## THE NAPA VALLEY GENEALOGICAL AND BIOGRAPHICAL SOCIETY

The Society was founded by Marian E. McGuire in July of 1974 as an offshoot of the Napa County Bicentennial Commission. There were 135 charter members by the first membership meeting in January 1975 and the Society has grown rapidly to its present status of a highly respected educational organization. Incorporation as a non-profit organization was accomplished in June of that same year.

In March 1975 the doors to our library were opened. Those using our facility found it housed in just one small room, with a few shelves of books. As our membership increased and we were financially able to purchase books (or they were donated or loaned), more space was needed, and we acquired the use of two additional rooms. Our holdings are now over 4000 volumes -- and still growing.

Instructional classes are offered in beginning genealogical research, as well as clinics for specialized help and regional study groups. Our meetings are of a very high caliber, with timely, interesting, informative topics, from which we all benefit. The Society's highly successful annual "Roots and Shoots" seminars were begun in 1978, bringing to the area the very finest genealogical teachers and lecturers.

### Objectives of the Society

1. To promote interest in genealogical and related historical and biographical research.
2. To provide instruction in research techniques involving evidence, proof and documentation stressing accuracy and ethics.
3. To accumulate and preserve manuscripts, documents, records, family histories and other genealogical holdings through the establishment of a genealogical library.
4. To serve as a medium for sharing knowledge and educational and social activities.
5. To encourage compilation and publication of records, family histories and biographies.

## ESTABLISHMENT OF INDEPENDENT NATIONAL ARCHIVES &amp; RECORDS ADMINISTRATION

Varney Nell, President, National Genealogical Society was a witness before the Subcommittee on Legislation and National Security, House Committee on Government Operations, on March 7 of this year, speaking in support of H.R. 3987, a bill to establish an independent National Archives and Records Administration.

Mr. Nell noted that in recent years family history research has become one of the principal avocations of the American people and that no group in our society is more interested than genealogists in the future of the National Archives and Records Service (NARS), as records held by NARS, including census, military, passenger arrival, and federal land records, are invaluable sources in genealogical and family history research. Genealogists constitute, by far, the largest single group of users of National Archives records and facilities.

He lamented the fact that genealogists across the country have become increasingly concerned in recent years that the status of the National Archives as a service within the General Services Administration is undermining its ability to fulfill its mission to identify, preserve, and make available to the public the historically valuable records of the federal government.

The current Archivist of the United States, Dr. Warner, and the people who work with him were complimented for continuing to pursue programs and projects to meet the needs of genealogical researchers. Examples of which are: publication of the Guide to Genealogical Research in the National Archives; reestablishing inter-library loan of microfilm by contracting with a private company to operate a census microfilm rental program; installation of a slide/tape show next to the microfilm reading room to instruct and orient new genealogical researchers on the use of National Archives records; and, the publication of a series of select catalogs of NARS microfilm publications, the first two of which are already available.

Mr. Nell stated that budget constraints over a period of years and the more recent budget cuts have led inevitably to some deteriorations in service to the public and, more important, have precluded steps that might have been taken to make NARS records more readily available to researchers.

Cited was the fact that the General Services Administration, in a recent report to Congress, noted the increasing dissatisfaction on the part of the public with the slow processing of orders for military records and that the Archives had on hand more than 1,800 overdue search and copy requests and 2,000 requests for refunds.

The N.G.S. President further stated that he had been told that the waiting time for records to be delivered to researchers in the central research room has lengthened, and that these problems flow directly from the severe reduction in staff that occurred in 1981 and 1982.

Also it was asserted that many of the records used frequently by genealogists have not been microfilmed and cannot be microfilmed given current budget levels. For instance, with minor exceptions, no compiled military service records or pension application files are available on microfilm for periods other than the Revolutionary War. These records can be examined only in the central research room in Washington, D.C., and the same is true for federal land records, which are available only at the General Archives Division in Suitland, Maryland.

