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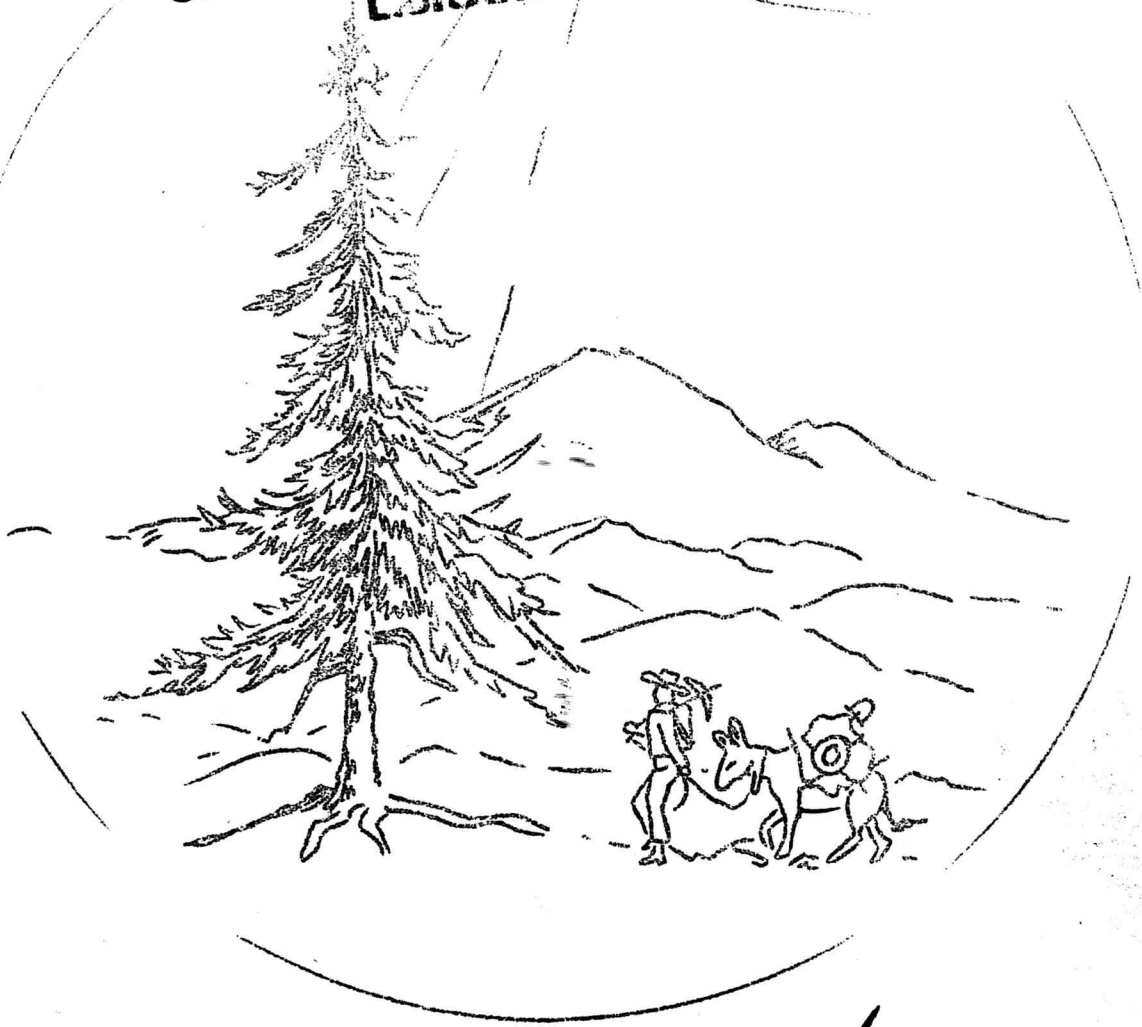

SAWYER'S BAR

The Salmon River has its source high in the mountains of Siskiyou County, California and is fed by the many lakes and springs there. It flows through a very narrow canyon and the road parallels the river. At intervals flats or bars extend into the river. These were named for former owners - Antoine's Flat, Robinsons' Flat, etc. until it came to my father's home, Clapboard Bar.

