Shaw Avenue, are to move to the L.M. Smith tenement on lower Main Street within a few days as soon as the house is vacated by R. Jacobsen and wife, who are to move away from town. (January 16, 1912)

Through a deal concluded last Thursday, George W. Kaussen becomes the sole owner of the Kausen & Tonini harness shop in this town, taking over the interest of his partner, Emilio Tonini. Mr. Kaussen assumed the management of the business alone last Friday. FERNDALE HOTEL (south 2/3 of lot

Carpenters will commence work in a few days overhauling the Ferndale Hotel. The building will be supplied with a new roof and a new and substantial porch will be made, and in a few weeks the hotel will present a better and far different appearance. Lumber and shingles are now on the ground. (September 29, 1893)

Carpenters Bert Haywood and J. Sprague are at work overhauling the exterior of the Ferndale Hotel. (October 6, 1893)

Shortly after supper Sunday evening the Ferndale Hotel narrowly escaped destruction by fire. One of the large barroom lamps was not securely fastened in the hanger, and when a boarder stepped upon a chair to lower the blaze which had become too high, the lamp suddenly fell crashing to the floor. It did not explode but oil was spilled in every direction to which fire was communicated, and in a few seconds a huge blaze was rapidly spreading over the room. Excitement became great, the cry of fire went up, and soon people were flocking to the scene from all parts of the town. Efforts to extinguish the blaze proved of no avail until finally the lamp was kicked into the street and blankets from adjoining bedrooms were brought into play. Even then it looked for a time as though nothing could be done for the smoke was so dense that it was difficult to breathe within the room. The fire was finally put out, however, and everyone felt that it was an exceedingly close call. The only damage of any consequences was the charring of the walls and bar in a few places and the death from suffocation of Joe's pet canary. (April 13, 1894)

The old sidewalk from the Brick Store to the Ferndale Hotel Corner was torn up Tuesday, preparatory to laying a cement pavement. Howard Gay is in charge of the work. (September 21, 1894)

The work of overhauling the Ferndale Hotel has been in active progress all week. The upper and lower verandas have been given new flooring and the entire building is now being reshingled. The upper veranda has also been given new supports. (October 13, 1893)

Lumber was being hauled this week for an addition to the Ferndale hotel, to occupy the space between the sample room and the rear

entrance to the barroom. (October 12, 1894)

The addition to the Ferndale hotel is nearing completion. J.W. Blakemore and assistants built it, and the new apartment will be utilized for a billiard, card and reading room. (October 19, 1894)

The addition to the Ferndale Hotel is being hand finished. Howard Gay is doing the work. (November 2, 1894)

The parlors of the Ferndale Hotel are to be repainted and decorated... (June 7, 1895)

Frank Elkins has built a neat cabinet for Joseph Kerfoot of the Ferndale Hotel in which Joe's collection of curios is to be placed. (May 8, 1896)

Kerfoot & Daugherty of the Ferndale Hotel have had a fine ice house erected in the rear of their hostilery, in which can be stored fresh meats, game, liquors, etc. George Milnes the carpenter built it. (June 5, 1896)

Charles H. Davis has accepted the position of waiter at Kerfoot and Daugherty's Hotel, Ferndale. (July 3, 1896)

Joe Kerfoot and Jim Giacomini joined the Salvation Sunday evening and still the good work goes on. (September 8, 1896)

Ernest Howe is conducting a boot black stand at the Ferndale Hotel Barber shop and is now prepared to shine your shoes so you can use them for a looking glass if you want to. "Rusty" is a rustler and will be found at all hours at his post of duty. (June 19, 1896)

...marriage...Mr. Bendix Jensen and Miss Agnes Sophia Ganderup...she has for nine years past held a position in the Ferndale Hotel... (October 6, 1896)

...Charles Farrens...who is now conducting a gasoline corn popper at the Ferndale Hotel. He can supply you with the nicest popcorn every tasted... (November 24, 1896)

A quiet wedding took place in the parlor's of the Ferndale Hotel last Saturday evening, January 30th....the contracting parties were Charles Farrens, proprietor of the Ferndale Popcorn Stand, and Minnie Crainage. (February 2, 1897)

As will be seen by reference to an ad in this issue the Ferndale Building Association offers for sale all of its property in Ferndale, including Roberts Hall, the Ferndale Hotel Building, and the Loewenthal Store Building, the property will be sold either separately or as a whole. The only place in town where names of streets will be found is on the Ferndale Hotel corner. We think this is a good move and would like to see these signs displayed at every street intersection and in the valley. (July 23, 1897)

Jerry Lanini has succeeded Patrick Conway as assistant at Kerfoot and Daugherty's Ferndale Hotel. (August 6, 1897)

...Charley Davis of Ferndale at present employed at the Ferndale Hotel...sister died, Mrs. George Perrott...Rohnerville... (August 10, 1897)

Joe Loewenthal of our County seat has sold the Ferndale Hotel property and the store building adjoining to M.S. Taylor the Eureka Capitalist. Rumor has it that Mr. Taylor is to make extensive improvements to the hotel this summer. (March 11, 1898)

M.S. Taylor of Eureka who owns the Ferndale Hotel building, visited Ferndale Sunday and we are reliably informed that he has decided to make extensive improvements on that structure in the very near future. (May 10, 1898)

Miss Dudley of Petrolia has accepted a position in the Ferndale Hotel. (June 14, 1898)

William McCuen, clerk for Kerfoot and Daugherty... (August 2, 1898)

M.S. Taylor, of Eureka...is the owner of the Ferndale hotel property, which is now being so extensively improved, and when the work of repair and renovation is completed Kerfoot & Daugherty will have one of the most convenient, roomy and attractive hostelries in the county. The capacity of the hotel is being largely increased, a handsome square front on both Ocean Avenue and Main Street will enclose the structure, and the interior will be arranged to the best possible advantage. A section of the north-east wing of the hotel is being moved back, and in its place will be built a store 20x50 feet in size, a duplicate to the store adjoining, owned by Mr. Taylor and occupied by the Jacobs Bros, clothiers. Above the store will be sleeping apartments connected with the hotel, and with the apartments above the Jacobs Bros' store... (August 16, 1898)

Never mind. The Ferndale Hotel does look a little odd shorn of the old balcony which had adorned the Main street front 23 years. But landlord Taylor promises that a new one, more roomy and elaborate in its architecture than the old one, shall be in place within a week. Even valley residents will hardly be able to recognize the old hostelry when the carpenters have finished. (October 11, 1898)

After a two months continuous siege, the carpenters and plasters, and painters and plumbers and paper hangers and mosaic hangers have

retired from the renovated, renewed and enlarged Ferndale Hotel and landlord Taylor has returned to Eureka. (November 18, 1898)

Since the Ferndale Hotel passed through the ordeal of being remodeled and enlarged, and has received the final coating of white, it is hardly recognized as being the old original rest for the weary. In fact, it had undergone such change that an old time guest of the house who was about to alight from the transfer stage not many days ago, looked curious, and finally asked, "Driver haven't you made a mistake?" He was soon assured to the contrary. The Main Street front, reaching almost to the Brick store, and including the second stories of both adjoining stores owned by Mr. Taylor, present owner of the hotel, is about 100 feet in length, and shows handsomely in its coating of pure white. The enlargement brought the Ocean Avenue side of the hotel out to the street and on a line with Roberts hall. This resulted in material enlargement of the office and dining room, and was equivalent aid in kitchen and sample rooms. The heavy cornice which surmounts the entire Main Street front, and the roomy balcony with its dainty ornamentation, add greatly to the attractiveness of the building. The work of remodeling and enlargement was done with a view to securing the greatest comfort and convenience, without regard to outlay. The Ferndale is now a ___room hotel, and to say that the closest attention is given to the general management, and the dining and sleeping departments, is only the truth. The second story apartments along the Main Street front, especially those in the east annex, are roomy, well lighted and fittingly furnished. The wash and toilet rooms are new and fitted in the most approved modern style, the former showing the handiwork of Gay & Griffin in the line of mosaic work, which will be a standing testimonial in their behalf. With Dennis Daugherty and Joe Kerfoot as mine hosts and Mrs. Kerfoot to supervise the cooking and sleeping departments, the Ferndale, now the largest hotel in the county outside Eureka, will go on accumulating friends and patrons, as it well deserves to. (November 25, 1898)

In this issue will be found the professional card of Dr. B.N. Childs, the Dr. formerly practiced in Petrolia but has spent the past year in San Francisco visiting the hospitals there. He has located in Ferndale for the practice of his profession and his wife will soon join him...office and residence, Ferndale Hotel, rooms 32 & 33. He is a surgeon and gynecologist. (December 13, 1898)

C.F. Rackliffe was at work yesterday, placing in position the necessary partitions for two card rooms in the Ferndale Hotel Office and saloon. (June 2, 1899)

Mr. M.S. Taylor is now erecting an addition to his Ferndale Hotel property. It will be a two-story structure, the lower floor of which will be used for warerooms for the store buildings on Mr. Taylor's possession, and also for woodshed's for the hotel. The upper part of the new structure will be fitted up for housekeeping and will be occupied by MacLennan and wife. (October 3, 1899)

Miss Smith, late of Petrolia hotel, now holds a position in the culinary department of the Ferndale Hotel. (August 8, 1899)

Miss Annie Forbes, who for eight years past has served so faithfully in the culinary department of the Ferndale Hotel, is off on a two months vacation and left yesterday to visit her parents at Salt Lake City. (September 19, 1899)

David Cronin, the popular clerk at the Ferndale Hotel... (October 31, 1899)

Neither one of them were injured in the least, but they were thoroughly frightened. (December 15, 1899)

They have our best wishes for future happiness. (January 16, 1900)

Clarence Matthews, who is agent for a new and improved gasoline lamp, placed a couple in position Wednesday at Kerfoot & Daugherty's Ferndale Hotel, and they certainly give a clear and brilliant light. (February 2, 1900)

Chas Davis, who has presided over the tables in the dining room of the Ferndale hotel for a long time past, has accepted a similar position in the Revere House, Eureka. (April 6, 1900)

In the parlors of the Ferndale Hotel yesterday afternoon, Rev. Kelly of the Methodist Church united in marriage Mr. Henry D. Athwood and Miss Alice E. Richardson. Quite a number of relatives and friends of the parties to the contract witnessed the ceremony. The bride is a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. F. Richardson of the Rio Dell section, while the groom is a resident of St. Helena, Napa County, for which place the happy couple will depart in a few days where they will reside. (April 19, 1901)

Attys Franks has resigned his position as clerk at the Ferndale Hotel. (July 12, 1901)

R. Shealor of San Francisco has accepted the position of clerk at the Ferndale Hotel. (July 19, 1901)

Mr. Bruce, who is employed at the Ferndale Hotel, yesterday severely cut his left wrist with an axe while chopping wood...(August 30, 1901)

R. Shealor, who has been acting as clerk in the Ferndale Hotel for a month or two, has gone to Eureka with his wife where they will reside, we understand. (September 3, 1901)

"Chef" Brown, of the culinary department of the Ferndale Hotel, expects to have his bakery in the Gill house on Main Street, opposite the post office, ready for business in a day or two, probably by Thursday. H.H. Niebur finished the big brick oven Saturday evening. (November 5, 1901)

Landlord Kerfoot is having the parlors of the Ferndale Hotel remodeled and fitted up. (November 8, 1901)

Frank Flemming, a crack-a-jack bartender and hotel clerk, has accepted a position with Joe Kerfoot at his Ferndale hostelry, vice Lem Walker. (December 27, 1901)

Al Stevens is now clerking for Joseph Kerfoot at the Ferndale Hotel. (April 11, 1902)

Al Stevens has resigned his position as clerk at the Ferndale Hotel and is now working in Brice's Stables. Dave Cronin has taken Al's place at the Ferndale. (June 17, 1902)

Gus Averill has resigned his position with H.J. Mueller and is now working at the Ferndale Hotel. (August 22, 1902)

Charles Davis has resigned his position as waiter at the Ferndale Hotel and has gone to Eureka to work. (November 14, 1902)

Joseph Kerfoot, who sold his interest in the Ferndale Hotel yesterday, intends to reside in Ferndale for a time at least, so he informs us. (November 21, 1902)

...Joseph Kerfoot, the popular landlord of the Ferndale Hotel, retired from the management of that hostelry, and was succeeded by Messrs. Lot M. Brown of Eureka, and A.D. Hawkins of Salinas, CA. Mr. Kerfoot has been in the hotel business in Ferndale for many years and has made "The Ferndale" a very popular stopping place, especially among the traveling men. Messrs Brown and Hawkins are both experienced hotel men, and it is their intention to make several changes about the building, particularly in the office and bar room. The new firm takes charge this morning. (November 21, 1902)

The lease of the Ferndale Hotel property from M.S. Taylor to L.M. Brown and A.D. Hawkins for a term of five years from November 2, 1902 at a monthly rental of \$105, was filed for record November 24th. (November 28, 1902)

M. Lidstone and wife came out from Eureka last week and will make their home in the Cream City. Mr. Lidstone has accepted a position at the Ferndale Hotel. (December 2, 1902)

Messrs Hawkins & Brown, the new proprietors of the Ferndale Hotel, are now squared away into the collar, and have gotten down to business in dead earnest. Since assuming charge of this popular hostelry they have made many improvements, which indicate plainly that they are hotel men and know what is needed in the business. The to many objectionable feature of a hotel office and saloon combined has been abolished, for the barroom has been moved back, and in the front corner is now a neatly arranged office and sitting room for guests. The bar is located between this office and the private cardroom, the main entrance to which is from the Ocean Avenue side, and it with the office, card rooms, hall, etc., have been handsomely painted and decorated and with everything connected as comfortable, neat and inviting as could be desired. The new arrangement is convenience itself, and cannot be but pleasing to the patrons of the hotel. It is Messrs Hawkins & Brown's intention to run a first-class house, and they are going at it in the right way. (January 23, 1903)

Dr. Starr, the dentist, has moved his office from the ground floor of the Ferndale Hotel to the front rooms of this building above Hopkins'

shoe store. (January 27, 1903) (NOTE: picture in ad)

Change at the Ferndale Hotel...Mr. Lot Brown selling his interest in this popular hostelry to Mr. Hawkins, who will hereafter conduct the same... (March 27, 1903)

Lot M. Brown, late of the Ferndale Hotel, is again to engage in the saloon business at Eureka. (April 10, 1903)

David Cronin has resigned his position as clerk at the Ferndale Hotel. (June 12, 1903)

Last Saturday in Eureka, Fred Antonsen and Miss Minnie Hicken, of Ferndale, were made man and wife. The bride is the waitress at the Ferndale Hotel...(August 25, 1903)

Carpenters C.F. Rackliffe and Bert Matthews started work yesterday morning remodeling the lower story of the Ferndale Hotel. The ground floor sleeping rooms are all to be torn out and in their place will be one large office fronting on Main Street and in it will be a plate glass front. From this office will ascend a wide new stairway, branching about half way up from a landing in two directions. The corner room, now used as an office, will be converted in to a modern bar room, and the whole is to be fitted up in fine style... (December 1, 1903)

Mr. and Mrs. Lidstone of Eureka have accepted situations at the Ferndale Hotel. Mr. Jack Scotton has left the dinning room of that hostelry and is now serving there as clerk and bartender. (January 1, 1904)

Modern, Attractive and Inviting...Some time ago the Enterprise noted the fact that extensive improvements were being made at the Ferndale Hotel, and now that they have been completed we desire to make detailed mention of the great change that has taken place at that hostelry, as all such advancements show progression, are of direct benefit to our little city, and therefore entitled to note at our hands. Previous to the change in question, the Ferndale hotel, while it answered its purpose in a way, so to speak, was decidedly a back number, and guests were not afforded the conveniences they expected to find in a place of this kind. Landlord Hawkins realized this and determined that he would take a step forward. As a result the entire front ground floor of the hotel has been practically rebuilt, and in the place of a small saloon, a smaller office and a number of inferior sleeping apartments that were as useless as they were ornamental, we now find the room thus occupied converted into an office and waiting room that would be a credit to any hotel in the state outside of the metropolis. In size the new waiting room or office is 33x35 feet, and leading from it to the second floor is an handsome stairway, which when it reaches a landing branches to either side. The office is prettily papered and decorated, the wainscotting and wood work being finished to oak grain, and in the front is a French plate glass window early 10 feet square. It's furnishings are also complete, including a spacious table for papers, writing purposes, etc. with high back easy chairs for the comfort of guests. From this office are entrances to the dining room, the wash room and the saloon, the latter being 27x33 feet in size, and like the office rail neatly papered and grained, and furnished in an attractive style. In the re-arrangement of the hotel, Messrs. Rackliffe and Matthews did the carpenter work, the handsome stairway was designed by W.S. Fitzell and made by R.A. Simpson... (January 5, 1904)

Mrs. A.L. Simonds is now employed as a cook at the Ferndale Hotel. (August 2, 1904)

Frank Lithgow has succeeded Ed Kerri as clerk at the Ferndale hotel. (September 6, 1904)

Ferndale Hotel...E.F. Hawkins and wife, late of the Ferndale Hotel...are now in Salinas City, CA...their daughter Pauline Hawkins, 7 years old, died in San Francisco (March 21, 1905)

Mrs. J.E. Chism has resigned the charge of the Ferndale Hotel dining room and this morning left for Eureka, where she will make an extended stay. (May 16, 1905)

Negotiations have been concluded whereby Mr. H.H. Howell & Son became the proprietors of the Ferndale hotel, having purchased the business from John Wood, who has conducted the hostelry for the last six or eight months. The Messrs Howell come from the northern end of the county where they have resided for years past and where they have gained the respect and confidence of the people of that section by their straight forward business methods. (September 5, 1905)

The Ferndale fire department was called out at about seven o'clock Wednesday evening in response to an alarm of fire. The blaze started in the cook's bedroom on the second floor and at the rear of the Ferndale Hotel building. The fire was caused by some clothes hanging near a coal oil stove catching fire by the explosion of the stove, and in a short time the flames spread to the ceiling and rafters of the building. The hose companies were not long in getting a couple of streams of water at work, and in a few minutes had the fire under control... (October 27, 1905)

Yesterday, March 1st, the Ferndale Hotel suspended business, Messrs. Howell, the gentlemen who have been conducting the hostelry for some months, having decided to engage in another line of work. Mr. Howell, Sr. and family are now occupying the R.W. Roberts house on Francis Street. (March 2, 1906)

The Ferndale Hotel, closed to the public the last month or more, is again open for business, and is under the management of the former proprietor, W.H. Howell... (April 27, 1906)

I hereby offer for sale the furniture and fixtures in the Ferndale Hotel, also the stock of liquors, etc., in the hostelry, together with the lease to the property...W.H. Howell, Ferndale, May 4, 1906) (May 8, 1906)

The Ferndale Fire Department was called out about 8:30 o'clock last Tuesday morning to extinguish a fire at the Ferndale Hotel. The blaze originated in the attic of the kitchen, and is supposed to have been caused by a defective flue. The fire ladders were on hand in short order and soon streams from the gasoline fire engine and the hose companies were playing on the flames with the result that they were extinguished before any great headway had been made or any serious damage done. This is the second time within a year the department has been called out to quell blazes at the Ferndale, and has been successful in each instance in checking what might have been a very costly fire to our little city. (July 20, 1906)

A deal was consummated last week whereby the Ferndale Hotel passes under new management. J.P. Cannon, formerly of Briceland, is the purchaser. The gentleman is an experienced and competent hotel man, and we predict that under his capable supervision the Ferndale will resume its old position as one of the leading stopping places of the county. Mr. Cannon will purchase only the lease to the property, the furniture, which is the property of John Woods of Freshwater, not being included in the deal. This will be moved out and brand new furniture installed throughout the house... (August 21, 1906)

It is reported that the Ferndale Hotel has been leased by Sig Hurtig for a term of three years. Mr. Hurtig is a former theatrical man of Eureka. (October 2, 1906)

G.A. Rochat, who has conducted the Creamery Restaurant in this place for some time, has leased the Ferndale Hotel and yesterday opened the hostelry to the public. (December 4, 1906)

The Ferndale Hotel Property, owned by M.F. Taylor of Eureka, has been purchased by H.C. Blum, the Ferndale real estate and insurance man, who, it is stated, has a number of Cream City residents associated with him in the venture. It is the intention of the new owners of the property to thoroughly renovate and refurnish the hotel, when the hostelry will be placed in charge of a capable hotel man and reopened to the public. (March 12, 1907)

As will be seen by an ad elsewhere in today's enterprise, E.A. Branch will on September 1st open the Ferndale hotel to the public as a rooming house and restaurant. The space formerly occupied by the bar room will be fitted up with tables and used as a lunch room, and in addition there will be private rooms for parties. The beds will be thoroughly renovated and placed in condition, and the Ferndale will be a most desirable stopping place for the night. (August 27, 1907)

It will be good news to the people of the town to learn that the Ferndale Hotel is to be thoroughly renovated and reopened about the first of the year. George Brice, owner of the property, has already started on the necessary repairs. The new concrete foundation will take the place of the present wooden one. The interior will be overhauled and thoroughly renovated and entirely refurnished. Mr. Brice has had applications from a couple of competent hotelmen... (October 9, 1908)

About the 20th of this month, if possible, the first of the new year, at the latest, the Ferndale Hotel is to be reopened. When it is opened for business it will practically be a new hotel from start to finish. Even the old name has passed away and the new hotel will be known as "The Ivanhoe".

From foundation to roof the place has been overhauled, repaired and remodeled. Under the entire building a concrete foundation has been laid. Hot and cold running water has been installed in all the front rooms. Every room and portion of the building has been repapered and repainted. The entire plumbing system has been torn out and the very latest sanitary improvements installed. The flooring in the dining room and kitchen has been torn up and new floors laid, and in the former room four new windows added on the Ocean Avenue side air and light the dining rooms splendidly. The new hotel will be lighted by the latest improvement acetylene plant with patent lighters and extinguishers. All the old furniture has been removed and in its stead are new carpets, furniture, bedding and linen. In fact, of the old Ferndale Hotel there is nothing left except the outside walls. George Brice, the owner of the property, has spared neither time or money in the remodeling. The hotel has been closed for some time and Mr. Brice has been often asked as to when he would reopen it. He has always replied, when he got around to fix it up thoroughly and put the right men in charge...the hotel will be under the management of McDonald & McKay, experienced hotel men who conducted a hotel in Dawson for ten years or more... (December 4, 1908)

Hartley Bros, the Ferndale painters, who have been engaged for some weeks in thoroughly renovating the interior of "The Ivanhoe", expect to complete their work in a few days... (January 15, 1909)

"The Ivanhoe", formerly the Ferndale Hotel, purchased some time ago and thoroughly renovated by Geo. M. Brice, is now practically ready for occupancy...The entire interior has been overhauled, repainted and repapered...In the hall a large grated opening admits the heat from the general or lobby room below. In the dining room four new windows on the Ocean Avenue side admit light and air, which added to the other improvements in the room itself...Ferndale has long been in need of two hotels. There is travel enough in this town to warrant the maintaining of them and with that end in view Mr. Brice spared neither time nor money in the new hotel. (January 26, 1909)

Mrs. Spires and daughter Mildred, who have made their home at the George Snively place on Rose Avenue since last September, are now domiciled at the Ivanhoe Hotel. (March 19, 1909)

...completed the work of fixing up the rooms in the rear of the Hotel Ivanhoe. New skylights have been placed in position and the rooms

will be most neat and convenient ones. The alterations will give the hostelry nine added rooms. (April 9, 1909)

G.M. Brice is having a large vegetable garden planted in the Shaw field near town, which will be used to supply the Hotel Ivanhoe with vegetables. (April 9, 1909)

Cliff Brice is filling the position at the Hotel Ivanhoe formerly occupied by Chris Christensen, who is now on an extended vacation, which he will spend in the southern part of the state. (March 8, 1910)

The choice redwood scene which up to last week was on exhibition at the Citizens' Furniture Store has been purchased by G.M. Brice and now adorns the wall of the lobby in the Hotel Ivanhoe, greatly admired by traveling men and patrons of the hotel. The picture is from the brush of Mrs. A. Keohan, who is fast gaining recognition as an artist of merit, especially in landscape and redwood paintings. This last work of Mrs. Keohan's is a 36x30 scene, depicting a road in the heart of the redwood forest, and those who have seen the picture know how true to nature is the work of Mrs. Keohan... (March 25, 1910)

About eight o'clock last Tuesday evening L.T. Sorenson was called from the lobby of the Hotel Ivanhoe by W.A. Imes, an insurance solicitor, and brutally beaten by a couple of hired thugs brought to Ferndale by Imes for that purpose. Imes and his two plug uglies, who later in court gave their names as Parker and Ferguson, arrived in Ferndale about six o'clock in an automobile and were accompanied by Otto Petersen and a man named Dillon, the chauffeur completing the party. Dillon, Petersen and the chauffeur took no part in the trouble, though the opinion is freely expressed that most all of the party knew when they left Eureka what was the purpose of the trip to this town...Mr. Sorenson was sitting in the lobby of the Hotel Ivanhoe when Imes stepped inside and asked him to come out a minute, as he wished to speak to him. The pug Parker was standing nearby, and upon Imes opening the conversation by demanding that Sorenson retract what he had said in reference to Imes telling an untruth about him he, stepped up and before Mr. Sorenson had an idea as to his intentions struck him a terrific blow in the face... (April 22, 1910)

A deal was concluded Saturday evening whereby Sidney Aston, the popular steward of the steamer Kilburn for several years past, leases of Geo. M. Brice the Hotel Ivanhoe in Ferndale. Mr. Aston will take charge of this popular hostelry on April 1st and it will be renamed the Hotel Aston. "Sid" Aston, as he is known to a host of friends, is immensely popular with all who have ever had occasion to travel on the steamer Kilburn... (March 17, 1914)

Sid Aston is expected to arrive in Ferndale next Thursday to make preparations for assuming charge of the Hotel Ivanhoe on April 1st. He will be assisted in the management of the Ivanhoe by Harry Sickel, who has been assistant steward on the Kilburn under Mr. Aston for several years. (March 20, 1914)

