

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# EXCERPTS FROM THE RECORDS OF THE FIRST PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH OF NAPA, CALIFORNIA

At a public meeting called in Napa City by the Rev. J. C. Herron at the Court House on Friday 19 Jan 1855, it was resolved that those present should organize themselves into a congregation to enable them more fully to carry out and observe the ordinances attendant upon religious worship.

The following persons then united themselves into a church -- John M. Hamilton, William L. Jacks, Hamlet Jacks, Mrs. Anne P. Hamilton, Mrs. Anna L. Jacks, Mrs. Kate A. Gilmore, Mrs. Mary Louisa Ogden, Mrs. Catherine M. Herron, Mrs. Amelia W. Jacks (Rev. Mrs. William), Miss Sarah A. Woodruff, Miss Sarah A. Smith.

J. M. Hamilton was unanimously elected ruling elder. Jeremiah Mansfield, James Lefferts, Robert R. Pierpoint, Fred Ogden and William C. L. Smith were elected trustees of the church for one year.

It was upon motion resolved that this organization be styled and known as, "The First Presbyterian Church of Napa". The congregation was then placed under the charge of the Rev. J. C. Herron and the meeting dismissed.

27 Jan 1855 - Mrs. Lavisa Thompson was added to list of members. J. M. Hamilton chosen clerk of session.

21 Jul 1855 - Mrs. Mary Ann Penewell was added to list of members.

5 Apr 1856 - Mrs. Pulaski Jacks and Miss Abbey L. Woodruff were admitted to this church on certificate of their being members in good and regular standing of the First Presbyterial Church of Elizabethtown and their names ordered enrolled with the list of members.

10 Jan 1857 - Benjamin F. McClure and Rhoda his wife and Thomas B. McClure and Margaret his wife were added to list of members.

29 Mar 1857 - Mr. Stephen and Mrs. Elizabeth Wing and Mrs. Rhoda Larimer were added as members.

3 Jan 1858 - James M. Thompson was added to list of members.

7 Jan 1858 - The congregation voted not to retain J. C. Herron as pastor for another year.

21 Mar 1858 - Thomas B. McClure was elected as elder and W. S. Jacks and B. Franklin McClure were elected as deacons. Rev. M. A. Williams from the Benicia Presbytery officiated as pastor and moderator.

28 Apr 1858 - Miss Amelia Jacks was added to list of members.

9 May 1858 - The congregation held a meeting to decide on a new pastor. Mr. Veeder of Sacramento and Mr. Fairbairn of Santa Rosa were considered. It was decided to call Mr. Veeder for one year.

4 Jul 1858 - Mr. Geo. E. Goodman was added to list of members.

2 Oct 1858 - Mr. and Mrs. Robert L. Thompson (Emma) from Monmouth, IL, Mrs. Josephine Rosekrans, Mrs. Mary Ann Van Pelt, Miss Latson and Miss Jacks were added to list of members.

3 Oct 1858 - Mrs. Rosekrans and Miss Latson were baptized by Rev. P. V. Veeder.

8 Jan 1859 - Mr. H. M. Rosekrantz, a former member of the Baptist Church of Halfmoon, Saratoga Co., NY was added to list of members. Mrs. Sarah H. Minney and Samuel W. Jacks were also added to list of members.

29 May 1859 - Rev. Peter V. Veeder was installed as pastor, with Rev. A. Fairbairn of Sacramento, Rev. W. C. Anderson of San Francisco and Rev. B. B. Bonham of Healdsburg conducted the service.

9 Jul 1859 - Mrs. Annie Smith, former member of Congregational Church of Providence, RI and Mrs. Nathan Coombs were added to list of members.

10 Jul 1859 - Mrs. Nathan Coombs was baptized.

24 Jul 1859 - Rev. W. A. Scott D. D. of San Francisco preached today.

18 Sep 1859 - Rev. Sylvester Woodbridge of Benicia preached today.

1 Oct - Mrs. Thomas Earl was added to list of members.

2 Oct - Mrs. Thomas Earl was baptized.

15 Apr 1860 - W. W. Estabrook, Mrs. N. A. H. Estabrook, Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Harvey, and Mrs. E. G. Mansfield were added to list of members.

29 Sep 1860 - Mrs. Mary L. Towle, Mrs. C. H. Montgomery, Mrs. Mary Jane Solomon and Miss Nancy Henry were added to membership.

6 Jan 1861 - Rev. L. T. Wells assisted with service.

19 May 1861 - Mr. David Ewing Thompson and Ann his wife were added to list of members.

20 Sep 1861 - Mrs. Jane Ross was admitted to membership.

29 Sep 1861 - Rev. George Burroughs D. D. and Rev. Thos. Frazer conducted service.

5 Apr 1862 - Mary Elizabeth Hagadorn was admitted to membership.

6 Apr 1862 - Miss Hagadorn was baptized.

12 Jul 1862 - Lewis and Andrew Bouton, former members of Congre- gational Church of Virgil(?) NY were added to membership.

13 Jul 1862 - Boutons were declared members in service conducted by Mr. Veeder.

4 Oct 1862 - W. Van Doren, former member of Presbyterian Church in Fulton MO was added as member.

26 Oct 1862 - Mrs. Lake was added to list of members.

8 Mar 1863 - Miss Lydia Cheny was added to membership list. Mr. W. Van Dorin transferred his membership to Presbyterian Church of Stockton.

5 Jul 1863 - Quarterly meeting of the session was omitted because of the funeral of Mrs. Langdon.

3 Oct 1863 - Mr. W. H. Hagadorn and Mrs. Gemima Hagadorn from First Congregational Church of Oakland and Miss Anna M. Tate from Second Presbyterian Church of Rock Island were added as members.

3 Jan 1864 - Mr. Alfred Warren Robinson was added to list of members. Mrs. D. A. Robinson from Trinitarian Congregational Church of Neponsett MA was also added.

21 Feb 1864 - Session met at house of Charles P. Allen. Miss Sarah Forshue Allen was baptized and added to list of members.

2 Apr 1864 - Mrs. Annie Smith requested transfer of her member- ship to the Howard St. Presbyterian of San Francisco and it was approved.

7 May 1864 - Mr. L. G. Oliver and Mrs. Catharine J. Oliver his wife were received on certificate from the church at Arcata CA and added to list of members. Miss Fanny K. Allen was added also.

8 May 1864 - Miss Fanny K. Allen was baptized.

25 Jun 1864 - Mr. Statham Wing and Mr. Robert S. Thompson are new elders, after Mr. Geo. E. Goodman declined the office. Miss Louisa A. Jacks was added to list of members. Rev. Charles C. Wallace of Placerville assisted with service.

1 Oct 1864 - Mr. Thomas Henderson from United Presbyterian Church of Cabin Hill, Delaware Co. NY was added as member.

4 FEB 1865 - George Simpson Thompson, infant son of James M. Thompson, was baptized.

1 Apr 1865 - Mrs. M. A. Van Pelt transferred her membership to another church.

9 Apr 1865 - Mrs. Margaret Jane Smith was added to membership.

1 Jul 1865 - Mrs. Mary R. K. Thompson from Calvary Church in San Francisco and John McLarlain(?) from St. Paul Church in San Francisco were added to membership.

9 Jul 1865 - Rev. Mr. Frasier from Santa Rosa preached today.

17 Sep 1865 - Mrs. Gordan and Miss Mary E. Gordon (now Mrs. Mary E. Applegate) were received on certificate from the church of Lenox, Mosser(?) Co. IL. Their letter was dated May 1863 - the reason of them not having united with any church before was they had not lived in any place when it was convenient.