The river divided the land here and the acreage across from home was Slapjack, where father mined. Here my parents raised their family of thirteen children - Louise, Herbert, Joe, Bessie, Sam, Mary, Phil, Hattie, Francis, Trudie, Rob, Lydia and Harry.

My father was raised on a plantation in Missouri with slaves to obey his every wish. He came west in 1849. His mother was a French Huguenot and felt above the working class, so when my father married a working girl, he was disinherited. My mother was a fine woman and she often laughed and said father was a Patrician, while she was a Plebeian. They were married in Arcata. My father kept a store in Sawyer's Bar for many years, but the gold fever bit him and he bought the Clapboard mine.

I am 92 years old and the winter of 1968-1969 recalled the many winters spent on the Salmon River where we expected and prepared for hard winters. For many years there was no wagon road into Sawyer's Bar. All supplies were carried on mules: feed, machinery and even lumber, usually enough food to last from four to six months.

There was no communication with the outside world except the weekly mail, weekly for awhile, then later - daily mail. For many years there was no doctor. Lard and turpentine was a panacea for many ills such as colds, pleurisy, pneumonia. Usually this medication was followed by large doses of castor oil. Then as spring approached we would take sulphur and molasses to thin the blood.

The winters were usually severe, four or five feet of snow was usual, so we stored in supplies to last several months. The amount of food stored for a winter was amazing. A mule usually carried 300 pounds. The load must be balanced and lashed securely. Some of the items were one bbl. (100#) of sugar, butter came in solid pack in a 60# salt or brine sealed can, flour in 50# bags, and salt, lard and cereals in bulk. There were few jars, but mother made great crocks of jams, preserves and mince meat. This was kept by using spice and brandy. You just took enough mince meat out for pies, and brandy covered the rest. There was plenty of dried and fresh apples to help out the menu.

Almost everything was made by hand, even some of the shoes. Father had a cobbler's outfit and would bring home big "sides" of leather. He made shoes for the children, which my brother Sam called "choice swabs" as they were very crude. Father had forceps and often people came to have a painful molar extracted. Mother did all the sewing by hand, until my sister Louisa at the age of 18 years obtained a certificate to teach school and bought the first sewing machine that

Mother had. My sister Lou taught at Seiad (Seiad) Bar.

Preparing food was a slow process and done from "scratch". Father was fond of coffee. Raw coffee beans came in large bags. Mother prepared a mixture of Costa Rica and Java which she put in a large baking pan and put in the oven. This she watched carefully, stirring often with a large mixing spoon. If it got too dark, the coffee would be bitter. As soon as it was just right, she would stir in a number of eggs and stir quickly so every grain was coated. Then soon as it was a little cool, she would put it in a tight gallon can. This made a delicious clear brew, but we children were not allowed to drink coffee until we were 16 years old, and then it was very weak.

The soap making was also a very long process. The ash hopper was always in the back yard, a barrel set on a small platform. The barrel was full of hardwood ashes and a groove was cut around its base. Now, unless it rained, water was poured over the ashes, and lye needed to make soap leached out in a vessel set to catch it. When there was sufficient lye for a batch of soap, a fire was built under a large brass kettle and any grease available added to the lye, bacon rinds, lots of suet, even rancid grease went into the lye and mother stirred with a paddle until it was just right. She tested a little at intervals before pouring the mixture into molds. When cool and set, it was cut into bars and dried.

My father had a deep mine on Clapboard. He employed seventeen Chinese. They were mining the "blue lead" as it was called and it was paying well until one Chinaman was killed. They had to abandon this mine as no Chinese would go back there and no white men would work either. So operations were opened up on Slap Jack. There was good timber available, so he split "laggin" as he called the heavy boards and made a fine bridge that even horses could cross. Here he worked with the usual miners luck, good and bad seasons. There was a whipsaw mill there at the mouth of Eddy's Gulch as it emptied into the river. That was a large pit with a heavy frame over it and operated with a cross cut saw. Later a sawmill was operated by a Mr. Bigelow below the town, where the timber was close by and it was beautiful clear pine and fir.