Sid Aston, for years past the popular steward of the steamer Kilburn, arrived in Ferndale Tuesday and on Wednesday assumed charge of the Hotel Ivanhoe, having leased his popular hostelry from Geo. M. Brice, as previously reported in The Enterprise. Mr. Aston was accompanied to Ferndale by his little son and by his brother-in-law, Mr. McLennan. His wife and other child will arrive in a few days. Chef Steve Sitich of the Kilburn also arrived Tuesday and will be in charge of the kitchen of the Ivanhoe, while assistant Steward Harry Sickels of the same steamer, who recently resigned his position and has been in Ferndale a week or more past, will assist Mr. Aston in the management of the hotel...George L. Collins of Ferndale has accepted a position as clerk at the Ivanhoe and his wide acquaintance and obliging ways make his selection a popular one... (April 3, 1914)

Appreciation of Sidney Aston (copy) (April 21, 1914 - page 3)

...Mr. Aston will continue to manage all departments of the Hotel Aston, while Mrs. Nevens will still operate the Crystal Cafe, which she had intended closing had she taken charge of the dining room of the Aston... (August 4, 1914)

Mr. and Mrs. Hawley, of Eureka have assumed charge of the dining room of the Hotel Aston, having leased same from Proprietor Aston. (October, 2, 1914)

Through a deal concluded this week Sidney Aston retires from the management of the Hotel Aston and G.M. Brice, former proprietor, again assumes control. The hotel, which under Mr. Aston's management has been known as the Hotel Aston, will resume its former name, the Hotel Ivanhoe. H.F. Brice will again assume the active management. Mr. and Mrs. Hawley, who for the past two weeks have been in charge of the dining room, will retire in a few days, and all parts of the hotel will be under the one control. Mr. Aston and family will return to San Francisco... (October 16, 1914)

Dr. R. Hickingbottom, a veterinary surgeon and dentist, has located in Ferndale for the practice of his profession and at present is making his headquarters at the Hotel Ivanhoe... (December 12, 1916)

F.H. Brice, manager of the Hotel Ivanhoe...(March 19, 1918)

Chas. Pearson, a laborer who arrived in Ferndale Saturday noon to be employed on the street paving work in this town, committed suicide some time after midnight that night at the Hotel Ivanhoe by hanging himself in his room...Being unable to enter the room which was locked, Mr. Brice secured a ladder and looked into the window. The body was hanging from an ordinary coat hook on the wall, a suitcase strap having been used by the suicide to suspend himself from it...(September 26, 1919)

marriage...Herbert Brice to Miss Pearl Whetstone...Los Angeles...for a number of years past he has been the manager of the Hotel Ivanhoe...(December 5, 1919)

George M. Brice, pioneer businessman of Ferndale, plans to retire from active business life and in today=s Enterprise offers for sale his Ivanhoe Hotel, stage and drayage business and all his business holdings...(February 23, 1923)

Frank Valsecchi of this town has purchased the Ivanhoe Hotel from George M. Brice and took possession yesterday morning. The deal involves the real estate and building, as well as the hotel furnishings and business. In the building besides the hotel proper are the business places of George Fredson, general merchant, and R.L. Jacobsen, the Tailor. The hotel will be under the management of Mr. Valsecchi=s brother, James Valsecchi, who returned to this town last week after a residence of two years in Petaluma. The gentleman is well known in Ferndale, where he formerly resided. Frank Valsecchi will continue to manage his restaurant and soft drink place as in the past. The Hotel Ivanhoe, which has been under the management of Herbert F. Brice for the last several years, is one of the pioneer hotels of the county and under the management of Mr. Valsecchi will doubtless continue to enjoy the liberal patronage which has been accorded it in the past. (March 9, 1923)

Frank Valsecchi has sold his pool hall and soft drink parlor in Ferndale to Messrs. Giger and Tomasini, two young men who will conduct the business hereafter. (2/24/28)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The Ferndale Hotel building lost considerable plaster and the pape was also injured...(April 24, 1906)

The Ivanhoe Hotel in this town had a narrow escape from destruction by fire about three o=clock yesterday morning, but prompt work on the part of the firemen, using the chemical engine, saved the building and the loss was nominal. The fire was first discovered by a guest in one of the rooms on the second floor, who was awakened by his room being filled with smoke. He gave the alarm and the firemen were on the scene in remarkably fast time. It was found that the fire was in the kitchen, having started from a box of ashes behind the large range. The fire had burned the partition back of the stove and gone up the wall, an din a few minutes would have spread to the upper floor. The smoke which filled the kitchen and adjoining rooms made the situation appear serious for a time...(1/9/25)

Engineer D.D. Peacock is now employed in the Ferndale Electric Light Works and electrician Wright will be engaged this week in wiring the Dungan-Stevens Laundry on Ocean Avenue, and the residences of J. Giacomini, J.T. Robarts and L.H. Miner in North Ferndale. (January 5, 1897)

Dungan and Stevens are to move their White Front Laundry into the Reinhart building near the Ocean Avenue bridge. (February 12, 1897)

Messrs. Stevens and Dungan are moving their White Front Laundry into the Reinhart building on Francis Creek at the Ocean Avenue bridge... (February 16, 1897)

Will Dungan retires from the White Front laundry Ferndale tomorrow and the business is to be conducted hereafter by Charley Stevens, Will's former partner, who has hired an experienced laundryman from below to assist him. (August 31, 1897)

Miss Jennie Goble last Tuesday purchased from Charles H. Stevens the White Front Laundry on Ocean Avenue and with the assistance of Mrs. R.D. Dunn will hereafter conduct the same. (November 19, 1897)

J.A. Fike has traded his place on Williams Creek for the J.H. Reinhart property on Ocean Avenue. (November 8, 1895)

Wednesday afternoon, shortly after 2 o'clock, the Ferndale fire whistle at the electric light works sounded an alarm, and the blaze was soon located in the building on Ocean Avenue (occupied by Miss Jennie Goble's White Front Laundry, and owned by Mrs. J.A. Fike.) The Ferndale fire company and in fact nearly every body in town promptly responded, and despite some confusion water was soon pouring out of two nozzles onto the flames, and the fire was checked before very much damage was done. All of Miss Goble's goods and chattels escaped without any serious injury, and \$100 will easily cover the loss to the building, which was uninsured. The fire started from the heater and worked its way up the rear wall and was burning quite furiously between the ceiling and roof by the time the fire fighters arrived on the scene. Quite a stiff breeze was blowing from the northwest, and had the flames gotten beyond control, the result would have been a clean sweep probably of a half dozen or more other buildings...Soon after the fire P.T. Putney started out with a subscription paper, and in a very short while raised enough money to enable Mrs. Fike to repair her building and put it in better shape than it was before the blaze. (May 13, 1898)

About 11:30 o'clock a.m. last Saturday a fire broke out in the rear of the White Front laundry on Ocean Avenue and for a time it looked as though Ferndale would have a serious conflagration. The fire department responded promptly and had water on the flames in less than three minutes. After an alarm was given the fire was under considerable headway and was too late to save anything of any importance. The laundry building was completely gutted and the shop adjoining and occupied by wheelwright, J.E. Daugherty, was burned. Had their been any wind at the time, the fire company would probably have experienced some difficulty in extinguishing the flames and keeping them from spreading to the adjoining building, i.e. Charles Schreiner's residence, the electric light works, Brice's Livery Stables, etc. The fire probably started from the furnace in the washroom of the laundry. Miss Goble, the proprietor, was absent at the time. The lady places her loss at about \$150, while the building, owned by Mrs. Dolly Fike, is suppose to have been worth about \$350, and the shop adjoining, \$100. We understand that there was no insurance on any of the property. This is the second time within the past few months that a fire has started in the laundry building, which is now only a mass of charred ruins and will necessitate the

erection of a new structure. (August 2, 1898)

Robert E. Morgan has sold to William Morgan the west part of lot 1 in block 15, Herrick's survey to Ferndale. (February 3, 1903)
Town Trustees...The superintendent of streets was instructed to arrange for the erection of a small building on Ocean Avenue near the bridge to be used as a pumping station to pump water into the town tank near the school house... (July 10, 1908)

The new power house erected on Ocean Avenue to be used as a station for pumping the town water supply is now completed and the necessary machinery for equipping the plant is expected on the Argo's next trip. (August 14, 1908)

Town Trustees...It was decided to purchase from _____ Morgan the lot where the town's pumping station on Francis Creek, near Roberts hall, stands, and the warrant was ordered drawn in favor of Town Marshal I.B. Barnes for \$76 to pay for the land. The purchase price of the lot was \$75, the extra dollar being for the recording of the deed... (March 11, 1910)

Town Trustees...it was decided o build a new barn, 20x24 feet in size, on the town lot on Ocean Avenue, for the accommodation of the team. Work on the same will be commenced shortly. (August 5, 1910)

William Flowers and Frank Reas are now engaged in the erection of a town barn on Ocean Avenue. (August 16, 1910)

Last Saturday a number of Ferndalers enjoyed a "rat killing" at the town barn on Ocean Avenue. Armed with clubs, rifles and other warlike instruments the rodent tribe was put to flight and their ranks sadly thinned, it being estimated that nearly 150 were killed. (March 28, 1913)

A new shed is being built on Ferndale's town lot on Ocean Avenue to house the town's street sweeping machine and other implements. (December 18, 1914)

C.T. Schreiner is having his lot between his blacksmith shop and residence on Ocean Avenue filled in and M.B. Soper is doing the job. He has leased this area to the Electric Light Company for a wood yard for three years, which will give the company storage room for 250 cords of wood. The small building occupied by Wagonmaker Daugherty has been torn down and the 12' wing of the building alongside of where the wagon shop stood is also to be made away with. (August 6, 1897)

BLACKSMITH BUILDING

T.J. Fennessey and Charles T. Schreiner have formed a co-partnership to date from October 1st, 1895, to do a general blacksmithing and horseshoeing business in Ferndale. Mr. Fennessey will move his shop to Mr. Schreiner's shop on Ocean Avenue... (September 27, 1895)

The blacksmithing firm of Mills and Schriener has been dissolved, C.T. Mills retiring. (September 27, 1895)

Blacksmith Fennessey vacated his old stand Tuesday and moved up to the Ocean Avenue shop where he and blacksmith Schriener will hold forth as partners hereafter. (October 4, 1895)

Last Saturday Thomas J. Fennessey was quite badly burned at his blacksmith shop on Ocean Avenue. Electric light man Cone was heating an oyster can filled with shellac and alcohol over the forge when the contents took fire and in attempting to remove the can it was accidentally overturned and the burning fluids struck Mr. Fennessey. Fortunately several were present at the shop and no time was lost smothering the flames, which threatened to cremate Tom in short order. As it was his hand and wrist were badly burned as were a couple of Mr. Cone's fingers. (April 28, 1896)

Mr. Fennessey is still shoeing horses at his shop on Ocean Avenue at this place... (September 3, 1897)

Chris Hansen, of the firm of Kinzel and Hansen, returned Sunday from San Francisco, where he selected new machinery for their woodworking shop on Ocean Avenue. They have found the building occupied by them too small and will soon move into new quarters to be constructed for them by C.T. Schreiner on the site where Charley's shop now stands. (October 23, 1900)

The Schriener blacksmith shop on Ocean Avenue is being torn down preparatory to the erection of a new building on the same site. Part of the new structure will be used as a blacksmith shop and the other will be occupied by Kinzel and Hansen for a mechanical shop. (November 16, 1900)

The Schriener blacksmith shop on Ocean Avenue is nearly torn down and a new building will soon take its place. This, one of the old landmarks of Ferndale, will be replaced by a structure which will be occupied by Kinzel & Hansen and Schriener & Fennessey, and will be a vast addition to that part of the town. (December 11, 1900)

Kinzel & Hansen are now located in their new shop on Ocean Avenue, next door to the Schreiner-Fennessey blacksmith shop. (March 26, 1901)

Kinzel & Hansen are now settled in their fine new shop on Ocean Avenue and are prepared to do all kinds of mill work, wagon and carriage repairing, turning and band sawing and will also conduct a general jobbing business. They will make a specialty of creamery work and are prepared to manufacture... (April 2, 1901)

Chris Hansen of the Ocean Avenue firm of Kinzel & Hansen...(August 23, 1901)

T.J. Frost cut the thumb of his right hand quite badly last Friday on a rip saw while working in Kinzel & Hansen's Ocean Avenue Mechanical Shop. (October 8, 1901)

The work of enlarging Walter Burrill's place of business...Messrs Kinzel & Hansen are building the circular counter and other fixtures, and T.J. Frost is placing them in position... (March 14, 1902)

While working in Kinzel's & Hansen's shop on Ocean Avenue Wednesday afternoon T.J. Frost had the two first fingers of his left hand almost severed by coming in contact with a band saw. It will be several weeks before Mr. Frost will be able to use the injured members. (April 4, 1902)

Chris Hansen, of the firm of Kinzel & Hansen, received the other day a letter from his brother M. Hansen, who was in Ferndale about three years ago...Mr. Hansen has been following the sea since he left Ferndale... (July 8, 1902)

As the result of blood poisoning, following the mangling of his thumb by a saw at the Ocean Avenue Mechanical Shop of Kinzel & Hansen less than two weeks ago our old and respected friend Cozine Kinzel breathed his last at his home in Ferndale at nine o'clock last Saturday... (March 3, 1903)

The Ocean Avenue Mechanical Shops, owned by C.T. Schriener, are to be under a new management after February 1st. Mr. Chris Hansen is to be succeeded by Frank Elkins and David Rees, who have taken a lease of the shop, Mr. Hansen having decided to engage in the manufacture of fixtures for the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co of Ferndale in company with W.E. Matthews. The Curtain Fixture Co. will be ready for business in a few weeks now. (January 12, 1904)

F. Elkins is at work at the Reis & Elkins mechanical shop on Ocean Avenue assembling a launch for J.C. Ericksen... (February 18, 1908)

A deal was concluded this week whereby R.F. Elkins disposed of his interest in the Rees & Elkins mechanical shop on Ocean Avenue to his partner, D.E. Rees, who will hereafter conduct the same. Mr. Elkins will leave tomorrow for his ranch in the South Fork mountains... (September 17, 1909)

T.J. Fennessey, of the Schreiner & Fennessey blacksmith shop, has definitely decided to locate at Oroville, this state, where he will engage in the merchandising business with his brother. Mr. Fennessey's family is at present at that place and will be joined by the gentleman in the course of two or three weeks... (October 12, 1909)

A deal was concluded Wednesday whereby R.A. Simpson disposed of his Cream City Mechanical Shop to a newly formed corporation, the Stockholders of which are D.E. Rees, Fred Winkler, Thomas Boyd and J.V. Dasher, Mr. Simpson also retaining a portion of the stock. Mr. Rees is the owner of the Ferndale Mechanical Shop on Ocean Avenue, which will now be consolidated with the Simpson shop. Mr. Winkler has been employed by him for some time past. Mr. Boyd and ... (June 27, 1913)

The work of moving the machinery from the Rees mechanical shop on Ocean avenue to the Simpson shop on Rose Avenue is in progress this week. (July 11, 1913)

T.J. Fennessey, who for many years past has bene associated with C.T. Schreiner in the blacksmith business on Ocean Avenue, will hereafter conduct the business alone. Mr. Schreiner leaves tomorrow for Eel Rock, where he will engaged in ranching. (October 29, 1915)

REAR OF BLACKSMITH SHOP

The subject of an electric light plant for Ferndale is being seriously considered by our business men, and the prospects of having our town lighted by electricity in the near future are quite flattering. Two or three different propositions are being discussed, and there seems to be a general desire on the part of our property holders for the establishment of a plant... (July 26, 1895)

...the board of trustees...a franchise has been granted to Mr. Nelson's and Kerri to erect and maintain an electric light plant in Ferndale...Ferndale needs electric lights and we must have them. This place has discarded its short dresses and is now a prosperous and growing city. (December 6, 1895)

Nelson and Kerri desire proposals for furnishing 100 electric light poles 32 feet long. For further particulars inquire of Nelson, the Taylor. (December 20, 1895)

In speaking of Nelson & Kerri's proposed electric light plant, the Valley Oracle contains the following..."...all those who are forced to walk along our streets on a dark and stormy night would appreciate the benefit of a few lights scattered at appropriate intervals..." (January 24, 1896)

Nelson, the tailor informs us that Will Kerri and himself will go to San Francisco about the middle of this month to arrange for the purpose of the necessary apparatus for their Ferndale Electric Light Works. Byron Wooldridge has been awarded the contract to get out 60 poles for Nelson & Kerri's Electric light circuit in Ferndale. (February 14, 1896)

Teamsters Charles Bartlett and Will Smiley were scattering electric light poles along Main Street yesterday. (February 28, 1896)

Mr. F. Nelson has leased of C.T. Schreiner a portion of the latter's blacksmith shop on Ocean avenue, and the Ferndale Electric Light Works are to be therein located...Tuesday Mr. Nelson and Mr. Cone, an electrician from Fortuna, surveyed Main Street and marked the location for the necessary poles...The rear end of Mr. Schriener's shop is to be remodeled and Geo Hammer started work there yesterday. Byron Wooldridge floated a raft of poles this week down Eel River from Price Creek to Port Kenyon, and they are being hauled to Ferndale and will be set up along Main Street. (February 28, 1896)

Messrs. Tinsley and Sanders commenced yesterday digging the holes for the Ferndale Electric light poles. The circuit at present will be from L.M. Smith's place at the north to the Robert Williams place on the west. The dynamo selected by Mr. Nelson, we believe, is of 800 light capacity. (February 28, 1896)

The town trustees have decided to permit nothing but square telephone, telegraph and electric light poles to be erected on Main Street. (March 3, 1896)

Mr. F. Nelson has let to Oluff Andreasen of the Ferndale Mechanical Shop a contract to remodel the rear of C.T. Schreiner's blacksmith shop for the electric light works and for placing the boiler engine, etc. in position. Mr. Andreasen will commence work next Monday. (March 6, 1896)

Seventy-nine packages of electrical machinery arrived on Saturday's Weott for F. Nelson. (March 10, 1896)

The square electric light poles for Main Street are being sawed out at Scotia for Mr. Nelson. The round poles will be used on the side streets of the town. (March 13, 1896)

Byron Wooldridge, assisted by John Sanders and Charley Tinsley, started at work Tuesday erecting electric light poles in Ferndale. (March 13, 1896)

Byron Wooldridge and his assistants, Charles Tinsley and Oscar Lindley are still hard at work erecting electric light poles along the

streets of Ferndale...the poles will be extended into North Ferndale as far as the places of L. Canepa and M. Welsh. Mr. Wooldridge tells us that all are to be painted and they will present a neat appearance when completed. (March 17, 1896)

Electrician Briggs arrived from San Francisco on Sunday Pomona. The gentleman is an old friend of F.C. Nelson and his mission to Ferndale is to set up and place in operation, Mr. Nelson's electric light plant...the rear of C.T. Schreiner's blacksmith shop in which the plant is to be located... (March 17, 1896)

There was filed for record Wednesday a lease from C.T. Schreiner to F.C. Nelson of the rear portion of the Schreiner blacksmith shop, for two years from March 1st at \$6 per month. The premises are intended for use as an electric light station. (March 20, 1896)

Messrs. Briggs, Cone, and Wooldridge, in the employ of F.C. Nelson commence Friday morning the work of stretching the street electric light wires in Ferndale. (April 7, 1896)

Engineer Wright arrived from Scotia this week, he has accepted the position of engineer at the Ferndale Electric Light Works. (April 17, 1896)

The Ferndale electric lights were turned on Friday evening and are now burning nightly. Proprietor Nelson will receive on this week's Weott a new dynamo of a new pattern. He proposes to give his patrons the best of lights. (May 12, 1896)

There was filed for record Saturday a lease from the Joshua Hendy Machine Works, San Francisco to Frank C. Nelson of Ferndale for the engine, heater and steam pump at use at the Ferndale Electric Light Works for a term of four months from March 7, 1896. (May 12, 1896)

...In our last issue Tuesday we reported the Enterprise electric lights "burning nightly" but had not been in press over an hour when the report reached us that a serious mishap had occurred at the plant. Investigation proved the report to be true, for after a two hours run Monday evening, the dynamo "fired" and the armature was badly wrecked. Proprietor Nelson ordered the machine taken out Tuesday morning and taken to San Francisco. This week's Weott will land one of the latest improved dynamo's at the Port for the Ferndale plant and in a few days Mr. Nelson will be ready for business again. The old dynamo was sold to him under a guarantee, but electrician Briggs says it is worthless and it surely has caused Proprietor Nelson a deal of trouble and annoyance. (May 15, 1896)

Mechanics liens upon the new Ferndale electric light plant were filed for record Tuesday by Oluff Andreasen and Kausen and Williams for labor and materials furnished Frank Nelson, the Proprietor in the sums of \$492.99 and \$186.62, respectively. (May 15, 1896)

The new dynamo for Nelson's electric light works arrived Friday...cost \$1,200... (May 19, 1896)

The Ferndale Electric light works did not start up Wednesday as expected...the plant will be ready for business tonight. (May 22, 1896)

F. Nelson says that the applications for electric lights are now becoming numerous, nearly every building in town will be wired before the summer is over. (May 26, 1896)

The Ferndale Electric light plant started up last Friday evening and is now working to a charm. The new dynamo is a beauty and the lights furnished are the best in the country. The Enterprise congratulates Proprietor Nelson on the success of his venture for he has a first class plant in every particular. We admire his public spirit and we beseech for him a liberal support from our people. He is deserving of it and we earnestly hope his investment will prove a paying one. Mr. Wright will fill the position of engineer and Mr. Cronin will be superintendent of the works, etc. (May 26, 1896)

The free dance given in the new KofP hall last Friday evening by Proprietor Nelson of the Ferndale Electric Light works now in successful operation was well attended and greatly enjoyed. Prof. Kausen, E.F. Kausen and Miss May Kausen furnished the music. (June 2, 1896)

Private letters were received in Ferndale this week from F.C. Nelson, prop of the Ferndale Electric Light Works, containing the information that he had started for Cuba where he intended to enlist in the army with the insurgents of that island. Before leaving San Francisco, however, he transferred his interest in the Ferndale plant over to the company from which he purchased it. What motive prompted Mr. Nelson to pursue such a course, we are unable to state, but suffice it to say that he has gone, probably never to return. (June 2, 1896)

A mechanics lien upon the Ferndale Electric light plant for \$492.99 was filed for record Monday by Oluff Andreasen. (June 5, 1896)

Mr. H.D. Scribner representing the Westernhouse Company of San Francisco now in possession of Nelson's Electric Light Plant arrived in Ferndale yesterday. The gentleman is engaged in straightening out the affairs of the business and we earnestly hope that he will succeed in making some arrangements to keep the plant in operation in Ferndale. (June 9, 1896)

F. Nelson the electric light man was in Phoenix, Arizona on June 3rd. He stated that he was on his way to Tempe, Arizona to put an electric light plant, after which he intended returning to Ferndale. (June 9, 1896)

Another mechanics lien has been filed on the Ferndale Electric Light plant, this time by R.A. Simpson for a balance of \$61.15, due for materials furnished. (June 12, 1896)

The Enterprise is unable to give its readers anything definite in this issue regarding the Ferndale electric light works. The plant is still running, but how long it will continue no one ventures to tell. The supply of wood is about exhausted, so Engineer Wright reports, and as there is no one at the head of the business, a new supply of fuel had not been secured up to yesterday. The affairs of the business are terribly mixed, and several liens and attachments have been filed. The western house representatives, from whom the dynamo and fixtures were secured by Nelson, is still here, and the boiler and engine is leased property. Those holding claims against the plant are searching for a means to get their pay...We might add that Nelson is still among the missing. (June 12, 1896)

Another mechanics lien against the Ferndale Electric Lights Work has been filed for record, Peter Andersen is the claimant this time for \$18.50 for labor and materials. (June 16, 1896)

A move was started in Ferndale yesterday to form a joint stock company to operate an electric light plant in this place. (June 16, 1896)

A lien was filed in the recorders office Tuesday by W.S. Wright against the property of the Ferndale Electric Light company for the sum of \$150, alleged to be due for services rendered in the construction of the plant. (June 19, 1896)

There was considerable excitement in Ferndale Wednesday. Shortly after dinner, H.D. Scribner, of the Westinghouse Co., of S.F. and Electrician Cone, with Byron Wooldridge and Chris Eskesen as assistants, proceeded to take down the electric light converters on the various buildings of the town. Mr. Scribner also took a team to Schriener's blacksmith shop, and with a crew of men, made a move to take out the dynamo from the electric light works. He was commanded to stop however, by T.J. Fennessey, Mr. Schriener's partner, the latter being at Bridgeville, and after a short consultation the gentleman from the city concluded to postpone that part of his undertaking. After all the converters had been secured, and freighted to Port Kenyon, and just as the work of taking down the street wires was commenced, constable Howard appeared on the scene with a warrant for the arrest of Scribner and Cone, sworn out by Oluff Andreason, who holds a lien on the electric light plant and its fixtures. The complaint charges them with a misdemeanor in unlawfully taking two converters, one from A.V. Chapin's and one from W.B. Alford's place of business, and they were taken before Judge Smith where pleas of not guilty were entered... (June 19, 1896)

Dismissed...cases against Messrs. Scribner and Cone, charged with a misdemeanor in removing certain electric light converters...Oluff Andreason, made no objection to a dismissal, and stated that the only desire of the prosecution was to have the existing difficulties settled in a legal way... (June 23, 1896)

C.H. Capwell tells us that he will commence next week to move the electric light works to the Ferndale mechanical shop in North Ferndale. The gentleman states that he will loose no time in getting the plant in running order. (June 26, 1896)

C.H. Capwell tells us that he will not commence moving his electric light plant to North Ferndale until next week sometime. There has been a delay in making out the necessary papers. (July 3, 1896)

The Ferndale Electric Lights, Heat and Power Company is now being incorporated for the purpose of operating an electric light plant in this town. The capital of the company is \$10,000, and the promoters of this scheme are: W.D. Capwell, J.H. Trost, C.T. Schreiner, H.H. Moller, C.H. Boynton, W.S. Wright, J.A. Shaw and E.F. Kausen. The directors named in the articles of incorporation for the first year are W.D. Capwell, Charles Schreiner, H.H. Moller, W.S. Wright and J.A. Shaw. (July 21, 1896)

W.S. Wright the electrician and a member of the recently arranged Ferndale Electric Light Company returned from below yesterday. He tells us that he did not succeeded in arranging for the purchase of the Nelson light plant still in Ferndale, but got figures on a new plant which his company will probably purchase. The Ferndale Company means business. (July 24, 1896)