29 Oct 1865 - Session directed the clerk to forward to Mr. L. G. Olive and Catharine J. Olive his wife letters of dismission from this church.

2 Jan 1866 - No session meeting since July 2nd 1865. Since the last Sabbath our late pastor the Rev. Mr. Veeder preached, the pulpit has been supplied by Rev. Mr. Frasier of Santa Rosa, Rev. Mr. Wiley of Bloomfield, Rev. Mr. Klink of Vallejo, Rev. Mr. Fein of Sonoma, Rev. Mr. Compton of Arcata, Rev. Mr. Edwards of Gilroy, Rev. Mr. Mosher of San Francisco, Rev. Mr. Wells of Oakland, Rev. Mr. Hempstreet of San Francisco and Rev. Mr. Candit from China.

3 Mar 1866 - Mrs. Marcia Goodman McGill of Mayamening(?) Church of Philadelphia, Miss Sarah F. McDonald of Presbyterian Church of Antesville LA and Miss Marian E. McDonald of Godfrey Presbyterian Church of Amana IL were added to list of members.

1 Apr 1866 - Rev. Mr. Candit has preached the last 3 months.

7 May 1866 - Rev. Mr. Wells has preached since Mr. Candit left on April 1.

13 May 1866 - Rev. F.L.S. Wiley of San Jose, Rev. Mr. Ely of Healdsburg, Rev. Mr. Fairbairn and Rev. Mr. McLarren of Ship Lancaster all took part in services. Mr. Hempstreet and Mr. Hammond were ordained.

19 Aug 1866 - Rev. Richard Wiley commenced his labor with us for 6 months. Since May 13th the pulpit has been filled by Mr. McLarren, Mr. Wells, Mr. Aveny, Mr. Buell, Mr. Fairbairn, Mr. Veeder and Mr. Candit.

13 Oct 1866 - Miss Charlotte E. Fapan from the Congregational Church of Essex VT and Mrs. Josephine Tustin were added to list of members.

4 Nov 1866 - Clerk was instructed by session to give letters of dismission, at their request, to Mr. Mary Louisa Ogden to Calvary Church in San Francisco and Deacon Benjamin F. McClure and Rhoda McClure his wife to Two Rock Church, Sonoma Co. CA.

11 Nov 1866 - Session directed clerk to give letter of dismission to Mrs. Amelia Veeder (formerly Amelia Jacks), at her request, to Calvary Presbyterian Church, S. F.

19 Mar 1867 - Mrs. Lucy H. Boggs from the Presbyterian Church of Lexington MO, Mrs. Elizabeth Martin McClellan from the Harvard Presbyterian Church in San Francisco, T. A. Larrimer, Donald McClenan, John T. McClure, David Ross, Isaac Tustin, W. H. Laughlin, Wm. C. S. Smith, Andrew Smyth, G. W. Towle, Miss Margaretta Alice McClure, Miss Susan G. Towle, and Miss Fanny K. Jacks were all added to membership.

30 Mar 1867 - Mr. Levi H. Mansfield, Mr. Henry Brown and Martin Henry Briggs were added to membership.

31 Mar 1867 - G. W. Towle, Isaac Tustin, Levi W. Mansfield, Wm. C. S. Smith and Henry Briggs were baptized. Infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Mansfield was also baptized.

21 Apr 1867 - After the morning service, with Rev. James Wylie acting as moderator, the congregation met and chose Rev. Richard Wylie as pastor.

21 Jul 1867 - Rev. Richard Wiley was installed as pastor. Rev. Dr. Ells of First Presbyterian Church San Francisco, Rev. T. S. Wylie of San Jose and Rev. P. V. Veeder of City College San Francisco conducted service.

29 Sep 1867 - Mrs. Sarah Fisher was received into church member- ship.

4

13 Oct 1867 - Mrs. Overton was received into the church by letter from the church in \_\_\_\_\_ CA.

1 Dec 1867 - Mrs. Pauline Steinhamer added to list of members.

15 Dec 1867 - Mary Tod, infant of Mr. and Mrs. Tustin, was baptized. Mr. Hagadorn wife and daughter, at their request, were given letters of dismission to the 1st Congregational Church in Antioch, Contra Costa Co. CA.

4 Apr 1868 - Mrs. Annie M. McClellan from Westminster Presbyterian Church of Santa Clara, Miss Samantha Bantan from the Congregational Church of \_\_\_\_\_\_NY, and Mrs. Head were added to the list of members. Margaret Wilson, infant child of Mr. T. M. Thompson and wife, was baptized.

12 Apr 1868 - Child of Mrs. Head was baptized.

19 Apr 1868 - Children of Mr. W.C.S. Smith and wife baptized.

30 May 1868 - Rev. Mr. Richardson, agent CA Bible Soc., preached.

3 Jul 1868 - Mr. Joseph R. McKee and wife from Sixth Presbyterian Church, Pittsburgh PA were received into membership.

5 Jul 1868 - Rev. W.A. Williams of Oregon provided the service assisted by Rev. Jas. Wiley.

10 Oct 1868 - Mrs. M.C. Ritchey from Illinois and Miss Emily Luella Dewig were added to list of members. George Edmond, infant child of Mr. Geo. E. Goodman and wife, was baptized.

11 Oct 1868 - Miss Emily Luella Dewig was baptized.

22 Nov 1868 - Session met at home of Mr. James H. Smith in lieu of church, he being unable on account of his feeble health to come to the church. Having given evidence of his sincerity and faith Mr. Smith was admitted to church membership. The funeral of Mr. Smith was held the following Wednesday.

2 Jan 1869 - Mrs. Jane McKay, who was a member of Presbyterian Chuch in Chilicothe OH many years ago, and Mrs. Mary Jane Bann from Calvary Presbyterian Church in San Francisco, were added to list of members.

3 Jan 1869 - Elder Wm. T. Linville and Mrs. Amanda J. Linville his wife from church in Brownsville OR, Mr. R.B. Bann and Mr. David Emerson were added to list of members.

8 May 1869 - Mr. Robert McKay, Mrs. Susan Elizabeth Emerson, Miss Lizzie M. Dewig, Mrs. Agnew M. Hamilton from the First Presbyterian Church of Iowa City in Iowa, Mrs. Hannah Dudding from the Presbyterian Church at Murphysboro, Mrs. Charlotte Brown from the Second Presbyterian Church in Elmira NY and Mrs. Sophia W.G. Pearles from the Presbyterian Church of Grand Rapids were all added to list of members. Thomas Montgomery, infant son of Thomas and Mr. Frances Earl, was baptized. Panthen Boan, Albert Gallitan and Henry Evans, children of Albert G. and Lucy H. Boggs were also baptized.

9 May 1869 - Rev. Mr. Thompson assisted with service. Mrs. Susan Elizabeth Emerson and Miss Lizzie M\_\_\_\_Dewig were baptized.

31 Jul 1869 - Mrs. Elizabeth Horne from First Presbyterian Church of Virginia, Nevada was admitted to membership.

6 Nov 1869 - Adelade Frances and Philip King, children of Henry and Charlotte Brown, were baptized. Mrs. Rossamond Fay from First Presbyterian Church in San Francisco and Miss Catherine A. Muir(?) from United Presbyterian Church of Providence RI were admitted to membership.

5 Feb 1870 - Dr. Joseph O. Boggs and Mrs. Deborah Boggs and Mrs. W.R. McCutchen were received by letter from the Presbyterian Church of Westport MO/MA. Mrs. Margaret Podry(?) was also added to list of members. Frank Mathieu, infant son of G.W. and Mary L. Towle was baptized.