Mining being an unreliable source of income and with a large family to provide for, father got the contract to carry the U. S. Mail between Etna and Sawyer's Bar, a 24 mile trip. The three older boys were able to take over this job, though Sam, the youngest was only 16 years old then. They became expert on skis, and had many thrilling adventures on the mountain. My dad made the skis from lumber that was "whip-sawed" at the nearby mill. He steamed the skis into proper shape and laced them with buck skin which he had tanned. My brothers worked hard, as the mail must be delivered and the mail was not often delayed. The boys would bring any really necessary articles in the winter, such as medicine, but heavy mail, such as catalogues, etc. were ditched. However, it was fine to get letters and the weekly Yreka "Union."

There seemed to be little crime. Of course, there were fewer people and they were closely associated in this little town. My brothers were kept busy, but other boys and young men found it not easy to find entertainment. One great source of amusement was stealing chickens. The boys would take chickens from different hen

houses, dress them and once even took them to the owner, who cooked them not knowing they were her own fowl. One old miner had a few hens, they helped out his menu, but they gradually disappeared, until when he went to feed them, only two or three were there. The boys on learning this, took up a collection of hens, a few from many neighbors and donated them to him, so when he went out to feed, a whole flock of hens flew out of the hen house.

On one St. Patrick's day, a very old miner who lived five miles away, came to town for supplies. He was a very small Englishman, but when he got to town he liked to celebrate. He wore a long white beard and his dog was white. This was too good a chance for fun, so after he had his drinks, the boys dyed his hair and beard and his dog a bright green. Imagine his consternation at his appearance after he sobered up.

My two older brothers, Herbie and Joe, dealt with one potential crime in their own fashion. They were about 12 and 14 and coming home from school when a man sitting under a bridge across Tanner's Gulch called Joe, who, unsuspecting, went to the man who then made an indecent proposition to him. This outraged Joe and he ran and overtook and told Herbie. They ran the mile home and secured a sawed-off shotgun and waited until the man passed and shot at him. He ran and they after him. The road is full of turns and each time he came into sight they shot. They pursued him about 1- $\frac{1}{2}$ miles when they got to Rattlesnake Spring and their ammunition was gone, so they went back home. Herbie was a fine shot and kept the family in fresh meat, a change from corned beef and bacon.

These years were hard, but my parents' faith was steadfast. Both were self-educated and fiction such as the monthly love story magazines were consigned to "Chick-Sales". This building stood on the edge of a 50-foot bank, a clear stream of water ran under it, a perfect sewer as it flowed through acres of rock piles. There were two big apple trees shading this building, so what a fine place to sit and read the forbidden stories.

My sister Hattie and her friend Mary Kelner cooked at the Hickey Hotel. This was a large hotel, long since burned. My younger sister Gertrude and her friend Pauline often went to visit the cooks at the hotel. One evening they came and found the girls still busy, so they went upstairs to wait in their bedroom. They were thinking of some joke to play, and spied a white chamber pot under the bed. They painted a face on the bottom of this with black ink and placed it between the pillows, then a roll of blanket completed the figure. They then left for home. When the girls in the kitchen got through with their dishes and preparations for breakfast such as slicing bacon, grinding coffee, etc., and went upstairs to their room, tired and ready to rest, they lighted the lamps and waited until the chimney warmed up, then they turned to their bed and saw it was occupied. Both screamed and ran; Mary fell and rolled down the long flight of stairs. The landlord came and uncovered the corpse and all had a good laugh.

My mother read aloud to us by the light of a kerosene lamp, aided by the flames of the big fireplace. A pan of apples or popcorn were always to serve as refreshments.

