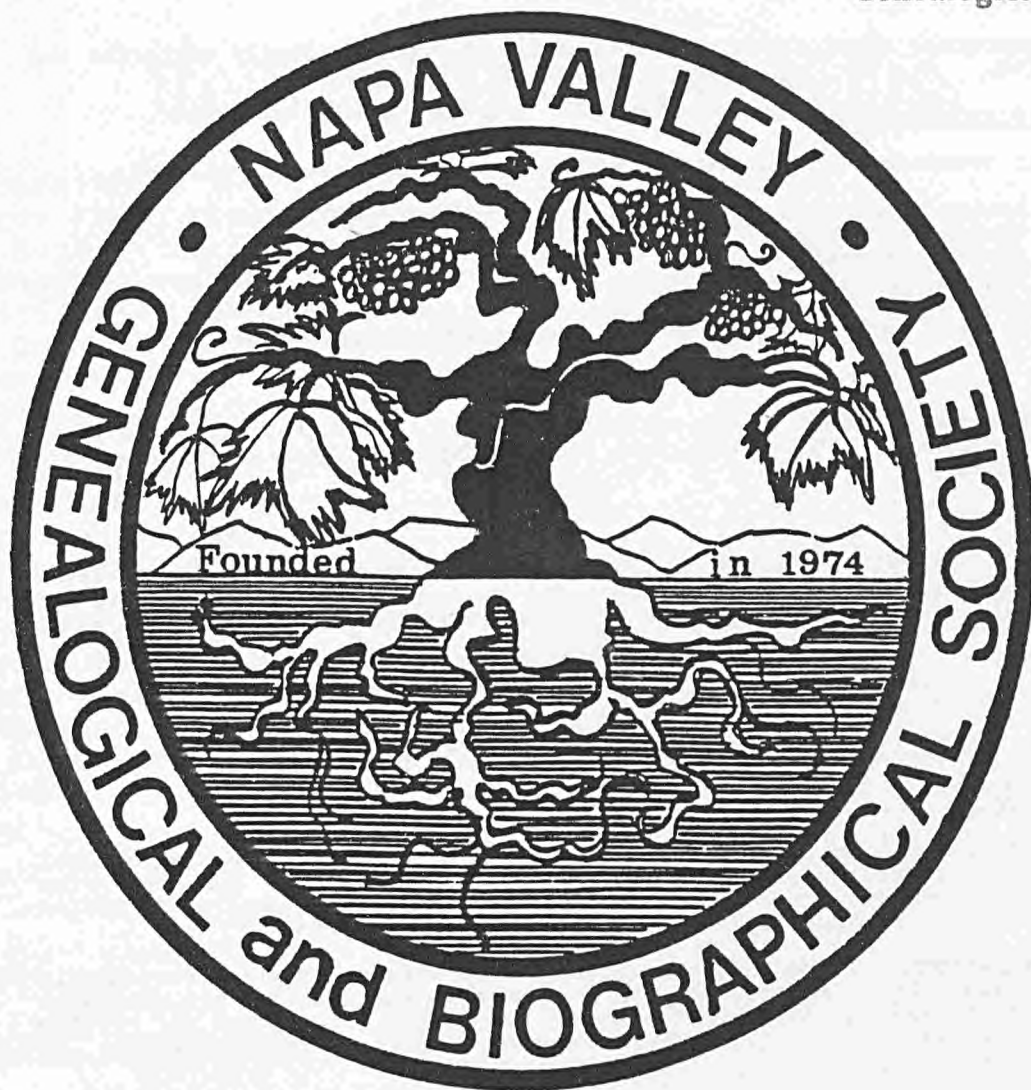

As usual, many new books have been added to the shelves of the Napa Valley Genealogical and Biographical Society Library since publication of our last periodical. Limited column space prohibits discussion of all the new volumes, but a few have been chosen for a descriptive look. This glimpse onto the shelves of our Library will show the depth and diversity of information contained in our collection. Visit the Library to find out for yourself!

Give me names! Every researcher is seeking names...hoping to find their family in print. Several of the books being discussed in this column will give the researcher lots of reason to hope.

10,000 VITAL RECORDS OF WESTERN NEW YORK, 1809-1850, by Fred Q. Bowman, published by Genealogical Publishing Company in 1985, includes 5275 marriage entries and 4781 death notices taken from the marriage and death columns of five western New York newspapers which published prior to 1850. The entries are listed alphabetically, with all vital data included in an abstracted form. A complete index lists all subordinate names, referring the reader to the exact entry number where the names appears in the text. Easy to use and comprehensive in scope, this compilation should prove most helpful to those researchers hunting those elusive New York ancestors.

A HISTORY OF METHODISM IN ALABAMA written by Rev. Anson West D.D. was originally published in 1893, and has been reprinted (1983) by the Reprint Company of Spartanburg, South Carolina. The 755 pages of text were indexed by the Alabama Genealogical Society in 1964, and the index is included in this reprint. The book delves into much of the early history of Alabama, leaning toward the history of the Church, but also dealing with many of the early pioneers of the area. Chapters include "Along the Tennessee River", "First White Settlers, and other Noted Persons", etc. Educational history is covered in depth while area by area discussions of early general history and discussions of new appointments, preachers, friends, and places make this a valuable source book for anyone working in early day Alabama. Well worth a glance whether your Alabama folks were Methodists or not.