H.D. Scribner of the Westinghouse Electrical Company, the owners of the defunct Nelson Light Plant here, came up on Saturday's Pomona and have been talking "sale" to the recently organized Ferndale Electric Light Company. (July 24, 1896)

The electric light muddle in Ferndale has at last been settled and yesterday Mr. Scribner of the Westinghouse Company departed for San Francisco with a check in his pocket of what money was due to his firm. The recently organized Ferndale Electric Light Company has purchased the entire Nelson plant and have settled all liens against it in terms of a specified agreement. In consequence Ferndale will again be lighted by electricity and the new company, we feel well assured will make a complete success of the business. The gentlemen who compose the company are solid men and will give Ferndale lights that will prove satisfactory in every way. (July 31, 1896)

Quite a number of buildings in Ferndale will be wired for electric lights right away. As soon as sufficient number of lights are taken to pay actual running expenses the plant will be started up. Get in and take lights everybody. The more lights taken the less the rate will be. The company intends doing the square thing with our people and they should be encouraged. Ferndale can not afford to be longer without electric lights. (August 4, 1896)

The Ferndale Electric light company will give you a cut rate on wiring from now until September 1st. (August 4, 1896)

On July 30th, satisfaction of liens against the Ferndale Electric Light works were filed. (August 4, 1896)

The Ferndale Electric light company has decided to start its plant running on September 1st. An application for lights are now steadily coming in. The cost of wiring has been reduced until September 1st, from \$2 to \$1.25 per light and the company has also made a liberal reduction in the former schedule of prices. Electrician Wright wired Mrs. Francis' residence last week and yesterday started wiring the home of A. Putnam. He will be kept busy from now on as several jobs of wiring are now awaiting him. (August 11, 1896)

The main electric light wires which were being stretched in Ferndale yesterday, were as large as ferry cables. (August 28, 1896)

Over 400 electric lights have been placed in buildings at Ferndale during the past three weeks. The plant will start on September first with not less than 650 lights. (August 28, 1896)

The Directors of the Ferndale Electric light company held their first meeting at the Ferndale Bank on Wednesday evening at elected the following officers: W.D. Capwell, President; C.H. Boynton, Sec; C.T. Schreiner, Supt. and Ferndale Bank, Treasurer. (August 28, 1896)

...the monthly charge for a 16 candle power light in dwellings is 25 cents up to 10 lights, all additional over 10, 20 cents per light. Rates for business places can be had on application. (August 28, 1896)

Large electric light converters were being placed in position along Main Street yesterday. (August 28, 1896)

The Ferndale Electric light plant starts tonight with about 600 lights. (September 1, 1896)

The Ferndale Electric light works started up Tuesday evening and the plant is now in splendid working order. (September 4, 1896)

Let There be Light...numerously signed petitions will be presented praying the Board to take immediate steps toward providing electric lights for the streets of our town...If there is one thing needed in Ferndale above all others, it is "illumination." Three or four hundred dollars a year could not be more judiciously spent than in providing this public convenience, aye, necessity, and with a well-working electric light plant in our town, there is no excuse for us remaining in the darkness. For the one great reason -- that of safety to life and property -- the Trustees should grant the prayer of its petitioners, for on a dark night Ferndale is at the mercy of any fire-bug that might choose to come this way, as it is simply impossible for one night watchman to guard all parts of the town, and an incendiary could do his work in this place with but little fear of detection. And again, there is hardly an evening in the week but what our city is well filled with people, who assemble at their respective churches, lodges and public entertainments, to whom street lights would be the greatest convenience, undoubtedly. From dark until midnight, vehicles are continually passing up and down our streets, and the multiplicity of collisions that have occurred in the past would have been avoided had our town been properly lighted. (October 2, 1896)

The street leading from L.M. Smith's place to the place of A. Putnam in North Ferndale is to be lighted nights by electricity. (December 4, 1896)

A street electric light has been placed at the intersection of Church and Eugene Streets paid for by the residents of that section. Another light is to be placed at the intersection of Church Street and Ocean Avenue, near the ME Church and one opposite the resident of Mrs. A. Gill. (December 11, 1896)

An electric street light is to be placed at the Scherslinger bridge near A. Putnam's place by private subscription. (December 15, 1896)

Last Sunday night, shortly after midnight, the Ferndale Electric Lights went out, owing to a "ground," and in searching for the trouble, electrician Wright fell from the pole at L.M. Smith's Cooper shop, but fortunately escaped with a sprained ankle. Peter Andersen was with Mr. Wright at the time of the mishap and assisted the gentleman in reaching his home... (January 1, 1897)

Jeweler James Jacobsen, has purchased the interest of W.D. Capwell in the Ferndale Electric Light Company. (February 5, 1897)

The big steam fire alarm whistle for Ferndale was received...and is now in position at the Electric Light Works. While endeavoring to regulate it last Saturday afternoon, emitted some unearthly toots for it has a voice of wonderful power and compass. But there is considerable doubt as to whether it will answer our purpose or not as it is feared it will require too much steam to blow it effectively... (March 9, 1897)

The Ferndale Electric Light company has purchased a new dynamo of 1300 light capacity. (June 25, 1897)

The Ferndale Electric Light Company received a new dynamo last week which will carry 1300 lights, to replace the one now in use in Ferndale the capacity which is 1000 lights. (October 5, 1897)

The Ferndale Electric Light plant has been sold to Mr. J.N. Steinback, who for some time past has been employed in M. Madsen's Riverside creamery...he purchased the entire stock of the corporation which owned this plant, and proposes we understand, to move it soon after July 4th to a more suitable location... (May 9, 1899)

...Mr. J.N. Steinback, who was to assume control of the Ferndale Electric Light Plant, June 1st, has concluded not to make the investment and will forfeit the \$500 he paid to the electric light company when the bargain was closed a month or so ago. (May 30, 1899)

Soon after July 4th, the Ferndale Electric Light Plant will be moved from its present location on Ocean Avenue to the Trost addition in

North Ferndale. Mr. J.N. Stenback, who recently bought the plant, this week purchased of Messrs J.H. Trost, Russ Early and Williams and Lee Cathey three lots of land situated between the residences of J.N. Lund and W.E. Matthews, and on this piece of ground, 125x120 feet in size, the plant will find a permanent location. A well will be sunk on the premises and a windmill and a tank will be erected on the premises to furnish water for the plant, and Mr. Stenback will also build him a residence there to reside. After the buildings, etc. are up, he will still have ground and room for 800 cords of wood. (May 12, 1899) (NEVER MOVED TO Trost=s ADDITION)

Extensive improvements are soon to be made at the Ferndale Electric Light Plant, which after July 1st will be operated all night. (June 6, 1899)

Next July the Ferndale Electric Light Works will be moved up Francis Creek where there is a large body of timber on Mrs. Mary Hart's place. The wood question has been a difficult problem in the past. (December 5, 1899)

W.S. Wright has sold his stock in the Ferndale Electric Light Works to J. Rasmussen. (May 8, 1900)

J.F. Hanley has accepted the position made vacant by the resignation of W.S. Wright in the Ferndale Electric Light Works. (May 11, 1900)

Preparations for moving the Ferndale Electric Light Works up Francis Creek are being made. Ground has already been broken for the site, a new boiler has been ordered and it will not be many weeks before everything will be in readiness for operation at the new scene. (June 5, 1900)

In New Quarters...The Ferndale Electric Light Plant and a description of the Works...Last Friday afternoon ...visit the new plant of the Ferndale Electric Light Works up Francis Creek...located on the creek, about two miles south of town, nearly on the line between the lands of J.W. Walker and Mrs. Mary Hart and borders on the edge of a fine timber belt. The object of moving the plant to its present site was the fact that wood could be easily and cheaply obtained thereby greatly reducing the running expenses of the company...The stockholders in the Ferndale Electric Light Works are: J.A. Shaw, President; J.N. Jacobsen, Vice President; C.H. Boynton, Secretary; F. Rasmussen, O.D. Whittier and Charles Schreiner... (August 7, 1900)

Now that our local electric light plant has passed into other hands, the Enterprise is prompted to say a few words of praise in favor of the former owners, Messrs. Trost, Rasmussen and Steeves, who assumed control of the plant some three years ago and who have since conducted it. When these gentlemen invested their money in the venture, the business of "lighting Ferndale by electricity" did not possess a very roseate hue. The plant had been moved from town to its present site up Francis Creek, and the cost thus entailed was considerable and in like proportion disheartening. But the gentlemen mentioned decided to take hold, and they did take hold, and to them the town of Ferndale is undoubtedly indebted for the service being continued as it was. True it is that once in awhile something would go wrong, and for an hour or two the town would be in darkness, all of which was provoking at the time, but when we look back over this period of three years, when we stop to consider that the business of "electric lighting" was a new one to the owners of the plant, when we consider further that they had many adverse circumstances to contend with, we believe all will unite with us in saying that they did well, and are entitled to credit for having kept the plant in operation... The structure will be constructed of corrugated iron with cement floor... (February 21, 1913)

The work of tearing down the old buildings on the site on Ocean Avenue where C.T. Schreiner is to build a new garage which will be occupied by O.B. French of San Francisco, was commenced Tuesday, work on the new garage will be commenced within a few days. (February 28, 1913)

O.B. French and wife of San Francisco were arrivals in Ferndale yesterday. Mr. French will soon open a new garage in this town in the building erected for him on Ocean Avenue on the Schreiner property. (April 18, 1913)

James Scott and Matt Olsen commenced work yesterday morning tearing down the old building on Ocean Avenue formerly occupied by the Rees mechanical shop and belonging to C.T. Schreiner, preparatory to building a large addition to the French garage alongside it. The new addition will be built of corrugated iron with cement floor and will practically double the size of the garage. (August 5, 1913)

Carpenters James Scott and Matt Olsen Tuesday commenced work on the addition to the French Garage on Ocean Avenue, which will double the capacity of that place of business. The addition will be of corrugated iron and with cement floor, like the original building. (August 19, 1913)

Mrs. E.S. French, of Salinas arrived Sunday to join her sons, O.B. and Ed French, of the French Garage in Ferndale. Mrs. Ed French and children also arrived and will make their future home here. The family will reside in the Hall tenement on Washington Street.

(September 9, 1913)

A deal has been concluded whereby O.B. French purchases the interest of his partner, Fran Green, in the French Garage in Ferndale. Mr. French will hereafter be the sole proprietor of the business. (November 17, 1914)

Harry Moore, former owner and operator of a shop in Arcata, but for the last two years employed by G.A. Fulton of Eureka, has accepted a position in the shop at Hough Bros. Mr. Moore is a high-grade mechanic, machinist and electrician...(October 21, 1921)

Charley Boots of Upper Mattole is now employed as a mechanic at Hough Bros.= Garage on Ocean Avenue. (June 16, 1922)

Last Friday evening between seven and eight o'clock, an altercation took place in the Pearsall corner saloon in Ferndale, which resulted in J.B. Groves, the proprietor, taking a shot at Pat Conway. Fortunately, Mr. Conway escaped uninjured, the ball from the pistol missing him and lodging in the wainscoting under one of the front windows of the saloon, Saturday morning, Mr. Groves plead guilty to the charge of a simple assault before Judge L.H. Miner, who fined him \$10, after hearing the evidence of several who witnessed the difficulty. The testimony given before Judge Miner was to the effect that while Mr. Groves, Mr. Conway and one or two others were shaking dice for the treats, a dispute arose, one word leading into another, until Mr. Conway struck Mr. Groves in the face, following the blow by throwing a glass at him, whereupon Mr. Groves drew his pistol and fired. J. Wilson, his bartender, stood behind the counter close to Mr. Groves' arm, destroying his aim. After the first shot was fired, bystanders interfered and disarmed Mr. Groves, thus putting an end to the trouble. (February 8, 1895)

Enos Sweasey, of the Ocean House, came up to Ferndale Sunday and Monday morning accepted the keys to his building, known as the Pearsall Corner Saloon, which he has had leased to J.B. Groves. (January 5, 1897)

J.B. Groves retired Sunday from the saloon business in Ferndale and surrendered his lease of Pearsall's Corner to Enos Sweasey, the owner of the property. (January 5, 1897)

Enos Sweasey is to open the Pearsall Corner saloon in Ferndale in the near future and is to have the building renovated and repaired... (January 8, 1897)

Messrs. Sweasey and McBride, will open the Pearsall Corner saloon the last of this week. The building has been renovated and repaired and the interior presents a greatly improved appearance. A new back shelving mirror, etc. have been placed in position. (February 9,

1897)

The Pearsall Corner Saloon will be reopened to the public tomorrow. Enos Sweasey, and his brother-in-law, Mr. McBride, late of San Francisco, will attend to the wants of the customers. (February 16, 1897)

Sweasey and McBride have placed a neat new sign above the front entrance to their saloon on the corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue, now known as the "Transient". (September 14, 1897)

Yesterday Enos Sweasey sold his Ferndale Saloon to M.H. Donnelly and Charles Tunzini, late bartender at the Milwaukee, and the new proprietors take possession to day. (February 15, 1898)

Archie McBride, for the past year or so connected with Enos Sweasey in his saloon business...was an outgoing passenger on Wednesday morning...destination Alaska... (Enos' brother-in-law) (February 18, 1898)

Messrs. Donnelly and Tunzini, have added a fine new graphophone to their Ferndale Saloon, which reproduces all of the very latest coon songs - a fine selection. (February 28, 1899)

The necessary lumber has been hauled from Fuller's Wild Cat mill for a new floor in Donnelly & Tunzini's Ferndale Saloon. (June 20, 1899)

Donnelly & Tunzini, who have been conducting the Transient Saloon in Ferndale, have dissolved partnership, Mr. Donnelly retiring. Mr. Tunzini will pay all bills against said firm and collect all moneys due. (September 20, 1901)

Al Stevens is now employed at Chas Tunzini's corner saloon in Ferndale as right bower to Jerry Lanini, the man with the flaxen locks. (September 9, 1902)

Jerry Lanini has resigned his position as bartender for Chas Tunzini in Ferndale to accept a position in the Petrolia hotel with Chas Giacomini the new landlord of that hostelry. Al Stevens has succeeded Jerry at Mr. Tunzini's place of business. (April 7, 1903)

Thos Pedrazzini has succeeded Al Stevens as bartender in Ferndale for Chas Tunzini. (August 21, 1903)

Last Friday morning, sometime between one o'clock and daylight, the two-bit slot machine in Chas Tunzini's Transient Saloon in Ferndale was robbed. The thief cut a hole in the panel of the back door large enough to insert his hand, and by this means turned the key which had been left in the lock inside. Once in the saloon he made for the machine, and with an axe, which he found on the woodpile he pried the back off the machine and there found the "change sack" which he emptied into his pocket and skipped. The chap was evidently an amateur in the business for he left fully \$30 in quarters in the cylinder of the machine, and was in such a hurry to get away that in emptying the sack he dropped \$4.50 in quarters on the floor, which he didn't stop to pick up. The cash register, the nickel machine close by, in fact nothing else in the saloon was disturbed, not even the drinkables. How much the fellow got away with is not known, as Mr. Tunzini does not know himself the sum left in the sack, but it probably did not amount to over a week or two's fair wages. There were no strangers in town that night, and the opinion seems to be that the culprit is a home man. Whoever he was he did a poor job. (March 1, 1904)

Yesterday shortly after noon Charles Tunzini, who has been ill with pneumonia at the American Hotel for the past few weeks, closed his eyes in the last long sleep. For the past week the unfortunate young man had gradually been growing weaker, and for 48 hours previous to his passing, Dr. L. Michael, his attending physician, felt confident that the end was near. Deceased was a native of Switzerland, aged about 29 years, and for several years past has been engaged in the saloon business in Ferndale. His parents are both dead, but he leaves to mourn his loss a sister in the old country, and an older brother, who reached here the other day from his home at Petaluma, and who was at his bedside when he passed away...A few days previous to his death Mr. Tunzini arranged his business affairs, his saloon interests here having been assigned to his brother. He left an estate valued at about \$5,000 or \$6,000, which goes to the brother and sister. (April 22, 1904)

Gus Tunzini, brother of the late Chas Tunzini, has sold the lease and business of the Transient Saloon in Ferndale to Tom Pedrazzini and Peter Mossi, who will in the future conduct the same. (April 29, 1904)

Jerry Lanini went to work yesterday tending bar in the Transient saloon, Ferndale. (July 1, 1904)

Thomas Pedrazzini disposed of his interest in the Transient Saloon, Ferndale, this week to his partner, Peter Mossi, who will hereafter conduct the business alone. (August 10, 1906)

Peter Mossi yesterday moved into the old paint shop on Ocean Avenue while the building at the corner will be torn down and a more substantial one erected. Preston Burriss has charge of the building and began work today. (May 4, 1909)

The work of tearing down the old Sweasey building at the corner of Main Street and Ocean Avenue will be completed today or tomorrow, after which work will at once be commenced on the erection of a fine new structure. (May 14, 1909)

Wednesday the work of raising the walls of the new Sweasey building near Brice's stables was commenced. A large crowd of men were engaged and the work will be rushed to completion as rapidly as possible. Yesterday no work was done of the structure because of the wet weather. (May 28, 1909)

P. Mossi moved into his new quarter yesterday in the new building erected for him on the Sweasey property at the corner of Ocean Avenue and Main Street. (June 29, 1909)

Peter Mossi, proprietor of the Transient Saloon, has just purchased the property owned by B. Bonetti on Main Street and occupied by the Central Saloon, of which Walter Reynolds is the proprietor. Mr. Reynolds will continue to rent the property for the present... (December 8, 1914)

Peter Mossi this week moved his saloon business from its former location in the Sweasey building to the Bonetti property, which he recently purchased and which has been occupied by the Central Saloon. Walter Reynolds, proprietor of the Central, moved to Mr. Mossi's old location. (January 8, 1915)

With the expiration of his yearly saloon license on February 1st, Walter Reynolds closed the Transient Saloon at the corner of Main and Ocean. An ordinance has been drawn up by the Town Trustees to allow the saloon men to take out licenses up to July 1st, when all saloons are to be closed but Mr. Reynolds decided not to take out his renewal for the portion of the year. He plans to engage in the wood business...(February 7, 1919)

A deal has practically been concluded whereby on June 15th, Jas. D. Martin will sell his automobile service station on the corner of Main St. and Ocean Ave., in this town to Jos. Martignoli, Jr....(6/8/28)

AD: Harold C. Ellingwood, Prop...Ferndale Super Service Station and Auto Laundry...(12/11/31)

A deal was concluded this week whereby Harold C. Ellingwood purchased of Gildo Martignoli the latter's service station at the corner of Main St and Ocean Avenue, known as Martignoli's Super Service Station. Mr. Ellingwood has had much experience in the service station business, and some years ago was connected with the station which he has now purchased...(5/29/31)

A coal oil stove which had been left burning in the harness room suddenly became enveloped in flames but was gotten out into the street before any damage was done. Excitement was rampant for a time. (December 8, 1893)

E.B. Carr has sold out his interest in the American Stables to his partner, G.M. Brice. Mr. Brice is to well known here to need any recommendation...Mr. Carr and family will go below on a few weeks visit to the mid-winter fair. (January 5, 1894)

Carpenter Banta commenced work Tuesday morning on his contract with Scott and Hicks, owners of the American Livery Stable property in Ferndale. He is to move the Fairbanks scales on the Ocean Avenue side of the stable to the Francis Street side, and is also to put down the required regulation sidewalk. (November 16, 1894)

The Kerri Bros, the first of the week, put in a new approach at the Ocean Avenue entrance to the American Livery Stable. (December 7, 1894)

Some extensive repairs will be made at Brice's stable when spring opens. Scott & Hicks, the owners of the stable property, are thinking strongly of building a large addition to the main barn to occupy the space now vacant between it and the carriage shed, fronting on Francis Street. (December 14, 1894)

G.M. Brice has transferred Ellis Roberts from the Alton to the Ferndale stables (November 22, 1895)

...Jack Morrison has departed from Ferndale having given up his position in Brice Stables last week. (November 29, 1895)

Will Brien has succeeded Jack Morrison as driver of the Singley-Ferndale stage, owned by G.M. Brice. (November 24, 1896)

G.M. Brice has purchased of L.S. Hicks the latter 1/2 interest in the American Livery Stable buildings and lots in Ferndale. (December 25, 1896)

A deed from L.S. Hicks and wife to George M. Brice for a 1/2 interest in the American Livery Stable property (January 12, 1897)

...Jack McConnell, has been compelled to stop work at Brice's stable...Ed Daugherty is tending to Jack's duties. (April 20, 1897)

G.M. Brice has decided to enlarge, rearrange, and thoroughly renovate the American Stables in Ferndale and work will probably commence this week. (May 25, 1897)

George Branstetter is assisting Ed Cronin and Will Kerri in the work of renovating the American Stables for Messrs. Scott and Brice who own the property. (June 4, 1897)

...renovating and enlarging the American Stables in Ferndale. The capacity of the barn is to be almost doubled and Mr. Brice proposes having one of the most convenient stables in the state. (June 4, 1897)

Rinehart Petersen...arrived in Ferndale last week and will probably practice his profession in this town. (June 15, 1897)

Rinehart Petersen the veterinary surgeon came up from Petrolia last Thursday. The veterinarian is thinking of locating in Ferndale. (June 25, 1897)

R. Petersen, vet surgeon and dentist, publishes card in this issue...find him at Brice's Stables... (August 10, 1897)

Jack McConnell has resigned his position from G.M. Brice's stables and Will Scott is his successor. (February 11, 1898)

George M. Brice of the American Livery Stable, carries the mails between Ferndale and Upper Mattole, Ferndale and Port Kenyon, Ferndale and Singley's and Ferndale and Alton. A little figuring shows that his mail horses travel each week 800 miles or 41,600 miles a year. A total of 11 horses are used on the four routes each day. The average yearly distance traveled by each horse being 3,872 miles.

H.G. Saunders, Ferndale's new veterinarian surgeon...late of Lompoc...office in Brice Livery Stable... (September 2, 1898)

Dr. Saunders has changed his office from Brice stable to Ring's drug store. (September 9, 1898)

Veterinary Petersen has removed to his new place of business in Trost's addition and he has prepared roomy box stalls for the accommodation of horses left him for treatment. (November 1, 1898)

W.H.E. Smith, the former Rohnerville horseman, has accepted a position at G.M. Brice's Ferndale livery stable. (January 31, 1899)

G.M. Brice is building a needed addition to the west side of his Ferndale livery stable. (July 9, 1901)

G.M. Brice is making extensive improvements in his livery stable in Ferndale, and he now has one of the largest, if not the largest, stable in the county and one of the most conveniently arranged. (August 16, 1901)

Sam B. Williams, after a month's vacation at Fortuna, has resumed work at Brice's Ferndale livery stable. (January 3, 1902)

Charley Lowry is now working in G.M. Brice's Ferndale Stables, vice Al Stevens, resigned. (March 4, 1902)

Walter A. Scott to George M. Brice: 56 feet off the southern part of lot 4, and lots 3 and 5 and an unplatted piece of land lying west of said lot 5 in block 15 of Herrick's Survey of Francis Addition to Ferndale. (May 9, 1902)

Al Stevens has resigned his position as clerk at the Ferndale Hotel and is now working in Brice's Stables. Dave Cronin has taken Al's place at the Ferndale. (June 17, 1902)

John Sanders has returned from Fortuna to Ferndale and is again employed in Brice's livery stable. (September 23, 1902)

Sunday night about 9:30 the fire alarm informed our residents that a fire was in progress in Ferndale, it soon being discovered that its location was in the building at the rear of G.M. Brice's livery stable. The fire was first discovered by Miss Blanche Robarts as she was returning to her home on Ocean Avenue, the young lady rushing to the stable and informing James Yuill, one of the employees. When first seen the building was all ablaze, and when G.M. Brice, owner of the property, and Pat Gallagher, an employee of the stable, got to the burning structure it was very evident that it could not be saved. Three horses were in the building...the flames and smoke to completely enveloped their barn that all hope of rescuing them was immediately abandoned and efforts turned toward saving the adjoining livery stable. In a few seconds after the first tap of the fire alarm the hose, hook and ladder and engine companies were ready for action and had several streams playing upon the flames, the result being that in a short time what at first looked like one of the most disastrous conflagrations ever visiting our city was under control...Mr. Brice figures his loss at upwards of \$2000, covered by no insurance...carried no insurance on the animals... (September 4, 1906)

The growling of a dog, kept at G.M. Brice's Ferndale stables, last Sunday night prevented what might have been a serious fire in the building. John Ivan, one of Mr. Brice's teamsters, who sleeps on the upper floor of the stable, was awakened about nine o'clock by the movements of the dog, and upon investigation found a lighted candle stuck in a bale of hay and surrounded by paper, which it was evidently the intention should become ignited as soon as the candle had burned sufficiently low. That it was the intention to burn him out, Mr. Brice is forced to believe, though why anyone should have reason for such enmity against him he does not know. He would rather think that the attempted incendiarism was the work of some one who has a mania for setting fires. It was just one month ago Sunday evening that Mr. Brice and Mr. Giacomini lost so heavily by fire. It is certainly a very serious state of affairs when one is compelled to acknowledge that a fire bug is in our midst. (October 2, 1906)

G.M. Brice has the lumber on the ground for a number of improvements at his livery stable in this place. The improvements will include a new barn to replace the one on his property destroyed by fire a number of months ago. (February 5, 1907)

Bert Kennedy has accepted the position as night keeper at G.M. Brice's American Stables in Ferndale. (April 19, 1907)

The work of placing the concrete foundation for G.M. Brice's new warehouse on Ocean avenue is now being done, and actual construction work on the building will commenced in a few days. (August 13, 1909)

The construction work on G.M. Brice's new warehouse on Ocean Avenue is practically completed, only a little finishing work remaining to be done. It is a commodious and convenient structure and adds much to the appearance of the locality. (August 31, 1909)

C.M. Dollison...is now engaged at the G.M. Brice stables in this town. (November 7, 1911)

J.N. Jensen has resigned his position at G.M. Brice's livery stable and is again engaged in the painting business, with a shop next door to the blacksmith shop of M. Bugbee & son. (May 11, 1915)

Matt Dougherty has resigned his position at Brice=s Stables in Ferndale and expects to leave next week with his wife for a visit with relatives in Petaluma. Later Mr. and Mrs. Dougherty will probably located in Modesto...Mr. Dougherty will probably located ten years at Brice=s Stables...(March 8, 1918)