Schools were not graded then, so we just went through our books. The schoolhouse was on a hill overlooking the town. There was quite a level place for a playground. The Chinese graveyard was a short distance back of the schoolhouse. The Chinese do not leave their dead on foreign soil, so every so often an aged Chinaman, whom we called "Bonepicker" would exhume the remains of the corpse and prepare the bones to send back to China. This interested the children, as parts of garments, queques, etc., were scattered about.

Later the Chinese Exclusion Act was passed, but not until the Chinese became so numerous that they were a menace to the economy. At one time there were 500 at the mouth of Scott River. They could live on less food than the white man. They ate rice, cabbage, and occasionally chickens. The feeling against the Chinese was getting bitter. They worked so much below the going wages that when the Exclusion Act was passed, the young men thought the law too slow, so gave the Chinese no time to leave. My father, who was very just, allowed the two merchants, Tim Lum and Chun Kee, to store their merchandise in our store-room and live in an old building near us. They had bags of dried and salted shrimps, candies, cookies and dried fruits. One evening a group of young men came from town to our home and ordered my dad to get rid of the Chinese, but father would not permit the crowd to come inside the fence or harm the merchants. They were quite good neighbors and brought to the U. S. to work on the railroads, so it seemed unjust to send them back. They were a thrifty people and probably saved money while here. Harry had a good voice and learned to sing in Chinese and in German, as did Phil.

China New Years was celebrated in great style. Gangs of Chinese would come to join the ones on Clapboard Bar. This was a mile from town so they would have fire works and wrestle for the rockets as they fell to the ground. They were sober and kept outside the fence, though sometimes some would come against the picket fence with such force we would be sure the fence would give way. They would lie on their bunks and smoke opium. This drug did not seem to affect them or their work.

Winter cannot last forever. Soon we could see the sun on the high peaks and soon the long rays would shine down the deep canyon and pierce into the ice and snow and melt them, then little rills of icy water trickled down the hillside. Then we could see patches of bare ground. The miners are glad to see the water start to melt and that work would soon begin!

The sun's rays would reach first to Jack Pepper's shack. He was a very small, very old Indian. His tiny shack is down river and high above us on the hill. He had a drum, made of a frame covered with deer hide. I have no idea how he lived, but he would beat this drum steadily. Brother Harry went up to see him and he showed him the dried woodpecker's heads which were dried on a stick. These were actually legal tender, earlier, among the Indians.

In our home, there was a window on either side of the fireplace. A little stand was in one corner. Mother had a box 21' x 18', very shallow, which she filled with moss, with a tiny mirror in the center for a lake. This she called a farm of no acres. We children would add some of the wooden animals from the Noah's Ark that we got for Christmas, and the farm would be of interest to all.

If the mine would look prosperous, mother would send an order for seed to Vicks catalog or to Floral Par, N. Y. as she dearly loved flowers. There were many kinds of old-fashioned roses around the house and many kinds of grapes, which grew on trellises that made nice shady spots. These were not pruned so they grew to be large vines.

Food would get very stale in early spring. The refrigerator was a frame of wood covered with screen and hung in a cool place. As there were no jars for canning, fruit was dried or preserved. Mother made hominy from corn. She put corn in a large iron kettle, added water and lye from the hopper and cooked this until the hulls and eyes were loose. Then she took the kettle out to the flume of water and washed it through many waters, and then cooked it until the grains were tender. This was fine served with sugar and cream, or sometimes she put the hominy in bacon fat and when it was hot she stirred in some eggs, and this too was a good dish.

I wonder how my parents always were so cheerful and patient through the long winters. They had so many problems--would the mine pay and where were the boys on the mountain during the storms, etc. They called each other "dear" and I never heard them quarrel, though sometimes father sniffed if the coffee wasn't hot enough, would get up from the table and put the pot back on the stove or he would threaten to throw it out on mother's flowers.