NORFOLK COUNTY MARRIAGE RECORDS 1795-1870, published by the Norfolk Historical Society, Simcoe, Ontario 1979, was edited by Wm. R. Yeager. Uniform registration of marriage records began in Canada in 1869, but prior to that date regional Administrations were expected to assemble the Justice of Peace records for each year. These regional records are abstracted and included: London District 1800-1833, 1833-1855, Talbot District 1837-1857; and Norfolk District Marriage Registry 1857-1869. Church records and a smattering of secondary source records round out the collection. The 604 page volume is indexed to several of the Registers, and all data possible was included in the abbreviated abstracts. The many names included, gathered from hard to locate source material, offers the researcher an opportunity to utilize a wealth of valuable materials. Don't miss this book if your ancestors were from the areas covered.

GENEALOGY, A Guide to Research Through High Technology by Paul Andereck and Richard A. Pence was published by Ancestry Inc., in 1985. This up to date how-to book on computers will bring the reader into the computer world. 280 pages, paperbound, the book is completely indexed and addresses our fears by covering such subjects as: "Are you smart enough to use a computer?", "Are you too old to learn to use a computer?". It discusses the definition of a "genealogically adequate" computer and the reasons for using a computer. Software and hardware are discussed in depth so that the reader may become conversant with computerese and feel competent when shopping for their own computer. A dictionary of terms is included as a helpmate. This book is a great aid for those tempted toward the floppy disk.

FAIRBAIRNS BOOK OF CRESTS OF THE FAMILIES OF GREAT BRITAIN AND IRELAND has two volumes in one, with over 600 pages in the first volume. Genealogical Publishing Company reprinted this 1905 edition in 1983. The text covers the subject with great care, giving descriptions of family names and their crests, plate drawings of many crests, and a key to the plates. A dictionary of terms assists the reader in determining the meaning of the obscure words used in the descriptions, and a definitive dictionary of mottoes completes the work. I.E.: Hewes= a peacock's head erased. Azure= blue. Bar= A straight horizontal band. This fascinating subject is well covered in this volume, and will go far toward supplying information on your British Crest.

"ATTACKED BY HOUNDS"

"A short time ago, William Smallput who resides in this county near the Sonoma line narrowly escaped a most terrible and violent death while returning to his home along the Calistoga and Santa Rosa road from a trip to the latter place. It was about six o'clock and just getting dark when glancing up the road he saw coming toward him at great speed a large buck followed by a pack of hounds. Knowing that the animal he bestrode was very skittish Mr. Smallput dismounted and tied his horse to a tree. He then settled himself the better to enjoy the exciting chase between the frantic buck and its tireless pursuers. The distance between himself and the deer and hounds, which was at first about a quarter of a mile was rapidly lessened until they were almost upon him. Mr. Smallput alas forgot himself in his excitement, and casting prudence aside, stepped out into the middle of the road thinking to check the deer and give the dogs an advantage. The buck, however was beyond checking, and before Mr. Smallput could spring out of the way he was knocked violently to the ground. Before he could gather himself together and regain his feet the dogs, six in number, sprang upon him, mistaking him for the deer and before learning their mistake had lacerated their prostrate victim in several places. The old dog and the leader of the pack had sprung at once for his throat and would no doubt have killed him had it not been for a thick woolen scarf which was tied around his neck. As soon as the man could cry out the dogs discovered their mistake and again broke into a mad chase after the buck. With great pain and difficulty Mr. Smallput arose and mounted his horse. About three-quarters of a mile further on he arrived at a farm house and remained over night. Upon examination it was found that he had been severely bitten in eleven places, the worst wound being in his thigh which punctured the lower part of the abdomen and will probably result in rupture, if nothing worse. At last accounts the injured man was suffering intensely and his hurts are considered very serious. It has not yet been learned to whom the hounds belonged or how the mad chase commenced."

"BURGLARS TRAPPED"

"On Tuesday night last Professor (C. M.-ed.) Walker, who resides on the corner of First and Franklin Streets, was awakened from the serenity of his dreams by the stealthy tread of an almond-eyed son of the Flowery Kingdom, who was amusing himself by collecting surplus articles of value that were lying around the rooms loose, ostensibly for his own aggrandizement, all of which was contrary to the statute in such case made and provided. The Professor arose like Banquo's ghost before the astonished Celestial, who mildly exclaimed, "Hoop-la!" and bounded through the window like a yearling calf, with an idea of tearing himself away. Mr. Walker did not stop to make his toilet but followed that one in his bare feet and novel summer habiliments with such energy that he overhauled him at the corner of Second and Randolph streets, when the thief drew a long knife and protested against the embraces of his captor. The Prof. gave him one on the disc of his moon-shaped physiognomy with the force of a forty-ton trip hammer. Officer Baddely and Borden arrived at this juncture, and went in search of the Chinaman and knife they had just seen going through the air. Both were found and taken to jail. The adventurous Mongolian gave his name as Ah Sing. Upon information given by Mr. Jacob Westfall, under Sheriff Bradford and officer Brown found the rendezvous of the Chinaman and his gang in a house near the old brick-yard, and discovered therein many stolen articles belonging to Messers. Fuller, Steele, Howland and Chase, and the Palace Hotel. A Chinaman was found asleep in this house and was taken in charge. He gave his name as Ah Sam, and was discovered to be the partner of Ah Sing the one caught by Prof. Walker. Ah Sing was examined before Justice Henning, and held to answer for burglarizing Walker's, with bail fixed at \$1,000. Ah Sam, in the same Court, was convicted of petit larceny, and sentenced to 50 days in the county jail. He was also held for burglary, committed at the residences of J. S. Howland and Ralph Ellis. Bail in each case \$500."