Mr. Nell declared, "More serious consequences of the budget constraints under which NARS has operated for more than a decade are those that are not evident to the researcher today but may have grave implications for the future. For instance, it has not been possible to recruit and train a new generation of archivists. The last class of trainees was hired five years ago, and many of them were lost in the 1982 reduction in force. The problems associated with an overcrowded and outdated National Archives building can only increase in the future. Lack of adequate climate control in records

storage areas may contribute to the deterioration of those records. A slowdown in the accessioning of records, due to a lack of both staff and space, postpones the time when these records will be available to researchers.

If the National Archives is to carry out its mission to identify, preserve, and make available to the public the historically valuable records of the federal government it must have the authority and the funding commensurate with those responsibilities. We at the National Genealogical Society believe the evidence is compelling that that authority and funding will not be available as long as the National Archives remains a part of the General Services Administration."

Recommendations to strengthen NARS were: 1. The Archivist of the United States should be appointed by the President with the advice and consent of the Senate, based on his or her professional qualifications, for a term of sufficient length to provide for continuity of leadership; 2. Statutory authority for all archival and records management programs, including field operations, should be returned to the Archivist; 3. The National Archives should be enabled through an independent budgetary process to prepare, defend, and execute its own budget in order to achieve adequate funding for its programs.

In his final statement Mr. Nell is quoted as saying, "These provisions are at the heart of H.R. 3987. Mr. Chairman, we commend you for your sponsorship of this bill, and we urge its approval by your subcommittee as the best means of restoring to the National Archives the authority it must have if it is to preserve the priceless historical documents of the federal government for the benefit of this and future generations of Americans."

(If you agree with the recommendations of the National Genealogical Society on this bill, write your Congressman and let him know. -- NOW!)

### *This & That from Here & There*

In searching for an ancestor's death record, have you overlooked a source that will be able to assist you? For instance, the person who is most closely connected with the event, your "friendly undertaker". The current issue of the National Directory of Morticians can give you the name of the mortuary and the address where you may write. You can get the information from your local mortuary or your local library reference desk. -- Be concise when writing to the mortician. Don't ramble. Give him the name and death date of the person if at all possible. Don't throw in a lot of verbiage that will only confuse the person to whom you are writing. -- By all means, send a SASE. -- Ask if the mortician has the place of interment. If they took care of the funeral arrangements, who was the family member in charge. -- And, finally, ask if there is anyone who might be able to give you further information. THE BEST LAID PLANS.....THE WILL OF ISHAM WESLEY WEST

*The will of Isham Wesley West, dated 7 October 1839, is the first of a packet of Warrick County Indiana court records which develop an interesting story--the deceased was very definite in his wishes...but the record shows that a will is far from the final document to research in a probate packet! One can only imagine the family rift which must have occurred from the court action taken by the widow...and her new husband. The final document makes known the family legend which had evolved some 90 years later.*

In the name of God amen I Isham West of the County of Warrick in the State of Indiana being of sound mind and memory thanks be to God for his mercies, Knowing the uncertainty of this mortal life and the Certainty of death and in order to arrange my temporal affairs do constitute and make this my last will and testament revoking all others by me before this time made or entered into.

Item first I will my body to the Ground from whence it came untill the morning of the resurrection and my soul to God who gave it.

Item second I desire that out of my personal property all my just debts be paid as soon as the nature of the case will admit of--