Our big two-foot flume that carried the water from a dam a mile up the river paralleled the road and had been used to carry water when they mined on Clapboard. I am sure this lumber was whipsawed and the flume was built before my time. My father cut wood up near the dam, split it into stove wood, place it in the flume and some of the boys would be at home to throw it out. The water was clear and pure and was used for house and irrigation.

Garden seed was gathered and carefully hoarded. It was as precious as Johnny Appleseed's store. Mother had a grey calico bag full of seed and we children loved so to see her open this bag. Sometimes she would give us a few seeds for a little garden.

Everyone was happy once the snow started to melt. The men would break trail across the mountain, often shoveling through snow drifts the mules couldn't get through. Then we could have fresh food brought in. When the road was open across the mountain, the local butchers--Ted Luddy and Jim Nally--would go to Scott Valley and drive over ten or more head of cattle so we would have fresh meat. However, this perhaps would not happen until June. The cattle would be tired and sore-footed, so we children would keep well off the road. When they butchered father would get up at daylight, take a flour sack and walk the distance of at least one and a half miles to bring back meat in time for breakfast. This may seem incredible to people who may just get in their car and drive a few blocks to shop, but it is absolutely true.

Later in the year we would hear the tinkle of a bell and that would mean a pack train was approaching and soon we would see the train coming around the bend further up the canyon. Then we must get off the road, for the mules carried big loads--a bale of hay on either side of the pack saddle or even lumber and long lengths of

pipe, so they had to have plenty of room.

Winters were long and we surely welcomed the spring. We could go barefoot and swim in the clear swimming hole, just back of our house. We made journeys up the road, nothing to fear except a stubbed toe or a rattlesnake. Each turn in the road was, Rocky Slide, Red Dust, Sandy Bar. Sometimes we got as far as Rattlesnake Spring. Sister Mary was responsible for most of the names. She also had many original words.

My parents were both self-educated and were unhappy with the school at Sawyer's Bar. We had a mile to walk to school and sometimes in winter we often would have to wait until the mules went by the house and broke the trail, so they decided to move to Etna. A friend of my father's, Bill Bennett, owned a pack train of 60 mules which carried supplies to his store at the Forks of Salmon River. He offered this train to my father to move us to Etna as they had taken a load of supplies to the Forks and would return with only the pack saddles. So with this convenience we moved to Etna. The mule train had returned from unloading their cargo at the Forks, so when they reached our place and loaded our possessions on the mules, we only made ten miles and stopped at Billy Murray's for the night. This was still fifteen miles from Etna and the usual stop for the train. The packers cooked their meal over an open fire, and such delicious odors as were wafted on the mountain air! Our family slept and ate in the cabin and were up early the next morning to "board" the train for Etna. I rode behind the saddle of Monahan, a big Mexican, with an Irish name. That ride was as thrilling to me as the airplane rides I've had since. When a mule would get out of line to crop a bite of greenery, my escort would spur his mule and dash ahead to get the mule in line, which he did with loud oaths. I clung to his coat and was surely a tired little girl when we got to Etna. There was a large field and barn and a small house where we stopped. The packers usually used this for headquarters, but kindly gave this up to our use until my father could build a home.

The schoolhouse was next door to us here, so this was an advantage. My father built us a home later a half-mile from Etna and the flowers and trees that mother planted 75 years ago still bloom--lilacs, roses and some fruit trees. We lived there many years until my brother Herbie took over the mail contract, then we moved back to Clapboard Bar.

My mother was a good manager and a fine cook and I well remember the big brown loaves of bread she made and the doughnuts she cooked in a large iron pot, half full of bubbling lard. We used brown sugar that we bought in a large 100# barrel, and mother said that this sugar was the secret of the success with doughnuts.