20 Mar 1870 - At his request Rev. Richard Wylie was given a years absence as pastor and Rev. James Wylie was selected to fill the pulpit during this time.

30 Apr 1870 - Mrs. Jessie B. Rainey from Calvary Presbyterian Church of San Francisco and Mr. Albert G. Boggs were added to list of members.

1 May 1870 - Mr. Albert G. Boggs was baptized.

5 Jun 1870 - Mr. John Deering was added to membership.

6 Aug 1870 - Sat. Dr. Charles F.A. Nichols from the Lafayette Street Presbyterian Church of Buffalo NY, Mrs. Ellen G. Nichols, his wife, from the Presbyterian Church of Springville NY were admitted to membership. Miss Jeramina Booth from the Second Presbyterian Church of Alexandria VA, Clarence Deering, Lilburn W. Boggs, Arthur Burleigh Barker, Mrs. Caroline W. Barker, Mrs. Issabella Townsend and Margaret Dewitt Jacks were also added to list of members.

7 Aug 1870 - Sun. James Pollack, Mary R. Pollack, Mary C. Jacks were added to list of members. Lilburn W. Boggs, Clarence Deering, Arthur Burleigh Barker and Barker were baptized. The three children of Mrs. Nancy Sackett and the infant child of Mr. Joseph R. McKee and wife were also baptized.

5 Feb 1871 - Mr. Phillip Palmer and Amanda his wife, from the Cumberland Presbyterian Church in Suisun, Solano County, were added to list of members. Mrs. Anna Hunter was baptized by Rev. James Wiley.

23 Apr 1871 - Elizabeth Jane, infant child of Mr. and Mrs. Ross was baptized by Rev. James Wiley.

13 May 1871 - Mr. E.I. Smith and Mrs. Alma Smith, his wife, from the First Presbyterian Church in Stockton, Mrs. Emily W. Colman, Mrs. Mary D. Sylvester and Miss Ann Sylvester from the First Church of Christ in Colchester CT, Mr. Edgar Jacks and Mrs. Sarah Jacks, his wife, from the Presbyterian Church of Andoan(?) IL, Mrs. Margaret Allan and Miss Mary Finley Boggs were all added to list of members. Mary Emma, daughter of David and Susan Elizabeth Emerson and Hattie Langdan, daughter of Henry and Charlotte Brown, were baptized by Rev. James Wiley.

14 May 1871 - Sun. Mr. M.D. Ritchey was requested to defer his connection with the church for the present.

5 Aug 1871 - Sat. Mrs. Jane Imrie, wife of William, from the United Presbyterian Church at Cabin Hill, Delaware Co. NY, Mr. William Imrie and Miss Lizzie McClure were added to membership.

8 Oct 1871 - Sun. John Andrew, son of William and Jane Imrie, was baptized.

4 Nov 1871 - Sun. Miss Docia Crow was added to membership.

5 Nov 1871 - Sun. Miss Docia Crow was baptized by Rev. Wylie.

4 Jan 1872 - Daniel and Catherine, twin children of Mr. and Mrs. Duncan Campbell, were baptized.

3 Feb 1872 - Sat. Mary Estabrook and William, daughter and son of Mr. and Mrs. Ira Francher, and Mary Isabela, daughter of Mrs. Jessie B. Rainey, were baptized. Rev. Richard Wiley was back as pastor. Mr. Duncan Campbell and his wife, Mrs. Alexy Campbell, from St. Andrews Church, Kincardine, Mr. and Mrs. Duncan A. Fraxer, from James Church, New Glasgow, Mr. Ira Fancher, Miss Laura D. Robinson, Daniel R. McLennan, John H.G. Keine, Peter Henrichs and Miss Annie Henrichs were all added to membership.

4 Feb 1872 - Sun. Miss Laura D. Robinson was baptized.

4 May 1872 - Sat. Mrs. Sarah W. Haines, Mrs. Edward Clark, Mrs. Alice Smith, Gluys, Miss Sophie M. Alstrum and Alex Thompson were added to membership.

5 May 1872 - Sun. Rev. Dr. Boardman preached and Alex Thompson was baptized.

3 Aug 1872 - Sat. Mrs. Charlotte Blake, Mrs. Mary E. Bowman and Martha Caroline, daughter of Mrs. Isabella Townsend, were baptized.

2 Nov 1872 - Sat. Mrs. Scott from Church of Scotland, Forteviet, Mrs. Lucy A. Garfield from Congregational Church of Monteray MA, Mrs. Fannie C. Garfield from Congregational Church of Fall River MA, and Mrs. Mary Aikin from Presbyterian Church of Bodega CA were all added to list of membership.

31 Jan 1873 - Sat. Mrs. Mary J. Vanderlip from Presbyterian Church in Vallejo, Mrs. Hulda Cotterill, Miss Jane Ross, Miss Emma Cooper, Miss Annie C. Wilson, Miss Lizie B. Thompson and George H. Thompson were added to the membership list.

# REVOLUTIONARY WAR COMPILED MILITARY SERVICE RECORDS

Wars have been a recurring factor in American history, and the records created as a result of military service or by application for veterans' benefits are major sources for genealogical research. These records are especially important to those who wish to prove military service by an ancestor in order to qualify for membership in a patriotic or hereditary society. Historically, there has been particular interest in Revolutionary War service, and the records of the federal government relating to such service are readily available to researchers.

The two groups of military and veterans' records most frequently used in genealogical research are compiled military service records and pension application files. Compiled military service records serve primarily to document military service. Pension application files, while also proving military service, usually contain in addition personal information about the veteran and sometimes about members of his family.

This article will describe the compiled military service records for those who served in the American army during the Revolutionary War. The next article in the "Federal Sources" series will deal with Revolutionary War pension application files.

A compiled military service record consists of an envelope, known as a jacket, that contains one or more cards on which information about a soldier has been abstracted from original records. These abstracts were so carefully and thoroughly prepared that there is seldom any need to examine the original records.

In the case of the Revolutionary War, most of the records in the custody of the War Department were destroyed by fire in 1800. In 1873 an effort was begun to collect records relating to the war from other federal departments, the states, and private sources. This collection, known as the War Department Collection of Revolutionary War Records, now constitutes Record Group 93 at the National Archives. It is from this collection that the compiled military service records for Revolutionary War soldiers were abstracted.

Information found in these records may include the soldier's rank, the military organization in which he served, the state from which he served, and the dates his name appeared on muster rolls, payrolls, rank rolls, returns, receipts for pay and subsistence, and in a series of record books.

Because of the loss of original records, the compiled military service records for Revolutionary War soldiers are fragmentary. They usually do not reveal the full extent of the soldier's service, and they may not indicate the highest rank he attained during the war. Only rarely is any personal information found.

In some instances, a jacket will contain only one card showing, for example, the date on which the soldier received a certificate for the balance of his pay without indicating the organization in which he served. In other cases, a record may document a soldier's service with a particular unit month by month for a period of months or years. Abstracted muster rolls and other documents may indicate the soldier's date and term of enlistment, periods of time during which he was sick or wounded, on furlough, or transferred to another unit, and the dates on which he was promoted, was taken prisoner, deserted, was discharged, or died. Occasionally a document will give the place of birth and the place of residence at the time of enlistment.