"THE LATE PETER STORM"

"The venerable gentleman whose name heads this article died suddenly of paralysis last Friday morning at Calistoga, in his 78th year. Much has already been said by others of brave old Peter Storm, but it is well that we should have something to say of him, too. Mr. Storm was born in Christiansand, Norway, in September, 1799, and at the early age of fourteen went to sea, which he followed for many years. He finally gave up his life on the seas, and settled in California in 1833, where he followed the life of a trapper and hunter, the scenes of his adventures being mostly in Napa and adjoining counties. Peter was not, by an accident of fortune or good management of business, possessed with old Californias, he was very poor -- so poor in his old age that, had it not been for the generous assistance of some of the Napa pioneers, he might have perished from shere want. But the old Scandinavian -- worthy of being a descendant of those hardy warriors of the North Sea -- worthy to have been under the leadership of Horsa and Hensa -- was neither a beggar nor a poltroon. In the days of his manly vigor he earned his bread by honest toil; but when decrepitude crept upon him, he, like many another man, appealed to his friends.

"It is told of old Peter that, at the capture of Sonoma, in 1846, he was informed that he would be shot by the Mexicans if taken prisoner, as he was a recognized citizen of the Mexican Republic. And such was really the case in those days; for, previous to the Mexican war, the Americans as well as the Europeans who were then residents acknowledged a sort of allegiance to that government. Old Peter's reply was brief but emphatic, "Tell them to go to ___; I'm an American now!" He was unquestionably honest in that declaration, for he often said, "The United States is the only country I now claim."

"It is unnecessary for us to repeat what connection old Peter had with the Bear Party. The story has often been told, and most every man in Napa is familiar with it.

"The body was brought to this city, and on Sunday the funeral took place from the Engine House, Rev. W. J. Maclay conducting the funeral services. Notwithstanding the inclement weather, quite a number of the Pioneers of this place and the adjoining counties followed the remains to their last resting place in Tulocay Cemetery.

"Considerable dissatisfaction is expressed at the course pursued by the San Francisco Pioneers, they having refused to take any part in the ceremonies, notwithstanding their society is under great obligations to the deceased."

JOHN LEWELLING

John Lewelling was born in Randolph County, North Carolina, on 16 Jan 1811. He was married in May 1832 to Miss Elvy Elliott, who was born near Richmond, Indiana, on 11 Oct 1815.

John had a severe attack of erysipelas, and one leg was so seriously afflicted as to lose pieces of the bone. But he recovered, and came across the plains to California, arriving at Hangtown (now called Placerville) on 7 July 1850. John immediately began mining, and continued his mining for several years.

Then in 1855, he went to San Lorenzo and planted a large orchard. The next year, he moved his family there. John was a member of the Alameda County Board of Supervisors for several terms.

The family lived in San Lorenzo until 1864, when, on account of John's poor health, he moved to Napa County and established his home near St. Helena. John was engaged in extensive enterprises, and by 1883 was president of the Grangers' Bank of California.

In December of 1883, John fell seriously ill with erysipelas again and his leg became badly swollen. On 26 Dec 1883, he died of erysipelas and dropsy combined. Surviving him were his two sons, Eli, who was still living on the old family farm in San Lorenzo, and Harvey J., who was living at St. Helena. John's body was taken to Vineland Station, and escorted by pall bearers to San Lorenzo, where the funeral services were held.

I CAN'T FIND THEM IN THE CENSUS - BUT I KNOW THEY WERE THERE!

Every genealogist in the world has had this problem crop up at one point or another; this article is being written in the hopes that you can learn some additional ways of finding your ancestors in the census records - even though you couldn't find them the first time around.

The most obvious step to take if you can't find your family in an index to a particular census is, of course, to go through the census itself, name by name by name. Indexes are made by human beings, and are apt to skip over names, misread them, or put in the name twice! If you do have an index, and can't find your ancestor, it also helps to read the introduction to make sure that your ancestor would have been indexed in the first place.

A prime example is the 1880 Soundex, which many people assume includes all families. However, the 1880 Soundex includes ONLY those families which had a child aged 10 or younger.

Another way to combat the problem is to "play around" with the supposed surname. We have all heard that surnames can be spelled in different ways, but it is often hard to think of different ways to spell the surname you are interested in. If you can't think of alternate spellings, ask other genealogical friends, or your neighbors. Ask them to spell the name you are interested in - and you'll be surprised at the range of answers you will get.

If the surname you are researching starts with a vowel, that gives you another possible "door". If, for instance, the name you are working on is Owens, take the last letter (or clear sound) of the Christian name, and "tack it on" the front of Owens. Thus, if your ancestor's name was Richard Owens, look under Dowens and other spelling variations. John Owens could have been misunderstood as John Nowens.

Conversely, the surname of Owens could have ended up as Wens - and the "O" might have migrated to the end of the Christian name, or gotten lost altogether.