Later, when I was married, we did have a doctor at Sawyer's Bar. He was Dr. Helm, who, with his wife and son, moved from Ashland. He practiced a few years, then passed away and a young Dr. Harry Kyselka came to our town. He was a Bohemian and a graduate of Ann Arbor and a good doctor. He rode a big mule to make his calls. His fee was \$2.00 a month for families and he furnished the few medicines needed. My daughter Betty was about four years old and the picture of health but had some trouble with her legs. She would fall when she stopped over was in some pain. We called Dr. Kyselka. He was puzzled and

said it acted like rheumatism and that some folks in his town used wintergreen, which grew there. This plant grows like yerbanna and they made a tea and drank it. So we gave Betty wintergreen tea and she was soon o. k. I believe now that this was polio, unheard of at that time.

Perhaps my story isn't connected, because at 92 dates and figures elude me, so I will just ramble on. I was one of the four youngest, mother used to call us "four babies". These were Rob, Lydia, Francis, and Trudy. When Trudy was seven, Harry was born. We were then near Etna in the house that father had built.

As we girls grew older, we would take "turns" keeping house for father and the boys--Joe, Sam and Phil. One year Mary and Bessie were at Clapboard, but there was not enough to keep both busy, so Bessie worked for neighbors. Herbie had married Tress Nally and had his home and headquarters for the mail in town. Joe carried the mail to Somes Bar and other offices down the river. This was a pericous trip, the narrow trail was so high above the river. The mules were slow and steady and the least misstep would have hurled them over the high cliffs. One day Joe got off his mule to get a drink of water at a spring. He was about to stoop down when he saw a big rattlesnake curled and waiting for prey, just above the spring.

Phil carried the mail to Black Bear, Summerville and mines along his route. I think the boys helped at home when not on the mail route. Sam and Mary were a lively pair and had a lot of fun. Mary was a pretty girl and had many admirers. One was not young, and lived in a small cabin on Russian Creek. He was in love with Mary and would entice her with promises of "fish and berries, Oh, Mary". Sam got a great kick out of this and made songs and poems to tease Mary.

The Chinese were then living on Clapboard and running the mine but were quiet and good neighbors. Some were small men and Sam would take one across his lap and spank him soundly. They thought this a big joke as they adored Sam. He was ambitious and wanted to find more income. He bought the town flume from Letty Golden. This flume was $2\frac{1}{2}$ or 3 miles long as it carried water to users below Sawyers Bar. It was an old flume, built part way on high trestles and required a lot of work to keep water for the town folks. Sam sent no bills for the \$1.50 a month fee, but would go to each user and say "it's time to ante up". The head of the flume was a dam near Clapboard Bar. This, Too, was an old dam and required a lot of work when the river was low to keep water in the flume. One day while Sam was working on the dam, he filled a nail keg half full of eels and brought them to Mary to cook. She was horrified as he threatened to wind one around her neck if she did not cook them. She finally persuaded him to take them back to the river.

Some years later, Mother and we younger ones moved back to Clapboard Bar. Mary and Ed Harris were married, as were Louise and Charles Bennet, Bessie and Joe Freshour, Sam and Florence Matthews, Herbie and Tress Nalley, Joe and Agnes Heard and Hattie and George Foerst. Phil, Rob, Francis and Trudy never married.

I was married to William Head and lived on Antone's Flat. Will worked at different mines and I was alone with the children, so after Dick (my third child) was born, mother wanted me to move back home.

There was a small house where the China house had been, so I moved there. Father was very ill and passed away in September. Mother followed him in November of the same year. Some months later Philip died.

Bob joined the Forest Service when it was first organized. He worked with them and was interested until they wanted him to work in the office. Then he quit and was at home for some years. After the parents' deaths, the home was left to the unmarried ones at home-- Bob, Francis, Harry and Trudy.

Through all these here years, father and mother kept an unwavering faith in a better world to come and both died happy, not at escaping life, but knowing a better world was ahead. Father only worried about unpaid debts, but later when the mine was sold, the ones left at home paid up all the debts, though they were long outlawed.

All the family is now gone. I, at 92 years of age, am the only one left of the large family. After an operation for cataracts, I can see quite well. My eight children are living in Oregon and California and I see them quite often. My health is very good and I keep busy while waiting like "the last leaf on the tree".