The lack of personal information in the records may make it difficult to establish conclusively that the soldier whose record you have found is actually your ancestor. Therefore, research in the compiled military service records should be supplemented with searches for information about your ancestor's Revolutionary War service in family records, local histories, obituaries, tombstone inscriptions, records of patriotic societies, and pension records.

You should also bear in mind that the records of two men with the same name who served in the same military unit may have been filed by error in one jacket. On the other hand, there may be two jackets for one soldier who served in more than one military organization during the course of the war. When you find your ancestor's name listed more than once in a compiled military service record index, the records may pertain to one person or to two or more persons with the same name.

Because of the incomplete nature of these records, failure to find a record

for your ancestor does not necessarily mean that he did not serve.

Despite their limitations, the compiled military service records for Revolutionary War soldiers constitute the most complete record available of service in that war and, therefore, they are an invaluable source in establishing Revolutionary War service by an ancestor. They are also readily available to researchers.

The records have been microfilmed on 1,096 rolls of National Archives Microfilm Publication M881. They are arranged by state, thereunder by military organization, and thereunder alphabetically by the surnames of the soldiers. Preceding the state groupings are units listed under the heading "Continental Troops". These organizations were generally state units adopted by the Continental Congress early in the war or units raised in more than one state. Continental Army units raised in only one state are listed along with that state's military organizations.

Unless you already know the unit in which your ancestor served, you must consult the general index to the compiled military service records, which is also on microfilm. That index, giving you the military organization in which the soldier served, leads you to the appropriate roll of the microfilmed records. Pamphlets that describe the contents of these two microfilm publications roll by roll are available free of charge from the National Archives.

As an alternative to using the microfilmed records, a copy of a compiled military service record can be ordered by mail from the National Archives by using NATF Form 80, Order for Copies of Veterans Records. To order a record by mail you must provide, at a minimum, the name of the soldier, the state from which he served, and the war in which he served.

Information found in the compiled military service record for your Revolutionary War ancestor will become a part of your family records. It should be accompanied by a description of its source. A citation for information found in such a record should read: Compiled Military Service Record for (name of soldier), (name of military organization), War Department Collection of Revolutionary War Records, Record Group 93, National Archives Microfilm Publication M881, roll (number).

#### A HALL FAMILY STORY

The following story was written by Charles Hall, grandson of the subject, in the early 1900's. The story took place about 1860.

John T. Hall came to Sacramento in 1848 and built a home on two acres of ground which is now "H" Street between 12th and 13th Streets. He was a merchant and was very much involved in the politics of the times, but was a farmer at heart. He plowed his ground with a team of oxen and raised vegetables and fruits.

His son, Tom Hall, recalls driving a freight wagon drawn by a six oxen team to Dutch Flats to sell vegetables to the miners. This was after the streams had been cleaned out of gold nuggets and the miners had moved into the mountains and hills for more concentrated mining. The miners eagerly bought the onions for a dollar a piece and ate them like apples. On his return trip, Tom would bring back a load of lumber from the mountains to Sacramento. He paid \$100 per thousand board feet of lumber. He would stache his money and gold dust in a little canvas bag on the bottom of the wagon and carefully loading the lumber over it. The miners warned him that some day he would be held up, and they were right. He was held up several times, but the bandits failed to find the money. They would accuse Tom of hiding his money and Tom would tell them to go ahead and search for it if they didn't believe him. When the bandits looked at the big wagon load of lumber, they would decide that Tom was telling the truth and let him pass on his way.

Information concerning the descendants of Peter Schaffer (married second time to Mary Magdalena Brown.)

On Tuesday afternoon, Apr. 30, we first called on Mrs. Catherine Wolf, then on Mrs. Sarah Bohner and Wednesday morning we called on Mrs. Mary Boyer, all daughters of Alma Schaffer (married to Euphrastus Hain) youngest daughter of Peter Schaffer (born 1784) and Mary Magdalena Brown (born 1799). Names and addresses of the three granddaughters of Peter Schaffer on whom we called are:

Mrs. Catherine Wolf (81), 1245 Highland Avenue, Sunbury, Pa. Mrs. Sarah Bohner, R. D. 1, Herndon, Pa.

Mrs. Mary Boyer, 1420 Nelson Street, Shamokin, Pa.

We learned from these graddaughters that Peter Schaffer and Mary Magdalena. Brown were married Feb. 15, 1818. Six children were born to that union, two dying in infancy. Names of the four children who lived, married and left descendants, were:

Susanna, born Apr. 13, 1824, died July 24, 1899 (married first to Lohr, then to Peter Bohner) Abby, born Apr. 5, 1826, died --- (married to Reuben Kramer) Peter, Jr., born July, 1828, died --- (married to Rebecca Malick) Alma, born July 13, 1831, died Oct. 18, 1920 (married to Euphrastus Hain)

These granddaughters told us that their grandfather, Peter Schaffer, did not treat their grandmother, Mary Magdalena Brown, right. During the first twelve years of their married life, the period in which the children were born, he was home very little. Would come home just on occasional visits. In the year 1830 he moved his wife and little children to Fayette County and there deserted them forever. None of them ever hear from him or of him again.

Mrs. Wolf told us that the Peter Schaffer heirs were making a claim for Henrietta E. Garrett's Estate: that they had filed their claim with the Administrator's attorneys, Biddle, Paul;, Dawson and Yokum, 505 Chestnut Street, Philadelphia, Pa. She said Biddle, Paul, Dawson and Yokum had sent a representative out to her sister, Mrs. Bohner's home who took a copy of everything pertaining to their family history. Mrs. Wolf said they had not engaged an attorney. She has abiding faith in our laws and institutions and thenks the Garrett fortune will come to them anyhow if they are entitled to it. She said they based their lineage on the theory that Christopher Schaffer (Henrietta E. Garrett's father) was a younger brother of their grandfather, Peter Schaffer. She also told us about some Philadelphia law firm writing them that they should not send any more information to Biddle, Paul, Dawson and Yokum because that firm represents Charles S. Starr and Frank G. Marcellus, Administrators, who are both claiming the estate, each one for himself.

We advised Mrs. Wolf that Christopher Schaffer was not a younger brother of Peter Schaffer, but that he was a son of Peter Schaffer to a former marriage. That Peter Schaffer had married in the eastern part of the state (probably Montgomery County) at the age of 21 or 22 and that he had possibly walked out on his first wife, Christopher Schaffer's mother, as he had walked out on their grandmother, Mary Magdalena Brown, in 1831.

Our discovery of Peter Schaffer's living descendants from a second marriage puts us on a somewhat different footing than we had calculated and we must recognize that fact. However, they are not direct heirs of Henrietta E. Garrett. We know now that Christopher Schaffer had a half-brother by the name of Peter Schaffer, Jr., and three half-sisters, all of whom left heirs. The granddaughters of Peter Schaffer whom we visited would stand as half first cousins of Henrietta E. Garrett and they are direct descendants of Peter Schaffer but not direct descendants of Henrietta E. Garrett. It would take an Orphan's Court lawyer to explain how such relationship would affect the children's descendants of Peter Schaffer's brothers and sisters from participatig under such circumstances. My father, Robert Wilson Shaffer (son of Andrew Shaffer) would be a first cousin of Christopher Schaffer and a first cousin once removed of Henrietta E. Garrett. Which would be the nearer kin to Henrietta E. Garrett, a half first cousin or a first cousin once removed? Well, we don't know. You must figure that genealogical problem out for yourselves.

Jacob A. Shaffer (82), 1709 16TH ST., Bakersfield, California, and George

M. Shaffer (73), of Sheffield, Pennsylvania, (sons of Joseph Shaffer and Hannah Miller) are the only two relatives surviving who are first cousins of Christopher Shaffer and first cousins once removed of Henrietta E. Garrett.