Dave Cronin...accepted a position with G.M. Brice in this town. (April 16, 1918)

Silva Laloli has accepted a position as driver of one of the G.M. Brice=s auto stages. (June 4, 1918)

Aelred McAlister, son of Mr. and Mrs. Cyrus McAlister of Pleasant Point, has accepted a position as driver of one of G.M. Brice=s auto stages. (June 7, 1918)

G.M. Brice this week placed his auto stages in operation between Ferndale and Upper Mattole, withdrawing the horse stages which are in use during the winter. The autos are in charge of Lee Miner and Silva Laloli. (June 14, 1918)

Lee Miner, Jr. driver of one of G.M. Brice=s Upper Mattole-Ferndale stages, was stricken with paralysis last Wednesday evening at the Roscoe place at Upper Mattole...Mr. Frank Vogel will probably drive the stage during Mr Miner=s illness. (August 2, 1918)

T.A. Varian, Veterinary Surgeon - office at Brice=s Stable (ad) (October 11, 1918)

A portion of the Brice stables, fronting on Ocean Avenue, is being converted into a garage, in which Mr. Brice will keep his motor trucks. The alteration work is being done by W.O. Davis. (April 18, 1919)

G.M. Brice=s auto stages were placed in operation Monday between Ferndale and Petrolia. The drivers are Lee Miner and E.L. Childs. The resumption of auto stage service is greatly appreciated by the people who are served by the Petrolia stages. (May 30, 1919)

Popular Young People Wedded...Emon Childs and Miss Edith Coppini...has made his home here for several years past, where he has been in the employ of G.M. Brice...(December 5, 1919)

G.M. Brice=s new auto stage for use on the run between Ferndale and Fernbridge was put into commission this week, and driver Sharkely is now the proudest man in town...The new stage has three seats which will comfortably seat twelve or fifteen people, with a big compartment in the rear of the transportation of trunks, baggage and light freight....(February 4, 1921)

Landlord Chris Eskeson of the American Hotel is making some decided improvements to that hostelry. Running water with neat washstands are being placed in all the rooms which will be a great convenience to the commercial trade. (September 25, 1908)

Mr. and Mrs. Chris Christensen have given up their house on Main Street and are now stopping at the American Hotel, which Mr. Christensen has charge of during the absence of the proprietor, Chris Eskesen, who departed Sunday for an extended visit to his old home in Denmark. (October 23, 1908)

An alarm of fire was turned in Sunday evening at 9:30 o'clock and in a short time our fire laddies and residents were on the streets. The blaze was located in one of the rooms on the second floor of the American Hotel, not occupied at the time, and was discovered by Miss Ila Jennings, who in passing down the hall detected the odor of smoke and quickly informed her aunt, Mrs. C. Eskesen, landlady of the hostelry. Mrs. Eskesen immediately investigated and upon opening the door to the sleeping apartment found the room flooded with smoke. The blaze, or rather the start of a blaze, was located in the bed and is supposed to have been caused by a lighted electric globe falling upon the bed clothing, which had ignited and was smoldering away at a rate that would have meant a bad blaze if it had not been

detected when it was. Water in buckets, etc., was soon applied and the fire extinguished before the services of the firemen were needed... (January 26, 1909)

What looked at first as though it would be a most disastrous fire broke out in the American Hotel Saturday noon about 12:20. When discovered the fire had to all appearances enveloped the entire upper story of the hotel and it was feared that the building was doomed. The fire boys were promptly on the scene, however, and their efficient work soon got the flames under control. The fire was particularly hard to fight, as owing to the dense smoke it seemed almost impossible to locate it, though the flames could be seen through the smoke eating their way through the roof and along the cupola of the building. After a hard fight they were gotten under control. The fire cannot be accounted for unless it was from a spark from the chimney of the barbershop which runs up the south side of the building. The theory is that a live spark got into the wooden gutters of the roof on that side of the building and burned its way under the eaves and into the attic, where the dry rafters made ready fuel for the flames. The damage to the building by the fire was confined to the attic and the roof. The majority of the rooms and the furniture on the south side of the building were of course badly damaged by water and will have to be thoroughly renovated. no insurance was carried by either Mr. Doe, the owner of the building, or Proprietor Eskesen of the hotel. Had the roof not been damp from the heavy fog of the morning and but little wind blowing the fire might have swept that corner of the town instead of confining itself to the comparatively small loss, which it is. Will Flowers and a crew of men started work yesterday repairing the building. (June 29, 1909)

Carpenters Bert Matthews, Will Flowers, Gene Haywood and Frank Reas last Friday finished the work of making repairs to the American Hotel, which was so badly damaged by fire a week ago Saturday. (July 2, 1909)

Tuesday the large water tank behind the home of Charles A. Doe on Main Street and which furnishes water to the American Hotel, corner Main Street and Ocean Avenue, came down with a crash, demolishing a woodshed and breaking holes in the roof of the Kemp Hardware store and the Edward tenement. It also deluged everything in the vicinity. The collapsing of the big tank was caused by the bottom hoop rusting and falling away. (October 25, 1912)

Charles E. Wilkinson, a pioneer resident of Ferndale and other parts of Humboldt county, was found dead in his room at the American Hotel in this town last Wednesday noon. he had been dead for some time, and as near as can be told must have passed away some time Monday evening. Mr. Wilkinson, who was familiarly known among his friends as "dad" was last seen alive Monday evening about seven o'clock, when he left the lobby of the hotel and went to his room. He had been working at his trade, that of blacksmith, for R.L. Cathey at the latter's Ferndale shop that day, and had appeared to about his usual health. Tuesday morning he failed to appear but nothing was thought of the matter, as he had been in the habit of going out to visit friends for two or three days at a time, leaving his door locked. Upon his door being tried while the housework was being done, and it being found locked, it was thought that he had gotten up early, as was his custom, and left town. Wednesday noon, Mrs. Eskesen while at work upstairs in the hotel again tried his door and found it still locked. She thereupon looked in the keyhole and found that the key was inside, and could also see portions of Mr. Wilkenson's clothing. Knowing that something must be wrong she immediately called her husband, Landlord Chris Eskesen, who burst down the door, and Mr. Wilkenson was found in his bed, dead...native of Lincolnshire, England, and was 81 years of age... (September 5, 1913)

Contractor A. Rusk and crew have been engaged of late in making extensive repairs to the American Hotel building. The cupola has been taken down and other work done to place the building in first-class shape. (November 9, 1915)

Alterations at American Hotel...The lower floor will be practically rebuilt. The location of the lobby will be changed to the Shaw avenue side, where plate glass windows will be put in. The cafe will be located where the lobby has been in the past.... (April 28, 1916)

Miss Stella Greenlaw has accepted a position in the dining room of the American Hotel. (December 6, 1918)

Chris Eskesen, proprietor of the American Hotel for many years past, has purchased the hotel property from the heirs of the Doe estate. (August 19, 1921)

Chris Eskesen, an old time resident of this place and for a good many years proprietor of the American Hotel, was found dead in bed yesterday noon...(7/17/25)

Mrs. J. Thomsen of the American Hotel has taken over the dining room, which has heretofore been under separate management, and will operate the same under her own supervision in the future. (12/31/26)

Dr. P.L. Breakiron, chiropractor, who has been located in the American Hotel since his arrival in Ferndale, will move tomorrow to the offices in the Williams building, over the Kausen & Williams Hardware Co. Store, formerly occupied by Dr. Harold Kausen. (2/11/27)

Dr. P.L. Breakiron, an experienced chiropractor, has located in Ferndale with offices in the American Hotel, and will make his permanent home here...(1/7/27)

The old water tower at the rear of the American Hotel is being torn down, the structure having been condemned as unsafe. (6/22/28)

A new sample room has been fitted up at the American Hotel in this town, occupying what was formerly the billiard room. Mrs. Thomsen, the proprietor, reports that the American is now enjoying a fine patronage both from the local and commercial trade. (4/20/28)

Max Meacham, a recent arrival in Ferndale from Napa county, attempted suicide last Monday night at the American Hotel, where he had been staying for a few days. He was found in his room Tuesday Morning by Louis Hansen, clerk at the hotel, with both wrists slashed and a gapping wound in his throat. He had lost a large amount of blood and was in a very weakened condition...(3/19/26)

Estate of Christen Eskesen, deceased. Hotel Property in Block 16, Shaw=s Division, Ferndale to Jennie Eskesen. (3/8/29)

Will Williams is now filling the position of clerk at the American Hotel. (11/23/28)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...The American Hotel stood the shock very well, and sustained the loss of but a few windows...(April 24, 1906)

TT...A complaint was received that the old water tower on the American Hotel property is unsafe, and the owner, Mrs. Eskesen, is to be requested to have the structure repaired or removed...(6/8/28)

Louie Hansen, for many years employed at the American Hotel in this town, has resigned his position there and is now employed at the Hotel Ivanhoe. (9/25/25)

A.D. Goble, a pioneer resident of this valley, died last Tuesday morning about 5:15 o'clock at the American Hotel, where he had made his home with his sister, Mrs. Jennie Eskesen, for several years past...(9/4/25)

Mrs. A. Dusi has resigned her position at the American Hotel and accepted employment at the F.J. Rushmore home. Mrs. Mamie Frost has accepted the position at the American made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Dusi. (5/22/25)

The American Hotel is being treated to a new coat of paint and will present a greatly improved appearance when the work is completed. (10/3/24)

Mrs. Anna E. Hill of Trinidad has purchased the lease of Mrs. James Thomsen to the American Hotel in this town and took over the management of the business the first of the week. For three years Mrs. Hill has been manager of the Hotel Trinidad at Trinidad...Mrs. Thomsen and her husband are to make their home on the Jeppe Jespersen ranch at Centerville, which they have had under lease for some time past. (12/20/29)

Mrs. Jennie Eskesen, owner of the American Hotel in this town, has decided to retire from the active management of this popular hostelry and on November 1st will lease the business to Mr. and Mrs. James Thompson of Santa Rosa. Mr. Thompson is a field man for the Standard Oil Co. And will retain his present position, the active management of the hotel being taken over by Mrs. Thompson, who has had much experience in the hotel business. . Mrs. Eskesen has been in the hotel for twenty-nine years and will now take a well earned rest...on Tuesday evening Mrs. Eskesen gave a dinner for her guests of long standing, some of whom have boarded at her hotel almost from the time she assumed charge...(10/29/26)

St. Mary's Episcopal Church, Shaw Avenue, will be reopened for services on Sunday next, after undergoing extensive alterations, which will greatly improve the interior of the Church edifice. (March 2, 1900)

Rev. Earle has accepted a call to the rectorship of the Episcopal church at Red Bluff and will leave Ferndale for his new location at the end of this month. Mrs. Earle and children will remain in Ferndale for the summer. Mr. Earle and his wife have made many friends during their stay here who will regret to learn of their intention of leaving the Cream City. (April 20, 1900)

Rev. E. Earle leaves on Today's boat for Red Bluff where he has accepted a pastorate. His family will spend the summer in Ferndale. (May 1, 1900)

One of the most notable events we have had the pleasure to chronicle for some time is the marriage of Miss Tecie Ray Baker of Grizzly Bluff, to Dr. Charles Falk of Eureka, which was solemnized at the Ferndale Episcopal Church...yesterday at high noon... (June 15, 1900)

Rev. Mr. A.L. Mitchell, of the Episcopal Church, has arrived in Ferndale and will take up the work in this Mission. (August 14, 1900)

...From Christ Church as a center, three new missions of the Episcopal church have been started recently -- at Ferndale, Fortuna and Arcata respectively...Rev. A.L. Mitchell will have charge of St. Mary's Mission, Ferndale...the mission in Ferndale begun so recently, is already self-supporting and has a comfortable little church in which to worship. With such laymen as Dr. Delamere and Mr. Joseph Shaw and others to attend to its financial welfare, and a priest of Rev. A. L. Mitchell's ability to minister at the altar a strong parish is sure to be the result...(August 21, 1900)

Mrs. Andrew Dove's funeral took place in Ferndale Friday afternoon service being held in the Episcopal church... (September 25, 1900)

A pretty wedding was celebrated at St. Mary's Chapel on Shaw Avenue, Ferndale, last Thursday evening, when Rev. Mitchell spoke the binding words that united in marriage Mr. Henry C. Samuels and Miss Etta May Buttle, both of this section... (October 30, 1900)
Rev. Mitchell of Ferndale conducts Episcopal services in Fortuna every Sunday afternoon. (May 7, 1901)

A very neat and attractive wedding, which was witnessed by friends and relatives took place at St. Mary's Chapel, Ferndale, last Tuesday evening, at about 8:15 o'clock, whereby Mr. Harry Walford, of Grizzly Bluff and Miss Minnie Kistner, of lower Cannibal Island, were pronounced man and wife... (September 10, 1901)

H.P. Harper of Pleasant Point has purchased the organ formerly in use at St. Mary's Chapel in Ferndale. (January 3, 1902)

Some quite extensive improvements are to be made at St. Mary's Episcopal Chapel on Shaw Avenue in the near future. A front addition to the Chapel, 19x26 feet in size, is to be built, thus extending the building out to the sidewalk line, together with a steeple, and with the main entrance in the corner instead of the middle of the front as now. (January 21, 1902)

The proposed changes to St. Mary's Chapel in Ferndale have been postponed indefinitely, but it is hoped that eventually something better may result. While the exterior of the chapel is plain and unpretentious, the interior is neat and attractive. (February 11, 1902)

At their place of business in the Russ Building, Ferndale, Messrs O'Neill & Klepper are making a very handsome baptismal font, which is to adorn the interior of St. Mary's Chapel on Shaw Avenue, as a donation from Mrs. Sarah Mason in memory of her deceased husband, William J. Mason, who passed to his final rest nearly sixteen years ago. The receptacle containing the water is octagonal in form, the faces bearing appropriate carvings. This is supported by a pedestal and base, the later exhibiting a memorial tablet, while on the plinths are carved the words "One Lord," "One Faith," "One Baptism" "One Body" the stone used is blue marble from the Rutland, Vermont, quarries, and the font is from a design by Mr. Klepper, who is an adept in this line of work. (March 4, 1902)

St. Mary's Chapel, of Ferndale, will soon be the possessor of not only a handsome marble font, the gift of Mrs. W.J. Mason, and already mentioned in the Enterprise, but also a beautiful brass altar desk, the joint gift of Miss Hannah Edwards of England, and Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Bulmer, of Ferndale, in memory of Henry Edwards, who died June 2nd, 1876, and was buried in the Ferndale Cemetery. The deceased came to this country with Mr. A. Keohan, that gentleman and the departed having been very warm friends. The altar desk was supplied by Mr. A.P. Winslow and is the work of Gorham & Co., of New York City. (March 25, 1902)

Rev. A.L. Mitchell, the Rector of St. Mary's Ferndale, is the recipient of a handsome set of stole protectors and an exquisite chalice veil, the work of Mrs. T.H. Faulkner. Another beautiful altar set is being worked by Mrs. T.J. Hall. (March 25, 1902)

Rev. Mr. Mitchell held a special service at St. Mary's Chapel on Shaw Avenue last Saturday evening, to consecrate the several gifts to the Chapel and which were in place for Easter. One a handsome marble baptismal font from Mrs. Sarah Mason, in memory of her departed husband, the late Wm J. Mason; a beautiful brass altar desk, secured in New York, from Mr. and Mrs. A.J. Bulmer, of Ferndale, and Miss Edwards, of England, in memory of the late Harry Edwards, who died here a number of years ago; a handsome marble altar slab from L.M. Klepper, and a magnificent burnt work panel, representing the Marys and the Angel at the Tomb of Christ, the work and gift of Mr. Mitchell to the Chapel. This panel occupies the entire window space back of the Chancel, and is certainly one of the most artistic productions in the line of burnt work we have ever seen. Six weeks' time was consumed by Mr. Mitchell in making it, and it proves him to be an artist of far more than ordinary ability. The baptismal font is the work and design of Mr. L.M. Klepper, of the firm of O'Neill & Klepper, and is ample evidence of that gentleman's very marked skill and what must certainly be with him a natural talent. (April 1, 1902)

Blum, Eleanor Varley, Beatrice Faulkner, Mrs. Sievers, Maud Guptill, Vivian Putney, Florence Buttle, Jeffrey Guptill, Chester Cooper, Harry Walford and Reginald Keohan. (May 26, 1903)

Rev. A.L. Mitchell, rector of St. Mary's Mission, Ferndale, has of late received three different calls to other and larger parishes than this, but he prefers to stay in the Cream City. The reverend gentleman's heart is in his work here, his one great desire being to establish to Ferndale a strong and independent Episcopal parish. That he will succeed is being evidenced by the fact that St. Mary's has already

seventy-seven communicants in good standing. (October 9, 1903)

Rev. A.L. Mitchell, whose resignation as pastor of our local Episcopal parish is to take effect June 1st, is to go east this summer, at least we are so informed. Since his recent sick spell Mr. Mitchell's health has been quite poor. (March 15, 1904)

We understand that Rev. Mitchell has withdrawn his resignation as rector of the Ferndale Episcopal Church... (April 29, 1904)

Sunday at high noon, in the Ferndale Episcopal Church, Rev. A.L. Mitchell united in marriage Mr. Eustace J. Craig, a stockman of the Fort Baker section, and Miss Roberta Fulghum, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Fulghum of the Island... (July 5, 1904)

Last Wednesday a new organ was placed in the Ferndale Episcopal Church, the generous donation of Mr. Joseph A. Shaw of this place. (April 7, 1905)

The Port Kenyon Post office becomes extinct today, hereafter the residents of that section will get their mail at the Ferndale Post Office. (March 31, 1899)

...26 new lock boxes have been added to the Ferndale Post Office. (April 4, 1899)

T.L. Wilson was at work yesterday varnishing L.H. Miner's handsome new postoffice front. (January 31, 1899)

That Ferndale narrowly escaped a serious conflagration last Tuesday will be admitted by all who are acquainted with the circumstances, and had it not been for the prompt and magnificent work of our volunteer fire department that day the result might have been disastrous. About 11:40 a.m. it was discovered that the Williams building on Main Street, occupied by the Postoffice and E.M. Loveland, was on fire, and the alarm was immediately turned in, to which the firemen responded immediately and soon had three streams plying on the burning structure. Owing to a lack of hose the engine could not be used. The fire was located in the attic of the building and was caused by a defect in the flue. When the fire was discovered by one of the occupants of the upper floor the flames had gained considerable headway and had evidently been burning several hours before the discovery was made by Miss Julia Ready who saw smoke issuing from the ceiling of the bedroom. She immediately gave the alarm and the firemen and others were soon on hand to lend assistance. Clyde Alford reached the roof of the burning structure first and turned on the water in the pipes on the top of the building, and he was quickly followed by the fire laddies with their hose. It was not long before they had the fire under control, but not until after a part of the ceiling on the second floor and a portion of the roof were burned. Much damage was done by water, but of course this could not be helped. The lower floor of the building is used by the postoffice on one side and E.M. Loveland's store, telephone and express office is located on the other, while the upper floor is used by roomers. Both floors were completely flooded, and much damage was done to furniture, carpets, etc. in the upper apartments. Mr. Loveland's stock of stationary, toilet articles, and groceries were badly soaked, and it is fortunate for him that he carried insurance. In the postoffice a number of office fixtures and several bags of mail were slightly damaged. The loss to all concerned will amount to about \$800. The damage to the building will probably reach \$250, and Mr. Williams intends to re-cover the whole structure with a new roof as soon as the weather will permit. All credit to our fire department. Stand in and help them on every proposition. (April 13, 1900)

We have been requested to correct a statement made in a communication to Wednesday's Times from Ferndale, in the report of Tuesday's fire, which read as follows: "A magnificent piano owned by Miss Hattie Guptill was almost completely ruined by being carried down stairs and thrown into the yard." This is decidedly untrue, as the fire laddies never even lost their heads long enough to commit such an act. It is true that the piano was carried down stairs, but it was handled carefully and was not ruined in the least, save one slight scratch. We make this correction in justice to the firemen and others who handled the instrument. (April 13, 1900)

Peter Bennett yesterday purchased a half interest in E.M. Loveland's Ferndale grocery, confectionery and cigar store. The Wells Fargo express and Sunset Telephone business here is included in the sale. "Mac" and Peter will make a strong team and will undoubtedly do well. (January 8, 1901)

Miss Agnes Grinsell has accepted a position with Loveland & Bennett. She has charge of the telephone department of that store. (February 5, 1901)

The Sunset Telephone company put four new telephones in last months, one in C. Doe's residence, one in Christensen & Damgaard's saloon, one at the electric light works and one in the new Acme laundry. (March 5, 1901)

Peter Bennett last Tuesday disposed of his interest in the Loveland & Bennett store in the Williams building, to his former partner, E.M. Loveland who will continue to conduct the same. (November 15, 1901)

President Roosevelt has reappointed L.H. Miner postmaster at Ferndale for the next four years, so says the chronicle of a recent date. (June 13, 1902)

Miss Martha Neville has accepted a position in the Ferndale Sunset telephone office as an assistant to Miss Simpson. (September 2, 1902)

The interior of E.M. Loveland's store in the Williams' building is being repainted and will present a much more inviting appearance when the work is done. (January 9, 1903)

A big lot of wire and telephone supplies reached Ferndale this week and inquiry at Manager Loveland's office revealed the fact that the shipment was for the Sunset Telephone Co., which in a few days will start the work of replacing the telephone poles now in use between the K of P Hall and A. Putnam's corner with much larger ones - 35 foot long. New poles are also to supplant the present ones between the Putnam corner and Port Kenyon and new lines will be stretched between these two points. (April 10, 1903)

...the Humboldt Telephone Company becomes the property of the Sunset Telephone and Telegraph Co...This purchase gives the Sunset Company control of the entire telephone system of Ferndale and Eel River Valley and the Sunset people promise a first class and greatly improved service for the future...Jas N. Jacobsen, who for some time past has so satisfactorily managed the Humboldt Company's business here, was primarily instrumental in affording the opportunity for a sale of his company's interests...rumor has it that it was (sold) in the neighborhood of \$5000. (June 5, 1903)

There will be but one central telephone office in Ferndale hereafter and that will be at E.M. Loveland's store. Yesterday the work of transferring the lines of the Humboldt System to the Sunset Circuit was virtually completed, and in the future it will be necessary to use the Sunset line if you wish to talk over the phone. (July 21, 1903)

Si Miner has resigned his position with his father in the Ferndale postoffice and will try outdoor life for awhile. (October 20, 1903)

Miss Larrison has resigned her position in the Ferndale Sunset Central office, and has gone to Eureka to study for the teachers examination... (October 30, 1903)

Miss Bea Faulkner has accepted a position as hello girl in the Ferndale Sunset Telephone office. (August 5, 1904)

Homer Tennis has resigned his job in E.M. Loveland's Ferndale store and has gone to Oregon to accept a position in one of the towns in the southern part of that state. (September 27, 1904)

The interior of E.M. Loveland's store, next to the postoffice, Ferndale, is being repainted and also renovated to give the gentleman more room in his place of business. The rear part of the store is now occupied as an office for the Wells, Fargo Express Co., for which Mr. Loveland is the Cream City Agent. (November 6, 1906)

The work of excavating the lot upon which George Williams is to erect his new building was in progress this week. (April 19, 1895)

The Ferndale Knights of Pythias have decided to build a fine hall of their own in this place and have arranged with the Honorable George Williams to construct the second story on his building soon to be erected on Main Street. the main building will be 44 x 68 feet in size with a rear addition of 36 x28 feet and the Knights will have the entire second floor which will give them an abundance of room. (May 3, 1895)

The Bartlett Brothers are hauling the lumber for the Honorable George Williams= new building. Work on the foundation of the new structure was commenced Tuesday morning. It will be built by days labor and not by contract. (June 14, 1895)

T.J. Frost is superintending the construction of Williams' new building. (June 21, 1895)

At least 140 thousand feet of lumber will be required in the construction of William's new building in Ferndale. (June 21, 1895)

Frank Matthews started work Tuesday giving the front of Honorable Williams' building its prime coat of paint. (September 6, 1895)

The plate glass windows for Williams new building arrived last Saturday. (September 20, 1895)

The carpenters, plasters, painters are hard at work putting the final touches on the Hon. George Williams new building. (October 4, 1895) Kausen and Williams assisted by Dick Williams and Tommy Hansen were hard at work this week moving their immense stock of Hardware into their new quarters in the Williams building. The boys will have an elegant store once arranged... (December 13, 1895)

In no instance in the business circle of Humboldt county have thrift, energy and strict application to duty been more markedly displayed than in the advancement and success of Ferndale's popular hardware dealers -- Kausen & Williams. These young gentlemen, sons of Prof. Wm. Kausen, and the Hon. Geo. Williams, respectively, started in business in this place a few years ago on a comparatively small scale, but today finds them occupying a name and place among the leading mercantile houses of the coast. P.N. Lund is having his Popular Restaurant refitted and rearranged, and Mrs. Coffren and daughters of the Creamery Restaurant will open up business there in a few days. (July 6, 1897)

No. 1 happened to be drilling in the street near by when the alarm was given and not much time was lost in getting water onto the fire. The loss to the proprietors of the restaurant and to P.N. Lund, the owner of the building, will probably not exceed \$150. Sovey, who has departed for other parts. Mr. Nissen will have an advertisement in our next issue. Success to you, Peter. (December 5, 1899)

Peter Nissen, the proprietor, closed the Olympia Restaurant in Ferndale last evening. It will re-open again in a few days, however, but in the future it will be conducted as a bakery and coffee house. (January 9, 1900)

Peter Nissen has closed the Olympia restaurant and bakery in Ferndale. (January 19, 1900)

P.N. Lund, who has retired from the furniture firm of Lund Bros, informs us that he intends to reopen his paint shop in the Olympia restaurant building in the near future. (February 9, 1900)

Mr. Edward Benson, for some time past an employee of the Brick Store, has decided to go into business for himself, and accordingly has purchased the Kemp grocery store in Ferndale which he will hereafter conduct. Mr. Benson is a son of N. Benson of Alton... (March 11, 1902)

The "Top Notch" grocery store, E. Benson, successor to Mrs. J.W. Kemp, Main Street, Ferndale. He invites a trial order. (March 25, 1902)

Ed Benson yesterday sold a half interest in his "top Notch" grocery store in Ferndale to his brother, Theo Benson. The name of the new firm will be "Benson Bros,"... (April 25, 1902)