Item third I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Elizabeth West during her natural life should she so long remain my widow the North half of the East half of the South West quarter of Section No. twenty four in Township No five South of Range No nine west also the SW $\frac{1}{4}$  of the South East quarter of Section No twenty four Town No five South of Range No. 9 west untill my son Adam Clark West arrives at the age of Eighteen years at which time he is to take possession of the said last mentioned tract of Land and enjoy the same as his own To be disposed as his own in right of this my own. And in the event of his death before arriving at the age of Eighteen Then and in that case the said tract of Land is to remain in the possession and under the full control of my said wife during her life should she so long remain my widow and after the death of my beloved wife or in the event of her marriage and in the event as aforesaid of the death of my son Adam Clark West before he arrives at the age of Eighteen I desire that the last mentioned tract of Land to wit the South West quarter of the South East quarter of Section No twenty four Township No five South of Range No nine West to be divided equally between my three sons Luther W., Riley W. & Isham W. West. And I desire it to be expressly understood that my said wife shall not be debarred from taking timber from off of any of the land I now have title to in the event that she should need it for the purpose of keeping in repair the farm by these presents willed to her & not being able to procure it off of the said first mention tract to her willed.

Item fourth I bequeath and give to my son Riley Willshire West the North West quarter of the South East quarter of Section No twenty four in Township No Five South of Range No Nine West

Item Fifth I give and bequeath unto my son Isham Wallace West the South half of the East half of the South West quarter of Section No twenty four Township No five South of range No Nine West

Item Sixth I give and bequeath the north half of the East half of the South West quarter of Section No twenty four in Township No five south of Range No Nine West at the death or in the event of my beloved wife's marriage to my youngest son Luther Wesley West.

Item Seventh I Give & bequeath to my son William West One Dollar in Cash to be paid One Year after my deceased

Item Eighth I Give and Bequeath to my son Brittain West a Fillay Known by the Name of Toby & my Rifle gun called long billy

Item Ninth I Give and bequeath to my son Isham Wallace West a Horse colt 2 years old last spring known by the name of Ball and my Rifle Gun called London

Item Tenth I Give and bequeath to my sons Adam Clark West & Rily Wilshire West a colt each so soon as the same can be raised and be spared from the use and service of my said wife

Item Eleventh I Give and bequeath to my daughters Elenor, Sally Reynolds, and Elizabeth Jane West each a Bed and necessary bedding at the age of Eighteen if in the opinion of my Executor and Executrix the same can be done without injury to the convenience and comfort of my wife & family in the suport of those under the age of Eighteen

Item twelveth I give and bequeath to my beloved wife all my wearing apparel Also my family Bible to decend at her death or marriage to my Eldest son and so on to my youngest son and should it last so long then to my Eldest daughter and so to my youngest Daughter My Object is to have it kept in my family

Item thirteenth I give and bequeath further to my children all my books as a circulating library amongst the whole making my Executor & Executrix herein after appointed Librarians And in the event of the death of my Executor & Executrix the last of them acting before their death to appoint one of my children as their successor as Librarian an so on to continue to be handed out in Librarian form to my children--The books never to be sold or removed any considerable distance from the major part of the family

Item Fourteenth I hereby appoint my beloved wife Elizabeth West and Isham Wallace West my Executor & Executrix of this my last will & Testament and it is my desire that imediately upon my decease that they should take an inventory of my personal property not positively and unconditionally in this my will disposed of and to sell so much thereof at private sale as soon as circumstances will admit as will to pay all my debts And the remainder of my personall property at the death of my beloved wife or in the event of her marriage to be Equally divided between all of my then living children.

In testimony of which I have hereunto set my hand & Seal on this the 7th day of October in the Year 1839. /s/ Isham West

Know all men by these presents that Saml Bradford & R.C. Matthewson all of Warrick County are held and firmly unto the state of Indiana in the sum of one thousand dollars for the payment of which, well and truly to be made and done, we bind ourselves our heirs, executors and administrators, jointly and severally, firmly, by these presents sealed with our seals and dated this day Oct 1st 1846.

The condition of the above obligation is such that if the above bound Saml C Bradford shall diligently and faithfully execute the duties and trusts committed to him as adminstrator of the estate of Isham West deceased and will obey all orders and decrees of the probate court of Warrick County, made pursuant to law tuching the administration of the estate entrusted to him, then the above obligation is to be void and of none effect otherwise to be and remain in full force and virtue in law.