We are confronted by a most confusing proposition because of the fact that the granddaughters of Peter Shaffer have filed their claim giving the genealogy that Christopher was a brother of Peter Schaffer. Their grandfather, Peter Schaffer, never had a brother by that name and unless Peter Schaffer's descendants correct this error before the hearing in Orphans' Court they will be thrown out because the Administrators, no doubt, have records to show who Christopher's parents were and a complete history of them because they have in their possession all the papers and records left by Henrietta E. Garrett but they are not giving out the information which they have to the thousands of alleged claimants. The granddaughters of Peter Schaffer do not have any data on him because he disappeared from his second family when their mother and her brother and sisters were babies. The same condition existed with his first wife and son, Christopher (born Aug. 15, 1808) whose mother's pride would not pemit any communication with any of Peter Schaffer's relatives after he left her and went to Northumberland County and married Mary Magdalena Brown (19) on Feb. 15, 1818 when he was 34. I mention this to show the wide breach between Peter's first wife and the Schaffers. In Walter Garret's letter introduced by the Garrett heirs at their hearing, the newspapers quoted his letter as referring to the Schaffers as "scalawags". No one of us should feel offended at this because Henrietta's grandfather, Peter Schaffer, left a trail of trouble in both homes of which he was the head when he walked out forever.

it would not be fair for anyone not knowing the circumstances to However, condemn old Uncle Peter too severely since he is not here to defend his conduct of almost a century ago. He may have been a very good man in every other respect, excepting his inability to live with either one of his wives. Many very good men have been failures in this respect.

We want to suggest to the grandchildren of Peter Schaffer that they carefuly study the list of their grandfather's brothers and sisters shown on a previous page and the will of Valentine Schaffer under that list. We believe tht you should amend your statement already given Biddle, Paul, Dawson and Yokum, Administrator's attorneys to read: Christopher Schaffer was the son of Peter Schaffer instead of a brother of Peter Schaffer. We believe the descendants of Peter Schaffer's brothers and sisters would be pleased if you would join us as to the lineage question. We are forming an organization as outlined hereinafter and we believe that it would be to your best interests to join in establishing the fact that Christopher Schaffer was the son of your granfather, Peter Schaffer, to his first marriage, because any other lineage would defeat us all, you included. Should it be proven by the testimony at the hearing that you, the direct descendants of Peter Schaffer, are entitled to the whole Henrietta E. Garrett Estate, you can rest assured that Judge Allen M. Stearns will decide in your favor and dismiss the claim of our side, the descendants of Peter Shaffer's brothers and sisters. On the other hand, if it should develop in the testimony that the descendants of Peter Shaffer's brothers and sisters are entitled to share in the Estate the Judge will render his decision accordingly. It is is shown that either side is ineligible to claim this huge fortune, Judge Stearns will not be backward in rendering a decision according to law.

Even if you join us you should have a special attorney of your own to guard your rights. You are of our blood and it is not a Shaffer trait to take that which rightfully belongs to his brother. Our lineage is the same and we should all stand together if we are to prove that lineage. After the lineage question, each side's attorney can present his argument as to the manner in which he thinks the estate shall be divided.

Thursday, May 2, 1935 We spent the forenoon in Easton, Northampton County, examining biographical histories in the Public Library and records in the Court House. After lunch we drove to Doylestown, Bucks County, and went to the Court House to look for possible records there. Then drove into Philadelphia. Registered at the Hotel Walton.

Friday, May 3, 1935 In Philadelphia until noon. Called on Clan's attorney, I. G. Gordon Forster. After lunch drove to Laurel Hill Cemetery to see the Garrett-Schaffer monuments on our way home via Norristown, Reading and Sunbury.

Saturday, May 4, 1935 Arrived at DuBois at 7:30 P. M.

There is nothing further to be gained by sending us or anyone else to Philadelphia for information. The lid has been clamped down tightly on that. Only a detective acquainted with the conditions in Philadelphia could hope to dig up the evidence we need to connect our lineage with Christopher Schaffer. We need some one familiar with Court House records and Court procedure. We have already finished the work we were expected to do, to go further is impossible without a strong organization and money.

Carl S. Shaffer, of DuBois, and the writer have both been busy with the preliminary maneuvers in bringing the case before the several hundred relatives interested who are scattered in many sections of the state and the United States. Very few of whom have ever heard of Henrietta E. Garrett and very few could trace their lineage back further than their grandparents. Neither of us have had much time for anything else since the latter part of February. We have not only made two strenuous trips to the eastern part of the state, each trip taking a full week's time and not a day has passed since we became interested that we have not had on our hands scores of callers for information and we have worked without pay. For that matter, we would not accept pay under any condition. Our expenses were paid by unsolicited donations from the descendats of the Andrew Shaffer Clan, the Elizabeth Hinderliter Clan, the Joseph Shaffer Clan and the Polly Shaffer Clan. The other clans were not aware of what was going on for we did not know then who they were. We have since put the information before every clan

This letter finishes our work as individuals. If we go further we must merge into an organization which will elect its own officers. The officers of te organization will take up the work and continue it. We will, however, continue to work but our future work will be done under the direction of the Clan's General Organization.

James F. Shaffer (grandson of Joseph Shaffer and Hannah Miller) of Cleveland, Ohio, a lawyer by profession, a member of the Cleveland Bar, and one of the Clan writes us in the following strain (We are not quoting his exact words but rather his ideas which are sound and constructive):

Right down in and about Philadelphia, primarily there in Court files is the evidence waiting for us to come and get it, evidence which will either make or kill our claim, and if the latter we want to know it within the next several months. He says our Clan's attorney, like any other practicing attorney is too busy to go out into the field to gather the facts and build our case but some one in Philadelphia will eventually have to do that very thing, is his guess. He says it should be some very young attorney under the daily direction of the Clan's attorney, I. G. Forster, fortified with all the facts as we now have them, willing and eager to go into the field and work, review all Court files and do plenty of detective work interviewing all the various angles of interested parties on the Shaffer side, the Kretchman side, the Garrett side, the State's side, etc. Says a lot of facts are yet to be gathered and analyzed before any attorney can get very far in applying the law to the facts, backgrounds, etc. He also suggests that cash will be needed to carry out such a program (not including attorney fees).

The Clan's attorney, I. G. Forster, no doubt, would approve of such procedure because there is no other way. Mr. Forster could readily find some young, capable attorney in Philadelphia to do this work at a moderate salary if the clan furnishes the cash with which Mr. Forster can pay him.

Under the intestate laws of this commonwealth the estate of Henrietta E. Garrett belongs to the nearest kin of her own blood. She left a huge fortune of \$17,000,000. There are many chiselers trying to muscle in and grab this fortune. Are we going to stand by and watch them take away from us what the law gives to us? Are the Shaffers going to remain passive forever? Are we, an army of citizens who are now paying and whose ancestors have paid taxes to maintain our government for a century and a half, going to give up what rightfully belongs to us?

In conclusion let me tell you if we hope to share in the Henrietta E. Garrett Estate we must fight. We are strong in man power, but what is that unless we organize? In union there is strength.

If the descendants of each branch of the Valentine Schaffer's family will organize, elect a president, a secretary and a treasurer, all of whom your respective clan know to be right, for the organization must have money to defray the expenses (two or three families can't do it all) and if each individual interested will contribute a small amount to his branch treasurer we can then go ahead with confidence. Anyone could give \$1.00, some \$5.00, others \$10.00 or

more. Each clan should gather up \$150 for each clan will benefit equally if we win.