Benson Bros have decided to retire from business in Ferndale... (September 19, 1902)

Miss Abbie Burrill has leased the Hatch store, formerly occupied by Benson Bros. and is soon to open therein a confectionery store, ice cream parlors, etc. The young lady will undoubtedly do a good business here, for she is well known and has many friends. (January 23, 1903)

Miss Burrill is to open her confectionery store and ice cream parlors in the Hatch building about the 1st of March. Carpenters Haywood and Matthews are now at work arranging the interior of the building for her occupancy. (February 17, 1903)

Miss Abbie Burrill will probably not have her ice cream and candy parlors in the Hatch building ready for business before the latter part of next month or the first part of April. A considerable part of her stock as well as her soda fountain had to be purchased in the east. (February 20, 1903)

Miss Abbie Burrill, at the request of a number of friends, opened her ice cream parlors in the Hatch building after the ladies dance in Roberts hall last evening...the date of opening her place of business to the public will be announced in the very near future. (April 17, 1903)

Miss A.C. Burrill opened her confectionery and ice cream parlors in the Hatch building to the public yesterday. (April 28, 1903)

Miss Martha Neville, of North Ferndale, is now employed at Miss A.L. Burrill's ice cream parlors in Ferndale...(June 23, 1903)

The candy kitchen at the rear of Miss Burrill's Confectionery and Ice Cream Parlor has been a busy place for the past week, where her candy maker, Walter Burrill, has been making up her Christmas Stock, and by tonight he will have turned out fully a half ton of the choicest candy to be had anywhere. (December 22, 1903)

Miss Dagma Rasmussen, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Rasmussen, of the Island, is at present assisting at the Burrill ice cream parlors in Ferndale. Miss Rasmussen takes the place made vacant by the resignation of Miss Fannie Trousdale, who with her parents departs...(May 6, 1904)

Miss A.C. Burrill in the Hatch building is now agent for the Log Cabin Bread. (July 5, 1904)

Charles Thompson has resigned his position at the Red Star Clothing to accept a job at Burrill's Confectionery and Ice Cream Parlors. (November 4, 1904)

Chas Thompson is to resign his position at Burrill's candy factory in Ferndale in a day or two... (January 13, 1905)

Artist T.L. Wilson is busily engaged at present decorating the interior of the Burrill Ice Cream and candy parlors in Ferndale. The interior will be grained throughout and when completed will certainly present a fine appearance. (June 23, 1905)

The interior of Burrill Candy and Ice Cream Parlors has been repainted and grained in a very attractive manner by artist T.L. Wilson. The work is not only a decided improvement to the store, but a demonstration of T.L.'s ability as a wielder of the brush. (July 4, 1905)

Terrific Shock of Earthquake...In Burrill's candy factory and ice cream parlors the only material loss was the destruction of quite a number of candy jars, with their contents, by being thrown to the floor...(April 24, 1906)

Yesterday Miss Lulu Dennis, who has been connected with the Burrill candy and ice cream parlors in Ferndale for nearly two years past, resigned her position. Miss Dennis expected to leave in a short time to visit with friends in other parts of the state. (February 1, 1907)

William Jensen is at work repapering and renovating the interior of the Burrill Candy Factory on Main Street. (August 13, 1907)

A cement crossing will be laid in the near future across Main Street from the old YMI Hall, now the property of S.H. Paine, to the Kemp building, occupied by Burrill's confectionery store. It will be laid by private subscription. (January 7, 1908)

Miss Dagma Rasmussen is now filling a position as clerk in the Burrill Confectionery parlors on Main Street, having commenced work yesterday morning. She took the position made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. P.T. Early. (February 4, 1908)

Walter Burrill is soon to have in his confectionery store a handsome and up to date soda fountain, which, when put into place, will out class any thing in that line north of San Francisco... (October 9, 1908)

Walter Burrill has just installed his handsome new soda fountain, and it is without a doubt one of the finest and most up-to-date in the state. "Burrill's" has always had the reputation of being one of the neatest and tastiest confectionery parlors to be found anywhere and his new soda fountain certainly "tops off" his cozy parlors. A large mantle mirror sits in a frame of polished cherry sets in back, while the fountain proper in a cherry counter case with a marble floor border takes the place of where a counter formerly stood...Walter is to be congratulated on his taste. he also has one of the prettiest windows to be found anywhere. It consists of a perfect imitation of marble terrace work, with capped gate posts, on either side of which rest two jardinières with palms. A rustic bronze gate made of twigs artistically arranged, swings from either post. The background of the window is dressed in a rich green velvet. (December 4, 1908)

While engaged at her duties in the Burrill ice cream and confectionery parlors last Saturday, Miss Carrie Moore was so unfortunate as to get her finger caught in a machine used for cutting candy, the end of the member being amputated and a painful wound resulting. (August 30, 1910)

W.L. Burrill is to move his Ferndale confectionery and ice cream parlors from its present location in the Hatch building to the Branstetter building, formerly occupied by the Bartlett & Pierson cigar store. The date of the removal has not been definitely decided upon...extensive alteration and repairs are to be made to the building, and when completed Mr. Burrill will have a store second to none of the kind in the county...the main store, ice cream parlors, candy factory, etc., will be handsomely fitted up and arranged in the most convenient manner possible... (January 14, 1913)

W.L. Burrill's ice cream and confectionery parlors are now located in the Branstetter building... (March 11, 1913)

A new business will be established in Ferndale about the first of September. Mrs. H.A. Nevens and her mother, Mrs. Giles, plan to open an up-to-date lunch room in the Hatch building on Main Street, formerly occupied by the Burrill parlors. The building will be thoroughly renovated and fitted up in a neat attractive manner. (August 19, 1913)

On the morning of September 1st or on the evening of August 31st a new restaurant to be known as the Crystal Cafe will be opened in Ferndale, to be owned and managed by Mrs. L.M. Nevens, assisted by her mother, Mrs. M.P. Giles, who at present is visiting her son, L. McCalmant in Tacoma, Washington, but who is expected to arrive in Ferndale before the first of September. For four years before

coming to Ferndale to reside Mr. and Mrs. Nevens kept the hotel and summer resort at Strong's Station and were very successful, having a large trade, especially among the transients and among those from Eureka and other towns who wished to spend their vacations in the redwoods...of late there have been many calls for a restaurant in Ferndale, especially among the traveling public who cannot always reach a town in time for the regular meals served at the hotels...Mr. J. Kemp the owner of the building that will be occupied by the Crystal Cafe, is having the building renovated and remodeled under Mrs. Nevens' supervision to suit the needs of such a business. The walls in the main dining room will be tinted a dark green and the woodwork will be done in an oak finish. On either side of the main entrance will be a rest room nine feet by eleven, furnished with rugs, rockers, chairs, desks with writing material and small tables to hold the daily papers, magazines and other publications for the general public and the patrons of the Cafe at all times are invited to make use of these rooms, which will be partitioned off from the main dining room by a partition and railing with curtain, about four feet high.... (August 26, 1913)

N.C. Halliday and daughter, Mrs. Howe, of Fortuna were in Ferndale yesterday afternoon negotiating for the purchase of the Crystal Cafe from Mrs. L.M. Nevens... (August 7, 1914)

Mrs. L.M. Nevens this week sold her restaurant, the Crystal Cafe, in Ferndale to Irvin and Omer Kline, who will take possession tomorrow morning. (August 10, 1914)

Goff and Hartley, of the Ferndale Cleaning Works, are to move from the Brelle building to the Hatch building, recently vacated by the Crystal Cafe, about the 15th of this month. (November 3, 1914)

Goff & Hartley, of the Ferndale Cleaning Works, are now settled in their new quarters in the Hatch building on Main Street, formerly occupied by the Crystal Cafe. (November 17, 1914)

Dave Hartley has accepted the position in the Brick store made vacant by the resignation of P.E. Johnson. Mr. Hartley still retains his interest in the Goff & Hartley clothing store and cleaning works, which will be managed by Ben Goff. (May 4, 1915)

The partnership heretofore existing between Ben H. Goff and David Hartley who have conducted a cleaning and tailoring establishment in Ferndale under the firm name of Goff & Hartley, was this week dissolved. Mr. Goff purchased the interest of his partner and will continue the business along the same lines as before. Mr. Hartley has not been actively engaged in the business for some time past, being connected with Russ, Aggeler, Williams Co. (November 19, 1915)

J.E. Kemp and Raymond F. Harbers are now the owners of the Ferndale Cleaning Works, having bought out B.H. Goff, who had conducted the plant for some time past. The deal became effective the first of the month and carpenters are now busy remodeling the building, half of which is to be occupied by a butcher shop, the cleaning works to be on the north side. Mr. Goff is to remain with Messrs. Kemp and Harbers, until the gentlemen are familiar with all the branches of that business. (February 4, 1916)

Ferndale is to have another meat market, which will be located in the Hatch building on the west side of Main Street, next door to the Ferndale Cash Grocery. C.W. Moore will be the preparator and expects to have his place of business open the first of next week. He has just returned from San Francisco, where he purchased a complete equipment for his market, which will be known as the "Independent"...George Robinson is to be associated with him in conducting the butcher shop... (February 4, 1916)

Moore & Robinson's new meat market in the Hatch building on Main Street was opened for business yesterday... (February 22, 1916)

Godrey Tappan, passed away last Thursday night at a Eureka Hospital...aged 49 years...at the time of his death he was the proprietor of the Ferndale Cleaning Works...Mrs. J.E. Kemp of Ferndale is a cousin of deceased... (February 20, 1917)

Part of the Hatch building, formerly occupied by a butcher shop and the cleaning works, is being remodeled for the occupancy of the Ferndale Bakery. The increasing business of the local bakery has forced proprietor Steeves to seek larger quarters than he has at present, and a deal has been on for some time relative to the new location. It is expected that a gentleman by the name of Orchard will arrive in Ferndale this week to commence work on the oven, which is to be 11x13 feet in size. (March 13, 1917)

The Ferndale Bakery is now located in its fine new quarters in the Hatch building, across the street from its former location. (May 18, 1917)

A deal has been partially concluded whereby Morton Steeves will sell his Ferndale bakery to Edward Hildebrand, formerly of Crescent City, and who has lately discharged from the army. (March 21, 1919)

A deal has been concluded whereby Edward Hildebrand purchases from Morton A. Steeves the Ferndale Bakery Business. Mr. Hildebrand took over the management of the business on April 1st. Mr. Hildebrand was recently discharged from army service. He came to Ferndale accompanied by his wife. Mr. Steeves is not yet fully decided as to his future movements, but with his family expects to reside in Ferndale for a time and later will probably visit relatives in Los Angeles. (April 4, 1919)

The people of Ferndale will regret to learn that the bakery in this town which has been so successfully conducted during the past several months by Mr. and Mrs. E. Hildebrand, is to be discontinued. The bakery has done a fine business and the quality of bread and pastry turned out has been as good as could be desired by the most particular. For various reasons Mr. and Mrs. Hildebrand desire to move to another location, probably Grants Pass, Oregon, where the lady=s people reside, and for this reason have decided to close their business here...(February 13, 1920)

...Commencing June 1st, the price of bread advanced to 13 cents a loaf...Ferndale Bakery, E. Hildebrand, Prop...(July 2, 1920)

In the issue of The Enterprise of May 6th, Mrs. Hildebrand of the Ferndale Bakery advertised for her wedding ring, which had been lost. The ring was returned by Mrs. Peter Brandt of the Capetown Hotel, who found it in a loaf of bread...(May 13, 1921)

Carl Helgestad has resigned his position in the Ring Pharmacy in this town and has accepted a position with the Ferndale Bakery, succeeding Henry Johnson, who has held the position for some time past. (3/13/31)

Miss Hazel Cady, clerk at the Ferndale bakery...(4/18/24)

Mr. and Mrs. E. Hildebrand, owners of the Ferndale Bakery in this town, have decided to retire from business here and on Monday E. Zink of Dickson, who has been in Ferndale the past week, will take over the management of this popular manufactory of good things to eat. Mr. Zink has had a great number of years experience in the bakery business, and the public may rest assured that the quality and good names of the output of this factory will continue. Messrs. Zink and Hildebrand formerly worked together in San Francisco and the latter recommends Mr. Zink as a first class man in his profession. Mr. and Mrs. Hildebrand are undecided yet as to their future activities...From a comparatively small concern at the beginning Mr. and Mrs. Hildebrand have built up the Ferndale Bakery until now it ranks as one of the best equipped in the state...(11/26/26)

Ed Hildebrand=s new bakery in Eureka...corner of F and Henderson Sts. (8/5/27)

Mrs. Julia Givins has accepted a position in the Ferndale Bakery. (1/7/27)

Robt. Winther has accepted the position at the Ferndale Bakery made vacant by the resignation of Arthur Johnson. (4/13/28)

Mrs. William DeCarli has accepted a position in the Ferndale Bakery. (7/9/26)

Henry Johnson has accepted a position with the Ferndale Bakery and is in charge of the bakery delivery wagon operating through the valley. (3/22/29)

WAREHOUSE

C.F. Rackliffe is soon to erect a rear addition to H.H. Hatch's hardware and farming implement store, which is to be 40x60 feet in size and which will rest on piles over Francis Creek. Mr. Hatch will utilize the addition as a warehouse. (June 16, 1899)

C.F. Rackliffe, W.H. Otto and Will Davis were at work this week piling Francis Creek at H.H. Hatch's place preparatory to the erection of a 40x60 foot warehouse by Mr. Hatch, which he will use for storing his farming implements, etc. The new building will extend over the creek, and the piling will afford a solid foundation for it, besides preventing the banks from washing away. (July 28, 1899)

C.F. Rackliffe, W.H. Otto and Will Davis have H.H. Hatch's new warehouse well underway. (August 1, 1899)

Last Friday, just before noon, W.H. Otto, who has been assisting C.F. Rackliffe and Will and Ike Davis in the erection of the H.H. Hatch warehouse in Ferndale, received a very bad fall. He was on the roof shingling, when the two by four, nailed to the roof and on which he and Isaac Davis were standing, gave away. Ike saved himself, but Mr. Otto rolled down the roof to the eaves of the building, and from there fell to the ground, a distance of about 12 feet, striking on his hips and back. As he left the building the two by four came with him, but it caught on the side staging and Mr. Otto struck it with great force. This blow caught him across the bowels, doubling him up before he struck the ground. The unfortunate man was taken to the American Hotel, where Dr. Michael attended him, but was afterwards removed to his home. Fortunately no bones were broken, but he was badly injured nevertheless, and Dr. Michael yesterday reported him in a precarious condition, suffering with peritonitis. It is feared that he is hurt seriously internally. (August 8, 1899)

HOSE CAR BUILDING

525 Main Street (South Part)

The members of hose co. no. 2 of the Ferndale Fire Department are made of the right kind of stuff. They saw the necessity of a house in which to keep their hose cart and determined to have it. Town Trustee Hatch having generously donated the use of a lot next to his building formerly occupied by Dr. McFadyen, the boys rustled around and obtained the necessary lumber and will erect the building themselves. Foreman Ira A. Lovell and several assistants started work excavating where the house is to stand and before many days the structure will be completed. It is to be 12x16 feet in size, with a front door that will slide upwards instead of opening, and to this door will be attached a wire which will turn on the electric light in the building as soon as the door is raised and turn it off when it is pulled down. Part of the lumber to be used in the building was donated by Chief Barney and constituted a chicken house for which Barney now has no further use. The balance of the lumber will come from that used in the tables at the Firemen's Fourth of July celebration year before last... (February 10, 1899)

The new building on the Hatch land on Main Street, in which Number Two Company's Hose Cart is to find shelter is nearing completion. (February 21, 1899)

The little building on the Hatch land on Main Street which is to hereafter house Hose Cart Number two is completed. J.N. Jacobsen has arranged therein contrivance which turns on the electric light when the front door is slid up and turns it out as the door is pulled down. The building was erected on the direction of Foreman Lovell of Hose Company Number Two and was built entirely of contributed labor. Photographer McMillan, now building a gallery on the Hatch property on Main Street, has had to purchase about 3000 feet more of lumber than he first ordered in order that his building may have what is known as fire-proof walls as required by an ordinance now in force in this town. (June 7, 1904)

John Kerri completed the carpenter work on Photographer McMillan's new gallery on Main Street, Wednesday, and Mr. McMillan expects to be ready for business by the first of the week. He and his family are now located in the Trousdale house on Brown Street. (June 10, 1904)

McMillan, the Ferndale photographer has purchased a large amount of photo material in San Francisco... (April 7, 1905)

Retiring from the Photograph business -- if you desire your photograph taken by McMillan do not delay any longer but come in at once. Building for sale. (May 16, 1905)

J.W. McMillan, the Ferndale photographer, accompanied by his family will leave the Cream City within the next couple of months to locate in a warmer climate. Mr. McMillan's son Wesley is now located at Scotia and is said to be doing a fine photographic business. (May 16, 1905)

J.W. McMillan, the photographer, has sold his building, and will be in Ferndale but a short time longer. (October 3, 1905)

J.W. McMillan, who has been conducting a photograph gallery in Ferndale for over a year past, has sold his building to John Kemp. Mr. McMillan and family expect to take their departure for the central part of the State in the very near future. (October 3, 1905)

It is rumored that a new photograph gallery will be opened in the near future at the location recently vacated by J.W. McMillan. (January 5, 1906)

The middle of next month J.J. McCloskey of Loleta will open a photograph gallery in the building on main Street, Ferndale, formerly occupied by Photographer Mansfield. (November 27, 1906)

Painters Mansfield and Hartley are at work "retouching" the interior of the photograph gallery on Main Street soon to be occupied by Photographer James McCloskey of Loleta. The gentleman and his wife arrived in Ferndale Wednesday to take up their residence in this town. They will occupy rooms in the Doe building on Main Street. (December 21, 1906)

In this issue appears the new advertisement of James McCloskey, who has opened a photographer's studio in the Hatch building on Main Street. Mr. McCloskey, who until recently conducted a studio at Loleta, studied for some time under Frank Davey of Palo Alto, one of the best photographers of the state. Mr. McCloskey is prepared to do all kinds of work... (January 15, 1907)

Photographer McCloskey, who recently opened a studio in the Hatch building on Main Street, was busy taking snow scenes in Ferndale the first of this week. A number of the views are now being exhibited in the window at his place of business. (January 18, 1907)

James McCloskey, the Ferndale photographer, has on display at his place of business a number of views of the Firemen's May Day celebration in this town. (May 7, 1907)

J.J. McCloskey, the Ferndale photographer, has a couple of views in his window taken on Decoration Day. One view shows the parade passing up Ocean Avenue, while the other was taken at the instant one of the salutes was being fired over the Unknown Grave in the Cemetery. The photos are excellent pieces of work. (June 4, 1907)

H. Cohn has rented the lower story of the C.A. Doe building next to the American Hotel, and will open a store therein, to be known as the Economy Store. (January 2, 1903)

L. Cohen hereby informs the public that he has opened the "Economy Store" in the Doe building, Main Street, Ferndale, and will carry the following lines: Notions, ladies and gents furnishing goods, hardware, five different kinds of cooking utensils, etc... (January 13, 1903)

The shelving and counters on the north side of the store have been removed and that portion of the building will be used by Mr. Van Norden who expected this alleys on the next steamer... (April 9, 1909)

Work was commenced this week on the remodeling of the Doe building on Main Street, which is to be occupied as a bakery by Mr. Kline of Arcata. The gentleman intends to fit up a first-class bakery. (7/25, 1913)

The new bakery in the Doe building, Ferndale, was formally opened for business yesterday. Mr. I. Kline, late of Arcata, is the proprietor of the new business, and has fixed up his bakery in an up-to-date and sanitary manner. (August 12, 1913)

Miss Zella Callahan has resigned her position at the Ferndale Bakery and has been succeeded by Miss Helen McAllister. (March 12, 1915)

A deal was concluded the last of the week whereby Irvin Kline disposed of the Ferndale Bakery to Archie Ellingwood and Frank Steeves, who will hereafter conduct the same. Mr. Kline and family plan to depart the latter part of this week for San Francisco and will probably make their future home in the central part of this state...Messrs. Steeves and Ellingwood are well known and popular young men of this town, the latter having learned the baker's trade under Mr. Kline...they have secured the services of an expert baker, Ernest Aronsen, late of San Francisco... (May 4, 1915)

Archie Ellingwood and Geo. Hines of the Ferndale Bakery were found in an unconscious condition in the rear of the kitchen department of that place last Tuesday morning shortly before seven o'clock, by Eddie Knudsen, who usually makes an early morning call on the boys when they are just finishing up the baking or the day. Upon entering the back apartments Eddie found both Mr. Ellingwood and Mr. Hines lying on the floor, and thinking they were playing a job on him handled the two bakers rather roughly, but when they failed to show signs of life he immediately gave the alarm and Dr. Ring was at once summoned and nearby persons called in. Jesse Walker and niece, Miss Sybil Walker, of Petrolia, who recently came to Ferndale so that Mr. Walker could receive medical attention, are soon to occupy rooms in the Doe building, next to the American Hotel. (January 16, 1917)

Rock, Colorado were united in marriage...late came to Ferndale, where they will occupy apartments in the Doe building on Main Street... (December 4, 1917)

The front of the Doe building on Main Street, next to the American Hotel, was treated to a new coat of paint this week, Messrs. Parker & Matthews doing the work. (July 2, 1920)

Dairy Inspector Mason and family have rented the Monroe apartments on Main Street, where they will reside. (May 13, 1921)

The new Cash Market in the Doe building, Main Street, Ferndale was opened to the public last Monday. The proprietors, Messrs. Larsen and Meakin, have their place of business very attractively fitted up with modern equipment and announce that they will carry a full line of meats, poultry, eggs, etc. (October 28, 1921)

L.M. Smith now has two men employed besides himself at his Ferndale Cooper Shop. He reports a lively demand for butter kegs and tells us that quite a quantity of butter will be packed in the valley this season. (May 26, 1896)

L.M. Smith has placed a new floor and new foundation in his cooper shop on lower Main Street. (December 18, 1896)

A blaze in L.M. Smith's cooper shop on lower Main Street called out our fire company last Friday night at 11:30 o'clock. Mr. Smith and Jas Gill had the fire under control by the time the department arrived, however, and no great damage was done to the structure, except to burn a small hole in the roof. The fire is supposed to have started from the flue. As the building is quite a distance from hydrants and tanks the fire company would have experienced some difficulty in getting water on the shop had occasion required. Mr. and Mrs. Bezold formerly resided in Chicago. It is not probable that a successor to Rev. Bezold in the pastorate of the local church will be engaged at present. (November 12, 1920)

St. Mark=s German Lutheran Church...services...(February 10, 1922)

Rev. W.F. Schleuter, late of Realitos, Texas, arrived in Ferndale Saturday evening and on Sunday was installed as pastor of the Ferndale German Lutheran Church. He conducted services at the church on Sunday and was greeted by a good sized congregation. Rev. Schleuter is a native of California, having been born at Orange, where his people now reside. He has been pastor of a church at Realitos for the past three years. He will be joined in about two weeks by his wife and little son, who are now at Orange. (February 10, 1922)

Last Wednesday evening at St. Mark=s Lutheran church in Ferndale, Benjamin H. Messer and Mrs. Pearl Rasmussen were united in marriage...(January 12, 1923)

Last Wednesday evening at the parsonage of St. Mark=s Lutheran church in Ferndale, Thomas Nilsen of Eureka and Miss Gertrude Clausen of Ferndale were united in marriage, Rev. W.F. Schlueter officiating...(April 27, 1923)

Rev. R.T. Du Brau, pastor of St. Mark=s Lutheran church in Ferndale, will today take up his residence in Eureka, where with his mother

he is to make his future home. Rev. Du Brau has been pastor of the Eureka church in addition to St. Mark=s church here, and finds that his duties in Eureka have increased to such a degree that it is necessary for him to make his home there. He will continue to serve Ferndale church as in the past, however, which will be good news to the reverend gentleman=s many friends here...(2/15/29)

St. Mark=s Church will observe its 25th anniversary...It was on June 13, 1893, that Pastor Theiss preached the first Lutheran sermon in the German language in Ferndale to about 30 hearers. On his first visit here he baptized five children and administered the holy sacrament to the people assembled. In 1895, Rev. F.C. Streufert, now of Chicago, accepted a call as missionary at large in California, and also included Ferndale in his charge. The attendance increased steadily and therefore a minister was called, who would devote his entire time to the care of Humboldt Lutherans. Rev. F. Schlottman, then a young candidate, was called, and in August of the year 1903 arrived in Ferndale. At first the services were held in Mueller=s Hall and later on in the Adventist church, which site is now used as a garage for the county trucks. A private place of worship was desired however, and so in 1904 Rev. Schlottman and Mr. H. Strube Sr. conceived the plan of building a church of their own. Two lots were purchased from the Danish Lutheran church and work on the new church was at once begun. Early in the year 1905 the hopes of the German Lutherans were realized. The church was complete. In April of the year 1906 the congregation was organized and upon the motion of George Reitz (seconded by Edward Detlefsen) was named St. Mark=s Lutheran Church, of Ferndale, California. The following pastors have thus far served at St. Mark=s church: Rev. F. Schlottman from 1903 to 1910; Rev. E. Hiebre 1910 to 1914; Rev. W. Bezold 1914 to 1918; Rev. W.F. Schlueter 1918 to 1927; and Rev. R.T. DuBrau 1927 to 1929. Pastor Steffen has been active here since September 1929. ...(2/14/30)

Rev. R.F. DuBrau has arrived in Ferndale to accept the pastorate of St. Mark=s Lutheran church in this town. Rev. DuBrau has made many friends since his arrival and it is hoped his pastorate here may be a long and pleasant one. (9/17/26)

The new parsonage of the Ferndale Danish Church on Shaw Avenue was dedicated last Sunday with appropriate exercises, services being conducted by the pastor, Rev. A.H. Jensen. A large number of people witnessed the ceremonies which were followed by a dinner, served by the Danish ladies in the KofP castle in the afternoon. A collection was taken that day among our Danish friends and \$269.50 was donated to the parsonage fund. The new edifice is a commodious and a comfortable dwelling and one which adds greatly to the appearance of Shaw Avenue. (October 22, 1901)