There are, of course, many letters which got "switched" somewhere between the census taker and the family. The "S" and "Z" are examples, as are "P" and "B", "V" and "W", "C" and "K", or "C" and "S". If you just listen to a name, you can come up with all kinds of switches that might have been used.

If you are actually looking at the census records, and can't find your people, begin to play around, visually, with the capital letters, especially if the census taker liked to use initials rather than full names. The "W" and the "H" often look very much alike, as do the "L" and "S". If you are having difficulty reading something, look up and down at other names to see if you can match the letter you are trying to figure out. The "I" and "J" are occasionally impossible to tell apart, by the way, because some census takers did not bring the "J" down below the line; thus these two capital letters would end up exactly alike. Also, watch out for the similarity between the "F" and "T".

If you think you have found the family you are looking for, but your particular ancestor isn't listed with the family, make sure that your ancestor wasn't listed under their middle name. If a boy was named Frank Thomas Johnson, he could have appeared on the census as Frank Johnson, as Frank T. Johnson, as Thomas Johnson, or as Thomas Frank Johnson.

This particular problem points up the absolute necessity of always writing down the full name of each of your ancestors; for all you know, the names could have gotten switched around, either by accident, or by design.

For that matter, a last name can get indexed as the first name, and vice versa. So you should check under the first name in an index if you can't find the person you are after. And if that doesn't work, break down the surname you are working on into syllables and try that way, especially if you are looking for a long surname - maybe the census taker didn't hear part of the name - or maybe the family "swallowed" it!

Any way you look at it, there are all kinds of tricks you can use to find that ancestor who was "temporarily misplaced" - good luck!

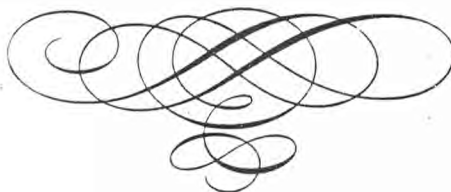

A RESEARCH STORY

At one time or another everyone has been curious to know his or her ancestry. It wasn't until my later years that I became interested. This was after my mother Ida Campbell Shock had passed away. She was one that never talked much of her family, the Campbells, except to tell me her father's name was Nicholas and her mother's was Modesto and brother's were George, Robert, Thomas, Nicholas, Lindsay and Marcell - she being the only girl. Sometimes she would tell me little things in her life. I did have a few pictures with no names on them and I knew they had lived in the southern California towns of Banner and Julian. That was just about all.

I started my research with a trip to the Federal Archives and Record Center at San Bruno. But, because I had such little information, it was a lost cause. Next was a trip to the LDS Genealogical Library in Salt Lake City. Again, I just didn't have enough information and dates. All the resources in the Bay Area available to me were visited, along with the California State Library in Sacramento, and the Federal Archives and Records Center at Laguna Niguel in Orange County. Such a small amount was found on this family, that I felt it hopeless and was about to give up.

Remembering I had a cousin (Thomas Campbell's daughter) living in Eureka, a journey was made to visit her and see what she knew of our family. She didn't know any more than I did, but she did have an old velvet covered photo album. Thumbing through the album, I found a picture of my grandmother, Modesto Campbell. Until this time I had never seen a picture of her and asked if I might have a copy made.

It was hard to tell if Modesto might be Spanish or an Indian (my mother could speak Spanish) and it peaked my curiosity, as I knew Nicholas had been a red-headed Scotsman.

The courthouse at San Diego was my next stop, looking up marriage records but finding nothing. In the San Diego Library a writeup on the family was found in an old newspaper, but, again, it contained little help for my research.

I wrote a letter to Lindsay Campbell's son, as I understood he was interested in genealogy. He had some family pictures, which he sent me, but didn't know much about the family.

Next it was back to San Diego and a visit to the Serra Museum. Here I found voter registration for Nicholas and a couple of his sons; also small news clippings from Julian, San Diego County dated 1894. Decided the next trip should be to Julian, where the family had last lived. -- Here another museum was visited and I found a Campbell family group picture (duplicate to one my cousin had sent me) on display, but with the name Cameron on it. The museum was grateful for the proper identification of the picture, but they had no other information on this family.

A chain of events, starting with a speaker at our Society's monthly meeting, led to contact with Mrs. D. H. Armstrong of Marysville, who had been working on the Campbell family for quite a number of years. I was invited to her home and met her mother, Jessie Dillon. In comparing pictures, it was discovered that one of those in my possession with no names matched the one that was of her great grandparents Henry and Grazella Campbell Dickerman, Grazella being the sister of Nicholas Campbell. Mrs. Armstrong shared with me the fruits of her research on our Campbell family:

Robert Campbell was born 26 Aug 1801 in Tyrone, Ireland, married Agnes Henderson 11 Jan 1822 at Kilmanark, Ayershire, Scotland. They had five children born in Scotland - Jean, Robert, George, Lindsay and Elizabeth. The family came to Nova Scotia in 1833 due to the rebellion against Mary, Queen of Scots. In 1843 they immigrated to the United States, settling in Pottsville, Schuylkill County, PA, where they had five more children - Grazella, Nicholas (my grandfather), Agnes, Jeanette and Annie.