#### LOCAL ORGANIZATIONS

The John Shaffer clan, the Peter Shaffer clan, the Catherine Knarr-Mowery clan, Maria Beisel clan, the Dorothea Sherry clan, the Isaac Shaffer clan, the Elizabeth Hinderliter clan, the Andrew Shaffer clan, the Joseph Shaffer clan and the Polly Shaffer clan should each form a separate organization immediately and elect officers. Each clan should organize immediately and its officers should begin at once to solicit funds. Don't wait for further instructions. Go right ahead.

#### A CENTRAL ORGANIZATION

As soon as possible after the local clans become organized and have raised their quota of cash then the various clans' officers should all meet jointly at some central point and organize a central organization, elect a president, a secretary and a treasurer, giving the Central Organization the power to act for all the clans. This plan is just a suggestion. When the clans meet jointly some one perhaps will be able to offer a better plan than the above.

If we win there will be a net amount of probably \$750,000 apiece for each to divide among themselves in accordance with the genealogical clan classification. It is a good gamble for each one interested to work and contribute, even should we lose. No one could lose more than he donates and that will not be much of a loss.

We have done our best to get all the information we could for you. It has been a laborious task and we can go no further without a strong organization which organization should at all times have at least a \$1000 balance with which to meet emergencies. In case all the money for any reason should not be used the balance would be returned to the various clan treasurers for pro-rata distribution to donors.

Tom's route was via Lincoln and Sheridan as the old waterholes were more plentiful along this route. "Nigger Jacks" was the only waterhole between Sacramento and Sheridan. It was at this waterhole that Tom decided to spend the night. He unhitched his six oxen and bunked down for the night. The next morning he found that all of his oxen were gone. He followed their tracks and finally found them at the American River just two miles from Sacramento. Tom had walked forty miles to find them and then had to walk the forty miles back with his oxen to pick up the wagon. He also drove the ox team from Sacramento to Placerville hauling supplies to the miners.


Tom's freight wagon had wooden axles and a timble, iron bands and lynch pines. It was purchased from some immigrants who came to California. When the family purchased the Elkhorn Ranch in Yolo County the wagon went with them, where it weathered from lack of use, and finally a junk man hauled it away.

#### GEN. WILLIAM SYDNEY JACKS OBITUARY

William Sydney Jacks was born 1 February 1809, a son of Captain Samuel and Mary Jacks, the sixth of eleven children. He was born in a log house on the south side of the Seneca River where Waterloo NY now stands. His father was commander of a company of artillery in the War of 1812, and was stationed at Fort Gray, Lewiston Heights, on the Niagara River opposite Queenston, Ontario, Canada.

William finished his trade as a watchmaker in 1830, and started business in Honesdale, which was then a city of stumps and five buildings. He came to California in 1849, returned to New York in 1851, and came back to Napa County in 1852. He settled at Jack's Point, building the first house in Napa Abajo, and lived there the rest of his life. From the first, William was identified with Napa's church interests. He was one of the twelve who organized the First Presbyterian Church of Napa in January, 1855, and always remained an active member. He was an honored Elder and was the church's representative at a General Assembly held in Philadelphia.

For a year or more, William suffered from heart disease. Though feeble, he was able to be up and around until the day of his death. On 28 May 1890, he died peacefully at home in his easy chair. He was survived by his wife and a large circle of relatives and friends. The funeral was from the Presbyterian church on May 31st.

#### DON CAYETANO JUAREZ

Cayetano Juarez was born in the Presidio at Monterey on 24 Feb 1809. When he was eighteen he enlisted in the Mexican army under Lieut. Martinez and Alferez Sanches. He was still in the army when he was married on 14 Feb 1835 to Maria Higuerra, a daughter of Francisco Higuerra, born in 1818.

Cayetano received an honorable discharge from the army on 19 Feb 1836. The following winter he brought horses and cattle into the Napa Valley, herding them during the day and returning at night to his home in Sonoma. On 6 Oct 1840, Cayetano received the Tulocay grant from the Mexican government, and moved there with his family. This was a two-league grant, lying on the east side of the Napa River, between Soscol Creek on the south and Clark's Creek on the north. It contained 8,865 58/100 acres. During the year 1840, he built a small adobe house on the east side of the road from Napa to Vallejo.

In 1843, Cayetano was elected Alcalde of the District of Sonoma. He was a generous, open-hearted man who extended his cordial hospitality to all who came to his home. In 1845, he built his second and larger adobe, and in 1873 he built a fine house on the knoll just east of Napa.

Cayetano and Maria raised a large family of children, six of whom were still living in 1883. In December of that year, Cayetano died at the home of G. B. Feroggiaro near the depot in East Napa. He had just eaten dinner with the family, then dropped his head into his hands, attempted to vomit, and died. The body was removed to the home of his son-in-law, J. R. True, on Second Street. An autopsy showed that Cayetano died of a ruptured blood vessel at the base of his brain, and a fibrous clot in the heart.

The funeral was held from the family's home in East Napa and was attended by a large number of people. Fifty-eight carriages followed the remains to the grave. Rev. W. A. Leacock conducted the services. The pallbearers were: H. Porterfield, William Edington, Henry Fowler, W. M. Boggs, William Hargrave, and G. N. Cornwell, all of whom were pioneer settlers in Napa County.

#### "Celestials at War" St. Helena Chinamen Open Fire on Each Other -- An Innocent Man Hurt

St. Helena's Chinatown was the scene of a lively fracas about 12:30 Thursday afternoon. It appears that a Chinaman from Calistoga, named Sam Lee, has a contract from Ed. Loeber for cutting a lot of wood, as has also Quong Wing of St. Helena. Bad blood has existed between the two for some time past, and it culminated Thursday in a general shooting scrape in the store of Goon Song, with Sam Lee on one side and Ah Tuey and Ah Kong, both intimate friends of Quong Wing, on the other, during which one innocent Celestial named Ot See was shot in the leg, while the principals escaped uninjured.

From what we are able to learn, Sam Lee was engaged in conversation with Ot See, who was lying in a small room smoking opium, when Ah Tuey and Ah Kong suddenly entered and began shooting. Sam returned the fire, and in all some twelve shots were fired. Mr. Loeber was standing in front of the building and there were several Chinamen in an adjoining room, but no one was injured with the exception of Ot See, who was shot in the right knee, the ball lodging underneath the skin about eight inches above, on the right side of the leg.

Deputy Constable Sciaroni was promptly on the scene and arrested Sam Lee, Ah Tuey and an unknown Chinaman, Ah Kong escaping. He lodged them all in jail and at the same time summoned a physician to attend to the wounded man. The unknown Chinaman was afterwards released. No one seems to know which fired the first shot, Ah Tuey or Ah Kong.

Later on a warrant was sworn out charging Quong Wing with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to commit murder. Marshal Johnson arrested him and placed him in jail. Warrants with a similar charge have been sworn out for the other three participants. We are informed that Quong Wing posted notices about a week ago in Calistoga offering \$500 to anyone who would kill Sam Lee.

Justice Smith informs us that the date of the preliminary examination is indefinite, as District Attorney Barstow is engaged in the Merkle case, and that the examination of Kather and Stevens will have to be held first.

Constable Howard immediately went in pursuit of Ah Kong, but up to the hour of going to press had not apprehended him. The injured man's wound while not fatal is very painful. More trouble is liable to occur and the officers are on alert.--"Star".