On last Tuesday afternoon in H.J. Mueller's hall, a Danish Lutheran church organization was perfected in Ferndale and a movement is now on foot to erect a Danish Church in this place. We hope that those who are moving in this matter will meet with success for such an edifice would not only be a credible addition to our town but the Danish people of this valley need a church building at this place and they are amply able to build one. Should they decide to erect a church here we know that it would be an ornament to our town, as they are people that never do things by halves. Rev. S.H. Madsen of Hayward held Danish Lutheran services here Sunday and was present at Tuesday's meeting (7/7, 1896)

Rev. Madsen arrived from Hayward on Monday's Pomona and will hold Danish Lutheran Service... (April 9, 1897)

Rev. M. Nelson, presiding elder of the Danish Lutheran Churches in this district, sailed last Sunday to assume the duties of the position, his family accompanied him. Rev. M. Petersen of Montana will succeed to the Eureka pastorate. (November 4, 1898)

Rev. A.H. Jensen who has accepted a call as pastor of the Ferndale Danish Lutheran Church... (March 21, 1899)

Articles of Incorporation for Our Saviors Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ferndale were filed with the county clerk Saturday. The corporation is formed for the purpose of maintaining a church organization according to the rights and usages of the Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church and erecting a church edifice in which to hold devotional services. Fifty years is fixed as the corporate existence, with the principal place of business at Ferndale. The directors, three in number, for the first year are: Christian Terkelsen, Ole M. Olsen, and Louis Smith, all of Ferndale. The association has elected officers as follows: J.N. Lund, President; John Hansen, Secretary; and Peter Johnson, Treasurer. (June 27, 1899)

Before fall Ferndale will have another church building, a meeting place for the Danish Lutheran organization of this valley, Rev. A.H. Jensen, Pastor. Mr. Jensen and Messrs. Hansen and Bonnickson are now soliciting subscriptions for a building fund and are meeting with a gratifying success. (May 19, 1899)

Things are moving in the matter of the construction of a Danish Lutheran Church building in Ferndale will meet tomorrow to receive the report of the soliciting committee, which, we understand, has met with gratifying success in its efforts to procure funds for the erection of the proposed new edifice. (June 16, 1899)

At a meeting of those interested, held last Saturday evening, a committee was appointed to secure articles of incorporation of the Eel River Valley Danish Lutheran Church Association, it having been decided to erect a church building. The site for the new edifice has not yet been selected, but will probably be decided upon at another meeting to be held next Saturday night. (June 20, 1899)

It is not yet decided where the Ferndale Danish Lutheran Church will be built, but it will either be erected on Shaw Avenue near the Episcopal Chapel, or on the lot owned by the town nearly opposite the ME Church. It is to be a substantial building. (June 27, 1899)

Negotiations are pending for the purchase of the town lot nearly opposite the ME Church, for the site of the proposed new Danish Lutheran Church. (July 7, 1899)

The Danish-Lutheran Church of Ferndale has purchased a piece of land from Mrs. I. Shaw on Shaw Avenue next to Ferd Haas' residence, and lumber will soon be hauled for the construction of a Church thereon. (July 25, 1899)

T.J. Frost is drawing the plans for Ferndale's new Danish-Lutheran Church. It will be built after the Gothic style of architecture and promises to be a neat edifice. (July 28, 1899)

Isabella Shaw has recorded a deed to a lot on Shaw Avenue, Ferndale, to Our Savior's Danish Evangelical Lutheran Church of Ferndale. (July 28, 1899)

Bids for erecting a church on Shaw Avenue...the building to be completed on or before October 15th, 1899...John Hansen, Peter Johansen, John J. Hansen, H.M. Bonnicksen, J.N. Lund, Committee on Building. (July 28, 1893)

The committee received four bids yesterday for building Ferndale's new Danish Lutheran Church, from Kerri Brothers, Bert Matthews, James Scott, and George Milnes. A meeting was held last evening to consider them. (August 11, 1899)

Contract for building Ferndale's new Danish-Lutheran Church as not yet been awarded. The committee has the four bids received under consideration. (August 15, 1899)

Contractor Bert Matthews and crew are hard at work on the construction of Ferndale's new Danish-Lutheran Church on Shaw Avenue. (September 5, 1899)

The new Danish Church on Shaw Avenue will be completed about the middle of next month. It is estimated that the building will cost about \$3,000 and when finished our Danish friends will have a place of workshop of which they may justly feel proud. (October 3, 1899)

Corner Stone of the new Danish Church on Shaw Avenue, Ferndale will be laid next Sunday immediately after the morning services probably about 12 o'clock. The work on this elegant new house of worship will be completed about the 20th of this month, instead of the middle of next month, as has been heretofore stated. (October 6, 1899)

The dedication of the handsome new Danish Lutheran Church on Shaw avenue, Ferndale, took place Sunday, and notwithstanding the disagreeable weather the services were very largely attended. This beautiful new place of worship, which stands free from mortgage, with only a small debt outstanding is truly a credit to this town and an edifice of which are Danish people are justly proud... (December 12, 1899)

John Etteline, the wood carver of Fields Landing, this week completed at Oluf Andreassen's Ferndale Mechanical Shop the new altar which is to adorn the interior of the new Danish-Lutheran Church on Shaw Avenue. It is a handsome piece of work and Mr. Etteline has every reason to feel proud of his handiwork. The gentleman is now employed at Kinzel & Hansen's mechanical shop on Ocean Avenue, where the pulpit for the church mentioned is being constructed. (January 5, 1900)

What might have proved a serious collision took place on lower Main Street Tuesday evening. Rev. Borup of Eureka was driving in one direction and Miss Grace Roberts the other way, and owing to the darkness of the night neither party discovered the other until they collided. The reverend gentleman was thrown over the dashboard and into the mud, but he escaped uninjured. A shaft was splintered on one of the rigs and a singletree broken on the other. (January 5, 1900)

Oluf Andreasen who was recently granted a patent on his new butter molding and cutting machine is finding a steadily increasing sale for the machines. A number of them are already in use in this valley and are giving splendid satisfaction. They will be turned out at Oluff's shop near Ferndale as soon as the contemplated shop is erected. (January 19, 1894)

Work on the foundation of Oluff Andreasen's carpenter shop near town was started Friday. (March 2, 1894)

Oluf Andreasen's building in which he will manufacture his patent butter molds is nearing completion and is a huge structure. Oluff's residence adjoining is one of the prettiest little dwellings in the valley. (April 6, 1894)

Oluff Andreasen leaves on the steamer tomorrow for San Francisco where he will purchase a complete outfit of machinery for his new workshop on extreme lower Main Street. Besides machinery for manufacturing his patent butter moulds, Oluff will put in turning lathes, planners, scroll saws, etc. in fact everything necessary to enable him to carry on a general carpenter and wagon repairing business. (April 27, 1894)

The large establishment which bears this title, and which was recently completed on extreme lower Main Street, opposite the residence of Judge James Smith, is now in operation, having started up early last week...proprietor, Mr. Oluf Andreasen. The building rests upon a concrete foundation and consists of two stories and a basement, the first story and basement -- the latter of which includes the engine and fire room -- being 46x100 feet in size, and the second story 46x76 feet. A twenty-five horse power engine, steam for which is furnished by a thirty-five horse power boiler, serves to operate all the machinery which at present comprises a combination surface planer and edger, two circular saws, one band and one swing saw, one jointer, and a turning lathe. In a few days a boring machine, an "iron lathe" and a complete blacksmithing and wagon making outfit will be added, and the front part of the basement, which has the ground for a floor, will then be fitted up as the blacksmithing and wagon-making department. The first floor extends only two thirds the length of the building from the rear, and beneath it is to be found the greater part of the shafting, pulleys, belting, etc., while upon it are the work benches and all the machinery above enumerated. The upper story is as yet but one large empty room, and Mr. Andreasen informs us that it will be utilized entirely as a carriage painting department and as a place in which to store vehicles after painting and the different articles that he will manufacture. In the front part of this floor has been left a large opening as an elevator passage way, it being the intention to put in an elevator shortly to convenience the raising and lowering of articles from and to the wagonmaking department. Mr. Andreasen states that his main purpose in erecting the establishment was to enable the manufacture on an extensive scale of his patent butter moulds. He is the inventor of the new famous Andreasen mould, a description of which we published a year ago...The new establishment is certainly both an ornament and a valuable addition to Ferndale, and we trust our people will accord Mr. Andreasen a very generous support. The handsome and cozy little residence which he has erected close by is also an ornament and is occupied by himself and parents. (June 15, 1894)

Andreasen will in a few days dedicate his large new shop with a dance in the upper story. (June 22, 1894)

Free dedication dance given by Oluf Andreason Friday evening in the upper story of his large new shop on extreme lower Main Street. Kausen's string band kindly volunteered for the evening, and with Peter Anderson as prompter, and a jolly good crowd, and a first-class collation, the affair was everything that could be desired. The large room, 46x76 feet, was filled almost to its capacity, and when awhile after midnight the festivities terminated all went home feeling abundantly grateful to Oluf for the pleasant time afforded them. (7/6, 1894)

A patent self-opening gate has been placed in position at Andreason's Mechanical shop. (October 26, 1894)

Oluff Andreason has supplied his mechanical shop with an elevator which works to a charm. (December 21, 1894)

Oluff Andreason...butter cutters are doing a ready sale...he now has 10 men employed. (May 10, 1895)

Oluff Andreason is erecting a large shed in the rear of his mechanical shop in which to store his best grades of lumber. (7/12, 1895)

Oluff Andreason is building quite an addition onto the rear of his mechanical shop. (September 27, 1895)

Peter Larson, who has been employed in the Ferndale Mechanical Shop is now associated with Blacksmith N.C. Anderson of Arlynda. William Grinsell of Port Kenyon now holds forth at the anvil at the Mechanical shop. (October 25, 1895)

Blacksmith Kerri of the Andreason Mechanical Shop with his family have moved into Mrs. R.W. Robarts dwelling near the masonic hall. (February 14, 1896)

Oluff Andreason now employs nine men...he is doing a rushing business repairing and manufacturing wagons, butter boxes, butter cutters, etc. (March 10, 1896)

Last Thursday Johnny Hynding while at work at Oluff Andreason's mechanical shop had a close call from being seriously hurt he was accidently caught by a piece of the machinery connected with the rib saw and his pants leg and a good portion of one of his stockings were torn completely off him. Fortunately he sustained no injuries. (May 19, 1896)

George Branstetter has accepted the position of bookkeeper for Oluff Andreason at the Ferndale Mechanical Shop. (June 12, 1896)

A large bulletin board is to be erected opposite the Ferndale Mechanical shop in North Ferndale. It will be 12 feet high and 120 feet long and A.A. Killen, the Eureka painter, and W.E. Matthews of Ferndale will control it. (October 13, 1896)

Eugene Matthews has succeeded George Branstetter as bookkeeper at Andreason's mechanical shop. (December 22, 1896)

Owing to the increased business at his establishment, Oluff Andreason has been compelled to build several additions to his mechanical shop in North Ferndale. The gentleman has built up a fine trade... (January 26, 1897)

The Ferndale Mechanical Shop will probably resume operations next Monday morning after a weeks layoff. Mr. Andreason has rearranged his machinery at this institution, besides putting in a number of new machines. (February 5, 1897)

Oluff Andreason is building a large warehouse next to his mechanical shop which he will use to store his butter boxes... (April 20, 1897)

The Ferndale Mechanical Shop...now prepared to furnish them with anything in the line of creamery fixtures, wagons, buggies, farming implements, windmills and building materials and he also does all kinds of repair work in wood or iron, turning, horseshoeing, vehicle painting, etc. In fact the mechanical shop is an all around institution, now enlarged and fully equipped in every department... (April 20, 1897)

Peter Larsen, the blacksmith at the Ferndale Mechanical shop is on visit to Oregon. (June 18, 1897)

Chris Hansen who is employed in the Ferndale Mechanical Shop... (September 3, 1897)

...Christian Hansen, who has so long been employed in the Andreason Mechanical Shop was admitted to citizenship last week and today will take onto himself a wife. The lady of his choice is Miss Louisa Meng, daughter of M.P. Meng and wife... (December 21, 1897)

Tuesday afternoon while at work in Andreason's Mechanical shop in ferndale, Lewis Klesper was very badly burned in and about the eyes with multon babbitt metal... (February 18, 1898)

Oluff Andreason of the Ferndale Mechanical Shop...has just turned out for Cigar manufacture Wickham, whose place of business is in the Brown building is about complete, an exceedingly handsome counter and also two neat glass front wall cases. The counter is built of selected redwood with pepperwood and laurel panel work and is very neatly and tastily constructed and finished in the natural colors of the wood... (May 13, 1898)

Earl Percy, who has been employed in the Ferndale Mechanical Shop, departed...for Eureka, where he will pay his parents a visit, then go to San Francisco to accept a position in the Union Iron works. (June 14, 1898)

With the above change of name for his place of business we suggest he apply to the court and have his name changed "ditto" or Andreasen, and when that is accomplished if he is lacking in inventive brains we are willing to supply him at reasonable rates. Oluf Andreasen. (May 16, 1899)

A Mr. Pine of Eureka...has accepted a position in O. Andreasen's Mechanical Shop. (May 19, 1899)

Manager Fred Hansen of the North Ferndale Mechanical Shops is now employing eight men at that institution. (March 27, 1903)

North Ferndale Mechanical Shop...some eight or ten men are employed by this institution...(June 5, 1903)

At a meeting of the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co., held in Ferndale yesterday, it was decided to proceed at once with the erection of a factory here for the manufacture of the Matthews patent curtain hangers, and a committee was appointed to secure a site... (October 20, 1903)

The Pacific Curtain Fixture Co. of Ferndale, at a meeting held Wednesday, entered into a contract with Chris Hansen and W.E. Incorporation papers will be recorded in a few days, and at yesterday's meeting James Giacomini was elected President, Geo M. Brice 1st Vice President, A.H. Kausen, 2d Vice President, and H.C. Blum Secretary and Treasurer...rumor has it that negotiations are pending for the purchase of the big Mechanical Shop buildings in North Ferndale for the factory... (January 8, 1904)

Friday's Enterprise chronicled the organization in Ferndale of the Monroe Cider Vinegar Co. gave the officers and directors elected, etc. and stated that the new company was negotiating for the purchase of the North Ferndale Mechanical Shops for a factory. The deal has since been consummated and for the sum of \$3625 Fred Hansen and his sister, Mrs. Rothe, have sold to the directors of the new corporation the property in questions, including the boiler, engine, safe and office fixtures as they stand in the buildings. Mr. Hansen reserves all the machinery in the shops, which we are told he is to move to Eureka, where it is sated he has leased the old Cottrell shops on B Street and will continue his manufacturing business at our county seat. (January 12, 1904)

D.A. Francis left for San Francisco yesterday where he will secure the machinery for the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co's factory, which is soon to start operations in a part of the North Ferndale Mechanical Shops, sold last week by Mrs. Rothe and Fred Hansen to the Monroe Cider Vinegar Co and Bottling Works... (January 12, 1904)

The Ocean Avenue Mechanical Shops, owned by C.T. Schriener, are to be under a new management after February 1st. Mr. Chris Hansen is to be succeeded by Frank Elkins and David Rees, who have taken a lease of the shop, Mr. Hansen having decided to engage in the manufacture of fixtures for the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co of Ferndale in company with W.E. Matthews. The Curtain Fixture Co. will be ready for business in a few weeks now. (January 12, 1904)

A portion of the North Ferndale Mechanical Shops is being made ready this week for the factory of the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co., which Messrs Chris Hansen and W.E. Matthews are to conduct. The machinery reached Singleys this week, and as soon as it can be placed in position business will start, for the company is anxious to get its fixtures on the market. The Monroe Cider Vinegar Co., which purchased the Mechanical Shop buildings from Fred Hansen and sister, do not get possession until February 1st, but arrangements were made to let the Curtain Fixture people prepare for their machinery before that date. Mr. Chris Hansen gives possession of the Schriener Mechanical Shop on Ocean Avenue to his successors, Messrs. Elkins & Rees, on Feb 1st, next monday. Mr. Fred Hansen is to move his machinery from North Ferndale to Eureka, but exactly how soon we are not informed. (January 29, 1904)

At the Annual meeting of the Pacific Window Curtain Fixture Co., held in Ferndale last Friday, the following were re-elected as officers and directors: J.N. Lund, President, John Hansen, VP; H.C. Blum, Sec; D.A. Francis, Treas., S. Comisto, W.E. Matthews, and E.A. Aggeler... (February 9, 1904)

All is bustle at the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co's factory, which is in the north annex to the North Ferndale Mechanical shops. The 10-horse power gasoline engine is in place, and nearly all the machines, excepting the presses, which are expected to arrive here in a few days, when Messrs Hansen & Matthews will be ready to start manufacturing the company's fixtures. Bert Matthews has remodeled the interior of the annex and connected with the main factory are a packing room, plating room and office. The company has on hand 50,000 of the Matthews fixtures, manufactured in the East, and which arrived here recently. These will be placed on the market at once. The

company also has a contract to manufacture 50,000 patent adjustable picture frame hangers for the inventor, Frank Matthews, of Eureka. (February 9, 1904)

Fred Hansen will start this week taking down the machinery in the North Ferndale Mechanical Shops, preparatory to moving it to Eureka, where he is to engage in business...at Eureka Fred is to occupy the old Cottrell shops, corner of 4th and A Streets... (February 9, 1904)

W.E. Matthews tells us that the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co. will be ready to start "Cutting" at their factory in North Ferndale probably by this evening, the machinery all being in place and the factory now practically ready for operations. The interior of the Cider Vinegar Co's factory, in the same building, is being painted by C.A. Monroe and Ira King, and Howard Gay was busy yesterday setting the big carbonator in cement. (March 8, 1904)

The Pacific Curtain Fixture Co's factory in North Ferndale, which started up last week, is doing good work and everything there is now running smoothly, despite a small break in one of the presses that occurred a few days ago. The Matthews patent window curtain hangers are being turned out in large quantities, and in a few days a gentleman will arrive from below to install the dynamo, etc., for re-plating the fixtures as they are finished. Visitors at the factory have been very numerous since the machinery started as the operations are interesting. Besides Messrs Matthews and Hansen, Ralson Poole is also employed there. The Enterprise learns that at Friday's meeting of the Board of Directors a resolution was adopted, excluding all visitors from the works, excepting those who secure a pass or permit. (March 15, 1904)

Friday afternoon...visited the North Ferndale Bottling Works of the Monroe Cider and Vinegar Company, and there inspected the workings of one of the finest plants of the kind in the entire state...The Bottling room, wherein all the work is done, is of large dimensions, the entire floor being of concrete, and its arrangements is perfect. At every point where needed a system of piping affords hot and cold water and steam and through a filter sufficiently large passes every drop of water used in the making of carbonated drinks, thus insuring cleanliness and first quality. The equipment consists of a large boiler and engine, which affords the required power, an elegant carbonator of the latest design, and certainly a beautiful piece of machinery, a corking and flavoring machine for carbonated pints, a corking and flavoring machine for carbonated quarts, a flavoring, corking and tinning machine for carbonated beverages and adjustable to any size bottle, a beer bottle corker of the latest make, a large carbonic gas receptacle and outside tank, a steam bottle washer and a vat through which radiates a net work of steam pipes for the heating of the beer and ale for bottling. Wash racks, stamping tables, etc. are also in place and it is plain to be seen that the plant is not lacking in any particular whatever. The make of beer to be bottled is "Fredericksburg," which comes to the factory in large casks, and this with the bottling of ale and the making of different flavored Sodas, Sarsaparilla, Orange Cider, Ironbrew, Ginger Ale, Phosphate Brew and Chocolate Cream will be the output of the factory until the apple season comes, when the company will have in readiness its big plant for the manufacture of Monroe's Celebrated Apple Cider and Apple Cider Vinegar, for which many advance orders have already been received. Assisting Mr. Monroe at the factory, which did its first bottling last Friday, is Ira A. King and from now on these gentlemen will be kept busy, no doubt...The officers of the Monroe Co are President, James Giacomini; 1st Vice President: G.M. Brice; 2nd Vice President: A.H. Kausen; Secretary and Treasurer, H.C. Blum, who with R.D. Boynton, James Mullady, Jos Russ, D.A. Francis and Maurice Nielsen constitute the Board of Directors... (April 8, 1904)

An Enterprise reporter last Friday afternoon spent a very interesting hour at our local Curtain Fixture Factory, situated in North Ferndale, and which by the way is now in full operation and working most satisfactorily. This factory is the property of the Pacific Curtain Fixture Co., a corporation made up of a number of our responsible people and was organized some months ago for the purpose of manufacturing and placing on the market what is known as the Matthews Curtain hanger, having purchased from Messrs. W.E. Matthews, the patentee, and J.N. Lund, then associated with him, the patent rights, etc. The fixture is a contrivance for the hanging of window shades and promises to supplant the old fashioned bracket, for it can be fastened on any window casing without the use of a nail or screw, is far stronger and can be put up or taken down without marring the sashing in any way...In charge of the factory is Messrs Chris Hansen and W.E. Matthews, both stockholders in the company..the gentlemen have assisting them Messrs. Halston Poole, Henry Briggs and Albert Dougherty...A list of the directors and officers of the company is appended: J.E. Lund, President; John Hansen, Vice President; H.C. Blum, Secretary; D.A. Francis, Treasurer; S. Comisto, W.E. Matthews and E.A. Aggeler. (April 15, 1904)

Mrs. Hattie Varian and her sister, Mrs. Robinson, have accepted positions in the Curtain Fixture Co's North Ferndale factory. (April 26, 1904)

It is stated that A. Jensen is to establish his butter factory in the North Ferndale Mechanical Shops building, having leased quarters from the Monroe Cider and Vinegar Co. (July 29, 1904)

A. Jensen, late of Kansas, now has carpenters at work fitting up his new creamery apartments in the big building in North Ferndale owned now, and occupied in part by the Monroe Cider & Vinegar Co. (August 2, 1904)

A. Jensen, proprietor of the new Central Creamery in North Ferndale, desire to inform the public that he will begin receiving milk at his new factory tomorrow. (September 13, 1904)

W.E. Matthews, who returned from a month's visit below the first of the week, started up the Curtain Fixture Co's plant yesterday. This company is now engaged in turning out an order of 20,000 of F.A. Matthews' picture frame patent... (September 23, 1904)

The Central Creamery in North Ferndale is now putting up its product for the San Francisco trade in very attractive cartons, and has four

young ladies employed at present in arranging packages for shipment. (July 7, 1905)

Last evening Carpenter Joseph Steeves completed the work of making improvements to the cider room at the Monroe Cider and Vinegar Co's plant in North Ferndale. (July 4, 1905)

The deed, conveying the Monroe Cider and Vinegar Co's buildings in North Ferndale to the Central Creamery Co, has been placed on record. (April 24, 1908)

The Central Creamery Co's plant in North Ferndale presents a very neat appearance in its new garb of paint. The firm name has also been neatly lettered on the front of the building. (August 11, 1908)

President Jensen of the Central Creamery Company states that the new condensing and sterilizing plant which is now being built in North Ferndale will be in operation in about two weeks. This plant will sterilize and evaporate milk and cream for canning and will also turn out the newly invented product of powdered milk which is to be merely milk evaporated into a powder... (May 25, 1909)

...The Excelsior Creamery Company that butter factory was sold to the Central Creamery Co... (March 4, 1910)

Walter Coltoft, who has been connected with the Central Creamery in North Ferndale for a long time past, left yesterday morning for San Luis Obispo, where he will be manager of a creamery owned by the same company... (March 11, 1910)

There is a possibility, even a probability, that Ferndale will have established within its borders before long a big new industry, bringing in much wealth to the town and giving employment to half a hundred people. The new industry planned is for the manufacture of powdered milk and the concern behind the proposition is the Central Creamery Co. As is known to our readers, Messrs. Jensen and Gray of the company have perfected a means of converting the substance of milk into a powdered form, which will keep indefinitely and is always ready for use with the addition of water. The formula is known only to the officials of the Central Creamery Co., and the manufacture of the powdered milk has been going on in a small way for a year or more past. As the merits of the article become known, however, the demand is increasing at such a rate that it is found necessary to engage in its manufacture on an extensive scale. Messrs. Jensen and Gray have practically decided to erect a big factory capable of turning out enormous quantity of the powder, and employing fifty or more people... (May 31, 1910)

As the result of an accident at the Central creamery in North Ferndale yesterday morning Oscar Ohrvall had two teeth knocked out and both lips badly cut, while Maurice Nielsen was struck in the abdomen and quite badly hurt, both now being under the care of Dr. Ring, who took ten stitches to close the cut in Mr. Ohrvall's lips. The accident was caused by the top blowing off one of the pumps while Messrs. Nielsen and Ohrvall were near, the heavy pieces striking them and causing the injuries noted above... (July 26, 1910)

The manufacture of powdered milk at the Central Creamery is now in progress and the product is on sale in several of the Ferndale stores...process used by the Central Co. originated with Messrs. Jensen and Gray, and is claimed to be superior to any method heretofore in use, in that the milk keeps indefinitely and loses none of its sweetness or taste... (August 12, 1910)

The Central Creamery Co. is still engaged in perfecting plans for the erection of a big plant for the manufacture of its dried milk product, which was discussed at length in these columns some time ago... (August 19, 1910)

Ferndale is to be the location of the big \$60,000 plant to be erected for the manufacture of dry milk by the Central Creamery Company. Work is to be commenced at once on the building, which will be located to the rear of the creamery in North Ferndale, the plans now being in the hands of Fred Johnson, superintendent of construction of the company...The dry milk will be manufactured by a process perfected by Messrs. Jensen and Gray, who have given practically all their time for two years past to this matter. They have placed a small quantity on the market during the last month for the purpose of allowing the people to pass judgment on it, and it has met with such popular approval that it becomes necessary to build the big plant at once to supply the demand. A three-story building, 60x100 feet in size, will be built. It will be a heavy mill construction, with a steel covering outside and cement inside, making the most sanitary building possible... (September 27, 1910)

Fred Johnson and assistants are busily engaged these days tearing down a number of buildings in the rear of the Central Creamery in North Ferndale preparatory to commencing work on the erection of the new \$60,000 dry milk factory to be erected by the company. (October 21, 1910)

Archie Morrison of Port Kenyon, who was injured at the dried milk plant now under course of construction in North Ferndale, as told in recent issues of The Enterprise, was removed to the Ferndale Hospital Friday for treatment. The gentleman has a very badly injured eye, and no improvement is noted at this writing. James Scott, who suffered a broken arm at the same time, is getting along nicely. (December 13, 1910)