Grazella married a James Wren, who went West to seek his fortune in the gold fields. After a period of time, Grazella followed, bringing with her her fourteen year old sister,

Jeanette, and seventeen year old brother Nicholas, in addition to her own children Agnes (4 years), Robert (2 years) and a six month old baby. They went by boat from the East Coast to the Isthmus of Panama and thence by donkey across the Isthmus. Robert died after reaching San Francisco of Panama Fever. The James Wren family settled in Springfield, Tuolumne County and he was later killed in a mine accident. In the meantime sister Jeanette had married and was living in Drytown, so Grazella and her children went to live with that family. Nicholas left for the gold mines of southern California.

Again I visited the towns of Banner and Julian. I knew Modesto Campbell was a Catholic, as she had been raised in a mission. A mission had been where San Ysabel Catholic Church now stands, and I hoped the priest there could help. However, he told us all the old records had been sent to St. Joseph's Cathedral in San Diego. The Monsignor there met me, by appointment only, with a sense of wariness (if not hostility), doubted there would be anything in the records for me, but would look them over and send me whatever he found. (Upon arriving home there was a scrap of paper with a few names scribbled on it -- no relation.)

Once again back to San Diego and out to Banner (I just knew something was there for me to uncover!). This little mining town sat on the bottom of a dried-up creek bed, but it had long been washed away, except for a gas station and store. We stopped for gas and wandered inside the store for a cold soda, as this little place sat on the edge of the desert. On the wall were many old-time pictures, one of Julian taken in 1887. I inquired as to the possibility of obtaining a copy of this picture and was told it was from the San Diego Historical Society Photograph Collection and where this collection was held.

Upon returning to San Diego, my husband and I went there and purchased a copy. In the process of looking at the many pictures, we came upon one of an old (118 years) lady by the name of Gertrude Alto. This had been my grandmother's surname, but at the time I didn't give it much thought. We were visiting with Lillian Taylor, daughter of Uncle Lindsay. When we got back to Lillian's home, I decided I had been remiss in not purchasing a copy of the Gertrude Alto picture. A phone call put me in touch with the Assistant Curator, who assured me she would send a copy right away and would include a copy of a newspaper article dated 19 Sep 1914 about Gertrude Alto.

Gertrude Alto was the oldest inhabitant of Southern California at that time. She died at the age of 130 or 135 years -- she had been born with the nation, more than a century and a quarter earlier. She was born to a mission Indian squaw at Vallecito Springs at the edge of the great desert. The American revolution, of which the Indians on the Pacific coast knew nothing, and of which the Mission Fathers heard only faint rumors, had just closed. She had been raised in a mission and taught to speak Spanish. Gertrude married Juan Pedro Alto. He worked on a cattle ranch near what is now San Ysidro for a Spanish ranchero named Francisco Lopez. The marriage produced five children: two sons, Jose and Gabriel; and three daughters, Modesto (my grandmother), Esperanza and Persention.

This was the encouragement I needed to continue. I had in my possession a picture of Modesto's brother, Gabriel, and felt I was on the right track at last.

A later trip back to the Serra Museum led me to the University of San Diego, where I was able to peruse the Baptismal Record books from St. Joseph's Cathedral. I found the baptism for each of the Campbell children, where they were born, when, and who their Godparents were. Each one had been baptized by a Father Ubach. It caught my eye that sometimes Modesto would sign her name as "Alto" and at other times "Murrillo". Could Murrillo have been Gertrude's maiden name? The records were written in Spanish and Sister Catherine Louise, the archivist, not only made copies of the original for me but transcribed it into English. (A side thrill was that she let us see old manuscripts of Father Fray Junipero Serra.)

As time passed, I was dissatisfied that a marriage record for Nicholas and Modesto had not been found. So, again, my husband and I went to San Diego and contacted Sister Catherine Louise, telling her of my plight. What a surprise when she told us that the Book of Marriages from St. Joseph's Cathedral had just been brought to her. Of course, we hastened to her office with high expectations. After turning only five pages, there it was -- the marriage of

Nicholas Campbell and Modesto Alto. They had been married 18 May 1876 by Father Ubach at the Indian Reservation at San Pasqual.

Perseverance is one of the successes of genealogical research, and I'm so glad I had it!

HOGWASH OR HERALDRY

Regardless of their interest in family history, most people are intrigued with the idea of possessing a coat of arms. Quite a few of the uninitiated refer to it as the family "crest", not realizing that this was only a device of wood, leather, or metal that was attached to the top of the gallant knight's helmet as an additional means of recognition by his friends and foes.

The arms, or insignia on the shields, of course, evolved because of the need of identifying an individual among the many fighting men in clanking armor who lost their recognizability when they donned these trappings. Later the same symbols were put on banners, on the coverings for horses, and embroidered on the surcoats protecting the armor from heat, dust, and rust. Hence the expression, "Coat of Arms".

These sets of symbols were proud possessions of their owners, and they were passed from father to son, along with the surnames handed down from generation to generation. Four centuries ago a system of differentiation, or "differencing" (the heraldic term), was instituted by the sons of a family. While each son used the same devices as his father, he added a little symbol to show which son he was. This system is still being used.

There are many good books on heraldry, and I am not going to attempt here to develop the subject further. A little research will give you a sound understanding of the intricacies of this charming companion to genealogy.