#### USING LAND RECORDS TO SOLVE RESEARCH PROBLEMS

Before attempting to solve a research puzzle in any one area, one must know the history of that particular location, whether it be a neighborhood, town, county, region, state or territory. In every case the minimum data that one should be familiar with would be the year the jurisdiction was formed, the parent localities, adjacent jurisdictions, and knowledge of the geography of the sector.

Knowing the history of an area will provide additional insight as to location of land records. Documents for a particular county may be on file in another jurisdiction. Early colonial residents of Nansemond Co., VA were in actuality often residents of the territory of North Carolina. The early records will usually be found filed with Virginia documents, but later deeds for the same piece of property can be found on file in Massachusetts. Also Kentucky was once part of Virginia, Virginia and Connecticut both claimed parts of Ohio Territory, and Tennessee records prior to 1790 can be found in North Carolina. Surprisingly as late as 1860 this was still occurring when Colorado records are found recorded in Arapahoe Co., Kansas.

Historical background will provide clues of boundary disputes, such as those between New Hampshire and Massachusetts, Tennessee and Kentucky, and New York and Vermont. This awareness may show that land in adjacent areas was less expensive. Before definite boundary lines were established many filed their claim in the area offering land at a lesser price. For example land in Pennsylvania at one time sold for five pounds per 100 acres while in neighboring Virginia land prices were considerably lower at ten shillings per 100 acres, as shown when deeds of residents of Fayette Co., PA are located in the Augusta Co., VA files recorded with Virginia land prices.

A study of an area's history will show that in Colonial times land was administered in one of three ways: Royal Colonies such as Georgia, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, the Carolinas, and Virginia, were under the administration of the Crown and its appointed Governors; Proprietary Colonies as Delaware, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and part of the time New Jersey and the Carolinas were under the jurisdiction of proprietors in England or America and their appointed agents; the Corporate Colonies were Connecticut, Massachusetts, Rhode Island, and part of the time Virginia whose lands were purchased from individuals.

One should become acquainted with the two types of land measurement used in the United States, the Metes and Bounds system and the Rectangular Survey. The Metes and Bounds system is based on topographical or physical features of the land with a water course or tributary usually as a base and a parallelogram owning adjacent property. This system is used in the thirteen original states, Hawaii, Kentucky, Maine, Tennessee, Texas, Vermont, and West Virginia. The remaining are considered public land states and these use the Rectangular Survey method of land description. This system uses an arbitrarily established east/west Base line and Principal Meridians running north/south. The land is surveyed into Ranges, which are numbered, lying either north or south of the Base line and east or west of the Meridians. Townships are formed six miles wide and six miles high. a total of thirty-six square miles in each. Public land is recorded in this manner. A typical description for property in Vesta township, Redwood Co., MN might read as follows: East one half (E 1/2) of the Northeast one quarter (NE 1/4), Township One Hundred Twelve North (Y or Twp 112 N), Range thirty eight west (R 38W).

Study will show that property records are usually indexed one or two ways: grantor (seller)/grantee (buyer) or by description of the property. When the recording of a deed is indexed by description, these specifications or at least some idea of where the land was located must be known to locate the entry.

One must be aware of the various types of documents used to record the transfer of ownership of property. Plat books, surveyor's records, land grants, patents, bounty land warrants, homestead entries, special grants, leases, mortgages, and private land sales.

When one is researching Federal land transactions, it should be remembered that only the initial disposition of the property will be found in Federal land records and State grants. Each transaction following will be recorded under the local jurisdiction. Most New England states file land records in the town or district while in most of the remaining states property is recorded at the county level.

Land records will ordinarily include the following information: names of grantor and grantee, place of residence of both parties, date of transaction,

location of property, description of land, price and payment form or agreement, amount of acreage, defense of rights and heirs, limitations and/or restrictions, past history of the land, date recorded, and name of witnesses.

The first grantee deed for an individual in an area may show the previous jurisdiction in which that person resided. This record also gives an indication as to when the person or family arrived in that locality. The first grantee deed for an offspring of the family may indicate his or her coming of age or marriage. The given name of a man's wife is often included in a deed to their offspring. Likewise names of former spouses may also be found listed in these documents. When the transfer of property is recorded showing a substantial difference in cost to other deeds for the community, it may be assumed that a relationship exists whether or not it is stated in the context of the document, but further research must be done to prove or disprove such an assumption.

When other documents are not available for an area, one may be able to establish family connections through the use of land records. This can be done even when specific relationships are not included in the recording of the document. By locating descriptions of all of a man's property and by following its descent, connections and/or relationships can be established. In this way one may be able to identify others living on the same land or adjacent to it. A case in point were the BOYET families residing in Wayne Co., NC. There were several families, many of whom have the same given names. Since few early records exist to help in establishing relationships and identifying one family from another, the location of their lands was studied. This research showed that one family. Thomas and his descendants, resided on the Marsh Branch. At the same time Edward and family held property in the vicinity of the Beaverdam Swamp, and James' family lived in the area called Buck Swamp. In this manner James, son of Thomas, was distinguished from James, son of Edward.

In some cases a wife's given name is recorded in land records. When this is done, it may indicate that the property descended to her or that she is releasing her dower or legal right to a share (usually 1/3) of her deceased husband's real estate for use during her lifetime. Because of "dower right", a man could not sell his real property without consent of his wife. Therefore any sale of property needed the wife's consent which was often obtained by the wife signing the deed itself or a document referred to as "release of dower". In doing so, the wife gave up her right to any future claims to the land. This recording will then usually include the wife's given name. Also, in most cases when property which has been inherited or deeded to the wife was sold, a release is recorded at the close of the document stating that the wife was interviewed separately and is free and willing to forgo her right to that possession.

By taking this last procedure one step farther, a wife's maiden name may sometimes be located. A careful search of the land records may lead to the solution. The prior owner of the property inherited and released by the wife must be found. When this is accomplished, by using the description of the land, one may be able to find probate or other records which will provide the evidence of relationship.

Another method used to discover a wife's maiden name is the following: the husbands deeds should be located and the property descriptions noted. Then the owners of all the surrounding lands should be determined through the deeds at the approximate time of the couple's marriage. By a careful search of the deeds and/or probates of each of these neighbors, a connection and therefore a maiden name can often be determined.

Witnesses to deeds should also be noted. Often these may later prove to berelatives or neighbors.

Deeds may indicate occupation, social status, as well as education. In areas where two or more men have the same name the land record may distinguish one from the other.

For instance, one may use only his mark in signing a document while another of the same name applies his signature to the record. Title, such as Colonel or Esquire, may assist in differentiating one man of the same name from another.

Church membership may sometimes be established through the use of land records. If a person served as a member of a committee to purchase property for a church, his name will be included in the record of that transaction. If a man or family deeded property to a church, it will also be recorded in the records of that jurisdiction. In the case of a quit claim of 40 acres for \$1.00 from Ann Eliza Spray to C. W. Burnett, what at first seemed to be an indication of relationship proved wrong. Further research provided the informaton that C. W. Burnett, was the minister of the Christian Church in Schuyler Co., MO, and the property was deeded to him for the use of the Church. Also in some communities the purchase of private cemetery plots are recorded in the deeds. When the burial ground is connected with a church, it would suggest that the family or person belonged to that organization. When the burial place is not known, this document may then provide the information.

Illegitimacies and/or adoptions may be shown in land records where no other record of the same can be found.

The last grantor deed in any one area may show where that person had relocated. This record will also help determine the approximate time a man or family leave a locality.