Archie Morrison, whose injury as the result of an accident while employed on the construction of the dry milk plant in North Ferndale has been told in previous issues of this paper, submitted to an operation at a Eureka hospital last Tuesday for the removal of his left eye, which had become badly infected and it was feared would extend to the other optic unless removed. Mr. Morrison is now getting along nicely and his full recovery seems only a matter of a short time. (December 30, 1910)

The powdered milk plant being erected by the North Central Creamery Company in North Ferndale...is rapidly nearing completion...since last August the experimental plant in North Ferndale has been manufacturing not only powdered skim milk, but also powdered dry whole milk, cream and milk... (April 7, 1911)

Friday afternoon, through the courtesy of Manager Maurice Nielsen, of the Central Creamery Company's plant in North Ferndale...inspect the new dry or powdered milk factory being erected by that firm and now all but ready to begin operations in earnest. This new enterprise is one that means a great deal to Eel River valley, and particularly to that section adjacent to the Cream City. For some time prior to the decision of Messrs. Jensen & Gray, proprietors of the Central Company, to embark in the manufacture of powdered milk, the location of their proposed plant was a matter of no little conjecture to the promoters, but at the earnest solicitation of the Ferndale Chamber of Commerce, which held a special meeting to give the matter the consideration its importance demanded, as well as its unqualified endorsement of support, and also at the solicitation of prominent individual business men of the town and valley, Messrs. Jensen & Gray finally concluded to erect the factory at their holdings in North Ferndale...Work on the factory in which the new enterprise will be conducted was commenced last winter and it now nearly completed...The process of manufacture is also a new one, and was originated by the gentleman named. The building is so constructed as to be practically fire proof, lessening the risk of fire to a minimum. The plant was built by Contractor Fred Johnson, under the direct supervision of Messrs. Jensen & Gray...The factory building is 60x100 feet in size and three stories high. The first floor is devoted to the machinery necessary for the operation of the plant...The second floor of the building will be used as a packing room and is of sufficient size to accommodate the handling of a large amount of the finished product. The third floor is given over entirely as a storage room. Located about sixty feet to the south of the dry milk factory is the power house from which is transmitted by means of large pipe the power for the manufacture of the raw material. The house is about 20x40 feet in size and is fitted with two 100 horse power boilers... (August 1, 1911)

A new warehouse is to be built in the rear of the Central Creamery Company's dry milk factory in North Ferndale. The building will be of corrugated iron and will be 120x100 feet in size. The date of commencing construction work has not been definitely decided upon, but it will probably be within the course of two or three weeks. (May 14, 1912)

Fire which originated from an unknown cause shortly before five o'clock last Wednesday afternoon caused damage estimated at \$25,000 at the dry milk plant of the central Creamery Co in North Ferndale. The first intimation of the fire was given by the blowing of the siren at the creamery... (good article, long) - June 25, 1915)

Ronald W. Cameron of Ferndale...the man of her choice has for some time past been engaged as buttermaker at the California Central Creamery in Ferndale...(January 25, 1918)

Reed Cook has resigned his position at the Central Creamery and departed Saturday for his home at Petrolia. (January 28, 1918)

Arrangements have been made whereby Ferndale will again have a fire alarm system second to none. Through the courtesy of the management of the California Central Creameries Co. The siren belonging to the town and which was formerly located on the old electric light plant when it was in operation, will hereafter be operated at the creamery in North Ferndale...(February 5, 1918)

A new garage is to be built at the California Central Creameries Company's plant in North Ferndale. (March 22, 1918)

S.T. Kelsey of the California Central Creamery Company's force in Ferndale, was struck in the thigh by a piece of flying steel a few days ago...(April 5, 1918)

Carl Vasmar of this town, while crossing the street at the California Central Creamery in North Ferndale last Saturday evening was struck by an auto driven by Harold Guptill. The fender of the machine struck Mr. Vasmar, who was badly bruised, though no bones were broken...(April 9, 1918)

Hiram Kemp has resigned his position at the California Central Creamery in Ferndale and has accepted a position on the ranch of George Price at Price Creek...(April 30, 1918)

Mrs. P. Coombe has disposed of her household furniture at auction and in a short time expects to leave with her children for San Francisco, there to join her husband. (September 15, 1893)

Mrs. P. Coombe is having her residence re-shingled. (September 29, 1893)

George Gries and family now reside in the Coombe residence. (November 17, 1893)

The Ferndale band have secured a room in the Coombe building and are now practicing every Saturday evening. (September 20, 1895)

The Coombes residence with two acres of land in North Ferndale is offered for rent. (February 11, 1896)

The Petersen family, all of whom are musicians and who furnished some excellent brass music on our streets last week, have rented the house on the Coombes place in Ferndale and will remain here all winter. Mr. Petersen wishes to send the children to our public schools. The gentleman paid us a call the other day and added his name to our subscription list. (September 22, 1896)

M. Benjamin and family have moved into the house on the Coombes place in North Ferndale, part of which is occupied by Prof. Petersen and family...Mrs. Petersen is in quite poor health of late. (May 7, 1897)

Professor Petersen and his musical children return to Ferndale Saturday after an absence of nearly three months, spent in touring Oregon and southern counties of California, giving entertainments. (November 2/ 1897)

A large new barn is being erected on the Coombes place in North Ferndale rented by Martin Larsen. (January 14, 1898)

Bulmer and French have purchased Martin Larsen's lease to the Coombes 20 acres in North Ferndale. (March 29, 1898)

M. Benjamin and family have moved back from the Coombe place to their old home on Ocean Avenue. (April 19, 1898)

M. Benjamin and family have decided not to move from the Coombe place in North Ferndale. (April 22, 1898)

Mrs. M. Benjamin of Ferndale is prepared to take two boarders and two lodgers. Consult her for terms. (May 24, 1898)

C. Kinzel and wife moved Tuesday from the Kerri house to the Coombes property. The former occupants, Mrs. M. Benjamin and family will occupy part of the residence of William Benjamin on Ocean Avenue. (September 16, 1898)

Mrs. C. Kinzel and Mrs. T.J. Frost will conduct a restaurant fair week in the Coombes building near the Ferndale fair grounds. (September 16, 1898)

Rumor has it that a 60 foot street is to be opened through the center of the Coombe property in North Ferndale, and that the west side is to be laid off into building lots and placed on the market. (January 6, 1899)

Professor Petersen and sons, who have been touring the coast for the past eight months, returned to Ferndale yesterday. (February 14, 1899)

It is quite likely that the Coombes twenty acres in North Ferndale will be in the near future be laid off in building lots offered for sale in parcels to suit. This land is beautifully situated, and an elegant place for residences. James T. Robarts can give you all information regarding this matter. (May 19, 1899)

The home of Mr. and Mrs. C. Kinzel in North Ferndale had an extremely narrow escape from fire tuesday evening, says the Exchange. A lamp was unintentionally left burning on a bureau in one of the bedrooms, and when the occupant thereof came home he found that the lamp had exploded and burned up the articles on the bureau, the bureau also being partially consumed. The fire was entirely out when the wreck was discovered, there fortunately not having been oil enough in the lamp at the time of the explosion to cause the flames to spread. (October 6, 1899)

Henry Briggs and wife have moved from Port Kenyon to the Coombes house in North Ferndale. (April 20, 1900)

A. Putnam has sold six acres of land on the "race track lane" to F.G. Williams. Frank also lately purchased the Coombe property on that street, where, we understand, he will erect a handsome residence next summer. Mr. Putnam is rapidly disposing of the Shaw farm. (October 9, 1900)

Maggie C. Coombs to Frank G. Williams and Georgie Russ Williams 2.41 acres at corner Arlington avenue and Main Street, Ferndale. Frank G. Williams and Georgie Russ Williams to Maggie C. Coombs, 1.16 acres on north line of Arlington Avenue, Ferndale. (May 21, 1901)

L.H. Whittier and family, who have been living up Williams Creek, moved into the Coombs residence in North Ferndale the first of the week. (August 23, 1901)

Jos Russ and his assistants were at work this week building a line fence through the Coombs 20 acres in North Ferndale, the west half of which Joe now owns, and it is a pretty strip of land. (January 17, 1902)

L.H. Whittier and family, of Ferndale, moved to Freshwater Saturday, where Mr. Whittier has accepted a situation on Dr. Rae Felt's Ranch. The Morris boys hauled their household effects up. (April 15, 1902)

Owing to damages already done, such as breaking windows in the house, etc., notice is hereby given that all parties are hereby forbidden to trespass on my premises, known as the Coombe place on Arlington Avenue. Anyone violating this order will be prosecuted, and parents will be held responsible for the acts of their children. F.G. Williams. (May 8, 1903)

Jack Smiley moved his family up from Joe Russ' Ocean House place Tuesday, and they will hereafter reside at the Coombe place in North Ferndale. Jack is to continue to drive Joe's freight team. (November 20, 1903)

Public sentiment seems to be strongly in favor of the establishment of a Union High School in Ferndale, and the question will be decided at next Saturday's election. Over \$2,000 have already been raised in this section to aid in the construction of the necessary building, with a prospect of more money for the same purpose. It now rests with the voters of the districts to be included in the Union High School District to say whether the same shall be established or not. (July 5, 1904)

Ferndale is at last to have a Union High School, the proposition carrying at the election last Saturday by a majority of 248 votes. A great deal of interest was taken in the matter, especially in Ferndale, where 225 votes were cast in favor of a high school and only 6 against it...final vote: 326 FOR; 78 AGAINST. (July 12, 1904)

High School Trustees: Wednesday's election for Union High School trustees passed off quietly, those chosen in the different districts comprising the Union district being as follows: Ferndale, M.C. DeCarli; Centerville, Lorenz Petersen; Coffee Creek, A Waddington; Island, Robt Jansen; Port Kenyon, J.P. Donnelly; Grant, H. Bonnicksen; Salt River, Amos Bonnicksen; Grizzly Bluff, W.M. Church; Pleasant Point, H.P. Harper. They are all good men and it is to be hoped that they will get to work at once to the end that our high school may be opened not later than the first of September. (July 29, 1904)

The trustees of the newly formed high school district met in the Town Hall last Saturday afternoon, the following trustees being present: A. Waddington, M.C. DeCarli, W.M. Church, H.P. Harper, A. Bonnicksen, H.M. Bonnicksen, P.J. Donnelly and Frederick Johnson. The Board organized by the selection of A. Waddington as president and MC. DeCarli as clerk. The location of the school was then fixed at Ferndale, and it was decided that the name of the school should be the Ferndale Union High School. The Board was desirous that the school be in operation as soon as possible, and fixed August 29th as the date on which it is expected to start the school... (August 2, 1904)

The High School Trustees have just announced the selection of Clarence J. Dufour to the principalship of the Ferndale High School. Mr. Dufour is a graduate of the University of Wisconsin...coming to California, he filled the position of instructor of English in the Santa Cruz High School for one year...It has also been definitely decided to at once employ an assistant teacher, and the trustees are now considering a number of applications for the position... (August 12, 1904)

The Ferndale High School opened yesterday in the Coombe building in North Ferndale with an attendance of 25 pupils, and it is

expected that this number will be materially increased in a short time. A report seems to have gained credence that pupils attending this school are expected to pay a tuition fee, and Clerk DeCarli desires us to assure all that this statement is without foundation. The school is free to all in this High School district. A list of the studies to be undertaken this term will appear in Friday's issue. (August 23, 1904)

The Board of Union High School trustees met Wednesday afternoon at the High School building in North Ferndale...after some discussion it was determined that a school house should be built for the use of the High School, and the executive committee was instructed to secure proposals and estimates as to the purchase of a high school lot...estimate of the amount that will be needed to conduct the school for the present year...\$2750, which will be sufficient not only to pay teachers' salaries, but also pay for all equipment thus far obtained, besides leaving a considerable sum for incidentals... (September 2, 1904)

C.H. DuFour, principal of the Ferndale Union High School, has tendered his resignation to the Trustees, to take effect today. Mr. DuFour finds this move necessary, owing to the fact that this climate does not agree with him, and upon the advice of his physician he is to seek a different locality. Mr. DuFour during the several months he has been in charge of our High School has proven himself a very able instructor... (December 16, 1904)

High School Site...The business of the meeting was the selection of a permanent site for the High School, and the merits of a number of proposed sites were thoroughly gone into. At the outset it was plainly the unanimous opinion that the best interests of the school, as bearing upon its future development, required the selection of a large lot to be used as a school site. After considering carefully the desirability of the various sites offered, having in mind the elements of price, public convenience, and general suitability, it was the unanimous opinion of the members of the Board that the present site of the High School should be obtained. It was accordingly ordered that the Board accept the proposal of Frank G. and Georgia R. Williams, their offer being to sell the said tract consisting of 2.41 acres for \$2250... (January 31, 1905)

High School Election...held in the various school districts of the valley last Friday, six new men were added to the High School Board. The trustees chosen by the various districts are as follows: Centerville, J.P. Jacobsen; Port Kenyon, F.W. Andreassen; Island, S.L. Goble; Coffee Creek, M.T. Waddington; Salt River, Theo Petersen; Pleasant Point, J.W. Kelley; Grant, H.M. Bonnicksen; Grizzly Bluff, Walter Church; Ferndale, M.C. DeCarli. The three last named are the only old men re-elected, the others elected not being members of the old board... (April 11, 1905)

A tennis court has just been completed at the High School grounds in North Ferndale, and will afford the pupils of this institution a great deal of amusement and healthful exercise in the future. (April 28, 1905)

Mrs. M. Adams, one of the teachers of the Ferndale High School, takes her departure in a short time for her home in Mountain View, accompanied by her little son and her father, who have been making their home in Ferndale. Mrs. Adams, we understand, does not intend to return to Ferndale as the climate here does not agree with Mr. Langley's health. (June 13, 1905)

The Ferndale High School closes today for the summer vacation, after a very successful term. It is not known yet who will take the position next term made vacant by the resignation of Mrs. Adams. The pupils of the High School and many friends here are sorry to learn the lady has decided to leave Ferndale. (June 16, 1905)

Prof. R.W. Coddington and wife take their departure from Ferndale today en route to San Francisco to visit friends...Mr. Coddington has been the principal of the Ferndale High School for several months past, and during their stay in the Cream City he and his wife have made many friends, who hope that they will again take up their residence here at the beginning of the August term. (June 16, 1905)

Prof. C.H. DuFour, principal of the Ferndale High School for a number of months after its organization, is now one of the teachers of Alameda's grammar schools. (June 20, 1905)

The trustees of the Ferndale Union High School met last Saturday and elected F.W. Andreassen president and M. C. DeCarli, Secretary. The teachers for the school have not been selected but will probably be chosen in a short time as the fall term commences either the 7th or 14th of August. Improvements will be made to the interior of the high school building, and it is expected that a laboratory will be added and a class in chemistry formed the coming term. (July 21, 1905)

High School teachers...As principal Prof. R.H. Van Horn has been selected, while the assistant teacher will be Miss Grace Smith. Prof. Van Horn has been in charge of several of the high schools of the state. Miss Smith is a graduate of the University of Michigan and has been teaching in this state for several years, her last position being with the San Diego High School. (July 25, 1905)

By today's steamer Prof. E.H. Van Horn, who has been selected as principal of Ferndale's High School, is expected to arrive in the Cream City, while his assistant, Miss Grace Smith, will also reach this place in a few days...The last several days carpenter John Kerri has been engaged in making alterations and improvements to the interior of the High School building in North Ferndale. A laboratory is being fitted up... (August 4, 1905)

A deed, conveying 2.41 acres of land at the northwest corner of Main Street and Arlington avenue, Ferndale, given the Ferndale High School District, by F.G. Williams and wife, has been placed on record. (March 9, 1906)

Last Tuesday afternoon the trustees of the Ferndale Union High School met in the town hall and adopted a resolution calling an election

for Saturday, March 31st, 1906, to submit the question of bonding the district for \$10,000 for the purpose of erecting a new school house on the district's property in North Ferndale to take the place of the building now used as a school house, which, in the opinion of the trustees as well as many others, has outlived its usefulness for the purpose it is at present being put to... (March 9, 1906)

The trustees of the Ferndale Union High School have made the final payment on the property in North Ferndale purchased from F.W. Williams and wife, and the deed of the land placed on record. The property consists of 2.41 acres of land and cost \$2,250. (March 9 1906)

Shall Ferndale Have a New High School Building? The present building is not only a disgrace to the rich and prosperous community such as is embraced in the Ferndale Union High School district, but is also entirely inadequate for the present number attending school. The seating room is crowded to the utmost, every seat being filled. There are in the graduating class in the Ferndale public school alone 16 pupils, the majority of whom will doubtless enter the High School... (March 13, 1906)

The bond election held in this place last Saturday to decide the matter of bonding the Ferndale union high school district for \$10,00 for the purpose of securing funds to erect a suitable school building, etc, was carried by an immense majority, the vote standing 285 for the issuance of bonds and 34 against the measure...All day Saturday young lady students of the high school and others were on the streets with carriages and saw to it that no voter had to walk to the polls in North Ferndale unless he so desired... (April 3, 1906)

Last Saturday afternoon the Trustees of the Ferndale Union High School met in the Cream City to inspect plans submitted to them for the new high school building for which bonds were voted in this district at a recent election. Six sets of designs were placed before the trustees by architects Newton Ackerman, W.B. Young and Warren Skillings of Eureka, W.S. Fitzell of Ferndale, Ernest Reese of Grizzly Bluff, and Stone & Smith of San Francisco. All the drawings are of buildings that are up-to-date in every particular and that would be a credit to the valley.... (May 8, 1906)

The trustees of the Ferndale Union High School district, at their meeting in the Cream City last Saturday afternoon, accepted the plans of Architect W.S. Fitzell of Ferndale, for the new high school building, to be erected on the district's property in North Ferndale. The plans submitted will give the district a neat and convenient building, one that will in every way be a credit to the valley... (May 22, 1906)

The High School Trustees of the Ferndale Union High School were in session in Ferndale last Saturday afternoon and organized for the new year by the election of F.W. Andreasen as president and M.C. DeCarli as clerk. The plans of the new high school building, prepared by Architect W.S. Fitzell, of this place, were inspected and adopted with but a few minor changes...bids will be received up to 12 o'clock of Saturday, August 4th, 1906...The High School Trustees decided at their meeting to employ Prof Van Horn and Miss Grace Smith as teachers of the school for another term. It was further decided to employ a third teacher in the High School... (July 17, 1906)

Bids were received...for the building of the Ferndale Union High School building...three tenders were received...the Board decided to reject all bids as being too high and also concluded to make a number of modifications to the plans and specifications... (August 7, 1906)

...The high school will again be in charge of Prof Van Horn, while Miss Smith, who taught here last term, will assist, together with Mr. Passmore...(August 14, 1906)

Ackerman & Son, of Eureka, who will build the new union high school building in North Ferndale, have commenced the work of laying the foundation for the structure. D.A. Francis has been selected to superintend the concrete work. (September 18, 1906)

George Ackerman and family of Eureka moved into the J.W. Blakemore house in North Ferndale yesterday. Mr. Ackerman and father are the contractors of the new high school building in North Ferndale, now rapidly assuming proportions. (October 9, 1906)

Robert Grubb, a carpenter employed on the new high school building now being erected in North Ferndale, met with quite a painful accident there last Friday morning. Mr. Grubb was riding on the elevator used in conveying material to the upper floor of the building, when the mechanism operating the elevator gave way, allowing the gentleman to fall some twenty or twenty-five feet. Although no bones were broken, Mr. Grubb was quite badly bruised about the hips and back, he also receiving a slight cut upon the head... (December 17, 1906)

I. Passmore has resigned his position as one of the teachers of the Ferndale Union High School, and left this place yesterday for Antioch, this state, where he will take the principalship of the schools of that town. Prof. C.W. Moore, who, the last eight years has served as principal of the Antioch schools, has taken the position in our high school made vacant by Mr. Passmore's resignation (January 11, 1907)

The Student Body of the Ferndale Union High School was in session...The gathering was held in the assembly hall of the school, which had been tastily decorated by the young lady students. The principal business transacted was the election of officers for the ensuing year, those chosen being the following: President, John Lund; Vice President, Granville Delamere; Secretary, Miss Constance Clemens; Treasurer, Harry Bonnicksen; Sergeant at Arms, Alfred Varley; Critic, Miss Mildred Ring. (January 15, 1907)

Contractor Ackerman, who has completed the carpenter work on Ferndale's union high school building, took his departure last Wednesday afternoon for his Eureka home. (February 15, 1907)

Washington's Birthday, last Friday, might well be termed "High School Day" in Ferndale, as on that date occurred the dinner under the

auspices of the school, the dedication of the new high school building in North Ferndale in the afternoon and the dance in the evening...The structure was built by Contractor Ackerman, of Eureka, and its construction superintended by Contractor and Architect W.S. Fitzell, of Ferndale. It is a substantial and well built edifice, and presents an appearance both imposing and attractive. In its arrangement great care has been taken in meeting the requirements of school work, the three recitation rooms, and laboratory rooms being large and comfortable, well lighted and with high ceilings. The building also contains cloak rooms, etc, and a large basement... (February 26, 1907)

Will Davis, assisted by his brother I.W. Davis, have about completed the work of laying a concrete walk from the High School building in North Ferndale to the creek bordering the grounds, across which the gentlemen are doing a fine job and are demonstrating their skill as concrete workers. (April 16, 1907)

Commencement Exercises...Ferndale Union High School...five of the students of the school will receive their diplomas, as follows: Teresa M. McDonough, Florence J. Buttle, Beatrice A. Faulkner, Eleanor I. Varley, N. John Lund. (May 24, 1907)

The first commencement exercises of the Ferndale High School were held Wednesday afternoon of this week and were attended by a large number of the relatives and friends of the graduating class. It has been three years since the institution of the Ferndale Union High School. The school began its line of work with a small number of pupils and now has a large membership, is presided over by three teachers of decided ability, is in a most flourishing condition and occupies one of the finest and most attractive school buildings in the county...the graduates--the Misses Teresa McDonough, Florence J. Buttle, Beatrice A. Faulkner, Eleanor J. Varley and Mr. N. John Lund... (May 31, 1907)

The trustees of the Ferndale Union High School were in session recently...the board has also disposed of the old school building to George Clark of the Port Kenyon section, who is now engaged in removing the structure. (July 23, 1907)

O.D. Whittier has been employed this week making improvements to the chemistry laboratory room at the Ferndale union high school building. (August 2, 1907)

The building in North Ferndale, formerly used as a high school, was torn down Tuesday by Fred Johnson and Chris Hansen. (January 10, 1908)

The "Tomahawk", the first paper to be issued by the Ferndale Union High School, is now being printed in the Enterprise office, and will be issued the latter part of this month. The Tomahawk will be edited by Kenneth Robarts, assisted by Miss Emily E. Keohan, Social Editor; Harry Bonnicksen, Athletic Editor; Horace Winslow, Josh Editor; Miss Mildred Ring, Artist; James N. Fulmor, Business Manager and James Andreasen, Advertising Manager. Contained within its pages will be found many illustrations of an exceptionally high order, all prepared from sketches made by pupils of the school, numerous articles from the pens of the pupils, and an abundance of other interesting matter. Although the first paper issued by the Ferndale high school, it gives promise of being a periodical of which the student body will have just reason to be exceptionally proud. (May 15, 1908)

Last Tuesday shortly after one o'clock our fire alarm notified our residents that one of the buildings of the town was ablaze, and it was soon learned that it was the residence of W.E. Matthews in North Ferndale...but upon their arrival there it was at once decided that nothing they could do could save the building, as the flames had secured such a start that the structure was doomed to go up in smoke...Cinders from the burning building alighted on the roof of the adjoining residence, that of the late J.T. Robarts, occupied by F.G. Williams and wife, and twice small blazes on the roof were noticed and extinguished...The origin of Tuesday's fire is supposed to have been caused by a defective stove pipe, and the fact that such a short time elapsed after the blaze was first discovered until the building was one mass of flames, leads one to believe that the conflagration was well under way in the upper story of the residence before any signs of its existence was learned. As soon as the alarm was given by Mrs Matthews, who discovered the blaze, neighbors lost no time in arriving and lending every assistance in removing as much of the contents of the burning structure as possible. Nearly everything of value in the rooms on the lower floor were saved, but nothing in the upper story could be reached before that part of the building was a roaring furnace. Mr. Matthews loss will be in the neighborhood of \$1200 or \$1400, partly insured... (August 11, 1905)

Mrs. C. VanOrden, J.T. Robarts' nurse, is spending a couple of weeks in San Francisco. (July 14, 1899)

Mrs. VanOrden returned from a visit to San Francisco on last week's WEOTT, accompanied by her husband, who is sojourning for a time at the home of James T. Robarts of North Ferndale, where Mrs. Van Orden is employed as a nurse. (August 1, 1899)

Friday evening, November 22nd, 1901, at her home in North Ferndale, Mrs. James T. Robarts passed from life to the Great Beyond...Mary Eliza Robarts was the eldest daughter of the late Hon. Joseph Russ and Mrs. Zipporah Russ... (November 26, 1901)

The will of the late Mary E. Robarts bequeaths to her husband her entire estate, conservatively valued at \$75,000, and consisting of dairy lands, residence, cattle and bank stock. (December 17, 1901)

Mrs. Bryant, late of Reno, Nevada, who reached Ferndale a few days ago, is to remain here and will hereafter serve as housekeeper at the North Ferndale home of Mr. James T. Robarts. This lady when a girl lived on Bear River in the early seventies, with her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Abbott, and is a relative of the Russes. (January 28, 1902)

Mrs. Van Orden, who has so long served as nurse for Jas T. Robarts, of North Ferndale, will go below on the next steamer. Mary Robarts Estate...home place, appraised at \$3000, sole owner...the total of the appraised value of the estate is \$55,363... (April 22, 1902)

Joseph Russ and wife, nee Sadie Flowers, who arrived from below on Monday' Corona, will make their home with J.T. Robarts in North Ferndale for several months at least. Joe was kept busy Tuesday shaking hands with and receiving the congratulations of his many Cream City friends... (January 30, 1903)