Edwards the Auditor at boonville promised about 3 months ago to look up when grandpaw settled north of Chandler But never did. There is no one interested. They came here from South Carolina in time of slavery. Brought his slave with him. Was ofered \$1,000 for him but would not sell old Nathin. Set him free here but the darky would not leave him. He married finely, died, I think in about 1859, they are buried at Milersburgh yard. Both have tomb stones No one suspects they were colored. He bore our name of West.

Do recollect him. Asked Aunt Mary seemed to know nothing. the grandson John Web said he was a section hand when they dug the old canal. When some fellow died was buried on the bank. Uncle would preach his funeral. Uncle Walis never saw him but once. I was about 6 or 8 yrs old. they came here from Kansas. When the grass hoppers eat up every thing and they had to eat the grass hoppers. But finally went back. the last I ever heard of them. Uncle Rile have only faint recolections of him. Think he gave me a bumb watch--not sure.

Sallie West married Speed Elis, 2 children were born. Sis (Sarah) and Columbus. Live near me now. He is 83 yrs old. But seems to have anything at all. Sis is dead. Clarck West, Uncle Dock as we called him, he was a minister. Had 6 children. One bad boy turned bandet. Was shot by the sherif. Uncle broke up folering him to catch him and reform him. Shot in Kansas, the family that are left are in Oklahóma where he died. lived to 90 yrs old. Aunt Lizy married Harmon Harpool. Had 3 boys and 2 girls. Uncle died then she married, a Shedric Dial, they parted then married a Ben Miller, they parted then married a William Murphy. But she died first.

Luther West my father married Mary Mitchem 3 boys & 3 girls. Ellen, Sadie, Annie; Ellen and Annie are gone. Joseph, Isham and John still here. Mother died

### LIFE'S JOURNEY ENDS PRISONER'S GUARD WILLIAM WALLACE KENNEDY SUCCUMBS TO DISEASE

Wall Kennedy is no more. For twenty-one years he served this city faithfully and efficiently as Prisoners' Guard, cleaning and building streets and gutters, flushing the sewers, and doing whatever else came to his hand as chief of the chain gang.

The community will miss Wall, not alone on account of his well performed official duties, but also because of his unique personality. "Old Desperate's" stories have served to enliven many a gathering, have set "Laughter holding both his sides" on many an occasion, and his quaint philosophy has pointed many a moral and adorned many a tale.

Though the charm of his stories consisted largely in his own inimitable manner of relating them and many of them bore a local flavor, there were some that found their way into the prints of other communities, even as far distant as the Atlantic coast, and one, the story of driving a swarm of bees across the plains, was published in the London Times and in one of the Paris papers.

Though he walked in an humble sphere, he sought and attained the noblest object of his life, that of affording happiness to others. In his family circle he was the personification of gentleness. Among his acquaintances--and they were numberless--he was good nature and kindness itself.

He took a personal pride in the appearance of the streets of the city, and they are a handsome monument to his industry and ingenuity. Even in the delirium of his last illness his thoughts were upon his loved labor.

He always took a lively interest in the welfare, spiritual as well as physical, of the prisoners in the county jail, and was their friend, confidante and adviser. He was a firm believer in the efficiency of moral suasion and had no faith in the doctrine of total depravity. He sought the good traits in every character, and his confidence was seldom misplaced.

He was a part of the town. He filled a niche in the community that must hereafter be vacant. He was everybody's friend, from the youngest to the oldest. In the line of duty he thought only of the public weal. His personal comfort or welfare was not considered. It was this fact that caused his death. "Greater love hath no man than that he lay down his life for his friends."