What I do want to point out is the absurdity of assuming a coat of arms merely because it was originally granted to someone of the same name you bear. It may be fine for the ego, but if you are a stickler for correctness, you will find little inner satisfaction for this display of status. It seems to me a worthless show, in very poor taste.

There are altogether too many firms capitalizing on this preening human trait though unprincipled advertising, and extreme caution should be exercised when it comes to "Mail Order Heraldry". Unlike the British Isles, there is no law in America to prevent any person from appropriating any coat of arms to which he takes a fancy, any more than there is any law against hanging an old portrait or oil painting and claiming it to be an ancestor.

Firms which purport to offer a coat of arms "for your family name" are taking unfair advantage of ignorance, for such arms cannot actually belong to you unless originally granted to an ancestor of yours in the direct male line. Take the surname Lewis, for example. You will find thirty-five different arms for it listed in Burke's. Even the comparatively rare name of Coe has four variations, and there are several Coe families not entitled to any arms at all.

Naturally, it is quite ethical to offer hand painted coats of arms, or other armorial portrayals, to those who can authentically trace back to an armigerous ancestor, but otherwise these should be presented as just what they are...decorative devices to be used for "atmosphere" only. As the associate editor of the New York Genealogical and Biographical Record once pointed out, even as a tourist, you could get in trouble in Scotland, for instance, just by wearing an "armorial blazer" if the arms are not rightly yours by grant or descent. You would be liable to a fine, imprisonment, and your clothes might even be taken from you. They tell me it's mighty cold wandering around those wild Scottish moors in scanty apparel!

THE DATING GAME

To most of us the history of the calendar is of only passing interest. But as genealogical researchers some understanding of them is forced upon us when encountering dates written, for example, as 11 Nov 1620, Old Style or 21 Nov 1620, New Style. (Both dates refer to the date the Mayflower Compact was signed.) Or have you heard the term "double-dating", referring to dates written with a double year, for example, 11 Feb 1731/2? This article will briefly explain what these peculiar dates mean and what to do about them when you find them.

Among the many calendars that have been in use we are concerned here with the difference between the Julian and the Gregorian calendars. Authorized by Julius Caesar in 46 B.C., the Julian calendar measured time for over 1600 years. But in 1582 A.D. the Julian year of 365 1/4 days was estimated to be 11 min., 14 sec. longer than the solar year, making an accumulated error of 10 days by then. In that year, in order to bring everything back into "sync", Pope Gregory XIII instituted the Gregorian calendar, the one familiar to us today. He decreed that the day following Oct. 4, 1582 should be called Oct. 15th, thus dropping 10 days. Also, at that time our system of leap years was established.

In France, Italy, Spain, Portugal, and Luxembourg it was adopted immediately but other countries did not switch over until later, as follows:

- 1584 - German Catholic states, Belgium, parts of Switzerland and Netherlands
- 1586 - Poland
- 1587 - Hungary
- 1699-1700 - Rest of Netherlands, Denmark, German Protestant states
- 1752 - Britain and its colonies
- 1753 - Sweden
- 1873 - Japan
- 1875 - Egypt
- 1912 - China
- 1917 - Turkey
- 1918 - Russia
- 1923 - Greece

The above dates may not be of concern to all researchers but if you're working with English ancestors, including American colonists, chances are you will need to know how to make a proper conversion between Julian and Gregorian.

The British government (and the American colonists) did not adopt the Gregorian calendar until 1752. It was decreed then that the day following Sept. 2 1752 should be called Sept. 14, the difference by then of 11 days. All dates before were referred to as Old Style (O.S.) while those after were New Style (N.S.). As might be expected the change did not come about without some opposition. Many people did not understand the change and felt they were being cheated in some way.

In addition, New Year's Day was moved to January 1st from March 25th. Under the Old Style Mar. 24, 1700 had been followed by New Style Mar. 25, 1701. (Scotland made the change of New Year's Day as early as 1600. This is to be remembered when dealing with Scottish dates between 1600 and 1751.)

To change from Julian to Gregorian, add 10 days to the dates 5 Oct 1582 through 28 Feb 1700; after that add 11 days through 28 Feb 1800; 12 days through 28 Feb 1900; and 13 days through 28 Feb 2100. Using the above formula, George Washington's birthdate, which was 11 Feb 1731, O.S., became 22 Feb 1732, N.S..

To add another complication, many American colonists had been using the Gregorian calendar before 1752, especially those who had immigrated from the Continent. This is why you will find double-dating between the Gregorian new year (January 1st) and the English new year (March 25th) until 1752. Therefore, a date such as 12 March 1720/21 indicated that, while it was still officially 1720, it was already 1721 in the minds of those writing the date.

A final tip: To avoid confusion in your records or family history for dates before 1752, indicate which date you are using.

A useful publication covering all of the above and much, much more, including the Quaker calendar, dating by year of reign, abbreviations likely to be encountered and arithmetic involving dates is A Practical Guide to Dating Systems For

Genealogists by Kenneth L. Scott (1983, 142 pp). It can be ordered for \$12 plus \$1.50 for postage from the author at 523 S. Weyant Ave., Columbus, OH 53213.