At twenty minutes to twelve o'clock Friday morning, February the 12th, 1904, Death closed the eyes of James T. Robarts in the long last sleep...This community, in which he resided for so many years, now deeply and sincerely mourns his loss, for no man among us stood higher in the affection and esteem of our people than did he. The writer of this article feels a personal bereavement in the death of James T Robarts, for he had been our friend for over 20 years, for a long period of time we lived close neighbors, and we knew him intimately. In this last tribute to his memory it is not too much for us to say that he was one of the best men we ever knew, and his nobility of character, his strict integrity, his sympathetic nature, his charity, his forbearance, and the grand and admirable fortitude he displayed in the face of trials and sufferings that would have weighted others down, must every remain as an inspiration to those at least who were closest to him. Just 33 years ago February 14th, the date of his burial, and on Valentine's Day, the deceased left his boyhood home in England for California, and he and his two companions, George M. Brice of Ferndale, and R.F.B. King, now of Seattle, came direct to Humboldt County. Here he has resided ever since, excepting brief periods spent on two different visits to England, and his life among us has been as an open book. While as a member of the well known firm of Robarts Bros he engaged in the shipping and warehouse business for a number of years and quite extensively, his chief occupation was that of farming and dairying, and up to the time Providence willed otherwise, he was classed among the most active, public spirited and progressive of our citizens. Ten years ago the first day of the coming June, and while engaged in repairing a well at his Occidental ranch, in the Centerville section, a derrick gave way, and from that moment it was decreed that Jim Robarts should be a helpless cripple. The cruel blow he received practically broke his back, paralysis of the lower limbs followed, and tho' every advantage was his that money could supply, the injury was permanent and no relief came. But notwithstanding his life had been an exceedingly busy one, notwithstanding that one of his greatest enjoyments was outdoor sports, he accepted his fate with a fortitude that was the admiration of all, and the many spells of indisposition and suffering that were his to endure since, he bore without a murmur. Sick indeed was Jim Robarts when he failed of a smile or a cheering word for a friend. And this great fortitude, patience and endurance remained with him to the last. Is it any wonder then that the relatives and friends who surrounded him loved him? But the terrible accident that befell Mr. Robarts was followed several years later by what to him was a far greater affliction -- the death of his beloved wife, whose tender care, love and sympathy were to him more than all else combined. The heart aches he has since endured were his alone to bear, and silently though he bore them, it was evident that his life was not what it was before. There is a Faith, however, and it is humanity's greatest boon, that this is not all, that beyond lies a far grander existence, where loved ones are reunited and where pain and suffering have no place. Of this great future recompense our old time friend will be a partaker. His life here will exalt him in the life to come. James Thomas Robarts was born in Gartna Greenock, Scotland, July 6th, 1854, and was one of a family of eleven children, those surviving him being William H. and Robert W. Robarts of Ferndale; Percival W. Robarts of Chicago; Mrs. Evan Thomas of Santa Cruz; Charles James Robarts, the father of Dr. Harry P. Robarts, of Ferndale, and who is a Lieutenant-Colonel in the English Army, and also Chief Magistrate of a District in India, and Mrs. Capt Taylor and Mrs. Captain Blood, who are also residents of Indian, and whose husband also hold position in English regiments. The deceased was married in 1880 to Miss Mary E. Russ, eldest daughter of the late Hon Jos Russ and Mrs. Zipporah Russ, but to them no children were born. Mrs. Robarts passed from life November 22, 1901. (February 16, 1904)

The last will and testament of the late James T. Robarts...to his sisters-in-law, Mrs. Maggie Coombe, Mrs. Annie Harville, Mrs. Georgia Williams and the Misses Edith and Bertha Russ, share and share alike, the North Ferndale home of 3-1/2 acres, known as "The Maples," and all the personal property therein contained, the Arcadia ranch at Meridian of forth acres, and the hill ranch of forty-five acres. (February 16, 1904)

A. Putnam, H.D. Smith and L.C. Ericksen Wednesday filed their inventory and appraisement of the estate of James T. Robarts, deceased. The total value of the estate is fixed at \$71,985.53 and is made up of the following items: Occidental ranch, 1/2 interest, \$45,000; home place, \$4,000; hill place, \$500; Arcadia ranch, \$8,000; Putnam place, \$1,500; personal property, \$12,985.52. (July 15, 1904)

A large number of the ladies of this section attended an "At Home," given at the "The Maples" in North Ferndale yesterday afternoon by Mrs. F.G. Williams and Miss Russ. The occasion is reported to have been an enjoyable gathering. (October 5, 1906)

Contractors Steeves & Flowers are engaged in placing a concrete foundation under "The Maples", the North Ferndale residence of Mr. and Mrs. F.G. Williams. (November 23, 1906)

Carpenter James Scott has completed quite a number of improvements to the interior of "The Maples", the north Ferndale residence of Mr. and Mrs. F.G. Williams. (January 29, 1907)

James T. Robarts estate distributed...appraised at \$72,000...the Maples, now the home of Mr. and Mrs. F.G. Williams, valued at \$4000, the Putnam place, \$1,500...The Home place, known as the Maples...in equal shares to sisters-in-law, Mesdames Coombe, Harville and

Williams, and the Misses Edith and Bertha Russ... (August 4, 1908)

James Nissen, who recently rented his ranch on the Island to Fred Johnson, has leased the F.G. Williams home in North Ferndale known as "The Maples," and with his family has taken up his home there. (February 3, 1914)

Two Ferndale homes have been placed at the disposal of the Red Cross as a means of relieving suffering attendant on the influenza epidemic. Mr. and Mrs. William Crowley have turned over their home to be used as a hospital and Mr. and Mrs. F.G. Williams have given their home, the Maples, as a rest home for nurses and others assisting in the care of patients so that there may be a place in which to rest without the danger of carrying the disease into the various homes...(January 31, 1919)

The Maples destroyed by Fire; Heavy Loss....The Maples, one of the finest homes in Ferndale, was totally destroyed by fire last Wednesday afternoon. The house is supposed to have caught fire from a sawdust pile near the back and to have followed a vine into an open window, as when discovered the flames were issuing from the upper story windows. When the firemen responded to the alarm the whole house was a mass of flames and it was with difficulty that anything was gotten out. A piano and some little furniture was saved, but most of the contents were destroyed with the home. The barn and garage, to the rear of the residence, were saved only with great difficulty, owing to the intense heat. That these were not destroyed is due to the heroic efforts of the volunteers, who at great discomfort and some danger succeeded in keeping a stream of water playing over the endangered structures. The house burned with great rapidity and in less than an hour from the time the fire was discovered the beautiful home was only a pile of burning timbers, three chimneys standing alone for a time until one of them finally collapsed. The Maples was built some thirty-five years ago by the late James Robarts and was the home of himself and wife until their death. Since that time it has been occupied most of the time by Mr. and Mrs. F.G. Williams. It was owned by the ladies of the Russ family. Destroyed in the fire were many old heirlooms which cannot be replaced. Tapestries and family silver, more than 150 years old, were destroyed and the loss cannot be estimated in dollars and cents. (October 14, 1921)

The latter, after extracting the cartridges from the chambers and passing them to Neville, illustrated with the weapon his mode of procedure in the event of a hold up, and then handed the revolver back. Neville returned the cartridges to their places, and putting the weapon in his outside coat pocket with his hand still grasping it, the muzzle pointing out, remarked: "If a footpad should stop me now I'd shoot him this way without him seeing the gun". Yesterday, carpenters commenced the work of erecting the electric light building on the Crowley place east of Ferndale, and we understand that quite a number of men are to be employed and thus rush the job to completion at as early a date as possible. Last Saturday Manager Barnes started moving the engine from the plant up Francis Creek to the new location, and his assistants complete the pole line into town yesterday. It is hoped to have the new plant in operation by the first of the month, and when the new engine and generator arrives from the East and is placed in position it will give the company a double service, thus reducing our electric light troubles to the minimum... (August 23, 1904)

Commencing May 1st, all users of electricity in Ferndale and the surrounding country will be given a twenty-four hour service, meaning that lights and power will be at their command at any time of the day or night. This move has been under consideration by Manager Barnes of the Ferndale Electric Light Co. for some time, and he believes that his rapidly increasing business now justifies him in giving consumers this convenience. It will now be possible for the housewife during the hot summer days to do her ironing by electricity, and also her washing if she desires. Breakfast, luncheon and dinner may be prepared on an electric cooker, in fact the uses to which the joice may be put are almost innumerable... (April 18, 1911)

By a deal consummated yesterday the Western States Gas & Electric Co. became the owner of all the lines, equipment and business of the Ferndale Electric Light Co. and at once entered into possession of same. It had been known for several weeks past that negotiations for the purchase of the plant were in progress and it was generally expected that the Western States Co. would purchase. The change of ownership in the local concern is of much interest to consumers in this vicinity, as several important changes will result. The users of electricity will now purchase their joice direct from the producer instead of its passing through the hands of three companies as before and it is understood to be the policy of the Western States Co. to give the consumer the benefit of the reduction made possible by the direct dealing...Manager W.W. Barnes of the Ferndale Electric Light co. has accepted from the Western States Co. a position as manager of all the business south of Salmon Creek. this means that Mr. Barnes will have charge of all the light and power business of Eel River Valley, including Loleta, Fortuna, Hydesville, Rohnerville, and other towns as well as all on this side of Eel River...During the time the local concern has been under the management of Mr. Barnes the plant has been greatly improved and the service extended. When he took charge of the plant it was located up Francis Creek and power was generated by wood burning steam boilers. He soon moved the plant to its present location in East Ferndale and installed oil burners. The system was operated thus for a time and later was connected with the lines of the North Mountain Power Co. at Loleta., where electricity was carried to this side of the river and the local power plant discontinued, though the plant in East Ferndale was still maintained as headquarters.... (June 2, 1911)

J.E. Gries has been engaged of late in building a room for Wm. Crowley of East Ferndale, in which Mr. Crowley will shortly have a milking machine installed. (January 2, 1920)

Ferndale is to be the location of a new distributing plant to be established by the Shell Oil Company of California. It is reported that work will be commenced in the near future on the erection of the new station. It will be located on a piece of land purchased from Wm. J. Crowley near the site of the old electric light station in East Ferndale, at the intersection of the old road leading over the hill and the main road from Grizzly Bluff to Ferndale. The tanks will be so located that they may be filled by gravity from trucks on the hill road, while on the lower road it will be possible to load the distributing trucks from the tanks, also by gravity, the idea being the same as now in practice at the Standard Oil station at the foot of the Wild Cat road. (5/11/28) Clyde Goble of Fortuna has been named as manager for the Shell Oil Co. In Ferndale, and with his family will move to this town in a few days. They will make their home in the Buttle house on the Williams Creek Road...(8/31/28)

The Standard Oil Co. this week had a large sign AF-DALE@ painted on the roof of its station in Ferndale to locate this town for the benefit of aerial navigators who may be passing over...(5/10/29)

The lumber for Mrs. J.T. Buttle's new residence is being hauled. It will be erected on her place near Ferndale. (August 17, 1894)

The size of the house, over all, is 49x68 feet. The ground floor is divided into a large hall 8x27 feet, with a vestibule 3x8 feet, a sitting room, 15x17 feet with fire place and bay window 4x12 feet, a bed room, 15x17 with fire place, and a square bay window 3-1/2x8-1/2 feet, a conservatory 6x8 feet, a porch 5x6

feet, dining room 16x18 feet, also with fire place, a kitchen 15x16 a pantry 6x10 feet, a store-room 8x12 feet and a bath room 6x12 feet. W.R. Ward and wife will soon depart for Byran Springs, Mrs. Ward being a sufferer from Rheumatism. Mr. Ward has rented his land to B. Morolf and his residence to his brother, S.A. Ward. (October 30, 1896)

J.C. Bartlett and wife have purchased an acre of land in Ferndale from Ben Motolf, on which is situated the dwelling now occupied by Jos Froli and family. George Gries and family, who have been making their home in Kings County, this state, but late of Astoria, Oregon, returned to Ferndale the first of the week after about a two years' absence from the valley. Mr. Gries and family have taken up their home on Rose Avenue, and will again become permanent residents of this place. (July 10, 1908)

Robert Gibson and family are to occupy the house on Rose Avenue recently vacated by George Gries and family. (January 10, 1911)

Mr. and Mrs. Oliver Winslow, who have been occupying the Petersen tenement on Rose Avenue which was recently purchased by Wm. Benjamin, are to reside in the Geo. Gries cottage on the same Street. (October 20, 1911)

TYRRELL ADDITION

Property for Sale: Bids will be received at Ferndale until March 29th, 1896 for the following property: The residence and furniture of R.S. Tyrrell, the lot is 100x150 feet; 10 acres of land formerly belonging to the Gill estate; The whole or any part of the 83 acres known as the Tyrrell Farm at Ferndale, to be divided on east and west lines, etc. R.S. or H.A. Tyrrell. (January 31, 1896)

R.S. Tyrrell tells us that he is soon to survey and plat a number of lots on either side of the extension of Shaw Avenue, which he will dispose of at reasonable figures. This land is well located for residences and will meet with a ready sale. Ferndale's new Danish Church will probably be built in this locality as negotiations are now on with Mr. Tyrrell for a lot. (August 14, 1896)

R.S. Tyrrell is soon to open streets through his property in East Ferndale, and cut up his land into town lots which he will offer for sale. (March 26, 1901)

J.A. Shaw has just completed a neat map for R.S. Tyrrell of Tyrrell's addition to this town. The saw and hammer are continually ringing in this new addition, and thus our little town is spreading out its wings. (August 20, 1901)

The Ferndale town trustees held a brief session Monday evening, and received a map of Tyrrell's addition to the town of Ferndale. The same was taken under advisement, previous to acceptance, and pending a report of Civil Engineer J.A. Shaw as to acreage, etc. (August 22, 1902)

TT...R.S. Tyrrell was granted permission to take the map filed by him from the town office for the purpose of making certain alterations therein and to have the same recorded at the county recorder's office... (January 8, 1904)

The sale of a lot on Grant Avenue, Ferndale, by R.S. Tyrrell to one Alfred Alford, has been declared off, so Mr. Tyrrell informed us yesterday. There seems to have been a "nigger" in the purchase, at least rumor had it so. (March 1, 1904)

WATER WORKS PROPERTY

Cooper O.D. Whittier has finished for R.S. Tyrrell, of the Tyrrell Water Works, an immense redwood tank, perhaps the largest in this section of the country. Its capacity is 31,000 gallons, and it now occupies a position on the tower 40 feet above terra firma. It is estimated that the tank when full will weigh 125 tons. Mr. Whittier did a fine job, and the tank is but another evidence of his ability of a workman. (August 3, 1894)

R.S. Tyrrell, prop of the Cold Springs Water Works, requests his patrons not to use water in any other manner than for domestic and stock purpose. (June 11, 1897)

Work has been commenced making improvements to the Cold Springs Water Works of Ferndale. A new reservoir will be built alongside the present one, and four or five more springs will be opened to give an additional supply of water. Manager H.A. Tyrrell intends to place the system in first-class condition and will have the work completed in a short time (May 7, 1909)

A rumor has been in circulation the past few days that the "Tyrrell water works in Ferndale had been sold to Mr. George Hansen, a son-in-law of Mr. R. S. Tyrrell. (June 8, 1909)

The arrangements have been concluded, although the deeds have not yet passed, whereby D.A. Francis, Mrs. G.M. Brice and Mrs. R.W. Robarts become the owners of the Cold Spring Water Works of this town, formerly the property of H.A. Tyrrell. The deal will be concluded some time this week. D.A. Francis Land and Water Co., owning and operating the Francis Water works, will also manage the newly acquired system. The two will be kept separate, as at present, however, and will not be connected to the one reservoir. Mr. Francis, Mrs. Brice and Mrs. Robarts also purchased the feed mill which is located at the Cold Spring pumping plant, and the same will be operated as in the past. (January 4, 1910)

A new Industry for Ferndale... A new industry which may make Ferndale famous has been launched by R.W. Robarts. Mr. Robarts is to manufacture a chicken food, which will undoubtedly in time be known all over the country. The new business is being conducted at the Tyrrell pumping station in East Ferndale, which has been altered and enlarged for the purpose. Briefly stated, the chicken food is neither more nor less than dried meat, ground fine. The meat used is the bodies of healthy calves, which are killed at the Robarts & Frame slaughter house and after being dressed are hauled to the scene of operations in East Ferndale...Bert Wanzer will act as foreman of the new manufactory and will be assisted by Jimmy Robarts and a son of A. Laloli. (March 29, 1910)

Wm. Flowers and D.A. Branstetter last Wednesday completed the improvements at the Francis pumping station in East Ferndale, where R.W. Robarts is manufacturing his new chicken food. The factory is now in fine condition for operations. (April 12, 1910)

Town Trustees...No action was taken on the matter of the old water tower in East Ferndale, against which a complaint had been registered at a previous meeting by residents of that part of town, as the board had been informed that the tower is to be removed by the owners...(6/11/26)

The old water tower in East Ferndale has been torn down. The old structure was in use for many years by the Tyrrell Water Co., and at

one time it is stated there was a creamery in the lower part of it. It was later acquired by the Francis Land and Water Co. But has not been used for some years and was torn down on account of being in a dangerous condition. (7/9/26)

Miss Neemab is the only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D.D. Pierce, who have successfully conducted the Empire's store in our town for several years past. ... (September 9, 1902)

Pioneer R.S. Tyrrell, one of the oldest settlers in this section, expects to depart within the next few days for Alameda County, where he has bonded the Valle Vista farm of 220 acres one and one half miles south of Haywards, and where he will shortly be joined by his wife and daughter, Miss Bertha, to make their future home in that locality. Many old time friends throughout this valley will learn with regret of the departure of these good people from among us, but will join with the enterprise in wishing them all success in their new home. Mr. and Mrs. Tyrrell's son Elton, now conducting one of Mr. Tyrrell's ranches in southern Oregon, will probably join his parents at Valle Vista, his change of residence being necessary owing to illness. He has been a great sufferer with asthma since leaving the Cream City and it is hoped that the climate of Haywards will restore him to his former good health. It is Mr. Tyrrell's intention to sell all but seventy

acres of his recent purchase in Alameda County and he pronounces the land to be of the very best and as good as can be found in many a days travel. RUSS PARK

105-acre pleasure ground donated to Ferndale by Mrs. Russ...Splendid site for park is donated to the town...Mrs. Z. Russ has offered to the Town of Ferndale a splendid park site as a gift, and at the meeting of the Town Trustees next Monday evening the offer will be considered and that it will be gratefully accepted is a certainty. The site consists of 105 acres, and is a strip one-fourth of a mile wide, extending from the Francis Creek road to the road leading from Ocean Avenue past the Catholic cemetery. It has great possibilities for conversion in to a beautiful park and camping grounds, of which Ferndale has felt the need for many years past. In addition to the gift of the land Mrs. Russ reserves the privilege of expending \$2500 on the grounds for planting trees where she desires them. It will be good news to all Ferndale people to learn of the park which is to be theirs, and the name of Mrs. Russ will be revered so long as people enjoy the pleasure which will come through the possibilities of the pleasure ground. As a slight token of the gratitude which our people must feel to Mrs. Russ for her liberality. The Enterprise suggests that it be the unanimous choice that the new pleasure ground be known as aRuss Park@. (October 29, 1920)

68 Mrs. Russ= gift of park is formally accepted by town...(November 5, 1920)

A wonderful track of giant redwoods on the California State Highway near Orick, Humboldt county, and about sixty miles north of Eureka, has just been given to the State of California as a memorial to Humboldt County=s pioneers. It is the gift of Mrs. Zipporah Russ of Ferndale, in memory of her husband, Joseph Russ, who came around the Horn to CA in 1852, and also in memory of all the early settlers who helped to build up Humboldt county and the state. Mrs. Russ, as a young girl, crossed the plains with her family in 1853. The tract contains 166 acres and has a stand of close to thirty million feet of redwood, as well as much other timber. It is admirably

situated on the State Highway above Orick and is crossed diagonally by Prairie Creek, a good sized stream which adds to the beauty of the grove and to its advantages from the park and recreational standpoint...(July 13, 1923)

Mrs. Williams writes verses on Redwoods...(August 10, 1923)

...the people of this community to give some thoughtful consideration to what we have here in Russ Park...I can assure you that there are countless places in this land where a spot like this would be prized beyond all measure. It commands a magnificent view o the ocean, the valley and the hills that lie on the other side of the ridge. It already contains a variety of trees and shrubs that are prized by nature lovers...The time must come when the vision of Mrs. Georgia Russ Williams as to what nature can do for people through this beautiful spot will be realized. It will only require a little thought for us all to have the privilege of a share in bringing this to pass...the things that are somewhere else seem to interest us more than the things that have always been near. But happiness is largely a matter of learning to appreciate the things that are near...(2/21/30)

HOME ON HILL - 1-1/2 acres, more or less

R.D. Dunn has sold his place on the hill overlooking Ferndale to Sarah M. Rich, for \$700. (April 20, 1888)

A House on the Hill@ - A.L. Trousale and Maynard Michel have finished the work of repainting, repapering, and thoroughly renovating the interior of Ahouse of the hill@. (November 22, 1895)

One week from today the quarantine on the "house on the hill" will be raised...the inmates of the house have about fully recovered from their attack of diphtheria... (August 23, 1895)

An agreement was filed for record Friday, whereby Mrs. Minnie A. French relinquishes all rights to her minor child, May Bell French to Mr. and Mrs. James McCormack, who agree to adopt the child. Mrs. French is known in Ferndale as Edna Gardner. (October 4, 1895)

A woman in one of Ferndale's tenderloin districts, made an unsuccessful attempt to commit suicide Sunday night. It is rumored, by taking poison of some kind. She took too small a dose and is still in the land of the living. (April 29, 1902)

On Wednesday, 10/22, Mrs. John M. Ludwig purchased of Sarah M. Rich, now Sarah M. Foster, the following described property -- commencing at a stake on the south side of the public road leading from Ferndale to Grizzly Bluff, where the east line of the land of Grace Francis crosses said road...one and one-half acres more or less (October 28, 1913)

TT:...among other matters coming before the body was a petition from the Village Club asking that steps be taken to abolish the red-light district of the town. The matter was discussed at some length, but no action was taken in the premises, the petition being laid on the table for the present... (April 9, 1909)

One of the houses of Ferndale's under world, the lower one, was entered and robbed last week during the absence of the women in Eureka. It is said that considerable money and jewelry was stolen. (September 20, 1910)

About 11:30 o'clock Wednesday night Bessie Wilson, who resides in the house on the hill, shot herself through the breast with probably fatal results. The bullet, which was from a revolver, went completely through her body, severing the spinal chord and causing partial paralysis. Doctors Phelan and Ring were summoned and removed the woman to the Ferndale Hospital, where she is now receiving treatment. She asserts that the wound was accidentally inflicted while she was placing the revolver under her pillow. Her chances for recovery are but slight. (October 21, 1910)

Doctors Phelan and Ring of Ferndale and Marshall of Eureka yesterday operated on Bessie Wilson at the Ferndale Hospital for injuries received when the woman accidentally shot herself with a revolver some weeks ago. A portion of the bone was removed from the spine where the bullet passed through. But little chance for the recovery of the patient exists. (November 15, 1910)

Many Trials in February...Commencing on January 30th, the trial of James Harris, charged with the murder of Bessie Wilson in Ferndale, will be taken up... (January 10, 1911)

James Harris, charged with the murder of Bessie Wilson, was arraigned in Department Two of the Superior Court Friday morning and pleaded "not guilty." he was in court with his attorney, James F. Coenen. (January 10, 1911)

...James Harris pleaded guilty to the charge of murder in the second degree and was sentenced to twenty years in San Quentin by Judge Connick. Harris had been charged with first degree murder for the shooting of Bessie Wilson in Ferndale, and had previously pleaded not guilty...Harris told the story of the shooting in court, claiming that it was an accident, though it is said he had previously told a different version to District Attorney Gregor. There was a strong case against Harris, as could be seen at the time of the inquest in Ferndale. Harris is a disreputable character, and society will be the better off for his twenty years' residence at San Quentin. (January 13, 1911)

The Enterprise notes with pleasure the expression of sentiment of the Board of Trustees of Ferndale relative to the disorderly houses in this town. The subject is a difficult one to handle satisfactorily, for various reasons. In the past it has been impossible to secure the conviction of the keeper or inmate of a house of prostitution here, owing to lack of evidence. And public sentiment has not been greatly outraged, as the inhabitants of the redlight district in public have behaved decently. With rumors of a particularly notorious woman about to take up her residence here, the Town Trustees have expressed a determination that the town shall be made too uncomfortable for her to stay, and unless her operations are confined entirely to her own house, without annoyance to respectable people living near, she will doubtless be glad to bid Ferndale a permanent farewell. The police officials of the town will see that no breach of the public peace or morals is permitted, and that the respectable people of the town, living in the neighborhood of the ill-famed resorts, as well as the public in general, are given full protection of the law. (April 25, 1911)

W.J. Eglin appeared before the board and made complaint against the lower house in the redlight district, which is situated close his home. He stated rumor has it that the house is to again be opened by some particularly undesirable parties, and desired to have the trustees take steps to prevent the nuisance. The board decided that nothing could be done until a breach of the peace is committed, in which event the town will probably be made too warm to hold the offenders. (April 25, 1911)

Helen Clifford, landlady of "the house on the hill", the redlight resort of this town, was shot last Sunday afternoon, reports of the affair giving it as an accident, which is the version of the shooting given by the woman herself. The shooting took place about two o'clock and Dr. Lane of Ferndale was at once summoned by telephone by one of the other women in the resort. The Clifford woman was found by Dr. Lane to be suffering with a wound in the left breast, caused by a bullet from a 32-calibre revolver. The sheriff's office was notified of the shooting, and Sunday evening Sheriff Redmond arrived to make an investigation of the affair. The inmates of the house are firm in declaring the shooting to have been accidental, stating that while the Clifford woman was taking some clothing from a bureau drawer in which the revolver was kept the weapon was discharged. The affair has some of the same characteristics as had the shooting of Bessie Wilson a couple of years ago in the same resort. It was given out that the shooting of the Wilson woman was accidental, but before her death some of the inmates of the house weakened and informed the officers that a man named Harris had shot her. Harris was tried, convicted and is now serving twenty-five years in San Quentin. It is rumored that two shots were fired in Sunday's affair, one going into the floor. If this is true, it is hard to understand how it could have occurred accidentally. It is not known what conclusion sheriff Redmond reached in the matter, and as yet no action has been taken. There was a man in the house when he shooting occurred, besides the other women inmates. (June 10, 1913)