William Wallace Kennedy was born in (*Tippencanoe Co.*) Indiana, December 10th, 1833. In 1846 he went as a teamster to Santa Fe. He then settled in Buchanan county, Mo., where he remained with his brother on a farm for one year. In the spring of 1849 he returned to Indiana and purchased cattle and an outfit and came across the plains to California, arriving in September. He mined for six years at Spanish Ravine in El Dorado county, and in 1857 came to Napa county, and worked for the late Dwight Spencer for two years. In 1859 he returned to Indiana and a few months later went to Missouri and purchased a farm. In August, 1862, he enlisted in the 35th Missouri Volunteer Infantry, and served nine months. At the battle of Springfield he was wounded, on account of which disability he received his discharge from the service. In 1864 he returned to California. His first wife, who was a sister of the late John Hogan, died in 1879. Their children are Mrs. Burt Switzer, Mrs. Chas. Harren, Andrew and Albert.

He afterward married Mrs. Dennison, who survives him. He also leaves several grandchildren and a stepdaughter, in whom he took a kind and fatherly interest.

The funeral will be held at 4 o'clock this afternoon from the family residence on Stockton street.

Wall Kennedy's funeral was held Sunday afternoon from the family residence on Stockton street. Rev. J.H.N. Williams officiated and a quartette consisting of Chas. and Lawrence Welti, F.O. Mower and E.S. Gridley, sang "One Sweetly Solemn Thought" and "Good Night." The pallbearers were T.B. Stewart, Wm. Shepard and N.F. Peck from Kit Carson Post G.A.R., and Sheriff Dunlap, Assessor Meacham and County Clerk Collins. There were a number of handsome floral pieces from friends and city and county officials and a large one from the Alert Hose Co. The casket was draped in the National colors. The Alert Hose Co. escorted the remains to the cemetery where the Grand Army burial service was conducted by Past Post Commander G.M. Francis. Among those who attended were the City and County officials who reside in Napa.

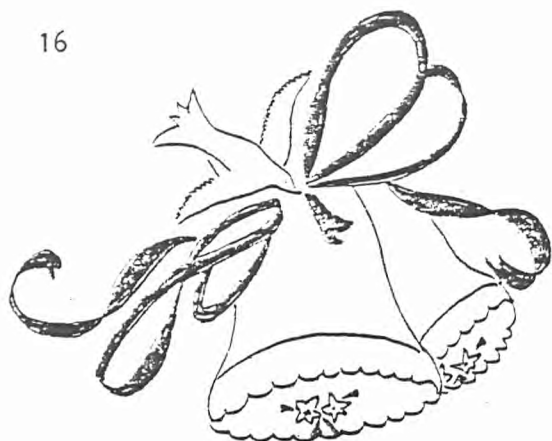

# Family Record

## HUBBARD

Samuel Hubbard, Jr., born 5 Sep 1798, Guilford Co. NC, was the son of Samuel Hubbard, Sr. and his wife Polly and the grandson of James Hubbard and Elizabeth Maddox of Burlington, NJ. James Hubbard, born 1707, died 1812, served in the Revolutionary War in NC.

When Samuel Hubbard, Jr. was approximately ten years old his father's family emigrated to Fayette Co. KY where they remained about eighteen months, then moved to Warren Co. OH where they lived about two years. They later lived in Butler Co. OH before moving to Franklin Co. IN.

Samuel Hubbard, Jr. was married on 9 Nov 1821, Brookville, IN to Nancy Glidewell, born 7 Jul 1802, Laurens District, SC, the daughter of Robert Glidewell and Joanna Lovesy. Robert Glidewell served in the Revolutionary War from VA, and was at Yorktown when Cornwallis surrendered. Robert Glidewell and his wife are both buried in Old Franklin Cemetery, Franklin Co. IN. Records show that Robert Glidewell entered his land 15 Apr 1806, the southwest quarter of Section 34, Fairfield Twp., Franklin Co. IN, which was part of Dearborn Co. before Franklin Co. was formed early in 1811.

Samuel Hubbard, Jr. and his family moved to Fayette Co. IN around 1823 where he built for his family a log house and began improving his farm. Nancy Hubbard died on that homestead in Sep 1848 and is buried in Mt. Garrison Cemetery, Everton, IN with some of her children.