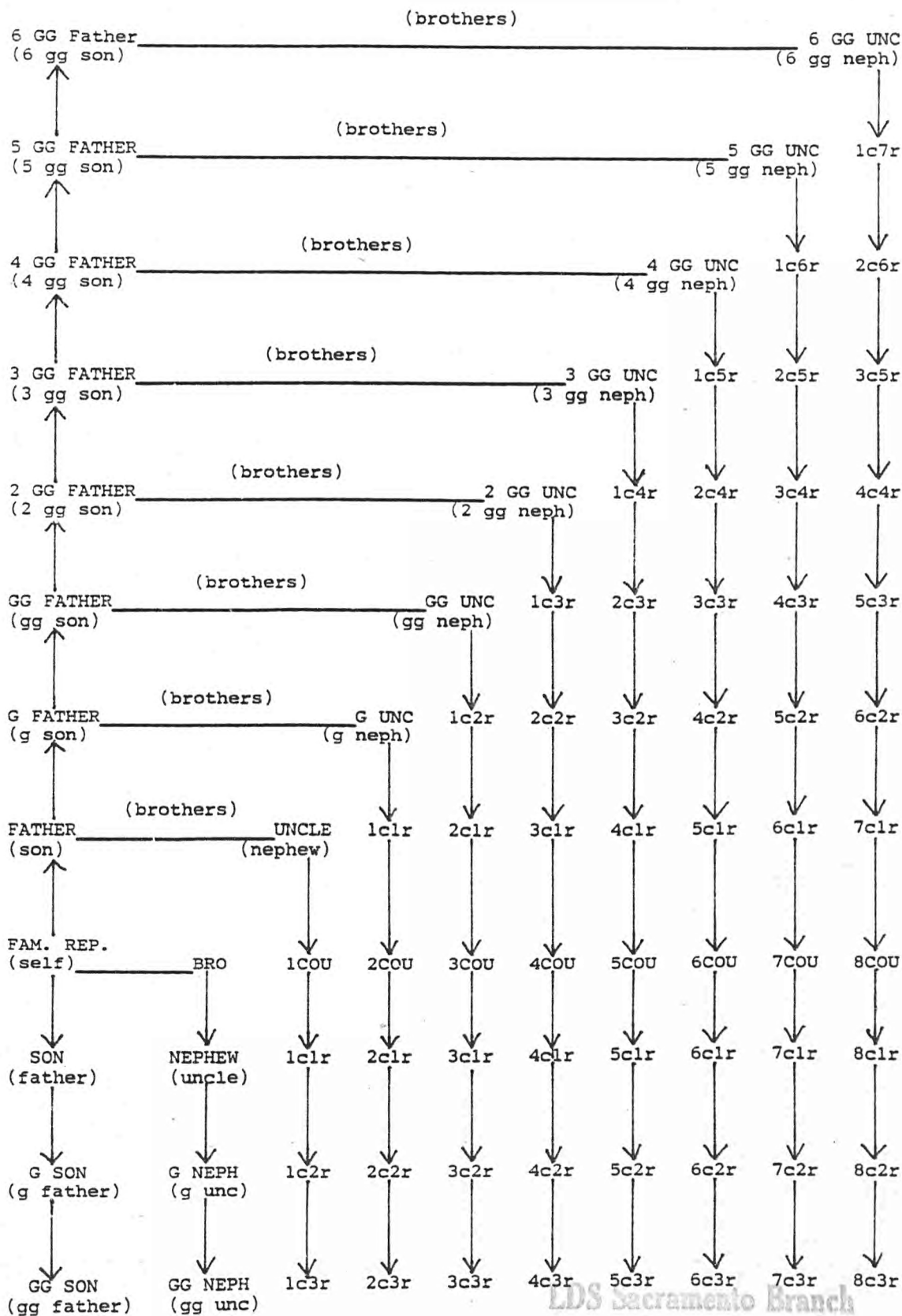

GEORGE MILTON FRANCIS

Among the men who have ever stood for the upbuilding of Napa county is G. M. Francis, the pioneer newspaper man of the city of that name. He was born in Pontiac, Mich., May 28, 1844, into the family of Sylvester and Mary Ann (Gregory) Francis, the former having been born in Pittsfield, Mass., October 12, 1805, and the latter a native of Williamstown, that same state, born February 2, 1808. Besides George M. there were three sons and one daughter in the household, he being the youngest. When he was a lad of four years his father died and he found a home with an uncle at Troy Corners, Mich., after he was seven until he was thirteen. His schooling was obtained at the district school a mile away from home and this he attended when he could be spared from the work about the farm.

At the above mentioned age George M. Francis joined his two brothers, James and Jesse, in Potosi, Wis., spending the winter with them and attending the grammar school at that place. In 1859 he became an apprentice in the office of the Grant County (Wis.) Herald, remaining until August of 1862, when he enlisted in Company C (the color company) Twenty-fifth Wisconsin Volunteer Infantry. He

had just been made foreman of the printing office when he enlisted and thus surrendered plans he had made for a year's schooling at Lancaster Institute. He served in the army until the close of the war, being with Sherman in his march through Georgia--from Atlanta to the Sea--and on through the Carolinas up to the surrender of General Johnson near Raleigh in 1865. He was on detail at Columbus, KY., at General Asboth's afterwards Gen. A. J. Smith's headquarters; also on detail as inspector's clerk at General Mower's headquarters after the taking of Atlanta; was mustered out at Washington and was present at the Grand Review of Sherman's army in that city in 1865.