Death dates or approximates can be obtained through use of deeds. Following through the indexes one may determine the general period of a person's death when no further entries are shown for him. Actual death dates have been found in deeds. When one's right to a specific piece of property may be questioned, genealogical data may be included in the text of the deed. This information may include names of the offspring's spouses, grandchildren, minor children, the spouse's name of the deceased, and even dates. If some of the parties in question reside out of the area these locations are usually noted in the document.

In any search of a jurisdiction one should always check Mortgages and Leases when these are filed independent of the deeds to title. Also plat books and surveys may lead to the discovery of additional information.

If one uses land records hand in hand with tax and court records, a more complete documentation of one's family can be made. Tax and/or court records may exist where deeds are missing. Tax records will pinpoint a person's location. A careful check may provide the sons' names and the approximate year they become of age for at that time they are enrolled on the tax lists even if they have no property. Widows may be listed in the tax records, and a check of the previous tax lists may provide the approximate year of a man's death. His absence on a tax record may also note his death or removal from the area.

Civil Court records often will show the registration and confirmation of title. This is especially helpful when the actual land record is missing. Also disputes over right to title are usually found in court documents.

When records have been destroyed or lost in a jurisdiction other sources may be used in place of or along with Civil Court and tax records. State tax lists, quit rents, surveys, probate court records, plat books, surveyor's records, state records, county tax lists, and U.S. Government records are some of the depositories for these records. Often duplication may be located when originals are missing.

Land records may be obtained through correspondence. The keeper of the records may be found under the title of County Clerk, Register of Deeds, County Recorder, or Recorder of Deeds. The HANDY BOOK OF GENEALOGISTS, published by Everton Publishers, Inc. lists to whom and where to write in the various jurisdictions for these records. County officials normally will search the index and inform you of the records found and the cost to duplicate them. Or one may request a specific record such as the first grantee deed, giving the name of the person, and the approximate date the deed may have been recorded.

Land records in the National Archives are in two arrangement patterns. Prior to 1908 these are arranged alphabetically, and then by district land office where the entry was recorded. For the land-entry files which are not covered by name indexes, one must have the legal description of the land, the aproximate date, and the name of the land office where the entry was made.

The Genealogical Society of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints has a continuing program of microfilming and now includes many of the land records for the United States. These microfilmed records are available on loan through their extensive network of branch libraries.

One may solve research problems through the use of land records. These documents may provide the answer to more genealogical dilemmas than any other single source in areas where vital records do not exist.

# PASSENGER AND IMMIGRATION LISTS INDEX,

First Edition, 1982 Supplement; Edited by P.William Filby with Mary K. Meyer. Gale Research Company, Detroit, Michigan, 1983.

Seeking your immigrant? Our library contains a wealth of compiled records. Our holdings include the original three volume set of this work, described as "A Guide to Published Arrival Records of about 500,000 Passengers Who Came to the United States and Canada in the Seventeenth, Eighteenth, and Nineteenth Centuries." The 1982 Supplement added over 200,000 additional names. These names, although numerous, comprize only a fraction of the actual twenty million names of those who immigrated between 1538 and 1900. But the compilers are doing their best to list them all.

It must be remembered when perusing these volumes that the information included is a compilization of published sources. Thus, you will not find your ancestors mentioned if their names have never been published anywhere else. But, the number of lists used is staggering (over 300 lists were indexed in the first three volumes; another 360 lists indexed in this supplement). It would be a difficult matter indeed for any researcher to seek out and read these 660 lists. Thus, this compilization offers a great service to genealogists.

The entry itself contains much information. A quick-reference key to the citation is given in an easily located spot on the inside cover, so the reader can quickly check the citation source when an entry of interest is found. Example; from page 64, we find this entry:

BISHOP, HENRY, JR. N.A.; Maryland and/or Virginia 1672 8510 p43.

Bishop, Henry, Jr. (name of passenger); N.A. (Passenger's age, in this instance not available); Maryland or Virginia (Place of arrival); 1672 (year of arrival); 8510 (Source book code, this referring to SKORDAS: The Early Settlers of Maryland); p43 (the page number where the item is listed in the source).

Some entries will include the names of accompanying passengers, in the case shown below you will note a complete census of the Chapman family which immigrated in 1774:

CHAPMAN, WILLIAM 44; Fort Cumberland, Nova Scotia, 1774, 5675, p42 Wife: Mary 42; Child: William 19; Thomas 17; Jane 15; John 13; Mary 9; Henry 7; Jonathan 5; Sarah 3; Ann 1.

Complete cross referencing has been done so that every child in the above entry will be listed separately, referring the reader to the main entry. Example:

#### CHAPMAN, HENRY 7, see Chapman, William.

The recent addition of the 1983 Supplement has added another 200,000 names to those indexed, making the available indexed names at our library 900,000. Certainly well worth a trip to the library.

#### EASTERN KENTUCKY REFERENCES by Evelyn Jackson and William Talley; McDowell Publications, Utica, Kentucky, 1980.

Nearly 500 pages of charming stories, events, and compiled records of Eastern Kentucky, will delight the reader. The counties of Boyd, Carter, Fleming, Greenup, Lawrence, Lewis, Montgomery, Nicholas, and Rowan are mentioned in the table of contents.

This is not a book written by the authors, instead they have allowed the source materials to speak for themselves with an occasional notation to guide us along. You will be run through a series of newspaper articles, Bible Records, transcribed cemetery inscriptions, indexed Will-books, etc., all mentioning many names.

A sample of the items in the table of contents are: Abandoned Graveyards in Boyd County; 1806 Tax List of Greenup County; The Blyew-Kennard Murder Case of Lewis County; Civil War Letters of William K. Hampton. A complete index to every name, with a separate index to Waterways and Stations and Furnaces and Railroads, leads the reader to desired information.

This is a fine book for those seeking information from this section of the country or for those looking for interesting highlights into the lifestyles of Eastern Kentucky. Well worth the reader's effort.

#### THE ITALIAN AMERICANS, Troubled Roots, by Andrew Rolle. University of Oklahoma Press, Norman, 1980, paperback, 222 pages.

The book jacket proclaims that "It fills a big gap, the big hole left by the reluctance of the Italian Immigrants to put down on paper their existence...It is about time someone of Professor Rolle's standing (traced) the epic of these obscure people whose success would otherwise remain unexplained." Luigi Barzini.

Anyone seeking information on Italian immigrants will recognize that this statement is correct as published sources on the subject are scarse indeed. This book fills a great need in our Library for more information on one of Napa Valley's most numerous early immigrant groups--the Italians. The book is not a genealogical study in that it does not contain numerous names, instead it is an history and an analysis of the reasons behind the movement of these industrious people. It also discusses the physical and mental hardships faced by these people when they arrived, and for several generations after. It delves into all phases of early Italian immigrant lifesytles, and explains it to us in an easy to read, entertaining fashion. Great reading for anyone interested in Italian heritage.

The author is considered one of the foremost Italian historians, author of many books on American ethnic and social history. His book is a welcome addition to our library shelves.

# HELPFUL HINTS ON GENEALOGICAL RESEARCH

Keep your source records very specific as to town, county, state and places where records were found, such as library, courthouse, church record, cemetery record, either from tombstone inscriptions or from mortuary records, and, of course, which family the notation concerns. If possible, write up each day's findings in the evening of that day so you won't have to wonder what a notation means when it gets cold. Be very specific in making notes to yourself fur further follow up or elaboration. If doing continuous days of research, make a list of what to work on the next day. Being methodical saves much time.