Samuel Hubbard, Jr. married his second wife, Elizabeth Ann Green, in May 1850 and in Apr 1856 the family moved to Wabash Co. IN, settling on Section 30, Twp. 28, Range 6, five miles northwest of Wabash, where he lived the remainder of his life. He and his wife are buried in Huff Cemetery where several of his children are also buried.

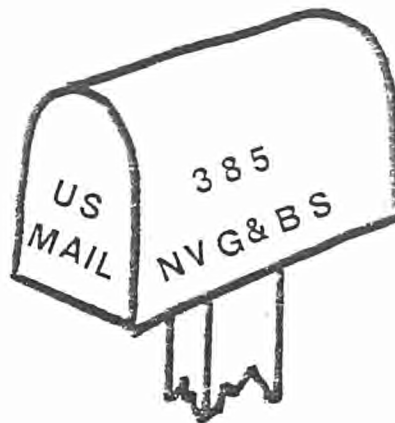

Effective 1 April 1984 all requests for copies of military service records or passenger arrival records held by the National Archives must be submitted on NATF Forms 80 and 81, respectively. After that date prior versions of these forms (NATF Forms 26 and 40) will not be accepted for processing and will be returned.--A change in payment policies will also take effect on 1 April. Currently NARS requires that payment accompany requests for copies of military and passenger arrival records. After 1 April payment should not be sent with NATF Forms 80 and 81. NARS will re-search the request, prepare copies of any records located, and hold the copies for three weeks or until payment is received, whichever is sooner. As soon as records are located and copied, the researcher will receive a bill and instructions for making a remittance.--Researchers should also submit a separate NATF Form 80 for each pension, bounty-land, or compiled military service record desired. Researchers have been able in the past to ask for all of these files for one veteran on one form. The change is designed to facilitate processing by the National Archives.--Copies of NATF Forms 80 and 81 may be obtained after 15 March by writing to Reference Services Branch (NNIR), National Archives and Records Service, Washington, DC 20408. The Federal Archives in San Bruno will be designated the "Leo J. Ryan Memorial Archives and Record Center" under legislation introduced in the House of Representatives by Congressman Tom Lantos. In introducing the bill on the floor of the House on 18 November 1983, the 5th anniversary of Leo Ryan's death, Congressman Lantos said, "It is particularly appropriate that a place of learning and scholarship should be named after Leo. Throughout his life he was both a student and teacher of American government. The official records of his accomplishments as a public servant will now be preserved in a building bearing his name." The legislation was approved by the House in record time. The bill was introduced just after noon, and the House passed it only 3 hours later. (From San Mateo County Genealogical Society, Volume 2 Number 12)



"How can I obtain information from the Social Security Administration on my relatives?" -- Social Security began in the late 1930's. Those who applied for an account number since that time will have an application on file which contains quite a bit of valuable information. To obtain this document, you must supply a photocopy of the death certificate of each individual for whom you make the request. -- Address your inquiry to your local Social Security office (they will forward the request to the main office.) -- Include the name and social security number of the person. Include a photocopy of the death record. State that you make the request under the F.O.I./P.A. (this refers to the Freedom of Information/Privacy Act which permits release of the data once an individual is deceased). Ask for a photocopy of the original application for social security number. -- The Social Security Administration is currently computerizing all the original applications. You will receive either a photocopy of the original application or a photocopy of the computerized version. -- Included will be name, names of parents, date and exact place of birth (usually EXACT places of birth are given even for foreign birth!), residence, place of employment == and the original has your relative's signature, as well! -- There is no cost for this service. The Census Bureau will hold meetings next month in Dallas and Columbia, S.C., to discuss the 1990 count - the first of more than 50 sessions nationwide in which people are invited to describe their "information needs." The bureaus said that the meetings are a cooperative effort involving businesses, libraries, professional groups and community and minority organizations interested in having specific types of information in the census county.