Returning to civil life Mr. Francis started the Butler County Argus at Butler Center, Iowa, in 1865. This did not prove a paying venture and at the end of six months he sold out and went back to Wisconsin, secured employment with the La Crosse Republican and was later made foreman of the job office of that establishment. In 1869 he came to California and made his home in San Francisco until 1870, since which time he has been a resident of Napa and one of the public-spirited and progressive men of the city and county. Upon locating in this city he purchased a working interest in the Napa Register, a very small weekly paper. Shortly thereafter he bought a half interest and has since been connected with it and has built up a paying business and for many years has published the Register as a daily newspaper.

Mr. Francis is a Republican and has taken a very active part in local politics. He was appointed postmaster of Napa by President Arthur in 1881 and served in that capacity until 1885, when a Democratic president was elected and he resigned. He was again commissioned postmaster by President McKinley on March 9, 1894, and was continued in that office during the administrations of McKinley, Roosevelt and Taft up to January 1910, when his resignation was accepted and the man he recommended was appointed his successor. Mr. Francis was appointed a trustee of the Napa State Asylum by Governor Waterman on March 11, 1889, reappointed four years later by Governor Markham, resigning the position when Governor Budd was elected. He was elected a presidential elector in 1896, when McKinley was the Republican nominee, and as messenger carried California's vote to Washington and now holds the receipt of Vice-President Stevenson for said certified vote under the date of January 2, 1897.

In 1904 Mr. Francis purchased the lot on which the Register building now stands and later erected the building which serves as the Register's home at a cost of \$9,000. He has always been loyal to the "Boys in Blue" and holds membership in and was the first commander of Kit Carson Post No. 74, G.A.R., organized in Napa in 1885. He is a member of the Presbyterian church of Napa.

In Lancaster, Wis., June 16, 1866, occurred the marriage of G. M. Francis and Miss Eliza, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Horton, and of this union three children have been born: Mrs. Mildred Benjamin and Mrs. Ethel Rohner of San Francisco, and George H. Francis of Napa, who is his father's business associate.

"DON'TS" WHEN USING CENSUS RECORDS

- Don't stop with the soundex findings; go back to the original census record.
- Don't believe the census indexes to be either correct or complete.
- Don't assume the relationship to the head of the household is as stated; Has anyone found a listing of niece-in-law, for instance?
- Don't assume the wife is the mother of any or all the children listed.
- Don't forget to copy the info at the top of the page, as well as all the data to the right of the occupation column .
- Don't forget to copy all the entries for your surname in the county. And better look over the neighbors too. Four Smiths in a row with a Jones in the middle could easily mean a married daughter and her family.
- Don't think the records before 1850 can't help. They may only have the one name listed but at least you'll know how many to look for - for a whole family.
- Don't think census data gives all the answers.
- Don't forget the 1880 plus records when you're stuck in the early 1880s.
- Don't forget the 1890 veterans census if your ancestor was in the military. Widows are also listed.
- Don't forget about state census records.

POST CEMETERY - BUILT IN 1849

"This United States Military Cemetery formerly part of the Benicia Military Arsenal is now under the jurisdiction of the Department of Defense & Interior. Gravestones date from the middle 1840's and in one corner are several graves of German and Italian prisoners from WWII."

Member Queen Berwald made inquiry to the Department of Defense & Interior as to the history of the above cemetery and also asked if there was a registry of the persons buried there available. One other question was: Why are so many listed on the gravestones as "U.S. Soldier Unknown"? Why were these men unknown? -- Below is the reply Queen received:

Dear Mrs. Berwald:

This is in response to your recent letter regarding the Benicia Arsenal Post Cemetery.

Benicia Arsenal Post Cemetery is one of 27 such cemeteries currently administered by the Department of the Army. The cemetery occupies one acre of land and contains the remains of 221 decedents. The first burial was 1st Lieutenant Charles E. Jarvis, 2nd United States Infantry on June 8, 1849. Enclosed for your information is a listing of the individuals buried in the cemetery. Considerable research concerning the cemetery was done in the National Archives, Office of the Chief of Military History, and the public library. Although there is material of record with reference to Benicia Arsenal, only this small amount of cemetery information is documented.

During the Civil War and the years preceeding, soldiers who died on the battlefield, in General Hospitals, or as prisoners of war at or near Benicia Arsenal were originally interred near their place of death. Those graves, if marked at all, were marked with the name and identifying data painted on them. Many of those headboards deteriorated over time. Therefore, when the remains were later disinterred and reinterred at Benicia Arsenal Post Cemetery, identification could not be made and these graves were marked as unknown.

Your interest in this matter is appreciated, and I trust this information will be of assistance.

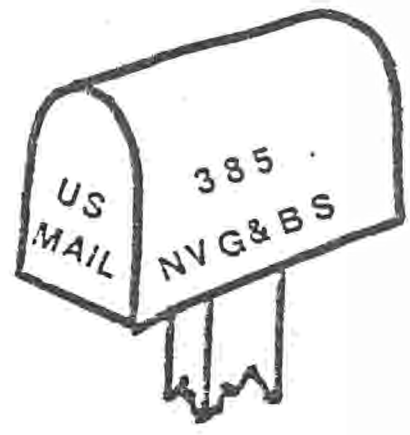
